

To any legislation on the part of Congress, on the subject of slavery in said District.

FEBRUARY 7, 1839.

To the honorable the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States:

The undersigned, inhabitants of the District of Columbia, beg leave

RESPECTFULLY TO REPRESENT:

That they have seen with unfeigned regret, notwithstanding the marked disapprobation with which your honorable bodies have heretofore treated similar petitions, that numerous inconsiderate and misguided individuals, in various parts of the United States, still continue to press upon your honorable bodies applications for the abolition of slavery within this District.

In the first place, your memorialists do not desire the enactment of any law for the extinction of slavery within this District, even conceding the very questionable right of your honorable bodies to pass such an act without the consent of the people whose interests are to be especially involved in its provisions; and, in the second place, we respectfully suggest, that whatever may be your powers or our duties in this regard, it is a question solely between you, our *only* constitutional legislators, and ourselves; is entirely municipal in its character, and one in which no exterior influence has any just right to interpose or invoke your action. These propositions your memorialists deem too plain to need any argument to sustain them. If, at any future period, it shall be the desire of the people of this District that slavery shall be abolished by law, they will doubtless make their wishes known to Congress, the Legislature provided for them by the constitution, and it will then be time enough for your honorable bodies to take the matter into consideration.

It is not that your memorialists are slave-holders that they present these views to your honorable bodies; many of them do not own slaves, and some of them might be forbidden by conscience to hold any, but these, nevertheless, unite with others in this prayer to your honorable bodies, not only from the just respect due to the legal rights of those of their neighbors Blair & Rives, printers.

who do possess slaves, but from a deep conviction that the continual agitation of the subject by those who can have no right to interfere with it is calculated to have an injurious influence on the peace and tranquillity of the community, and upon the well being and happiness of those who are held in subjection.

Your memorialists, therefore, beg leave as well to protest against the unauthorized interference of which they complain, as to deprecate any legisla-

tion on the part of your honorable bodies, in compliance therewith.

And your memorialists, as in duty bound, will every pray, &c.
