1-A. STRIKE NOTES.

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On the 10th inst. the Marine Engineers, who are at present on strike, signed a contract for one year at the old rate of wages with three companies, one of which is a large concern and two members of the American Steamship Owners' Association. The companies to sign were the Eastern Steamship Lines, Inc., operating a large fleet of vessels on the Sound and between Boston, Maine and eastern Canada points; The China Mail Steamship Co., operating two vessels from the West Coast, and the P. & O., operating a small fleet in the Cuban trade. During the early part of the week, few transatlantic liners left the Port of New York, but a number of Coastwise ships did.

It was reported that the United States Shipping Board had taken away from the United States Transport Co., which is a C. W. Morse Corporation, the S. S. "Colin H. Livingston" in Seattle for having conceded to the demands of the union.

The status of the above strike is practically the same as last week. After having had various meetings the ship owners and union have been unable to arrive at a satisfactory settlement and from the present outlook it appears that the strike may last for several weeks. The strikers claim that the port is tied up while ship owners, on the other hand, state that they are making considerable progress under the circumstances.

Several ships have cleared during the week for European ports with a full complement of men. Under-cover employees of the Bureau have made investigations along the water front throughout the

E. RADICAL ORGANIZATIONS

EQUITY CONGRESS OF GREATER N. Y.

At a meeting held under the auspices of the above organization at the Palace Casino, 135th St. & Madison Avenue, New York, on Sunday the 8th inst., Mrs. Irene Moorman Blackstone advised her audience "that negroes should never again put on the uniform of the United States unless they have some assurance that they will not be killed by white people here before they have time to take off the uniform again". The meeting was called to urge that lynching be made a Federal offense.

State Senator William Duggan, who was the first white speaker following Mrs. Blackstone, stated that, he was ashamed to appear on the platform from which such a speech had been made. Congresman Hamilton Fish who commanded the 15th Infantry, New York negro regiment, rebuked the audience for having applauded Mrs. Blackstone's advice.

UNITED COMMUNIST PARTY

On the 9th inst. Edward Lindgren, Israel Amter and Abram Jakina, who were arrested on the 29th ult. by the New York Police, appeared before Judge Tally in the Court of General Sessions. The men had been indicted for criminal anarchy. The case was postponed until the 16th inst.

The New York office has recently learned of the present status of the differences between the above party and the Communist Party through a communication which was signed by Paul Holt, Executive Secretary, which reads as follows:

"Early in March the American Agency of III, after having consulted with the C. E. C's of both parties, sent to the EC (Exec. Comm.) of the CI (Comm. Intern.) the suggestions & conditions upon which, according to the opinion of the Amer. Agency, Unity could be achieved.

These conditions provided for:

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- a) Equal representation at the Unity Convention.
- b) 4 from each party & 1 from the American Agency upon the new CEC;
- c) covering certain disputed points as to insurrection, shop-commits centralization.

- d) participation in mayoralty & congressional campaigns.
- e) language federations, providing for the discontinuation of dues payments to federations, same to be paid thru regular party channels; providing for language bureaus, of three members, same to be elected by langauge conventions. But such national language conferences are to be held following the national convention of the party, and the bureaus and the editors are all subject to the approval of the E. C. C.
- f) the American Agency has the power to break any dead-lock which may occur at the convention.
- g) the party or section of either party which rejects these instructions shall be automatically expelled from the III. Scott, for the Agency placed before both parties these conditions for acceptance. The CEC of the UCP accepted these conditions for unity for altho we compromise on the federation question to some extent, yet the conditions as they refer to federations, are not

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which different from the plan for national propaganda committees as considered by the UCP, The CP, on the other hand, agreed to equal representation and agreed to proceed with the technical arrangements, but the member held that all the other points were points for the Unity Convention to decide. Technical arrangements are progressing at this time, but the member from the CP upon the committee to issue the call for the Unity Convention, claimed he had to report to hb CEC before he could agree to issuing the convention call inclusive of the conditions as laid down by the American Agency, That is, he claimed not to have power himself to agree that the conditions for unity as laid down by the Amer. Agency shall be included in the call for the Unity Convention. The American Agency holds that these conditions must be included in the call. The UCP member on the committee and the CEC of the UCP also takes this stand. At this point the matter rests until the CEC of the CP can be heard from.

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The point then is that the CEC of the UCP has recognized the mandate of the III given to the American Agency, whereas the CP altho recognizing the mandate in part, seeks to evade the conditions for unity imposed by the American Agency.

ITALIAN CHAMBER OF LABOR OF NEW YORK

The above organization is at present making its headquarters at 31 Union Square, Room 706, where it will be located until the completion of the Italian Labor Centre, now in the course of construction. There has been little activity in the above circles during the past week and from a confidential source it has been learned that the membership as a whole has shown little interest in the movement. During the present strike of marine workers in which several thousand men are involved there has, so far as can be learned, been no attempt on the part of the I. W. W. to spread their propaganda.

The Queens County Branch of the organization is said to be almost extinct and the New York Branch, while it has a larger membership, has shown no activity worthy of mention.

AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

On the 13th inst. the above organization placed before the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court sitting in Brooklyn, the question of the right of free speech in Mount Vernon, New York, where permission to speak in public was recently refused the Rev. John Haynes Holmes. The Court's decision will be handed down later.


This woman was arrested in New York on April 29th for distributing circulars entitled "May Day--Red Labor Day" which was signed "American Freedom Foundation".

4. RADICAL PRESS (See Monthly Report)



At a recent meeting of the above organization, held in the Ethical Culture Meeting House, 2 West 64th St., New York, John Haynes Holmes, Unitarian Minister, who is a pronounced radical, sharply criticised the so-called "Lusk Bills" which have recently become a law in New York State and which will unquestionable curb the activities of the Rand School of Social Science and other institutions of the same character.

Dr. Holmes spoke against "passive resistence" and stated: "When the teachers show guts, to use a fine old Elizabethan term, then there will be a hope of liberty".

Rev. Harry F. Ward, teacher of Christian Ethics in Union Theological Seminary, also spoke at the same meeting and stated that the law could not be enforced if the teachers refused to submit to inquisition and tyranny and added that "one way to get rid of such legislation is to make it community legislation istead of class legislation".

NATIONAL DEFENSE COMMITTEE

On the 10th inst. a meeting under the auspices of the above organization was held at the Central Opera House, East 67th St., New York, for the purpose of protesting against the alleged "kidnaping" of John Lindgren, Israel Amter and Abram Jakira, Communists who were arrested by the Police on the 29th of April for violation of the State Anarchy Act; also, to protest against the detention of seventy-five deportees at Ellis Island. The meeting was very sparsely attended and was addressed by a man named Goldstone and Elizabeth Gurly Flynn, who, as usual, charged the Government forces with being responsible for a great deal of radical activity through provocateur methods. 6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS.

INTERNATIONAL LADIES GARMENT WORKERS UNION.

Supreme Court Justice McAvoy in New York on the 10th inst. granted an injunction restraining the above union from interfering with the operations of the Cohen, Friedland & Martin Co. of Toledo, formerly engaged in manufacturing women's wearing apparel. The plaintiff alleged that the union workers in the manufacturing plant which the Company maintained in Toledo curtailed the output when improved machinery was installed so that the concern was forced to close the plant on December 1, 1920., and engaged thereafter in the jobbing business.

The Company alleged that since that time the union has undertaken to prevent the Company from operating as a jobber and has tried to force it to open its manufacturing plant. The Company further alleged that the union in furtherance of this plan, had started strikes at factories which attempted to produce for the Toledo Company, the strikes having been discontinued after the manufacturers agreed to repudiate their contracts with the plaintiff. The action was brought in New York City for the reason that the headquarters of the union are here and most of the manufacturers alleged to have been intimidated are also located in this city.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

The status of the so-called "lockout" of the above organization remains practically unchanged since last week, the union claiming that the employers are settling, while the employers claim to be presenting a solid front against the strikers.



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JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

MAY 14, 1921.

A report of the above Committee, which is generally known as the "Lusk Committee" because of the fact that State Senator Clayton R. Lusk was chairman, was made public early in the week. Touching on the Negro question the report states in part:

"While the negro in general has been well treated in New York State, the ill-treatment accorded him in other parts of the country has engendered a spirit of resentment which has been kept alive by the agents and agitators of the Socialist Party of America, the Industrial Workers of the World and other radical groups. ******* This spirit also has been encouraged by well-to-do liberals who have taken an active part in social uplift organization."

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PEOPLE

It is understood from a confidential source that the above Association is losing caste with the negro population of Harlem, particularly with the younger element, as the Association is constantly asking for funds and its members seem to think that too little has been done by the Association for the actual advancement of the race and too much money has been spent for high salaries for officials and for carrying on the organization.

The same source states that it was probably for the purpose of creating another excuse to ask for funds that the N. A. A. C. P. recently protested against the showing of the film "Birth of a Nation". It is also understood that the activities of the Universal Negro Improvement Association have materially affected the collections of the above organization.

SINN FEIN ACTIVITIES Harry Boland, envoy of the "Republic of Ireland" in the United States, on the 13th inst. denied reports to the effect that there was any possibility of an agreemant between Lreland and Great Britain at this time. He stated, that notwithstanding the dispatch carried by the Universal Service stating that such an agreement had been found to be possible on the ground of the peace terms to be submitted to the British Government, "the policy of the Sinn Fein remained unchanged; that it stands for the right of the people to determine how they shall be governed; for the right of every citizen for an equal voice; for civil and religious liberty and for full, proportional representation safeguarding of minorities."

11. LEGISLATION

On the 9th inst. Governor Miller of New York signed a bill providing for the licensing of all private schools by the State Department of Education.

The bill was introduced by Senator Clayton R. Lusk, former chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee more commonly known as the "Lusk Committee", and is obviously for the purpose of putting out of existence the Rand School of Social Science and others of the same abaracter. The bill would also put out of existence the Ferrer School (which has a branch in this city) in which radicalism of the first order is taught to children with the alphabet.

The law will require each public school teacher to take an oath of loyalty before receiving a teaching license and has been strenuously objected to by the Teachers' Union of New York on the ground that it will "belittle the teaching profession". The Teachers' Union is regarded as a semi-radical organization of public school teachers.

Governor Miller, in answering the criticism of members of the Rand School and other radicals, stated, the bill was not a check on liberty, but rather a check on license.

RUSSIAN AFFAIRS ABROAD

MAY 14, 1921

"Soviet Russia" in its issue of the lath inst. carried an article which stated that on March 12th the All-Russian Congress of the Russian Communist Party adopted a resolution concerning concessions to be granted the foreign capitalists, which reads as follows:

"It is impossible to conceive Russia at present as an isolated economic organism standing aloof from the world market. Only with the participation of foreign technical and financial forces will Russia be able to revive swiftly her economic life.

"Under the present circumstances there is consider the possibility of securing state credit by means of offering to foreign capitalists the natural resources of Russia for using them by way of concessions. The concessionaires are offered a great number of legal and economical guarantees. The liquidation of the concessional enterprise may take place only under the conditions that are provided in the agreement. In no case the liquidation of the enterprise is to result in the enrichment of the government or a third party to the detriment of the concessionaires.

"Owing to the difficulties in the establishment of money payments the concessionaires will at the present state of the world money market have to pay in kind (part of the product produced.) Thus the question of the Russian currency and its relation to the foreign exchanges will be entirely eliminated.

"In case a payment will be made by the government to the concessionaires, there is also to be desired a natural method of offering in exchange Russian goods that are at the disposal of the Soviet Government." G. Unicher

There I saw Carriera, with Mancuse and Gandela the president of my group, with another fellow. Nothing of importance.

A collection box was passed, into which, being among my friends I put \$2.00. I also bought some literature. I was asked to sell some literature by Comrade Wineheimer, who is the person that I saw at Carriera's place the night that they made a communist out of me, who is the person that brought in the organizer that night I paid for the literature and then gave it away to show that I was good for the cause of that organ. 75 cents was the amount paid for the literature, which was "the Toiler".

Had a talk with Gandela, which he told that they had a hell of a good time at the Venus Hall and asked me if I was there. I told him "no". He told me that they even had red flags, displayed in the hall after which I shock hands with him and he told me he would see me Friday.

From there I went home. Now, Joe, that is all I have to say for today.

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

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

ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN did not show up at the Radical Forum to-day. She was suddenly called away to Boston to attend a protest meeting caused by the arrest of two Italian Reds. There was a crowded house awaiting her arrival.

The chairman appointed a "Red" by the name of MATTIS to be the speaker of the afternoon. Mattis said he was born in Russia where he lived until he was about 12 years old. Не went on to describe the brutalities of the old Russian government, etc. He told the audience boastingly that he was an active worker and an officer in the Communist Party of America and had adopted the Third Internationale of Lenine. That the Socialist Party was cowardly and weak and afraid to join the Communistbut flirting with the Capital-That the only thing to do was to overthrow the Capitalists ists. and bring about a social revolution at once instead of telling the t, people to wait. That the Communist theory was to join the ranks of any capitalist group so as to learn what they were doing, then work from within. To join the churches, A.F. of L., Democratic, Republican, Nationalist or any other movements so as to oring about the revolution. That he knows of young men of the Communist Party 25

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who are members of some of the above named organizations. Mattis claimed that he has been in touch with the leading Communists of Europe and writes for different radical papers. Among those present were MESS GRACE CAMPBELL, CHANDLER OWEN, DOMINGO, POTTER, MOORE, CARPENTER and other lights of the local Reds.

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DR. HOLMES: I visited the Harlem Community Church, 149 W. 136th Street at 8:30 P.M. where REV. JOHN HAYNES HOLMES spoke on "The Whole Duty of Man." The hall was crowded to capacity, all the local Reds being present. He took his text from the Bible but finally ended up by denouncing the so-called 100% Americans or those people in this country who wanted to direct peoples thoughts preventing them from seeking the truth and trying to lay down a rule by which they should think. He would like to make this a branch of his down-town church but on account of heavy debts they were carrying on the rebuilding of this church.

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Referring to my report made April 30, Prome above entitled matter, I kept in touch with the radical situation and learned that the Italian radicals who intended holding a meeting on North Salina Street, Sunday afternoon, May 1, at 3 o'clock, failed to call the meeting because the speaker did not appear.

However, the meeting which was arranged by DR. THOMAS CRIMINS. who is the leader of the Communist Party in this city, was held in Silver Hall on Sunday evening, May 1, at eight oclock. This meeting was attended by about one hundred persons, mostly Russians with a few Poles and was presided over by Dr. Thomas Caimmins who began his remarks at 8:35 and stated in substance that the object of the workers was to agitate and organize an International spirit rather than a National spirit and the different classes could organize among themselves and then merge into a great International body of workers. He stated that the Irish workers will strive to rule Ireland and that the Poles are ready to join this movement and that the Russian and German workers have already taken a great step in this direction.

DR. CAIMMINS introduced MR. FRANK BAILEY of ROCHESTER, NEW YORK as the principal speaker of the evening and Mr. Bailey stated that he is a representative of the Proletarian Patty of Rochester, N.Y. 600 es present -742 He as well as Dr. Crimmins referred to the number of detec

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and also stated that in Rochester, New York, where the Chief of Police is broader minded than Chief of Police Cadin of Syracuse, New York, fifteen thousand paraded the streets of Rochester on Saturday April 30. He also stated that he had some copies of the May Day Edition of a paper called "SOVIET RUSSIA" and stated that two thousand copies of this paper were distributed in Rochester and that he had fifty copies with him that he would sell at five cents per copy. This paper is the official organ of Soviet Russia and is published in New York City. He also had a paper called "PROLETARIAN" which sold for fifteen cents per copy and which is published in Detroit, Michigan.

Reference was made to "BIG BILL HAYWOOD" and Bailey stated that Haywood is in Russia and that the third Congress of the Third International would be held in Russia. He further stated that three years ago there was a work or fight law placed on the Statute Books and that now there are about five million workers starving on account of unemployment. He stated that May 1, is International Labor Day and that the workers should not be fooled into recognizing the first Monday of September as Labor Day because this was done by the Capitalists in order to divide the interest of the workers. He stated that three months after the Russian soldiers were fighting with the Allied Forces, American soldiers were sent to Russia to fight the Russian workers. He also stated that he believes that by July 1, 1921 the Railroad workers will be in an angry mood because they are beginning to see "RED" at the present time. The reason for the above statement is based, I learned, on the fact that he addressed six meetings of railroad workers in Buffalo and that the railroad men are asking for RED speakers and a few

years ago, he stated, they would not listen to men like him. Five hundred thousand railroad men are out of employment since last December and are looking for jobs. He says that their idea is to eat first and they are not concerned about what flag they eat under. He further stated that the Capitalists refuse to operate their machines unless they can make a profit and that if the workers owned their jobs and machines they could operate them all the time. He also stated that there are about thirty thousand ex-soldiers in rags in New York City. He stated that in Buffalo, New York hundreds of men are scouring the Dumps and that they are saying to themselves: "we are going to get ours and if anything happens it will be blamed on to the Reds." He stated that the Capitalistic system is breaking down and that a new system bankrupt will crowd the/capitalistic nations to the earth.

Bailey also touched on conditions in England and stated that the authorities took guns away from the coal strikers in England and that while Russian needs supplies and machines the Capitalistic nations will not ship Russia what it needs. He further stated that two hundred eighty thousand kodaks are in the stock room of the Eastman Kodak Company at Rochester, New York and that they only work four days a week. Mr. Baliey spoke about fifty minutes and when he finished Dr. Crimmins stated that resolutions would be adopted extending sympathy to the workers in Ireland, Great Britan and to "Jim Larkin" who is now in Sing Sing Prison.

Another speaker spoke a few minutes in the Hebrew language and another in the Italian languageand through an interpreter I learned that their remarks were general and simply covered what had gone before.

There was no apparent desire to make any outward demonstration

At Albany, N.Y., Troy, N.Y., Rensselaer, N.Y., Cohoes, N.Y. and Watervliet, N.Y. the 1500 employees of the United Traction Company. covering those cities, are still out. Noted

2800 building trades workers are on strike in Albany, $\mathbb{Y}_{\bullet}^{\mathbb{Y}}$, Troy, N.Y., Schenectady, N.Y. and against a 25% reduction in pay 🦕

In Albany, Troy, Schenectady, Glens Falls, N.Y., Utica, and other smaller places in this District, members of the allied printing trades to the number of approximately 1500 are on strike for a 44 hour working day with 48 hour pay. This does not affect printers on newspapers, only job workers.

At Glens Falls, N.Y., Schuyler Falls, N.Y. and many smaller places paper makers are on strike against a reduction in pay and longer hours. The number involved varies from day to day, at present about 5000, but unless settled before May 11th when all contracts will have expired, the total will reach nearly 15000 in this District.

There is no indication of radicalism in any of the disturbances to date.

The attached circular entitled "May Day" had been sent in to this office after it had been distributed by the foreign element throughout Binghamton, Endicott, and Johnson City, N.Y.

Agent interviewed the Chief of Police and requested him for two officers who accompanied Agent to the foreign section of the city to learn whether or not any such literature had been distributed in this part of the city and whether any meetings were being held on the morning of May 1st.

Agent found that no meetings were held and no literature was found to have been distributed on that morning.

Agent then proceeded to Johnson City, N.Y. and after in interview with the Chief of Police, requested him to furnish Agent with a plan clothesman to accompany Agent to the foreign section of the city to see whether or not any meetings were being held or any circulars distributed on that day. No meetings were held in Johnson City, N.Y. and no literature was distributed.

 WEEKLY REPORT ON STRIKE AND RADICAL SITUATION IN CNETRAL NEW YORK.

FACTS DEVELOPED

There are no new developments in the Railroad Strike situation but a number of railroad men are unemployed at the present time. The Strike at the plant of the Pierce Butler and Pierce Company at Eastwood, New York is still in progress, but no violence has been attempted by either side during the past week.

During the past week considerable literature in the form of hand bills and circulars has been distributed in various parts of the city apparently by members of the Communist Party of America. This literature advocates the overthrow of the United States Government and calls for a demonstration by the unemployed and by the workers on May 1, 1921. With the aid of the local police and confidential informants, I have obtained copies of these hand hills as soon as possible after they were distributed so that they would be kept off the streets, During the past week no meetings have been held except possibly one or two informal gatherings of the leaders for the purpose of calling a meeting on Sunday May 1, 1921.

I learned today that there will be a meeting at Silver Hall, 345 East Onondaga Street under the direction of Dr. Thomas Crimmins who is recognized as a leader of the Communist Party in this city. FRANK BAILEY who claims to represent the PROIETARIAN PARTY of ROCHESTER, NEW YORK, will be the principal Speaker and it is stated

Acting under instructions of Agent in Charge G.O.Holdridge, continuing reports in the above matter, Agent obtained the following information in regard to industrial unrest.

The 1500 employees of the United Traction Company are still out. The cities of Albany, Troy, Watervliet, Cohoes and Rensselaer are included.

300 molders at Schenectady, N.Y. voted to continue the strike during the past week. This has been in existence since Jan. 1921.

At Albany, N.Y. the Tri-City Council (Albany, Schenectady and Troy) of builders met and decided to stand pat on preposition to reduce all wages twenty-five (25%) per cent. Every indication points to strikes in the above three cities in all building trades on May 1st. More than 8,000 are connected with said trades in the three cities above mentioned. Practically the same conditions exist at Utica.

At Albany the printers have made a demand for a forty-four hour week, and increase in pay. Every indication points to a strike on May 1st, as the employers are determined to refuse. Over 700 M^{3-3} are involved.

various paper mills in this district is showing no new developments. The workers have voted to refuse the reduction, and new schedule offered by the employers, and as the contracts expire between May 1st and May 11th, both sides seem to be awaiting developments, with very little activity on either side.being shown. More than 15000 are engaged in the industry in this district.

There is no news as to the question of an agreement in the matter of a reduction in pay of the employees of the New York State Railways, though the prospects of the avoidance of a strike seem good.

150 employees at hhe WALTER A. WOOD HARVESTING MACHINE WORKS at Hoosick Falls, are still out.

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



Just opened your letter and was surprised to find my expense check, also was glad to hear that you are enjoying the best of health and to hear that you expect to locate yourself in Buffalo again.

Now, Joe, I will keep up the good work under one condition, that is, that you will come here and take full charge of the thing, that now I am beginning to be of some importance in my business and will be getting rushed, and then I won't have no time at all to lose with my Bolsheviki friends, or those that you asked me to cultivate their friends.

Now then, we will start with the meeting that took place at my shop Tuesday. About 8:30 o'clock P. M., they all assembled in front of my shop, seven or eight in all, and ten minutes after walked into the back of my joint, two by two, five minutes apart, that is to say, they took precautions. After we all assembled in the rear the Leader or the Captain opened the meeting, which he read a bulletin which talked about a few unimportant things that have been experienced and what they have developed, to, all of no importance.

The only thing that was important was the distributing of some literature which I am enclosing, some of it that might enable you to work right through in your locality.

The meeting went on nicely until 10 P.M. and then Mike, the grocery man, called my attention to the fact that a captain of the force had looked in my place with suspicion. This I advised the captain, who suggested to close the meeting immediately, and of course it made me kind of scared, because with that which is unknown, they might throw me out of my place of business and then what. The meeting closed and the captain told me that he would let me know the cutcome of the meeting, and of what was new that I did not know.

Enclosed you will find the Illegal literature which is being distributed throughout different parts of the city.

Having nothing else to say, I close, giving you my best regards, to your wife and baby. Receive same from my family also receive regards from Angelo.

Hoping to hear from yoh soon and hoping that you will come back and take responsibilities, I remain, Fallatutulle Pasquali.

P. S. Remember what I am doing is all because of our friendship, that if our friendship had not been I would have never rendered any information at all to anybody at all, so respect that friendship well.

Continuing on this matter, at 2:30 p.m. I proceeded to Room 405, Rand School, 7 East 15th St., for the purpose of attending a meeting of the Conference. That the unemployed must be organized in every city, town and industrial center and through them enlist the aid of the employed workers in order to utilize the labor unions and other sources for the purpose of bringing about united action in making demands upon the Government as follows:

First: Employment or compensation at union rate of wages. In order to provide this fund we demand taxation of incomes above \$3000. a

year.

Second: Immediate trade with Soviet Russia.

Third: No evictions for non-payment of rent by unemployed.

Fourth: Proper medical care for the unemployed and their dependents when sick, this work to be financed by eliminating further expense for building of implements of war.

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Slogan: Work or Compensation. The Publicity Committee was ordered to draw up a nest leaflet for distribution, and it was announced that the next meet- ing would be held at 2:30 p.m., the coming Saturday. Published by the International Bible Students' Association, which was also responsible for the dissemination of "The Finished Mystery", for which several members were indicted, is being brought out in more compact form and with much more reading matter, during the past few months. There is less of the publication devoted to religious matters and more to general topics of the day. The Easter number, March 16th, contained an article on "The Irish Cuestion" by Frederick J. Falkiner, Dublin, which points out the number of deaths for which the present situation in Ireland is responsible. In another article entitled "Zionism Certain to Succeed" quotes the full report of a lecture delivered by Judge RUTHERFORD at Jerusalem in 1920.

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The April 13th issue of the same publication contains an article on "Black and Brown Races", which states that Great Britain's treatment of the Black and Brown races is not the same as her treatment of the Whites, and also goes into opium industry for which Great Britain is charged to be largely responsible.

The same issue contains an article captioned: "The Bankers' League" in which the League of Nations is referred to as a combination of politicians and bankers for the preservation of the British App and the article generally savors of anti-British sentiment. Under the same caption the "Official Bulletin of the Communist Party of America" (Section of the Communist International, issued by the Central Executive model. in small numbers in New York. It will be noted that formerly there were two issues of "The Communist", one purporting to represent "The Communist Party of America" while the other purported to represent "The United Communist Party". The issue in question has been forwarded to the Washington office of the Bureau and contains in the main a number of articles which seek to put the blame for the split in the Party in the United States upon the United Communist Party. It also contains an appeal for funds together with a financial report for January of the present year.

COLLIUNIST PARTY OF AMERICA

During the current month there have been several instances throughout Greater New York of the distribution in mail boxes and doorways of a circular signed "Issued by the Central Executive Committee, Communist Party of America" which is entitled "Then and Now--April 6, 1917--April 6, 1921", which calls the attention of the readers to the difference between conditions on the two dates above mentioned, and, in the main, carries the usual Communistic arguments and strong recommendation for the use of arms by the working class against the present form of government.

SOCIALIST REVIEW

The April--May issue of the above journal, issued during the current month, carries an article entitled "Is the Third International a Menace to the Russian Revolution?", in which Socialist Alderman V. C. VLADECK takes the affirmative side and J. B. SALUTSKY, Educational Director of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, the negative. Another article "Is Proletariat a Majority?" is discussed by Dr. ISAAC A. HOURWICH.

"The New York Call" in its issue of the 9th inst. carries a news item dated Troy, New York, April 8th, stating that the local Troy branch of the Socialist Party, at a recent meeting held at 351 River St. had adopted a resolution instructing its delegate to the coming National Convention to vote for affiliation with the Third International without reservations.

NATIONAL CIVIC FEDERATION REVIEW

In the April 1st issue of the above publication, which is the official organ of the National Civic Federation, there appears an article "The Dishonesty of the Socialist Mind" by Gertrude Atherton.

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THE NEW YORK CALL

During the current month has been devoting considerable of its space to the articles by William Z. Foster, in which the writer points out the advantages of the I. W. W. scheme of solving labor troubles.

It has also paid considerable attention to the proposed amnest drive on Washington, and, as usual, to Socialist and radical activities of all kinds.

THE WORKERS CHALLENGE

Which is published anonymously in New York, although the name of the editor is given as John Jacobs, and that of the managing publisher as Joseph Greenberg of 179 East Broadway, has, during the current month, carried the usual articles eulogizing the Soviet system of government and attacking the so-called "capitalistic" government. Its issue of the 15th of March also carries an article on the 50th anniversary of the Paris Commune.

The general tenor of all articles in this publication tend to stir up class hatred and general dissatisfaction with conditions as they are.

THE IRISH PEOPLE

The above publication, which is the official organ of the Irish-American Labor League and is published weekly at 262 West 23rd St., New York, has, as usual, been devoting its attention to attacks upon the British government and all others who disagree with the opinions of this publication's writers.

The paper purports to carry to the Irish people in the United States, the message of James Connolly, so-called martyr. It also devotes considerable space to the case of James Larkin and to occesional attacks on the American Legion as well as the Knights of Columbus.

THE NEGRO WORLD

Radical weekly, published in New York, has, during the current month, devoted practically all of its reading space to the affairs of Marcus Garvey, who is at present in the West Indies in the interests of the Black Star Line and the Universal Negro Improvement Association, and to the weekly meetings held at Liberty Hall. Space is also devoted to the present trip of President King of Liberia to the United States in connection with a loan from the United States Government which Liberia is seeking. Most of the articles are, as usual, tinged with antiwhite sentiment which Garvey and his followers have been so active in spreading.

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THE NATIONAL REVIEW

"A Negro weekly" of which the editor is ARTHUR E. HING, Associate editor CLAUDE A. LEADE and the advertising manager J. A. PLULIMER, all of whom are connected in one way or another with the Marcus Garvey movement, in its issue of April 9th, carries an article telling of the enthusiasm with which Garvey is supposed to have been received in Jamaica. The paper also carries what purports to be an excerpt from the "Jamaica Gleaner" which includes quotation from the Japanese paper "Yorodzu" of Tokyo, issue of Feb. 27th, under the caption "The Awakening of Negroes". The article, which seems to be of interest at this time, reads as follows:

"When Japan introduced to the Paris Conference a proposal for the equality of races, the colored people of the world all united in the Japanese action. The "Yorodzu" is known as the champion of liberty, justice, equality and humanity and it received many letters addressed to the Japanese Empassy in Paris, thanking the paper for its efforts, and praying for its success. Most of the senders of these letters were Negroes and the awakening of these people has been striking since that time.

"Mr. Marcus Garvey is a great Negro, who is now trying to establish a republic of the Negroes in Africa on the gound that no race is more miserable than one which has no country of its own. The persecution of Negroes by Whites is beyond our imagination. The Yellow people are insulted and boycotted by the Whites in all parts of the world, but the Black people are maltreated more seriously than we. Mr. Garvey is calling for the exodus of the Whites from Africa. If the Negroes establish a powerful republic and demand re•dress for the wrongs inflicted on the Black people in the past by the Whites, how will the latter apologize to Mr. Garvey? He is quite a young man, yet his name is already resounding throughout the world. While expressing unbounded respect for his personality, we delight in the awakening of the Negroes."

THE COLMUNIST

No. 15 of the above publication, which is the official organ of the United Communist Party of America, has made its appearance in small numbers in New York. Considerable of the issue is given up to the progress of the unity proceedings between the above party and the Communist Party, and the rest to the usual communistic propaganda. FORWARD (New York Yiddish Daily)

In its issue of February 11th, translation of which has just come to hand, carries an article touching on the commercial relations between the United States and Soviet Russia which may be of interest at this time and is therefore quoted in full. Under the caption "American Big Business People Already Dealing With Russia Through Caucasia" the article states:

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"Tiflis, Georgia, February 10:- Notwithstanding the fact that commerce between America and Russia is still meeting with great obstacles from the American Government, commerce between American business-men and Russia is already carried on. Since it is still impossible to deal directly with Russia, - another way was found. The business is done with Tiflis:

Tiflis, the capitol of the Caucasian republic, Georgia, is now practically the only neutral place. Representatives from all countries meet there with representatives of Soviet Russia. American representatives also are present there. Goods are shipped there and sold to agents of the Soviets.

A great cargo of shoes has arrived from America. Here they were sold to the Bolsheviki and the goods are now already in Baku, in Soviet Russia.

The business-men, who are here, think that commercial relations between Russia and the whole world will soon have to be carried on open and free, the Soviet Government has here several commissions with a personnel of between 500 and 600 officials....."

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THE INDUSTRIAL UNIONIST

Volume 1, No. 6, official organ of the New York District Council, I. W. W., for April, carries an editorial in which the write eclares that the I. W. W. will welcome any activity of the American Bureau of the Moscow Labor International "that will weld the sadly divided workers of this country into a solid fighting unit, when Our dream of opening jail doors may come true. WE ARE FOR THE RED LABOR DNION INTERNATIONAL." The rest of the paper is devoted to the usual I. W. W. propaganda.

2. RADICAL ORGANIZATIONS RAND SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE.

During the past week the above School has been under fire in the Legislature at Albany where Senator Clayton Lusk introduced two bills providing for the dissolution of the hand School and others of the same character. On the 14th inst. the State Senate passed the bills which will go to the Assembly within a few days.

AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

The above organization on the 14th inst. made public a statement in New York to the effect that a survey of a number of cities in the United States disclosed the fact that only eleven out of eighty-eight principal cities now recognize the unrestricted right of free speech. The announcement states that the report was based upon written answers received from police chiefs of the various cities to which questionnaires were sent.

SOCIALIST PARTY

Announcement has been made that the annual convention of the above Party, at which the "21 points" laid down by Moscow will discussed, is slated for June 25th at Detroit, Michigan.

The official organ of this Party "The New York Call" states that the Independent Labor Party of Great Britain has "shelve the twenty-one points and retained their own unity.

Locally there has been little activity in the above circles during the past week. It is understood, however, from a confidential source, that MASHLYKIN, one of the organizers, is making efforts to get some Polish member to go to Shamokin, Pennsylvania, and vicinity in order to disrupt the Metal Mine Workers Union of that place. 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JAMES LARKIN AND ISAAC FERGUSON

On the 11th inst. Justice William P. Burr, in Special Term the Supreme Court, New York, handed down a decision denying a certificat of reasonable doubt to the above individuals. The arguments on the writ were completed December 30, 1920.

Both men were convicted of "criminal anarchy" by Justice Bartow S. Weeks and former Assistant County Attorney Alexander I. Rorke and received sentences of from five to ten years in the State's prison.

REV. JOHN HAYNES HOLMES

Pastor of the Community Church, gave a sermon at the Lyric Theatre, New York, on April 10th, his subject being "Who Is the Greatest Man In the World". In the course of the sermon he stated that in his opinion M. K. GANDHI, leader of the <u>Non-co-operation Movement of India</u>, is "the greatest man now living in the world".

5. RADICAL MEETINGS JEWISH SOCIALISTS

On the 10th inst., addressing a meeting of Jewish Socialists and Trade Unionists of New York, numbering about three thousand, at the New Star Casino, 107th St. & Park Avenue, New York, MOISSAYE J. OLGIN, a Jewish writer who has recently returned after a six months stay in Soviet Russia, stated among other things, that in Moscow, Petrograd and other cities, strikes occur occasionally and that people must wait in line for bread, shoes and other commodities and that there is not much bread to be had. He also stated that hunger and terror are evidant and that Mensheviks and Socialists are put in jail during periods of general disturbance amongst the people; and, in these cases persons who are merely opposed to the Government are also put in jail and released later.

Another remark of his was to the effect that "ten or twenty years of hard work and suffering are shead of Russia, but the people know there is no way back and therefore they go on".

SOVIET RUSSIA MEDICAL RELIEF COMMITTEE

The above body held a meeting at the London Casino, New York, on the 13th inst. at which the principal speaker was WALLIS W. LEFEAUX a Canadian lawyer who defended the leaders of the general strike in Winnipeg last year.

This man has recently returned from Soviet Russia and made the statement that that country is in urgent need of supplies and trained individuals for combatting disease and sickness. Lefeaux added that it was estimated that ten million people had died in Russia during the past seven years from disease and starvation alone. He further stated that there was no doubt in his mind that if the Soviet Government could have peace it could build the country up anew and put an end to misery and privation.

	6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS	

CENTRAL TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

The above organization, which claims to represent seven hundred and fifty thousand union workers, issued a statement on the 12th inst. to the effect that it had prepared plans for a state-wide campaign against "the abuse of the injunctory powers of our courts by the issuance of unfair and confiscatory injunctions by judges who have shown by their acts they are opposed to organized labor".

The first definite action, it is understood, will consist of a mass meeting to be held at Madison Square Garden, New York. within the next few weeks, at which all the unions are expected to have a large representation.

CLOAK, SUIT AND SKIRT MANUFACTURERS' PROTECTIVE ASS'N.

The above body, consisting of three hundred and fifteen manufacturers who severed relations with the International Ladies Garment Workers Union on October 9th, 1920, made the announcement on the 12th inst., subsequent to its annual meeting, that immediate steps are to be taken to bring about a reduction in wages, an increase in working hours and a revival of the privilege of the employers to "hire and fire". The announcement stated that during the past eighteen months the employees had received many increases in wages and instead of turning out a maximum of work after the increases, produced a minimum of work and thus retarded the production of the industry.

In the event of the manufacturers introducing the threat-

ened wage cuts, it is probable that over fifty thousand workers will be affected.

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INTERNATIONAL LADIES' GARMENT WORKERS' UNION

On the 12th inst. Supreme Court Justice Delehanty denied the application of Borgenicht & Sons Co., Inc., for an order restraining the above union from maintaining pickets in front of the former's place of business. On the same date Justice Gavegan ordered the union to show cause why they should not be punished for contempt of court for violating the injunction granted to the Albert Florscheimer Co., manufacturers of dresses.

The injunction probibited picketing in front of the Florscheimer factory.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

The above union on the 12th inst. brought suit for a Million Dollars against the Clothing Manufacturers' Association of New York, Inc. for damages alleged to have been sustained by the union as a result of what they termed a conspiracy against it to prevent it from carrying out its function, and by a lockout which the union claims the manufacturers instituted in December, 1920, which resulted in preventing the members of the union from securing employment.

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Leaders of this Union have stated that they expect an early victory for the Union in their dispute with the manufacturers. The "lockout fund" is now said to total One Million One Hundred and Fifty-two Thousand Four Hundred and Twenty-eight Dollars (\$1,152,428.)

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WORKERS EDUCATIONAL BUREAU OF AMERICA

It has been learned that on the 3rd inst. there was organized in New York a body which is to be known by the above title and headed by JAMES H. MAURER, Fresident of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor with SPENCER MILLER, Jr., instructor at Columbia University as Secretary. The Executive Committee consists of JOHN BROPHY, President of District 2 of the United Mine Workers of America; HARRY DANA, of the Boston Labor College; FANIA N. COHN, of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union; WILLIAL F. KEHOE, Secretary of the Central Trades and Labor Council of Greater New York; HARRY RUSSELL, of Springfield, Mass.; PETER MILLER, of Philadelphia and J. B. SALUTZKY, in charge of the Education Department of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America.

An Advisory Committee of twenty-five was selected by the Executive Committee and comprised a number of widely known radicals of both sexes. The aim of the organization, as provided by the constitution, is as follows:

"To collect and to disseminate information relative to efforts at education on any part of organized labor; to coordinate and assist in every possible manner the educational work now carried on by the organized workers to stimulate the creation of additional enterprises in labor education throughout the United States."

7. UNEMPLOYMENT



MARCUS GARVEY

Papers filed in the Supreme Court in New York in the marriage annulment proceedings brought by Garvey against his wife, have disclosed that as provisional president of Africa Garvey was voted a

salary of Twelve Thousand Dollars a year at the convention that was held in New York in August, 1920, and as president of the Universal Negro Improvement Association his salary is supposed to be Ten Thousand a year.

In his answer Garvey made the statement through his attorney that he is paying \$96. a month rent, \$35. weekly for a housekeeper and \$125. a month for installments on his furniture.

The papers in the suit also revealed that in addition to the salary voted Garvey, the Rev. Er. Eason was voted a Ten Thousand Dollar yearly salary as president of the Negroes of America; Henrietta Vinton Davis, international organizer, Six Thousand Dollars a year; Wilford H. Smith, Counsel General of the Universal. Negro Improvement Association, Seven Thousand Bollars; William H. Matthews, Assistant Counsel General, Six Thousand Dollars; Eli Garcia, Auditor General, Five Thousand Dollars.

Hrs. Garvey's affidavit also states that since December 1, 1920, the payroll of the Universal Negro Improvement Association has been approximately Fifteen Thousand Dollars a month. Garvey in his reply stated that the Salaries named above were purely on paper.

Latest information regarding Carvey's movements, is to the effect that he has left Jamaica for Fanama and is expected to arrive in New York early in May.

13. RUSSIAN AFFAIRS ABROAD.

According to a cablegram received on the 11th inst. by Dr. D. H. Dubrowsky from Soviet Consul at Libau, Latvia, the Russian border will close on April 20th and anyone from the United States will not be permitted to enter Russia until an official representative of the Russian Soviet Government, with authority to visa passports of persons desiring to go to Russia, arrives in America, this according to an order issued on April 9th.

It is also understood that Mr. Kalnin, Latvian Consul, has received word from his Government to visa no more passports for Latvia for persons who wish to pass from that country to Russia.

CHARLES RECHT, who is serving as local representative of L. C. A. K. Martens, is said to have made the statement that no systematic border control of quarantine has been set up as yet in Russia and the demobilization of the Army and the transportation of goods within the country, all of it over a badly impaired railway system, has been "more than the traffic can bear".

It has been learned from a confidential source that ARTHUR KATZES, one of the anarchists deported on the Buford December, 1920, has, within the past few weeks, written a letter to another Russian in New York in which he stated that PETER BIANKI, another deported member of the Union of Russian Workers, was assassinated in Petrograd on the 26th of January. Katzes' letter referred to Bianki as "traitor Bianki" and further set forth the fact that Bianki had deserted the anarchist group and joined the Communist Party who made him a Commissar. The letter added that a previous attempt had been made on Bianki's life at Moscow.

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From the same source it has been learned that the Russian anarchists in New York have been informed by sailors who have recently arrived, that the order issued by the Soviet Government to the effect that commencing April 20th, no Russians returning from the United States would be permitted to enter that country was made necessary by the internal dissensions between anarchists and communists and factional fights amongst the communists, and that the Government had decided to attempt to bring order out of impending chaos before permitting any new immigrants, especially those from the United States, to enter the country.

Acting under instructions of Agent in Charge Holdridge, and continuing reports in the above matter, Agent obtained the following information in regard to industrial unrest.

Strikes still in effect in Troy, Cohoes, Watervliet, Rensselaer, and Alb any,N.Y. The 1500 employees of the United Traction Company are still out on strike. Hardly any passengers are being carried on the cars which are being run during the day with strikebreakers. Occasional clashes occur between the strike sympathizers and moneunion employees, but no indications of radicalism are being injected into the strike.

The 300 molders at the General Electric Plant, Schenectady, N.Y. are still on strike. The plants of SWEET & DOYLE COMPANY at Green Island, N.Y. and the ALBANY FOUNDRY CO. at Albany, N.Y. are doing the molding work for the General Electric. Strikes at the two above mentioned plants have resulted in the shops being run as open shops with frequent clashes occurring between the workers and the striking union molders. The 600 carpet workers are still out on strike at Amsterdam?N.Y. The 150 employees of the WALTER A. WOOD HARVESTOR MACHINE works are still out at Hoosick Falls, N.Y.

At Binghamton, N.Y. 140 members of the allied printing trades council are still on strike. 202-600-33-2

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classes of labor ployed in the construction of a new armory to take effect, April 1st, when the workers informed the contractor the cut would not be accepted they were all laid off forthwith.

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The builders of Utica, N.Y. have announced that they will pay 15% less to their employees May 1st. The unions have decided to strike against the proposed cut. Their membership is above 2000.

The N.Y. State Railway officials are holding meetings to try and effect a satisfactory reduction in pay without any strike. About 15000 are involved. There are rumors of a strike in all paper making plants which would involve several thousand. This will be against a reduction in wages and an increase of hours.

This information was obtained from the State Labor Bureau, State Employment Bureau, Federation of Labor, ^Chamber of Commerce, the daily papers, and from personal investigation.

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

FACTS DEVELOPED Continuing on this matter, at 2:30 p.m. I presented myself at the Rand School, 7 East 15th St. for the purpose of attending the above conference. Upon my arrival there I found about thirty-four delegates present. The meeting was opened by the Secretary A. Shields and Taylor of the Public Service was elected chairman. Then a report was made by Shields of the work of the Committee of Action and he said that there was a difference of opinion and the work of the Committee was held up, nothing concrete being done. Beyer, as Secretary of the Committee of Action, reported that it was the sabotaging of a few that held up the work and therefore the ones that were agreeable called a meeting and decided on some action. A motion was made to dis solve the Committee of Action and the motion was carried. Then another motion was made to dissolve the Conference ontirely, and this motion was also carried. At the termination of the conference, the majority of the delegates went to Room 405 and there reorganized the Conference with the election of Hofbaur as chairman and Beyer as the Secretary and Treasurer. Then the Committee, as reported by Ecclellan, said that they had elected a Finance Committee and a Committee of Action. This last Committee had drawn up a program which they had put in leftlet as MAY = MAY = MAY = 1 form, urging the maintenance by the Government of the unemployed wiggy the prevailing rate of wages; also, the heavy taxation on incomes of

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\$3000. and over and the immediate resumption of trade with Russia. McClellan said that they knew that this program was a bit conservative, but there was an ultimate aim behind this. When the committee drew this up they had in mind revolutionary propaganda and they knew that the Government would never agree to this, and this therefore would incite the army of unemployed and they may take some definite action. This program was adopted temporarily by the new council and a motion was passed to elect a committee of five to draw up the principles of this body. It was reported that open air meetings had been arranged and for a May day demonstration, they had decided to hold three open air meetings on April 30th as May 1st was a Sunday. One meeting was scheduled for 10th St. & Second Ave., the other at 110th St. & 5th Ave. and the other in Brownsville, Brooklyn. Finance Committee reported that they had called on several labor unions and had collected about (90. to be used for propaganda work. The Irish Workers League was also represented here and the delegate reported that they are making a drive to boycott all English goods here to help Ireland in its fight for freedom and also to help the strikers in England. He said that on Monday Le will start distributing literature on the river front, asking the longshoremen to boycott and not to handle English goods. A motion was made to affiliate this conference with the National Bopaganda Committee for the Unemployed, headquarters in Chicago. (A circular of which you will find attached hereto). The motion was amended so that a Committee of three be elected to investigate this National Committee as to its aims and purposes and report their findings at the next meeting to be held the coming Saturday. The meeting adjourned at 6:40 p.m. as the variogs committees had to convene.

Referring to my report made April 4, in the above entitled matter, beg to advise that the railroad strike situation remains unchanged in Central New York.

The strike situation at the plant of the Pierce buller and Pierce Company at Eastwood, New York remains unchanged. The men are still out and the New York State Constabulary have two men on duty there at all times and no further violence has been attempted by either side.

The Solvay Unit of the Communist Party of America held another meeting at BAGOZZI'S HALL of Tuesday Evening April 5, and there were about two hundred present at same, consisting of Itlaians and Austrians for the greater part with a few Spaniards. One VALENTY addressed the meeting and his talk was along Socialistic lines and not quite as radical as some of the speakers who have appeared at this same hall. He told the workers to vote the Socialist ticket if any, and that eventually they would orgamize their own party and the workers would receive justice. A collection was taken up and about twenty five dollars was contributed. VALENTY sold some papers and pamphlets touching on Socialism and Communism. He spoke about conditions in England at the present time and said that the labor party in England would overthrow the Government. Of course he meant by that, that LLOYD GEORGE being in power through a coalition form of Government, he would be overthrown,

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Page 2. but no doubt many of his hearers believed that he meant a real revolution is in store for England. Aside from this meeting they have been inactive because they are still out of work and are not supplied with funds.

- EMMET O'REILLY - claiming to be representative of the Irish Transport Workers Union, addressed a gathering of about 100 workmen in Miller's Hall, Buffalo, New York on Friday evening, April 8th, and spoke in substance as follows:

"Ireland will have no bourgeoise, capitalistic government; no replublic like the United States, God forbid. We are going to have a workers' republic." He pleaded for a great union of the American working people, patterned after the great Irish union, which, he claimed, his is alone responsible for the fight which his country is making against England. He alleged that the American dock workers, railroad men, etc. organized in behalf of the working men in Ireland; also that the members of these unions refused to load or unload British ships, refused to transport English goods or goods consigned If such an organization were perfected, England would to England. withdraw her troups from Ireland within three weeks . He denounced the politicians who groweled in the dust at Chicago and San Francisco, Conventions, and begged that the Republicans and Democrats incorporate an Irish plank in their platforms. He stated that their reward from the Harding administration was given them on March 17th when Secretary Weeks refused to permit United States soldiers and sailors to participate in a parade in Boston where societies carried the flag of the Irish He ridiculed the efforts of some Irish societies in this Republic.

As a result of a conference between the tugboat owners and Secretary of Labor Davis, which was had with the employees angaged in the recent strike, the men agreed to accept the reductions of approximately twenty-five per cent, which were put into effect about March 1st.

The reduction was accepted, however, on condition that the previous wage scale existing on the former agreement which expired on December 31st, be restored on May 1st and continued, pending the adoption of a new agreement between the ocean steamship employers and employees. Despite this adjustment, however, it is understood that further disagreement may arise on May 1st when the steamship concerns have announced their intention of putting into effect reductions ranging from fifteen to thirty per cent. The seamen have said that they will oppose the reductions and threaten to institute a shipping tie-up.

THE CITIZENS' ALLIANCE FOR GOOD GOVERNMENT OF QUEENS COUNTY

The above organization, which is successor of the German-American Alliance in Queens County, New York, has adopted resolutions calling upon all "real American" members of the American Legion to resign from that organization. It recommends that the men join the "World War Veterans" "as an ideal American association". As has been previously noted the World War Veterans is practically the only radical organization consisting of ex-service men in this district.

In their preamble the resolutions set forth the following: The present leaders and managers of the American Legion have become agents for the British government in carrying out its propaganda in the United States against liberty and justice, instead of spreading the gospel of brotherhood and democracy, the very principles we entered the World War for."

The resolutions then criticised the action of the American. Legion in dropping from their rolls Lieut. Colonel Anderson for his participation in the meeting held on Feb. 28th at Madison Square Garden against the "Horrors on the Rhine".

The Citizens' Alliance succeeded the "Good Government League" which was in turn preceded by the "German-American Alliance", which organization was active during 1915 in urging the nomination of German candidates for offices in the United States.

6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS.

RAILROAD WORKEPS

At a meeting held in New York on April 3rd, at which about three hundred representatives of the various railroad crafts were present, at Horton Hall, 110 East 25th St., plans were laid for the organization of a Railroad District Council for about two hundred thousand railroad workers of all crafts in the New York district.

The chairman of the meeting was NATHAN SPAIR, President of the New York District Council of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees.

According to Mr. Spair, the object of the meeting was not to fight wage reductions locally, but to give better support to the national officials in their fight against wage reductions.

It is expected that further meetings will be held in the near future.

INTERNATIONAL LADIES' GARMENT WORKERS UNION

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On the 4th inst. Justice Delehanty in the Supreme Court, New York City, heard argument in the application of the firm of S. BORGENICHI & SONS for an injunction against the above Union to restrain it from conducting a strike at the above Company's factory. In ordering submission of briefs by attorneys for the plaintiffs and defendants, Justice Delehanty said:

"Employees on strike must realize that while they have the right to strike, other men and women have the right to work without hindrance and striking employees must understand that those who desire to work will be protected by the courts."

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The strike has been going on sime November, 1920, at which time, the Union claims, the Company broke its agreement which was entered into with the Union.

NECKWEAR MAKERS UNION

Supreme Court Justice Newberger, New York, on the 4th inst. granted a temporary injunction to the I. D. Wolfson Co., 1587 Broadway, against the above Union, restraining striking members of the Union from picketing the factory of the Company, pending the hearing on this suit against the Union for Twenty-five Thousand Dollars damages.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

Supreme Court Justice Joseph E. Newberger on the 4th inst. signed an order modifying the temporary injunction which he granted on March 31st to J. Friedman & Co., Inc., against the above Union and certain of its members. Further hearings in this case will be held on Monday, Aprill11th when attorneys for Friedman & Co. will make application for a continuance of the injunction.

In modifying the temporary injunction Justice Newberger ordered that the words in the injunction which restrained the Amalgamated "from instigating, waging or continuing a strike against plaintiff or among plaintiff's employees" be stricken out.

The union has made the statement that the Million Dollar fund which was collected to help support the so-called locked out members of the union, has been oversubscribed by Twenty-three Thousand Three Hundred and Ninety-seven Dollars (\$23,397.00).

9 On the 7th inst. attorneys for S. D. Levey & Co., Clothing Manufacturers with a plant at the Bush Terminal, Brooklyn, applied to Supreme Court Justice MacCrate for an injunction restraining the above union from interfering with the employees of the Company. The Company charged the union with intimidating the workers during the strike which has been in progress for some months. Justice MacCrate reserved decision.

NEW YORK EMPLOYING PRINTERS' ASSOCIATION

The above Association, which has been attempting to arrive at a wage basis with the eight thousand workers whom it employs, has submitted to the Board of Arbitrators, consisting of WILLIAM F. OGBURN, Professor of Economics at Barnard College; ALLEN T. BURNS, Director of Methods of Americanization of the Carnegie Corporation and RAYMOND D. FOSDICK, formerly Commissioner of Accounts under the late Mayor Gaynor.

The proposal of the employers includes a reduction in wages of about twenty-five per cent, to become effective this month, and a forty-eight hour week, while the counter demands of the Pressmen's Union includes increases in wages varying from Seven Dollars to Ten Dollars a week and the forty-four hour week. It is expected that in the course of a few days the leading representatives will also submit a brief to the Board of Arbitration. fjr

7. UNEMPLOYMENT

The statement has been made by HENRY C. HUNTER, Counsellor for the New York and New Jersey Dry Dock Association, that only one half as many men are employed in American shipyards today as were employed one year ago.

From a statement made by the Contracting Dock Builders Association of New York, there are only about five hundred dock builders employed at this time as against three thousand a year ago.

The Dock Builders' Association points out that before the War Dock Builders received \$24.00 a week; Engineers \$27.00 and cement workers \$10.50 to \$14.00 all for a forty-eight hour week, and since then wages have been increased to \$8.00 a day for dock builders, \$6.50 a day for cement workers and engineers for a forty-four hour week.

The Cunard Steamship Co. and the Luckenbach Lines claim that they are only awaiting a fair reduction in wages in order to spend several million dollars on port improvements.

There has recently been held a meeting of the so-called unemployment conference consisting entirely of radicals, at which plans were laid for a mass meeting to be held some time in the future at Madison Square Garden. It is quite unlikely, however, that the above meeting will ever take place as, so far, the only work which seems to have been accomplished is the appointment of a committee on program. The main factors in this movement were CARROLL of the Public Service Organization and MCCLELLAN of the I. W. W.

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9. NEGRO ACTIVITIES

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NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PEOPLE

The above association is organizing a drive to increase its membership to two hundred and fifty thousand. The drive will end on May 15th. The entire country will be covered, plans for the campaign having been laid at a number of regional conferences which have been held in the main centers of the association.

BLACK STAR STEAMSHIP LINE

As previously reported, there are a number of Negroes now in New York awaiting the return of Marcus Garvey and the sailing of the ship which he had advertised would leave the port of New York for Liberia on March 24th. In his absence, one PLUMMER is attempting to placate these people who have sold all their belongings and have brough their baggage to this city.

From confidential source it has been learned that Garvey had sold steamship reservations to the amount of at least a few thousand dollars prior to his departure from New York. Plummer is also said to have made the statement that the Postal Department may soon charge Garvey with using the mails in a scheme to defraud, In view of the fact that he has used the mails in the furtherance of his Black Star Line activities.

MEETINGS.

On the 3rd inst. Professor BOAS of Columbia University, spoke at the Radical Forum, 131st St. & Seventh Ave., with CHANDLER OWEN, a well known Negro radical, acting as chairman. The Professor's subject was "The Inferiority of Races", and he stated in the course of his speech that he advocated the mixing of the colored and white races, as the offspring of mixed racial marriages were invariably stronger than those of the pure races. While Professor Boas was discoursing on this subject MOORE, another pronounced Negro radical, interrupted the meeting by rising and strongly urging all those present to adopt Bolshevism as the only means by which to settle the race problem.

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MARCUS GARVEY

The above individual, according to latest confidential sources is still in Jamaica, B. W. I., on his speaking tour. It is understood from the same source that he is accompanied on his trip by a woman known as AMY JACQUES, with whom it is alleged he has been living since his trouble with his lawful wife some months ago. The girl is known generally as his private secretary.

Most of the New York Negro papers have been running news articles in which they raise the question as to whether Garvey will be permitted to return to the United States, for the reason that he is known as an agitator and has had a baneful influence on the Negro population of this country.

IRISH-AMERICAN LABOR LEAGUE

Under the auspices of the above organization a meeting was held on April 5th at Bohemian National Hall, 321 East 73rd St., New York, which was attended by several hundred men and women.

THOMAS F. RYAN, Business Agent of the Warehousemen's Union and a director of the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic, made a speech which was extremely bitter and in the course of which he stated: "You used to hear them say, 'don't bite the hand that fed you'. America never fed me. I have fed myself. I owe nothing to America. No Irishman owes anything to America, but America can never repay the debt she owes to Ireland." He later added: "Ireland is not fighting England. Ireland is fighting America. The Liberty Bonds--I should say the slavery bonds-you bought are keeping the Black and Tans in Ireland". Another remark of Ryan's was to the effect that the Irish in America had "sent their boys overseas to make the world safe for the British empire" and that they had been gulled into "going out and waving flags and being one hundred per cent jackasses". Ryan thereafter pointed out to his audience that in 1917, when the United States declared war against Germany if the Irish in this country had been worth a damn they would have gone to Washington and told the Englishman in the Presidential chair that not an Irishman nor the son of an Irishman would don a uniform and fight until Ireland Was liberated.

After the meeting JOHN L. JONES, representative in this country of the British Labor Party, left for the coal fields of West Virginia where he will agitate amongst the miners and explain to them the position of the coal mine strikers in England. Jones, in addressing the meeting, stated that a labor government would be in control in Great Britain within the next few weeks.

The Chairman of the meeting was THOMAS J. OFLAHERTY, eaitor of "The Irish People", a Socialistic Irish publication, the first issue of which was published within the past few months.

12. RUSSIAN AFFAIRS ABROAD

On the 6th inst. Captain HUGH H. MARTIN, who for over three years, was in Russia in the Diplomatic Service of the United States Government, made an address before the Merchants' Association at the Astor Hotel, New York. Captain Martin described the methods by which twenty leaders with less than half a million followers gained mastery over a nation of more than one hundred and fifty million people. He warned his hearers that Bolshevism was not going through a period of evolution or betterment.

In describing the methods used by the Bolsheviks to maintain their grip, Captain Martin stated that it was based absolutely on terror and that Russia is dying today because her industry is gone, having been destroyed by Bolshevism.

It has been learned that Dr. Morris Zuker of Brooklyn, New York, has just arrived at Reval, Esthonia, after spending about five months in Russia.

Zuker was convicted before the United States District Court in Brooklyn, New York, in January 1919, was released on bail and a year later surrendered to the authorities with the request that he be deported to Russia. Zuker's request was granted. In a long statement made on his arrival at Reval, he said that he had spent most of his time while in Russia in prison, by order of <u>Santeri Nuorteva</u> and that conditions in Russia are steadily becoming worse.

He bitterly criticized the present school system in the United States.

FACTS DEVELOPED HUDSON PRICE, Associate Editor of the "Negro World", who visited President King of Liberia in Washington yesterday, gave me the result of his conference today. Price said that Johnson, a member of the King Liberian delegation, was very much incensed and displeased at the poor reception given to them in Washington. He claimed that they were slighted by the U. S. A. who had invited them here; that after being there in Washington three weeks, there was not even a pretense of granting them an interview until Friday of this week and so far this is the worst treatment they had from any other power. King told Price that he was not going to accept a loan from the U.S. with any of the conditions which were attached to it last year; it must be a loan which guarantees to Liberia their sovereignty. He also said that even if he gets a U.S. loan, he would still be open for a loan from private Johnson in expressing his displeasure at the way the U.S. sources. treated them, told Price that on one occasion they, the Liberian Government, had some dispute with native African tribes. They sked the aid of the U.S.A., who sent down a gunboat to Monrovia in answer to their call, but when they arrived there, the Captain and crew of the U. and many other European cities and has always been treated with far more courtesy than he and his delegation are now receiving from the U.S.

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Johnson said he is a member of Garvey's Association, having joined the branch in Monrovia and spoke for them there a few weeks before leaving. He will speak next week before the Philadelphia branch of Garvey's Association and afterwards he is booked to speak in New York Liberty Hall. He told Price, that the teaching of Garvey which says that he is using Liberia as a 'base' for conquering Africa should be cut out as it is an unwise policy.


In regard to the general trades-men, they claim they will not accept reduction but it seems as though they will have to accept reductions by May 1.

I had a conversation today with two of the officials of Garvey's Black Star Association, one, the circulation manager of the Negro World and the other, a fellow named PLULMLER who is known as the head of Garvey's field force or diplomatic corps. He is supposed to gather all information and solve the problems which might get Garvey or the Association in trouble. Plunmer told me that there werea number of persons who were here from Detroit and other points in the South, awaiting the sailing of a ship for Africa as per Garvey's misleading advertisement in the Negro World of a few weeks ago, which said that his ship would be sailing on March 24th, another in April, etc.

Plummer said that these poor misguided followers had sold their belongings and were here with their baggage and not the very slightest prospect was there of even acquiring a ship.

I also learned from Plummer that Garvey had sold quite a lot of tickets amounting probably to a few thousand dollars. However, Plummer and the circulation manager told me that they fear very much that the U. S. Postal Department will soon charge Garvey with using the mails to defraud. 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FACTS DEVELOPED

Pursuant to instructions, I interviewed one GEORGE VAUGHN, who is a delegate to the Unemployment Conference, which move has been started by the Amalgamated Metal Workers. He, (Vaughn), informed me that this move had been started by the above organization with the help of A. Shields who had the word of the technical engineers that they with their vast knowledge would furnish all statistics on the unemployment question. The organization that sent delegates were seven from the Communist Group, about fourteen I. W. W. locals, about sixteen from the Painters locals and all of the Amalgamated Metal Workers locals, the 'Aircraft Workers, the Hotel Workers, Public Service Organizations and also from the Printers and Publishers. The ones who organized the move were a man named Howard from the Public Utility Workers, a man named Kelly from the Amalgamated Metal Workers and Shield and Vaughn from the Frinters and Publishers and Beyer of the Defense. At the conference the program was discussed in which it was decided to elect a committee on program and they brought in the following recommendation; That we urge the Government to start trade relations with Russia; that we urge all labor organizations to send delegates to this conference; that we urge all locals to contribute as much as possible to further Ros the work of this conference, and to call a large unemployment meeting at Madison Square Garden. After these recommendations were adopted, it was decided to elect a committee of action of 15 men. This c Reference: Copies of This Report Furnished To: 3. om-

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mittee was instructed to draw up a letter to be written in circular form to be distributed far and wide. At the following conference the committee reported that they had done nothing, as the time had been too short between the conferences to do anything. At this conference they were again instructed to draw up the letter, and also to make arrangements to hold open air unemployment meetings. Vaughn is a member of the Committee of action and stated that the Committee has not done a thing as yet because the men vary too much in opinion; and, from what he can see, they, the committee, will never do anything.

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
Therefore, some of the Committee, headed by Carroll of the Public Service, under the auspices of the Public Service, called a caucus meeting of delegates of the conference in the Public Service Hall on East 83rd St., there being about twenty delegates present, four Communists, some painters and I. W. W. At this meeting a committee of action was elected to get in touch with the committee of action of the conference and learn if they had done anything, and if not, the Committee of Action of this caucus was to take the matter in hand and call at all labor organizations and also call unemployment open air meetings and, if possible, to ask the Committee of Action of the Conference to call a meeting of the Conference as soon as possible.



1-A. STRIKE NOTES FEATHER BOA MAKERS UNION

As a result of the signing of an agreement between the Marabou & Ostrich Manufacturers Association and the above Union, the strike, which has been going on for some weeks, was practically brought to a close. The agreement included the following demands which had been made by the Union: closed shop, forty-four hour week, same wage scale as 1920, the discharge of scabs who do not join the Union within one week and no discrimination against workers who were active in the strike.

HOUSE WRECKERS UNION

At a meeting of the above Union, held in New York on the lst inst. six hundred members voted unanimously to reject the proposals of the employers--The Demolition Contractors' Protective Association, Inc., which included wage reductions of from twenty-five to forty per cent. The members also voted that unless some amicable arrangement could be made with the employers, they, the Union, would go on strike on May 2nd.

POLITICAL AMNESTY COMMITTEE

ADOLPH GERMER, Director of the Political Amnesty Committee, headquarters at 7 East 15th St. (Rand School), on the 29th of March made a request of E. L. Ream, Assistant Secretary of Cooper Union, to engage the hall for some night during the coming week. Ream asked for a list of the speakers and was told that they included MORRIS HILLQUIT, PHILIP FRANCIS, the Rev. JOHN HAYNES HOLMES, JUDAH L. MAGNES and LEON H. ROUSE, President of the Typographical Union. Later on in the day Mr. Ream informed Germer over the telephone that the managers of Cooper Union did not wish to have the meeting held there.

After a meeting of the above body on the 28th of March it was announced that the proposed activities of the Committee to be held in Washington on April 13th and 14th would consist of the following program:

1. Presentation of petitions to Congress. These petitions will be presented by a committee chosen by the conference to be held on the evening of the 13th. The committee will be escorted to the steps of the Capitol by the entire delegation.

2. A delegation to visit and interview President Harding.

3. A delegation to visit and interview Attorney General Daugherty.

4. A mass meeting at the Masonic Temple on the evening of the 13th.

5. Personal interview with representatives and senators on the 14th of April.

SOVIET RUSSIA MEDICAL RELIEF COMMITTEE

4

The above organization has made the announcement that it is arranging to send another cargo of medical and children's supplies on the S. S. "Pittsburgh Bridge" of the Susquehanna Steamship Line, which is due to sail during the first week of April. The organization at the same time made the statement that recent advices received from Russia indicated that the need of the children of Soviet Russia is most urgent in view of the recent counter revolutionary moves.

The statement charged that large amounts of money and supplies collected in this country by the Red Cross and other organizations for the relief of suffering Europe were used directly or indirectly to support the invaders of Soviet Russia. The Committee further suggested that during the coming month every city and community should set aside one week to be known as "Children's Week of Soviet Russia", for the purpose of collecting funds and supplies for shipment to that country.

SOCIALISTS

HENRY JAGER, Socialist Assemblyman from the 14th District of Kings, was ousted by the New York State Assembly which accepted the conclusion of the Judiciary Committee that he was a resident of Jersey and not of New York. No attempt was made to evict the other two Socialists, CHARLES SOLOMON of Kings and SAMUEL A. ORR of the Bronx.

Seven hours debate preceded the final roll call which showed seventy-six (76) for and sixty-two (62) against unseating.

The ouster proceedings were led by Assemblyman GEORGE ROWE of Buffalo, who claimed that all of Jager's alleged residences in Kings Alternation and a structure ので、「「

County were small furnished rooms and the testimony of witnessed called tended to show that Jager regarded Maywood, New Jersey as his home.

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UNION OF RUSSIAN WORKERS

It has been learned from a confidential source that many members of this organization, which makes its headquarters at 83 fast 7th St., are carrying revolvers and one BEREZOWSKY has made the statement. that the American policemen must be shown that the Russian anarchists mean business.

UNITED RUSSIAN PROFESSIONAL UNIONS

There has been little activity during the current week in the above circles.

PAWLOFF, who was formerly connected with the Detroit branch, has been in New York since the Convention of the Third All-Colonial up till recently when he went to Philadelphia where he will meet one BELOPOL and remain in that city for several days.

According to confidential advices, there seems to have been a split in the ranks of the "Americanskye Izvestia" and it is thought that one faction will finally sue the other for possession of the linotype machines which are at present in possession of a group headed by GORODIENKO..

There seems to have been renewed activity in the Connecticut branches of the Unions, requests having been made from three towns to have agitators sent there. This information has been conveyed to the Hartford office in which district the towns lie.

3. INDIVIDUALS

BENJAMIN GITLOW

The conviction of the above individual, formerly New York State Assemblyman, sentenced to not less than five years imprisonment under the State Griminal Anarchy Act, was affirmed on the 1st inst. by Justice Laughlin of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, the other members of the Court concurring.

The charge against Gitlow was that he feloniously advocated, advised and taught the duty, the necessity and propriety of overthrowing and overturning organized government by force, violence and unlawful means.

After reviewing the revolutionary teachings in the left wing' manifesto, published July 5, 1919 in the 'Revolutionary Age', Justice Laughlin says in part:

"I cannot subscribe to the doctrine that it is not competent for the legislature to forbid the advocacy of such a doctrine designed and intended to overthrow government in this manner until it can be shown that there is a present or immediate danger that it will be successful**

"The doctrines advocated are not harmless. They are a menace and it behooves Americans to be on their guard to meet and combat the movement, which, if permitted to progress, as contemplated, may undermine and endanger our cherished institutions of liberty and equality*****

"But if immigration is properly supervised and restricted,

and people become aroused to the danger to be apprehended from the propaganda of class prejudice and hatred carried on by a very small minority, mostly of foreign birth which has for its object, not only the overthrow of government, but the destruction of civilization and all the innumerable benefits it has brought to mankind, there can be no doubt that the God-fearing, liberty-loving American, both in the urban and rural communities who appreciate the equal liberties for all for bettering their status and every advancement afforded by our constitutional form of government under which the majority rule and have made and are making sacrifices to improve their conditions and that of their families, and accumulate property for themselves and for those who come after them, will see to it that these pernicious doctrines are not permitted to take root in America."

5. RADICAL MEETINGS

SOCIETY FOR THE RELIEF OF SOVIET RUSSIAm

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A meeting was held at the Lexington Opera House on the afternoon of March 27th, the chairmen being J. W. Hartmann, editor of "Sovie Russia", who served temporarily, and Dr. Isaac A. Hourwich, formerly counsel to the Soviet Bureau in this city. Other speakers were HARRY WATON and CHARLES ASHLEIGH an I. W. W.

The object of the meeting was to protest against the "three year old campaign of lies and falsification against Soviet Russia" and the mention of any of the New York leading dailies was met with derision.

Professor Hartmann stated, that despite the apparently unfriendly tone of Secretary of State Hughes' note to the Soviet republic he could not help the feeling that it would benefit the Soviet government, and said that the audience were there to rejoice in the triumph of the Russian proletariat over its enemies and the victory of Communism over capitalism.

Harry Waton, in the course of his speech, prophesied that within a short time negotiations for trade relations would be entered into between the United States and Russia and added that within a short time "a new psychology will be created, the capitalist press will help and in a short time they will kiss the cheeks of Lenin and Trotzky".

BROOKWOOD SCHOOL

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On the 31st of March a number of radical labor leaders from various parts of the country assembled at the Brookwood School, Katonah, New York, for the purpose of framing plans to establish a new Socialist college. Amongst those who were said to have been present at the conference, which lasted two days, were W. Z. FOSTER, leader of the recent steel strike in the Pittsburgh district; JAMES H. MAURER, President of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor; JOHN FITZPATRICK. President of the Illinois State "ederation of Labor; JOHN BROPHY, District President of the United Mine Workers of America; JOSEPH SCHLOSS-BERG, Secretary of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America; MISS ROSE SCHNEIDERMANN of the Women's Trade Union League; JAY G. BROWN, President of the International Timber Workers Union and A. J. MUSTE. Executive Secretary of the Amalgamated Textile Workers of America. Amongst the speakers was, also HENRY DANA, former Professor of English Literature in Columbia University. It is impossible at this time to learn the progress made by the conference..

H. R. BROGHAM, publicity man for the conference stated that the "four fundamental tenets" upon which the conference was held, were:

First, that a new social order is needed and is coming--in fact, that it is already on the way.

Second, that education will not only hasten its coming, but will reduce to a minimum and perhaps do away entirely with a resort to violence methods.

Third, that the workers are the ones who will usher in this new order.

11 Fourth, that there is immediate need for a workers college with a broad curriculum, located amidst healthful country surroundings where the students can completely apply themselves to the tasks at hand. \mathbf{x} .

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6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS

BUILDING TRADES EMPLOYERS' ASS'N. ESSEX CO., N. J.

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The above Association has made the announcement that commencing May 1st, a wage cut will take effect in thirteen trades.

According to the statement, bricklayers' pay and masons' will be cut from Ten Dollars to Nine Dollars a day; sheet metal workers' from Nine to Eight Dollars; plumbers' from Ten to Eight Dollars; steam fitters helper's from Seven to Five Dollars; iron workers' from Nine to Eight Dollars; wood and metal lathers' from Nine to Eight Dollars; mill workers' from Six Dollars and Eighty Cents to Five Dollars and Sixty Cents; hod carriers' and masons' helpers' from Seven to Five Dollars and Sixty Cents. Carpenters, painters, decorators and paper hangers will not be affected by the order.

A meeting of the Newark Building Trades of the Central Labor Union will be held shortly to consider the new scale, and William J. Lyons, President of the organization, has made the statement that he could not express the attitude of the men toward the wage cut until the meeting.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

The suit against the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America for the dissolution of the Union and for Five Hundred Thousand Dollars damages, brought against SIDNEY HILLMAN individually and as General President of the Amalgamated, and other officials of that organization, as well as against the New York Joint Board, by J. FRIEDMAN & CO., INC. was dismissed by Justice Nathan Bijur in the Supreme Court, New York, on the 29th of March.

The decision of Justice Bijur sets aside the previous rulings of two other Supreme Court justices and holds that the suit brought by J. Friedman & Co., Inc., in the recent strike troubles was without sufficient grounds to formulate an opinion.

Decisions had been handed down by Justices Mitchell L. Erlanger and Joseph E. Newberger favorable to the clothing manufacturing firm. Justice Bijur not only set these aside, but gave the Amalgamated workers the benefit of a complete victory.

The proceedings were started by J. Friedman & Co. against the Amalgamated on three points, the first asking the dissolution of the Union as unlawful, the second asking an injunction to prevent the Union from picketing the Company's five factories and the third asking damages of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars against the Union. ないたいであるというとうない

In Justice Bijur's decision the defendant's action for dismissal of the suit was granted with Ten Dollars costs, with leave for the plaintiff to plead over within twenty days.

Harry Gordon, attorney for the Clothing Manufacturer's Association, announced that he would avail himself of this opportunity and stated that all that was needed to be done was to amend the wording of the plea.

On the 30th of March Justice JAMES C. VAN SICLEN in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, handed down a decision declaring that picketing of the clothing factory of Schwartz & Jaffee, Inc., at the Bush Terminal, Bay Ridge, was unlawful.

The Court said that peaceful picketing was not necessary to inform the public of the strike and that, therefore, it was unlawful. The Justice called attention to the fact that while the Union disputes the right of the concern to make individual contracts with its present employees, it does not dispute the legality of the wage contracts from 1914 to 1919. The strike was declared by the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America against Schwartz & Jaffee, Inc., in December, 1920, and since that time the picketing has resulted at different times in acts of violence. The Union admitted that picketing was being carried on, but stated that it was done by individuals and not by order of the Union or Sidney Hillman, General President, who was named as the defendant. Fart of the decision of Justice Van Siclen, which may be of interest to the Bureau, reads as follows:

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"The issue between the parties is nothing more than the old conflict between capital and labor. The swing of the pendulum is influenced almost entirely by the law of supply and demand, and neither capital nor labor at any time is satisfied to be the governed by the length or sweep to and fro. Prior to December 1920, when the trouble between the parties hereto became acute, and from 1914 to the last mentioned date, the swing was entirely to the side of labor, enabling it to force upon capital demands and contracts of employment exclusive as to non-union or unorganized workers and therefore oppressive.

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"Now, and perhaps for a few years to come, the pendulum swing will be to the side of capital, which, in turn will force upon labor contracts equally oppressive and exclusive as to union or organized workers. It will be seen that at no time is there what may be termed the true 'open shop'.-----

"A peculiar slant to the whole situation is that the worker of today may become the master of to-morrow. From the radical to the conservative by mere change of circumstances and position. Mevertheless there will be no change in their relationship. When capital has the upper hand it will continue to grind down labor and when labor is in the ascendant it will in turn continue to harass, eheat and seek to either control or destroy capital. Neither, at any time, is willing to give quid proquo, and the never ceasing conflict goes on.-----

After discussing the Court's duty in the matter, Justice Van Siclen said:

"They (the Courts) must stand at all times as the representatives of capital, of captains of industry, devoted to the principle of individual initiative, protect property and persons from violation and destruction, strongly opposed to all schemes for the nationalization of industry and yet save labor from oppression and conciliatory toward the removal of the workers' just grievances. The prosperity of the United States depends upon constructive legislation backed by judicial interpretation and strict enforcement."

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At a meeting held at the Lafayette Building, 131st St. & Seventh Avenue, New York, on the afternoon of March 27th, the principal speaker was WALTER WHITE, Field Secretary of the above Association.

White, whose complexion is so fair that he is very easily mistaken for a white man, stated that he had recently returned from a trip to the South and described conditions there as shameful and a disgrace to the United States. He also told his audience that he is a firm believer in social revolution amongst the Negroes and did not believe in passive resistence. He added that he believed, also, in the theories of Bolshevism and advised his hearers that the time was now ripe for the formation by the Negroes of radical and cooperative societies, pending the arrival of the social revolution, just as the Russians did prior to the overthrow of the Czar.

Amongst the colored radicals present at the meeting were MOORE, CHANDLER OWEN, PATTERSON, POTTER, CAMPBELL, CARPENTER, DOMINGO, LIGGETT and MISS GRACE CAMPBELL.

FRIENDS OF IRISH FREEDOM

A meeting of the above organization was held at the Lexington Opera House, New York, on the 27th inst., at which Supreme Court Justice Daniel F. Cohalan in an address stated that:

"Not a ship lands from England or France that is not loaded down with people who are coming here to endanger our interests and to work more or less openly against our ideals------

"We should tolerate no longer these attempts in the name of America to divide our people into groups and factions."



The Chair made it further understood that the labor organization, of each of the Latin-American countries be proceeded with on the American plan, into Unions for crafts, trades and callings and not after the I. W. W. fashion, which had been proposed by the Latin-American countries. In fact Mr. Gompers made it thoroughly understood that no radical element was to take part or issue in any of the deliberations. The next meeting of this organization was to take place sometime in 1920 in Mexico. No information is available as to whether the proposed meeting ever took place.

JOHN CRAWDON, WILLIAM ELLIS, JOHN O'KEAN, ROODLY: Examination of our files, telephone, city and postal directories failed to disclose any information as to the probable whereabouts of above named persons. Inquiry of prominent labor chiefs elicited the information that these persons are unknown to them, nor have they ever heard them discussed in labor meetings or conferences.

It is probable that these names may be the aliases of some well known Communists or Bolshevists.

No one by the name of Reitler is connected with either firm. CUSTOMS OFFICIALS BAXTER & LEADERSON: Inquiry at Personnel Bureau of Customs and Immigration Services elicited the information that neither of these persons are or have ever been employed by the above mentioned branches of the Government in or about the City of New York. WEINSTOCK, alias FRED COLLINS: Steamship "Port Curtis" arrived in New York City from Hamburg on March 5, 1921, as a cargo ship, carrying no passengers. Crew numbered seventy men. Crew lists disclosed no one by name of Weinstock or Fred Collins. Among crew, however, there is one Thomas J. Collins, a fireman and British subject. A seaman's card bearing No. 121374 was issued to him March 9, 1921. Ship sailed March 27, 1921, for Amstralian ports.

FACTS DEVELOPED:

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Acting under instructions of Agent in Charge Holdridge, and continuing reports in the above matter, Agent obtained the following information in regard to industrial unrest.

Strikes still in effect at Albany, Troy, Watervliet, Cohoes, and Rensselaer, N.Y. -- United Traction Company employees numbering 1500 are still on strike. The cars are being run regularly during the day with strikebreakers but hardly any passengers are being carried. No indications of radicalism are being injected into the contest, though occasional clashes between strike sympathizers and non-union employees occur.

At Schenectady, N.Y., 300 molders at the General Electric Plant are still out on strike. The molding work for this company is being done in small plants in the District and a strike at the SWEET & DOYLE COMPANY plant at Green Island, N.Y. and also at the Albany Foundry Co. at Albany has resulted in the last named two plants being run as open shops with frequent clashes between the workers and the striking union molders.

JAt Amsterdam, N.Y. 600 carpet workers are still out.

At Troy, N.Y. notice of a reduction of 15% was served on all classes of labor employed in the construction of a new armory to take effect, April 1st, when the workers informed the contractor the cut would not be accepted they were all laid off forthwith.

The Burden Horse Shoe Works at Troy, N.Y. put to work 500 employees.

At Cohoes, N.Y. the Harmony Mills (textile) laid off 500 employees.

The N.Y.C.R.R. put back 1000 employees to work at their repair shops at West Albany, N.Y.

The International Harvestor works reduced the pay of 450 employees at their plant at Auburn, N.Y. 10% to 20%. No disturbance occurred.

The coal handlers numbering 300 employed by the retail coal dealers of Albany had their wages reduced \$2.00 weekly each. No disturbance occurred.

The Standard Oil Co. at Oswego, N.Y. have reduced the pay of their employees in their box factory 10%.

At Utica, N.Y. the builders have announced they will pay 15% less to their employees May 1st. The unions have decided to strike against the proposed cut, their membership is above 2000.

The N.Y. State Railway of ficials have a meeting scheduled for April 1st, 1921, to agree upon a new scale of wages generally expected to be a reduction of 15% to 25%.

FACTS DEVELOPED:

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The strike situation at the plant of the Pierce, Butler and Pierce Company at Eastwood, New York remains unchanged. No further violence has been attempted during the past week and no further trouble is expected.

In regard to the Railroad strike situation, I have been informed by railroad men and others who are in a position to know the situation, that there is no danger of a **rai**lroad strike now nor in the immediate future because it is estimated that a great percentage of organization men are out of work at the present time and in the event of a strike these men and former railroad men would besiege the railroad offices and that the railroads would not be tied up for more than twenty minutes, as one man expressed it.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the above party it was announced by JAMES BATTISTONI that he had attended a meeting of the National Executive Committee in New York, and while there discussed the condition of the Buffalo Local, and had succeeded in getting an outside man for Buffalo, who will be either CLAESSENS or GORMER; that this man will come here for quite a time after the membership drive in New York is over.

At Fleming's hall, corner of Genesee and Spring streets, a meeting of the study class of the Socialist Industrial League was held. This meeting was attended by 26 members. The principal business transacted was the reading of a letter received from J. KERACHER of Detroit in regard to the proposed unity between the two existing organizations of Proletarian Party of America with Socialist Industrial League. He explained the matter is under consideration by both organizations and the unity will be effected probably within a month or so and the local S.I.L. will be advised of it by its headquarters in proper way and the proposition will be submitted for consideration of all branches throughout the country in due time. While his letter from J. Keracher contained personal news how far the negotiations went in this respect, and that Keracher, Harris and Richter are much in favor of this unity. 

1-A. STRIKE NOTES.

JOURNEYMEN TAILORS UNION

On the 21st inst. two thousand members of the Union went on strike after having held a meeting at Bohemian National Hall, 321 E. 73rd St., New York, where strike headquarters were immediately established.

The striking tailors demand a forty-four hour week and Forty Dollars minimum wage and the abolition of home work. A settlement committee will conduct negotiations with the shops agreeing to these conditions.

FEATHER BOA MAKERS UNION

As a result of agreements made between representatives of the Union and the manufacturers about three hundred workers returned to their places during the current week.

MARINE ENGINEERS BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION

Thomas B. Healy, General Manager of the above Association, on the 23rd inst. issued orders to all engineers on ocean-going tugs whose owners have cut wages, to quit work immediately. As most of one hundred and fifty vessels that are affected are now at sea, it will be several days before the order is generally effected.

Healy claimed that in the strike the engineers expected the assistance of the licensed deck officers and the firemen crews, in all about two thousand men. The order to strike, according to healy, is the result of reductions in wages of from Thirty-five to Fifty Dollars a month of men who have been receiving from \$210. to \$275. a month and follows an authorization from the National Executive Board of the Engineers Association.

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C. G. Hannah, President of the Atlantic Coast Tugboat Owners' Association, on the same date, stated that it was not expected that much difficulty would be experienced in filling the places of the men who struck. He estimated that not more than twenty-five per cent of the tugs were in service, leaving many men from whom to recruit crews.

Walter B. Pollock, Marine Superintendent of the New York Central Lines, on the same day, declared that five hundred of the eight hundred men in his department had agreed to accept deductions in wages ranging from fifteen to twenty per cent to become effective on April 1st. and the second second

SHIRT MAKERS UNION

The strike of the above Union, which has lasted for some months, has been practically ended, due, it is claimed, to the removal of the general depression in the industry which has lasted for about seven months.

NECKWEAR WORKERS UNION

The strike, which has been conducted by the above union and affiliated organizations since October 25, 1920, is likely to be brought to a close in a very short time as a result of settlements made between the strikers and their employers. During the current week a large number have returned to work, there being only a few shops that are still fighting the union.

2. RADICAL ORGANIZATIONS.

JEWISH DIVISION OF THE PEOPLE'S COMMISSARIAT FOR NATIONALITIES

The above organization, of which Dr. D. Dubrowsky is the head, on the 22nd inst. shipped to Moscow aboard the S. S. "Lackawanna Valley' a large lot of goods which were contributed to the various organizations affiliated with the above named. Amongst the goods sent were also one hundred thousand writing tablets sent to the children of Soviet Russia by the "New York Call".

SOCIALISTS

Miss SARAH HYAMS, a teacher of cooking in the Public Schools, has been charged by Dr. ETTINGER, Superintendent of Schools, with being "totally unfit to remain in the service of the Board of Education" In support of his charges Dr. Ettinger presented a photostat copy of an application card of the left wing section of the Socialist Party signed by Miss Hyams. Miss Hyams stated that she signed the application card, but never joined the left wing party, never took part in its activities and did not believe in violence under any circumstances.

NAKSAR BEN, local Socialist, is very active in obtaining signatures for the appeal for amnesty for all political prisoners and up to date has received about seven hundred and eighty (780) signatures.

0240 BRANSTETTER, National Secretary of the above Party, who has recently returned from a trip to Atlanta, Ga., where he visited EUGENE V. DEBS in the Federal Penitentiary, is responsible for the statement that Debs has not been mistreated during the time of his service in the Penitentiary.

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Under the auspices of AUGUST CLAESSENS' Public Speaking Class a debate was held at the Rand School on the 20th inst, the subject of debate being:

Resolved: The acceptance unconditionally by the American radical movement of the twenty-one points as laid down by the Third International for the progress of social revolution in America.

The affirmative was taken by GEORGE LEWIS, ALFRED LOSSOFF and SAMUEL KRIEGER and the negative by ISADOR EDELMAN, MISS C. BRISTOL and AL. EDEMAN. and the second second

Lewis opened the debate by stating that the twenty-one points were necessary and should be adopted as directed by the Third Internationa; Isador Edelman stated that he would accept the twenty-one points if they did not advocate armed insurrection and illegal tactics, as the present order permits the Socialists to openly convert the masses and that the twenty-one points are not applicable in this country at this time because, as they were foreign they were not as yet understood by the American masses.

LOSOFF then stated that nothing could be gained by reforms and compromises; that the only weapon is armed insurrection; that the workers should arm themselves with guns.

Miss Bristol stated that while she was in favor of the twentyone points she was not in favor of their adoption at this time as the

people were not ready for them and were satisfied with the present form of government.

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Samuel Krieger and Al. Leeman also followed with short speeches which were of little interest.

There were about forty people present.

AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

During the current week the above organization made the statement that the "struggle for the maintenance of civil liberties and for the checking of reaction in the United States" was being most strenuously fought in Pacific Northwest. The organization also added that interference with radical meetings and prosecutions are on the decline taking the country on the whole.

There has been little activity during the current week in the above circles and none that would be of interest to the Bureau at this time.

UNITED RUSSIAN PROFESSIONAL UNIONS

There has been little activity in the above circles of which the Bureau has not already been advised by Agent Scully in special reports.

There appears to have been further dissension between the Second All-Colonial and the Third, because the Second has been making demands upon the Third for the money belonging to the "Svoboda Line".

It appears the money was given to GORODIENKO of the above Unions by the Treasurer of the Svoboda, KONSTANTINOWITCH, and the Third AllColonial has decided to use the money for publishing of "Americanskye Izvestia".

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It was finally decided that the United Russian Professional Unions will send two members of the Executive Committee to a meeting of the Third All-Colonial at which the matter will be threshed out.

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5. RADICAL MEETINGS

SOCIETY FOR THE RELIEF OF SOVIET RUSSIA

The above Society plans to hold a monster mass meeting at the Lexington Theatre in New York on Sunday the 27th inst. at two-thirty o'clock, the object being, they state, to "raise the blockade of lies against Soviet Russia".

Amongst the speakers will be Professor J. W. HARTMAN, editor of "Soviet Russia"; ARTURO GIOVANITTI, the labor agitator; Professor ISAAC HOURWICH, formerly counsellor to "Ambassador" L. C. A. K. Martens and others.

PATRICK QUINLAN, who recently returned to this country from a trip to Soviet Russia, addressed a meeting at the Rand School, New York, on the 22nd inst., at which he described conditions in Russia. He stated, that it was practically the "same old Russia" as far as the daily life of the people is concerned. He also stated that there was much more religious tolerance in Russia under the Soviet Regime than there had been under the Czaristia rule. He further stated that "the capitalists of England and America were now beginning to climb down from the band wagon because they needed the Russian trade" and that "if the German Communist leaders had had the courage and the audacity of the Russian leaders there would have been a revolution in Germany and that would have meant Italy and France also".

In another meeting which he addressed at Bryant Hall, he

said, that in the cities of Soviet Russia the workers had made unusual progress and the peasants had also fared well and lived better now than they did under Czarism, although they (the peasants) are, under the Communist Government, forced to give up eighty per cent of their produce for distribution among city workers and soldiers. He said further that "Lenin is the most conservative man in Europe--the average trade union man in New York lives better than Lenin, who is a hard worker and advocate of the simple life."

Further on Quinlan said that while in Russia Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman had acted as his interpreters and that he had spent considerable time with them. Continuing, he charged that Colonel RYAN of the American Red Cross acted as a spy and was allowed all the privileges he wanted in Russia, but upon his return to the United States gave a report to the United States Government before submitting one to the Red Cross.

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6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

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As a result of settlements made between manufacturers and members of the above Union, about twenty-five thousand men in all have returned to work.

The strikers claim to have collected Eight Hundred and Thirtyfive Thousand Seven Hundred and Nine Dollars (\$835,709.00) which is part of the Million Dollar strike fund for which they are striving.

Decision was reversed on the 21st inst. by Justice George V. Mullan in Part Three, Special Term, Supreme Court on the motion made by J. Friedman & Co., Inc., to have the trial of the action of the Company against Sidney Hillman, President of the Amalgamated and other officers of the Amalgamated, put on the preferred calendar for trial on April 2nd. In support of his request that the trial be held in April instead of several months later, Max D. Steuer, Attorney for the Friedman Co., stated that his clients were being damaged by the strike

of the Union by picketing and by alleged disorder and violence.

Samuel W. Peck & Co., Wholesale Clothing Manufacturers of 65 Roebling St., Brooklyn, on the 22nd inst. applied to Justice Van Siclen in Supreme Court of Brooklyn for an injunction to restrain the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America from "continuing by force, violence. intimidation and threats" to hinder the operation of the firm's factory. The firm also asked for Two Hundred Thousand Dollars damages. Decision was reserved.

INTERNATIONAL LADIES GARMENT WORKERS UNION

Injunctions restraining members and officials of the above union from picketing the factories of three employers were granted on the 23rd inst by Supreme Court Justice Newberger of New York

The application for injunction set forth that the firms lost heavily because of the Union's interference with their business and that non-union employees were intimidated. In granting the injunctions Justice Newberger said:

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"It is clear from the affidavits submitted that the strike is not for the purpose of bettering the conditions of the employees, but prompted rather by fear that it may interfere with the system now in vogue of collective bargaining.

"It is clear from a reading of the complaint that it sets out a cause of action in charging them of forming a conspiracy to cause plaintiff's factory to shut down and are wrongfully instigating his employees to stop work."

LACKAWANNA R. R. EMPLOYEES

On the 23rd inst. the laborers and shop forces employed by the above road met representatives of the management at 90 Church St., New York, and after discussing conditions, refused to agree to the road's proposition that wages be reduced. They also refused to join in making a presentation of the case to the Railroad Labor Board. The road was represented by F. M. RIMES, Vice President and General Manager and the men by E. E. MILLIMAN, N. J. DE NIESS, P. J. MALONEY and FRANK KRUTZNER of the Maintenance of Way, Clerks, Carmen and Shop Crasts Union.

CENTRAL RAILROAD OF N. J. EMPLOYEES.

Representatives of various railroad organizations on behalf of the common laborers and the Maintenance of Way Employees met the executives of the Central Railroad of New Jersey at the Jersey City Terminal on the 24th inst. and rejected the twenty per cent wage cut announced by the Road on March 14th.

The employees were represented by L. A. MCGINLEY, General Chairman of the Shop Crafts Federation of the Jersey Central System, and after the conference he stated that, in the opinion of the men, wages could not be reduced until the matter had been referred to the U. S. Railroad Labor Board.

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7. UNEMPLOYED

According to Harry D. Jacobs, Manager of the Ex-Service Men's Employment Bureau at 729 Sixth Avenue, New York, there are at present at least fifteen thousand ex-soldiers idle in New York. Mr. Jacobs admitted that there were a number of "drifters" in town who only hold a position for a few days. He added that the majority of applicants were desperately in need of work.

In addition he stated:

"If Americans don't wake up they will be confronted by a radical army composed of discouraged soldiers. The soldier thinks he has been forgotten, but only asks for a chance to prove his worth."

The members of the Ex-Service Men's Employment Bureau are: HARRY D. JACOBS, President; JOSEPH D. MALANKA, Treasurer; JOHN H. SCHROEDER, Publicity Director. It is understood that these men are at present working without pay and attempting to raise a budget of \$1000. a month until which time they will not accept any money.



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



FACTS DEVELOPED:

Continuing reports in the above matter, acting under instructions of Agent in Charge Holdridge, Agent obtained the following information in regard to industrial unrest.

Strikes at Albany, N.Y. -- United Traction Company employees numbering approximately 1560 are still out. The lines of this company cover the cities of Albany, Troy, Watervliet, Cohes and Rensselaer, N. Y. The cars are being run by strike breakers and there are almost daily clashes and disturbances on the part of the strike sympathizers. There has been no indications of radicalism.

At the plant of the GEORGE SPALT CABINET WORKS there has been a strike involving 25 employees which is still on.

THE ALBANY FOUNDRY CO. which has formerly a union shop but has now become an open shop due to the fast that the Albany Foundry Co.is making castings for the GENERAL EIE CTRIC CO. at Schendetady, N.Y., where 300 molders are on strike yet. There are occasional clashes between the union molders and those at present employed by the ALBANY FOUNDRY CO. Number involved -- 60.

At the SWEET & DOYLE FOUNDRY in Green Island, N.Y., the same conditions and the same causes are prevalent. About 75 are involved in this trouble. EF = 30 302600 - 33 - 192

At Amsterdam, N.Y. 600 carpet workers are still out on strike.

FACTS DEVELOPED

Following instructions received from Special Agent Charles Scully, based on telephone communication from Mr. JOE TAYLOR, who resides at 300 West 49th Street, New York, and is employed as a watchman by the FRED T. LEY COMPANY, 145 West 55th Street, and who stated that on several occasions he has found Communist circulars displayed in the plant and believes it is the work of some of the employees, one of the circulars being entitled "WORKINGMEN OF AMERICA. STAND BY SOVIET RUSSIA", agent called at 145 West 55th Street and interviewed MR. TAYLOR . This building is an apartment house in the dourse of erection. There are about 100 men of different trades employed at the present time. The circulars have been found on different floors of the building. Mr. Taylor suspects that some of the Jewish non union painters are distributing these circulars. He made a search of the clothing of the workmen under suspicion, but failed to find any of the circulars in question. WEEKLY REPORT ON STRIKE AND RADICAL SITUATION IN CENTRAL NEW YORK. FACTS DEVELOPED:

In regard to the strike situation at the plant of the Pierce Buther and Pierce Company at Eastwood, New York, two strikers were arrested on the 17th inst., and charged with assault, second degree, upon strike breakers. When arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jackson they plead not guilty, waived examination and were held to await the action of the Grand Jury which convenes in April. The NEW YORK STATE CONSTABULARY have assigned two men to this vicinity and they are keeping the situation well in hand except for an occasional outburst such as occurred on the 17th.

The railroad strike situation has changed for the better. On account of a decision recently made requiring the Erie Railroad Company to refrain from reducing the wages of the men until the matter was taken up by the Federal Wage Board, the representatives of the employes in this vicinity believe that the railroads will not cut the wages until evidence has been submitted to the Federal Wage Board and a decision rendered by that Board.

1-A. STRIKE NOTES.

INSIDE IRON AND BRONZE WORKERS UNION

The two thousand members of Locals No. 273-274 and 275 of the above Union, who have been on a lockout since early in January, have come to terms with their employers and have returned to work. The dispute, so the Union claims, was provoked by three associations of employers affiliated with the National Erectors Association when the Union expected they would obtain the forty-four hour week, which they claim had been agreed upon in a conference the year before.


The men have returned to work under the Union scale, except in some cases where the wages were reduced to \$33. minimum for helpers and \$44. for finishers, and lost the fight for the forty-four hour week. The lockout may be regarded, however, as a victory for the employers.

FEATHER BOA MAKERS UNION

As a result of settlements made by manufacturers with members of the above Union, about three hundred men returned to work during the week and it is confidently expected that the strike will be settled within a comparatively short time.

PAINTERS AND DECORATORS UNION

As a result of a referendum circulated amongst the Brotherhood of Painters, it is expected that this strike, which is of many months duration, will be brought to a quick termination. The men plan to

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SPECIAL REPORT 2. RADICAL ORGANIZATIONS AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

MARCH 19, 1921.

The above Association, at a meeting on the 14th inst. in New York, wired a protest to Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas against the socalled mob attacks on non-partisan league organizers at Great Bend on the previous day. According to the views of the Committee representing the Civil Liberties Union "those responsible for Sunday's violence will doubtless be brought to justice".

SOCIALIST PARTY

The trial of Assemblyman Henry Jager is still going on before the Assembly Committee on Frivileges and Elections, his seat having been contested by Andrea B. Yacenda, defeated Brooklyn Democratic candidate for the same seat.

The Assembly claims that the issuance of the certificate of election to Jager was "improper" and based upon improper and incorrect returns and statements of the various inspectors of elections and of the Board of County Canvassers of the County of Kings.

It is probable that the decision will not be made for several days.

The Party has claimed that as a result of a recent drive toward a one hundred thousand membership, they have gained five thousand members.

As a result of newspaper reports to the effect that President Harding has requested Attorney General Dougherty to reopen the DEBS case, it is understood that the Socialist Party will refrain from putting into effect their previous plan to picket the White House on behalf of Amnesty for political prisoners.

<u>I. W. W.</u>

There has been little activity in the above local circles during the current week. It has been learned from a confidential source that J. H. BEYERS has resigned as Secretary of the New York I. W. W. Defense Committee, stating that there was not sufficient money coming in to keep him employed.

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COMMISSARIAT FOR NATIONALITIES

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Dr. D. R. Dubrowsky, United States representative of the above body, on the 15th inst. made public a request for condensed milk and clothing of which, he stated, the Soviet Ukraine and White Russia are in urgent need. He added an appeal for funds for the purchase of these articles.

ANARCHISTS

On the 16th inst. Justice JOHN M. TIERNEY, in the Bronx Supreme Court where PAUL MANKO is on trial for violation of the State Anarchy Law, ruled that search and seizure without warrant were against the principles of justice and law.

The decision arose out of the fact that at the time of the arrest of Manko by the police on June 1, 1920, the police took away many pamphlets which were afterwards used in evidence, some of the papers taken being circulars entitled "Seeing Red", "Down Tools on May lst", "Free Thought", etc.

COMMUNIST PARTY

During the past week a large number of circulars have made their appearance along the shore front in both New York and Brooklyn and also in the factory districts of both boroughs, which are signed: "The American Bureau--International Conncil of Trade and Industrial Unions".

The circulars urged American workers to send delegates to the convention of the Communist Trade Union International which will be held in Moscow in May and to avoid the International Federation of Trade Unions which has its headquarters in Amsterdam.

About two weeks ago Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, officially notified JAN OUDEGEEST, Secretary of the International Federation of Trade Unions that the A. F. of L., representing four million workers in the United States and Canada, had withdrawn from the International Federation because it was too revolutionary.

Other circulars, which are printed on both sides and issued by the "Central Executive Committee, Communist Party of America", read in part as follows:

"WORKMEN OF AMERICA! STAND BY SOVIET RUSSIA!" The circular then goes on to state that "The Bloodthirsty capitalists of Western Europe and America are waiting to learn of the fall of Petrograd in order to bury their fangs into the heart of Soviet Russia". It then advises the workingmen of America to "stand by Soviet Russia" and says:

"Let us resolve to break the chains of wage slavery. Let us prepare for the overthrow of the hypocritical and bloody capitalist state and establish in its place the Soviet Republic of America.

"Let us destroy The Republic of the Rich and erect The Republic of Labor."

UNITED RUSSIAN PROFESSIONAL UNIONS

It has been learned that comrade SIVKO recently went to Waterbury, Conn., with the intention of exposing the alleged trickery of the Detroit branch of the Medical Aid to Soviet Russia. At the same time it was his intention to attempt to disorganize the local branch of the Society at Waterbury and to organize another committee which will operate under the Executive Committee of the Third All-Colonial. A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Third All-Colonial was held at the office of the "Americanskye Izvestia" on the 18th inst. at which it was decided to start a loan drive in this country and Canada among Russian citizens in order to help to reconstruct Soviet Russia. The Executive Committee decided that they would work out all the details of this plan and then present them to the various organizations affiliated with the All-Colonial for approval.

There has been considerable dissention between the <u>Second and</u> Third <u>All-Colonial Executive Committees</u>, the former having attached money in the bank which was in the name of the latter organization, the Second <u>All-Colonial claiming</u> that the money rightfully belonged to many Russians who had been deported and not to the Third <u>All-Colonial</u>. It is thought that the dispute will finally find its way into court.

It has been learned that during the coming week several Russian sailors whose names we have not as yet been able to learn, will sail on one of the Hamburg American Line ships from Hoboken, N. J., for Finland, their purpose in visiting that country being to bring back several revolutionists who are fighting against the Soviets at Kronstadt and who will be brought back to the United States for the purpose of instituting an anti-Soviet drive amongst the Russian residents in this country.

Union of Russian Sailors

It has been learned that a newly organized branch of the above organization, whose sponsors were YOUMSHANOFF KORNEEFF and KUZMENKO, has joined the Third International. They are said to be holding meetings at the home of Korneeff, 23rd St. & 4th Ave., Brooklyn, and he is said to be receiving all illegal literature carried by sailors into this country and delivering it to the leaders of the Communist Party in this section.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

Justice Van Siclen in the Supreme Court of Brooklyn on the 14th inst. indicated his purpose to render a decision declaring all strike picketing illegal. The proposed decision of Justice Van Siclen was caused by the application of a clothing manufacturing firm named SCHWARTZ & JAFFE who requested that picketing of their manufactory be declared illegal. The final decision will be handed down within the next week.

HOUSE WRECKERS UNION NO. 95

It is thought very likely that within a few days a reduction in the wages of wreckers, members of the above union, will be acceded after meetings between the union and the Demolition Contractors' Protective Association. One meeting has already been held and the general sentiment seems to be that after another meeting terms will be agreed upon that will be satisfactory to both parties.

AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

According to statements made by the above organization, about three hundred clothing factories are now working under union conditions. As a result of these settlements several thousand workers have returned to their places. The union, however, is continuing its efforts to raise a Million Dollar lockout fund and has stated that Two Hundred and Seventy-five Thousand has been raised in New York and Three Hundred Thousand Dollars has come from Chicago. Forty Thousand Dollars of the money

15 raised in New York is understood to have been donated by the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. 7-1169 Storig .

7. UNEMPLOYMENT

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On the 14th inst. executives of the New Jersey Central R. R. at a conference attended by representatives of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance and Way Employees, notified the men that there would be approximately twenty-seven per cent reduction in wages for all laborers. About three thousand and seven hundred track laborers are affected and about ten thousan men altogether. No decision has as yet been arrived at as to the course of action the men will take, although it is doubtful that there will be any strike order issued.

It is thought about six thousand marine workers employed on the floating craft of the railroads entering the Port of New York would be affected by the wage reductions figuring up to twenty-three per cent, which were agreed upon at a meeting of the Railway General Managers Association on the 14th inst. It is also probable that these workers will make some attempt toward arbitration before final acceptance of the terms offered by their employers.

The Westchester County Building Trades Employers Association announced on the 16th inst. that they had unanimously voted to cut the wages of all skilled and unskilled labor thirteen per cent. According to FRANK N. GOBEL, Chairman of the Association, the cut will become effective on April 1st and will affect nearly ten thousand employees. It is understood that the only class of workers which will be excepted is the masons who will continue to receive Nine Dollars per day.

9. NEGRO ACTIVITIES

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PEOPLE

The above organization made public, on the 15th inst., a statement to the effect that a petition to which they hoped to obtain one hundred thousand signatures was being circulated to request of President Harding the pardon of sixty-one members of the 24th Infantry (Colored) who are now in prison for their connection with the Houston, Texas, riots of 1917. The petition recites that the regiment had had an excellent previous record for "discipline, service and soldierly conduct," also, that local animosity had been shown the troopers before the riot.

It has been learned from a confidential source that the Rev. HEYLEGAN, Marcus Garvey's High Commissioner, recently made the statement that the Rev. LYONS, Liberian Consul General and official mouthpiece of the Liberian Government, had been somewhat opposed to Garvey, but that the latter had promised him a position and that he had changed his mind and promised to use his influence to induce President King of Liberia not to say or do anything that would hurt Garvey's "Liberian Loan" and "back to Africa" schemes.

The same source of information is responsible for the statement that Garvey's organization is at present negotiating for another ship to be obtained from a Chinese or Japanese company and to be used for propaganda purposes. The same source also makes the statement that the number of Negro unemployed is rapidly increasing, but there seems to be

19 no attempt made by the radicals at this particular time to take advantage of this fact. It was announced at a meeting on the 13th inst. at Liberty Hall that on his return to this country sometime next month, Garvey intends to send a Negro ambassador to take up his headquarters in Washington. This representative was stated to be Rev. Dr. EASTON, who was elected "leader of the American Negroes" at a convention of the Universal Negro Improvement Association in August last in New York.

On St. Patrick's Day the drive for Ten Million Two Hundred and Forty Thousand Dollars was begun for the alleviation of suffering women and children in Ireland. A number of other prominent persons have also associated themselves with the Committee.

The strikers and strike breakers at the plant of the Pierce Butler and Pierce Company at Eastwood, New York have not had any serious difficulties and nothing further has developed except that another striker has been arrested and was charged with assault. He is to be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jackson at Eastwood, New York at 2PM Wednesday March 16, 1921. N 15

The strike situation in Central New York is beginning to take on a serious aspect. The railroad men are holding meetings and sentiment seems to be unanimously in favor of a strike and in addition to this the newspapers are in favor of the mell Just at present public opinion has not crystalized but it is possible that public opinion will be in favor of the men also. After making discreet inquiries, I find that there are no radicals involved in this agitation among the railroad men at the present time but the men feel that the Companies stepped beyond their power when they ordered a revision of salaries without first consulting the men and they will not consent to the reduction. They claim that they will stand on the decision of the Wage Board. The men claim that the Railtond Companies will endeavor to force the men to accept the wage reduction by laying them off and giving them short time assignments. One instance being cited, states that a representative of the Company appeared before a freight agent near Batavia, New York recently and asked him, or the man in charge of the **yard**, how many crews he had working and the yard man stated that he usually had twenty seven crews but that at the present time, thisteen were on duty and that conditions were such the work was not done properly. In the face of this statement the Company's representative ordered the thirteen crews reduced to ten. The railroad men are rather indignant at the proposed cut because they claim that they worked hard and long hours in all kinds of weather during the past two or three years and they did not receive any more money than they were entitled to and now they do not receive any consideration from the Companies.

There are a number of other labor unions talking a bout strikes in the near future but nothing of any serious nature has developed as yet.

On Sunday afternoon March 13, a meeting was held at the Onondaga Hotel in this city at which forty eight railroad lodges were represented. Election of officers was held and a three hour discussion was had relative to the wage reduction situation. L. and W. workers were not present officially although there were a few D. L. and W. men around the Hotel. T. W. EVANS of SYRACUSE, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER of the New York Central and JOHN A. ROBERTSON, GENERAL CHAIRMAN of the BROTHERHOOD OF CLERKS AND STATION WORKERS in NEW YORK STATE indicated that the danger of a strike by the railroad on April 1. 1921 had passed. MR. EVANS believes that the Companies will not make any reductions until the WAR LABOR BOARD OF CHICAGO has granted them authority to do so. On March 12, a few copies of a pamphlet entitled: "WHY ARE YOU OUT OF A JOB?" were distributed in Syracuse, New York in the vewish section on East Adams Street between  $\texttt{Oran}_{\mathbb{S}}\texttt{e}$  and Almond Streets. The substance of this small pamphlet is as follows: "The workmen must act in this country as they did in Russia in order to obtatin possession of the shops. However, when they attempt to do this they will be met with police, thugs, machine guns, etc and then the workers must be ready to fight. In order to fight they must organize and the time is coming soon when there will be some action." At the end of this pamphlet they say: "DOWN WITH CAPITALISTS GOVERNMENT, DOWN WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF UNEMPLOYMENT. ALL POWER TO THE WORKERS." It is stated on the paper that it is distributed by the United Communist Party. The Local Police have taken an interest in this matter in view of the fact that it might be construed a violation of Section 162 of the Criminal Code but upt to date the Police have been unable to ascertain who distributed these pamohlets. 
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### FEATHER BOA MAKERS UNION.

Twelve hundred members of the above union, led by Mrs. IOLAN-THE SIDNEY, quit work on the 8th inst. as a measure to force the feather boa manufacturers to recognize the union and elso to renew the fortyfour hour week and the closed-shop agreement. The manufacturers have so far refused to accede to the demands of the members of the union, although it is thought that the strike will be of short duration.

### INTERNATIONAL LADIES GARMENT WORKERS UNION CHILDREN'S DRESSMAKERB' UNION

As a result of a meeting of the General Executive Board of the above Unions on the 8th inst., ten thousand workers quit work on the morning of the 9th for the alleged purpose of establishing minimum wage scales, regaining the wage rates in force before recent reductions and forcing the industry to recognize the Union and sign agreements embodying these conditions.

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### 2. RADICAL ORGANIZATIONS. AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

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According to a statement made by the above organization on the 6th inst., an appeal will be made for \$10,000. with which to assist ninety-eight members of the I. W. W. who appealed to the United States Supreme Court from their conviction in Chicago recently.

The committee which will make the appeal will number amongst others, Rev. PERCY STICKNEY GRANT, Rector of the Church of the Ascension; Dr. HARRY F. WARD, Professor of the Union Theological Seminary; ERNEST FREUND Professor of Law at the University of Chicago; HENRY R. MUSSEY, former Professor of History at Columbia University, New York, and Mrs. FLORENCE KELLEY, General Secretary of the National Consumers League.

The organization will also become active in the defence of ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN, who was recently arrested in Philadelphia where she had gone to address a meeting in behalf of SACCO and VANZETTI, the Massachusetts Italian radicals, as well as other radicals who were active at the same meeting with the Flynn woman and who were arrested at the same time by the Philadelphia authorities. The Supreme Court of the State of New Jersey has ruled in the appeal of one WALTER GABRIEL, that membership in the Communist Party does not in itself constitute an offence in law and that the section of the Sedition Law of New Jersey under which Gabriel was convicted is unconstitutional.

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COMMUNIST PARTY

Gabriel was arrested in Newark, N. J., in January, 1920, and was convicted at the Guarter Sessions Court in Newark on two charges. The first charged him with being a member of the Communist Party and the second with advocating the overthrow of the Government of New Jersey and the Government of the United States by force.

The judgment of the Court reads in part:

A STATISTICS

"Under the Constitution and Bill of Rights, the legislature cannot make it criminal to belong to a party organized or formed for the purpose of encouraging hositlity or opposition to the Government of the United States or to this State unless the hostility or opposition includes a purpose to overthrow or subvert such government."

#### SOCIALIST PARTY

Supplementing statements previously made, OTTO BRANSTETTER, National Secretary of the above Party, recently made the statement that efforts were being made by all members of the Party to obtain signatures to an appeal which the Party proposes to present to President Harding on April 13th or 14th, following a monster parade through the streets in Washington.

The petition reads in part as follows:

"As American citizens, inspired by the desire to safeguard and

perpetuate the freedom of speech and press guaranteed by the CONSTITU-TION OF THE UNITED STATES, we earnestly urge the enactment of such legislation as will effect the immediate release of all persons charged or convicted under wartime legislation whose alleged guilt consisted of writing or speaking in defense or explanation of their political or industrial beliefs.

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"We further insist that the release of such persons should be UNCONDITIONAL AND WITH FULL RESTORATION OF ALL RIGHTS OF CITIZENSHIP."

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#### 4. RADICAL PRESS

### "UKRAINIAN DAILY NEWS"

In its issue of March 5th, carries an article under the caption "Parliamentarism and Sovietism" which contains quotations from 'The State and Revolution' by Nicolai Lenin, and 'The A.B.C. of Communism' by N. Bucharin. Commenting on the theories advanced by both writers, the paper says in part:

"These 'sincere' leaders, even today, refuse to admit that the Parliament is no more than a skating rink for the representative and cabinet officials including the whole State machinery is nothing else but one partnership of murderers" -----and again

"Here it is clearly and openly spoken that under the present crooked system, under the present form of parliamentary bourgeois rule with their criminal prostitute press, with its agents, intelligencia, theatres and churches, with the wealth in the hands of a small group, the working class will never come to power through legal ways, a Constitutional way, by means of a general popular vote."

(Hungarian Radical Daily)

In a recent issue under the caption "The Most Interesting News of the Day", discusses the unemployment situation with particular respect to the ex-service men, and, referring to the fact that the employers are making a preference in favor of ex-service men when hiring help, states:

"This is the crumb THEY get from the richly set table. That

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is what the workers have to pick up after they had set the table with everything good. When the proletariat will come to its sense and will act, then instead of picking up the crumbs it will take a seat at the table. It has a right to it!"

The same issue in another article which is entitled "Fear That Bolsheviki Ideas Get Into the Army", discusses an article, dated Washington, Feb. 24th, in which General Nolan, Chief of the Army Intelligence Bureau, stated before the Senate Military Committee, that the Russian Soviet Government was introducing propagandists into the Army and closes with the following:

"General Nolan may find danger that is much nearer, which will undermine the discipline of the Army much more effectively and quicker than all Bolsheviki plots. This work will be done by the recent 'heroes' who, because they were heroes, now have to starve and live in misery. They will tell the boys what is waiting for them; and the outlook of a similar future will bring a better result than all Bolsheviki agitation."

#### "AMERICANSKYE IZVESTIA"

Official organ of the United Russian Professional Unions, in its issue of March 5th carries an article under the caption "In the Darkness of Unfinished Thought" which states that it is an answer to the Zubovich article "Wanderers In Darkness" published in "Russky Golos", in which the author ridiculed the stand taken by "Volna" and the "Americanskye Izvestia" towards Soviet Russia, and states that these papers "have no definite program to achieve their aims". To this the author of the article replies in part:

"Anarchism strives for complete destruction of all social in-

stitutions, forcibly separating a person from his physical and social spheres. The Anarchists do not believe in mediators among human beings, they recognize no form of government or state.

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-----"The Anarchists have also a definite plan for achieving their aims-----overthrowing capital and government by united effort. The Anarchists build a new society on the basis of federal autonomous groups and communes united for the common good and for combatting the common enemy."

#### "NEW YORKER VOLKSZEITUNG"

In its issue of March 6th, carries an article under the title "The Next Struggle for Mastery" (by Joseph Joos) in which the writer discusses the American-Japanese problem and also refers to the question whether in case of war with the United State, Great Britain is obliged to aid Japan, and the writer closes with the following: "This reference to diplomatic secrecy makes possible, indeed likely, that one nice day the United States will be face to face with a very unpleasant surprise. Unless the resourceful American Secret Service were successful in obtaining a copy of the text of the Anglo-Japanese treaty and so get onto the game of our two war-time war-allies."

### "NEW YORK CALL"

On the 8th inst. printed an article which stated that it was the intention of this paper to sue, as an individual, ex-Postmaster General Burleson for Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, based upon alleged unlawful proceedings instituted by him in his official capacity against the "New York Call".

### THIRD ALL-COLONIAL CONVENTION

On March 6th the Convention of the Third All-Colonial Russian Congress of the United States and Canada was started in this city. Said Convention, which lasted for a period of about three days, was held at Astoria Hall, East 4th St., New York City.

There were about thirty-four delegates in attendance representing thirty-seven radical organizations of which the total membership is estimated at eleven hundred.

Delegates throughout the entire East were present and resolutions were offered and adopted.

### 6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS

### AMERICAN STEAMSHIP OWNERS' ASSOCIATION

Members of the above Association representing transatlantic and coast steamship lines which have recently offered to their employees a scale of wages which includes a twenty-five per cent reduction, to take effect on May 1st, held a meeting on March 8th in New York and finally agreed to confer with the United States Shipping Board on this matter, which makes it seem quite likely that arbitration will eventually settle the question of wages and prevent the threatened strike of steamship employees in this port.

### AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

On Tuesday the 8th inst. Justice Mitchell L. Erlanger, of the Supreme Court, handed down a decision preventing the locked out' workers of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America from picketing the factor; of Joseph Skolny of 906 Broadway and charged the Union Ten Dollars Court costs.

This is the first of several decisions which are expected to be handed down by the same Justice in the case of similar suits brought by manufacturers who are engaged in the clothing business and are in favor of the "open-shop" movement.

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### 7. UN EMPLOYMENT

In many lines of business the decrease of employees has been noted and it has been reported that many of the larger concerns throughout this district have decreased the weekly wage in practically every line of work with the exception of that particular character of labor with which a wage agreement had previously been made.

The situation to date affects principally the clerical and unskilled laborer, although numbers of skilled laborers engaged in the building line are out of employment due to the fact that the concerns engaged in construction are awaiting a further drop in the cost of material before building.

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### 9. NEGRO ACTIVITIES.

The March issue of "The World's Work" carries a letter signed by Bishop C. S. Smith of Detroit, Michigan, which criticises the publication by this magazine of an article which appeared in the December 1920 issue of "The World's Work", and, according to the interpretation placed upon it by Mr. Smith, eulogized Marcus Garvey and the Universal Negro Improvement Association. In answering the letter written by Bishop Smith the "World's Work" states that:

"It is encouraging to have the assurance of Bishop Smith that Marcus Garvey does not speak for one per cent of American colored people. His campaign is essentially anti-American and trouble-making, and above all, most injurious to the race of which he has made himself the spokesman".

The article further states that:

"Marcus Garvey is not, himself, an American citizen and has spent only four years in this country; it is probable, therefore, that he has no sympathy with American ideals and no personal contact with the work which this nation is doing for the uplift of the Negro race".

### "THE CRUSADER"

Negro radical monthly magazine published in New York, in its issue of March, carries an article by "C. VALENTINE", under the caption, "The Ku Klux Klan" in which the writer points out to his readers that, notwithstanding the statement, which is heard to the effect that "The Ku Klux Klan won't amount to much in the North":

"The fact is that there are thousands of Southern whites now

resident in the North; that the mind of the average white man of whatever locality, provides a most fertile field for anti-Negro and white supremacy propaganda," and points out that there is a grave danger that the Negro, after reading the first statement, will "relapse into his ancient state of false security and almost complete detachment from his harassed kindred in the South".

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The same issue of the "Crusader" carries an article under the caption "The Irish Boycott on British Goods", in which the writer draws attention to the comparison between the Irish and Negro people in their efforts to gain freedom and points particularly to the attempted boycott of English-made goods by the Irish. The article winds up with the admonition:

"On with the boycott! Press home the war for liberation! Strike for a free Africa and a redeemed race! Hit them where it will hurt most--in their pocketbooks! Aim at the bulwark of Anglo-Saxon domination! On with the boycott!

There also appears a poem entitled "The Call" by Ben. E. Burrell, which unquestionably aims at the promotion of race hatred, ade vises the Negro to arm against the "Ku Klux Klan" and closes with the following:

> "For the honor of your children, And for the ashes of your sires; For the love of peace and justice, And for Freedom's altar fires, Fight for your race and kindred.

### 10. SINN FEIN ACTIVITIES AMERICAN COMMITTEE FOR THE RELIEF OF IRELAND

On Sunday the 6th inst. the above Committee held a meeting at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria, New York, at which One Hundred Thousand Dollars was pledged by those present for the relief of the suffering women and children in Ireland.

MARTIN CONBOY, who presided, announced that with other pledges the Committee at that time had over Three Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars of New York's quota of Two Million in the national drive for Ten Million Dollars, which is to be instituted on March 17th and to continue until the twenty-eighth inst.

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SIR PHILIP GIBBS made a speech on the same evening at the Casino Theatre in which he criticised the attitude of the American public toward the Irish situation. He was heckled somewhat by Irish sympathizers in the audience, but no arrests were made.

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Today I had a talk with GARVEY'S Publicity Agent, He told me that he was Chairman of the Delegation who called PLUMMER. upon Fresident KING of Liberia, at the Waldorf Astoria, yesterday, the others being GARCIA, STEWART, and Counsellor W. H. SMITH, all high officers of Garvey's Association.

PLUMMER further informed me that after discussing with KING, the general dondition of the association, he handed him some letters from MARCUS GARVEY, which Garvey left in his keeping when leaving for his West Indian trip. He said he did not know just what the letters contained. After a while we were joined by REVEREND HEYLEGAN and TOBIAS, the Treasurer, and entered into a general discussion of the Liberian situation, they claiming that KING should join hands with Garvey, tour the country, get behind the Garvey movement openly and put the Liberian Loan over, instead of trying to get the loan from the Government, thereby mixing in with the white men.

Referring to my report made February 28, 1921 in the above entitled matter I find that the situation in Solvay, New York remains unchanged. The radicals are still distributing anarchist and Communist literature in pamphlet form and the newspapers called Umanita Nova and L'Agitazione are also being distributed. Nearly all the members of this radical contingent are out of work at the present time and therefore they are not contributing funds for the purpose of bringing speakers here to address them. This together with the fact that they are a little bit afraid of being arrested is responsible for their failure to meet as often as they have in the past. They intended to have a meeting on February 28, but only a few appeared at the meeting and it was called off.

My confidential informants advise that different members are talking among themselves about the penalties meted out to some radicals and anarchists and they seem to be of the opinion that if they are convicted of advocating the overthrow of the Government by force or violence they will be sentenced to at least five years and possibly ten years in jail.


RADIGAL ORGANIZATIONS


Barry, an organizer for the Amalgamated Garment Workers, reported that they would start a Cooperative Men's Clething Factory immediately in the Coal and Iron Exchange Building, Buffalo, New York, and will employ 25 men and women. They intend to sell stock to members of the association and try to start another shop in the near future, which it is hoped would employ about 100 men and women. **EXAMPLE**. Lormerly connected with the steel strike, will essist to build up this organization.

RESTER, who is now associated with the Amalgamated Garment Morkers, is also attempting to start an organization among the bailroad car workers for the purpose of affiliating them in one big union.

LEO KRZYCKI, of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers, addressed a rorow meeting at SocialistParty Headquarters at Miller's Hall, Buffalo, New York on February 27th. His speech was a milt one, and in the course of his remarks he stated that a good many of the radical Socialists in this country did not realize the difference between this country and Russia or any other European country; that a great many had been lead to believe that the Revelution was right around the corner, and that those who did not maintain this belief were called traitors although they were sincers in their belief. He said that in Chicago two years ago, a conference was held to decide which of the newspaper plants they should take for the official party organ when the revolution started, and they must realize that there was a big difference in the United States and European countries; for instance, in Russia it was easy to organize the workers as the Russian army was for years in trenches, and a good deal of the time without food or shoes; that in their starved and frozen condition it was easy to organize them, but the United States army was the best paid army in the world, well teken sare of and it was a bard matter to introduce propaganda among them.






The Joint Strike Committee of the above body has made the statement that so many manufacturers have settled with the Union that there are now only two thousand workers still on strike and that further settlements are locked for in the near future.

A fund of approximately Thirty Thousand Dollars a week will be raised to meet legal expenses and help support those at present on strike by the members of the Union who have gone back to work, according to a statement made by officials of the Union.

The above Committee has been recently formed by members of the Workmen's Circle, a Jewish radical organization which claims a membership of eighty thousand throughout the United States and Canada. It is proposed by the Committee to raise a fund of from Twenty-five to Fifty Thousand Dollars with which to equip a hospital for Soviet Russian sufferers.

## MUTUAL AID SOCIETY OF NEW YORK

ROGER N. BALDWIN, Chairman of the above body, recently issued a statement showing the work done by this Society since its inception on January 1st, part of which follows:

"The membership on January 1st numbered 443. Although the membership chosen is only a mtter of accident, still it is almost systematically divided; on the Pacific Coast 17, in the middlewest 29, the South 19, New York and vicinity 219, the Eastern states 160. The members are radicals and liberals of all tendencies: 32 members from the I. W. W., 45 from the A.F. of L., 11 from the Communist Party, 7 who are employed in cooperatives, 14 anarchists, 51 members of the Socialist Party, 45 radicals without labels and more than 100 of such who call themselves liberals."

## SOCIALIST PARTY

The "New Yorker Volkszeitung" (People's News) in discussing the rejection by the Central Committee of New York of the twenty-one con-

ditions laid down by the Third Internationale, says in part:

"There is some unrest again in the Socialist Party. The Left Wing is stronger than ever and follows no longer the leaders on their well worn path. The Slovak and the Finnish groups left the Socialist Party and now the Bohemians are voting with the same final aim, just as the conference of the Jewish Socialist Federation has shown evidences which are irrefutable. Only a very inconsiderable minority of the members of these groups stay with the Socialist Party in spite of all 'resolutions" of local branches. The overwhelming majority of the members are tired of the old ways and methods and turn away from them."

KATE RICHARDS O'HARE spoke at the Park View Palace, New York, at a meeting held under the auspices of the above Party on the 2nd inst., this being the first of three meetings which she will hold in this city demanding amnesty for Communist, I. W. W. and all others at present imprisoned.

She stated that it was the intention of the Party to circulate a petition which would contain between two and three million signatures and that the Party proposed to hold a parade through the streets of Washington on April 13th or 14th, at the head of which will be one thousand representatives of the Socialist and trade union movement from all parts of the country.

Mrs. O'Hare closed her speech with a vicious attack upon the President and eulogy of DEBS.

The Professional Unions are, of course, an Anarchist body and opposed to the Soviets, but expect to defeat the efforts of the anit-Anarchist body at the Convention.


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The activities of this organization have been confined almost entirely to matters connected with the coming convention.

## SOCIALISTS

FLORELLO H. LA GUARDIA, President of the New York Board of Aldermen, and SEYMOUR STEDMAN, who was last year's candidate for President on the Socialist ticket, held a debate at Hunt's Point Palace, New York, on Sunday the 27th ult. The meeting was largely attended and the chairman was Judge LOUIS GIBBS.

Stedman set forth the theory that Socialism is necessary to the preservation of civilization, while Mr. La Guardia took the opposite view. In the course of the latter's remarks he was hissed several times by the audience because he disagreed with the views advanced by Stedman.

#### WORLD PEACE FELLOWSHIP

The above body held a meeting at Cooper Union, New York, on Monday the 28th ult. at which some of the speakers were JOSEPH SCHLOSS-BERG, Secretary and Treasurer of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers; A. J. MUSTE, of the Amalgamated Textile Workers; NORMAN THOMAS, editor of "The World To-morrow" and ROSE SCHNEIDERMAN, President of the Women's Trade Union League.

SCHLOSSBERG, in his speech, ridiculed the leaders of the American Federation of Labor for saying that they would not obey injunctions and stated that the labor movement should be organized for the purpose of fighting against militarism. The other speakers talked along the same lines.

## 6. TRADE AND LABOR UNIONS.

## MARINE ENGINEERS BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION

What was thought might develop into a coastwise strike of large proportions, has at least been temporarily deferred, according to a statement made by BERT L. TODD, manager of the above Association. The Tugboat Owners' Association and the American Steamship Owners' Association recently made a statement that, commencing March 1st they proposed to offer a new scale to the men at a reduction of about twenty-five per cent in wages. The officials of the local unions after conferring with the members, have stated that they will accept the cut tentatively and would expect the old wage scale to again be put in force on April 1st. It is probable that the matter will be referred to the U. S. Shipping Board for adjustment.

## AMALGAMATED CLOTHING WORKERS OF AMERICA

The lockout of the above organization is in its thirteenth week and the indications do not point to an early return to work.

At present there are six actions against the Amalgamated for heavy damages which have been instituted by members of the New York Clothing Manufacturers Association, the total amount of damages claimed by the Manufacturers being One Million Five Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars.

Amongst those who are suing the Amalgamated are some of the largest clothing manufacturers. The names of these firms together with the amounts of their respective claims, follow:

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The Standard Oil Company, on the 2nd inst., announced a new schedule of wages to become effective immediately at the Bayonne, New Jersey, plant, which will affect practically all of the 4,500 employess, most of whom will be put on part time, in some cases working five days a week and in other, four days a week.

The Company states that it has taken this step in order to avoid laying off a number of men due to general business depression.

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The unemployment situation in New York in so far as it affects the Negro population, remains about the same, with the exception that the number of Negroes unemployed seems to be increasing and the radical element of the race are, of course, taking advantage of this situation.

The average Negro, however, seems to be of the opinion that his unemployment is due to economic rather than racial causes.

#### 9. NEGRO ACTIVITIES

Marcus Garvey in the Negro World of Feb. 26th makes an appeal in favor of the Universal Negro Improvement Association and the Black Star Line, in which he states in part:

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"Today I have before me a vision of a titanic struggle. ....I see before me now the desperate effort on each and every one to survive the bloody conflict.

.....Europe, with her millions of organized groups battering down the gates of Asia and all Europe demanding entry. On the other hand I see Asia stubbornly resisting the attempt of the foe. I see on the great battleplains millions of men going down in defeat. And after the battle I hear the shout of victory for Asia. Asia once more free, and in the same spectacle I see the same foe battering at the gates of Africa, demanding Africa, and four hundred million Negroes under the banner of the Universal Negro Improvement Association standing up like men, blocking the entry and also winning laurels for the great crown But, ah, even before the clash I see men organof African freedom. izing everywhere. I hear Japan crying out to a dismembered and disunited Asia to organize, to get together, and it is through this . organization of Asiatic groups that the victory I have spoken of in my vision becomes imminent. Through this organization Africa must come together. The scattered millions in America, the West Indies, South and Central America and in the homeland, must all unite as one man in this time of world reorganization; so that when the conflict really comes, united we will stand to meet the common foe and thus protect the rights of our fathers, ourselves and our children."

GRACE CAMPBELL, seems to be the most active female member of the radical element of the Negro race in this city. This woman was the candidate on the Socialist ticket during the past year for a place in the Assembly and collects the dues from the members of the Socialist Party in the Negro District.

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It has been learned from a confidential source that a number of the more radical Negroes in New York are West Indians by birth and have not as yet attained U. S. citizenship.

ARTHUR REID is another active radical agitator of this race and is also a West Indian alien, but has not as yet arrived at the stage where his activities are of moment.

Marcus Garvey, is, so far as known, at present in Florida, whence it is his intention to proceed to Cuba, from which point he will later embark for Jamaica. His trip has been taken in the interests of the Black Star S. S. Line and the Universal Negro Improvement Association.

That the New York Japanese Society is connected with the Japanese Consulate in New York is evidenced by the following article which appeared in the "Japanese Times" February 12th, under the caption "Japanese Immigrants in Eastern States About Thirty-eight Hundred In Total":

"According to the census taken last autumn by the New York Japanese Society, the total number of Japanese immigrants in the territory under the supervision of the New York Japanese Imperial Consulate appears to be three thousand seven hundred and eighty (3,780). <u>This</u> <u>census is carefully prepared by said Society in compliance with the</u> <u>order of the Japanese Consulate</u>, and its sources of information are chiefly based on the various reports from its branch organizations in different localities including New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Boston, Atlantic City, etc. Out of the total number of immigrants three thousand and fifty-four (3,054) are male individuals and six hundred and twenty-six (626) female individuals; and, of the six hundred and twenty-six females two hundred and fifty are asserted to be young single women and not more than twenty-five years of age."

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
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

FACTS DEVELOPED:

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Pursuant to instructions from AGENT IN CHARGE TORMEY, I proceeded to FORT ONTARIO OSWEGO, NEW YORK and there interviewed of the Medial Corps, PRIVATE CARL BRLETICH/ who stated that he wrote the letter accompanying this report and that previous to his enlistment in the United States Army he was in touch with members and leaders of the Communist Party. Also that when he was in YOUNGSTOWN in 1917 they wanted him to join this party but at that time he did not know the object of the party and did not give them a decided answer but used to attend their meetings to find out what kind of a party it was. He stated that these people did not work but got their money by robbery and murder and told him that in 1921 he would see a revolution in this country and the Communist Party would overthrow the present Government. He also stated that they have private houses in LACKWANNA, BUFFALO and YOUNGSTOWN where they hold meetings two or three times a wask month and they send reports to Cleveland, Ohio which is their headquarters and they also have a place to store ammunition. MR. BRLETICH does not remember any names or addresses of these meeting places as it has 6 been two years since he has been around but he stated that if he could get around these cities again he could find out where these people are

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At 2 P. M. I proceeded to 98 Forsyth Street, for the purpose of attending a meeting being held under the auspices of the WORKERS CIRCLE OF SOCIAL CULTURE, where I found about 200 men and women present.

At 3 P. M. the meeting was opened, with a man named DIANUSO being introduced as the first speaker, and he spoke along general lines, saying that the White House is in Wall Street, and Wall Street in the White House, and that the workers are always being promised things, and instead have periods of unemployment, and that the only way to do things is to run the State themselves and enjoy the fruits of their labor.

NICOLA CUNED was next introduced and the first part of his speech concerned religion and how foolish it was for people to believe in it, stating that the people preaching it were the medium between the workers and the capitalists. He then went on to say that the workers should educate themselves and do away with Wall Street and the "crazy man at the White House".

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CARLO TRESCA was the next speaker, but did not say anything of value to this Bureau.
