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

> "Chicago -- the Deacons for Defense and Justice, a gun-carrying group of southern Regrees dedicated to neeting force with force, pages to establish its first chapter in the North in Chicago.

Earnest Thomas, Vice President of the group, said yesterday the group has 62 chapters fin Dixie. The Chicago chapter was planned because the Ku Klux Klan, which the Deacons were formed to fight, is 'moving Morth and we're going to try to curtail some of its activity, he said.

Thomas, who lives in Jonesboro, La., the birthplace of the Deacons, said the green operates in the South 'by riding armed with pistols and good rifles in radio-equipped cars.'

He said the primary purpose behind the group was to meet own terms."

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As you are aware, the Deacons of Defense and Juntal Inc., (DDJ) is a Negro organization having a; its main purpose the arming of Negroes for protection against Klan violence. Said organization has been active in demonstrations in Bogalusa, Louisiana.

In view of the foregoing and because of the potential for violence, Chicago should initiate immediate inquiry to determine available facts concerning the plans of the DDJ to start a chapter in Chicago. Follow closely any actual efforts in this regard and if a chapter is organized, develop necessary sources in order to fully obtain information concerning the activities of the DDJ leaders, and the group's activities.

You should be alert to any indications of subverted and/or outside influences on the DDJ. Also, you chould complish such sources as may be necessary to run one information remarking weapons reportedly possessed by the DDJ and any lease remarking weapons' suppliers.

Chicago should also be alert for any information indicating an extension of the DDJ to other northern cities. Leads should be promptly set out and New Orleans, one office of origin, fully informed concerning devolupments.

Bureau must be promptly advised of all develops win regarding the DDJ and information suitable for dissemination should be submitted by letterhead memorandum.





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

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APPENDIX

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contained a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening In Cula," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This adverti. .. ment announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittees or January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TABER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TABER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the alonementioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the PPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist No. Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the IBOC and thereby influence FPCC policy. This source added that during the past year there had been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and oth . organizations in the FPCC so that their influence as call May, 1963, was negligible.

> The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 20, 1963, a second source advised that VINCENT "TED" LEE, FPCC Mational Office Director, was then formulating FPCC policy and had indicated that he had he intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. This source stated that LEE believed that the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and should support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations. IEE did not advocate supporting the Cuban revolution per se.

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APPENDIX

FAIR PLAY FOR CUEA COMMITTEE

The November 23, 1963, edition of "The New York Times" reported that Senator THOMAS J. IODD of Connecticut had called FFCC "the chief public relations instrument of the CASTRO network in the United States." It is to be noted that Senator DODD was a member of the Senace Internal Security Subcommittee, which twice conducted hearings on the FPCC.

The December 27, 1963, edition of "The New York World Telegram and Sun" newspaper stated that the pro-CASTRO FPCC was seeking to go out of business and that its prime activity during its lifetime had each sponsorship of pro-CASTRO street rallies and mass picket lines, and the direction of an active propaganda mill nighlighting illegal travel-to-Cuba campaigns. Its comparatively brief span of life was attributed to mounting anti-CASTRO American public opinion, the 1902 Congressional hearings which disclosed FFCC financing by CASTRO's United Nations Delegation, and ultimately, the bad publicity which the FFCC received from disclosure of activities on its behalf by suspected presidential assassin, LEE H. OSWALD.

on February 6, 1964, the previously mentioned second source advised that V. T. LEE had recently remarked that the FPCC was dead and that there were no plans to organize another similar organization.

On April 13, 1964, a third source advised that there had not been any FFCC activity in many months and that the FPCC had been dissolved.



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APPENDIX

WORKERS WORLD PARTY

On April 17, 1959, a confidential source advised that on February 12, 1959, a Socialist Workers Party (SWP) minority group under the leadership of National Committee member, SAM BALLAN, split from the SWP.

The source stated that this mincrity group, referred to as the Marcyites, after many years of program and policy differences on varied issues concerning tactics and interpretation of political events, spliff from the SWP on the grounds that the Party was liquidating itself by the from the Marxist precepts of LEON TROTSKY and retreating from the fight for the world socialist revolution. The final issue which ultimately forced the spliff was the minority's opposition to the SWP regroupment policy which involved the operation with the Communist Party (CP) periphery-individuals characterized by the minority as petty-bourgeois.

The minority program, according to source, advecated unconditional defense of the Soviet Union and has as its goal the building of a revolutionary party with a complete proletarian orientation for the purpose of overthrowing capitalism in the United States and throughout the world.

On May 12, 1960, source advised that this minority group had chosen the name Workers World Party.

On May 3, 1965, second source advised that the Workers World Party, which maintains headquarters at 46 heat 2.55 Street, New York, New York, supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological dispute with the Soviet Union.

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

The following article captioned "Militant Negroes Here Forming Armed Unit to Fight the Klan" appeared in the October 15, 1965 issue of the "Chicago Daily News," a Chicago, Illinois newspaper: newspaper:

"Militant Negroes are organizing a Chicago chapter of the gun-carrying Deacons for Defense and Justice, a vigilante group active in baffling the Klue Klux Klan in the South.

"'We believe there are Klansmen active in this city and we're confident they have thousands of sympathizers here, said Earnest Thomas, 32, the Deacons' vice president and their full-time paid national organizer.

"'While we have 62 chapters quite active in the South, Chicago will be our first Northern chapter, ' he said.

"'We expect to operate with freedom patrols up here and be alert for police brutality against Negroes. And we'll also campaign against shady deals that are often pulled off on us Negroes in the North.

"The extent of our stay in Chicago will depend or now things improve here for Negroes

"THOMAS, father of five, told in an interview here how he and other Deacons do battle against Klansmen.

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"'We don't teach hatred,' Thomas said.

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"'We do teach that you have to meet force with force. The only thing that the Klan respects is force. It is also the only thing understood by the others who battle Regroes such as the John Birch-Society, the Minute Men, and the American Nazi Party.

"'We usually operate down Scuth by riding armed with pistols and good rifles in radio-equipped cars. We've had a ccuple of gun battles recently with the Klanbut nobody was seriously hurt. We think we sent some Klanamen to the hospital."

"THOMAS said Deacons never shoot unless somebody else shoots first.

"We simply meet violence against Negroes with violence, and it has worked. The Klan is quieter now in the South because of us and the hearings set by the House Un-American Activities Committee in Washington next week."

"The local police have protected the Klan and even the federal government, the Federal Bureau of Investigation included, have been ineffectual in fighting Klansmen.

"The Deacens' activity is 'absolutely within the law,' Inchas maintains.

"We were organized in Jonesboro, La., about 18 months ago because of violence, and threats, by white gangs," as said. 'Legally, we're above board because the Bill of Rights allows any citizen to bear arms in defense of life and property.

"'In Louisiana we're allowed ownership of weapons as long as they are not concealed. Our weapons are

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never concealed. We're a civil rights group but we don't demonstrate in the streets. We observe and then act if it is necessary.'

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"THOMAS, a Korean war veteran, is outspoken in his criticism of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King and his non-violent southern Christian Leadership Conference.

"'Talk doesn't solve anything, Thomas said.

"'We Negroes are not going to gain or freedom by talking. We Negroes can't continue to let the Klan and similar hate groups trample on us. King, and I really live in two different worlds."

"Thomas is scheduled to debate the Rev. James Bevel, one of King's top aids, at 8 p.m. Saturday in the First Congregational Church, 1613 W. Washington Blvd.

"They will debate the topic, 'Non-violence vs. Self-defense.'"

The following article captioned "Rights Leaders Reject Plan to Start Deacons" appeared in the October 18, 1965, issue of the 'Chicago Defender," a Chicago, Illinois newspaper:

"Two Chicago rights leaders gave a short shrift to the announcement that the gun-currying Deacons for Defense and Justice was planning to establish its first Northern chapter in Chicago.

"Earnest Thomas, Deacons' vice-president, had said over the weekend in Chicago that his group, dedicated to seeting force with force, has 62 chapters in Dixie.

"The Chicago chapter was planned because the Ku Klax Klan, which the Deacons were formed to fight, is 'moving North and we are going to try to curtail some of its activity,' he said.





'Timuel Black, president of the Negro American Labor Council, said the people's frustrations had called such a group in existence.

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"'But I am personally not in favor of this kird of threat. I don't know these fellows or anything about their activities. We don't run with this kind of people.'

Black, an executive in the Coordinating Council of Community Organizations, said, on the other hand, that 'unless Chicago changes its racial policies, it can expect many kinds of things.'

"Rev. Lynward Stevenson, president of The Woodlaw. Organization, said 'All my friends are non-violent."

'The militant leader said he didn't know anythin, about Deacons' activities in Chicago. 'But if theire arring themselves, i'd want to know.'

"This group knows only 'how to get rid of the Klar,' no said. They don't know anything about law and order and the ordinary ways of achieving justice."

"'It's just propaganda,' he said, 'that there are many Klonsmen around, in Chicago or elsewhere. The H. is not nearly as strong as the Crand Wizard has reported."

"Thomas, who lives in Jonesboro, La., the birthplace of the Descons, said the group operates in the South by riding armed with pistols and good rifles in radio-equipped cars."

"He said the primary purpose behind the group was to meet the KKK and similar groups on its own terms."

These informants also advised that there has not been any indication that Thomas has attempted to purchase or obtain any weapons while in Chicago.



On October 20, 1965, Nahaz Rogers, Vice Chairman of ACT, a civil rights organization with headquarters at Chicago, Illinois, appeared on Wesley South's "Hot Line" over Chicago radio station WVON from 11:00 p.m. to 12:00 madnight. The "Hot Line" is a show on which usually a controversial person is interviewed and as a result of the interview, telephone questions are received from the listening audience which are answered by the interviewee.

Rogers' subject for the evening was the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Inc. The following is a transcription of Rogers' remarks; the moderator, Wesley South's statements; and questions telephoned in from the listening audience; and Rogers' replies:

But we teach and preach and hope and pray that every single ACC member will at all times conduct himself like a God-fearing man, and that is, that he will protect himself, he will protect his family, he will protect his property. This is not violence. This is how to deter violence.

And this is obviously lacking in many Negroes over 21 years of age and I don't thing you can be a man unless you possess the qualities that go along with being a man and that is to be willing to protect your family and your home and your children.

Caller

"I don't thing you'll find any Negro man, unless there are very few, who are not willing to protect their rights and their family and their home and what not. And a new organization coming up, I agree with you a lot of organizations in Chicago who are working for Negroes rights, but to me they are all going and assuming different directions until very few are making much head may. We are making headway, and I don't say that Chicago has the best police force in the nation but it's a big organization and any big organization that you find you're going to find a few goods. These men are human. They've got their prejudice too. They're police, but they've still got their prejudice. I don't think that among the police that Chicago has that it's running mant through the whole force. And to me, if you bring in .. another group and something should start where there is a peaceful demonstration and then there's hecklers like there was at Mayor Daley's house, and the Deacons are there to protect those pescaful demonstrators, we would have a riot. And in a riot, it's hard to tell who's right and who's wrong. Especially when you have two groups at odds with each other. They're both vicient.

It's much easier to tell if you have a non-violent group here and a violent group here. It's easy to spot those who were committed to violence before than if you have two violent groups. And this police force to me isn't like the fatal police force in the South. If feel very wholeheartedly that the Deacons do need to have an organization in the South because there is a great-lack of law and order there. And I am not seeing any breakdown of law and order here. This is what I'm wondering about.

I don't want to take up a lot of time, but containly Chicago offers many areas where the time and is remiss in the treatment of Negross. that we have made a lot of headway is wrong. The school system is worse today in 1965 then it was in 1955. And getting more segregated every year. So we are not making the kind of progressic copthat we are making progress in the newspapers, but in fact in many cases we're going backward and there must be a reason. One of these reasons may be that the organizations are not taking a mili and enough stand.

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
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The September 29, 1965 issue of "Rebellion", on Page 3, carried an article captioned "Deacons Hold Rally". This described the rally held at the Roxbury Branch of the YMCA a little over a month ago sponsored by the Boston Friends of the Deacons for Defense. It claimed the meeting was fruitful and encouraging and attended by 150 or more persons. The roster of speakers included Roland Bedford of the Boston Friends of the Deacons; Floyd Hardwick of "Rebellion" and Bill McAde of the David Douglas, both of the Harlem Defense Counsel of New York City.

The central theme of the discussion was the growing need of the masses of black people to be made fully aware of the total insecurity of their portion in the framework of American society.

This issue of "Rebellion" states that the paper is a private publication published in the interest of the nonwhite communities of Boston, Massachusetts. Its masthead states,

NATION OF ISLAM

In January, 1957, a source advised El.jah Muhammad has 15 described his organization on a nationwide, basi; as the "Nation 16 of Islam" and "Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

18 .. On May 7, 1965, a second source advised Elija: ''uhammad 19 is the national leader of the Nation of Islam (NOI); Muha mad's 20 Temple of Islam Number 2, 5335 South Greenwood Avenue, Chicago, 21 Illinois, is the national headquarters of the NOI; and in 22 mid-1960 Muhammad and other NOI officials, when referring to 23 Muhammad's organization on a nationwide basis, commenced usin, 14 either "Mosque" or "Temple" when mentioning one of "Muhammad's 25 Temples of Islam."

The NOI is an all-Negro organization which was 28 originally organized in 1930 in Detroit, Michigan. Muhammad 29 claims to have been selected by Allah, the Supreme Deing, to ?0 lead the so-called Negro race out of slavery in the wilderness of North America by establishing an independent black nation 32 in the United States. Members following Muhammad's teachings 33 and his interpretation of the "Koran" believe there is no such 34 thing as a Negro; the so-called Negroes are slaves of the 35 white race, referred to as "white devils," in the United States; and the white race, because of its exploitation of the so-called Negroes, must and will be destroyed in the approaching "War of 33 Armageddon."

In the past, officials and members of the NOI, including Muhammad, have refused to register under the provisions of the Selective Service Acts and have declared that members cwe no allegiance to the United States.

On May 5, 1958, the first source advised Muhammad had, upon advice of legal counsel, tempered his personal statements and instructions to his ministers concerning the principles of his organization in order to avoid possible prosecution by the United States Government; however, he did not indicate any fundamental changes in the teachings of his organization.



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

NATION OF ISLAM

On May 3, 1965, a third source advised Muhammad had, early in July, 1958, decided to de-emphasize the religious aspects of the teachings of Islam and to stress the economic benefits to be derived by those Negroes who joined the NOI. This policy change, according to Muhammad, would help his acquire additional"followers and create more interest in his programs.



LOTUDER COMMITTEE FOR TRAVEL TO CUBA

"The Columbia Owl," weekly student newspaper of Lolumbia University, New York City, December 12, 1962, issue, lage one, contained an article entitled "Students to Visit Tuba During Holidays." This article stated in part that 16the Ad Hoc Student Committee for Travel to Cuba wis formed Dctober 14, 1962, by a group of students from New York City Euniversities, the University of Wisconsin, Oberlin College 19and the University of North Carolina, who stated that as 20students they would like a chance to see and evaluate the Situation in Cuba for themselves and had received an offer 22of transportation and two weeks' stay in Cuba from the Federation of University Students in Havana, as guests of 2 the Federation. The Committee accepted the offer and applied 250 the State Department of the United States for passport Walidation which was refused; however, over fifty students 2 planned to defy the State Department ban and go to Cuba.

A source advised on December 6, 1962, it was learned Sine Ad Hoc Student Committee for Travel to Cuba had recently bein formed by the Progressive Labor Group. 32

A second source advised on September 13, 1963, that during 24the summer of 1963, fifty-nine individuals traveled to Cuca: the -- eaders of the group were members of the Progressive Labor Movement: Sand the trip was planned and organized by Progressive Labor Movement members. 38

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY (PLP) PROGRESSIVE LABOR MOVEMENT (PLM)

A source advised on April 20, 1965, that the PLP, formerly known as the PLM, held its first national convention April 15-18, 1965, at New York City, to organize the PLM into a PLP. The PLP will have as its ultimate objective the establishment of a militant working class movement based on Marxism-Leninism.

"The New York Times," City Edition, Tuesday, April 20, 1965, page 27, reported that a new party of "revolutionary socialis was formally founded on April 18, 1965, under the name of the PLP. The PLP was described as an outgrowth of the PLM. Its officers were identified as Milton Rosen, New York, President, and William Epton of New York and Mort Scheer of San Francisco, Vice Presidents. A 20-member National Committee was elected to direct the party until the next convention.

According to the article, "The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in 1962 by Mr. Rosen and Mr. Scheer after they were expelled from the Communist Party of the United States for assertedly following the Chinese Communist line."

The PLP publishes the "Marxist-Leninist Quarterly," a theoretical magazine; "Progressive Labor," a monthly magazine; "Challenge," a New York City newspaper; and "Spark," a west coast newspaper.

The June 1, 1965, issue of "Challenge," page 6, states that, "this paper is dedicated to fight for a new way of life where the working men and women own and control their homes, factories, the police, courts, and the entire government on every level."

The source advised that the PLP utilizes the address of General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn 1, New York, but also utilizes an office in Room 622, 132 Nassau Street, New York City, where PLP publications are prepared.

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YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960, issue of the "Young Scialist" ("YS"), page 1, column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue 17 stated this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter 18 clubs of the publication "YS."

19 . The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of YSA. This declaration stated YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the "YS" have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

A source advised on May 7, 1965, that the original YSA was an organization formed during October, 1957, in New York City, by youth of various left-socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The leaders of this group were the guiding forces in the establishment of the national organization.

The source further advised on May 7, 1965, YSA is dominated and controlled on a national basis by the SWP through having SWP members comprise exclusively the National Executive Committee (NEC) and through an official SWP representative at all YSA NEC meetings. The YSA, in reality, is the youth and training section of the SWP and the main source of new SWP members.

The headquarters of the YSA is located in Room 631, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

RACIAL MATTER

The following article appeared in the October 21, 1965, issue of the "Chicago Defender", a Chicago, Illinois, newspaper:

"Wither Thou Goest, I go...seems to be the new pattern for the Deacons of Defense and Justice with regard to the movements of the Ku Klux Klan. Since the Ku Kluxers and its menagerie of prehistoric, fire-spewing characters, have its splashy entrance into our great State of Lincoln, the Deacons' vice president, Earnest Thomas, has announced his indefinite stay in Chicago. Word is that the Klan has organized four chapters in Illinois thus far; Thomas in looking for recruits to join his self-defense organization. The only known northern branch is in Seattle, Washington.

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

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

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

The "Workers World", volume 7, number 20, page 3, dated October 14, 1965, contained an article captioned "President of Deacons for Defense to Speak in New York which reflects that it was announced by Rictue Le Seur, a friend of the Deacons, from the newly opened office of the Friends of the Deacons for Defence and Justice (FDDJ), 271 West 125th Street, Room 209, New York, New York, that Charles Sims, founder of the Deacons for Defense and Justice (DDJ) and Robert Hicks, Vice President of the Bogalusa, Louisiana. Voters League will speak in New York on October 23 and 25, 1965.

The meeting on October 23, 1965, will be at 8:30 p.m. in the Unitarian Hall, Clinton and Fillmore Streets, West Brighton, Staten Island, New York.



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President of the DDJ in Louisiana, arrived in New York City, 1:15 p.m., October 23, 1965, at John F. Kennedy International Airport (JFKIA) on Delta Airlines Flight 976.

he attended (c) a fund raising affair for the DDJ at the Unitarian Church Hall, Clinton and Fillmore Streets, Staten Island, New York, from 8:50 p.m. to 11:00 p.m., October 23, 1965.

The source stated Mae Mallory took up most of the time relating her experiences in the civil rights movement and praising Robert Williams. She pointed out the similarities between Robert Williams' approach and the approach of the DDJ to the civil rights movement. Robert Hicks spoke about the various incidents that occurred in Bogalusa, Louisiana, while attempting to register Negroes to vote. Jerry Gutman, introduced as an attorney for Charles Sims, differed with Mae Mallory, stating that the DDJ is a legally constituted organization which is defensive and will remain so.

Robert Williams is characterized in the Revolutionary Action Movement which appears in the appendix attached hereto.

Charles Sims spoke about the background of the DDJ and stated the purpose of the DDJ is to protect Negro and white civil rights workers. He stated the DDJ is able to effectively deal with the Ku Klux Klan, however, he was critical of the local sheriff's office, stating the past Wednesday (October 20, 1965) the sheriff obtained the names of the DDJ

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leaders and arrested them on various charges.

A characterization of the Ku Klux Klan appears in the appendix attached hereto.

During the question and answer period which followed the speeches Sims stated his primary concern is with the Bogalusa chapter of the DDJ. He stated there are 50 DDJ chapters throughout the south although he declined to comment on the total number of members. Admission of \$2.00 per person was charged. Approximately 60 to 80 persons attended.

he attended b the above mentioned affair and provided essentially the same information as but in addition stated Sims did not criticize any particular approach to the civil rights effort. Sim's main theme appeared to be that those engaged in bargaining on civil rights but in addition stated (4) b issues such as Robert Hicks should be assured protection for themselves and their families.

After the meeting a reception was held for the persons who had appeared at the home of Ricque Le Seur on Staten Island

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

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a fund raising affair at Washington Temple Church of God in Christ, 1372 Bedford Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, on October 24, 1965, where approximately 40 persons were present. This meeting was held after the regular church service which is from 9:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Charles Sims stated during his speech that he is not a speaker, he is a "fighter". He spoke about the background of the DDJ but made no mention of firearms. When Sims requested donations for the organization, most of the audience walked out, however, a collection was taken. The source characterized Sims as a very reserved, very uninteresting speaker.

The "New York Herald Tribune", page 2, dated October 25, 1965, contained an article captioned "Armed Resistance By Negroes Urged" in which it was indicated that at a news conference Robert Hix, the Reverend William H. Melish and Charles Sims said Negroes are going to start hitting tack and perhaps should even arm themselves on the picket line." Hix qualified his statement by saying 'Laws must be obeyed." The Reverend William Howard Melish, identified as a DDJ member, said "Arms were justified to protect life and property."



300 to (c) b1 400 persons attended a meeting held at Emanual AME Church, 37 West 119th Street, New York City, from 8:15 to 10:45 October 25, 1965, at which Jesse Gray, the master of ceremonies, apologized for the absence of Charles Sims, who was to be the main speaker. Gray stated that Sims had to return to Louisiana in order not to forfeit bail on a local charge.

Mae Mallory gave a speech in which she stated each gun for the Deacons cost \$80.00. Mallory asked those in attendance to pledge a gun individually for the Deacons. Several persons signed pledges for guns. A collection of \$126.00 was taken up for the Deacons.



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Sims of the Deacons spoke at a public neeting sponsored by the YAWF at Academy Hall, 853 Broadway, New York City. Sims recounted experiences of racial persecution and claimed that the persecution had been somewhat alleviated through the formation of the Deacons, which are armed for self defense. Sims indicated that the DDJ in Bogalusa had about 200 followers and indicated a new unit was being formed in Chicago. Sims asked for contributions to carry on the work of the DDJ and a collection was made for him.

The "Workers World", volume 7, number 22, page 1, dated November 11, 1965, contained an article captioned 'Charles Sims, Deacon of Defense President, speaks in NYC" which reflects Sims addressed a meeting of 300 at Academy Hall, New York City, sponsored by the YAWF.

The prticle reflects Sims stated civil rights workers, some of them white, had been threatened with physical violence by the Klan and were about to be attacked when he and some friends started an armed defense guard in Bogalusa, Louisiana, in the early part of this year.

Having staked out his men around the local CORE headquarters, Sims saw the chief of police looking things over. At first inclined to ignore the chief, since he knew him as a racist probably in league with the Klan himself, he changed his mind, went over to him and said: "You better stop 'em. 'cause if you don't we're gonna kill them all."

The chief apparently did not take this statement lightly. There was no trouble and Sims reported: "That night a brand new Negro was born."

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A collection of \$400.00 was raised from the audience. Over \$200.00 was raised at a house party in Brooklyn later on.

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APPENDIX

UNITED KLANS OF AMERICA, INC., KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN

Records of Superior Court of Fulton County, Georgia, reflect that this Klan organization was granted * a corporate charter on February 21, 1961, at Atlanta, Georgia, under the name United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc.

A source advised on February 27, 1961, that United Klans was formed as a result of a split in U.S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc. According to the source, the split resulted from a leadership dispute and United Klans has the same aims and objectives as the parent group. These are the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy, and segregation of the races.

The first source and a second source advised in July, 1961, that United Klans, Knights of the Ku III LA Klan of America, Inc., merged with Alabama Knights, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The merged organization established headquarters in Suite 401, the Alston Building, Tuscil ose. Alabama. (The organization is directed by ROBERT SHELMON, Imperial Wizard, and is the dominant Klan group in the South, with units in several Southern states.)

Second source advised that at a meeting at Prattville, Alabama, on October 22, 1961, the U.S. Klass, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, merged with the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Third source advised on August 4, 1965, that the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, is currently an active organization, with Klaverns in several Southern states. This source said that ROBERT SHELTON is the Imperial Wizard of this organization, and was last elected to this position on September 5, 1964, at a National Klonvocation in Birmingham, Alabama. Source said that the activity of the United Klans of America 13 increasing and that the national office remains in Silve 401, Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

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APPENDIX

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REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT

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On November 3, 1964, a source made available a document entitled "The Revolutionary Action Movement Manifesto," the document having been obtained by the source from an individual known to be a member of the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM).

This document stated, in part, that RAM was officially organized in the Winter of 1963 by Afro-Americans who support the revolutionary objectives of ROBERT F. WILLIAMS, now residing in Cuba, and his concept of organized violence to achieve the liberation of the Afro-American people in the United States. This Manifesto disclosed that RAM had oriented its program to one of education and political revolution and the organization of a "black" political party with revolutionary objectives, having recognized the need for a "black revolution" that could and would seize power. RAM philosophy is described in this document as one of revolutionary nationalism, that is, one involving the struggles of the nonwhite races of the world against exploitation and enslavement by the white capitalist and imperialist nations.

Regarding WILLIAMS, it should be noted that on August 28, 1961, a Federal warrant was issued at Charlotte, North Carolina, charging him with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for the crime of kidnapping. Subsequent to the issuance of this warrant, WILLIAMS fled the United States to Cuba, where he now publishes a monthly newsletter entitles "The Crusader" from Havana.

This source in September, 1964, advised RAM is dedicated to the overthrow of the capitalist system in the United States, by violence if necessary, and to its replacement by a socialistic system oriented toward the Chinese communist interpretation of Marxism-Leninism. RAM is entirely nonwhite in membership, clandestine in nature, and owes its primary allegiance to the "Bandung World," that is, the nonwhite races of the world rather than to any national entity, as such.

On November 16, 1964, a second source advised he learned recently from an RAM member that the organization began in Detroit, Michigan, largely under the impetus of DON FREEMAN, described as the "Father" of RAM and referred to

as RAM's "Black Stalin." FREEMAN served as RAM Chairman, with MAXWELL STANFORD, now of New York City formerly of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, serving as RAM l'ield Chairman.

This source stated in May, 1965, there has been no formal headquarters, as such, for RAM but that headquarters have been with FREEMAN since he has played such a dominant role in the leadership of and has directed the policies and activities of the organization.

Within recent months, according to the second source, dissension within RAM has become evident and some dissatisfaction with FREEMAN's leadership has arisen. So far as it known, how-

ever, he remains the titular leader of RAM.

To date, according to the second source in May, 1965. RAM has organized units and membership in several of the larger cities in the United States east of the Mississippi River and the organization is currently active in attempting to recruit new members and expand its sphere of influence.

"WORKERS WORLD"

On May 3, 1965, a confidential source advised that the "Workers World" is the official newspaper of the Workers World Party, published twice monthly, with editorial offices located at 46 West 21st Street, New York, New York.

WORKERS WORLD PARTY

On April 17, 1959, a confidential source advised that on February 12, 1959, a Socialist Workers Party (SWP) minority group under the leadership of National Committee member, SAM BALLAN, split from the SWP.

The source stated that this minority group, referred to as the Marcyites, after many years of program and policy differences on varied issues concerning tactics and interpretation of political events, split from the SWP on the grounds that the Party was liquidating itself by departi from the Marxist precepts of LEON TROTSKY and retreating from the fight for the world socialist revolution. The final issue which ultimately forced the split was the minoricy's opposition to the SWP regroupment policy which involved cooperation with the Communist Party (CP) periphery-individuals characterized by the minority as petty-bourgeois.

The minority program, according to source, advocated unconditional defense of the Soviet Union and has as its goal the building of a revolutionary party with a complete proletarian orientation for the purpose of overthrowing capitalism in the United States and throughout the world.

On May 12, 1960, source advised that this minority group had chosen the name Workers World Party.

On May 3, 1965, second source advised that the Workers World Party, which maintains headquarters at 45 West 21st Street, New York, New York, supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological dispute with the Soviet Union.

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YOUTH AGAINST WAR AND FASCISM

A confidential source advised on March 29, 1965, that the Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF), formerly known as the Anti-Fascist Youth Committee, was established by the Workers World Party (WWP) in the summer of 1962, to bring college and high school youth into the periphery of WWP activities and thereby gain recruits for the organization.

A second confidential source advised on October 23, 1964, that a flyer distributed by the YAWF describes that organization as a militant organization of young workers and worker-students for combating war and faccism.

The first source advised on March 29, 1965, that the YAWF maintains an office in Room 1214, 1123 Broadway, New York City, and publishes a magazine called "The Partisan."

According to the informant, AUSTAN stated that he is not a non-violent pacifist, but rather he believes it violence, on the part of the Negro in order to protect himself, even to the extent of armed violence.


The "Chicago Daily News," a Chicago Illinois, newspaper, issue of October 15, 1965 carried an article captioned "Militent Negroes Here Forming Armed Unit to Fight the Klan." This article went on to relate that EARNEST THOMAS, a Deacons Vice President and full-time paid national organizer, indicated that the Deacons were organizing a Chicago chapter.

On October 25, 1965.

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advised that THOMAS

had reportedly attempted to interest various groups and individuals in Chicago in forming a Chicago chapter but had no success in these attempts.



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REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT

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On November 3, 1964, a source made available a document entitled "The Revolutionary Action Movement Yani-festo," the document having been obtained by the source from an individual known to be a member of the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM).

This document stated, in part, that RAM was officially organized in the Winter of 1963 by Afro-American tho support the revolutionary objectives of Robert F. Williams, now residing in Cuba, and his concept of organized violence to achieve the liberation of the Afro-American people in the United States. This Manifesto disclosed that RAM had oriented its program to one of education and political revolution and the organization of a "black" political party with revolutionary objectives, having recognized the need for a "black revolution" that could and would seize power. RAM philosophy is described in this document as one of revolutionary nationalism, that is, one involving the struggles of the norwhite races of the world against exploitation and enslavement by the white capitalist and imperialist nations.

Regarding Williams, it should be noted that on August 28, 1961, a Federal warrant was issued at Charlotte, North Carolina, charging him with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for the crime of kidnapping. Subsequent to the issuance of this warrant. Williams fled the United States to Cuba, where he now publishes a monthly newsletter entitled "The Crosader" from Havana.

This source in September, 1964, advised RAM is dedicated to the overthrow of the capitalist system in the United States, by violence if necessary, and to its replacement by a socialistic system oriented toward the Chinese Communist interpretation of Marxism-Leninism. RAM is entirely nonwhite in membership, clandestine in nature, and owes its primary illegious to the "Bandung World," that is, the conwhite races of the world rather that to any national entity, as such.



APPENDIX

REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT CONFIGURATION

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On November 16, 1964, a second source advised he learned recently from a RAM member that the organization begar in Detroit, Michigan, largely under the impetus of Don Freeman described as the "Father" of RAM and referred to as RAM's "Black Stalin." Freeman served as RAM Chairman, with Maxwell, Stanford, now of New York City, formerly of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, serving as RAM Field Chairman.

This source stated in May, 1965, there has been no formal headquarters, as such, for RAM but that headquarters have been with Freewan since he has played such a dominant role in the leadership of and has directed the policies and activities of the organization.

Within recent months, according to the second source, dissension within RAM has become evident and some dissatisfaction with Freeman's leadership has arisen. So far as is known, he ever, he remains the titular leader of RAM.

To date, according to the second source in May, 1965, RAM has organized units and membership in several of the larger cities in the United States east of the Mississippi River and the organization is currently active in attenting to recruit new members and expand its sphere of influence.

APPENDIX

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REVOLUTIONARY COMMITTEE OF THE FOURTH INTERNATIONAL

A source advised on September 9, 1964, that the Revolutionary Committee of the Fourth International (RCFI) was also known as the Spartacist Committee and the Spartacist Group. ... This source described the RCFI as being composed of former members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) who had split from the SWP and who were led by James Robertson This source stated that this political unit has its main center in New York City, where it publishes "Spartacist" on a very irregular basis, but their formal meetings are held at least once a week.

A second source advised on March 4, 1964, that Farrell Dobbs, National Secretary of the SWP, sent a letter to all SWP branches in February, 1964, in which he advised that the expelled leader of a minority faction of the SVP, James Robertson, announced on February 10, 1964, that his faction would publicly criticize the SWP and had followed this with a public organ called "Spartacist" in which they attacked the SWP.

The July-August, 1964, issue of "Spartacist," in its masthead describes this publication as follows: "... published bi-monthly by supporters of the Revolutionary Tendency expelled from the Socialist Workers Party." This misthead sets forth that the editor of the publication is James Robertson, and its main address is Post Office Box 1377, General Post Office, New York, New York.





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

The meetings of the Forum generally are held at Chicago SWP headquarters although the Forum, in the past, has sponsored other affairs, such as meetings, socials and picnics held at other locations.

The source mentioned in this memorandum has furnished reliable information in the past.

"The Sunday Star", a weekly Washington, D. C., newspaper, issued February 27, 1966, page B-5, had an article captioned "Negroes Plan Armed Unit On Rights". The article stated the "Deacons for Delenge and Justice" (DDJ), planned to form an armed chapter of the DDJ in Washington, D. C., with Julius Mouson, leader of a Washington organization called Associated Community Teams (ACT), as acting coordinator of the new chapter of DDJ. This had been announced at a meeting held in house Station WUST Music Hall, Washington, D. C., on Februar, ..., 1966.

The March 13, 1966, issue of "The Washington Post", a weekly Washington, D. C., newspaper, on page B-6, had an article captioned "Brutality, Laid To Police By Pickets".

The above article reported that eight members of the Washington, D. C., group of ACT, picketed the Fifth Precinct, 500 E Street, S. E., of the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), on March 12, 1966. Julius Mobson, Chadre man of ACT led the pickets and according to the article, stated the eight pickets were ACT members and that two of them also belonged to "Deacons For Defense". The two "Deacons" were helping the forming of a Washington chapter to protest police brutality, according to Robson's comments.

Some of the comments made on February 26, 1966, at the rally sponsored by ACT at the WUST Radio Hall were deliberately made to create the impression that the "Deacons For Defense" would organize in Wasnington, D. C., with Hobson as acting coordinator. There is no "Deacons For Defense" organization in Washington, D. C, nor is such a group to be organized in D. C. An understanding to that fact exists between Ernesty Thomas, a leader of the "Deacons For Defense", Chicago, Illinois, and Jillus W. Hobson. Thomas would like to organize such a group in D. C. but will abide by Hobson's desires that the Deacons stay out of the D. C. area. Hobson does not want a group that advocates arming its members.

The source stated further as follows:

Julius Hobson was one of the eight ACT pickets who marched in front of the Firth Precinct Station of the MPD, on March 12, 1966, protesting police brutality in Precinct Number Five. Hobson was very angry concerning the incorrect information attributed to Hobson in the "Washington Post" issue of March 13, 1966, page B-J. The article indicated Hobson had said two of the eight ACT members were members of the "Deacons For Defense" and were to form a Washington chapter of the "Deacons For Defense". Hobson denied ever making such a statement to a newsman or anyone else. Hobson stated ACT, to his knowledge, her no members who belong to "Deacons For Defense" of which Ernest Thomas is an organizer.

The source also recalled as follows:

Recently a Negro family in MDD Precinct Number Five, had a wedding reception. Members of the MDD forced their way into the reception and created a disturbance while making arrests. This resulted in accusations that the MDD used brutality. "High Up" orficials of the MDD

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then refused to hold a hearing to determine whether the police were at fault. The general feeling among Negroes is that the MPD should have an open hearing regarding the foregoing incident in order to bring out the true facts. The Negroes in the MPD Precinct Number Five, feel the MPD officials have "white washed" the entire incident. ACT plans to demonstrate at Precinct Number Five on March 10, 1966, in furtherance of ACT's protest against the "police brutality" as displayed at the wedding reception. The protests will continue until the MPD agrees to discuss "Police Brutality".

ACT does not desire a large number of pickets at Precinct Number Five. A large group is difficult to control and could get out of hand. ACT desires that only ACT members, willing to abide by Houson, will be welcome to future picket lines.

The source also stated as follows:

The references to ACT and Deacons For Decembe on the signs carried by the ACT pickets on March 12, 1966, were made to create a feeling that the "Dateons" are coming to D. C. to organize. 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
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THOMAS, Vice President and Regional Organizer of the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Incorporated (DNJ), was the speaker at the meeting of the Triday Night Scriplist Yorkn (FNSF) held on February 18, 1966, at Chicago, Illinois.

THOMAS stated that the DDJ was formed at demediate, Louisiana, in July, 1964, for the purpose of protecting Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) and Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) workers in Louisians who year being beaten and sometimes murdored by the "red necest sheriffs." THOMAS said that in one week the DDJ had 500 armed Negroes.

THOMAS referred to the Civil Rights desconstinations as a "game" and said that he cannot understand people who demonstrate for their rights and said they alould take what is rightfully theirs. THOMAS did not specifically mention how people should take what is rightfully theirs.

THOMAS said that the anti-poverty legislation was enacted just to placate and "sugar coat" the Negro. Some of the comments made on February 26, 1966, at the rally sponsored by ACT at the VUST Radio Hall were deliberately made to create the impression that the "Dreators For Defense" would organize in Washington, D.C., with HCR3ON as acting coordinator. There is no "Deacons For Defense" organization in Washington, D.C., nor as such a group to be organized in D.C. An understanding to that facts exists between ERNEST THOMAS, a leader of the "Deacons For Defense" Chicago, Illinois, and JULIUS W. HOBSON. THOMAS would be organize such a group in D.C., but will abide by HOBSON's desires that the Deacons stay out of the D.C. area. HORSON does not want a group that advocates arming its members.

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The source stated further as follows ANT CALLAN

JULIUS HOBSON was one of the eight ACT pickets who marched in front of the Fifth Precinct Station of the MPD, on March 12, 1966, protesting police brutality in Precinct Number Five. HOBSON was very angry concerning the incorrect information attributed to HOBION in the "Washington: Post" issue of March 13, 1966, page E-6 The article indicated HOBSON had said two of the eight ACT members were members of the "Deacons For Defense" and were to form a Washington chapter of the "Deacons For Defense." HOBSON denied ever making such a statement to a newsman or mayor a else. HOBSON stated ACT, to his knowledge, has no members who belong to "Deacons For Defense" of which ERNEST THOMAS is an organizer.

. The source also recalled as follows:

Recently a Negro family in MPD Practicat Number Five, had a wedding receiption. Members of the MPD forced their way into the reception and created a disturbance while making arrests. This resulted in accusations that the MPD used brutality. "High Up" officials of the MPD than rafused to hold a hearing to determine whether the police were at fault. The general feeling among Nagroes is that the MPD should have an open hearing regarding the foregrang incident in order to bring out the true facts. The Negroes in the MPD Precinct Number Five, feel the MPD officials have "white washed" the entire incident. ACT plans to demonstrate at Precinct Number Five on March 19, 1966, and furtherance of ACT's protest against the "police bint lify" as displayed at the wedding reception. The protests well continue until the MPD agrees to discuss "Police Ecutality."

ACT does not desire a large number of pickate at Precinct Number Five. A large group is difficult to comerci. and could get out of hand. ACT desires that only ACT members, willing to abide by HOBSON, will be welcome to future picket lines.

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NATION OF ISLAM, Formerly Referred to as the Muslim Cult of Islam, Aka. Muhammad's Temples of Islam

In January, 1957, a source advised ELIJAH MUHAMMAD described his organization on a nationwide basis as the "National Islam" and Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

On May 7, 1965, a second source advised ELIVAH MUHA I II is the national leader of the Nation of Islam (NOI); Muharmad's Temple of Islam No. 2, 5335 South Greenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, is the national headquarters of the NOI; and a midel of MUHAMMAD and other NOI officials, when referring to MUHAMMAD and other NOI officia

The NOI is an all-Negro organization which was original organized in 1930 in Detroit, Michigan, MUHAMMAD claims to have been selected by Allah, the Supreme Being, to lead the so-called Negro race out of slavery in the wilderness of North America by establishing an independent black nation in the United States. Members following MUHAMMAD's teachings and his interpretation of the "Koran" believe there is no such thing as a Negro; that the so-called Negroes are slaves of the white race, referred to as "white devils," in the United States; and that the white race, because of its exploitation of the so-called Negroes, must aid will be destroyed in the approaching "War of Armagedden."


In the past, officials and members of the NOI, including MUHAMMAD, have refused to register under the provisions of the Selective Service Acts and have declared that members one allegiance to the United States.

On May 5, 1958, the first source advised MUFARMAD had, upon advice of legal counsel, tempered his personal statements and instructions to his ministers concerning the principles of his organization in order to avoid possible prosecution by the United States Government; however, he did not indicate any fundamental changes in the teachings of his organization.

On May 3, 1965, a third source advised MUHAMWAD had, early in July, 1958, decided to de-emphasize the religious aspects of the teachings of Islam and to stress the economic benefits to be derived by those Negroes who joined the NOI. This policy change, according to MUHAMMAD, would help him acquire additional followers and create more interest in his program.

SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY - NEW YORK LOCAL

A source stated on August 25, 1960, that the New York Local (NYL) of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) was founded during 1938 in New York City.

A second confidential source stated on April 8, 1964 that the NYL was affiliated with and followed the aims and purposes of the National SWP.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT

On November 3, 1964, a source made available a document entitled "The Revolutionary Action Movement Manifesto," the document having been obtained by the source from an individual known to be a member of the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM).

This document stated, in part that RAM was officially organized in the winter of 1963 by Afro-Americans who support the revolutionary objectives of Robert F. Williams, now residing in Cuba, and his concepthof organized vactions to achieve the liberation of the Afro-American people as the United States. This Manifesto disclosed that RAM had ordented its program to one of education and political revolution and the organization of a "black" political party with revolutionary objectives, having recognized the need for a "black revolutiona" that could and would seize power. RAM philsoophy is described in this document as one of revolutionary nationalism, that is, one involving the struggles of the nonwhite races of the world against exploitation and enslavement by the white capatalist and imperialist nations.

Regarding Williams, it should be noted that on August 28, 1961, a Federal warrant was issued at Charlotta, North Carolina, charging him with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for the crime of kidnapping. Subsequent to the issuance of this warrant, Williams fled the United Stages to Cuba, where he now publishes a monthly newsletter enumbed "The Crusader" from Havana.

This source in September, 1964, advised RAM is decicated to the overthrow of the capitalist system in the United States, by violence if necessary, and to its replacement by a socialistic system oriented toward the Chinese Communist interpretation of Marxism-Leninism. RAM is entirely nonwhite in membership, clandestine in nature, and owes its primary allegiance to the "Bandung World," that is, the nonewhite races of the world rather than to any national entity, as such.

REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT

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On November 16, 1964, a second source advised he learned recently from a RAM member that the organization begain Detroit, Michigan, largely under the impetus of Don Freeman described as the "Father" of RAM and referred to as RAM's "Black Stalin." Freeman served as RAM Chairman, with Maxwell Stanford, now of New York City, formerly of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, serving as RAM Field Chairman.

This source stated in May, 1965, there has been no formal headquarters, as such, for RAM but that headquarters of have been with Freeman since he has played such a dockmant role in the leadership of and has directed the policies and activities of the organization.

Within recent months, according to the second accord, dissension within RAM has become evident and some dissatisfaction with Freeman's leadership has arise. So far as is known, however, he remains the titular leader of RAM.

To date, according to the second source in May, 1965, RAM has organized units and membership in several of the larger cities in the United States east of the Mississuppl River, and the organization is currently active in admirphilate to recruit new members and expand its sphere of influence.

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REVOLUTIONARY COMMITTEE OF THE FOURTH INTERNATIONAL

A source advised on September 9, 1964, that the Revolutionary Committee of the Fourth International (RCFI) was also known as the Spartacist Committee and the Spartacist Group. This source described the RCFI as being composed of former members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) who had split from the SWP and who were led by JAMES ROBERTSON. This source stated that this political unit has its main center in New York City, where it publishes "Spartacist" on a very irregular basis, but their formal meetings are held at least once a week.

A second source advised on March 4, 1984, that FARRELL DOBBS, National Secretary of the SWP, sent a letter to all SWP branches in February, 1964, in which he advised that the expelled leader of a minority faction of the SWP, JAMES ROBERTSON, announced on February 10, 1964, that his faction would publicly criticize the SWP and had followed this with a public organ called "Spartacist" in which they attacked the SWP.

The July-August, 1964, issue of "Spartacist," in its masthead describes this publication as follows: "... published bi-monthly by supporters of the Revolutionary Tendency expelled from the Socialist Workers Party." This masthead sets forth that the editor of the publication is JAMES ROBERTSON, and its main address is Post Office Box 1377, General Post Office, New York, New York.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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

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Bogalusa **Unit Plans** Move to D.C.

'Deacons' Protest Alleged Police Brutality Here

. By William Raspherry

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The Deacons for Defense and Justice, organized a year ago in Bogalusa, La., to retaliate for white attacks on Negroes, have been branching out and plan to establish a chapter here. Already they claim scores of active chapters in several Southern states. They reportedly are moving north as well.

The Deacons insist their purposes are purely defensive-to protect the Negro community against white violence. Pri-marily they have operated in the South, striking back at the Ku Klux Klan and protecting Raspberry civil rights demonstrations.

Why are they coming to Washington, where demonstrators almost never are subjected to violence and where there has been no reported Klan activity?

According to Julius W. Hobson, militant leader of ACT and a prospective Deacon, it is because of increasing brutality on the part of police officers and failure of officials to punish it.

He blamed brutality for two recent jail-cell suicides and cited the case of a wedding party melee in south-east Washington during which seven persons, including four policemen, were upjured. Hobson said the judge in that case "upheld the police before he even heard the witnesses." He said there have been "five or six people to die in jail, recently, and the only explanation we get is from the police who put them there."

NOT ONLY can Negroes not expect justice from officials in cases of brutality, said Hobson, but "the middle-class Negro leadership acquiesces in this mistreatment by sitting on these committees." Hobson him-self sat for two years on the Police Chief's Citizens' Adsory Committee, which during that time "took a hundred cases (of alleged brutality) and never anything about them."

He finally quit the committee.

As to the Deacons, Hobson's theory is that since neither the Police Department, the courts nor the Complaint Review Board acts with sufficient vigoragainst allegations of police brutality, Negroes must organize to strike back at brutal officers.

It is a dangerous theory. It is one thing for a Negro in Bogalusa to take a shot at a fleeing car whose occu-

pints have just fired into his home. It is quite anothe: for an armed group to ga running for a policeman be-cause they have heard rum irs of brutality.

ASKED ABOUT the dange: of a misguided attack or an officer who had used force to maintain a legitimate arrest, Hobson noted that the "police make a lot of mistakes; the people will make a lot of mistakes too." He didn't appear to be un-du y bothered by the prospect.

Hobson said the Deacous probably could recruit as many as 300 to 400 "good men" in the Washington in .. the Washington area. It will be difficult to tell whether that estimate is high. While the Deacons operate more or less openly in Bogalusa, they have been inclined to secrecy in other areas.

Capt. Thomas Herliny, head of the Police Department's Special Investigations Squad, said he was aware that officials of the Deacons for Defense had been to Washington and were scheduled to return this week. He said, however, that the information given him indicated that the Washington group would be essentially a fund-raising organization to support Deacon chapters in Chicago and elsewhere.

Herlihy said he had no knowledge of Minuteman activities in Washington, but for Hobson the fact that the FBI uncovered a Min-uteman rifle range and training site last year in northern Virginia is reason. enough for Negroes here to arm themselves. The Min utemen are a militant group who say they train themselves against a "Communist" takeover of the U.S.

Crambling has a noteworthy record of being a people-centered town. The efforts of its leaders in the past were so directed, and all current plans are geared to making and keeping Grambling a good place for people to live.

Organizations like the Grambling Improvement Association are working continuously to insure good housing for Grambling citizens, to secure agencies and industries which will provide employment outlets, and to give direction to recreational development.

A thriving Federal Credit Union is working steadfastly to provide area citizens the opportunity to establish financial strength for themselves and to provide a source of help in time of need.

Grambling College steadfastly lends its assist-Grambling Water Supply ance and leadership to all worthwhile community endeavors, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Grambling work unceasingly to coordinate the efforts for betterment on the part of all individuals and agencies and to sponsor those legal pathways to progress for which it is responsible.

In addition to an expanding city-maintained recreation park, the area abounds with good fishing and hunting regions for those who like these recreational pursuits. Swimming facilities are available in nearby Ruston and on the Grambling College-campus. Three standard movie theatres and one drive-in operate in the Grambling environs. Dozens of outstanding cultural attractions open to the general public are sponsored on the college campus each year along with many first-rate games in football, basketball, and baseball.

Social and fraternal groups of wide description and broad purpose abound in the community.

In regard to medical services, close ties have long been maintained between the Grambling College Infirmary and the Grambling Community. A hospital, three clinics, and numerous physicians, surgeons, and dentists are available in the Grambling

Continuous efforts are being made by the officials of the Town of Grambling, civic and educational agencies, and various leaders to the end that the people of Grambling may have life and have it











The beginnings of Grambling actually go back to the establishment of Lincoln Parish in 1873 from portions of Jackson, Union, Claiborne, Bienville and Ouachita parishes when cotton growing became increasingly profitable in the area and many modest tarms were developed in the region.

The birth of Ruston occurred in 1884 when a subdivision of 80 acre, belonging to a large landowner named Robert E. Russ was laid out as a townsite by the VS & P Railroad (Illinois Central) in exchange for a right-of-way through the Russ property. The VS & P mainline ran from Shreveport to Vicksburg and around the turn of the century one P. G. Grambling established a sawmill near the present site of Grambling. The Railroad established a spur and way-st tion to service the timber business and the stop was named for Mr. Grambling.

The sawnill soon went out of existence, but meanwhile several small justinesses had been established, churches built, and in 1901, the North Louisiana Colored Farmer's Relief Association, made up of more than fifteen hundred persons from five parishes, set about establishing an industrial school. The association contacted Tuskegee's Booker T. Washington and secured on August 4, 1901, the services of Charles PaAdams, who founded the Colored Industrial and Agricultural School of Lincoln Parish in the Allen Green Community just north of the present location of Grambling. The history of Grambling has been clinked almost inseparably with the growth and development of this school in the community.

By 1905 the industrial school was moved to its present site. In 1918 it became Lincoln Parish Training School; in 1928, it became Louisiana Negro Normal and Industrial Institute, a state-supported junior college. In 1940 a four-year, degree-granting program was initiated at what was now to be called Grambling College. Meanwhile, more and more families began to cluster in the immediate vicinity of the village and the college, more businesses were statted

a post office put in operation, and the town began to grow.

During the 1958-59 school year, the duly authorized Liberal Arts Program was put into effect. For the 1959-60 school year, the College was reorganized under the following divisions: Division of Applied Sciences and Technology, Division of Education, and Division of Liberal Arts. Beginning September, 1963, the College instructed the Division of General Studies.


In September, 1953, Grambling was incorporated under the Statue laws of the State of Louisiana. The first official meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen were held October 1, 1953 for the Village of Grambling, Louisiana. The first officers were a Mayor, three Aldermen and Marshal, appointed by the Governor of the State of Louisiana.

In 1959, by proclamation of the Governor of the State of Louisiana the Village was declared a Town, with a population of 3,144 citizens.


Since the incorporation of the Town, major bond issues have been floated for the establishment of water, sewerage and a town hall. Many other developments such as streets, street lights, natural gas, telephones, etc., have been initiated by the town.

The present officers of the town are a Mayor, five Aldermen, and a Marshal elected by popular vote. Appointed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen are Public Utilities Commissioner, Treasurer-Clerk, Secretary-Tax Collector, and Street Commissioner. Also a Planning and Zoning Commission, consisting of nine persons.



Reference is made to memorandum at Detroit, Michiga dated March 24, 1966, captioned as above.

> A characterization of the Friday Night Socialist Forum is contained in the appendix attached hereto.

All unidentified sources utilized in the appendix have furnished reliable information in the past.

On April 4, 1966, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Ernest Thomas, Vice President of the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Incorporated, from Jonesboro, Louisiana, spoke in Detroit, Michigan, on April 1, 1966, at a forum sponsored by the Friday Night Socialist Forum which was held at 3737 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, Michigan.

Source advised that Thomas was the featured speaker at this forum and spoke for approximately one hour. According to source, approximately 60 to 70 individuals, the majority of whom were Negro, were in attendance at this forum.

Thomas, during his talk, indicated that by the summer of 1966, there will be "groups of Deacons" in every community in both the North and South. Thomas indicated that the headquarters of the Deacons is located in Chicago and that the Deacons also receive their training in Chicago before being dispatched to various cities throughout the United States to form Deacon clubs.

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
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Thomas indicated, at the present time, that the Deacons are direly in need of funds and that the Deacons in order to obtain these funds, plan on putting pressure of rich Negroes. Thomas indicated, during his talk, if the white power structure in the United States does not maintain law and order, then the Deacons plan to take law and order into their own hands. He stated that the Deacons would dea in a harsh manner with any informants of the Federal Bureau, of Investigation (FBI) or Central Intelligence Agency within their organization and plan on utilizing all their resources in an effort to get Negro citizens to vote in the forthcoming elections throughout the United States.

Thomas indicated that his organization was protecting civil rights workers in the South and preventing anyone from harming these civil rights workers while engaged in their activities. Thomas discussed the recent rioting in the Watts area of Los Angeles, California, and that which took place during the summer of 1965. He indicated it was significant that in the recent rioting which took place in the Watts area, thay many of the individuals involved were armed with rifles and other weapons, whereas during the summer of 1965, very few of the Negroes were armed.

The Articles of Incorporation of the Deacons of Defense and Justice (DDJ) as on file with the Secretary of State, for the State of Louisiana, reflects that the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Inc. is a Louisiana corporation domiciled at Jonesboro, Louisiana. The location and business office address of its registered office shall be Amos Service Station (rear), Beach Spring Road, Drawer B, Jonesboro, Louisiana.

"This corporation is organized for the following purposes and to carry on the following purposes: To instruct, train,

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"teach and educate Citizens of the United States and especially minority groups in the fundamental principals of the republican form of government and our democratic way of life; to instruct, teach, train and educate & said persons in the provisions of the constitution and laws of the United States and the State of Louisiana, as well as the constitution and laws of any other State wherein this corporation may operate; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the use, value and purpose of the ballot and the right to vote; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons as to the duties and responsibilities of good citizenship relative to the obligation and duties of the citizen to the community and the obligation and duties of the community to the citizen: To further instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the value of economic security and in the effective use of their spending power; to inspire in said persons a sense of responsibility and to develop leadership. This corporation has for its further purpose, and is dedicated to, the defense of the civil rights, property rights and personal rights of said people and will defend said rights by any and all honorable and legal means to the end that justice may be obtained. This corporation may establish chapters and conduct its business at my place in this State and elsewhere as permitted by law."



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

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

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Not Trying to Start Movement in North

Negro Vigilantes Here Will Aid Dixie Fight

"The Deacons for Defense and Justice, an armed Negro self-defense organization, is starting a Chicago branch 'to help in the struggle in the South,' says president Charles Sims.

"'We're not trying to come up here and start a movement,' said the massive, soft-voiced native of Bogalusa, La., at a press conference in a home at 7354 S. Michigan.

"Sims said the Deacons hope to raise money and manpower here for civil rights campaigns in Bogalusa and other Southern cities."

"With him at the press conference was A. Z. Young, president of the Bogalusa Voters League. The Voters League is the local civil rights group in Bogalusa, focus of marches and demonstrations last summer.

"Sime said the Deacons were organized when local police could not protect Negroes and civil rights workers.

"He said armed Deacons patrol Negro neighborhoods, guard the homes of civil rights leaders and watch Negro churches 'so they don't get bombed.'

"Sims and Young said they are trying to raise money for the defense of 90 children and six adults going on trial in Bogalusa Friday on charges growing out of demonstrations last October.

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"They said they have no money to pay fines in the event of a guilty verdict.

"Young said he also was seeking support for a 105-mil march from Bogalusa to the Louisiana state capital in Baton Rouge, to take place within 60 days.

"'We're going to clean up the whole state of Louisiana, said Young. "The whole state is out of line.'

"THE BOGALUSA leaders said they wanted to confer with the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King 'to ask his support in out struggle in Bogalusa.' King was expected to return to Chicago Thursday.

"Sims said he 'hadn't planned on' working with King in Chicago. 'We want Dr. King's help for Bogalusa,' he said.

"King, who preaches nonviolence, has been critical of the Deacons, but Young said 'King might have been misled about the Deacons and the Voters League in Bogalusa.'

"'The Rogalusa Votors League is nonviolent, just like Dr. King's organization, 'said Young. 'And the Deacons are nonviolent -- up to a point.'

"In Chicago, Sims suggested, a Deacons' chapter might try to register more Negro voters.

"'I understand Dick Gregory is running for mayor,' he said. 'If there was a Deacons chapter here, it could endorse Mr. Gregory.'

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"Sims said it was 'not true' that the Deacons we a black Ku Klux Klan.

"'We're a defensive organization, organized to defend people, have said. 'We have a constitutional right to defend out home, our children and our lives.'

"He said the organization has chapters in many Southern cities. 'In the South,' he said, 'the (white) man is making us pick up arms in order to live.'

"While the Northern Negro can use ballots instead of bullets, he said, 'there's a need for Beacons anywhere in the country where black men exist.'"

The following article appeared in the April 8, 1966, issue of the "Chicago Daily News", a Chicago, Illinois, newspaper:

"Prince Hall Masons Deny Deacons Link

"The head of the state Prince Hall Masons has strongly denied his organization has any connection with the Deacons for Defense and Justice, a Southern-based Negro vigilance group that reportedly is starting a chapter here.

"Oscar Stagron DePriest, grand master of the organization, said, 'We most certainly disown any intention of affiliation with any group... which carries guns or other weapons.'

"The Deacons are said to carry guns in their fight against the Ku Klux Klan.

"LaVernon Cornelius, worshipful master of the Olive Branch Lodge 94 of Prince Hall, had said that a recent visit to Chicago by several Deacons was backed by his lodge."

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'"I have ordered a sweeping investigation into the affairs of Olive Branch Lodge, DePriest said Thursday night at the Masons office, 4227 S. Cottage Grove.

"'I have already contacted several members (of Lodge 94) who say they know nothing concerning any invitation to the so-called Deacons from Louisiana.'

"DE PRIEST SAID he had ordered Cornelius to 'cease and desist' any activity connected with the Deacons and his capacity as worshipful master. Cornelius was not present at the press conference.

"DePriest said he would ask for the minutes of past meetings of Lodge 94, which has about 100 members. He said the over-all membership in Prince Hall Masons in the state is about 10,000.

"Meanwhile, Mary Lowe, who manages the building at 30 W. Washington, where Cornelius reported the Deacon chapter was located, said there is no such group in the building."

Ernest Thomas, characterized as the local organizer for the Deacons For Defense and Justice (DDJ). and as Regional Vice-President and Northern Director for the DDJ, appeared on the program "Hot Line" on WVON radio, Chicago, Illinois on May 23, 1966. "Not Line" is a radio program on which a controversial figure is usually interviewed. Telephone questions are solicited from listeners which are answered by the interviewee. A transcript of the program pertaining to THOMAS is as follows:

Well, I've been in and out of Chrago for the last seven months. Presently it's around 455 actual members of it now. But the number is going to grow quite large. Actually, we got to open an office on the north and south side now because we have such a great number that is coming in we won't be able with the space that is ...

Listen, I want to ask you. I noticed you opened on the west side first. Why did you open over there and not on the south?

Well, you take the west siders for instance.

I wouldn't even recommend that a man stand out in front of the A&P or the Acme (phonetic), markets and look at a ham, and starve to death there. So the best thing for him to do would be to break the glass to get him some ham. Now so the structure wants to deal with this then they have to begin to give some jobs, make some jobs.

Will you also be a job seeking agency? Certainly. We will be trying to seek out employment for, as the structure say, qualified personnel. We will be trying to find them some qualified personnel.

You see, because how tell a man that you are going to be out her after this freedom and are going to letthin your head and when he whip your head you are coming back tomorrow and let him whip your head To us this does not seem like being a man. we are after what is rightfully ours and upon action for what is rightfully ours then I expect to get it and we don't expect you to use brute force against us to deny us this. Ladies and gentlemen. I just got a note from the control room that we had a little difficulty before we went on the air and probably you didn't hear who our guest is tonight. He is Mr. ERNEST THOMAS, who is the Regional President and Northern Director of the Deacons for Defense and Justice. They opened an office on the west side three weeks ago. As I said, I want to welcome nim back. You know he was our guest, I think it was back in October, wasn't it Yes, it was.

So in case you were listening and wondering who that was on the 'Hot Line" his name is ERIES THOMAS and he's the top Deason here. right?

Well, we intend to protect civil rights wor to a point in the city of Chicago. If we'r called upon to help out then we will do this Now what do you mean by that. That's rather ambiguous. If we're called - say that they are marching as they did down near Mayor DALEY's home as they did last summer and they ask you for protection. Now maybe, oh maybe 200 or 300 policemen there. Would they feel they needed some protection from you? I mean just say that someone said well here's a good chance for us to have a confrontation. Let's call the Deacons. What would you do in a case like this? Well, we would come in more or less as witnesses to the fact. We wouldn't participate openly in the march but we would be there as spectators and we would be looking out for police brutality and John Bigot coming around and agitating thema whereas they have committed them to non-violence. So that if the police would not handle Join Bigot we would take care of John Bigot for them

Now what do the Deacons, what do you think about the Chicago Police Department? Well, here on the off and on periods that I have been in the city here could stand a lot, could be changed in Chicago here with the police department to make it function a little better. For an instance, on the west side here you see sometimes two white police. Well, a lot of times you see two white policemen in the car together, two blacks together, then you see, the car. When you see things like this you know

that some black person is going to get abused because when they riding like that that is what they're out there big. Ninet/ per cent of the time And this is bad. And if the man really want to make a change in Chicago then there should be integration here. Black and white policetogether. And this way the black one couldn's abuse the white one and the white one couldn't 'abuse the black one because after all he belongs to the black race and he bolongs to the white race. This would seem to be a way of . balancing it out. But I've been told they have done it last year, you know, during the riots for a while but then they put them back together. So I don't know what the situation is going to be here. That would be one of my suggestions to, as a matter of fact I have a meeting with Superintendent WILSON on Thursday evening. I am going to strongly suggest this would be one of the best things really if they intended to try to keep it coolsome, is to put a little integration in the Chicago Police Department.

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Did you say you will be meeting with Superintendent WILSON? When?

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The Articles of Incorporation of the Deacons of Defense and Justice (DDJ) as on file with the Secretary of State, for the State of Louisiana, reflects that the Deacons of Defense and Justice, Incorporated is a Louisiana corporation domiciled at Jonesboro, Louisiana. The location and business office address of its registered office shall be Amos Service Station (rear), Beach Spring Road, Drawer B, Jonesboro, Louisiana.

"This corporation is organized for the following purposes and to carry on the following purposes:

To instruct, train, "teach and aducate Citizens of the United States and especially minority groups in the fundamental principals of the republican form of government and our democratic way of life; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the provisions of the constitution and laws of the United States and the State of Louisiana, as well as the constitution and laws of any other State wherein this corporation may operate; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the use, value and purpose of the ballot and the right to vote; to instruct, teach, train and educate said persons as to the duties and responsibilities of good citizenship relative to the obligation and duties of the community to the citizen: To further instruct, teach, train and educate said persons in the value of economic, security and in the effective use of their spending power; to inspire in said persons a sense of responsibility and to develop leadership. This corporation nation its further purpose, and is dedicated to, the defence of the civil rights, property rights and personal rights of said people and will defend said rights by any and all honorable and legal means to the end that justime may be obtained. This corporation may establish chapters and conduct its business at any place in this State and elsewhere as permitted by law."

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

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
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

On 4/6/66, a pretext telephone call to 665-0787, the number listed on a pamphlet issued by the Harlem Committee for the Defense of Free Speech, was answered by an unidentified male who stated that neither he nor any of the other persons in the office know who to contact to join the Deacons. In fact, he stated he wished he did because he would join. He stated he does not believe there is such an organization in New York at the present time. (The number 666-0787 is listed to the Harlem Unemployment Center, 139 West 125th St.)

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on 4/22/66,

advised that he has no knowledge of any planned activities of the DDJ in the Pennsylvania, New Jersey or New York areas.

He stated that is in no way associated with the DDJ and has never expressed an interest in becoming affiliated with the organization. Although did not elaborate, he expressed the feeling that in his opinion, is not the type of individual he would want in the DDJ. advised that EARNIO THOMAS, Vice President of the Jonesboro, Louisiana, DDJ, is presently in Jonesboro, Louisiana, and has not indicated that he has any knowledge of planned activities of the DDJ in Pennsylvania, New York, or New Jersey. emphatically stated that if any such plans did exist, he would certainly be aware of them. He advised that he, himself, has no desire to become active in that area, and has heard no leaders of the DDJ express a desire to do so.

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

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
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
