

Dear Ms. McKechnie:

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message concerning the Kennedy-Hawkins Civil Rights Act of 1990, legislation the President deeply regrets that he could not sign.

Equality of opportunity is a fundamental value Americans hold dear, and President Bush believes that every citizen is entitled to fair treatment -- a fair chance. As the President has said, "Discrimination, whether on the basis of race, national origin, sex, religion, or disability is worse than wrong. It is a fundamental evil that tears at the fabric of our society, and one that we should and must oppose."

Kennedy-Hawkins did contain provisions that the President strongly endorsed. There were, however, fatal flaws in the bill. Despite the use of the term "civil rights" in its title, that bill actually employed a maze of highly legalistic language that would have introduced the destructive force of quotas into our Nation's employment system. Kennedy-Hawkins contained several other unacceptable provisions, including some that would have insulated illegal quota schemes from legal challenge by those individuals they impact, and others that would have created inappropriate incentives for costly litigation.

A central goal, and indeed, a promise of the Bush Administration has been equal opportunity and equal protection under the law. When legislation, however well-intentioned, has the impact of leading employers to adopt hiring and promotion quotas, equal opportunity is not advanced, rather it is thwarted.

President Bush is committed to ensuring that all American workers will be judged on their skills and their work, not on the color of their skin or their gender. That very commitment to equality, fairness, and justice is the reason that he was compelled to veto the bill approved by the Congress, since any bill that results in quotas is contrary to those very principles. To demonstrate his commitment to the stated purposes of Kennedy-Hawkins, the President sent to Congress a sound civil rights bill, containing all of the main provisions in Kennedy-Hawkins, but which accomplished its goal of lessening employment discrimination without resort to hiring quotas. Unfortunately, the Congress adjourned without acting on the President's bill. I sincerely appreciate your bringing your concerns to the attention of the Administration.



I am writing on behalf of the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) regarding the Civil Rights Act of 1990. As you may be aware, we are the nation's largest Hispanic civil rights law firm. We have filed major civil rights lawsuits in the areas of school desegregation, political access, immigration, and employment discrimination. All of these areas are important to the members of our community, but the elimination of discrimination in the workplace is essential to the advancement of equal opportunity in the economic sector. The bill which is about to come before you, the Civil Rights Act of 1990, will ensure that victims of employment discrimination have access to the courts to redress the discrimination they experience in the workplace.

The essential purpose of the Civil Rights Act of 1990 is to reverse a series of 1989 Supreme Court decisions which make it exceedingly difficult for Hispanics, blacks and women to prove job discrimination. The bill addresses several issues, including mixed motive discrimination, challenges to consent decrees, attorneys fees, damages and the appropriate burden of proof in employment discrimination cases. Most of your criticism, and the basis of your publicly announced decision to veto the legislation, has been focused on the burden of proof provisions.

Although these provisions merely restore the burden of proof standards used by the federal courts prior to the 1989 Supreme Court decision in <u>Wards Cove</u>, the leadership of the Justice Department has sought to characterize the Civil Rights Act of 1990 as a quota bill. According to these officials, the burden of proof standards in the bill are so difficult to meet that employers will be required to resort to the adoption of quotas in order to avoid discrimination lawsuits. For a number of reasons, this

characterization of the Civil Rights Act as a quota bill is a severe distortion presumably intended to mislead you and members of Congress to oppose the bill.

First, under the current terms of the Civil Rights Act of 1990 the burden an employer must meet if a plaintiff makes out a prima

facie case of disparate impact discrimination is not difficult. The bill states that job practices which have a discriminatory impact will have to be defended as being "significantly related to

successful job performance." Common sense dictates that an employer should be able to justify his employment practices as indeed measuring successful job performance. Many other practices and actions, including plant closings, bankruptcies and rules relating to the use of methadone, alcohol and tobacco are subject only to a test of bearing a "significant relationship to a manifest business objective." Thus the requirements of the bill can hardly be characterized as unduly burdensome or difficult to meet.

Second, despite repeated statements that the Civil Rights Act of 1990 will force employers to adopt quota systems, neither you nor your administration has ever substantiated this allegation. To the contrary, during the course of extensive hearings on the bill, none of the opponents of the legislation was able to produce a single witness who allegedly adopted quotas as a result of the burden of proof standard used prior to the <u>Wards Cove</u> decision. This bill merely returns the law to the standard which successfully dictated employment law decisions in the federal courts for nearly two decades.

Finally, in an attempt to address concerns surrounding the quota issue, the conferees inserted language which specifically states that nothing in the amendments "shall be construed to require or encourage an employer to adopt hiring or promotion quotas...". Thus, any fears that this is a quota bill can be put to rest.

Before you lies a piece of legislation which a large and bipartisan majority of the Congress supports. If you listen to the voices in your administration which have mischaracterized this legislation as a quota bill and decide to veto it, the nation will not remember you as one who supported civil rights in some areas, but rather as one who did not support civil rights at all. It is important to consider that an overwhelming majority of the voting population in the United States consists of people who are at risk of employment discrimination on the basis of race, sex or national origin. It is to these voters that you, your administration, and your party must answer.



As chief legal officer of the State of New York, and as the chair of the civil rights committee of the National Association of Attorneys General, I write to urge that you approve the Civil Rights Acts of 1990 in the version passed by the Congress this week. Enactment of the Civil Rights Act of 1990 will signal that the federal government remains committed to principles of fairness and equality, and will preserve citizen confidence that our system of laws permits meaningful redress from invidious discrimination in all of its forms.

It has been only a quarter of a century since the Civil Rights Act of 1964 became the law of the land. For most of those years, vigorous executive branch and private enforcement of antidiscrimination laws and the judiciary's fealty to Congress' purposes in passing them combined to change our social landscape in ways few dreamed possible twenty-five years ago. Despite the great strides we have made, however, we are far from achieving our national goal of erasing the scourge of bigotry. I, like many of my colleagues, was therefore dismayed last year by the Supreme Court's stunning retreat from the national commitment to

eradicating employment discrimination. The Court's decisions not only turned the law in the wrong direction; they threaten to extinguish trust in the legal system, built on decades of slow but certain progress, as a means to overcome the reign of Jim Crow in our social and political institutions.

For those and other reasons, in July 1990 the National Association of Attorneys General adopted a resolution, a copy of which is attached, supporting enactment of the then-pending version of the Civil Rights Act of 1990. The compromise bill which eventually emerged from Congress merits your approval. It would create meaningful federal protection against on-the-job racial or sexual harassment; it would ensure that there is a federal remedy whenever intentional discrimination plays a role in hiring or promotion decisions; it would provide victims of discrimination adequate time to seek redress for discriminatory practices by removing procedural barriers that presently exist; and it would encourage voluntary resolution of disputes by eliminating impediments to settlements now found in the law.

More important, the Civil Rights Act of 1990 would restore the rule announced in <u>Griggs v. Duke Power Co.</u> and its progeny, which existed prior to <u>Wards Cove Packing Co. v. Atonio</u>. Under that rule, an employer must show that an employment practice that disproportionately deprives classes of persons of job opportunities because of their race, gender, national origin or religion is essential to effective job performance. For twenty years, that rule proved to be workable. It was responsible for opening a wide array of jobs in the public and private sector to minorities and women, and served as the catalyst that led employers to develop employee selection devices that best identify those truly capable of performing the job.

The <u>Wards Cove</u> case, which, in effect, overruled <u>Griggs</u>, thwarts that progress by requiring that persons challenging a discriminatory practice prove that it is not necessary to the employer's business. Relieving an employer of the obligation to justify its discriminatory policies is unfair and counterproductive. Furthermore, the criticism that restoring the <u>Griggs</u> rule will cause employers to adopt "quotas" simply cannot be supported, as nearly twenty years of experience with the rule proved.

Provisions of the bill that authorize the recovery of damages, including a substantially weakened provision authorizing punitive damages for intentional discrimination, also deserve approval. Damages awards compensate serious injury, and provide an effective deterrent to racial discrimination and numerous other forms of unlawful conduct. I see no justification for insulating employers who discriminate against women from awards of compensatory damages. Nor does it serve the Nation's interest to protect those who intentionally violate the law from the remedies that would most effectively discourage their conduct. The provision for awarding punitive damages is not open-ended; it is capped at \$150,000.00 or the sum of the compensatory damages and the equitable monetary award, whichever is greater. It is further limited by the exclusion of punitive damage awards in "mixed motive" cases, thereby assuring that punitive damages may be awarded for clear intentional discrimination only.


Last year's Supreme Court employment discrimination decisions sent the chilling message that our country is no longer committed to combatting the evils of discrimination. Congress has now moved to signal anew that the eradication of discrimination remains a national goal of the highest priority. A veto of this important legislation would set an unfortunate tone of tolerance for bigotry, and could lead to unnecessary strife. I therefore urge you to sign the Civil Rights Act of 1990 into law so that we can continue our fight for fundamental fairness and equality for all our citizens.

WHEREAS, as Attorneys General, we oppose discrimination based on race, color, religion, national origin, and sex and favor civil rights laws to protect against discrimination:



On behalf of the Black Republicans Civil-Rights Task-Force, an organization dedicated to keep the general public aware of the historical leadership role of the Republican Party in civil rights, I write to strongly urge that you support the Civil Rights Bill of 1990, which has been passed by the Congress. This clearly is an open invitation for the enemy to exploit through propaganda techniques.

Mr. President, you personally, through your constructive sense of purpose, your appeal to the Thousand Points of Light has earned the approval of all Americans. Black Americans, for the first time in the history, are giving you, a Republican, the same approval rating as are other Americans.

As Black Republicans we know that it was a Republican led Supreme Court which launched the modern day civil rights movement, and a Republican, President Eisenhower, who enforced its implementation. Therefore, we welcome your politics of inclusiveness which has gained favor with all Americans.

To veto this Civil Rights Bill would be a setback for your constructive leadership in the eyes of many Americans and would be disastrous with Black Americans.

Black Americans understand that quotas are restrictive and therefore would be the first to resist any such mandate. The Civil Rights Bill of 1990 holds no restrictive threats but rather is a safeguard against discrimination. Again, Mr. President we urge you to sign this Bill. To do otherwise would send the wrong signal to the Nation and the world and particularly to the Third World.

The American Consulting Engineers Council strongly urges <u>you to veto</u> S. 2104, entitled the Civil Rights Act of 1990. We do not believe the Congress has addressed your objections and concerns about the proposed law. Neither have they responded to our 5,000 member firms' concerns about the lack of reasonable standards for fair employment practices and the vastly increased liability from lawsuits that the bill promises.

We strongly support increased opportunity for minorities and women to become engineers. There is a growing shortage of trained technical employees and we recognize our future workforce must be drawn from these under-represented groups in our profession. But increased opportunities in our firms will only occur from improved math and science education programs, which we are actively supporting. It will not occur through legislation such as S. 2104.

We support a meaningful civil rights law which truly extends the justice of job opportunities. But a bill which threatens the jobs and the firms which provide them with bankruptcy through protracted and expensive lawsuits benefits no one except the trial lawyers.

We believe that the only course available is the exercise of your veto authority, therefore we urge you to veto S. 2104.

The members of the American Road and Transportation Builders Association (ARTBA) urge you to veto the *Civil Rights Act of 1990*. The *Civil Rights Act of 1990* would force employers to hire based on quotas and place undue burdens on employers.

ARTBA and its 4,000 members believe in equal employment wherein every person is hired according to qualifications and promoted based on performance. We also believe that every applicant deserves equal treatment when interviewing for a job. ARTBA realizes that employers must make every effort to employ minorities and women when possible. However, we do not believe an employer should be required to hire people for jobs they are not qualified to fill, nor should an employer be required to fill an arbitrary quota.

The *Civil Rights Act of 1990* places the burden of proof on employers instead of the plantiffs in employment discrimination cases and would expand Title VII of the Civil Rights Act to include punitive and compensatory damages. This provision would eliminate an incentive for quick resolution of disputes (a primary goal of our current civil rights laws) and cause lengthy, expensive and often unnecessary litigation.

ARTBA hopes you will veto final passage of the *Civil Rights Act of 1990*. Do not place employers in a position that makes them less competitive by requiring them to hire someone not qualified in order to fill an arbitrary goal or quota.



Dear Ms. Collins:

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your message concerning the Kennedy-Hawkins Civil Rights Act of 1990, legislation the President deeply regrets that he could not sign.

Equality of opportunity is a fundamental value Americans hold dear, and President Bush believes that every citizen is entitled to fair treatment -- a fair chance. As the President has said, "Discrimination, whether on the basis of race, national origin, sex, religion, or disability is worse than wrong. It is a fundamental evil that tears at the fabric of our society, and one that we should and must oppose."

Kennedy-Hawkins did contain provisions that the President strongly endorsed. There were, however, fatal flaws in the bill. Despite the use of the term "civil rights" in its title, that bill actually employed a maze of highly legalistic language that would have introduced the destructive force of quotas into our Nation's employment system. Kennedy-Hawkins contained several other unacceptable provisions, including some that would have insulated illegal quota schemes from legal challenge by those individuals they impact, and others that would have created inappropriate incentives for costly litigation.


A central goal, and indeed, a promise of the Bush Administration has been equal opportunity and equal protection under the law. When legislation, however well-intentioned, has the impact of leading employers to adopt hiring and promotion quotas, equal opportunity is not advanced, rather it is thwarted.

President Bush is committed to ensuring that all American workers will be judged on their skills and their work, not on the color of their skin or their gender. That very commitment to equality, fairness, and justice is the reason that he was compelled to veto the bill approved by the Congress, since any bill that results in quotas is contrary to those very principles. To demonstrate his commitment to the stated purposes of Kennedy-Hawkins, the President sent to Congress a sound civil rights bill, containing all of the main provisions in Kennedy-Hawkins, but which accomplished its goal of lessening employment discrimination without resort to hiring quotas. Unfortunately, the Congress adjourned without acting on the President's bill. I sincerely appreciate your bringing your concerns to the attention of the Administration.



Your October 20th editorial regarding the Civil Rights Act of 1990 maintains, as a premise, that the proposal "...would restore the law as is stood for 18 years.... " This assertion is factually incorrect for several reasons.

1. CRA 1990 permits plaintiffs, for the first time in 18 years, to establish a discrimination claim without ever proving what practice specifically caused the disparity. Instead, employers will have the burden of demonstrating why employment criteria do not have a disparate impact on a protected class. Rather than facing the impossible task of trying to prove a negative, many employers will resort to quotas to avoid protracted litigation even though the bill does not require the adoption of a quota system. The fact that employers have not had to do this to date is because the law today is fundamentally different from CRA 1990. This somewhat subtle distinction must be understood before the implications of CRA 1990 are fully appreciated.

Never before have employees been able to recover punitive damages (as opposed to backpay and reinstatement) for a claim of Title VII discrimination. CRA 1990 will offer this remedy, thereby encouraging a flood of litigation. Some predict that CRA 1990 will triple the number of litigations filed each year. In 1989, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission received approximately 70,000 charges of discrimination. If that number approached 200,000 per year, the delay in resolving these matters would become intolerable for all litigants, including the employee-plaintiffs.

3. Litigation, instead of prompt resolution of disputes, also would be encouraged by CRA 1990 since it changes the statute of limitations for filing claims from 180 days to 2 years.

4. These remedy changes immediately would apply to the newly enacted Americans With Disabilities Act. Furthermore, one should anticipate a movement to amend all other federal and state discrimination statutes to provide for these new remedies. The result would be the transformation of the workplace into a battleground between lawyers rather than a cooperative venture between employers and employees.


You may believe all these implications which flow from CRA 1990 are "sensible." But they are neither "modest" nor the restoration of existing law. Regrettably, your editorial only inflames the emotional debate rather than providing your readers with the facts necessary to form an intelligent decision about the most far-reaching change to our employment laws in at least a quarter century.

Mr. Bush's Loaded Label for Fairness

Once again the Senate and House have passed, by strong majorities, a compromise Civil Rights Act of 1990. An earlier version was modified, mainly through Republican efforts, in an attempt to appease the Bush Administration, which persists in calling the measure a "quota bill." Yet President Bush, still in the grip of that loaded label, talks of a veto.

This legislation would restore the law as it stood for 18 years, how can that be a bill that creates some invidious new quotas? It can't, unless the law being restored was a quota law. But that law merely required employers to justify job practices that disproportionately screen out qualified minority members and women, a requirement the Supreme Court scrapped last year.

The Administration argues that employers, rather than defend those practices and risk civil liability in court, will resort to quotas. But in hours of floor debate no opponent cited a single instance of a quota being forced on employers in that manner in the 18 years under the old law.

Perhaps the best evidence that this is not a

quota bill is that Senator Orrin Hatch, a fervent opponent of quotas, recommended it to the White House. Only because the Administration remained adamant did he later speak against the bill.

At the height of negotiations this summer, John Sununu, the White House chief of staff, seriously suggested that good customer relations might justify discriminatory hiring practices. As an argument, customer preference is so discredited that the Supreme Court has never been required to address it. It would permit, for example, the hiring of only single, pretty women as flight attendants, or setting limits on black employees in places unfriendly to blacks. *That* principle would have created real quotas, of a sort long repudiated in law.

President Bush may choose to offend black Americans. He may reject the counsel of centrist Republicans and pander to his party's right wing. He may decide it's politically expedient to cater to business lobbyists claiming imagined injury. But he may not escape the harsh judgment of reasonable people by calling this modest, sensible law a "quota bill." That simply isn't so.







I rarely make personal appeals to the White House regarding legislation before the Congress. However, the Civil Rights Act of 1990 is of such importance that it warrants my every effort to secure its passage.

The need for a new Civil Rights Act is real and undisputed. The Supreme Court's narrow reading of existing civil rights legislation has already produced cases in which workers are racially and sexually harassed with virtual impunity. Further discriminatory abuses can only be prevented by enacting the Civil Rights Act, which clarifies the commitment of the U.S. to equal opportunity in the workplace. The Congress has made countless revisions in an attempt to overcome White House reservations about the legislation. A threatened Presidential veto is the only obstacle to passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1990.

A Presidential veto of this legislation would be a colossal disappointment to minorities across the nation. The nation's deteriorating racial climate demands that we as national leaders advance, rather than retreat from, the cause of equal opportunity and freedom from discrimination in the workplace. Without the Civil Rights Act, minorities will have no assurance of fairness in the hiring process and promotions or of freedom from harassment and discrimination. A Presidential veto of the Civil Rights Act of 1990 would be an affront to the many who placed their lives on the line for the cause of equal justice under the law.







Dear Mr. Miller:

On behalf of President Bush, thank you for your letter regarding the President's "open door" policy and the invitation of certain individuals into the White House. As the President's liaison to the conservative and religious communities, I appreciate the opportunity to discuss this issue with you.

I can assure you that no "special status" has been given to the homosexual community. In fact, while the President continues to meet with religious and pro-family leaders on a regular basis, that community has been invited in only once, and this for a bill signing ceremony.

Representatives were invited last April to the signing ceremony of H.R. 1048, the Hate Crimes Statistics Act, for two reasons: 1) they were involved in the drafting and passage of the legislation in the Congress; and 2) they were part of a broad coalition of minority and handicapped advocacy organizations that attended as one group. Their invitation into the White House does <u>not</u> mean that the President condones their lifestyles or policies.

Please know the President's commitment to traditional family values has not wavered one bit. For example, on November 29th the President signed into law S. 3266, the Crime Control Act of 1990. With its passage, the Administration won significant toughening of federal laws relating to child pornography and obscenity. Most important was the addition of a provision that prohibits the mere possession of child pornography, providing for punishment of up to five years imprisonment and a fine of up to \$250,000. Until this bill, there was no comparable federal law.

I appreciate your taking the time to write the President, and hope you will let me know how I can be of further assistance.

New Civil Rights Act woul favor merits, not 'quotas'

By PAUL BURSTEIN

As Congress debates, and President Bush threatens to veto, the proposed Civil Rights particular jobs, the employer could be c Act of 1990, one concern preoccupies the act's critics more than any other: the claim that it would require employers to adopt quotas so they could not be accused of having "too few" minorities or women.

This is nonsense. Not only should the act not lead employers to weaken merit selection by adopting quotas, it should actually strengthen merit systems and increase business efficiency as well as fairness to minorities, women, and white men.

The part of the proposed act most commentators object to would overturn last year's Supreme Court decision in Wards Cove Packing Co. vs. Atonio, and reestablish the equal employment opportunity doctrine set down by the Supreme Court in the 1971 case, Griggs vs. Duke Power Co.

The Griggs decision, it is widely claimed, virtually makes statistical imbalance in an employer's work force into proof of discrimination. If employers have fewer minorities or women than the community's labor force, employers are allegedly forced to adopt quotas in order to avoid being sued, drastically reducing the role of merit in the employment process.

This is an amazing claim. The Griggs decision was written by Chief Justice Warren Burger, a conservative Nixon appointee, and was supported by conservative and liberal justices without one dissenting vote. The Supreme Court has never been a bastion of wild-eyed radicals, and it neither supported quotas nor challenged the merit principle in the Griggs case.

What it said was that two questions often must be asked when employers are accused of discrimination. First, if there is a substantial pool of seemingly qualified minorities or women for employers to draw on, do we have the right to be concerned when the employer hires few or none? The court decided that in a society in which employers once publicly proclaimed their "whites only" and "men only" employment policies, there was reason to be suspicious when an employer's work force, or its better jobs, had relatively few minorities or women. Second, if an employer hires or promotes few minorities or women, should we simply take the employer's word that its employment practices are based on merit, not prejudice? Or, in a society in which many people simply assumed that minorities and women were unqualified for many jobs, should the employer have to show its practices are real-

ly oriented to selecting the most capa people? The court decided that if there v suspiciously few minorities or women gated to show that merit, not prejudice, the reason.

Quotas? The court did not establish c tas in the Griggs decision, and even a most "liberal" only imposed quotas employers who discriminated flagrantly continuously (in response to Alaban refusal to hire and promote black state tro ers, for example).

Those who claim the new Civil Rij Act would lead to quotas are really say that employers might feel obligated to ac quotas, not because the law would req them to, but because they could not sl that their seemingly exclusionary emp ment practices were based on merit they had, in the words of the latest co promise language, a "substantial demonstrable relationship to effective performance."

Critics of the new Civil Rights Act ar in essence, that Congress should reject proposed act because American emplo are either not making decisions on the b of merit, or are so incompetent that e when they think they are relying on m they could not convince pro-busin Reagan- and Bush-appointed judges they are.

Business opposition to the new (Rights Act is less concerted than it might because many employers realize this examination actually had a positive ef leading to improved testing and train programs, better systems for evalua employees and, ultimately, hig productivity.

By overturning the Wards Cove deci and reinstituting the doctrine the Supr Court adopted in the Griggs decision. new Civil Rights Act could not only incr opportunities for minorities and wome could lead to continuing improvemen personnel practices, which would incr taimess for all employees and improv efficiency of American business.

Rights act dies at hands of Bush

□ Stinging criticism follows the veto, which the bill's backers fear could bring back hiring discrimination

LA Times-Washington Post Service WASHINGTON — President Bush vetoed on Monday the Civil Rights Act of 1990, prompting the sharpest criticism he has endured since he was elected from women, unions, blacks and other minorities.

In a three-page veto message to Congress, Bush said that "despite the use of the term 'civil rights,' " the legislation "actually employs a maze of highly legalistic language to introduce the destructive force of quotas" in the workplace.

The dispute has centered largely on the defenses available in the legislation to employers sued for socalled "unintentional" discrimination. The White House has charged that the provisions in the bill were so burdensome to employers that they would create "powerful incentives" for employers to "adopt hiring and promotion quotas" to avoid lawsuits, as the president said Monday in his veto message.

Proponents of the bill contend that it essentially would have restored the laws fighting employment discrimination that had been in force for nearly two decades, before six 1989 Supreme Court rulings that made it more difficult for minorities and women to win discrimination suits. They strongly dispute the contention that the new law would result in quotas. Bush said equal opportunity is "thwarted," not served by quotas, and "the very commitment to justice and civil rights groups agreed they lacked the two-thirds needed to achieve an equality that is offered as the reason why this bill should be signed requires me to veto it.' I am writing to express to you how deeply outraged and concerned I am at your recent decision to veto the "Civil Rights Act of 1990". The Civil Rights Act was an opportunity to redres teh backsliding that had occurred during the eighties on issues of civil rights. It appears that your decision was based on misinformation, lack of sensitivity and awareness, and white male privilege. Your decision and action was not only harmful to the country, but ultimately, harmful to your administration as well.

White people (and particularly white men) have, for centuries, been attempting to clarify for People of Color exactly what racism is and what racism looks like. Furthermore, we (whites) have come up with a variety of solutions to ending racism. Tragically, we have regularly argued with People of Color about what racism "really" is; and come up with "solutions" which are frequently contrary to what is truly needed to confront and eliminate racism. Your recent decision to veto the Civil Rights Act of 1990 is but one more example of this pattern of behavior. It is important for us, as white folks, to listen to people of color when they label racism. Further, we are absolutely compelled to respect the identified needs and expressed concerns of people of color. Your action was not only indicative of your not truly listening to what the organizers were saying, but was ultimately a sign of disrespect.

It is certainly true, that it is up to us, as whites, to confront and eliminate racism--after all, it is us to created racism, and it is us who perpetrate racism. However, to attempt to confront and eliminate racism without listening to people of color and holding ourselve saccoutable to people of color for our actions; and to further act in direct contradiction to what people of color are arguing for (as you did in vetoing the Civil Rights Legislation) is nothing more than yet another, albeit subtle, expression of oppressive racism.

Part of the dynamics that gets established when we as whites don't listen or respect the identified needs and soltutions created by people of color is that we definie ourselves, white men, as more of an "expert" on racism and on how to deal with racism than are the people of color who are the victims of that racism. Clearly this is absurd. What I'd like to point out to you, is that that pattern, in and of itself, is yet another expression of racism.

When white folks set themself up in a position of authority and power over people of color, as we do when we attempt to "help" people of color, or when we attempt to define or re-define what racism "really" is or isn't, we are acting as agents of oppression. Regardless of our personal views, when we act in roles that are established as a one-up-man-ship position over oppressed people, that action is in and of itself, oppressive. To confront racism, and create solutions, we need to listen to oppressed people, and respect their wishes.

I ask that you make the public commitment to respect the needs of people of color and work effectively to eliminate racism. Further, I ask that you make the commitment now and publicly to support the Civil Rights Act of 1991 when it is drafted, and let the true experts of racism--those who are directly effected, victimized, and killed by it--define what racism is, as well as what the solution are.

Dear President Bush,

On behalf of the 10,000 members of Pax Christi USA, the national Catholic peace movement, I would like to express my dismay at your veto of the civil rights legislation passed by the Senate. This badly needed bill would have guaranteed the rights of men and women of all ages, race and religion from job discrimination. It would have restored civil rights protection that was removed by the Supreme Court.

Especially disturbing is your use of the issue of quotas which has the effect of casting this issue as a black verses white conflict. There is nothing in this bill that would require companies to establish hiring quotas. By raising this issue you inflame already simmering racial discord around the country. By using the false issue of quotas you have choosen to lead this country down the road to racial confrontation instead of racial harmony.
