Resolution requesting the president of The United States to recommend the enactment of a federal anti-lynching law and petitioning congress to enact an anti-lynching law.

Whereas, more than twentyseven (27) citizens of the United
States in widely scattered sections
of the country have been lynched
thus far this year, being a great
increase over last year, causing
public expression of condemnation,
thereof to be made throughout the
land, and

Whereas, lynching, is an unlawful deprivation of the rights of citlizens, to the protection of Article
VI, of the amendments to the constitution of the United States
(which reads as follows: '(')

"If all criminal prosecutions the
acquised shall enjoy the right, to a
speedy and hublic trial, by; an impartial jury of the states and district wherein the crime shall, have
been committed, which district,
shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed
of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the
witnesses against him; to have
compulsory process for obtaining
witnesses in his favor, and to have
the assistance of counsel for his defense."

"Nor shall any state deprive any
person of life, liberty, or property,
without due process of law; nor
deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of
the laws" and
Whereas, lynching and mob violence tend to promote a general
disregard for law and order and to
undermine the very purpose and
stability of government, and has a
deteriorative effect both upon the people participating therein and the community wherein same occurs, and
Whereas, this resolution constitutes an emergency in that the
same provides for the usual daily
operation of a municipal department, now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the council of
the city of Cleveland, Ohio:
That the president of the United
States be and is hereby requested
to include a plea and recommendation for enactment of a federal
anti-lynching law in his first message to the next session of Congress, and

Be it further resolved, that the
congress of the United States be
and is hereby petitioned to enact
an anti-lynching law at its next
sess
