

# Transmitting information of the progress whieh has been made in taking the Fifth Census of the Inhabitants of the United States.

I transmit herewith, for the information of Congress, two letlers from the Secretary of State, accompanied by statements from that department, showing the progress which has been made in taking the fifth census of the inhabitants of the United States; and also hy a printed copy of the revision of the statements heretofore transmitted to Congress of all former enumerations of the population of the United States and their Territories.

## Departionent of State,

December 5, 1831.
Sib: Congress, at its session in 1829 and '30, passed an act for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants ol the United States.
With the requirements of that law, this department proceeded early after its passage to comply, and, on the 24th of March following, a circular was addressed to the several marshals of the different districts of the Union, preparatory to the duties which were about to be assigned them.

This circular, on the 15th day of April, 1830, was succeeded by another, containing such instructions as were deemed necessary to enable the mar-
chals to enter on the taking of the census promptly and advisedly, and with it were forwarded all the formula (copies of which accompany this communication) required in conformity with the law alluded to.

The great increase in the number of inhabitants, the extent of country over which they were spread, and the additional duties required by the act, rendered it impracticable in many instances for the marshals to complete their returns by the time directed in the act. To relieve those who had thus from necessity incurred the penalty of the first law, the act of the 3 d of February extended the time for making the returns to the first of August following.

Had this act contained nothing more, it would not have been a difficult matter to have completed by the 1st September last all that was required by the former one. The third section, however, rendered it the duty of the Secretary of State "' to note all the clerical errors in the returns of the marshals and assistants, whether in the aclditions, classifications of the inhabitants, or otherwise, and to cause the said notes, with the aggregate returns of the marshals, to be printed for the use of Congress."

The great labor imposed on this department by this additional clause can scarcely be conceived by one unacquainted with the research necessary, and the difficulties attending such an investigation as a literal compliance with its demands required, and this Department found itself compelled to adopt one of two alternatives: either, after adding, classifying, examining, and correcting every marshal's and assistant marshal's return in the whole Union, to return transcripts of the whole, (bulky as they necessarily wauld be,) accompanied by notes designating the discrepancies and errors, of whatever kind they might be, in the whole returns; or, after investigating the returns of the marshal's themselves, and comparing them with those of the assistants, to make out from them an entirely new and corrected copy, by a comparison of which with the originals, all the errors of every kind contained in the latter might at once readily appear.

This lest course has been adopted, because considered more simple, more expeditioug, less expensive, and more correct. But notwithstanding this simplification of the work, it has proved of such magnitude, that with the employment of double the ordinary number of clerks in the department for: some time, and the application of double force to the press, it has not been possible to accomplish it even at this period.

The whole however is in such progress that it will probably be completed within the month. In the mean time, a manuscript copy, compiled from the original returns of the marshals, with a table showing the aggregate population of the United States as rendered by them, is respectfilly submit led, that you may, should you deem it expedient, transmit the same to Canpress.

In act to provide for taking the fifth census, or enumeration of the inhubitants of the United Slates.
Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the marshals of the several districts of the United States, and of the district of Columbia, and of the territories of Michigan, Arkansas, and of Florida, respectively, shall be, and are hereby required, under the direction of the Secretary of the Department of State, and according to such instructions as he shall give pursuant to this act, to cause the number of the inhabitants within their respective districts and territories, (omitting, in such enumeration, Indians not taxed,) to be taken, according to the directions of this act. The said enumeration shall distinguish the sexes of all free white persons, and ages of the free white males and females, respectively, under five years of age; those of five and under ten years of age; those of ten years and under fifteen; those of fifteen and under twenty; those of twenty and under thirty; those of thirty and under forty; those of forty and under fifty; those of fifty and under sixty; those of sixty and under seventy; those of seventy and under eighty; those of eighty and under ninety; those of ninety and under one hundred; those of one hundred and upwards; and shall further distinguish the number of those free white persons included in such enumeration, who are deaf and dumb, under the age of fourteen years; and those of the age of fourtcen years and under twenty-five; and of the age of twenty-five years and upwards; and shall further distinguish the number of those free white persons included in such enumeration, who are blind. The said enumeration shall distinguish the sexes of all free colored persons, and of all other colored persons bound to service for life, or for a term of ycars, and the ages of such free and other colored persons, respectively, of each sex, under ten years of age; those of ten and under twenty-four; those of twenty-four and under thirty-six; those of thirty-six and under fifty five; those of fifty-five and under one hundred; and those of one hundred and upwards; and shall further distinguish the number of those free colored, and other colored persons, included in the foregoing, who are deaf and dumb, without regard to age, and those who are blind. For effecting which, the marshals aforesaid shall have power, and are hereby required, to appoint one or more assistants in each city and county in their respective districts and territories, residents of such city or county for which they shall be appointed, and shall assign to each of the said assistants a certain division of territory, which division shall not consist, in any case, of more than one county, but may include one or more towns, townships, wards, hundreds, precincts, or parishes, and shall be plainly and distinetly bounded; the said enumeration shall be made by an actual inquiry by such marshals or assistants, at every dwelling-house, or by personal inquiry, of the head of every family. The marshals and their assistants shall, respectively, before entering on the performance of their duty under this act, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation, before some judge or justice of the peace, resident within their respective districts or territories, for the faithful performance of their duties. The oath or affirmation of the marshal shall be as follows: "I, A. B., marshal of the district (or teritory) of
do solemnly swear, (or affirm) that I will truly and faithfally cause to be made; a full and perfect enumeration and description of all persons resident within my district, (or territory, ard return the same to the Secretary of State, agreeably to the directions ci an act of Congress, entitled, ' An act to provide for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the

United States,' according to the best of my ability." The oath or affirnitw tion of an assistant shall be as follows: "I, A. B., appointed an assistant to the marshal of the district, (or territory) of do solemnly swear, (or affirm) that I will make a just, faithful, and perfect enumeration and description of all persons, resident within the division assigned to me for that purpose, by the marshal of the district, (or territory) of and make due return thereof to the said marshal, agreeably to the directions of an act of Congress, entitled ' An act to provide for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the United States, according to the best of my ability, and that I will take the said enumeration and description, by actual inquiry at every dwelling house within said division, or personal inquiry of the head of every family, and not otherwise." The enumeration shall commence on the first day in June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and shall be completed and closed within six calendar months thereafter: the several assistants shall, within the said six months, and on or before the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, deliver to the marsials, by whom they shall be appointed, respectively, two copies of the accurate returns of all persons, except Indians not taxed, to be enumerated, as aforesaid, within their respective divisions; which returns shall be made in a schedule, the furm of which is annexed to this act, and which shall distinguish, in each county, city, town, township, ward, precinct, hundred, district, or parish, according to the civil divisions of the States or territories, respectively, the several families, by the name of their master, mistress, steward, overseer, or other principal persons therein,

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That every assistant, failing or neglecting to make a proper return; or making a false return, of the enumeration, to the marshal, within the time limited by this act, shall forfeit the sum of two hundred dollars, recoverable in the manner pointed out in the next section of this act.
Sec. 3. And be it further enanted, That the marshals shall file one copy of each of the several returns aforesaid, and, also, an attested copy of the aggregate amount hercinafter directed to be transmitted by them respectively, to the Secretary of State, with the clerks of their respective District or Superior Courts, as the ease may be, who are hereby directed to receive, and carefully to preserve, the same; and the marshals, respectively, shall, on or befrire the first day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, transmit to the Secretary of State, one copy of the several returns received from each assistant, and, also, the aggregate amount of each description of persons within their respective districts or territories; and every marshal failing to file the returns of his assistants, or the returns of any of them, with the clerks of the respective courts, as aforesaid, or failing to return one copy of the several returns received from each assistant, and, also, the aggregate amount of each description of persons in their respective districts or territories, as required by this act, and as the same shall appear from said returns, to the Secretary of State, within the time limited by this act, shall, for every such offence, forfeit the sum of one thousand dollars; which forfeiture shall be recoverable in the courts of the districts or territories where the said offences shall be committed, or within the Circuit Courts held within the same, by action of debt, information, or indictment; the one half thereof to the use of the United States, and the other half to the informer; but, where the prosecution shall be first instituted on behalf of the United States, the whole shall accrue to their use; and, for the more effectual discovery of such offences, the Judge of the several District Courts, in the several districts,
and of the Supreme Courts, in the territories of the United States, as aforesaid, at their next session, to be held alter the expiration of the time allowed for making the returns of the enumeration, hereby directed, to the Secretary of State, shall give this act in charge to the grand juries, in their respective courts; and shall cause the returns of the several assistants. and the said attested copy of the aggregate amount, to be laid before them for their inspection. And the respective clerks of the said courts shall, within thirty. days after the said original returns shall have been laid before the grand juries aforesaid, transmit and deliver all such original returns, so filed, to the Department of State.

Sec. 4. And be it further enucted, That every assistant shall receive at the rate of one dollar and twenty five cents for every hundred persons by him returned, where such persuns reside in the country; and, where such persons reside in a city or town, containing more than three thousand persons, such assistant shall receive at the same rate for three thousand, and at the rate of one dullar and twenty five deents fur every three hundred persons over three thousand, residing in such city or town; but where, Irom the dispersed situation of the inhabitants in some divisions, one dollar and twenty five cents will not be sufficient for one hundred persons, the marshals, with the approbation of the judges of their respective districts or territories, may make such further allowance to the assistants, in such divisions, as shall be deemed an adequate compensation: Provided, The same does not exceed one dollar and seventy-five cents for every fifty persons by them returned: Provided, further, That, betore any assistant as aforesaid, shall, in any case, be entitled to receive said compensation, he shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation, belore some judge or justice of the peace, authorized to administer the same, to wit: "I, A. B. do solemnly swear (or affirm) that the number of persons set forth in the return made by me, agreeably to the provisions of the act, entitled ' an act to provide for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the United States,' have been ascertained by an actual inquiry at every dwelling house, or a personal inquiry of the head of every family, in exact conformity with the provisions of said act; and that I have, in every respect, fultilled the duties required of me by said act, to the best of my abilities; and that the return atoresaid is correct and true, according to the best of my knowledge and belief." The compensation of the several marshals shall be as follows:

Sec. 5. And be it further enucted, That every person whose usual place of abode shall be in any family, on the said first day in June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, shall be returned as of such family; and the name of every person who shall be an inhabitant of any district or territory, without a settled place of residence, shall be inserted in the column of the schedule which is allutted fur the heads of families, in the division where he or she shall be, on the said first day in June; and every person occasionally absent at the time of enumeration, as belonging to the place in which he or she usually resides in the United States.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacled, That each and every free person, more than sixteen years of age, whether heads of families or not, belonging to any family within any division, districi or territory, made or established within the United States, shall be, and hereby is, obliged to render to the assistant of the division, if required, a true account, to the best of his or ner knowledge, of every persou belonging to such family, respectively, according to the several descriptions aforesaid, on pain of forfeiting twenty dollars, to be sued for and recovered, in any action of debt, by such assistant; the one hall to his own use, and the other half to the use of the United States.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That each and every assistant, previous to making his return to the marshal, shall cause a correct copy, signed by himseli, of the schedule containing the number of inhabitants within his division, to be set up at two of the most public places within the same, there to remain for the inspection of all coneerned; for each of which copies, the said assistant shall be entitled to receive five dollars: Provided, Prouf of the schedule having been set up, shall be transmitted to the marshal, with the return of the number of persons; and in case any assistant shall fail to make such proof to the marshal, with the return of the number of persons, as aforesaid, he shall forfeit the compensation allowed him by this act.

Suc. 8. Ald be it further enacted, That the Secretary of State shall be, and hereby is, authorized and required to transmit to the marshals of the several districts and territories, reguiations and instructions, pursuant to
this act, for carrying the same into effect; and also, the forms contained therein, of the schedule to be returned, and such other forms as may be necessary in carrying this act into execution, and proper interrogatories, to be alministered by the several persons to be employed in taking the enumeration.
Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That those States composing two districts, and where a part of a county may be in each district, such county shall be considered as belonging to that district in which the courthouse of said county may be situate.
Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That, in all cases where the superficial content of any county, or parish, shall exceed twenty miles square, and the number of inhabitants in said parish or county shall not exceed three thousand, the marshals or assistants shall be allowed, with the approbation of the judges of the respective districts or territories, such further compensation as shall be deemed reasonable: Provided, The same does not exceed four dollars for every fifty persons by them returned; and when any such county or parish shall exceed forty miles square, and the number of iuhabitants in the same shall not exceed three thousand, a like allowance shall be made, not to exceed six dollars for every fifty persous so returned.

Sec. 11. And be it further enacted, That, when the aforesaid enumeration shall be completed, and returned to thre office of the Secretary of State, by the marshals of the States and Territories, he shall direct the printers to Congress to print, for the use of Congress, three thousand copies of the aggregate returns received from the marshals: And provided, That if any marshal, in any district within the United States or territories, shall, directly or indirectly, ask, demand or receive, or contract to receive, of any assistants to be appointed by him under this act, any fee, reward or compensation, for the appointment of such assistant to discharge the duties required of such assistant under this art, or shall retain from such assistant any portion of the compensation allowed to the assistant by this act, the said marshal shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor in office, and shall forfeit and pay the amount of five hundred dollars for each offence, to be recovered by suit or indictment in any Circuit or District Court in the United States, or the Territories thereof, one half to the use of the Government, and the other half to the informer; and all contracts which may be made in violation of this law, shall be void, and all sums of money or property paid, may be recovered back by the party paying the same, in any court having jurisdiction of the same.
$\mathrm{S}_{\mathrm{Ec} .}$ 12. And be it further enacted, That there shall be allowed and paid to the marshals of the several States, Territories, and the District of Columbia, the amount of postage by them respectively paid on letters relating to their duties under this act.
Sec. 13. And be it further enacted, That the President of the United States is hereby authorized to cause to be made a careful revision of the statements heretofore transmitted to Congress, of all former enumerations of tre population of the United States and their Territories, and to cause an abstract of the aggregate amount of population in each State and 'Territory to be printed by the printer to Congress, (designating the number of inhabitants of each description, by counties or parishes,) to the number of two thousand copies, which said copies shall be distributed as Congress shall hereafter direct, and for that purpose, the sum of two thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

The instructions and regulations to be given in pursuance of this act, will be prepared as soon as possible, and transmitted to you, together with blank forms and interrogatories ${ }_{1}$ and a sufficient number of those blanks, for the use of the whole number of deputies in your district. This course is adopted, to produce an uniformity in all the official returns under the act reterred to.

In the mean time, to avoid any unnecessary delay, and as the enumeration is to commence on the first day of June next, you will please make a selection of your assistants as soon as possible, and transmit to this department a list of their names, and of the districts or divisions assigned to tach.
On the perusal of the act, you will see the neccssity of your selecting persons of a'ility and integrity, and possessing the additional qualification of diligent and industrious habits, and particuiarly those competent in accounts.

In order that I may form some estimate of the probable number of hlanks that will be required in your district, be pleased to note on the list of assistants, the probable number of inhabitants in each assistant's division.

I will thank you to acknowledge this circular immediately, and to direct your answer to this, as well as all communications relating to the oensus, as follows:

## T'o the marshal of the United States for the district of

$\mathrm{S}_{\mathrm{Ir}}$ : The "act to provide for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the United States," copies of which are herewith transmitted, prescribes, that this enumeration shall be taken under the direction of the Secretary of State, and according to such instructions as he shall give, pursuant to the act. In obedience to the injunctions therein contained, the following instructions are now transmitted to you.

The means provided hy the Legislature in the act for the attainment of the objects enumerated, are in the appointment of the marshals of the several districts. and of surh assistants as they may select, for the accomplishment of the returns within the period prescribed by law.

The importance of the duties assigned to these officers by the ant is sufficiently indicated by the provisions, that every marshal and every assistant shall. before he enters on the duties required by the act, take an oath or affirmation for the faithful performance of them; and that, after this performanen, every assistant shall take a second oath, or affirmation, that he has faithlully performed these duties in the manner prescribed by the act. Blank forms of these oaths, numbered 1, 2, and 7, are herewith transmitted to you, in numbers sufficient to supply yourself and your assistants, and, for the sake of umiormity, the form of a certificate, to be subscribed by the magistrate who may administer the oath, is subjoined to it. It is directed that you transmit to this department one copy of the certificate that you have yourse'f taken the oath required of the marshal; that you should require of all your assistants to deliver, or transmit to you, the cestificates of their oaths, taken hoth before and after their returns, and that you return them to this department, as they will be vouchers necessary for the settlement of your account. Each set of oaths (or affirmations) to be immediately transmitted to the department on receipt by the marshal.

The duties to be performed by your assistants, under the solemnities of an oath, are such as will require arduous industry, active intelligence, pure integrily, great facility and accuracy of computation, and an intimate knowledge of the division allotted to them respectively. They must, by the letter of the act, be residents of the county or city for which they shall be ap. pointed, and each division may include one or more towns, townships, wards, hundreds, precincts, or parishes, which must be plainly and distinctly bounded; but a division must in no case exceed one county. You will also use all suitable precautions to avoid the assignment of the same portion of the population, to more than one assistant, and the inconvenience that any two of them should interfere with each other.

Your assistants will observe, thai the act expressly requires the enumeration to be made by an actual inquiry at every dwelling house, or by personal inquiry of the head of every family, and not otherwise; and that the oath or affirmation to be taken by them, after the performance of this duty, and before they can receive compensation for the same. declares expressly that they have ascertained the numbers by such actual inquiry.

The act requires that the enumeration shall commence on the first day of June next, and shall close within six calendar months thereafter; and that the said assistants shall, on or before the first day of December, $18: 30$, deliver to the marshals by whom they shall have been appointed, respectively, two copies of the accurate returns of all persons (except Indians not taxed) enumerated as aforesaid, within their respective divisions. From the number of inquiries to be marde at every house, it is obvious that the progress to be made by each assistant will be necessarily slow; and as it is required that the enumeration shall be completed within the time prescribed, you will perceive the necessity of appointing a number of assistants adequate to that result, and each assistant must be enjoined not to lose a day in the performance of his task. And I beg leave to suggest, as advisable, proper precautions to meet the contingency of any of your assistants being disabled by sickness, or otherwise, from accomplishing his duties, and to supply immediately the. places of such as may be vacated by death, or other casualty.

To facilitate the labor of your assistants, a printed list of all the interrogatories for enumeration is enclosed, [No. 3] in which all the questions reler to the day when the enumeration is to commence-the first day of June next. Your assistants will also bear in minu to include all persuns of a family (except Indians not taxed) who were members thereof on the first day of June, 1830, whether present or not, and not to include ary person whose usual abode was not in the famly they are enumerating on the said tirst day of June. They will, of course, include such persons as may have deceased after that day, and will not include in it infants born aiter that diay. This, though not prescribed in express terms by the act, is tite undoubted intention of the Legislature, as manifested by the clause providing that every person shall be recorded as of the family in which he or she shall reside on the first day of June, 1830.
The execution of the fifth section of the act requires the further interrogatories, whether any person, whose usual abode was in the family on the tirst day of June, 1830, be absent therefrom at the time of makug the inquiry; and, if so, the sex, age, color, and conclition, are to be asked, and marked in the proper column, in the return of the family. It follows, of course, that any person who, at the time of taking the enumeration of any famity, has his abode in it, is, nevertheless, not to be included in the return of that family, if his usual place of abode was, on the Jirst day of June, in another family. The name of every person having no settled place of residence is to be inserted in the column of the schedule allutted for the heads of families, in the division where such person shall be on the first day of June, and, of course, also in one of the other colurnns, according to the age and condition of such person.

Your assistants will see, that, by the 6 th section of the act, each and every free persoin, more than suxteen years of age, whether heads of families or not, belonging to any family, within any division, district, or territory, is obliged to render the assistant of the division, if required, a true account, to the best of his or her knowledge, of every person belonging to such family respectively, according to the several descriptions in the schedule, under a penalty of twenty dollars. They should, theretore, read that section to the person of whom they make the inquiry, whenever it may be found necessary.
By the 7th section of the act, every assistant, before making his return to you, is required to cause correct copies, signed by himself, of the schedule containing the number of inhabitants within his division, to be set up at two of the most public places within the same, for the inspection of all concerned; proof of which is to be transmitted to you by each of your assistants, and by you to the department, with the return of the number of persons; upon failure of which the assistant will forfeit the compensation allowed him by the act. A form of a certificate, to be written on the copy of the Schedule No. 4, which is to be transmitted to the department, signed by two respectable witnesses, is enclosed, as a convenient mode of furnishing the prool required by the act.
One copy of the returns of enumeration, when received from all your assistants, is to be filed by you, together with an attested copy of the angregate amount, to be made out by yourself, with the clerk of your District (or Superior) Court, who is directed to receive, and carefully preserve them; and, on or before the first day of February, 1831, you are to transmit to this department one cupy of the several returns received from each assistant, signed by each assistant respectively, and also by two respectable witnesses,
that the same has been posted; and, also, one copy of the aggregate amount of each description of persons witha your disirict: by whela is to be understood, not inerely the general aggregate amouat of your whole district, but also the spectal aggregate of every sub davision of counues, cities, towns, townships, parishes, precincts, hundreds, and districts, and the several warus in the principal caties.

For the purpose of uniformity in the mode of rendering accounts of compensation for taking the census, or enumeration of mbabitants, the following instructions on that point are added:

1. No payments will be made in advance for this object. Payment will be made, lior the whole amount of compensation in each district, to the marshal thereof. The assistants are to be apprised that hey are to apply to the marshal wone for their cumpensathon.
2. As suvu as the marstal has received the returns of all his assistants, he is to make vat an abstract of their compensation, as in the form No. 9 , adding, at loot, the amount of his own compensation, as lixed by the act of 23 d March, 1800.
3. If any of the assistants are allowed more than at the rate of one-dollar and twenty tive cents for every hundred persons enumerated, there must be annexed, to tine absiract of the account, the certilicate of the District or Territurial Judge of the United States, approving such additional allowance.
4. The account of compensation is to be transmitted to this department at the same time with the returns of the census.
5. The act provides for the payment to the marshals of the amount of postage by them respectively paid on letters relating to their duties under this act. The charges under this head must be accompanied with the receipt of the postmaster to whom such postage has been paid.

Should any dificulty or obstacle occur to any of your assistants in performing the duty assigned to him, it is directed that he give you immediate notice thereof, that you may take measures for removing it, if within your power. Should any such occur to yourself, you are requested to make immediate communication of it to me. $\Lambda$ number, believed to be sufficient, of the copies of the act, of these instructions, and of the forms referred to in them, (with the exception of Nos. 4, 8, and 9,) is herewith transmitted for the supply of yourself and assistants. Should more be required, you will receive them on giving notice to this department.

The forms Nos. 4 and 5 , in sufficient numbers for the enumeration of the whole of your district, and also a copy of No. 9, will be forwarded by subsequent mails, as soon as they are prepared. You are requested to acknowledge this package immediately on receipt.

each assistant; and the number of the forms of the schedule for that object, that the department intend to furnish the marshals, for the use of their assistants, it is deemed proper to give the following information and instruction.

The act to provide for taking the difth census (by the ist Sec.) requires that "the several assistants shall, within the said six months, and on or before the first day of Decumber, 1830, deliver to the marshals, by whom they shall be appointed, respectively, two copies of the acrurate returns," \&c.

And the 7th section provides, "that cach and every assistant previous to making his return to the marshal, shall cause a correct copy, signed by himself, of the schedule containing the number of inhaintants within his division, to be set up at two of the most public places within the same, there to remain for the inspection of all concerned.'

It is therefore conclusive that each assistant is required to make four sopies of the schedule (blank No. 4 of this department relating to the census.)

The sth section of the act requires the Serretary of State to transmit to the marshals "the forms contained therein of the schedule to be returned," \&c.

In compliance with the section last reitred to, it is the intention of the department to furnish the marshals, with "the form of the schedule," (blank No. 4 as above noted) for the several copies required by the act; that is, fous* copies.

There has been alrearly transmitted to yon, what is deemed more than a sufficient number of these forms. for one copy of the return of the enumeration of your district;-and a sufficient number of forms for the remaining copies will be forwarded as carly as possible.

Should the copy used by an assistant in taking the enumeration, be too much injured or defaced for any of the foregoing purposes, an additional number will be supplied on your giving notice thereof.

The form referred to has been compiled in such a manner as to leave the least room for error in taking the enumeration, and it is therefore enjoined on the marshals to have the blanks used in the enumeration that have been issued by the department, and no others.

As the department intends furnishing the marshals with all the requisite forms, for the several purposes of the census, it is deemed proper further to inform $y$ ou, that no charge for stationery, or other incidental expenses can he allowed, (with the exception of postage as provided by the act.)

An act to amend the act for taking the Fifth Census.
[Sec. 1.] Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Ropresentatives of the linited States of America in Congress assembled, That it shall and may be lawful for such of the assistants to the marshals in the raspective States and Territories, who have not, before the passage of this act, made their respective returns to such marshals, under the act hereby amended, to complete their enumerations, and make their returns under the said act, at any time before the first day of June: and for the marshals of such States and Territories to make their returns to the Secretary of State at any time before the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-
one: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be deemed to release such marshals and assistants from the penalties contained in the act aforesaid, unless their returns shall be made within the time prescribed in this act: And, provided further, That no persons be included in the returns made under the present act, unless such persons shall have been inhabitants of the districts for which such returns shall be made on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty.
SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the copies of returns and aggregate amounts directed to be filed by the marshals with the clerks of the several district courts, and supreme courts of the Territories of the United States, shall be preserved by said clerks, and remain in their offices respectively; and so much of the act to which this is an amendment, as requires that they shall be transmitted by said clerks to the Department of State, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to note all the clerical errors in the returns of the marshals and assistants, whether in the additions, classification of inhabitants, or, otherwise, and cause said notes to be printed with the aggregate returns of the marshals, for the use of Congress
