RESOLUTIONS relative to the acquisition of new territory.

Whereas the existing war with Mexico may result in the acquisition of new territory to the Union:

And whereas measures are now pending in Congress having in view the appropriation of money, and the conferring authority upon the treaty making power: to this end, therefore,

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That our Senators and our Representatives in Congress be requested to vote against any measure whatever by which territory will accrue to the Union, unless, as a part of the fundamental law upon which any compact or treaty for this purpose is based, slavery or involuntary servitude, except for crime, shall be forever prohibited.

Resolved, That the governor be requested to forward a copy of the foregoing to each of our Senators and Representatives in Congress.
