IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES.

April 12, 1864.

Mr. SUMMER, from the Select Committee on Slavery and Freedmen, reported the following bill; which was read and passed to a second reading.

A BILL

To establish a bureau of freedmen.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa- $\mathbf{2}$ tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 That an office is hereby created in the Treasury Department 4 to be called the bureau of freedmen, meaning thereby such 5persons as have become free since the beginning of the 6 present war, under the care of a commissioner, with an annual salary of four thousand dollars, who shall be appointed 7 by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the 8 Senate; and there shall be in the bureau a chief clerk, acting 9 also as disbursing officer, under bonds to the United States, 10 with an annual salary of two thousand dollars; and also such 11 number of clerks, not exceeding two of each class, as shall be 12necessary, who shall be appointed by the Secretary of the 1314 Treasury.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the commis-

sioner shall have authority, under the direction of the Secre- $\mathbf{2}$ tary of the Treasury, to create departments of freedmen 3 within the rebel States, so far as the same may be brought 4 under the military power of the United States, and each de-5partment shall be under the supervision of an assistant com-6 missioner, with an annual salary of two thousand dollars, to 7 be appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury, and with 8 9 authority to appoint local superintendents and clerks, so far as the same may be-needed, at a compensation not exceeding 10 11 the ordinary rate for similar services, subject, in all respects, 12to the approval of the Secretary.

1 SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That the military 2 commander within any department shall, on the application 3 of the assistant commissioner thereof, supply all needful mili-4 tary support in the discharge of his duties; and any military 5 commander may be appointed assistant commissioner, without 6 increase of salary.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the commissioner, 1 $\mathbf{2}$ under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, shall 3 have the general superintendence of all freedmen throughout the several departments, and it shall be his duty especially to 4 watch over the execution of all laws, proclamations, and 5military orders of emancipation, or in any way concerning 6 freedmen, and generally, by careful regulations, in the spirit 7 of the Constitution, to protect these persons in the enjoyment 8

9 of their rights, to promote their welfare, and to secure to them10 and their posterity the blessings of liberty.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That the assistant 1 commissioners shall have authority, within their respective $\mathbf{2}$ departments, to take possession of all real estate, with the 3 4 houses thereon, liable to sale or confiscation, or to any claim of title by the United States, and not already appropriated to $\mathbf{5}$ 6 government uses, and also to take possession of all personal 7 property found on such estate, and to rent or lease all such 8 real estate, or any part thereof, with the personal property 9 thereon, or in case no proper lessees can be found, then to 10 cause the same to be cultivated or occupied by the freedmen, 11 on such terms in either case and under such regulations as 12the commissioner may determine: *Provided*, That no freed-13men shall be held to any service on any abandoned estate, 14otherwise than according to voluntary contract reduced to writing and certified by the assistant commissioner or local 15superintendent, nor shall any such contract be for a longer 16 17period than twelve months.

1 SEC. 6. And be it further enacted, That the assistant 2 commissioners and local superintendents shall be ready, as 3 advisory guardians, to aid the freedmen in the adjustment of 4 their wages, or where they have rented plantations or small 5 holdings, in the organization of their labor; that they shall 6 take care that the freedmen do not suffer from ill-treatment

or any failure of contract on the part of others, and that on 7 their part they perform their duty in the premises; that they 8 shall further do what they can as arbitrators, to reconcile and 9 settle any differences in which freedmen may be involved, 10 11 whether among themselves or between themselves and other 12persons, and in case such differences are carried before any tribunal, civil or military, they shall appear as next friends of 13 14the freedmen, so far as to see that the case is fairly stated 15and heard, and in all such proceedings there shall be no dis-16ability or exclusion on account of color.

SEC. 7. And be it further enacted, 1 That leases here- $\mathbf{2}$ tofore made by the supervising special agents of the Treas-3 ury Department, under the authority of the General Order three hundred and thirty-one, of the Secretary of War, $\mathbf{4}$ 5dated October nine, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, and 6 in accordance with the regulations of the Treasury Depart-7ment, shall have the same effect as if made by assistant com-8missioners under this act; and such agents shall have the same powers in the premises as are given herein to assistant 9 commissioners: Provided, That no lease shall be made by 10 11 them for a longer period than one year, and that immediately 12upon the organization of any department of freedmen, such 13agents shall cease to execute their functions within such de-14 partment and shall deliver over to the assistant commissioner thereof all property and papers held by them as agents. 15But all expenses necessarily incurred by such agents in any department, prior to its organization under this act, shall be
defrayed by the Secretary of the Treasury out of any moneys
in his hands arising from the leases made by such agents.

1 SEC. 8. And be it further enacted, That the commissioner 2 shall apply the proceeds arising from leases in the several 3 departments to pay the salaries and other expenses under this 4 act, so that the bureau herein established may become, at an 5 early day, self-supporting ; and any proceeds over and above 6 the annual expense thereof shall be paid into the treasury of 7 the United States.

SEC. 9. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the 1 $\mathbf{2}$ duty of all officers, civil and military, charged with the exe-3 cution of any law, proclamation, or military order of emancipation, or in any way concerning freedmen, not mustered $\mathbf{4}$ into. nor regularly engaged in, the military service, to make $\mathbf{5}$ return to the commissioner of all their proceedings in execu-6 tion thereof, under such regulations as shall, from time to 7 8 time, be prescribed.

SEC. 10. And be it further enacted, That the commis sioner shall, before the commencement of each session of
 Congress, make full report of his proceedings to the Secretary
 of the Treasury, who shall communicate the same to Con gress. And the assistant commissioners shall make quarterly
 reports of their proceedings to the commissioner, and also
