Between 12:30 and 1:00 PM, EST, July 27, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed approximately one hundred and fifty Negroes at the Mt. Zion Church, Albany.

At 2:18 PM, July 27, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed Martin Luther King, Ralph Abernathy, W. D. Anderson, Slater King and

Albany, arrive in front of City Hall, Albany, accompanied by five female Negroes. The ten individuals lined up in single file on the sidewalk directly in front of City Hall and were met by Chief of Police Laurie Pritchett. Pritchett talked to King, who indicated that Dr. Anderson would be the spokesman. Pritchett then asked Anderson the purpose of the group's being there and Anderson replied they desired to see the City Commission and would remain until they saw the Commission.

Martin Luther King then asked Rev. Ralph bernathy to lead them in prayer. Upon conclusion of the prayer, Chief Pritchett asked if they were through praying, and neither Abernathy nor Anderson indicated that they were.

Chief Pritchett then ordered them to disperse or be arrested. Anderson and King stated they would remain. At 2:23 PM, EST, Agents observed Chief Pritchett place all of the ten under arrest, charging them with disorderly conduct, failure to obey orders of an officer and congregating on the sidewalk.

Commission to meet with Negroes on mutual problems and grievances.

Special Agents of the FBI observed a group of Negroes and one white male approaching the front of the Albany Police Station. Upon reaching the police station and City Hall, they all knelt on the sidewalk. One Negro male read from prepared sheet what appeared to be charges against the City of Albany. When he finished the chief of police told the group to move on since they had had ample time to pray and should go about their business. He reiterated this was their last chance to leave without being arrested. None of the Negroes moved and the chief then informed them they were under arrest.

Some remained in a kneeling position and were placed on stretchers and carried into the police station. All were charged with disorderly conduct, failure to obey an officer and obstructing the sidewalk.

advised that in this instance a total of eighteen individuals were arrested. This included one white male, identified as five Negro male juveniles, one female Negro juvenile, eight male Negro adults and three female Negro adults.

Special Agents of the FBI observed Negroes gathering at the Mt. Zion Church, beginning at about 7:00 PM, July 27, 1962. Approximately 600 persons were observed inside and outside the church at various intervals between 6:30 PM and 7:30 PM.

on July 27, 1962, that Wyatt Tee Walker entered the Mt. Zion Church at approximately 8:15 PM and instructed that no more night demonstrations would be held.

Persons began departing the church about 9:00 PM and there were no incidents or demonstrations.

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advised that Martin Luther King had received a telephone call from Lawrence Spivak, Producer of the TV Program "Meet the Press". King told Spivak that his leaving Albany would be a distressing factor to the cause, and King would not make a commitment as to whether or not he would appear on the program, Sunday, July 29, 1962.

advised that at 2:15 PM, July 28, 1962, Dr. W. G. Anderson was released from the Albany City Jail, following which he announced he would leave Albany by plane for New York and Washington, DC, to appear on the TV Program Meet the Press", Sunday, July 29, 1962, as a substitute for Martin Luther King. Anderson further announced that a "caucus" was held on the evening of July 27, 1962, and it was decided that Anderson would now lead the Albany Movement.

Special Agents of the FBI observed nine persons appear in front of City Hall, Albany, at 9:38 AM, July 28, 1962, where they started a picket line. It was composed of six female Negroes, two male Negroes and one white male.

Chief of Police Pritchett instructed that only two of them could picket and the rest must leave. Thereafter all nine were arrested and charged with failure to obey a police officer and bond of \$27 was set for each. The pickets carried signs which read as follows:

"1100 arrested in peace demonstrations"

"God is on our side"

"Freedom. No civil liberties. No civil rights"

"Legal to picket Albany, Georgia - Police say no"

"Does justice extend to Albany, Georgia"

"Revive First Amendment in Albany, Georgia"

"Freedom of Assembly"

Special Agents of the FBI observed a group of persons leaving Mt. Zion Church, Albany, about 3:30 PM, July 28, 1962. They drove to City Hall, Albany, got out of the automobiles and twenty-ine individuals knelt on the sidewalk in front of City Hall and started to pray. When they finished praying Chief Pritchett asked them to move on. One of the group got up and left. Another of the group replied, "In the name of God we will go to jail". The twenty-eight remaining were then

arrested and taken to jail. Six of the twenty-eight refused to walk into jail and were carried in on stretchers by police officers. At the/time the twenty-eight were praying, a white male.

No information was received that such prayer vigils were held in Atlanta, Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia, Hartford or Richmond (California). Short vigils were held in Boston, Los Angeles, Sacramento and Fresno. No incidents or arrests occurred.

One hundred and three ministers, led by Reverend George Lawrence, Antioch Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York, met at the Metropolitan Baptist Church, Washington, D. C., en August 6, 1962, and then went in a body to the White House where they were met by Mr. Lee White, Assistant Special Counsel to the President.

After 45 minutes with Mr. White, they held a prayer vigil in front of the White House and thereafter picketed for a short time. They carried placards reading, "Prayer Vigil For Martin Luther King And The Embattled People Of Albany, Georgia," and "On To Washington, On To Albany, Georgia."

Information concerning additional developments in relation to the Albany situation will be promptly brought to the Department's attention.

They refused and were arrested at 3:30 p.m. They were taken to City Jail and charged with congregating on the sidewalk, disorderly conduct and failure to obey order of a police officer. Bond was set at \$200 for each person. This group consisted of one adult male, two adult females, five juvenile males, seven juvenile females.

Shortly after 3:30 p.m., July 31, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed six Negroes kneeling and praying on the steps of the Albany City Hall. When they completed their praying, they were requested by a police officer to leave, but refused. They were arrested charged with congregating on the sidewalk, disorderly conduct and failure to obey order of a police officer. Bond was set at \$200 for each person. Of these six individuals, one was an adult male, and five were adult females.

on July 31, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI at 8:25 p.m. observed a group of eighteen Negroes arrive at the Albany City Hall in automobiles. They left their vehicles, knelt on the sidewalk and prayed. They then arose and sang.



The "New York Times," a daily newspaper for July 31, 1962, contained an article that a group of ministers from New York and vicinity planned to come to Washington; D. & Monday, August 6, 1962, to demand intervention by the President on behalf of Regroes in this racial crisis.

The article mentioned that the ministers, thoth white and Hegro, met in a Harlem, New York City, church, on July 30; 1962, to formulate plans for getting other ministers in the eastern part of the state to join the motorcade to the White House.

The meeting was presided over by Reverend George Lawrence, Regional Representative of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and Reverend Thomas Kilgore, Executive Secretary of the New York Friends of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

This figure should be 37 since one Negro did leave the area in front of City Hall, Albany, when ordered to do so by the police department (PD) and was not arrested. Information developed 7/28/62 that there has not been any rock throwing or disturbances at the Newton, Georgia, jail where ten Negroes arrested for demonstrations in Albany are incarcerated. had informed Atlanta Office that he had called Assistant Attorney General Burke Marshall and complained of rock throwing at the jail. A hearing was held in U. S. District Court for the Middle District of Georgia by U. S. District Judge J. Robert Elliott on 7/30/62 concerning the petition for injunction by the city of Albany against demonstrations by various Negro groups and individuals. Judge Elliott at 3:30 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time - EST) ruled that his court had jurisdiction of the subject matter of the dispute and commented that to rule otherwise would in effect be a ruling that the Constitution would protect only minority groups and would not protect majority groups. On 7/30/62 a crowd possibly consisting of 2000 persons assembled at Kiokee Church, Albany, Dr. W. G. Anderson founder of Albany Movement, a group seeking desegregation at Albany, was the main speaker.

Anderson stated that while in New York City to appear on "Meet the Press' on 7/29/62 he contacted important people who promised to send additional demonstrators to Albany. Anderson then stated "We are going all the way regardless of what happens."

A group of 16 persons (15 Negroes and 1 white) at 9:15 p.m. EST from Kiokee Church arrived at City Hall where they knelt and prayed on sidewalk, then stood up and sang loudly. They were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct, obstructing the sidewalk, and failure to obey an officer.

A meeting of the Albany Movement, a Negro group seeking desegregation of public facilities at Albany, Georgia, was held 7/28/62 at Mt. Zion Church, Albany. The meeting ended at 10:30 P.M. No incidents or violence reported.

Robert M. Shelton of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Imperial Wizard, United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was observed by Agents in Albany on 7/28/62.

Dr. W. G. Anderson, President of the Albany Movement, who was arrested on 7/27/62 by Albany Police Department, was released from jail on 7/28/62. Dr. Anderson announced he would appear on "Meet the Press" television program 7/29/62.

Dr. Anderson did appear on "Meet the Press" and stated the Negroes of Albany desire to negotiate with City Commission of Albany on the following points:

- 1. Fair and just disposition of cases against persons arrested in demonstrations at Albany
- 2. The right to peacefully protest grievances
- 3. Clarification of the Interstate Commerce Commission ruling concerning desegregation of transportation facilities
- 4. Desegregation of local bus service when it resumes
- 5. Establishment of a bi-racial committee concerning public facilities.

Dr. Anderson described Albany, Georgia, as the most totally segregated city in the United States and stated the situation was explosive if the demands of Negroes were continually frustrated. He criticized the present administration for not taking stronger action. He also described the beating of a white man in Albany who was placed in a cell with other white men. Dr. Anderson stated the guard mentioned to the other white prisoners, "Here is a nigger lover," which led to the beating.

Dr. Anderson stated the Executive Committee of the Albany Movement would have to make the decision as to whether to obey a Federal injunction against demonstrations.

A hearing is being held today 7/30/62 on City of Albany petition for Federal injunction against demonstrations in Albany.

Nine individuals (eight Negroes and one white person) were arrested by Albany Police Department on the afternoon of 7/28/62 after picketing City Hall, Albany, and then failing to obey orders of a police officer. Bond was set at \$27 each.

An additional group of 29 individuals left Mt. Zion Church on the afternoon of 7/28/62 and proceeded to City Hall. The group knelt in front of City Hall and were requested to leave by Chief Pritchett. They refused stating "In the name of God we will go to jail."

One white citizen, described as a "hothead" was arrested when he charged the above group as it knelt in prayer.

Mr. John Murphy of Civil Rights Division was furnished the above information on 7/29/62.





Newton is approximately 20 miles from Albany.

Bond was set at \$200 for each person. The 15 arrested at the library consisted of 1 adult male, 2 adult females, 5 male juveniles and 7 female juveniles. Those arrested at City Hall consisted of 1 male adult and 5 female adults. All persons arrested were Negroes. At 8:25 P.M., EST, 7/31/62, 18 Negroes arrived at City Hall, knelt on the sidewalk and prayed after which they arose and sang. These persons were then told by to leave or they would be Trested. About 1:30 P.M., Eastern Standard Time (EST), James Forman, a Negro leader of the SNVCC, and seven Negro male juveniles left the church and attempted unsuccessfully to obtain lunch service at Grants and Woolworth 5¢ and 10¢ stores, a Howard Johnson Restaurant and a Holiday Inn in Albany. While approaching the Holiday Inn, a large group of spectators, who by this time was following the group, congregated on the sidewalk with press representatives. A police officer advised Forman and the juveniles they were creating a disturbance and he asked them to disperse. They refused and were arrested. They were taken to City Jail and charged with disorderly conduct. Bond was set at \$200 each. At 8:00 P.M., EST, 8/1/62, a meeting commenced at Kiokee Church and estimated attendance was placed at 1,500 persons. The meeting ended at 10:00 P.M., EST. that during the evening of July 31, 1962, Reverend Martin Luther King, Sr. addressed a meeting of the Albany Movement held at the Mt. Zion Church. He urged his audience to demand better housing facilities and encouraged a full economic boycott by Albany Negroes of white Albany merchants.

FITTS also advised that William Fitz Ryan, a congressman from New York State, appeared at the above-mentioned meeting and spoke in support of the Albany Movement. Ryan said he was in Albany as a private citizen rather than as a congressman. He stated his constituents in New York were sympathetic to the Albany Movement and would possibly send persons to Albany, Georgia, to demonstrate. Ryan promised to report his observations and remarks to the Attorney General of the United States.

After leaving this meeting, Ryan spent 50 minutes in the Albany City Jail visiting with Martin Luther King, Jr. Thereafter, he talked to representatives of the press concerning the same matters he referred to during his talk at the Mt. Zion Church.

On August 1, 1962, at approximately Noon, Special Agents of the FBI observed that a meeting was being held at the Shiloh Baptist Church by members of the Student Non Violent Coordinating Committee. At 1:30 p.m. seven juvenile Negroes, led by James Forman, left the church in automobiles.

They drove to Grant's Store located in the Midtown Shopping Center. The group was refused service at the lunch counter and then entered a Woolworth Store. The lunch counter in the Woolworth Store was closed and the group was told by an Albany police officer to leave. The group retired to their vehicles, but in a few moments returned to Woolworth's. Forman attempted to make a purchase at the lunch counter. He was told by the manager that the lunch counter was closed. Forman and his companions left.

The afore-mentioned group arrived at Howard Johnson's Restaurant in the eastern section of Albany, at approximately 2 p.m. They left a few minutes later.

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The group then walked near by to several representatives of the press who had been following the group.

A few minutes later, the group entered their cars and proceeded to the Holiday Inn Motel in downtown Albany. Forman and four of his companions walked to the motel dining room. Concurrently, a large group of spectators had congregated on the sidewalk together with representatives of the press. An Albany policeman told the group they were creating a disturbance and asked them to disperse. The group refused, was arrested, and taken to the City Jail. Each individual was charged with disorderly conduct and his bond was set at \$200.

Re Racial Situation, Albany, Georgia

On August 1, 1962, at approximately 8 p.m., a meeting of the Albany Movement was observed by Special Agents of the FBI to be held at The Third Kiokee Church in Albany. An estimated 1,500 persons attended. The meeting terminated at approximately 10 p.m. without incident.

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

There were no arrests or incidents in Albany, Georgie, on August 7, 1962.

On August 7, 1962, the defendants in the Albany injunction case made a motion to consolidate two pending intesting gration suits (730 and 731) with the present injunction action. If the United States District Judge were to allow this motion the city of Albany would be given time to file an answer to the above pending suits, and after deliberation, he would then rule on the motion to consolidate. However, after the 2:30 p.m. recess on August 7, the defendants withdrew this motion to consolidate pending actions stating they wanted the merits of other cases heard.

At the conclusion of the examination of Mayor Asa Kelley in the Albany injunction case on August 7, 1962, the defendants' attorney elicited Kelley's view as to scope and meaning of the injunction if it were granted. Kelley under questioning indicated the injunction was not intended to enjoin defendants in actions that would violate segregation laws, but only actions which would violate the specific penal ordinances mentioned in the injunction.

Between 12:00 noon and 1:45 p.m. August 7, 1962, a youth meeting was held in the Mount Zion Church Thich was attended by approximately 25 to 30 individuals. Efforts fere made at this meeting without success to get volunteers to demonstrate at the Albany, Georgia, City Hall.

At approximately 8:30 p.m. August 7, 2962, between 1,800 and 2,000 Regroes attended a meeting at the Third Micke 1962 Church. The meeting consisted of a long address by IE. W. G. Anderson in which he attempted to stimulate interest.

denounced James H. Gray, Editor of the "Albany Herald," as an "outside agitator." Dr. Anderson said that it would be necessary to have 11,000 Negroes registered before the November election in order to remove the incumbent commissioners.

Dr. Anderson stated that the 103 ministers who had appeared at the White House on August 6, 1962, were in Albany, Georgia:

Br. Anderson announced plans to have all Negro churches in the Albany area filled to capacity on Sunday, August 12, 1962, and for a possible demonstration the same day. He announced no plans for demonstrations prior to that date.

A youth meeting is scheduled for the Shiloh Baptist Church for noon August 8, 1962. A meeting of the Albany Movement is scheduled for the Arcadia Baptist Church and Mount Olive Baptist Church on the evening of August 8, 1962.

There was no prayer vigil held in San Diego, California, on August 6, 1962. An article appearing in the "Washington Post and Times Herald" on August 6, 1962, stated that a vigil was scheduled for San Diego that would protest the mass jailing of Hegroes in Albany, Georgia, and was scheduled for that date.

Developments in relation to the Albany situation will be promptly brought to the Department's attention.

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At 2:30 p.m., July 30, 1962, a hearing on an injunction previously filed by Albany city officials against officers of the Albany Movement and others commenced before Judge J. Robert Elliott, U. S. District Court, Middle District of Georgia in Albany. At approximately 3:30 p.m., Judge Elliott ruled the court had jurisdiction and commented that to rule otherwise would in effect be a ruling that the Constitution would protect only minority groups and not majority groups. The hearing went into the merits of the injunction and at 5:15 p.m., Judge Elliott declared a recess until 9:30 a.m., July 31, 1962.

At approximately 8:40 p.m., July 30, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed a crowd of persons, possibly up to two thousand in number, meeting at The Third Kiokee Baptist Church located about one mile from downtown Albany. This meeting terminated approximately 10:30 p.m.

At approximately 9:19 p.m., July 30, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed fifteen Negroes and one white person arrive at the Albany City Hall from the Kiokee Church. These persons knelt and prayed on the sidewalk before the City Hall. They then stood up and sang loudly. They were arrested at 9:26 p.m. by Chief of Police Laurie Pritchett and charged with disorderly conduct, obstructing sidewalk and failure to obey an officer. Bond was set at \$200 each.

At the hearing before U. S. District Court Judge J. ROBERT ELLIOTT on August 3, 1962, the plaintiffs completed presentation of their evidence about noon. Following this, the defendants moved to dismiss on the grounds that the court lacks jurisdiction and other reasons. Judge ELLIOTT overruled the motion to dismiss, and court adjourned until 2:00 p.m., August 7, 1962.

Approximately 1:00 p.m. on August 3, 1962, four Negro juveniles, two male and two female, started to picket in front of City Hall in Albany, each carrying signs which read "Freedom to picket, speak, assemble now -- freedom in Albany now - if Albany is to grow, Jim Crow must go - we want freedom of speech now." requested the picketers

to halt three times so he could speak with them. They ignored this request and were arrested on charge of failure to obey an officer. The picketers were turned over to the Juvenile Office.

A meeting of the Albany Movement Negroes at the Mount Zion Church began at 8:00 p.m. on August 3, 1962, with about 400 present. The meeting concluded at 10:40 p.m. with no demonstrations or violence.

At 4:05 P.M., SA called from Albany, Georgia, to advise that Departmental Attorney Jerome Heilbron of the Civil Rights Division, filed a brief today as friend of the court in civil action number 727, United States District Court, which is the suit brought by Asa D. Kelly, Jr., Mayor of Albany, et al., seeking an injunction against the Albany Movement to prevent their demonstrations.

The brief which Heilbron is releasing to the press makes the following major points:

- l. The demonstrations which the plaintiffs seek to prevent are a direct product of the failure of Albany officials to grant Negro citizens their Constitutional rights.
- 2. This is a suit in equity and the plaintiffs do not come with clean hands because of their refusal to negotiate with the Negroes.
- 3. There is no cause for Federal action because the Negroes did not have the purpose of depriving others their Constitutional rights or of preventing city authorities from granting others their Constitutional rights. The Negroes instead were seeking only to gain their own Constitutional rights.

Copies of the brief are being mailed to the Bureau directly from Albany tonight.

Stephen (Rusk) Albany City Manager, testified at the injunction proceeding today that he had never received a request from the Albany Movement for a parade permit. On cross-examination he was shown a copy of a letter which allegedly requested such a permit but he testified that he had never considered the letter to be a request for a permit but had considered it merely to be a statement of intention to parade.



The Attorney Consideration

United States District Judge, J. Robert Elliott, heard defense witness Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., on August 8, 1962, who was asked if he had knowledge of the fact that several well-known communists were present when Reverend Mr. King spoke at the Highlander Folk School (a labor education school in Tennessee). Reverend Mr. King denied any knowledge of persons present being known to him as being communists.

Both parties to the injunction suit brought by the city of Albany against various groups and individuals seeking to enjoin further demonstrations in Albany, rested their case on August 8, 1962. Judge Elliott denied a motion of the defense to dismiss on grounds of lack of jurisdiction and insufficient evidence. He stated at the conclusion of the pearing that it may be days, weeks or months before he decides the case. Judge Elliott stated he was leaving the case open to both parties for additional briefs, new evidence or written arguments pending his final decision.

The defense (Negroes of Albany) made a plea for an early hearing on two pending cases, the desegregation of facilities and the right to stage demonstrations. Judge Elliott declined to set a date on these cases.

During the afternoon of August 8, 1962, Departmental Attorney, Jerome K. Heilbron, filed a brief, amicus curiae, in the above injunction action questioning jurisdiction and supporting the position of the defendants.

As of August 8, 1962, there were four out-of-town ministers from Virginia and North Carolina in Albany.

United States Attorney, Floyd M. Buford, Middle District of Georgia, advised on August 8, 1962, that he had been in telephonic contact with the Department and requested the following investigation under the contempt aspects of this matter regarding readily accessible adults who participated and were arrested in the July 21, 1962, demonstration:

- (1) Whether participant was a member of an organization named in the injunction order;
- (2) Whether participant had notice of the order, when the notice was received, and how the notice was obtained;
- (3) Participant's knowledge of the provisions of the order;
- (4) Whether participant acting in concert with any person or organization named in the order and whether any persons actively pursuaded participant to join in the demonstrations.

United States Attorney Buford has advised he is submitting a written request for the above investigation on August 9, 1962.

The Albany Movement held meetings at the Mt. Olive Baptist Church and Arcadia Baptist Church, both Albany, on the night of August 8, 1962, with mediocre crowds in attendance. No meetings are set for August 9, 1962.

Information concerning developments in relation to the Albany situation will be promptly brought to the Department's attention.

Slater Hunter King, Negro leader, cousin of Reverend Martin Luther King, was released from jail on bond on 8/2/62.

Congressman William Fitts Ryan, Democrat, New York, spoke to House of Representatives on 8/1/62 as reported in Congressional Record Volume 108, No. 133, Pages 14322-14326.

Mr. Ryan called for civil rights legislation on the basis of the Albany situation. Mr. Ryan admitted that he had only spent 6 to 8 hours in Albany.

Mr. Ryan stated "I bring a frightening warning from Reverend Martin Luther King \*\*\* and other Negro leaders in Albany, Georgia. A warning which I have found with my own eyes to be dangerously true." He also commented that "Interstate bus facilities continue to be segregated. City officials refuse even to discuss steps toward equal rights. The courts have delayed in acting on the arrests of some 700 Americans."

There is no indication in the Congressional Record that Mr. Ryan visited the bus terminal, talked with city officials, city police or anyone connected with the judicial system in Albany.

Mr. Ryan commented that "Police brutality is openly reported and easily discovered."

Commenting concerning Negroes who attended a meeting held on 7/31/62 in Albany, Mr. Ryan stated "Their enthusiasm, their indomitable will in the face of brutality and oppression and their continued restraint are amazing."

Mr. Ryan claimed that the situation in Albany may explode into violence. He mentioned the FBI in one instance, "The FBI has been investigating well reported instances of police brutality." The Bureau is conducting investigation into several allegations of violations of civil rights.

Mr. Ryan did not contact any representative of the Bureau while in Albany.





advised that between July 11, 1902, and August 3, 1962, inclusive, 384 persons had been arrested by the Albany Police Department in connection with activities of the Albany Movement.

explained that when persons are arrested and booked by the Albany Police Department in connection with demonstrations and/or other activity, bond is set immediately on the spot and the arrestee may make bond at the time or at any subsequent time he desires.

During the evening of August 4, 1962, advised that of the persons previously arrested in connection with the Albany situation, less than fifty persons now remained in jail. observed that the Albany Movement appeared to be in the process of bonding out all persons previously arrested.

At 7:15 p.m., August 4, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed a group of 13 Negroes assembled in front of the Albany City Hall, in which building is also housed the Albany Police Department and City Jail. This group consisted of nine females and four males. There was one juvenile female and one juvenile male included in the group. This group knelt on the sidewalk and intermittently prayed, sang, screamed and cried. Between approximately 7:20 and 7:30 p.m., approximately 15 representatives of the news media, including news cameramen and TV cameramen were observed to arrive on the scene. They set up their equipment directly in front of the group of Negroes. The praying, singing and screaming on the part of the group was observed to be intensified as the setting up of the afore-mentioned equipment was completed.

The Albany Police Department blocked off the street from pedestrian and automobile traffic. After approximately thirty minutes, Chief of Police Pritchett requested the group to move on several times. The group ignored his requests and the Chief told them they were under arrest.

RACIAL SITUATION ALBANY, GEORGIA O RACIAL MATTERS - ATLANTA

The City Commissioners of Albany, Georgia, met on August 11, 1962, and thereafter issued a press release. ? The Commissioners noted the departure from Albany of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., and stated that it was the beginning of a quieter and more relaxed atmosphere between Megroes and white persons.

The Commissioners reiterated their policy of enforcing laws which are violated and mentioned that they would hear any person at regular city commission meetings.

No specific mention was made in the press release of the telegram which was sent by Albany Movement officials to the City Commission on August 10, 1962, which telegram requested an audience with the Commission.

Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., and Reverend Ralph Abernathy have airline reservations to return to Albany, Georgia, teday, August 13, 1962, from Atlanta, Georgia. Hr. Wyatt Tee-Walker, Assistant to Reverend Mr. King, had airline reservations for Detroit, Michigan, on August 11, 1962.

Reverend Mr. King was interviewed on August 11, 1962, by an Associated Press reporter and stated, "the present attitude of Albany City Commission can cause one of the most explosive racial situations in U. S. today." He commented he would return to Albany on Monday, August 13, 1962, and may have to resort to massive demonstrations again.

The group of Begro and white individuals led by Beyerend Richard A. Battles from Hartford, Connecticut, which group arrived in Albany on August 9, 1962, departed Albany englest 11, 1962, after esticials of the Albany Sevenent requested the group to leave. The Albany Police Department was advised of the apprival and department of the apprival and department was advised of the apprival and department.

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Mixed groups of Negro and white persons under the sponsorship of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee attempted to integrate the Carnegie Library and the Tift, Carver and Tallulah Massey Parks, all in Albany, Georgia, on August 11, 1962. The library and parks were immediately closed. The parks were barricaded and guarded by Georgia state troopers. No incidents occurred and no arrests were made. On August 11, 1962, five individuals entered the dining room at the Holiday Inn at Albany and refused to leave after being requested by the management three times to do so. They were charged with failure to leave the premises after being requested to do so by the management.

We information has been received that members of the American Mani Party, an anti-Negro and anti-Semitic group of Arlington, Virginia, have arrived in Albany. The Albany Police Department has been alerted to the possible arrival of four American Mani Party members.

On Bunday, August 12, 1962, small groups of Regroes appeared at three white churches in Albany to attend services. The Negroes were turned away with the exception of one Negro female who was allowed to attend services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

No other incidents or arrests occurred on August 12, 1962.

# BRIEF FOR THE UNITED STATES AS AMICUS CURIAE

The United States, which has both a legal interest in the protection of the constitutional rights 1/of citizens and a deep concern for the maintenance of law and order, submits this brief amicus curiae in the hope that it may assist the Court in the solution of the issues facing it in the instant case.

been demonstrating in Albany for a change of the City's racial policies so as to bring these policies into alignment with the Federal Constitution. The instant suit was brought to enjoin these demonstrations. The plaintiffs have alleged that considerable numbers of law enforcement officers have been required to subdue the defendants and others seeking their rights, and that the City of Albany is threatened with disorder and violence as the result of the defendants' activities.

The American governmental system is built upon law and respect for law. It is essential to the

preservation of this system of law that no citizen, whatever his cause, be permitted to commit acts of violence or to disobey the law. But it is no less essential to the preservation of this system that the fundamental rights of free speech, assembly, and petition be safeguarded and preserved to those citizens who seek peaceably to present their cause to the governmental officials charged with the duty of administering and executing the laws of the land. It is significant, therefore, that the plaintiffs seek not only to enjoin mass demonstrations, or demonstrations which might conceivably erupt into violence and civil disorder. They also seek to close all avenues of demonstrative protest, however few the persons involved or however restrained their conduct.

It has been argued that the Court lacks constitutional and statutory authority to restrain the activities of the defendants. We believe such arguments to have considerable force. In our view, however, even if the Court had statutory authority to proceed, it would still be precluded by fundamental principles of equity from granting relief to the plaintiffs.

An essential condition to the exercise of equity jurisdiction is that "he who comes into equity must come with clean hands." Precision Co. v. Automotive Co., 324 U.S. 806, 814 (1945). The Supreme Court has stated that this maxim "is far more than a mere banality. It is a self-imposed ordinance that closes the doors of a court of equity to one tainted with inequitableness or bad faith relative to the matter in which he seeks relief, however improper may have been the behavior of the defendant." Ibid. One of the primary purposes of the doctrine is to protect the integrity of equity courts (Gaudiosi v. Mellon, 269 F. 2d 873 (3rd Cir. 1959), Mas v. Coca-Cola Cp., 163 F. 2d 505 (4th Cir. 1947)) -- courts which act "only as conscience commands." Keystone Co. v.

But incidental consequences do: not satisfy ithe 'statute. There must be a purpose to deny to others their constitutional rights. Lacking that, there is no cause of action under the statute.

The First Amendment prohibits courts as well as administrative officials from imposing a prior restraint upon speech or assembly even in cases where a claim is made that the activity would incite others to acts of violence. Sellers v. Johnson, 163 F. 2d 877 (8th Cir. 1947), cert. denied, 332 U.S. 851; Cooper v. Aaron, 358 U.S. 1 (1958); Rockwell v. Morris, 211 N.Y.S. 2d 25 (1st Dept. 1961), aff'd. 10 N.Y. 2d 721, 176 N.B. 2d 836 (1961), cert denied, 368 U.S. 913 (1961); Whitney v. California, 274 U.S. 357, 377-378 (Brandeis, J., concurring). The defendants in this case have shown that theirs is a movement of non-violent protest. The violence of others, whether opponents or proponents, cannot be used as a vehicle for denying the defendants their constitutionally-protected rights.

Excavation Co., 290 U.S. 240, 245 (1933). It would be difficult to imagine a case more suited to the application of this overriding principle than the case now before this Court.

The plaintiffs have presumed to invoke 42 U.S.C. 1985 (3), a civil rights statute, in support of their claim. Hence, we have here the incongruous spectacle of laws adopted to protect the citizens from oppression by the State and by those who are acting pursuant to state policies, laws, and customs, being used to stifle the freedom of these defendants to protest against continuation by the plaintiffs of these unconstitutional practices.

The Supreme Court and the lower federal courts have repeatedly held that racial segregation in facilities operated by or under the control of the state (or its officials) is illegal under the United States Constitution and under federal law.

These holdings apply to public schools, public 5/parks, public recreational facilities, public

libraries, public transportation, interstate transportation terminals, and other public facilities.

In spite of their clear and well-settled obligation under law to cease these discriminatory practices, and their duty under the Constitution, the officials in charge of the City of Albany have not acted. The public parks and public libraries are still segregated. So are the public schools. Indeed, city ordinances require segregation in privately-owned public accommodations, such as taxicabs and theaters (see note 10 supra). The result is that segregation and discrimination persist in every significant public facility or accommodation provided in or by the City of Albany.

follows that all ordinances of the City of Albany
requiring segregation (e.g., Code of City of Albany,
1947, Ch. 22, §§ 1, 2, 3, 4; Ch. 26, § 12.) are in
violation of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

In an attempt to alleviate this situation, those affected and discriminated against repeatedly sought to negotiate directly with the City Commission for their undeniable constitutional rights.

Nevertheless, conditions in Albany remained unchanged. When it finally became apparent that no action, however minimal, would be taken to comply with federal law, the Negroes proceeded to exercise their rights of free speech, assembly, and petition by means of various demonstrations. But even when their protests could not have been objectionable in size or manner, the only result was that the dissenters were arrested.

It is thus apparent that the demonstrations in question were the direct product of the failure of the Albany officials to take any steps to grant to the Negro citizens of Albany their constitutional rights. The City officials should not be permitted to use the situation thus created as a basis for a federal injunction restraining demonstrations seeking to introduce constitutional rights into Albany. "Whenever a party who, as actor seeks to set the judicial machinery in motion and obtain some remedy, has violated conscience or good faith, or other equitable principle, in his prior conduct, then the doors of the court will be shut against him in limine; the court will refuse to interfere in his behalf, to acknowledge his right, or to award him any remedy." Mas v. Coca-Cola Co., supra at 508.

Moreover, as the Supreme Court has recognized, "where a suit in equity concerns the public interest as well as the private interests of the

litigants this doctrine (of clean hands) assumes even wider and more significant proportions. For if an equity court properly uses the maxim to withhold its assistance in such a case it . . . averts an injury to the public. The determination of when the maxim should be applied to bar this type of suit thus becomes of vital significance." Precision Co., v. Automotive Co., supra at 815. The public interest is clearly involved in this action which seeks the help of a federal court to close the one avenue of protest open to persons who have been deprived of their fundamental rights. This Court should not lend its aid to the plaintiffs without first requiring them to comply with the recognized principles of equity and the fundamental law of the land.

He who seeks equity must do equity. "An actor in equity comes into a court of conscience and will not be allowed . . . relief otherwise than under the condition that he does equity upon his part." Walker v. Galt, 171 F. 2d 613, 615 (5th Cir. 1948). In accordance with these established principles of equity and justice, we believe that this Court ought to require the plaintiffs to initiate, in good faith, compliance with the law before the Court further considers the complaint filed in this action. We are confident that if the Albany officials, the plaintiffs in the lawsuit, were to declare today that they would do what the Constitution and the law

commands them to do, there would be no demonstrations and no need for litigation and bitterness.

The demonstrations arose out of the failure of the plaintiffs to comply with the Constitution; a federal court, or, indeed, any court of equity, should not lend its power to these plaintiffs until there is such compliance.







On 8-3-62, four Negro juveniles (two males and two females) started to picket in front of City Hall Albany. They were requested three times to halt by could talk to them. They refused and were arrested, charged with failure to obey an officer. They were turned over to juvenile authorities. This information has been furnished to Governor S. Ernest Vandiver of Georgia, Chief of Police Laurie Pritchett of Albany and the Civil Rights Division of the Department. Approximately 400 Negroes of the Albany Movement met at the Mt. Zion Church on 8-3-62. No demonstrations occurred and meeting adjourned at 10:40 P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

Memorandum to Mr. Belmont

The ministers, white and Negro, met in a Harlem Church New York City, on July 30, 1962, to formulate plans for getting other ministers in the eastern part of the state to join the motorcade to the White House. The meeting was presided over by Reverend George Lawrence, Regional Representative of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and Reverend Thomas Kilgore, Executive Secretary of the New York Firends (of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference).

The ministers agreed to call on President Kennedy to initiate an immediate investigation to determine if the arrests of Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr., and his associates violated their Constitutional rights. They will urge that such investigation should be directed personally in Albany by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy.

The "Worker," East Coast Communist newspaper for Sunday, 8-5-62, contains a similar article pointing out that 150 ministers from New York City and surrounding areas are organizing a motorcade to Washington, D. C., on Monday, 8-5-62. The "Worker" contained a quote from Reverend Lawrence that "if the President does not see and satisfy us, we will demonstrate prayerfully and peacefully in front of the White House. If this produces no results, we will mobilize both white and Negro clergymen to march on Albany, Georgia, and to demonstrate peacefully and prayerfully in front of the same municipal building where Dr. King and his associates sought to pray and were arrested for it." One of the proposals the group will urge on the President is to have the Attorney General personally go to Albany, Georgia, to direct an investigation.

The above information concerning the ministers coming to Washington, D. C., was furnished to the Civil Rights Division of the Department, Secret Service at the White House, the Metropolitan Police Department, Washington, D. C., and the Park Police, Washington, D. C., on 8-3-62.



Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., returned to Albany, Georgia on the evening of August 13, 1962, and is staying at the residence of Dr. W. G. Anderson, the founder of the Albany Movement.

Mr. Wyait Tee walker, assistant to Reverend Mr. King, did not go to Detroit, Michigan, as planned on August 11, 1962.

On August 13, 1962, two pickets appeared at the Carnegie Library, Albany, which has been closed by police. They left when requested to do so by the police department.

A fifteting of approximately 1500 Negroes was held at the Mt. Zon Baptist Church on the evening of August 18, 1962. The meeting was addressed by Dr. W. G. Anderson, who urged a continued boycott of local merchants. He also stressed voter registration for the city election to be held in Nevember, 1962, in order that Negro city commissioners could be elected.

I Dr. Anderson also discussed plans to have parents register their children in Albany high schools this fall. No plans were discussed for mass demonstrations in Albany but small demonstrations at lunch counters, cafeterias and public tax-supported institutions will continue.

Reverend Mr. King and Reverend Ralph Abernathy made an appearance at the meeting at the Mt. Zion Church and Reverend Mr. King stated he planned to remain in Albany to lead the fight for integration.

## The Attorney General

The five individuals arrested at the Holiday Inn restaurant on August 11, 1962, were tried in Recorder's Court, Albany, on August 13, 1962, and each was sentenced to a fine of \$200 or sixty days in jail.

Three members of the American Nazi Party arrived in Albany on August 12, 1962, and are camping out in a wooded area.

A sparsely attended meeting did take place in St. Louis, on August 12, 1962, attended by Negroes and white persons. Clergymen of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant faiths offered prayers in support of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., and the Albany Movement. Those present were urged to write letters to the President of the United States, the Attorney General of the United States, the Governor of Georgia, and the Chief of Police at Albany, Georgia.

Additional information received concerning the Albany situation will be promptly furnished to the Department.







## RACIAL SITUATION, ALBANY, GEORGIA

On August 9, 1962, advised that at approximately 11:30 a.m., August 9, 1962, fifteen Negroes (ten juveniles, five adults) were arrested for picketing at Albany City Hall and various business establishments. These individuals were charged. with failure to obey a police officer and disorderly conduct.

advised that during the evening of August 9, 1962, meetings of the Albany Movement were held at the Mount Zion and Shiloh Baptist Churches. These meetings were attended by overflow audiences.

also advised that on August 9, 1962, the wives of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Reverend Ralph Abernathy, Dr. W. Anderson and Wyatt Tee Walker applied to the Albany City Commissioner for necessary permits to authorize a "mothers' and wives' " parade in Albany at 3 p.m., August 10, 1962, and a "ministers' march" at 5 p.m., August 10, 1962. Parade permits were denied by Albany City Manager Stephen Roos.

advised on August 9, 1962, that on this date Dr. W. G. Anderson announced that a women's march and demonstration from the Shiloh Baptist Church to The Albany City Hall would commence at 10 a.m., August 10, 1962, led by the wives of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Dr. W. G. Anderson, Reverend Ralph Abernathy and Wyatt Tee Walker. Anderson also announced a similar activity for August 10, 1962, to be participated in by men to be led by ministers from outside Albany.

Dr. Anderson said that participants in the two aforementioned activities would probably be arrested. He requested non-participants to bring food to the Union Baptist Church, Albany at 5 p.m., August 10, 1962, for the purpose of feeding persons arrested.
