



On April 24, 1964, demonstrations spendored by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference at St. Augustine, Florida, consisted of picketing at the Civic Center and a meeting at the Castillo de Inn marcos, a national monument. A permit to hold the meeting was obtained from the United States Mational Pork Lervice Euperintendent, Bert Roberts, by Reverend A. I. Paylor. Approximately 75 colored students attended the meeting held at 12:30 PM, which lasted for about an hour. This meeting consisted of songs and speeches. Television photographers from MEC, Chicago, and Channel 4, Jacksonville, Florida, were present but took no pictures according to hoberts since they considered the meeting to be of no particular news interest.

Permits were granted by Roberts to Reverber. Taylor for meetings of the Castillo de Lan Margos to be held of 3:00 Pa on April 25 and 23, 1004.

h. B. Mayling, local Eouthern Claistich feadership Conference leader, advised Eugeninteadent Roberts that he expected another group from Massachusetts would arrive in St. Augustine on Monday, 'pril 27, 1964. He would not comment on the size of this group or what plans had been formulated. There were no incidents and no arrests were made.

On May 26, 1964, at 10:00 P.M., approximately 300 Negroes, including a large number of boys and girls, paraded through downtown St. Augustine, Florida, and held a meeting at the Slave Market which is located in the park in the downtown area. The march was sponsored by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) and was led by Dr. Robert B. Mayling. The meeting at the Slave Market consisted of songs and speeches, and was concluded at about 10:35 P.M. The demonstrators then marched back to the Regro section of town and they were closely followed by approximately fifty persons from out of town who appeared to be members of the Ku Klux Klan. Local and state law enforcement officers stopped this group before any incidents occurred. As of 11:00 P.M., this group of Klansmen was still in the area.

On May 27, 1964, Deputy Sheriff
Ut. Johns County Sheriff's Office, advised there were no incidents during the night of May 26, 1964, following the demonstration in St. Augustine, Florida.



He was met by Dr. Robert Hayling of St. Augustine, Florida, along with several other individuals. King departed the airport at 8:10 p.m. and proceeded to St. Augustine, Florida, by automobile. Prior to leaving the airport, King stated he would hold a news conference in St. Augustine on May 26, 1964.

On May 27, 1964, at 10:15 P.M., approximately 3.00 Negroes, including a large number of high school boys and girls, under the leadership of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, marched in double file from the colored section of St. Augustine, Florida, toward the downtown area. They were stopped by Chief of Police VIRGIL STUART and Sheriff L. O. DAVIS on the outskirts or the downtown area and warned that a group of white youths was occupying the slave market in the plaza. Their leaders were asked to discontinue the march since it was Telt that violence might result. However, the group chose to continue and walked past the slave market, around the plaza and then returned to the colored section of the city. In addition to the fifty or so white teenagers in the slave market, there were approximately 100 other white spectators. Local law enforcement kept the colored and white groups separated and furnished safe escort to the marchers. There were no assaults or arrests. It was observed that some of the white youths in the slave market were carrying what appeared to be sticks and one was observed with a tire iron. During the rest of the night no further incidents occurred.

During the demonstration HALSTEAD MANUCY, Exalted Cyclops of the Ku Klux Klan (NKK) at St. Augustine was posserved riding with deputies of the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office. MANUCY previously advised he was not a special deputy and Sheriff L. O. DAVIS, St. Johns County, Sheriff's Office, likewise denied MANUCY had been made a special deputy. Other individuals believed possibly to be members of the KKK have been observed near the county jail and, according to Deputy Sheriff these persons may have been made special deputies. Bhellet DAVIS advised he has made about 80 individuals special deputies, which

ASAC O'Connor was instructed to keep the Bureau currently informed of the situation in St. Johns County, Florida. ASAC O'Connor was also instructed to immediately submit a teletype advising of the visit of Deputy Assistant Attorney General Dolan.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

Sheriff L. O. Davis, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, St. Augustine, Florida, furnished the following information on May 28, 1964:

At approximately 12:00 noon on May 28, 1964, Three Negro women were arrested at the Ponce de Leon Motor Lodge, St. Augustine, Florida, in connection with a sit-in demonstration. The women were incarcerated at the St. Augustine County Jail under \$1500 bond, and charged with being undesirable guests, conspiracy, and trespassing after warning.

Subsequently on May 28, 1964, three additional Megro women were arrested at the Ponce de Leon Motor Lodge Restaurant in connection with another sit-in demonstration.

Several Negro men and women staged a "lie-in demonstration on May 28, 1964, at the entrance to the restaurant of the Monson Motor Lodge, St. Augustine. The demonstration lasted about 30 minutes after which the group left the restaurant. Subsequently at 3:25 pm, May 28, 1964, nine Negro men and women were arrested in connection with a sit-in demonstration at the Monson Motor Lodge. All persons arrested were charged with unwelcome guests, conspiracy, and trespassing after warning.

At approximately 10:50 pm, May 28, 1964, a group of about 200 Negroes left the St. Paul AME Church in the colored section of St. Augustine, and marched to the down town area. The group which consisted primarily

of children and high school students, marched two abreast. The march was conducted in silence and proceeded to the Plaza, then past the slave market. Preceding the march was a group of five or six news photographers.

Approximately 250 white males, half of whom appeared to be teenagers, were massed in the slave market. When the Negroes passed, the white group left the slave market to follow them. A short distance after passing the slave market, the Negro marchers stopped for prayer. Cameramen began "shooting the scene" as The white crowd jeered. The Negroes then resumed the was rch closely guarded by Florida Highway Patrolmen, Dity Policemen, and Deputy Sheriffs. The white crowd which followed, became disorderly and began grabbing newsmen's cameras, which were smashed to the ground. A rock was thrown through a store window and three cherry bombs were detonated by the white group. According to Sheriff L. O. Davis, an NBC newsman, was cut on the back of the neck; and while riously injured, was treated at Flagler General Hospital and released.

Deputy Sheriff advised that claimed he was assaulted by an unknown individual and that another unknown white man fired two shots into the air to scare the assailant away. The also observed that one newsman may possibly have been bitten by a police dog. He said that this individual crossed in front of the dog while one of the Deputy Sheriffs was attempting to drive off the crowd.

No Negroes were assaulted and by 11:30 pm the marchers had returned safely to the colored section of St. Augustine. One white man was arrested for breaking a camera.

Sheriff Davis and St. Augustine Chief of Police Virgil Stuart, advised on May 28, 1964, that they planned to prohibit any further marches of this type in view of the disorder which occurred.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

Sheriff Davis further advised on May 28, 1964, that prior to the commencement of the current demonstrations in St. Augustine, Reverend Martin Luther King, leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference had made press releases wherein he threatened St. Augustine with a "non violent army of one thousand." Davis said that he felt such a large group would eventually take some type of violent action. He said in anticipation of violence, he had made every effort to develop a supporting force of white men in the event his 28 deputies were overrun by "King's army." He said he accepted any who wanted to volunteer, and he had no way of knowing whother a particular volunteer was a klansman or not. Davis advised that only residents of St. Johns County were eligible to be deputized.

A source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised

Sheriff L. O. Davis furnished the following information on May 29, 1964:

At 11:30 am, May 29, 1964, Harry G. Boyte, white assistant to Reverend Martin Luther King, complained to the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office that semetime between 1:30 am and 7:30 am, May 29, 1964, unknown individuals shot out the rear window of his Thunderbird automobile, which was parked in front of the Holiday Inn, St. Augustine, where Boyte and his son had spent the night of May 28 - 29, 1964. Hoyie advised that no one was in the car at the time of the shooting. After noticing the damage to the car, Boyte and his son went to the rented cottage of Reverend King at Crescent Beach, Florida, where they found the cottage had been "shot up" during the night.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

No one was in the cottage at the time of the incident and a neighborhood investigation by the Sheriff's Office revealed the shooting incident apparently occurred between 5:00 am and 6:00 am, May 29, 1964, by unknown persons in a white Chevrolet Sedan.

At 10:15 pm, May 29, 1964, about 150 Negroes attempted to march on downtown St. Augustine. They were stopped by local law enforcement officers and instructed that no further nighttime demonstrations would be allowed. The group then knelt in the street, prayers were conducted for about 10 minutes, and the group then returned to their meeting place, the St. Paul AME Church. By midnight the group had disbanded.

Captain John Prater, Florida Highway Patrol, St. Augustine, Florida, advised on May 29, 1964, that city officials had instructed that no further night demonstrations would be allowed at this time. He said attorneys for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference are protesting this decision in Federal Court, and that a hearing was scheduled to be held in United States District Court, Jacksonville, Florida, on June 1, 1964.

Deputy Sheriff

Sheriff's Office, advised on May 29, 1964, that he
investigated a fire of unknown origin at the cottage

He said vandals had apparently broken in and set

St. Augustine Klavern, UFKKK, told those present that Sheriff DAVIS had told hom about 20 FBI agents were in town and would arrest the klansmen if they became involved in the demonstrations. Manucy then told the klansmen that they should "breakup" and go home, and they did.

On the afternoon of May 30, 1964, 56 Negroes, all of high school age or younger, walked through the downtown section of St. Augustine carrying signs protesting segregation. They were orderly and closely guarded by the Florida Highway Patrol and St. Augustine Police Department. No incidents occurred in connection with this demonstration.

Also during the afternoon of May 30, 1964, 15 Negroes were arrested in connection with sit-in demonstrations at a St. Augustine motel-restaurant. Twelve were juveniles and three were adults. The juveniles were released to their parents and the adults were charged with trespassing after warning, being undesirable guests, and conspiracy.

who identified himself as an official of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, telephonically contacted a representative of the PRI at St. Augustine, Florida, on May 30, 1964.

stated that he had received information that J. B. Stones. Klan Attorney, was in St. Augustine and he was fearful that Stoner and his klan associates might bomb the cottage which had been rented by Reverend Martin Luther King.

advised that it did not appear that local authorities were affording proper protection to the cottage.

Sheriff Davis was advised of the above information on May 30, 1964. Sheriff Davis stated Reverend King's cottate was being spot checked by the Florida Highway Patrol and his deputies, but in view of the tense racial situation in St. Augustine, manpower could not be spared for around the clock coverage.

RACIAL STTUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

Shortly after 10:00 PM, May 30, 1964, Negro teenagers assembled at the Zion Baptist Church in west St. Augustine. During the course of the meeting approximately seventy-five Negroes left the church and paraded around the block singing integration songs. Local law enforcement officers covered the demonstration and allowed it to take place since the area is located about two miles from the downtown section of St. Augustine where previous trouble had occurred. No incidents were reported in connection with the demonstration.

A rally sponsored by the UFKKK was held at Lake Builer, Florida, on the evening of May 30, 1964. Approximately 250 people attended this rally and about twenty-eight were in Klan robes. Cars at the rally bore tags from Georgia and South Carolina as well as from northeast Florida.

At 12:20 PM, June 1, 1964, three Negroes were arrested during a sit in at Monson Motel Restaurant, St. Augustine, Florida. All were charged with trespass, being undesirable guests and conspiracy. Their bond was set at \$1000 on each count. Twenty minutes later, two Negroes and one white person were arrested at the same restaurant, similarly charged. The same bond was set.

St. Augustine, Florida, advised City Commission will pass two emergency ordinances tonight prohibiting juveniles in the downtown area after 9:00 PM and prohibiting parking around the plaza after 9:00 PM.

There were no incidents.

Demonstrations are expected to continue tonight.

At 5:30 PM, June 1, 1964, three Negroes were arrested for a sit in at Service Drug Lunch Counter, St. Augustine, Florida. Two are juveniles and will be released to their parents. One adult was charged with trespass, being undesirable guest and conspiracy. A bond of \$1000 was set on each charge.

At 5:40 PM, same date, two Negro juveniles were arrested after lying in at Monson Motel Restaurant and will be released to their parents.

MACIAL SITUATION ST. WOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

Hearing in United States District Court, Jacksonville, Florida, regarding night demonstrations at St. Augustine, Florida, took place at 2:00 PM, June 1, 1964, and has been continued until 9:00 AM, June 2, 1964.

Negroes conducted nightly meeting at the First Baptist Church, St. Augustine, Florida. The meeting dispersed at 10:30 PM. There were no marches or incidents. According to Chief Deputy Sheriff Matt Powers an unidentified newsman attended the meeting where it was announced there would be no further night demonstrations pending results to court hearing. Powers also said The Ku Klux Mlan (KRK) was meeting on the night of June 1, 1964, to decide whether or not klansmen, who had been appointed special deputies, should turn in their deputy cards. This meeting took place in the parking lot of the Civic Center in St. Augustine. About 25 cars and 35 people were observed at this meeting which broke up at 10:30 PM. According to Powers, Sheriff L. O. Davis has told klansmen it was not necessary for those who have been deputized to turn in their card.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

At 4:50 PM, June 2, 1964, fifteen Negroes paraded around the plaza at St. Augustine, Florida, for about thirty minutes. They carried anti-segregation signs. All appeared to be about fourteen years of age. There were no incidents during the night of June 2, 1964. A check of Negro churches in the city indicated no mass meetings took place.

The hearing regarding night time demonstrations at St. Augustine being held at United States District Court at Jacksonville was continued to June 3, 1964. Sheriff L. O. Davis was asked at the hearing whether any Ku Klux Klan members were deputies. He said there were none. Judge Bryan Simpson has ordered him to produce a list of his special deputies at the hearing.

Local ordinances prohibiting persons under eighteen in the downtown area of St. Augustine after 9:00 PM and parking restrictions in the downtown area were rigidly enforced last night by the St. Augustine Police Department. The entire downtown area was practically deserted after 10:00 PM.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

At 12:30 PM, June 3, 1964, two white males and two Negro males were arrested at the Monson Motel Restaurant, St. Augustine, Florida, in connection with a sit-in demonstration. The two white males were charged with trespassing, being undesirable guests and conspiracy. The two Negro males were juveniles and were therefore released to their parents.

At 4:50 PM, June 3, 1964, eight teenage Negroes marched around the plaza at St. Augustine, Florida, carrying anti-segregation signs. The march lasted about forty-five minutes and no incidents occurred.

The hearing regarding night-time demonstrations at St. Augustine being held at United States District Court, Jacksonville, Florida, was concluded on June 3, 1964. Judge Bryan Simpson stated he would render an opinion within a week but requested the Negroes to withhold demonstrations until he reached a decision. Officials of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) agreed to comply with Judge Simpson's request.

The Florida Highway Patrol withdrew from St. Augustine on June 3, 1964, pending the outcome of the court decision.

On the evening of June 3, 1964, a number of white people were observed gathered at the St. Johns County Jail, St. Augustine, and Sheriff L. O. Davis was observed in conversation with Halsted Manucy, Exalted Cyclops of the St. Augustine Klavern, United Florida Ku Klux Klan.



There were no demonstrations at St. Augustine on June 4, 1964; however, a capacity crowd of Negroes gathered at the St. Paul's AME Church in St. Augustine on the evening of June 4, 1964 to hear Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., leader of the SCLC, speak.

On June 4, 1964 the City Commission at St. Augustine rescinded all curfew regulations previously placed in effect.



On the morning of June 5, 1964, a person who identified himself as the bf the SCLC, St. Augustine, telephonically advised an agent of the FBI that the persons who had shot at the were driving a green and white Oldsmobile which he believed had been identified by an unknown employee of the Florida Power and Light Company, St. Augustine. Could not explain how this identification had been arrived at.

APPENDIX

UNITED FLORIDA KU KLUX KLAN (UFKKK)

A source advised on August 20, 1955, that a new organization known as the Florida Ku Klux Klan (FKKK) had been formed at Macclenny, Florida, on August 14, 1955, by former members of the Association of the Florida Ku Klux Klan (AFKKK).

The objectives of this group, according to a second source are to oppose integration in the schools and to fight communism.

Regarding AFKKK, a third source advised that a former official of the Association of Georgia Klans (AGK) formed an organization on July 7, 1953, known as AFKKK. The "Morning Tribune", Tampa, Florida newspaper, in its August 11, 1955 issue, revealed AFKKK disbanded on that date.

A fourth source advised on October 25, 1956, that AFKKK operated under the same principles and bylaws as the AGK. The AGK has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A fifth source advised on February 17, 1958, that the FKKK is operating and maintaining the same objectives as set forth above.

The sixth source advised on June 28, 1961, that at a meeting held in Orlando, Florida on June 25, 1961, the FKKK and the United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Irc., in Florida, consolidated, and the new organization is known as the United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK).

On May 17, 1962, the sixth source advised that the UFKKK is still in existence in Florida and maintains the same objectives as set forth above.

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


RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHIS COUNTY, FLORIDA

Rev. Martin Luther King, leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), held a press conference on June 5, 1964, at St. Augustine, Florida, at which time he submitted five demands to the City of St. Augustine which were to be met, or a "nonviolent army" of white and Negro demonstrators would be used in the city. In brief the demands included desegregation of hotel and restaurant facilities, hiring of additional Negro city employees, establishment of a bi-racial committee with two-thirds of the Negro representatives to be named by the SCLC, charges to be dropped against civil rights demonstrators previously arrested and acceptance of applications from Negro citizens for any jobs in St. Augustine with the applicants being judged on merit rather than race. Rev. KING reportedly indicated he would leave for New York City on June 5, 1904, and would return to St. Augustine the following week.

On the afternoon of June C, 1964, 41 teenagers marched silently in single file through downtown St. Augustine, Florida. They carried signs protesting segregation in the city. All of the demonstrators were Regroes with the exception of two white boys and one white girl. The march was closely observed by the St. Augustine Pelice Department and no incidents resulted.

There were no demonstrations or mess meetings of Mogrees at St. Augustine on June 7, 1964.

At 8:05 P.M., June 7, 1934, a white taxical driver, reportedly fired a shot at an automobile occupied by Negroes in the colored section of St. Augustine. reportedly claimed the Negro occupants had cursed him earlier in the evening in downtown St. Augustine. He also claimed that the Negroes had fired shots at him. He reportedly followed the car and admitted firing one shot at it. Following incident about 100 Negroes congregated in the area

threatening and cursing police officers and deputies who arrived on the scene. Two policemen were hit by bottles thrown from the crowd. Stones were also thrown at the police cars.

and a white companion were arrested by the Sheriff's Office along with five Negroes. One of the Negroes was who was charged with inciting a riot. Jackson reportedly has been prominent in racial demonstrations at St. Augustine and has been arrested on several occasions in this regard. Three Negroes were arrested for throwing stones at police cars. Riot conditions existed for a short time before the crowd dispersed. There were no injuries sustained except for a policeman who received head lacerations.

At about 10 P.M., June 7, 1964, the St. Augustine Brach Fire Department answered an alarm on a fire at the cottage which has been rented by Rev. MARTIN LUTION KING near Crescent Beach, Florida. Inspection of the cottage revealed that furnishings, windows and appliances had been almost completely wrecked. Three small fires were smoldering in the living room; however, fire damage was negligible. A neighbor, advised two car loads of Negro males were seen at the cottage by him at about 5:15 P.M., June 7, 1964. He noted their license tags were bent so he could not read the numerals. He described the cars as being a late model Oldsmobile and a Buick, both green in color.

Daily contact was maintained with local authorities at St. Augustine and Illth Intelligence Corps Group (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, concerning the above matters.

AND PROCEEDED EAST UNTIL THEY WERE OPPOSITE THE SLAVE THE MARCHERS, AGAIN ATTEMPTED TO CROSS BUT WERE DRIVEN. BACK. THE MARCHERS THEN BEGAN RETURN TO THE COLORED ANOTHER ATTACK WAS MADE BY FOUR THE SOUTH SIDE OF KINGS STREET.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

There were no racial demonstrations or incidents at St. Augustine, Florida, on June 8, 1964.

On June 9, 1964, at about 5:00 a.m., three Negroes were fired upon by unidentified white males traveling in a white Volkswagen. The incident occurred north of St. Augustine, Florida, on Route AlA while the Negroes were traveling from St. Augustine to Jacksonville, Florida.

Investigation by the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office disclosed four bullet holes in the rear of the 1952 Chevrolet in which the Negroes were traveling. Shattoring glass caused a superficial cut on one of the Negroes which required medical attention. No arrests were made and the white assailants have not been identified.

At about 4:00 p.m., June 9, 1964, 22 Negro boys and girls paraded through downtown St. Augustine carrying anti-segregation signs. They were closely protected by the St. Augustine Police Department and no incidents occurred.

On the afternoon of June 9, 1964, United States District Judge Bryan Simpson issued an order restraining the city of St. Augustine from prohibiting demonstrations at any time during the day or night.

During the evening of June 9, 1964, approximately 165 Regroes and whites marched from the colored section of St. Augustine, Florida. The march proceeded down the south side of Kings Street which is the main thoroughfare in St. Augustine. At St. George Street the procession attempted to cross to the north side of Kings Street where a group of about 25 or 30 white youths were waiting. As \sim the demonstrators approached the south side of Kings Street. about four white youths attacked the two leaders of the march

with their fists. The two Negroes were knocked to the ground and stomped by the whites for about 30 seconds until driven back by a St. Augustine policeman. The marchers then retreated to the south side of Kings Street and proceeded east until they were opposite the slave market. The marchers again attempted to cross the street but were driven back. The marchers then began returning to the colored section on the south side of Kings Street.

Another attack was made on the demonstrators by four or five white men. One white marcher was beaten to the ground and kicked by the assailants before they were driven off by the police. At this point, re-enforcements of sheriff's deputies, Florida Highway Parolmen arrived on the scene and forced the white group to the north side of Kings Street.

The white group attempted two additional attacks on the demonstrators and one marcher was struck by a Coca Cola bottle and another marcher was struck with a fist. At this point, police officers succeeded in keeping the groups separated until the marchers were able to return to the colored section of St. Augustine.

Sheriff L. O. Davis, St. Johns County, Florida and Chief of Police, VIRGIL STUART, stated that the Negroes did not notify them when they intended to march which increased the difficulties of having adequate law enforcement on the scene.

Daily contact was maintained with local authorities at St. Augustine and with Intelligence Corps Group (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, concerning the above matters.

On June 11, 1964, twenty nine Negro youths paraded through downtown St. Augustine carrying antisegregation signs. They were closely watched by the local police department and no incidents resulted.

At 12:35 PM, June 11, 1964, ten demonstrators were arrested by Chief of Police Virgil Stuart and Sheriff L. O. Davis, at the entrance to the restaurant of the Monson Motel. The manager of the motel had the restaurant locked and refused entrance to the group of demonstrators. The manager asked the group to leave on two occasions, advising them that his restaurant was segregated and did not serve Negroes. The group refused to leave and were then placed under arrest and charged with trespassing with malicious intent, breach of peace and conspiracy. One hundred dollars bond was placed on each charge. Included in this group were Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) officials, Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Ralph David Abernathy, Bernard Scott Lee, Clyde C. Jenkins, Lucille Charles, Ollie Mitchell, Mary Barbare Smith, Catherine Jean Fentress, W. L. England and R. N. Hoffert.

At 12:45 PM, four other demonstrators were arrested at the Monson Motel under the same circumstances. These individuals were identified as also known as All four were placed in jail under \$100 bond.

At 2:10 PM, four additional demonstrators were arrested at the Monson Motel under similar circumstances and were charged as indicated above. They were identified as.

These individuals were also incarcerated and placed under \$100 bond on each count.

SCLC officials advised on June 11, 1964 that Negroes will continue nighttime demonstrations each night, and that bus loads of individuals are expected to arrive in St. Augustine to assist in the struggle. It was indicated that one such bus load of thirty seven Negroes had arrived from Savannah, Georgia and planned to attempt to register at the Monson Motel.

At 10:15 PM, June 11, 1964, between 200 and 223 Megroes interspersed with a very few whites, marched from the colored area to the slave market in St. Augustine, and returned. A crowd of about 300 white persons watched the march and many of them walked along the route of the march jeering and "cat calling." Police officers were on the scene and prevented the marchers from being assaulted. One white police officer who was stationed along the route was hit by a bottle of liquid reported to be acid, but he apparently was not injured. Several fire crackers were exploded around the slave market. As the demonstrators left the slave market, a gang of young white men followed shouting "we are going to nigger town." Police officers blocked this group two blocks west of the slave market and when orders to disperse were not heeded, the officers threw one tear gas grenade which broke up the mob.

Shortly after this incident, the gang of white youths reappeared at the slave market where an unidentified white spokesman exorcised them to return to the same place on the night of June 12, 1964. At least four white persons were reportedly arrested during the march and subsequent demonstrations.

Contact was maintained with little Intelligence Corps Group (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, and with local authorities, St. Augustine, Florida, concerning the above matters on June 11, 1964.

Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), held a press conference at the Negro Elks Club at St. Augustine, Florida, on the afternoon of June 10, 1964. Reverend King announced that a demonstration would take place on the evening of June 10, 1964, and daily thereafter until further notice. He said that he would personally take part in a demonstration on June 11, 1964, to the extent that he and others would subject themselves to arrest if necessary. He described St. Augustine as a prelude to a series of statewide demonstrations. He also expressed dissatisfaction at the handling of the demonstration on the night of June 9, 1364, by local law enforcement officials. He said that he was sending a telegram to President Johnson and also to commissioned members of the St. Augustine Quadricentennial Celebration requesting that they withdraw any financial support in view of the segregated conditions in St. Augustine.

Representatives of the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, St. Augustine Police Department and the Governor's Office, met with Andrew Young of the SCLC after the press conference. Young vigorously protested the handling of the demonstration on the night of June 9, 1064, by law enforcement officers. Young was advised by law enforcement officials present that protection without prior notification by the SCLC of their demonstration plans was difficult. Young then agreed that with regard to all night time marches he would notify the Police Department prior to the march. He stated that the march on the evening of June 10, 1964, would leave the chirches in the colored section between 9:00 and 9:30 PM.

dvised on June 10, 1964, that he had conferred with officials of the FHP and that the FHP was sending 20 additional

men into the St. Augustine area on the night of June 10, 1964, bringing the total of FHP officers to 33. local law enforcement officials agreed that every effort would be made to arrest any white persons who attempted to assault the marchers.

At approximately 2 PM June 10, 1964, 26 teenage Negroes paraded through the streets of downtown St. Augustine carrying anti-segregation signs. There were no incidents in connection with this demonstration.

At approximately 9:45 PM June 10, 1964, an estimated 400 demonstraters marched from the colored area of St. Augustine with an estimated 12 whites dispersed throughout the column of twos. The marchers were escorted by over 200 law enforcement officers from the FHP, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, St. Augustine Police Department, and special deputies from both the County and City. The column marched without incident to the area in front of the slave market when 2 white youths in the crowd of over 600 attacked a white male marcher and knocked him to the ground. The marcher arose and continued marching.

Two assailants were arrested, handcuffed and hauled away. Later in the same area a white youth struck an unknown marcher, ran across the square and disappeared before Police officers were able to apprehend him.

The column turned south on St. George Street when a shower of rocks was thrown. The Negroes fell to the ground and for a moment the march faltered; however, the Police quickly got the march going again and repelled further attacks on the Negroes by firing 2 tearges shells into the white crowd. Two more white youths were arrested incidental to this attack, and cuffed and taken away. Two law enforcement officers were struck by the rocks as were a number of Negro marchers but no serious injuries resulted.

The column of marchers then returned to the colored area at approximately 10:45 PM. The 4 white youths arrested were tenatively charged with carrying a concealed weapon and disturbing the peace.

The crowd of whites remained in the general area of the slave market until approximately 11:15 PM with no additional incidents developing.





At 3:15 PM June 15, 1964, 15 Negro teenagers paraded in downtown St. Augustine, Florida carrying anti-segregation placards. The march lasted about one hour and was closely covered by St. Augustine Police Officers. There were no incidnets in connection with this demonstration.

Captain J. T. Prater, Florida Highway Patrol, St. Augustine, advised on June 15, 1964, that a bus with 34 Negroes arrived in St. Augustine during the afternoon of June 15, 1964 from Williamston, North Carolina. The group was lead by Mrs. (first name unknown) Small, Williamston, North Carolina, integration leader. According to Captain Prater, they unloaded at the colored Elks Hall in St. Augustine where they were searched by Florida Highway Patrol Officers, however, no weapons were found.

was held at St. Paul's AME Church, St. Augustine, on the evening of June 15, 1964 and was attended by approximately 400 persons inside the church, and 200 who remained outside the church. Jackie Robinson, former major league baseball player, spoke to the group and enthusiasm was high.

A group made up of approximately 375 Negroes and 3 white males left the church at 10:05 PM and marched to the Slave Market where they were addressed by Reverend C. T. Vivian. At 10:50 PM the group returned to the church.



A characterization of the UFKKK is attached hereto.

The foregoing information was furnished to the Florida Highway Patrol, St. Augustine, who made plans to remove King to the Duval County Jail, Jacksonville, Florida. On orders of Governor Farris Bryant, King was removed to the Duval County Jail at 5:40 pm, June 12, 1964.

At 12:15 pm, June 12, 1964, a group of approximately 110 demonstrators, all Negroes except for two white males, marched from the Negro section of St. Augustine to the Slave Market singing and chanting as they marched. At the Slave Market they were addressed by two unidentified Negro males, who said they were willing to sacrifice their blood for freedom. One said he was a wounded veteran, and

that it was ironical that the government against whom he fought (Germany) gives its citizens more rights today than the United States. He said Negroes would continue to peacefully demonstrate even though those who disagreed with them resorted to violence. He further stated that he did not believe in black supremacy not did he believe in white supremacy.

Local police officers were discharged to the scene and no incidents occurred; however, there was scattered jeering by white persons who gathered to watch the demonstration.

At 2:20 pm, June 12, 1964, approximately 30 Negroes marched to the Slave Market carrying anti-segregation signs. Local police officers closely observed the march and no incidents occurred. During the march police officers discovered a cache of several bricks in a satchel type bag behind a wall near the plaza in which the Slave Market is located.

Demonstrators attempted to obtain service at nearly every restaurant and lunch counter in downtown St. Augustine on June 12, 1964. As a result 56 arrests were made. All those arrested were Negroes except for two white males. They were all charged with trespassing after warning, trespassing with malicious intent, and breech of peace. Bonds were set at \$100 on each count and all were confined to the St. Johns County Jail in lieu of bond. Among those arrested was Hosea Lorenzo Williams, SCLC leader from Savannah, Georgia.

Bond for Martin Luther King was raised from \$100 on each count to \$300 on each of three counts by County Judge Charles Mathis.

A bus load of 38 demonstrators arrived in St. Augustine on the morning of June 12, 1964, from Birmingham, Alabama, and participated in the 12:15 pm demonstration mentioned above. At a press conference on June 12, 1964, announced prior to his arrest that two additional bus loads of demonstrators were ready to come to St. Augustine from Wilmington, North Carolina, and Albany, Georgia.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

At 8:00 pm, June 12, 1964, 189 demonstrators marched to the Slave Market where they sang songs and listened to speeches. Thereafter they returned to the Negro section of St. Augustine. Police officers closely guarded the line of march and no incidents occurred.

furnished the following information on June 12, 1964:

Halstead Manucy, local Klan leader admitted he was head of the Ancient City Hunting Club in St. Augustine, but refused to give his title. Manucy claimed the club had 1476 members, who are "better organized than the Niggers are." Manucy claimed his club was equipped with about 24 two-way radio sets. Manucy denied he had ever been a special deputy sheriff in St. Johns County, Florida, and claimed he only had a gun permit, which he has since surrendered on the Sheriff's request. Manucy stated that he and his associates usually carry guns in their cars.

Manucy claimed his club was not connected with the Klan in any way, but admitted members paraded recently with the Klan in Jacksonville, Florida. Manucy also admitted that his group supplied bail money for white persons arrested for opposing the demonstrations in St. Augustine. Manucy was planning a march through the Negro Section, but that there would be no violence.

The source mentioned above has advised that the Ancient City Hunting Club is a Klan unit in St. Augustine, Florida.

At 9:00 pm, June 12, 1964, groups of white people began collecting in the plaza around the Slave Market. A total of about 375 persons gathered and listened to a speech by J. B. Stoner, Klan attorney from Atlanta, Georgia. Stoner stated that whites must ban together to preserve the white race. He then insisted that their

march must be peaceful and newsmen protected. He urged the white demonstrators not to retaliate if Negroes took action against them.

The group then lined up by two's and began marching at 10:00 pm toward the Negro section carrying Confederate flags. One hundred additional persons stood by watching the parade. The whites marched through the Negro section and back to the Slave Market and disbanned after a brief speech in which Stoner urged all participants to return on the evening of June 13, 1964, at 7:00 pm. The white demonstration was closely guarded by police officers, and no incidents occurred.

On the evening of June 12, 1964, Florida Attorney General James Kynes, advised he would appear in Federal Court, Jacksonville, on June 13, 1964, to present arguments designed to permit local authorities to ban night time demonstrations.

Grand Jury for the 7th Judicial Circuit, St. Johns County, Florida, on June 12, 1964, in its presentment to the presiding judge, announced it had voted to consider racial unrest in St. Johns County in an effort to bring about a peaceful solution. It was indicated that the Grand Jury would endeavor to establish meaningful lines of communication through which diverse groups may establish solutions.

Fred Martin, spokesman for the SCLC, advised on June 13, 1964, that the SCLC would not conduct a march in St. Augustine that evening. He stated that the SCLC would sponsor kneel-ins in local churches on Sunday, June 14, 1964. At 1:20 pm, June 13, 1964, 19 Negroes, mostly juveniles, paraded around the plaza carrying integration signs. No incidents or arrests resulted from this demonstrations.

Beginning at approximately 12:45 pm, June 13, 1964, sit-ins were conducted in three local restaurants. Police officers arrested 15 persons consisting of eight Negro juveniles, four Negro adults, and three white adults.

The juveniles were turned over to juvenile authorities. Of the seven adults arrested, two were charged with trespassing, breech of the peace, and conspiracy. Two were charged with conspiracy and three were charged with being undesireable guests, trespassing, and conspiracy. All were incarcerated under \$100 bond for each count.

White persons began gathering in the plaza at 7:00 pm, June 13, 1964, and listening to a speech by J. B. Stoner, who spoke at length against the Civil Rights Bill. About 175 persons including women and children finally gathered and began marching at 8:00 pm to the colored section. Less than 100 observers stood on the streets watching. The march returned to the plaza at 8:35 pm, and after another brief speech by Stoner, disbanded. The participants were urged to meet again at 8:00 pm, June 14, 1964, for another march. Police officers closely observed the foregoing demonstrations, and no incidents occurred.

Federal Judge Bryan Simpson, after hearing testimony on June 13, 1964, declined to amend his original order prohibiting local authorities from banning night demonstrations.

Martin Luther King made bond on June 13, 1964, and reportedly indicated he was preceding to Springfield, Massachusetts.

On the morning of June 14, 1964, four persons were arrested (three Negroes and one white) attempting to gain entrance to the Grace Methodist Church, St. Augustine. The white male arrested was identified as Little Rock, Arkansas, and a student at Yale University. All four arrested were charged with trespassing with malicious intent, breech of peace, and conspiracy. \$100 bond was set on each charge.

Also during the morning of June 14, 1964, two Negro females were arrested at a Baptist Church in St. Augustine, and charged with disturbing the peace. \$100 bond was set for each individual. Arrested with these two Negro females was one juvenile, who was subsequently turned over to parents.

At 2:15 pm, June 14, 1964, 30 Negroes were arrested at the Monson Motor Lodge and Restaurant, St. Augustine, while attempting to gain entrance. Among those arrested was SCLC leader Reverend Lavert Taylor. All 30 were charged with trespassing with malicious intent, breech of the peace, and conspiracy. \$100 bond was set on each charge.

Fred Martin, SCLC leader, advised on June 14, 1964, that the three persons arrested at the Baptist Church mentioned above were not part of the SCLC group.

June 14, 1507, that Jackie Robinson, former major league baseball player, would arrive in Jacksonville, Florida, on June 15, 1964, and proceed to St. Augustine to aid in the demonstrations. He further advised that Jewish Rabbis holding a convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey, reportedly will send some of their group to St. Augustine on or about June 18, 1964, to assist in demonstrations with the Negroes. Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth of Birmingham, Alabama, is also scheduled to arrive in St. Augustine on June 16, 1964, to demonstrate with the Negroes.

White demonstrators assembled in the plaza area at 8:00 pm, June 14, 1964, and were addressed at 8:45 pm by J. B. Stoner. Stoner spoke against the Civil Rights Bill. At 9:00 pm, the white demonstrators conducted a march of ten minutes duration in the immediate area of the plaza and an estimated 190 marchers participated. No incidents occurred during the march. Stoner told the crowd that a committee would decide when the next march will occur.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

Information was received from the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office that a total of 127 persons had been arrested during the past week. This figure reportedly did not include two persons arrested by the St. Augustine Police Department.

Information was received from the Florida Mighway Patrol that during the day of June 13, 1964, they had confiscated one dozen knives and seven rifles, pistols and shotguns.

Daily contact was maintained with 111th Intelligence Corps Group (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, and with local authorities, St. Augustine, Florida, concerning the above matters.

APPENDIX

UNITED FLORIDA KU KLUX KLAN (UFKKK)

A source advised on August 20, 1955, that a new organization known as the Florida Ku Klux Klan (FKKK) had been formed at Macclenny, Florida, on August 14, 1955, by former members of the Association of the Florida Ku Klux Klan (AFKKK).

The objectives of this group, according to a second source are to oppose integration in the schools and to fight communism.

Regarding AFKKK, a third source advised that a former official of the Association of Georgia Klans (AGK) formed an organization on July 7, 1953, known as AFKKK. The "Morning Tribune", Tampa, Florida newspaper, in its August 11, 1955 issue, revealed AFKKK disbanded on that date.

A fourth source advised on October 25, 1956, that AFKKK operated under the same principles and bylaws as the AGK. The AGK has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A fifth source advised on February 17, 1958, that the FKKK is operating and maintaining the same objectives as set forth above.

The sixth source advised on June 28, 1961, that at a meeting held in Orlando, Florida on June 25, 1961, the FKKK and the United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc., in Florida, consolidated, and the new organization is known as the United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK).

On May 17, 1962, the sixth source advised that the UFKKK is still in existence in Florida and maintains the same objectives as set forth above.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

At approximately 12:40 PM on June 13, 1964, 70 white and Negro demonstrators including several Jewish Rabbis marched to the Monson Motor Lodge Restaurant, St. Augustine, Florida. Some of the marchers carried clothing in brown paper bags. After the Rabbis conducted a prayer session in front of the restaurant, Manager ordered them to leave stating that they were on private property. He pointed out to the demonstrators that many of these same individuals including the Rabbis had marched into the motel area during the night of June 17, 1964, singing loudly and disturbing the guests in the motel.

When the demonstrators refused to leave the motel, requested that they be arrested. Fifteen Jewish Rabbis, an elderly white woman and three Negroes were arrested by officers and charged with trespassing, breach of peace and conspiracy.

Those demonstrators who were not arrested then marched through the downtown area of St. Augustine, carrying anti-segregation placards and thereafter returned to the colored section of St. Augustine, Florida.

At about 12:47 PM on June 13, 1964, five Negroes dove into the swimming pool of the Monson Motor Lodge along with two white individuals who were registered at the motel. One of the white men swam to the edge of the pool and told "These are our guests. We are intered here, and want these people to swim with us." then ordered the swimmers to leave the swimming pool. After they refused, he ran to his office nearby and returned with two gallons of muriatic acid which he poured into the swimming pool after shouting "I am cleaning the pool right now."

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY, FLORIDA

While these individuals were in the swimming pool another group of eleven demonstrators attempted to gain entrance into the restaurant of the Monson Motor Lodge. They were arrested by local authorities under the same charges mentioned above.

Deputy Sheriff ordered the swimmers to leave the swimming poor and after they refused to, he called for dogs to assist in getting them out of the pool. However, before the dogs arrived, a regular St. Augustine, Florida Policeman who was off duty and dressed in old clothes, volunteered to jump into the pool and effect the arrests of the swimmers. He grappled with the white demonstrators both of whom resisted arrest but they were finally "dragged" from the pool. The Negroes then followed offering no resistence. It took about 19 minutes before the demonstrators, were removed from the pool. Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) observed the demonstration from across the street. Hosea Lorenzo Williams SCLC leader from Savannah, Georgia, was also at the scene but did not take part in the demonstrations.

The two white demonstrators in the swimming pool were registered at the Monson Motor Lodge as Madison, New Jersey, and McLean, Virginia.

Reputable white businessmen at the scene of the demonstrations appeared to be extremely bitter at this invasion of private property and because of the lack of arrests by local authorities during the demonstrations on the night of June 17, 1964.

Included in the marches and demonstrations were Fred Shuttlesworth and C. T. Vivian, SCLC leaders.

Sit-in demonstrations also conducted at 2 other restaurants in St. Augustine, Florida, at 3:50 PM on June 18, 1964. Three Negroes attempted to enter the swimming pool of the Monson Motor Lodge and were arrested. At the same time six Negroes tried to gain entry into the Monson Motor Lodge Restaurant. All of these individuals were arrested by officers of the Florida Highway Patrol.

that 44 arrests were made during the evening of June 18, 1964.

The Grand Jury meeting at St. Augustine, Florida, returned a presentment recommending a period of no demonstrations for 30 days and upon the expiration of this period of time, the Grand Jury reconvened to name a bi-racial committee. However, after hearing of the demonstrations on private property mentioned above, the Grand Jury reconvened to hear additional witnesses. A new presentation is expected by the Grand Jury on June 19, 1964.

At approximately 9:10 PM on June 13, 1964, 168 demonstrators including approximately 6 white individuals, marched in pairs through the white residential area of St. Augustine, Florida. They sang loudly but marched in an orderly manner. While en route, this group stopped in front of the Monson Motor Lodge where Hosea Williams instructed them to stop. He started to make a speech but was immediately instructed to keep marching by L. O. Davis, Sheriff, St. Johns County, St. Augustine, Florida. Williams did not comply with the order of Sheriff Davis and was arrested by him and removed from the area. The Negroes continued and marched to the slave market in downtown St. Augustine, where one of the leaders gave a speech. At 9:52 PM the demonstrators departed from the slave market singing loudly and clapping their hands and returned to the Negro area of St. Augustine. The Plaza area around the slave market was closely guarded by law enforcement officers during the demonstration. During the activities and demonstration in front of Monson Motor Lodge, there were less than 100 spectators and most of them were in the immediate area of the motor lodge. Most of the spectators appeared to be reputable businessmen and from their conversation indicated that they were very disturbed and disgusted with the demonstrations. b sc

Martin Luther King, Jr., leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCIC)

the evening of June 18, 1964. King reportedly indicated that after the passage of the Civil Rights Bill, he SCLC will move into several cities to make test cases which will be presented to the Department of Justice. Some of the cities named were Birmingham, Selma, Montgomery, Gadsden and Albany, Alabama, and St. Augustine and Tallahassee, Florida.

At 3 P.M., on June 19, 1964, about 52 Negroes and eight whites conducted a wade-in demonstration at St. Augustine Beach, Florida. They were closely observed by Florida Highway Patrol troopers en route to and from the beach and while bathing. The group returned to the colored section at about 4:40 P.M., without incident.

A meeting of white persons was held at the slave market at 9:30 P.M., June 19, 1964, with 400 persons attending. Speakers included Don Cothran and Al-Massey, klansmen from Jacksonville, Florida. J. B. Stoner, klan attorney from Atlanta, Georgia, and two other unidentified persons also spoke. The meeting was identified by one of the speakers as a rally of the United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK).

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A characterization of the UFKKK is attached hereto.

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Racial Situation St. Augustine, Florida

Stoner claimed to have support of a New Orleans States Rights Group which was willing to send persons to participate in the white demonstrations at St. Augustine. Stoner also stated that the "Thunderbolt," a National States Rights Party newspaper and other similar publications would run advertisements urging white citizens to vacation in St. Augustine and participate in the white demonstrations.

A characterization of the National States Rights Party is attached hereto.

Stoner stated that the local grand jury had requested a temporary truce regarding demonstrations and that there would be no white march that date. He called for rallies at 9 P.M. on Saturday and Sunday nights, June 20 and 21, 1964. Stoner said he felt sure that Negroes would break the truce and if this happened he predicted the largest gathering of white persons would demonstrate and march on Sunday evening. He estimated that 6,000 persons would march and claimed that St. Johns County Sheriff L. O Davis would participate as a private citizen.

All speakers at the rally called for no violence. Comments among the crowd were violent in nature and were, in favor of a march.

At 9:55 P.M., June 19, 1964, about 200 Negroes and a few whites marched in pairs from the colored section. They marched north on Bay Street and when they reached a point opposite the slave market where the white rally was still in progress they attempted to cross the street to the slave market. They were stopped by Florida Highway Patrol troopers and three Negro leaders were arrested.

The Negro leaders arrested were identified as Andrew Young, C. T. Vivian and Hosea Williams. All three were charged with failing to obey lawful orders of a policeman and were subsequently released on \$100 bonds.

St. Augustine, Florida

The march was allowed to continue north on Bay Strest. It proceeded past the Monson Motor Lodge and was followed by a group of young jeering whites. A few stones were reportedly thrown in the area of the Monson Motor Lodge. The march continued through white residential areas and proceeded on to the colored section without further incident.

The white rally continued during the Negro march and "broke up" about 10:45 P.M. On the morning of June 20, 1964, St. Augustine Mayor Shelley, State Senator Verle Pope and other local officials met and discurred asking Governor Ferris Bryant to prohibit night the marches under emergency powers available to the Governor.

At 1:30 P.M., June 20, 1958, 28 Negroes and four whites paraded through downtown St. Augustine carrying antisegregation placards. One marcher had beer thrown in his face. At 2:50 P.M., the marchers returned to the colored section. No arrests were made and no other incidents were reported.

At 4 P.M., June 20, 1964, 30 Negroes and four white demonstrators conducted a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach. Halstead Manucy, local klan leader and about 25 of his associates were on the beach at the time. The Negro and white demonstrators walked on the ramp to the beach. One small white male approached the Negroes and dared them to enter the water. I local klansman, dragged this individual away before he could make trouble.

one of the white demonstrators grabbed by police efficers and the white actasked ran away. When this blow was struck other young white males charged the Negroes. The fight was immediately broken up by Florida Highway Patrol troopers.

the peace and lighting. He was released on \$500 bond on each count.

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resides at t. Augustine, was also arrested and charged with disturbing the peace. He was released on \$25 bond.

At 5:45 P.M., June 20, 1964, Governor Bryant issued an Executive Order prohibiting demonstrations between 8:30 P.M. and dawn.

At 8 P.M., June 20, 1964, a meeting of whites was held at the slave market. This was a scheduled meeting sponsored by the UFKKK. J. B. Stoner, the only speaker, berated the "communist-controlled Federal government"."

He called for a meeting of whites at 6:30 P.M., June 21, 1964, at the slave marked and indicated a march would be held.

At 8:30 P.M., Major J. W. Jourdan, Florida Highway Patrol, appeared before the group and read the Governor's order banning demonstrations between 8:30 P.M. and dawn. He then instructed the group to disperse.

Sheriff L. O. Davis then announced to the group that there were no restrictions on day-time demonstrations and that they could march on June 21, 1964, at 6:30 P.M. He urged them to comply with the Governor's order.

At 9:30 P.M., June 20, 1964, about 60 Negroes started to march from churches in the Negro section. They were stopped by police officers and Major Jourdan introduced himself to the group over a loud speaker and then read the Governor's Executive Order. The leaders of the march asked if the Governor's order applied to meetings at the churches and Jourdan replied that it did not.

On the morning of June 21, 1964, Negro and white demonstrators attempted to attend 11 o'clock church services in downtown St. Augustine. A group of six Negroes, including an Episcopal minister, were permitted to attend the Trinity Episcopal Church by the minister over the objections of the vestry. A *hite male accompanied by four Negroes attended the Catholic church in St. Augustine

without incident. Efforts of Negroes to enter the First Methodist Church in St. Augustine were repulsed and three Negroes and one white person were arrested at 11 A.M., when they refused to leave the church property. At 11:50 A.M., three more Negro demonstrators were arrested at the same church. All were charged with trespassing with milicious intent, breach of the peace and conspiracy. All were released on \$100 bond on each count.

At 5 P.M., June 21, 1964, a mass meetir by integrationists was held at the St. Paul AME church. At 6:30 P.M. segregationists met at the slave market for a short time and were addressed by J. B. Stoner, whose main theme was "integration will lead to intermarriage." The white segregationists began marching at about 6:35 P.M. and proceeded west on the north side of King Street. As the marchers proceeded in front of the Post Office Building a Negroes' march passed on the south side of King Street proceeding west. The white demonstrators proceeded through the colored section of St. Augustine and returned to the glave market at 7:27 P.M. The Negroes numbered about 150 and their march was confined to a circuit of the plaza after which they returned to their church. The white marchers numbered about 250. A crowd of about 350 were in the plaza, which number includes those whites who participated in the march.

Sheriff L. O. Davis was observed acting in his official capacity on the evening of June 21, 1964, and he did not participate in the march with the white segregationints contrary to the statement of J. B. Stoner on the evening of June 20, 1964. After returning to the plaza, the white group was again addressed by Stoner, who succeeded in arousing the crowd with statement's such as, "Niggers want to integrate because they want our white women." Stoner referred to the FBI as "Federal Bureau of Integration." Stoner announced there would be another meeting at 6:30 P.M. on Wednesday, June 24, 1964, and that the group would march. He said this rally would be addressed by Connte Lynch, who he described as "bigger than the FBI and all the niggers in St. Augustine. He continued his vilification of the FBI, calling them spies and shouting, "There are FBI spies in the crowd right now." The crowd responded by shouting, "Where are they? Point them out." The meeting concluded at 8:05 P.M., and no incidents resulted. The state of the state of the The state of the s

After the Negro demonstrators returned to the church in the Negro section, they sang and made announcements until 7:30 P.M. Hosen Williams announced that on June 22, 1964, they would meet at the Elks Club and depart for a wade-in at 9:30 A.M. He said at 12 noon they would march through the plaza, at 3 P.M. there would be a workshop meeting and at 7 P.M., they would meet at the First Baptist Church for a march at 7:30 P.M. He said if the march was not completed by 8:30 P.M., they would disband wherever they here in order to comply with the Governor's Executive Order. Williams said they were calling on United States District Court Judge Bryan Simpson on the morning of June 22, 1964, concerning the conflict between his court ruling and the Governor's Executive Order.

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APPENDIX

UNITED FLORIDA KU KLUX KLAN (UFKKK)

A source advised on August 20, 1955, that a new organization known as the Florida Ku Klux Klan (FKKK) had been formed at Macclenny, Florida, on August 14, 1955, by former members of the Association of the Florida Ku Klux Klan (AFKKK).

The objectives of this group, according to a second source are to oppose integration in the schools and to fight communism.

Regarding AFKKK, a third source advised that a former official of the Association of Georgia Klans (AGK) formed an organization on July 7, 1953, known as AFKKK. The "Morning Tribune", Tampa, Florida newspaper, in its August 11, 1955 issue, revealed AFKKK disbanded on that date.

A fourth source advised on October 25, 1956, that AFKKK operated under the same principles and bylaws as the AGK. The AGK has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A fifth source advised on February 17, 1958, that the FKKK is operating and maintaining the same objectives as set forth above.

The sixth source advised on June 28, 1961, that at a meeting held in Orlando, Florida on June 25, 1961, the FKKK and the United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc., in Florida, consolidated, and the new organization is known as the United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK).

On May 17, 1962, the sixth source advised that the UFKKK is still in existence in Florida and maintains the same objectives as set forth above.

NATIONAL STATES RIGHTS PARTY (NSRP)

On November 26, 1957, a source advised that the United White Party (UWP) was organized at a convention held in Knoxville, Tennessee, on November 10, 1957. An article in the November 26, 1957, issue of the "Greenville Piedmont," a newspaper of Greenville, South Carolina, reported "the recent formation of a new political party to be known as the United White Party." According to the article, the party was formed at a recently held meeting in Knoxville, Tennessee, at which many klansmen were represented. The UWP was reported as being opposed to all "race mixing organizations and individuals."

The July, 1958, issue of "The Thunderbook," self-described as the "official Racial Nationalist Organ of the National States Rights Party" (NSRP) reported that rank and file "States Righters" had merged with the UWP under "the banner of the National States Rights Party," with national offices at Post-Office Box 261, Jeffersonville, Indiana.

In November, 1958, a source advised that the NSRP is composed of past members of klan-type organizations and notorious anti-Semites.

Issue Number 19, dated June, 1960, "The Thundertolt," announced the address of the headquarters of the NSRP had been changed from Jeffersonville, Indiana, to Post Office Box 783, Birmingham, Alabama.

On June 17, 1960, a source advised that Edward R. Fields, the Information Director of the NSRP, is the individual who "runs the NSRP."

"The Thunderbolt" continues to publish articles attacking Negroes and persons of the Jewish faith.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

Beginning at 12:30 PM, June 16,1964, sit-in demonstrations were conducted by Negroes at three St. Augustine Drug Stores and at the Monson Motel Restaurant, St. Augustine. 51 arrests were made for Trespassing with Malicious Intent, Breech of Peace, and Conspiracy. \$100 bond was set on each charge for the adults. There were 21 juveniles among those arrested who were released to their parents. The majority of the demonstrators arrested were from Williamston, North Carolina, which group arrived in St. Augustine on June 15, 1964, by Greyhound Bus.

Halstead Manucy, Exalted Cyclops of the St. Augustine Klavern, United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK), and J. B. Stoner, Klan Attorney from Atlanta, Georgia, were interviewed by the press at the Monson Motel, St. Augustine, on the afternoon of June 16, 1964. Stoner stated that the "Pageant Committee" would hold a committee meeting at the slave market on the evening of June 16, 1964. Manucy and Stoner stated that plans for demonstrations by the white people would be made at this meeting but they refused to reveal what these plans might be. Stoner indicated he was returning to Atlanta, Georgia, on June 16, 1964. Manucy reportedly commented to the press that he was a "non-violent type."

At 2:00 PM, June 16, 1964, 37 Negro teenagers paraded through downtown St. Augustine carrying anti-segregation signs. They were closely observed by police officers during the demonstration and no incidents occurred.

At 9:00 PM, June 16, 1964, a mass meeting of Negroes was held at the First Baptist Church, St. Augustine, and Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), was present and addressed the assembly. Reverend King stated the difficulties in St. Augustine might be settled in hours or in a few days. He particularly pointed out during his address that there were other areas requiring his attention.

At 10:20 PM, Negroes left the church and began a march through downtown St. Augustine. The group numbered approximately 300 and included 7 white men and women. They proceeded to the slave market where they were addressed by Reverend F. L. Shuttlesworth. The meeting concluded at 11:00 PM after which the Negroes returned to the church. The entire march was closely guarded by law enforcement officers and no incidents resulted. Approximately 75 spectators observed the march.

About 25 white males, including Halstead Manucy, mentioned above, gathered in the slave market about 9:25 PM, June 16, 1964. A speaker advised the group that there would be no march by whites that evening, but that everyone should gather in the Plaza on June 19, 1964 at 9:00 PM. He further advised that a march through "coon town" would begin at 10:00 PM on June 19, 1964. Approximately 50 additional spectators were present during this time. This group disbursed at about 9:30 PM.

State Senator Verle Pope stated that he and State Attorney Dan Warren, in conjunction with the local Grand Jury, hoped to organize a bi-racial committee, formed of local businessmen and Negro leaders.

Harry Boyte, SCL& Official, advised on June 16, 1964, that the local Grand Jury was about to recommend that a bi-racial committee be formed. the Grand Jury and local merchants rest that any such committee formed should have official Sanction by the City Commission. Boyte further Grand Jury action had been delayed because Mayor Joseph Shelley opposed official recognition of a bi-racial committee. Boyte reportedly said a meeting was arranged between Shelley and Herbert Wolfe, prominent business leader in St. Augustine, on June 17, 1964, in an effort to gain Shelley's cooperation. Boyte indicated to appointment of a bi-racial committee would satisfy the SCLC and that they would withdraw from St. Augustine to await results of committee action.

St. Augustine City Manager, Charles Barrier advised on June 16, 1964, that St. Augustine merchants will meet on June 17, 1964, and will issue a statement that they will obey the laws and comply with the Civil Rights Bill, if and when it is passed. According to Barrier, until such time as the Civil Rights Bill is passed, the merchants intend to stand on their legal right to deny service to anyone.

Deputy Sheriff, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, St. Augustine, Florida, advised on June 16, 1964, that the four demonstrators arrested on Sunday, June 14, 1964, at the Methodist Church, would be released that date since the church refused to press charges.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

At approximately 12:20 PM June 17, 1964, sit-in demonstrations were conducted at three downtown restaurants in St. Augustine, Florida. Sixteen Negroes, including seven juveniles, were arrested during the demonstration. The juveniles were released to their parents and the remaining demonstrators were charged with trespassing, breach of peace, and conspiracy and held on \$100 bond on each charge. Approximately one-half of those arrested were from Savannah, Georgia.

At 3:45 PM June 17, 1964, between fifty and seventy-five Negro demonstrators marched from the colored section of St. Augustine to the Slave Market. They gathered for about fifteen minutes to sing songs and listen to speeches after which they returned to the colored section. There were no incidents in connection with this demonstration.

At about 5:30 PM June 17, 1964, about twenty-five Negroes and two whites participated in a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach. The Florida Highway Patrol observed the wade-in. No incidents or arrests resulted.

Subsequently, on June 17, 1964, ten Negro demonstrators, one of which was a juvenile, were arrested in connection with a sit-in demonstration at the Congress Inn Motel, St. Augustine.

Florida Highway Patrol officers have adopted a policy of searching automobiles and pedestrians at St. Augustine. St. Augustine policeman was

arrested on June 17, 1964, while in plain clothes for car a piece of pipe. He was booked at the county jail and released under \$50 bond. reportedly commented that identified himself to the Florida Highway Patrol to no average.

Negroes conducted a mass meeting at the First Baptist Church, St. Francis Street, St. Augustine, on the evening of June 17, 1964. They conducted a march beginning at 10:35 PM with approximately 260 persons participating, including seventeen whites. Reporters who attended the meeting at the church prior to the march stated that these whites were rabbis who had arrived in St. Augustine on June 17, 1964.

The demonstrators proceeded to march to the Monson Motor Lodge where they stopped on the property of the lodge from 11:20 PM to 11:35 PM. While there they prayed and sang songs. The manager of the Monson Motor Lodge made: complaint and no arrests were made. The march then continued back to the colored section and did not stop at the Slave Market which has been the usual procedure in the past.

On the afternoon of June 17, 1964, St. Augustine merchants issued a statement with State Senator Verle Pope acting as spokesman. It was stated that the merchants adopted a resolution that they would obey the law and would operate their businesses in accordance with present and future laws. It was indicated that the merchants favored a study of legitimate problems by responsible local citizens.

Contact was maintained with 111th Intelligence Corps Group, (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, and with local authorities on June 17, 1964, concerning the above matters.

U. S. Judge Bryan Simpson, District Court, Jacksonville, on 6/9/64, issued order restraining city of St. Augustine from prohibiting demonstrations at any time day or night. Florida Governor Farris Bryant issued an executive order banning nighttime demonstrations in St. Augustine. The Southern Christian Leadership Conference requested the District Court to rule on the conflict between the Court's order and the Governor's order. It is recommended that Agents be authorized to testify to the incidents they observed.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on June 20, 1964, advised that on that date Martin Luther King, Jr. (President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, Atlanta, Georgia) in commenting about the racial situation mentioned that Harvard University, Boston University, and

Boston University, all theologians, would soon be in St. Augustine, Florida.

Personnel at the Information Bureau, Boston University, Boston, Massachusetts, on May 25, 1964 advised that Dr. L. Harold DeWolf is currently on the faculty of the School of Theology, Boston University (BU).

"The Boston Herald," a daily Boston newspaper, on April 7, 1953, carried an article which showed that Harold L. DeWolf was among 56 other educators in the Boston area who signed a charge that Congressional investigation committees were "contributing to a subtle breakdown in our democratic process."

The "Daily Worker", an east coast communist newspaper, in its issue of April 15, 1953, carried the name of L. Harold DeWolf in an article in protest against "congressional investigation committees which are contributing to a subtle breakdown in our democratic process."

The name L. Harold DeWolf appeared on a flyer announcing a meeting sponsored by the Massachusetts Action

The "Daily Worker" in its issue of May 24, 1950 carried an article mentioning that Professor L. Harold DeWolf, BU School of Theology, spoke at a rally sponsored by the Massachusetts Action Committee for Peace during the previous week.

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in 1950, identified the Massachusetts Action Committee for Peace as an organization in which the Communist Party (CP), USA, District #1, was vitally interested and in which members of the CP in Boston actively participated.

In January, 1950, the name of Professor L. Harold DeWolf appeared in opposition to the legislation of the General Court of Massachusetts in connection with House Bill 161 for a special commission to study and investigate the infiltration of "communist doctrines into the teaching systems of the Commonwealth and to investigate persons who are sympathetic to communism or its doctrine."

A third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in 1950, advised that Professor Harold DeWolf, BU, was a sponsor of the Mid-Century Conference for Peace in Chicago, Illinois, May 28-30, 1950.

The third source advised that the Mid-Century Conference for Peace was initiated by the Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact.

UNITED FLORIDA KU KLUX KLAH (UFKKK)

A course advised on August 20, 1955, that a new organization known as Florida Ku Klux Klan (FKKK) has been formed at Macclenny, Florida, on August 14, 1955, by former members of the Association of Florida Ku Klux Klan (AFKKK).

The objectives of this group, according to a second source, are to oppose integration in the schools and to fight communism.

Regarding AFKKK, a third source advised that a former official of the Association of Georgia Klans (AGK) formed an organization on July 7, 1953, known as AFKKK. The "Morning Tribune," Tampa, Florida, newspaper, in its August 11, 1955, issue revealed AFKKK disbanded on that date.

A fourth source advised on October 25, 1956, that AFKKK operated under the same principles and bylaws as the AGK. The AGK has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A fifth source advised on February 17, 1058, that the FKKK was operating and maintaining the same objectives as set forth above.

The Sixth source advised on June 28, 1961, that at a meeting held in Orlando, Florida, on June 25, 1961, the FKKK and the United klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc., in Florida, consolidated, and the new organization is known as the UFKKK.

On May 17, 1963, the sixth source advised that the UFKKK is still in existence in Florida and maintains the same objectives set forth above.







RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

During the night of June 21 - 22, 1964, windows were broken at the office of State Senator Verle Pope, St. Augustine, Florida, by unknown individuals. It is noted that Pope has been attempting to form a bi-real committee and act as a mediator in regards to the resial situation in St. Augustine, Florida.

An immediate investigation of the incident was instituted by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau. Seven Negroes were detained and questioned as possible suspects in this incident.

At about 10:45 AM, June 22, 1964, approximately 24 Negroes and two whites staged a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach. Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) troopers and St. Johns County Sheriff's Office deputies were present. A small group of whites attacked the demonstrators and seven whites were subsequently arrested and charged with disturbing the peace. The demonstrators entrance to the water was then blocked by about nine white youths. After about a hour, FHP officers ordered the Negroes to leave the beach since violence had previously occurred and an impasse had resulted from the uine whites standing in the way of the demonstrators entrance to the ocean.

As the Negroes walked back to their cars, they ware followed by a group of newspaper and television nameragan. A white male hit meraman for the DANISH

TV NEWS, Copenhagen, Denmark. The assailant was chared by FHP troopers and placed under arrest. He was charged with assault and battery.

At 11:30 AM, June 22, 1964, 20 Negroes retained through downtown St. Augustine and returned to the colored section. There were no incidents and the maximal lasted about 15 minutes.

At 12:40 PM, June 22, 1964, a group of about 30 demonstrators consisting of Negroes and three whites, again attempted a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach.

time they were able to enter the ocean without rest times; however, about 20 white males, carrying sticks and clubs. Suddenly ran across the beach and attacked the demonstrators. Approximately 40 FHP troopers and deputy sheriffs on the scene immediately stopped the attack and arrested about six demonstrators and six white youths. According to newsmen, one white demonstrator was struck on the head by a unknown special deputy sheriff and was observed in custody behind a patrol car. The blow resulted in considerable bleeding.

Halsted Manucy, local klan leader, and J. B. Stoner, klan attorney from Atlanta, Georgia, were observed on the scene at both wade-ins, but took no part in the assaults.

At 1:55 PM, June 22, 1964, a group of about 80 Negro demonstrators marched through downtown St. Augustine. They held a short meeting at the Slave Market and veturned to the colored section at 2:35 PM. They aumounced at the meeting that they were teturning the beach. There were no incidents connected with this demonstration.

At 8:10 PM, June 22, 1964, approximately 150 Negross and six whites marched from St. Pauls AME Chartly to the Slavo Market and returned. There were 19 1986 how and the march concluded at 8:15 PM. A chart group of white spectators jeered and should asults it the marchers but there were no other fuciding.

Luvised at 12:30 a.m., June 26, 1964, that early that evening two white males whom they described as "red-necks" came to the Monson Motor Lodge, St. Augustine, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff St. Johns County, Florida. by Deputy Sheriff These men in the company of two American Broadcasting Company (ABC) newsmen contacted photograph in his room at the Monson Motor Lodge. The ABC men asked photographer taken at St. Augustine to show them photographs Beach so they could pick out state law enforcement officers who had clubbed a white man while making an arrest. According apparently feared consequences if he.did not comply and therefore made available enlargements of the photographs for the two "red-necks". These men then reportedly made veiled threats commenting that they knew one of the state officers and knew where his family lived.

The foregoing information was immediately furnished to appropriate authorities in St. Augustine.

Governor Farris Bryant visited St. Augustine on June 26, 1964, and inspected the area where the demonstrations had been held. At a press interview, Governor Bryant stated the National Guard was not needed as yet, but that he was considering an earlier curfew making demonstrations illegal from sundown to sunup. He also stated that an additional 80 state law enforcement officers had been ordered to St. Augustine.

At 7:00 p.m., June 26, 1964, a meeting of white segregationists was held in the slave market and attended by about 500 persons. The meeting was started with an address by Charles Conley Lynch also known as Connie Lynch

rally speaker from California, and was followed by J. B. Stoner, klan attorney from Atlanta, Georgia. Stoner said that "those Negro loving FBI Agents and the Niggers had burned a house in Jacksonville and blamed it on the klan." He said that no matter how many FBI Agents are sent to St. Augustine, "We will never eat with Niggers, drink with them, or swim with them." Stoner said that President Johnson and Allen Dulles are "Nigger lovers" and persecuting whites in Mississippi. Both Stoner and Lynch, during speeches, frequently referred to the FBI as "Nigger loving Agents".

At about 8:15 p.m. the meeting was concluded and the crowd moved in mass to the intersection of King and St. George Streets in an apparent attempt to hold has march. The crowd was stopped at this point by officers and police dogs and dispersed at about 8:40 p.m.

No demonstrations were held by the Negroes on June 26, 1964, and no further incidents occurred.

During the day, June 27, 1964, about 300 white persons were at St. Augustine Beach waiting for the Negroes to conduct a wade-in demonstration, however, no wade-ins were conducted and no incidents occurred at the beach.

During the day and night, a large number of automobiles displaying Confederate flags were observed being driven about the city.

At 7:00 p.m., June 27, 1964, a meeting of white segregationists was held in the slave market. A crowd of about 400 persons was addressed by J. B. Stoner and Connie Lynch. Their speeches were similar in content to those they made the night before.

The Florida Highway Patrol reported that a large number of Negroes gathered along Washington Street, which

is on the route of previous night marches, while the meeting was in progress. Troopers reported the Negroes were in a vicious mood due to past beatings by whites and predicted violence if the whites marched into the Negro area. The meeting in the slave market concluded at 8:20 p.m. and no march was held.

Following the meeting, several small fights between Negroes and whites occurred in mixed neighborhoods in West St. Augustine. A Negro house at 70 Palmer Street, St. Augustine, was shot into. One white man reportedly received minor buckshot wounds in his leg. Another white man was beaten and robbed by a band f Negro youths. Still another white man received a minor head wound in a fight with a Negro. Two arrests were made, but none in connection with the shootings.

At 11:00 a.m., June 28, 1964, one white and four Negroes were turned away from the First Baptist Church on King Street, St. Augustine, when they attempted to attend services there. The demonstrators knelt on the church property and prayed for about 10 minutes before leaving. St. Augustine police officers were called to the scene, however, no arrests were made.

Willie Bolden, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLO) Official, advised on June 28, 1964, that the Negroes did not plan any wade-ins or marches that date. He said a meeting would be held at the First Baptist Church on St. Francis Street, St. Augustine, at 3:00 p.m., June 28, 1964.

Calvacades of 50 and 60 cars carrying Confederate flags and honking horns drove through the city during the afternoon. An automobile driven by a Negro had a bottle thrown through the windshield by a 14 year old white boy

who was apprehended and turned over to the juvenile authorities.

At 7:00 p.m., June 28, 1964, a meeting was held in the slave market by white demonstrators. Only about 200 spectators were in the plaza due to the inclement weather. J. B. Stoner and Connie Lynch gave their usual speeches and the meeting ended at 8:30 p.m. No further incidents were reported.

RACYAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

At approximately 11:20 AM, June 24, 1964, thirty Negrous attempted to conduct a "wade in" at St. Augustine Beach, Florida. About twenty five white persons stood at the water bedge and barred their entrance into the water. The Negrous turned back without entering the ocean and daparted from the beach. No effort was made by law anforcement officers on the scene to clear the way for the negroes. Ho incidents or violence resulted from this demonstration.

_At 2:40 PM, June 24, 1964, 138 Negroes led by C. T. Wivian, of Southern Christian Leadership Conference, marched to the Plaza in St. Augustine, where a brief prayer meeting was held in the center of the Plaza. The Negroes were unable to use the Slave Market since a group of white teenagors had blocked the entrance by their physical presence and with benches. The Negro demonstrators were well protected by law enforcement officers; however, no effort was made by law enforcement to clear the Shave Market for the Negroes'

At 4:30 PM, June 24, 1964, two white males were booked at the St. Johns County Jair by Florida Highway Patrol troopers on charges of failure to obey a lawful command of a police officer and open profamity. Bonds were placed at \$100 and \$59 respectively on the two charges.

A meeting of white scaregationists began at 6:45 FM. June 24, 1864, at the Stave Market in St. Augustane. The moeting was aidraged by charles Conloy Typoh, also known as Connie Lynch.

a Ku Klux Klan member to deck reville, Florida during the

summer and fall or 1963, regularly attended Klam meetings and spoke-at Klam rallies during that period.

During the meeting at the Slave Market, Lynch made abusive remarks concerning Negroes and contended that whites were the master race.

Following the weeting, the white segregationists, numbering about 300, marched through the Negrosection. About 100 Negro spectators in the colored section of St. Augustine observed the march, while singing "We inveewerybody."

About 150 Negroes conducted a march at the same time, reaching the Slave Market at 7:50 PM. The Negroes continued past the Slave Market without stopping for speeches or prayer. The routes of the two marches would have not at the intersection of King and Cordova Streets, however, police officers prevented any intermingling of the two groups. There were no incidents with the exception that two cherry bombs were thrown by unknown persons into the Negro column. The Negroes returned to the colored section, and the whites regrouped at the Slave Market, where Lynch spain addressed the group.

Lynch claimed "Jaws" in California were collecting money for Negroes, and that most of the funds were being sent to St. Augustine. He stated if violence was needed to enforce the Constitution then he was for it. He contended that there were rumors about a Negro and two whites missing in Mississippi. This Statement brought loud laughter and cheering from the crowd. Lynch said "Jews and nigger lowers had better make tracks" before the meeting was over. Lynch announced that another meeting and murch would be held at 6:30 PM, on June 25, 1964. The group began to disperse at 8:25 PM.

Commander H. V. Gibson, Florida Conservation Department, advised on June 25, 1964, that he had talked with Halstead Manucy, Klan leader in St. Augustine, the night before in the Plaza at St. Augustine. The conversation related to information which Gibson had received that Manucy was "allowing" some photographers to cover Klan activities and not allowing others to do so. Gibson said severa of Manucy's "muscle men" surrounded him during this contersation and two of them bumped him slightly. Gibson told them that if one of them laid a hand on him he would shoot Manucy. Manucy then reportedly called off his men. During the conversation, Gibson told Manucy Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) officers were getting provoked because of the trouble caused by Manucy's men and that some of Manucy's men were going to get their heads "knocked in". According to Gibson, Manucy replied he would pull a thousand men in and clean out the whole FHP force. 676,670

advised on June 25, 1964, he had spoken to manuey the higher before regarding a rumor that Manucy had made a deal with some of the Press to allow them to take photographs at the rally in the Plaza provided that the Danish photographer, who previously had been attacked by white segregationists, was not there.

Company (ABC) photographers who apparently had made the original deal with Manucy, each contributed \$10. As a result of this action, that he and other photographers at the speakers platform also put in \$10 since they felt they had been forced into doing so by the action of the ABC newsmen.

one arrest was made during the march on the evening of June 24, 1964. The person arrested was st. Augustine, who was charged with disturbing the person Strickland reportedly had been observed throwing a cherry bomb.

At 10:07 AM June 25, 1964, eight carloads of Negro demonstrators numbering about fifty arrived at St. A. gustine Beach, Florida. Numerous law enforcement officers were on the scene. As the demonstrators marched toward the water, a white youth attacked one of the Negro demonstrators and was arrested. This person was identified as St. Augustine. He was charged with assault and battery on C. T. Vivian, Negro leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC).

The Negroes were blocked from entering the water by nineteen white males and two or three white females. After the arrest of Stanford, the Negroes started to move toward the whites but were ordered off the beach by the FHP in view of the violence which had occurred. They left the beach at 10:20 AM.

Five newsmen from ABC were observed standing behind the white segregationists who were blocking the Negroes from the water, apparently taking photographs with the sanction of the segregationists. After the Negroes departed this same group of photographers was observed laughing and joking with the segregationists.

At 2:30 PM June 25, 1964, about eighty Negroes and one white male staged a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach.

Approximately eighty white males and females stood at the water's edge inviting the Negroes to come in while jeering and making insulting remarks. The Negro demonstrators then walked north on the beach in an effort to enter the water. An FHP trooper announced over a loud speaker that the white crowd should clear away or be arrested. The crowd then made an opening for the Negroes, but as the Negroes entered the water, the whites attacked with their fists starting numerous fights. Law enforcement officers immediately broke up the fights and eight whites and one Negro were arrested. Two white males resisted arrest and were clubbed by officers. A brief scuffle then occurred between troopers, a deputy sheriff, and a city policeman as a result of protests by the deputy and the city policeman that the blows struck by the state officers were unnecessary.

A meeting of white segregationists schedul at the Slave Market in St. Augustine got underway at 7:00 PM June 25, 1964. About four hundred white men, women, and children attended the meeting. J. B. Stoner, Klan attorney from Atlanta, Georgia, addressed the crowd and gase his usual hate speech. He urged all whites who are hit by state troopers to obtain their badge numbers so they can be presecuted in court.

At 7:20 PM Connie Lynch, mentioned above, then spoke to the crowd making abusive remarks concerning Negroes and Jews.

At 7:45 PM June 25, 1964, about 180 Negroes formed for their march outside the First Baptist Church on St. Francis Street, St. Augustine. They marched north on Cordova Street, then east on King Street and proceeded opposite the Slave Market at about 8:00 PM. The white segregationists did not march but remained in the Slave Market. When the Negroes arrived opposite the Slave Market, they were attacked by a large group of whites. The whites threw trash recepticles into the group of Negroes and police officers. Attacks were made indiscriminantly on troopers and Negroes alike. One trooper was shot in the arm by an unknown person. The wound reportedly appeared to have been made by a zip gun or small bored pistol. The whites were driven back and the march continued, proceeding west on Cathedral Street.

At the corner of Cathedral and St. George Streets, the rear of the march was again attacked by whites who had followed the march from the Slave Market. The attack appeared to have been touched off by the arrest of a white man by FHP troopers. About seventy-five whites rushed into the intersection. Negro marchers were attacked but the white crowd seemed primarily interested in preventing officers from making arrests. Negro women and other marchers in apparent terror broke ranks. After about three minutes, order was restored and law enforcement officers succeeded in rapidly escorting the marchers back to the church.

At the corner of King and Cordova Streets a large group of whites congregated for about 15 minutes. FMP officers called for gas equipment but the crowd returned to the Slave Market before it became necessary to use it. At this point the crowd appeared to be enraged at all law enforcement officers.

Twenty-one persons were injured in the foregoing demonstrations.

On return to the Slave Market, Lynch and Stoner again addressed the crowd for about ten minutes. A plea for funds was made to get those arrested out of jail. Lynch said they would get them out of jail one way or another

advised on June 25, 1964, that ten arrests were made and a number of law enforcement officers were injured but none seriously. That in his opinion the FHP and other state law enforcement officers can no longer control the situation and marshal law is imminent.



The other photograph sought by the ABC men was of a Florida State Highway Patrolman struggling with several white individuals, one of whom was a local Sheriff's Office County Deputy and an off duty St. Augustine policeman who was wearing a bathing sut. Yoder feels the reason these photographs were requested by the men coming to his room was for the purpose of harassing or possibly causing physical harm to the Beverage Agent and Florida State Trooper.

It was requested by the individuals that the photographs be blown up to such an extent that the Beverage Agent and State Trooper could be easily identified either through the picture itself, or the numbers showing on their badges.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

At approximately 10:40 AM, June 29, 1964, about 40 Megroes and 9 whites arrived at St. Augustine Beach, Florida. About 8 or 10 white segregationists were in the water at the foot of the pier awaiting the arrival of the integrationists. State law enforcement officers were present and walked into the water completely surrounding the demonstrators in order to prevent any interference from the white segregationists. These officers were dressed in uniforms and some waded into waist deep water in order to form a protective cordon around the integrationists. Over 100 officers were on the scene. The demonstrators left the beach at 11:15 AM and returned to the colored section without incident.

Florida State Attorney Dan Warren announced at St. Augustine that age 27, St. Augustine, Lar Meen arrested June 28, 1964, and charged with simple assault. Felony charges were also placed against Thompson for interfering with an officer in the partornance of his duty. Bond was set at \$2500. Said this was the first of approximately 15 felony arrests contemplated in which investigation is being conducted.

At 7:25 PM, June 29, 1964, a group of about 150 white segregationists gathered in the slave market at St. Augustine and were addressed by Charles Conley Lynch, also known as Commie Lynch, rally speaker from California. At 7:45 PM about 120 Negroes and 4 Whites Tigan a march from St. Marys Baptist Church on Washington Street, St. Augustine.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA

As the march turned East on King Street, Lynch's audience left the slave market and proceeded to the West side of the Plaza to watch the Negroes. Law enforcement officers marched beside the Negroes in three deep formation, to prevent attacks. The demonstrators marched around the Plaza and returned to the colored section at 7:55 PM. One brick was thrown at the marchers but there were no injuries or other incidents. Lynch attempted to resume his speech but discontinued after a few moments since he had lost his audience.

HALSTEAD MANUCY, Klan Leader from St. Augustine, was observed in attendance at the meeting. The crowd in the Plaza disbursed at 8:30 PM and the Plorida Highway Patrol (FHP) resumed its normal patrol.

On the evening of June 29, 1964, all suspicious automobiles were being stopped and searched by the FHP. Arrests have been made on charges of carrying concealed weapons. Also about 15 youths were arrested for throwing rocks in the vicinity of King Street and Central Avenue.

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APPENDIX

UNITED FLORIDA KU KLUX KLAN (UFKKK)

A source advised on August 20, 1955, that a new organization known as the Florida Ku Klux Klan (FKKK) had been formed at Macclenny, Florida, on August 14, 1955, by former members of the Association of the Florida Ku Klux Klan (AFKKK).

The objectives of this group, according to a second source are to oppose integration in the schools and to fight communism.

Regarding AFKKK, a third source advised that a former official of the Association of Georgia Klans (AGK) formed an organization on July 7, 1953, known as AFKKK. The "Morning Tribune", Tampa, Florida newspaper, in its August 11, 1955 issue, revealed AFKKK disbanded on that date.

A fourth source advised on October 25, 1956, that AFKKK operated under the same principles and bylaws as the AGK. The AGK has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A fifth source advised on February 17, 1958, that the FKKK is operating and maintaining the same objectives as set forth above.

The sixth source advised on June 28, 1961, that at a meeting held in Orlando, Florida on June 25, 1961, the FKKK and the United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, lnc., in Florida, consolidated, and the new organization is known as the United Florida Ku Klux Klan (UFKKK).

On May 17, 1962, the sixth source advised that the UFKKK is still in existence in Florida and maintains the same objectives as set forth above.

At approximately 11:20 A.M., June 23, 1964, Negro demonstrators staged a wade-in at St. Augustine Beach, Florida. While proceeding toward the beach in pairs, a group of about fifteen segregationists stood at the head of the beach ramp and blocked the way. One of the Negroes at the head of the group was struck by one of the white segregationists. Police officers immediately intervened and arrested both individuals. Order was restored and the demonstrators proceeded to the beach closely guarded by about fifty law enforcement officers. In order to afford close protection it was necessary for police officers to wade into the water. The segregationists again placed themselves between the ocean and the demonstrators. At this point two white female segregationists attacked two of the demonstrators and attempted to hold their heads under water. The Florida Highway Patrol again intervened and ordered the demonstrators to depart because of the violence and arrests which occurred.

Seven persons were arrested during the wade-in demonstration, including Gene Norman Foreman, a klans-man from Jacksonville, Florida.

After the demonstrators departed from the beach, the beach photographer for the Danish "TV News", topenhagen, Denmark, made a complaint to J. T. Prater, Captain, Florida Highway Patrol, that he was not receiving adequate police protection and vised Prater that he had again been threatened with assault by spectators while photographing the demonstration. He said he was physically attacked and beaten on June 22, 1964, while photographing a demonstration

and had called this matter to the attention of his ambassador and that the ambassador was very concerned about the situation. Captain Prater pointed out that Hansen had separated himself from the other photographers which created a police problem. Captain Prater suggested that in the future Hansen should stay with other photographers in order to have suitable protection.

At 2:20 P.M., June 23, 1964, approximately 120 Negro demonstrators marched through downtown St. Augustine. This demonstration was conducted without incident.

At 7:45 P.M., June 23, 1964, approximately 200 Negroes and several whites marched through the downtown area. During the demonstration approximately 100 white spectators jeered, shouted abuses and threw sand, which resulted in the arrest of four Negroes and one white. There were about 150 police officers in the area who moved in swiftly to restore order and isolate the spectators from the demonstrators.

Holstead Manucy, klan leader from St. Augustine, was observed at both the morning and evening demonstration.

Hosea Williams, Project Director, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), advised on June 23, 1964, that demonstrations for the rest of the week would likely follow a similar pattern with wade-in demonstrations at 10:00 A.M., and marches through downtown St. Augustine about noon and at 7:30 P.M.

advised on June 23, 1964, that the SCIC had filed a motion in United States District Court, Jacksonville, Florida, requesting Federal troops be sent to St. Augustine. This action was reportedly based on petitions signed by integrationists alleging inadequate police protection.

St. Augustine Chief of Police, St. Johns County Sheriff and Colonel Kirkland, Florida Highway Patrol, have reportedly received telegrams from SCIC attorney in New York City advising them of this action. According to

these individuals do not intend to appear in court in connection with this action unless they are subpoensed by the judge.

A hearing is scheduled in United States District Court, Jacksonville, on June 26, 1964, in connection with an order by Judge Bryan Simpson for Governor Ferris Bryant and other officials to show cause why they should not be held in contempt of the judge's decision to allow demonstrations after dark in St. Augustine.

At 6:00 p.m., July 5, 1964, five Negroes, including a wows and a child, were fishing off the Vilano Bridge near St. Augustine, Florida. They were attacked by a group of seven to twelve white youths, one of them using bicycle chain. Two of the Negroes were injured, one, was hospitalized.

Was hospitalized.

Currently under indictment in St. Johns County in connection with the shooting of William Kinard in October, 1963.

The incident was investigated immediately by the Florida Highway Patrol and the Florida Sheriff's Bureau. Four of the assailants have reportedly been identified. No arrests have been made as yet, but Assistant State Attorney Dan Warren intends to prosecute the assailants for aggravated assault and assault with a deadly weapon.

At midnight, July 4, 1964, approximately 60 Negro youths approached the Quik Serve drive-in hamburger stand near the Negro section of Palatka, Florida. Approximately 75 or 100 white youths were gathered at the restaurant. Sheriff E. W. Pellicer, Putnam County Sheriff's Office, went to the scene and asked the group of Negroes to turn back which they did. The restaurant them closed for the night and the group of white youths moved to Angel's Drive-in, several blocks away. Approximately 20 Negroes then proceeded toward Angel's Drive-in at which time Sheriff Pellicer explained to the two groups that Circuit Judge P. B. Revels had issued an injunction against creating racial disturbances. Most of the two groups then dispersed. Sheriff Pellicer arrested two white youths and five Negroes for refusing to disperse. They were charged with unlawful assembly and violating a circuit court order.

According to the Putnam County Sheriff's Office all participants were local residents, mostly teen-agers.

At 5:30 p.m., July 4, 1964, 62 robed klansmen and klanswomen merched at St. Augustine, Florida, followed by a procession of approximately 150 men, women and children. The group marched from the Community Center Parking Lot to the slave market where Connic Lynch addressed approximately 400 spectators. Lynch's speech included his usual comments against Negroes plus remarks as to the unconstitutionality of the Civil Rights Bill.

After a half hour of speaking, the procession returned on foot to the Community Center.

There were no incidents.

The parade and rally were followed closely by numerous Florida Highway patrolmen. As a result of the rally, the Florida Highway Patrol has again increased its force in St. Augustine, Florida, to prevent violence.

At 11:30 a.m., June 30, 1964, 30 Negroes and 3 whites held a wade-in demonstration at St. Augustine, Beach, Florida. They were protected by 150 state law enforcement officers. About 200 white spectators were also present. Officers again cleared the way for the demonstrators and went into the water to provide protection. The demonstrators left the beach at 11:50 a.m. As they were leaving, one white male charged the officers in an affort to break through to the demonstrators but was easily repulsed. This man was not arrested at the time but was later arrested and charged with failure to obey a lawful command of a police officer. Two other white segregationists were also arrested on similar charges.

White segregationists gathered at 7:40 p.m., June 30, 1964, at the slave market, St. Augustine, Florida. Approximately 100 whites were present and were addressed by Charles Conley Tynch, also known as Connie Lynch, rally speaker from California. The rally broke up about 8:10 p.m. without incident.

On the evening of June 30, 1964, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) leaders R. D. Hayling and James Jackson were arrested by the Sheriff's Office, St. Johns County, Florida, and charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor since juveniles had been used in marches and other demonstrations in St. Augustine. Hayling was charged on seven counts and released on \$2300 bond. Jackson was charged on one count and released on \$300 bond.

Warrants were also issued for Martin Luther King, SCLC leader, and John Gibson of the SCLC on charges

of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. King, following his arrival at St. Augustine, on June 30, 1964, surrendered at the courthouse and was released on his signature. GIBSON was out of town but is expected to surrender upon his return.

A press release from Tallahassee, Florida, on June 30, 1964, indicated Governor Farris Bryant had been successful in appointing a bi-racial committee of four.

Martin Luther King held a press conference at St. Augustine on June 30, 1964, and announced that demonstrations would be stopped for two weeks pending results of efforts of the bi-racial committee.

Halstead Manucy, leader of the white segregation ists forces in St. Augustine also announced that white the segregation ists would comply with the truce and that the rally planned by the whites for July 4, 1964, would not be held. He also instructed young white segregation ists to refrain from creating any disturbance since bond money would not be furnished by Manucy and his associates if they should be arrested.

Beginning at 5:00 p.m., July 9, 1964, Alonzo Manucy, also known as "Bubba" nephew of Halstead Manucy, picketed the Morson Motor Lodge, St. Augustine, Florida, carrying a sign saying "Niggers ate and slept here, would you" Both Alonzo and Halstead Manucy are active in the klan unit at St. Augustine, Florida.

J. B Stoner and Connic Lynch were on the scene at the Monson Motor Lodge when the picketing started. The motel manager, as told by Stoner that Stoner was in charge of the picketing. It asked him why he was being picketed since he accepted Negro guests only when forced to comply with Federal law. Stoner replied, "we're just trying to get you some nigger business." Stoner added they planned to picket all integrated St. Augustine establishments.

The picketing of the Monson Motor Lodge continued until 8:30 p.m. when officers of the Florida Highway Patrol ordered it discontinued in accordance with an 8:30 p.m. deadline for demonstrations set by Governor Farris Bryant.

Ku klux klan (KKK) at St. Augustine, Florida, was angry at because he had surrendered to the integrationists and made an anouncement on television that St. Augustine businessmen would obey the new Federal law. Stated further in his television interview that he hoped the out-of-towners on both sides would go away and let St. Augustine run its business. This statement offended Coppie Lynch, from California, and J. B. Stoner, from Georgia, who arranged for the picketing.

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On July 10, 1964, picketing at the Monson Motor Lodge was repeated from 5:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Similar pickets were posted on the morning of July 11, 1964, at the Monson Motor Lodge and the Monterrey Motel plus Victor's Restaurant. As of 2:00 p.m. on July 11, 1964, the picketing of the Monson Motor Lodge and the Monterrey Motel *as discontinued but Victor's Restaurant was picketed until nightfall. There was no picketing on July 12, 1964.

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Regarding advance information concerning Negro demonstrations at St. Augustine, as the Bureau is aware Negro leaders of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) refused to furnish the Bureau with prior information of scheduled demonstrations. The SCLC apparently felt that as the demonstrators had to rely upon ineffectual protection from the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office and St. Augustine Police Department, it served them no purpose in giving advance notice to any law enforcement agency of planned demonstrations. However, once it was apparent that Negro demonstrators were to be afforded protection by the Florida Highway Patrol and other state officers, Negro leaders readily furnished advance information regarding demonstrations. This cooperative feeling between the FBI and Negro leaders is being fostered and encouraged. Since the truce was instituted in St. Augustine on 7/1/64, close liaison has been maintained with Negro leaders in that community.

During the nights of July 18 and July 19, 1964, rallies were held at St. Augustine, Florida, by the Ku Klux Klan (KKK). The rallies took place on private property located on Route 207 on the outskirts of St. Augustine, Florida. J. B. Stoner and Conrad Lynch were the speakers at both rallies. Approximately two-hundred persons were in attendance Saturday night and one-hundred-fifty persons Sunday nights. The speeches were the usual pro-segregation anti-Negro addresses. Stoner and Lynch were critical of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Stoner publically set fire and burned copies of the Act at both rallies.

There were no incidents of violence in connection with the rallies.

Group (INTC), Jacksonville, Florida, was advised of the foregoing information.

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On July 17, 1964, Martin Luther Hing, Jr. held a press conference at St. Augustine, Florida, wherein he threatened to resume mass racial demonstrations unless integration is effected. He said the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) attorneys will file suit against accommodations refusing service and will attempt to enjoin white segregationists from interfering with the implementation of the Civil Rights Law. Suits have already been filed against Rusty's and the Santa Maria Restaurant. Free Martin, SCLC official, advised King had telephoned the Governor's Office to protest the situation at St. Augustine. King will also request LeRey Collins, Director of the Community Relations Service, to intervene.

On July 17, 1964, there was no picketing by whites and Negroes continued testing public accommodations without incident until a group of four Negroes attempted to integrate Pappy's Seafood Restaurant, South Dixie Highway, St. Augustine, Florida. These Negroes arrived at the restaurant at approximately 5:00 P.M., July 17, 1964, got out of their automobile, and were immediately chased by seven or eight white males. The Negroes abandoned their automobile and ran. Three of them ran north on United States Highway Number One to the Kayo Gas Station where was caught by three white males, beaten with fists, and kicked. The other two Negroes,

State Trooper. As the State Trooper approaches the three white males ran off. Was taken to the local hospital and was discharged with no apparent injuries other than bruises. One of the Negro integrators ran from Pappy's into the woods and was missing for about two hours until located by the Florida Highway Patrol. Of the four Negroes, only was beaten. Florida Highway Patrol immediately instituted investigation.

On the night of July 17, 1964, a large Negro rally was held at the St. Mary Baptist Church in St. Augustine. Martin Luther King, Jr. left the city on the afternoon of July 17, 1964, and Hosea Williams is presently directing SCLC activities at St. Augustine, Florida.

Captain James Prater, Commanding Officer of the Florida Highway Patrol, presently at St. Augustine, has fourteen men on duty to handle the racial situation.

On July 14, 1964, white youths were observed picketing three restaurants at St. Augustine, Florida. These pickets carried placards protesting the Civil Rights Act and "Delicious food - Niggers eat here." Identification on these placards indicated that the picketing was being sponsored by the National States Rights Party, of which J. B. Stoner is the Vice-Presidential candidate.



good faith when they appeared in Federal Court fon July 28,
1964. The Association went along with thoughts on
the matter and the majority decided to re-integrate. At
about 3:25 A.M. on July 24, 1964, two "Molotov Coctails"
were thrown through the dining room window of the Monson
Motor Lodge.

The night manager, immediately
called the Fire Department and tried to determine who
had caused the fire. He failed to see anybody in the
vicinity. The fire was extinguished and damage amounted
to about \$3,000 and was confined to the rug, chairs, tables
and a door.

Two arrests were made by the Special State Police Force assigned to St. Augustine and the following persons were held for investigation on arson:

age 33, St. Augustine, Florida, and age 22, of Ocala and St. Augustine, Florida.

On July 25, 1964, these men were released from the investigation charge since there was insufficient evidence to connect them with the arson.

On July 25, 1964, J. B. Stoner and Connie Lynch surrendered at the County Jail and were released on \$300 bond each. No other arrests have been made to date.

On December 14, 1964, approximately sixty students and several faculty members of Florida Memorial College, St. Augustine, Florida, gathered in front of the City Building, St. Augustine, beginning at 7:30 PM.

Dear Mr. Hoover: The enclosed booklet "st, Augustine...Desecration (or Rape of The Ancient City " has just come to my attention. I felt it was important enough to bring to your attention and to the attention of The President -if you feel it necessary to do so at this time, in timely readiness for what new demonstration may break out in the coming year in St. Augustine where, I understand. Martin Luther King has threatened to bring St. Augustine to its knees: I have inquired about the reliability of the facts contained in this booklet from many people here in St. Augustine, and have found that their faith in it has been quite authentic as to what has happened and what may again happen in 1965 when the City hopes to celebrate its 400th Anniversary of founding. I have returned from a lengthy wisit of many months in New York City where I used to live in St.Albans, and have found business has been badly hurt these many months after the demonstration which occurred here. No one seems to know why St. Augustine has been picked as the target for violent demonstrations, except that it represents asymbol or testing ground for further demonstrations here and elsewhere and that it was originally started by one not responsible for his unaccountable reason and acts, as indicated in the copy contain in the enclosed booklet. If the incidents are certain to occur a am in this City, naturally the tourist business upon which this area depends -/572 will be shattered and there is no need of the Government continuing its plans to help establish Restoration work being done here in contemplation of the City's 400th Anniversary of Founding in 1965 inability to exist after what happened earlier this year. mands of one Martin Luther King, they will not only suffer from the loss of local trade, but they know that fewer tourists will wish to visit their beautiful city. On the other hand, if they refuse to obey the public accommodations section of the new "Civil Rights Bill" (proclaimed an un-Constitutional invasion of private property by many authorities, both in and out of Congress), they will be held in contempt of court and deprived of their property.

This pitiful situation is perhaps best expressed by one of the affected resaurant owners who says:

This thing is more than just civil rights . . . if this law stands, Congress can pass any law it wants to, and that means a powerful centralized government with complete control over our lives and savings. I had to leave high school to earn my living, but under the American free enterprise system, I got what I've always dreamed of owning; my own business. I've fought and worked hard for what I've got. Now that it's almost mine and almost paid for, my government comes along and threatens to destroy me, instead of protecting me, just to please outside, trouble-making agitators.

The responsible citizens of St. Augustine have shown that they deplore violence and do not intend to use it. Naturally, they will resist laws that deprive them of their personal freedom and decould be next.

correct the absolutely false and dishonest reporting that has cut their normal tourist trade in half. St. Augustine, to-day, is as safe a place for tourists, if not safer, than any other city in America. It is certainly far safer than our nation's capital where women fear to walk the streets alone at night, or even New York City, the site of the World's Fair. This fact is clearly realized by today's tourists who are delighted to find beauty and peace in this ancient town—intead of the ugly violence so falsely pictured by the hatchet men of the "Liberal" Press.

The second concern of St. Augustinians is to take corrective, legal action to undo the injustice which they feel has been imposed upon peaceful citizens of all races by the patently un-Constitutional features of the new "Civil Rights" law. Proper, peaceful action at the polls is again the approach they propose to take.

Desecration --- Rape Of The Ancient City

Press so openly in favor of the provocateurs and so violently against the citizens of their peaceful little town? The questions go on and on.

Another puzzle to them is the complete reversal of position taken by certain public officials. Why, they prudently inquire, should a Federal Judge deny an injunction against the city (and in doing so actually brand Mrs. Malcolm Peabody a trouble-making outsider) and then suddenly reverse himself and supinely grant the same injunction to Martin Luther King—this time publicly humiliating their Mayor, Chief of Police, and Sheriff?

From many eyewitnesses comes the impression that Judge Simpson conducted a court that was demonstrably biased in favor of King's hoodlums. After the lawyers for the city and the lawyers for the agitators had rested their cases, Judge Simpson even took a day and a half to ask leading, often insulting, and highly loaded questions of local law-enforcement officers while fawning upon the racist agents and

Judge than he was to the Negro ministers of St. Augustine, who refused to have anything to do with him. After all, the Negro ministers concluded, St. Augustine is not a segregated community. They were also familiar with King's past associations with the activities and agents of the Communist Party of the United States.

And why, St. Augustinians ask, did their Governor reverse his position from supporting the very efficient local law-enforcement agents to down-grading them and placing over them a special state force with orders to protect the Negroes—and not the total community? What changed his mind? He had numerous agents in St. Augustine who knew how efficiently and peacefully the local law officers were then handling the situation. And, perhaps most important, who convinced the Governor to proclaim a state of emergency over this peaceful American city?

As distant spectators the citizens of St. Augustine—like all of us—saw local law-enforcement officers displaced by federal paratroopers in Little Rock, Arkansas. They also saw local law-enforcement officers displaced with Federal Marshals in Oxford, Mississippi. They have noted the cries of "police brutality" coming from the Communist Press and certain foolish "Liberal" dailies in Northern cities—and against some of the best local police forces in the world. But before their very eyes the citizens of St. Augustine now watched as their own efficient and respected police officers were displaced by a subservient Governor and replaced by a strange special police force. After putting two and two together, they wonder if St. Augustine was not used as a practice run to test the use of special state police forces, instead of the U.S. Army or U.S. Marshals, as an occupy-

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the amateur "do-gooders" and the professional provocateurs led by Martin Luther King failed to produce riots and voilence—when the citizens of St. Augustine, Negro and white, refused to act lawlessly—"Reverend" King found himself in trouble. He had boasted in previous press conferences that he would "have St. Augustine on its knees" in ten days. He was now being severely criticized for his failure by the more militant Negro leaders who have since operated their successful riots in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Illinois, Kansas, and Michigan; they were clamoring for his removal as a leader of the cause. King now needed a facesaving operation very badly. It came in the form of a most unusual telephone call from United States Senator George Smathers. The Senator, stating that he was acting as liaison officer for the President of the United States, urged a business leader of St. Augustine to comply with "Reverend" King's demand to form a bi-racial committee. This would save face for King, as he had now completely lost out on every other demand.

To the credit of local businessmen and the Mayor, the entire community of St. Augustine—black and white—stood firm. They refused to bow the knee to King, to the Governor, the Senator, or even to the White House. They flatly refused to form or to serve on the phoney bi-racial committee, come Hell, hurricane, or the whole Fifth Army.

It was Governor Bryant who now rushed to the rescue of Martin Luther King by announcing that he had formed a bi-racial committee for St. Augustine. When asked by the Press to name the members of the committee, the Governor—always an innovator—offered something new in American politics: "It was a secret committee," he said. The bewildered local citizens are con-

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With King gone, St. Augustine is again quiet. vinced that the same White House pressure that was applied to their Senator was again used on their Governor. There is, under the circumstances, no other explanation.

Finally, armed with a non-existent victory, "Reverend" King could go to Washington to be pictured standing behind President Lyndon Johnson as hesigned the newly enacted "Civil Rights Bill."

In their initial state of shock, St. Augustinians were reluctant to believe that the highest office of this land could, or would, be used to bail out a racist agitator like Martin Luther King. It was with dismay and disbelief that they found their Federal Judge, their junior Senator, and their Governor trying to force them to "their knees" instead of fighting to protect them in their Constitutional rights.

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TODAY, the stunned citizens of St. Augustine are beginning to recover from the immediate terror of their ex-

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while the demonstrators invaded the private swimming pool of a motor court. They even led midnight marchers through residential sections, turning flashlights upon the first and secondstory windows of houses where families were sleeping. They permitted the demonstrators to bellow songs and shout, and allowed them, as well as news photographers, to trample private lawns, destroying shrubbery and flowers. The special state troopers ceased to be regarded as friends and some restaurants even refused to serve them. During

his time, our Chief of Police and sheriff were forced to withhold their forces. The commandant of the state troops made no attempt to coordinate and cooperate with them in any way, and the city officials and the city law-enforcement agencies were completely by-passed."

From many eyewitnesses come statements praising the Sheriff and the Chief of Police who on one occasion were even forced to brush aside the confused

violence; they turned demonstrators from a planned line of march which would have taken them right into a meeting of angry white citizens gathered in the Plaza. At least seven eyewitnesses to whom we spoke felt that the special state police force was saved from a serious situation only by the quick and intelligent action of the local enforcement officers who knew and understood the local situation.

Remember that, in creating this special state police force, Governor Bryant conferred upon it the power to make are rests for violation of any regulation that he might promulgate. This, in effect, turned St. Augustine into a police state under martial law. During the period, it was primarily white local citizens who were seized and searched for so-called deadly weapons by the Governor's special police force. There was an obvious effort made to avoid searching Negroes and agitators. The few times that the Sheriff was able to have even a few of the demonstrators searched, law officers collected numerous pistols, knives, and ice picks. When the Sheriff tried a general search of demonstrators before a mass march, the special police force refused to allow

Now that the race agitators have departed, law-abiding citizens of this ancient city have paused to reflect; many questions come to their minds.

One has to do with Hayling, the dentist. His dental practice is almost non-existent. His dental office is now a near headquarters for outside agitators, and he is still authorizing bills in the name of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. The source of the funds that sustain him and support his activities is a mystery.

The provocative and willfully unlawful acts of the publicity-seeking Mrs. Malcolm E. Peabody, mother of the



ipecial state forces wade into the ocean to attack St. Augustinians with clubs.

Governor of Massachusetts, are regardcd by most St. Augustinians as those of a misguided "do-gooder" in her dotage; acts to be expected from the brainwashed wife of a retired Episcopal Bishop tainted with a strange public record of some thirteen Communist Front affiliations. No such compassion is felt, however, for her son, the Reverend George Peabody, whose display of straight-from-the-bottle vodka drinking-while in clerical garb-engendered no great wave of respect. The same might be said of his later performance described in these words by L. O. Davis Jr., Sheriff of St. Johns County:

While Mrs. Peabody was recently confined in the St. Johns County Jail, a man dressed in the garb of a priest or minister came to the jail and stated that he wanted to visit his mother, and that he was her son, Reverend Peabody.

I told him that she was retired and that I did not allow visits from persons who were heavily under the influence of intoxicants and refused to allow him to visit her. I told him that if he did not leave that I would prefer charges against him. He called a taxicab and left.

The citizens of St. Augustine think they understand—if they cannot respect -the Peabodys; but they cannot understand why they were invaded by a Press corps many times larger than the one that came to report the visit to their city by Vice President Lyndon Johnson last March 11, 1963. If reporting the truth is still considered a proper journalistic function, then, they ask, why didn't the Press check the inflammatory and false statements contained in the releases of King's fronts before moving an army of cameramen and reporters into their city? Why were cameramen and reporters always stationed. in advance, at the trouble spots? [Their presence was even used as an indicator by law officers who thus knew where the agitators planned to perform next.] Why were the agents of the



minor consequence usually treatable with a Band-Aid. The action of the Governor was simply not justified by the actual situation in St. Augustine."

This unusual and curious act by Governor Farris Bryant rendered the powers of the local Sheriff and Chief of Police impotent. They were left to handle petty larceny and the usual misdemeanors that plague any community -but they were now powerless to prevent an outbreak of violence which might result from the presence or activity of "Reverend" King's racist agitators. St. Augustine was firmly in the hands of the Governor's special police force, and the arbitrary actions of that force were shocking. We again quote Dr. Norris:

"From being a friendly force, the state troopers were transformed almost overnight into a hostile army. There were incidents of citizens being stopped in the course of their normal movement and searched, the most pedestrian articles were often seized, and all this was done without warrant or reason.

One of the first individuals treated in this fashion was a prominent physician, Dr. Raymond S. Cafaro. He'd been on a house call and was returning down one of our main streets when he was stopped by a trooper and told that the area was blocked and he had to go another direction. The doctor demurred and agreed to turn around and retrace his steps. As he started off, the state trooper commanded him to halt, and, when he rolled to a stop, he was ordered to identify himself. Even though Dr. Cafaro did this properly, he was forced to get out of his automobile, place his hands on the roof top of the car, spread his legs and be ignominiously searched in front of local citizens, many of whom knew and respected him and who vigorously protested to the state trooper. They were told to shut up, or they would be put in jail. The state trooper then forced the doctor against a stone wall, leaving the car in the middle of the road, and called a patrol wagon to take him to jail. Fortunately a local policeman happened to

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"Another incident occurred to the wife of one of our other physicians. She was kindly delivering some medicine to a friend. It was about eleven o'clock at night when she was stopped very much in the same fashion. Because she did not halt fast enough for the officer, she was hauled out of the automobile and carried off to jail. Her husband had to get out of bed and go to the jail to secure her release. He was compelled to post a twenty-five dollar bond. This is in contrast to the treatment accorded Martin Luther King, who was proved to have employed, in his agitation, parolees of a minor age from a detention school. He was charged with the crime of "contributing to the delin-quency of a minor," but King was treated differently; he was released without bail on his own cognizance.

"Another incident occurred in which a man appeared at the Sheriff's office with a receipt to reclaim his son's toy popgun, one of those cork air-guns that children use. He presented himself to the Sheriff and asked where he had to go to recover this deadly [sic!] weapon which the Governor's officers had seized from his car the night before.

"A very revealing incident was the arrest by a state trooper of a local policeman of fifteen-years honorable service. He was in civilian clothes at the time, but identified himself to the trooper. Our police officer was charged with carrying a concealed weapon which, in actuality, was a fifteen-inch piece of waterpipe. He was carrying the pipe, as evidence, openly in his hand to the police station to be checked for fingerprints. On arrival at the county jail, a Deputy Sheriff again identified this man as a local police officer. Nonetheless, the state trooper still preferred charges and our officer was jailed. Obviously, the Judge threw this case out of court.

"As these incidents were multiplied many times over, local citizens were horrified to realize that the state troopers who at first had been allies and friends were now their jailers, and had, in effect, isolated and exposed their integrated, model community to the nightmare of what can only be called a police state. Citizens quickly realized that there was no difference between what was happening under the state troopers and what would have happened if an occupying federal army had been sent in. The treatment, in no way, could have been worse.

"The commandant of the state troopers, meeting with doctors in our community in an endeavor to set up a precautionary First Aid Station, made the comment that his orders were to protect the Negroes in whatever demonstrations they might wish to make. It was obvious that this was exactly what the state troopers were doing; protecting imported agitators-under our Governor's orders—as they set about violating the peace and private property of our

Upon his return, Mayor Shelly was compelled to reject Hayling's incredible demands for desegregation on the simple grounds that no public facilities were segregated, and because—as everyone knows—he had no such authority over privately-owned restaurants and motels. For these same reasons, the Mayor also refused to appoint a "biracial committee," a propaganda

scheme proposed by the militant dentist.

Mr. Hayling's followers then began to engage in sit-in and lie-in demonstrations on private property, in open violation of local and state laws—the sort of simple trespass laws which have been a part of most state and local codes for centuries. The local police were thus forced to arrest and remove the lawbreakers. Not a single Negro was injured. The failure of these demonstrations to produce violence now seemed to provoke the need for more drastic

as a welling confilled where.

On November 15, 1963, Hayling was severely reprimanded by Judge William McRae in the Federal Court at Jacksonville, Florida, where he sought an injunction against the city. In denying the injunction, the Federal Judge told Hayling:

The court is of the opinion that the plaintiff did not come into court with clean hands. Their leadership and particularly Robert B. Hayling bave displayed a lack of restraint, common sense and good judgment, and an irresponsibility which have done a disservice to the advancement of the best interests of all the plaintiffs and others in St. Augustine wbo are similarly situated. Problems which might well have been solved by intelligent action have been handled with deliberate provocation and apparent intent to incite disorder and confusion. [Emphasis ours.]

At this point, the local NAACP was forced to disavow Hayling.

The little city now settled down to prepare itself for the anticipated flow of tourists upon whom they depend for a living. In the meantime, Hayling, after being dropped by the NAACP, became the local leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), the front organization of the notorious Martin Luther King. As such, he invited [March 11, 1964] the Massachusetts Chapter of the SCLC to send agitators to St. Augustine during the college spring vacation.

Just before the spring vacation began, a shocked local boy, attending school in

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lets that had been distributed to students and clergymen throughout the New England area by the Student Christian Movement and the SCLC; the leaflets called for demonstrations in St. Augustine on March twenty-first to twenty-eight and/or March twenty-ninth to April fourth. Trouble was on its way.

II

DR. HARDGROVE S. NORRIS, a prominent surgeon and a highly respected citizen of St. Augustine gives this eyewitness account of the invasion that followed:

"St. Augustine has been targeted for demonstrations since last summer. There were sporadic attempts to integrate restaurants and motels. This was done in some of the chain firms such as at the Holiday Inn, Howard Johnson's, and Woolworth's. By Easter, a special task force invaded St. Augustine, highlighted by the activities of the Peabodys of Massachusetts. The last week of May saw the real invasion under the command of Martin Luther King and his lieutenants. In spite of King's efforts, at no time, I repeat, at no time did the peace of St. Augustine become threatened. At no time did the local police and Sheriff lose control. Law and order were maintained completely. The city further strengthened the hand of its law-enforcement officers by declaring a ban on demonstrations after eight-thirty at night. It was at this point that the Federal Judiciary, in the form of the Federal Court in Jacksonville [under Judge Simpson], turned the demonstrators loose by interdicting the right of the city to impose and enforce the ban-an unbelievable precedent. Concurrently with this, the Governor of the State of Florida intervened operated with the City of St. Augustine by sending in as an auxiliary force a small number of state troopers. Because of the invasion of outsiders of unknown accountability, the citizens of our community, the city officials, the Chief of Police, and Sheriff, appreciated the relief and aid which those troopers provided and were very glad to see them here. But, on June fifteenth, a change

occurred. The Governor suddenly invoked a special emergency police power that had been voted by a special session of the Florida Legislature in 1956. 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

■ Four hundred years ago next September, St. Augustine, the oldest city in America, was founded on the east coast of Florida by Spanish explorers. Time has only beautified this ancient city of eighteen thousand citizens. St. Augustine, with its forty-five miles of wide, sandy beaches and its fascinating store of Spanish antiquity, has long been a vacation playground and a mecca for history-conscious tourists.

Since the founding of the city, white and Negro families have lived side by side in peace and happiness. They live that way today, within one block of the City Hall and in most other parts of the city. For seventy-five years, the Negro citizens have voted in city elections, and civic participation by St. Augustine's four thousand Negroes has been constantly encouraged by such organizations as the local Junior Chamber of Commerce - which has even operated voter-registration campaigns among Negro citizens. Always a leader in municipal responsibility, St. Augustine was | cause Hayling, the dentist, claimed that

one of the first Southern cities to employ Negroes on its police force. This was done thirty years ago, and the in tegrated St. Augustine Police Department has been used as a model for other Southern cities. It might also be noted that the St. Johns County Sheriffs Department—the county force also responsible for the city of St. Augustine—has been integrated now for many

There are no segregation ordinances on the city's books, and, as a result, no public facilities are segregated. The public schools were integrated in the Fall of 1963 without a court order. On the ocean, separate public beaches were used; but not by compulsion of law, by habit and by preference. [Most Negroes used Butler's Beach. In fact, the main section of that beach was donated to the State especially for Negroes by Frank Butler, a leading Negro citizen.]

Some three years ago, a Negro dentist named Dr. R. B. Hayling arrived in this quaint, peaceful community. He came to take over the practice of the late Dr. Rudolph N. Gordon, a highly respected Negro dentist with many more white patients than colored. Then, shortly after his arrival, Hayling surfaced as an extreme and violent racist -demanding racial coordination by the force of government. He soon became the leader of the local NAACP group. In June of 1963, the Mayor of St.

RACIAL SITUATION ST. JOHNS COUNTY

On December 16, 1964, a Negro student, Florida Memorial College, St. Augustine, was interviewed by Agents of the FBI. Peported that on the night of November 20, 1964, he was assaulted by an unknown white man at approximately 10:00 p.m. while standing outside of Mac's Bar, West King Street, St. Augustine, Florida, while waiting to use the public telephone. Stated he was waiting for another Negro who was using the telephone and had no intention nor desire to enter Mac's Bar.

stated that while standing next to one of the parked cars, several unknown white men leaving the bar approached the car and one white man told him, "Nigger, get away from my car" and thereafter punched in the face. The assailant and the other white man got in the car and departed. Afterwards, recorded the license plate of the vehicle used and with college officials reported the assailant to the St. Augustine Police Department. Further stated that his school's attorney has filed a warrant in Justice of the Peace Court, St. Augustine, against a resident of St. Augustine, Florida, who Department. is the registered owner of the vehicle recorded by having been involved in the assault. stated this case is still pending in local courts, St. Augustine.
