To the resolutions of the State of Vermont on the subject of slavery and the war with Mexico.

Response of the General Assembly of the State of Alabama to the preamble and resolutions of the State of Vermont on the subject of slavery and of the war with Mexico.

The State of Alabama deems it proper to respond in a respectful manner to the preamble and resolutions of the State of Vermont. In thus responding, Alabama, as a sovereign State of the American Union, formed its opinions on the subject of slavery at the adoption of the constitution and the admission of the State into the Union. This opinion has never been changed, nor has any opinion expressed either by the citizens in their private intercourse, in their popular assemblages or General Assembly, upon the subject of slavery, been changed, nor will it be retracted. So far as the war with Mexico is concerned, we regard all honorable efforts to conclude a speedy peace with that republic as having been made by the P. esident of the United States. We regard the war as one of necessity, for the protection of the rights of American citizens, and which could not be avoided without a faithless violation of their rights by the Chief Magistrate of the nation. This question has been settled by Congress in 1846; and whilst Alabama refuses to be fickle upon a subject of so much importance to the honor of nations. Vermont may.

Therefore be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Alabama in General Assembly convened, That his excellency the governor of this State send to the governor of every State in this Union a copy of the foregoing response, as well as to our Senators and

Representatives in Congress.
