IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES.

Mr. Sumner, from the Select Committee on Slavery and Freedmen, reported the following bill; which was read and passed to a second reading.

ABILL

To prohibit commerce in slaves among the several States, and the holding or transportation of human beings as property in any vessel within the jurisdiction of the national government.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-Ĭ tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, $\mathbf{2}$ That there shall be no commerce in slaves among the several 3 States, by land or by water; and any person attempting or 4 aiding to transport slaves, as an article of commerce, from 5 one State to another State, or any person who shall take part in such commerce, either as seller, buyer, or agent, shall 7 be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted 8 thereof before any court having competent jurisdiction, shall 9 suffer imprisonment for not more than five years, and be 10 fined not exceeding five thousand dollars, one-half of such 11 fine to go to the informer; and every slave so treated as an 12 an article of commerce among States shall be free. 13

- Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That no human being 1 shall be held or transported as property in any vessel on the 2 high seas, or sailing coastwise, or on any navigable waters 3 within the jurisdiction of the United States; and every vessel 4 violating the provisions of this act shall be forfeited to the 5 6 United States; and every master of such vessel consenting to such violation shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and 7 8 on conviction thereof subject to the penalties hereinbefore 9 provided, one-half of the fine to go to the informer; and every human being so held or transported as property shall 10
 - SEC. 3. And be it further enacted. That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith, including especially so much of an act approved March second, one thousand eight hundred and seven, as regulates the coastwise slave trade, are hereby repealed.
