Mr. ARNELL, from the Committee on Education and Labor, reported the following bill :



Amendatory of an act establishing the Office of Education, discontinuing the Freedmen's Bureau, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
That the Office of Education in the Department of the
Interior shall hereafter be named the Bureau of Education
in the Department of the Interior.

1 SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That all laws and 2 parts of laws prescribing duties for the officers of the Bureau 3 of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands, so far as the 4 said duties have not yet been fully executed, be, and the 5 same are hereby, repealed; and all funds now in the treasury 6 of the United States, placed to the account of the Commis-7 sioner of said bureau for the education and support of 8 refugees and freedmen, be, and the same are hereby, trans 9 ferred to the account of the Bureau of Education, and that 10 the said funds be expended exclusively for educational pur-11 poses, having special reference to aiding in the establishment 12 and usefulness of common schools among freedmen and 13 refugees.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That the Bureau of 1 Education is hereby authorized to exercise the same powers $\mathbf{2}$ 3 as those hitherto exercised by the Freedmen's Bureau in its educational division, and especially in co-operating with be-4 nevolent societies, or bodies incorporated for educational pur- $\mathbf{5}$ 6 poses; and the same co-operation may be extended to State and municipal authorities for similar purposes, under such 7rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the President 8 9 of the United States.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That all buildings re-1 paired or constructed, in whole or in part, under the direction $\mathbf{2}$ of the Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, and now 3 held by municipal or State authorities, societies, corporate 4 bodies, or trustees, for educational purposes, or funds arising 5from their rental or sale, shall be forever applied to and used 6 for such purpose. And said bodies and institutions shall make 7 an annual report to the Commissioner of the Bureau of Edu-8 cation, exhibiting the number of teachers and pupils during 9 the year, and such other facts as the said Commissioner may, 10 from time to time, require. 11

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That the collection 1 and payment of bounties, arrears of pay, prize money, and $\mathbf{2}$ 3 other moneys due to colored soldiers, sailors, and marines. 4 and their heirs, shall be conducted under the direction of the Secretary of War, as heretofore authorized by law to be made 5 by the Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, and that all 6 hospitals and asylums now under charge of the Commissioner 7 8 of said bureau, and all funds belonging thereto, shall hereafter 9 be under the supervision of the Secretary of War.

SEC. 6. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary
may designate some officer of the army to discharge the
duties arising under the foregoing section.

SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, That all clerks, mes-1 $\mathbf{2}$ sengers, and employees of the Freedmen's Bureau, except 3 such as the Secretary of War shall retain for the purposes of this act, are hereby discharged: Provided, That the clerks in 4 the educational division of the said bureau be transferred to $\mathbf{\tilde{o}}$ and retained in the Bureau of Education until their services 6 7 can be dispensed with, or others be appointed, by the Com-8 missioner of Education, in their stead.

1 SEC. 8. And be it further enacted, That the Commis-2 sioner of the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned 3 Lands shall be allowed three months, after the passage of this 4 act, to fulfill all legal obligations and contracts, and to settle 5 his accounts at the treasury of the United States.
