Important Proclamation by Gen. Fremont.

General Fremont has issued the following proclamation, placing Missouri under martial law and applying the Confiscation Act to the emancipation of the slaves of robels :

HEADQUALTERS OF THE WESTERN DEPARTMENT,

Br. Louis, August 31, 1661. Circumstances, in my judgment of sufficient urgency, render it necessary that the commanding General of this department should assume the administrative powers of the state. Its disanound assume the administrative powers of the state. Its dis-organized condition, the helplessness of the civil authority, the total insecurity of like, and the devastation of property by bands of murderers and marauders, who infest nearly every county in the state, and avail themselves of the public misfortunes and the violation of a bould force a cartifu the state, and avail themeelves of the public misfortunes and the vicinity of a hostile force to gratify private and neighbor-hood vengeance, and who find an enemy wherever they find plunder, finally demand the severest measures to repress the daily increasing crimes and outrages which are driving off the inhabitants and ruining the state. In this condition the public safety and the success of our arms require unity of purpose, without let or hindrance to the prompt administration of affairs.

without let or hindrance to the prompt administration of affairs. In order, therefore, to suppress disorders, to maintain, as far as now presticable, the public peace, and to give security and protection to the persons and property of loyal clitzens, I do hereby extend and declare established martial law throughout the state of Missouri. The lines of the army of occupation in this state are for the present declared to extend from Leaven-worth, by way of the posts of Jefferson Clity, Rolla, and Ironton, to Cape Girardeau, on the Mississippi River. All persons who shall be taken with arms in their hands

who shall be taken with arms in their hands persons within these lines shall be tried by court-martial, and, if found guilty, will be shot. The property, real and personal, of all persons in the state of Missouri who shall take up arms against the United States, or who shall be directly proven to have taken active part with their enemies in the field, is declared to be confircated to the public use, and their slaves, if any they have, are hereby declared free men.

hereby declared free men. All persons who shall be proven to have destroyed, after the publication of this order, railread tracks, bridges, or telegraphs, shall suffer the extreme penalty of the law. All persons engaged in breasonable correspondence, in giving or procuring aid to the enemies of the United States, in disturb-ing the public tranquillity by creating or circulating false reports or incendiary documents, are, in their own interest, warned that they are exposing themselves.
