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



stated that he resides at Massachusetts.

said that he is a member of the Medical Committee for Human Rights (MCHR) which has its headquarters in New York City. He said that he understood that on March 7, 1965 Doctor MARTIN LUTHER KING got in touch with the MCHR in New York City and requested that a number of physicians be sent to Selma, Alabama to supply medical presence.

said that he was asked by MCHR to go to Selma and he did so in the company of of New York City. He said that he arrived at Montgomery, Abbama, at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, March 8, 1965, and travelled by automobile to Selma, Alabama with Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, arriving at 11:00 p.m. on March 8, 1965. He added that he departed Selma at 6:30 a.m. on March 11, 1965, returning to Boston.

March 10, 1965 he was standing on Sylvan Street in downtown Selma, Alabama together with a type of ambulance, which described as a panel truck containing first aid supplies and equipment. He said that they were fairly close to a police barricade that had been put up to prevent civil rights sympathizers from marching. He said that the reason they were in that area was because they anticipated that there might be violence and that they wanted to be in a position to give first aid or other medical assistance of an emergency nature.

said that at about this time, shortly after noontime, an unmarked automobile approached containing three uniformed Alabama State Troopers, and a fourth man in civilian clothes who was subsequently identified as

montgomery, Alabama. Said that the car stopped and one of the State Troopers got out and ordered them into the car. Said that the got into the car without comment. Said that as he approached the car he stopped and asked the Trooper if he was under arrest. The Trooper said, "Never mind. Just get in."

asked where they were going and the Trooper said that they were going to the jail said that they proceeded to the Sheriff's Office in the County Courthouse where they were questioned at length by said that at this point he did not know the names of any of the State Troopers and added that he had no conversation by with them after he entered the automobile, other than the conversation that he mentioned above. He said that they did not question him and that all questioning was done by

He stated that asked for identification, which was given, and then asked why they had come to Selma, Alabama.

that they had come to provide medical presence for the civil rights workers, to expedite the transfer of any injured persons to local physicians or hospitals and to provide emergency first aid, if necessary, to any person.

Alabama law concerning the practice of medicine and said that inasmuch as we were not licensed under Alabama law that

we would be violating state law if we advised, diagnosed or treated any person. Stated that he and his companion contended that while they believed in state licensing laws they wished to point out that they had not come to Alabama to practice medicine or to violate the law in any way. He said that any physician, regardless of whether he was licensed in a given state, had the legal and moral obligation to give emergency assistance to an injured person. He said that the said that this was true only if a medical disaster was declared by the Governor, and further, that there are plenty of physicians available who were licensed to practice in Alabama.

said that they argued pro and con on this point and it ended up with making the statement that if we so much as touched an injured person or picked him up or assisted in any way, or gave any first aid or other treatment, no matter what the emergency, we would be immediately arrested.

said that they asked if he would have prevented them from giving emergency medical treatment to the Boston Minister whose skull had been fractured the previous day.

there and had attempted to assist the injured Minister in any way, he would have had them arrested immediately.

In answer to this said that he and his companion told that if they were in the presence of any person, whether he be a civil rights worker or a state policeman who was injured and required emergency care, they will obey their conscience and obligation as physicians, regardless of his threat to arrest them.

they were in the Courthouse being questioned by was approximately one hour. I did all of the questioning and no one else participated in the interview. There were other individuals, both in uniform and in civilian clothes, who were moving in and out of the room, but they did not

participate in the interview. He stated that he and his companion were not charged, booked, nor fingerprinted, and further, they were not physically abused in any way.

office a man in civilian clothes, whose identity was not known to them, walked in to the room carrying a camera and asked and if he could take their picture for identification purposes.

said that inasmuch as they felt that they had already been photographed on a number of occasions by the State Police, he said that he could see no objection to this and, accordingly, consented.

explained that while he was engaged in his civil rights work in Selma he observed on a number of occasions State Troopers photographing him from a distance.)

said that he and his companion were then photographed front and profile views.

stated that he did not feel that he had any choice in the matter when he was ordered to enter the patrol car at the request of the Trooper. He said that when he was told to get into the police car he obeyed because he felt that he would be forced into the car if he refused, and quite likely hurt. Similarly, he stated that when he was in the Courthouse being questioned by the felt that he was not free to leave and could not leave until permission was granted. While he was in the Courthouse he did not ask if he was under arrest as he felt it would serve no purpose.

said that when he and
were working in Selma, Alabama under the supervision of Drs.
and he said that this would be consistent
with Alabama law as outlined in Chapter 13, Title 4, Sections
268 and 295. He said that he looked this up and in the
State Medical Licensing Law, Section 295, it was stated,

advised that when he left the Dallas County Courthouse on March 10, 1965 at approximately 1:00 p.m., he was returned by automobile to the Sylvan Street area in downtown Selma. He said that he first went into the headquarters of the civil rights workers which was in the First Baptist Church on Sylvan Street and then back to the ambulance. He stated that he returned to the ambulance to resume and take up the work that he had been doing prior to the time that the troopers had taken him to the county courthouse. He said that from this time until the following morning at 6:30 when he departed Selma he remained on Sylvan Street either at the ambulance or at the clinic in the First Baptist Church. He said that he was there all night as it was felt necessary. He said that he was there ready and willing to offer first aid or emergency medical treatment to anyone who might need it. He added, that as a matter of fact, he did not treat anyone as there was no need of his services. He said that he had every intention of giving medical treatment of an emergency nature to anyone who needed it but the occasion did not arise.

All of the supervisory personnel in the General Investigative Division that have had any contact with Departmental Attorneys have emphatically stated that they had no knowledge in their possession concerning the results of the investigation by the Mobile Office as to

SAC Dalness telephonically advised that neither he nor any of the Agents working this case at Selma furnished any information whatsoever to any Departmental Attorneys or anyone else indicating that any of the police officers involved in the brutal beating of the marchers on Sunday afternoon, March 7, 1965, had been identified. SAC Dalness advised that, as of the present time, none of the police officers who actually participated in the brutality have been identified. He stated that photographs are available of quite a large number of the officers and that investigation is continuing to try and identify these police officers. The investigation to obtain information needed for the hearing on March 11th was completed as of the afternoon of March 10th. The identification of the police officers has been difficult due to the fact a large majority were wearing gas masks. Dalness has been instructed to concentrate the efforts of the Agents to complete these identifi-

Memorandum to Mr. Belmont RE: REGISTRARS OF VOTERS DALLAS COUNTY, ALABAMA

WHY SAC DALNESS FURNISHED WRITTEN NOTES OF INVESTIGATION TO ACTING ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL JOHN DOAR

SAC Dalness states that there was a great deal of pressure and time was of the essence in making available to Acting Assistant Attorney General Doar the information that he desired, and that after a conference with Doar, a decision was reached that the only way the matter could be handled in order that Doar would have his information in sufficient time was to permit Doar to read the handwritten signed statements Agents had obtained, as well as to make available to him copies of the rough draft interview report forms that had been prepared by Agents. Dalness states that this decision was made on the basis that it was the only way the matter could be handled in view of the time element. Concerning the authority for such action on his part, Dalness believes that he discussed this matter on the telephone with Section Chief C. L. McGowan or his Number One Man, of the Civil Rights Section of the Bureau. It was pointed out

to Dalness that he had on occasions, since the investigation commenced, advised the Bureau that Acting Assistant Attorney General Doar and other Departmental Attorneys were being kept orally advised of the current developments taking place in Selma and of the current developments in connection with this investigation. Dalness readily agreed that this was true but repeated his belief that he had advised the Bureau as stated above that he intended to furnish to Mr. Doar written information in order that Doar would have same available for the hearing that was scheduled for March 11, 1965, in Montgomery. Dalness says he has no written record of authorization.

Supervisor advised that he had no discussions with 570 Dalness or anyone else in Selma regarding the furnishing to Doar of copies of Agents' interview report forms or signed statements.

Section Chief McGowan advised that while he has been in frequent telephonic communication with SAC Dalness, he had not authorized Dalness to furnish written statements or notes of Agents' interview report forms to Doar. The first McGowan knew of this having been done was on Wednesday afternoon, 3-10-65, when Dalness was questioned as to when a report would be submitted. Dalness was instructed that the material had to be assembled so that a report could be submitted to the Bureau by 3-11-65. (The report referred to was received at the Bureau on the evening of March 11, 1965, is being reviewed, and a memorandum analysing the report will be submitted on 3-12-65. The report will be submitted to the Department.)

Memorandum to Mr. Belmont RE: REGISTRARS OF VOTERS DALLAS COUNTY, ALABAMA

During the telephonic conversations with Dalness concerning these questions, particularly to establish who authorized the material to be furnished to Doar in writing, Dalness indicated that this was not a new policy in the Mobile Office, that it had been done on numerous occasions, that it was the only way in which the expedite requests that had been received on frequent occasions could be handled, and the deadline met, and insisted that the Bureau was aware of this policy. Dalness mentioned several case files wherein such procedure was followed.

ACTION:

The files mentioned by Dalnesshave been called for, will be reviewed as rapidly as possible, and a separate memorandum will be submitted concerning the comments of Dalness relative to procedures that are being followed in the Mobile Office, particularly as to whether or not this has been done on Bureau authority or whether it is a policy which has grown up in the Mobile Office.





With reference to the furnishing of written material, including notes of Agents' interview report forms, to Acting Assistant Attorney General John Doar at Selma, Alabama, SAC Earl Dalness stated that this procedure had been followed in three other cases involving racial discrimination in voting at Dallas County, Alabama (BuFile 44-12831); Perry County, Alabama (BuFile 1'44-17669); and Wilcox County, Alabama (BuFile 56-2295).

The files cited by SAC Dalness have been carefully reviewed, and no instance has been found where the Bureau has given authority to provide Departmental attorneys on the scene with material of the type made available to them at Selma fast week, nor was any instance noted in these Bureau files where Mobile had advised this was done.

There have, of course, been many instances in which due to the exigencies of imminent court action the Mobile Office has been instructed to furnish results of investigation to the attorneys on the scene having the responsibility to represent the Government in court. Attached for ready reference is one such memorandum dated March 23, 1961, which shows at the bottom of page two that the results of interviews would be given directly to Departmental attorneys in Montgomery, Alabama.

There have been a number of instances in which a copy of the investigative report has been made available to Departmental attorneys on the scene at the time that it was mailed to the Bureau. In certain other instances where time has been of the essence the Mobile Office has furnished the Departmental attorneys with copies and/or originals of signed statements. In such instances, this has not interfered with the prompt submission of the investigative report to the Bureau but has

merely been a method of furnishing the attorneys with data they needed for court a day or two sooner than the investigative report was completed for mailing.

Since the signed statements are prepared with the thought in mind that they may be introduced as evidence, they cannot be changed once they have been executed, and when the urgency of court action requires it, they may be given to the U. S. Attorney or Departmental attorney trying the case before final administrative approval of the investigative report so long as this is done in a manner which does not delay the final preparation of the report or its submission to the Bureau.

In view of the problem which arose in Selma last week, it is felt that all offices should be cautioned against making Agents' notes or other raw material available to Departmental attorneys in the field.

The information set forth herein will supplement information set forth in previous letterhead memorandum dated March 5, 1965:

At Selma, Alabama

At 8 a.m., March 12, 1965, sixty to seventy persons remained in the march line in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church, Selma, Alabama.

At 10:12 a.m., CST, Mayor Joseph Smitherman, appeared at the head of the line and refused permission for anyone to march in Selma. At 10:53 a.m., Smitherman read a prepared statement to the marchers numbering approximately two hundred at this time that a march would not be permitted. Smitherman stated that if the marchers were serious about a memorial service for the deceased Reverend James J. Reeb, this service could be conducted inside the Brown Chapel AME Church.

Reverend L. L. Anderson, Negro pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, Selma, Alabama, acting as spokesman for the marchers, asked Smitherman by whose authority he stopped the march; Smitherman stated, by the decision of the City Council, Selma, Alabama, sitting in a closed session. Anderson then requested police protection for a memorial march for Reverend Reeb to the Dallas County Courthouse, Selma, Alabama, which was refused.

ENCLOSURE

churches (NCC) is presently meeting in Washington, D.C., and stated it would be a simple matter to request this group to come to Selma, Alabama, to enter the protest against voter registration discrimination. There would be about five thousand ministers to come to Selma if this request was made. Stated that the SNCC is presently contemplating this action.

As of 12:15 p.m., two hundred persons remained standing in a one-block area in front of the Church. These people were being maintained in the area by local authorities and State Troopers who had the area blocked off.

At 12:18 p.m., Reverend Anderson in confrontation with Mayor Smitherman told Smitherman that had they been allowed to hold a 15-minute memorial service at the Dallas County Courthouse for Reverend Reeb, the marchers would have returned to the church and cleared the streets.

As of 5:30 p.m., CST, approximately 85 to 100 persons, Negroes and whites, remained under a make-shift tarpaulin erected during night hours for shelter. Another fifty to sixty persons were milling around the area near Brown Chapel AME Church.

At 2:06 p.m., CST, approximately ten Catholic Priests from the State of Connecticut joined the demonstration line. The day was spent mostly in singing songs and offering prayer.

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advised that there had been some discussion of charging the police line being maintained by the Selma Police Department and the Alabama State Troopers;



however, it was decided this decision would be left to Dr. Martin Luther King.

At 5:30 p.m., Richard Boone and Reverend William Greer, both of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), announced to the line of confrontation that no consideration would be given to a night march until Dr. Martin Luther King arrived from Montgomery, Alabama.

As of ll:30 p.m., CST, a group of approximately 150 individuals remained in the marching line in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church under a tent-size plastic tarpaulin. Inside the church were approximately 300 persons; however, there was no organized meeting in progress. No mass meeting was held. The individuals in the church were lying and sitting on various benches.

The "Voter Registration Appearance Book,"
Dallas County Courthouse, was closed at 4:30 p.m.,
March 12, 1965. The following numbers were issued during
the week on the days indicated:

March 9, 1965 Numbers 2606 and 2607, both issued to white persons

An all-night vigil was maintained by about fifty persons under the canopy about one hundred yards from the Brown Chapel AME Church, Selma, Alabama, in the middle of Sylvan Street, which was blocked off at both ends,

Dallas County Courthouse.

and law enforcement authorities still refused to allow demonstrators to march on the Dallas County Couthouse.

who was on the scene at Selma, advised that he had about one hundred Catholic Nuns and Priests ready to march on the Dallas County Courthouse.

advised at 11:47 a.m. that a march led by about one hundred clergy members would originate at Brown Chapel AME Church at 1 p.m. to proceed to the

As of 12:30 p.m., CST, there had been no indication that a march would form to move on the Dallas County Courthouse.

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At 1:36 p.m., CST, March 13, 1965, a group of 96 clergy, Reman. Catholic priests and nuns. and Protestart Ministers, left the First Baptist Church, Jeff Davis and Sylvan Street, Selma, Alabama, and were joined by approximately 250 other marchers, Negro and white. They marched approximately one hundred yards toward Selma Street where they were confronted by the Selma Police Department under the direction of Captain J. Wilson Baker, Director of Public Safety, Selma, Alabama. A Negro spokesman requested permission to march to the Dallas County Courthouse in memory of a fallen brother, Reverend James Reeb. Baker denied this request and told the group, "This matter should be handled in court and not in Selma."

A Roman Catholic Priest Dan Cantwell, Chicago, Illinois, read a prepared speech. According to Cantwell is Director of the Inter-racial Council, Chicago, Illinois. Baker again requested the marchers to return to the church and the marchers then attempted to flank the confrontation point by turning through Negro housing projects. The Selma Police Department

Joined arms and confronted the marchers again. Alabama State Troopers ringed the housing project to back up the Selma Police Department. There was no violence used to confront the marchers. Baker again addressed the clergy stating, "We have violence in Selma, Alabama. We don't want a repeat of violence." Numerous clergy then addressed the group at the confrontation point. C. T. Vivian, SCLC, acted as spokesman for the group. Vivian continued to address Baker in a boisterous manner and when Baker made a statement that he would arrest Vivian in sixty seconds, Vivian was then grabbed by clergy at the head of the confrontation point.

The group then continued to sing and pray intermittently. As this proceeded, a small private plane flew over the area at low altitude, throwing leaflets. One leaflet requested donations for the defense of R. B. Kelley, et al., who were charged with the murder of Reverend Reeb in Selma. The second leaflet stated, "White citizens of Alabama, now is the time to join Operation Ban. Selective hiring, firing, buying, selling -- an unemployed agitator ceases to agitate -- sponsored by White Citizens for Action Committee, Inc., P. O. Box 1081, Tuscaloosa, Alabama." On the bottom of these leaflets was the following message: "This message was brought to you by the world's smallest air force -- the Confederate Air Force."

It was determined at Tuscaloosa, Alabama, that P. O, Box 1081 was assigned to the white Citizens for Action Committee, Inc. (WCAC) upon application by James L. Frazier. Records of the Probate Judge's Office, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, reflect the WCAC was incorporated by petition filed July 1, 1964, showing incorporators as James L. Frazier, 3735 Second Avenue, Tuscaloosa; William Shamblin, Northport; and Claud L. Sanders, 2320 Seventh Street, Tuscaloosa. The purposes



for the WCAC stated in this petition are as follow:

- 1) "To organize the White Citizens of Tuscaloosa County to counteract the local and outside activities of Communistic organizations in promoting and conducting illegal activities."
- 2) "To seek out unregistered white voters and assist them and encourage them to register and vote and participate in public affairs."
- 3) "To promote studies, research, and participation in voting by white citizens."
- "To coordinate the development, acquisition, and dissemination of information relating to voting by white citizens and make such information available to white citizens."

Circuit Court Judge Fred Nichol advised that the WCAC has held no meeting in the County Courthouse since December of 1964 and that this organization is without membership

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At 3:07 p.m. the clergy followed by Negro demonstrators left the confrontation point and returned to the First Baptist Church at 3:12 p.m.

At 4:14 p.m., CST, an Office of Special Investigations (OSI) source advised that a meeting was being held at the First Baptist Church in which future plans of the racial movement were being discussed. Suggestions were being solicited from the white clergy in attendance, which included staying in the church until starvation, blocking off Jeff Davis

Avenue, a main artery into Selma, Alabama, and other harassment-type suggestions.

At 4:27 p.m., CST, this group consisting of over one hundred individuals left the First Baptist Church to march on Sylvan Street to the previous confrontation point. The clergy spread themselves across Sylvan Street and spaced young Negro students between them. C. T. Vivian, SCLC, was observed at the head of this march line.

At 5:45 p.m. this group, joined by several hundred Negro demonstrators, marched ten abreast for approximately one hundred yards where they were confronted by J. Vivian, as spokesman, for this group, requested permission to march into downtown Selma and asked Baker to outline the area which this march would travel. Baker declined and stated they could march "up and down Sylvan Street."

At 4:45 p.m. Baker announced to this group, "We cannot let you to up town today for your own safety. It is that simple." At this point, a group of demonstrators on the right side of the confrontation line broke and marched through a Negro housing project. Small groups broke from the original marching line and took devious routes.

Baker managed to confront one group of approximately two hundred demonstrators and asked them to return to the church. They refused. After some conversation, Baker stated he would meet the leaders of this group at the church and this group returned to the First Baptist Church.

One group of demonstrators broke through the confrontation line and assembled in the school yard of the Baker Elementary School near the Old Armory in Selma. This group was led by a white female. The group continued to sing in the school yard, closely guarded by members of the Dallas County Sheriff's Office Posse. On command to return to the church, after singing several songs, the group returned to the area of the First Baptist Church.

Another group of approximately fifteen to twenty Negroes gathered in front of the Ted Gentry Chevrolet Company across from the Dallas County Courthouse where they were confronted by Chief Deputy L. C. Crocker of the Dallas County Sheriff's Office. Crocker informed this group that they would not be allowed on County property and could not march around the Courthouse. Shortly thereafter, J. Wilson Baker arrived and after talking with leaders of this group, the group moved slowly back to the area of the Brown Chapel AME Church near the point of confrontation. During the trip back to this area, the group was continually harassed by numerous whites. The leader of this group, believed to be a white male, was arrested by Lieutenant Nichols of the Selma Police Department for failing to obey an order of a police officer.

At 6:15 p.m.

advised the demonstrators would remain in the area throughout the night. This would be a vigil type demonstration and no mass meeting was scheduled for the evening.

stated there would be no demonstrations on March 14, 1965. Strategy meetings were scheduled through March 14, 1965, by and other leaders.

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J.Wilson Baker held a press conference immediately after this demonstration, advising he had just met with various leaders in the Brown Chapel AME Church discussing the "explosive situation in Selma." Baker stated he intended to pull the law enforcement officers back from the area and there would be no confrontation line.

A group of approximately two hundred to two hundred fifty individuals, Negroes and whites, maintained an all-night vigil, in the street near the Brown Chapel AME Church.

At 10:14 a.m., CST, March 14, 1965, a group of twenty-five to thirty Catholic Priests and ministers gathered in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church. At 10:35 a.m. this group, accompanied by at least one Negro, was allowed to pass the police line after a short discussion with J. Wilson Baker. It was noted during the day, at 10:39 a.m., one Negro and one white man were observed at the front door of the First Presbyterian Church, 301 Broad Street, Selma, Alabama. After a discussion at the front door of this church with the unknown individuals inside, these two individuals left the church at 10:50 a.m. without gaining admission. Attempts were made by different groups also to enter the St.Paul's Episcopal Church, 201 Lauderdale Street, Selma, Alabama. This group was told by unknown individuals that white and Negro clergy could attend; however, Negro laymen could not attend. Another group was refused admission at the Central Baptist Church, 1416 Selma Street.

After lining up in front of St. Paul's Episcopal Church and maintaining this line for approximately twenty minutes, this group walked back to Brown Chapel AME Church, arriving at 11:26 a.m., and there were no incidents or violence.

At 12 Noon, a group of individuals led by one white female and one Negro female was observed in front of the St. Paul Episcopal Church, Selma, Alabama. This group conferred with individuals at the church door where they were refused admission and then returned to the Brown Chapel AME Church.

At 1:57 p.m. Hosea Williams, SCLC staff, addressed a group of ministers at the confrontation point near Brown Chapel Church. The ministers were predominately white and a few Negroes were carrying signs reading, "Selma Wall End." One minister of the Unitarian Church in Boston, Massachusetts, advised this group that a bus carrying board members of that church would arrive in Selma later this date to join in the racial demonstrations.

advised that a massed meeting would be held at 8 p.m. at the Brown Chapel AME Church. 67C He said no demonstrations were planned for March 14, b70 1965. However, on March 15, 1965, at 8 a.m. a group of ministers would lead a march through the line of confrontation. stated Mayor Joseph Smitherman of Selma had issued a statement that anyone crossing an imaginary line at the confrontation point would be arrested; if they are not arrested, they would conduct a march to the Dallas County Courthouse. He further stated that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., would arrive at Selma sometime on March 15, 1965, and address the mass meeting at Brown Chapel AME Church at approximately 2 p.m. After this meeting, there would be a march to the place where Reverend James Reeb was murdered, or possibly a march to the Dallas County Courthouse in downtown Selma.

advised that he had a conference with Hosea Williams regarding memorial services for Reverend Reeb to be held March 15, 1965, in Selma.

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Williams had requested the City of Selma to make available to him the Memorial Stadium for these services. However, advised that the City of Selma had granted permission for these individuals to use the City Stadium all day on March 15, 1965.

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advised that an agreement had been reached by officials in Selma to permit a memorial service in memory of Reverend James J. Reeb at the City Stadium, Selma, Alabama, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., March 15, 1965.

At 6:58 a.m., March 15, 1965, Hosea Williams, SCLC staff, addressed a crowd of approximately fifty to one hundred individuals in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church. According to Williams, demonstrators would march to Dallas County Courthouse in protest of the death of Reverend James Reeb. At this time, no local officers or Alabama State Troopers were on the scene. At 8 to 9 a.m., Reverend Charles King of Evanston, Indiana, addressed a group at the First Baptist Church, a Negro church near the Brown Chapel AME Church, on the proper way to protect the head and body in the event marchers received a beating.

At 9:24 a.m., CST, C. T. Vivian gave instructions to the marching line assembled outside of Brown Chapel AME Church that if the march resulted in being stopped by local officers, the marchers should obey any command by the officials.

At 9:37 a.m. this group, headed by C. T. Vivian, was confronted by Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr. Clark told Vivian there would be no march to the Dallas County Courthouse. He instructed the Sheriff's Office posse members to maintain this confrontation line near Alabama Avenue on Sylvan Street, approximately two hundred yards from the Brown Chapel Church.

At 9:49 a.m. the demonstrators lined up, twenty abreast, by the Sheriff's Office posse. Hosea Williams then advised this group through a loud speaker that Sheriff Clark had stepped the march at the Courthouse. Williams stated he could not allow these marchers to disobey this order because the clergymen in the front of the line were nonresidents of Dallas County.

At 9:51 a.m. Sheriff Clark announced on the loud speaker that if any person at the confrontation point had voter registration business they could go to the Courthouse individually or in small groups to conduct this business.

At 10:C7 a.m. Captain J Wilson Baker, Director of Public Safety, Selma, Alabama, appeared on the scene, after which Sheriff Clark ordered the Sheriff's Deputies to the rear of the confrontation line and these deputies were replaced by ten officers of the Selma Police Department. Baker announced to the marchers at this time that he would not allow a mass march to the Dallas County Courthouse; however, these demonstrators could go to the Courthouse in small groups to register to vote.

At 11:27 a.m. a Congressional delegation from the State of Massachusetts, representing Senator Edward Kennedy arrived at Selma. This delegation was headed by Executive Assistant Phil Evans and also contained Congressmen Silvio Conti and Edward Boland.

At 4:19 p.m. Reverend Bevel, along with Public Safety Director J. Wilson Baker, Mayor Smitherman, and Sheriff Clark, agreed in a meeting that a march would be conducted to the Dallas County Courthouse.

At 4:40 p.m. Captain Baker removed the barricade along the confrontation point and Reverend Andrew Young marshaled the demonstrators on Sylvan Street.

At 4:44 p.m. Dr. Martin Luther King, who had earlier arrived that day, finished at the local service and at 5:08 p.m. the demonstrators started their march to the Dallas County Courthouse. The march to the Courthouse, consisting of approximately two thousand demonstrators, was led by King. Walter Reuther was also in the front ranks.

This march was protected by Alabama State Troopers spaced approximately fifty yards apart throughout the march and by police officers of the Selma Police Department, under the direction of Captain Baker. The march stretched from the lead group which arrived at the Dallas County Courthouse at 5:24 p.m. to the church on Sylvan Street, approximately ten blocks away.

At 5:46 p.m. King started a short memorial service at the Dallas County Courthouse and at 5:59 p.m. he laid a wreath on the steps of the Alabama Avenue entrance to the Dallas County Courthouse. King left the Courthouse at 6:02 p.m., after the group sang one song. The last of the marching demonstrators returned to the Brown Chapel AME Church at 6:39 p.m.

On March 15, 1965, the Dallas County Board of Registrars was open from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Processed were 182 Negroes and 26 whites. There were 75 people, both white and Negro, remaining in line at the time the Board closed. The last person processed held Voter Registration No. 1943.

A scheduled mass meeting at the Brown Chapel AME Church on the night of March 15, 1965, was not held as planned. A meeting was held at Dr. Sullivan Jackson's home at 1416 Lapsley Street, Selma, with Dr.Martin Luther King, Jr., Hosea Williams, and Reverend Andrew Young in attendance.

At 8:23 a.m., March 16, 1965.

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advised that in a discussion with Hosea Williams, Williams indicated he and some attorneys would meet with U. S.District Judge Frank M. Johnson, Jr., in regard to a march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. According to Williams, the marchers would leave the Brown Chapel AME Church and march over the Edmund Pettus Bridge. A token group would continue to march to Montgomery and the rest of the marchers would continue on to Montgomery by bus. This action was planned for Thursday, March 18, 1965.

At 9:37 a.m. Reverend James Bevel, SCLC, addressed a group of approximately one hundred fifty individuals at Brown Chapel AME Church. Bevel told this group that they are trying to get a court order from U. S. District Judge Frank M. Johnson, Jr., Montgomery, Alabama, authorizing a march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. Should this be obtained, Bevel said he planned to get as many individuals as possible to engage in this march about fifteen miles out of Selma, Alabama, as a token march, then the majority of these individuals would motor by bus the remaining distance to Montgomery, Alabama. Bevel planned to keep only three hundred in the group to march the entire distance; however, about fifteen miles outside of Montgomery the original marchers would assemble and join the march into Montgomery proper. Demonstrations would be held in various small towns en route from Selma to Montgomery.



At 12:10 p.m. on this date, Dr. Martin Luther King was holding a press conference at the home of Dr. Sullivan Jackson in Selma, Alabama. King completed his conference at 1:12 p.m., and according to advised that King discussed the planned march to Montgomery and stated that the demonstrators will continue their activities regarding veter registration in the outlying counties around Selma, Alabama, until such time as the voter registration bill is passed by Congress.

At 4:28 p.m. a group of approximately three hundred individuals, one half of whom were clergymen, left the First Baptist Church, Selma, Alabama, and formed in the street, two abreast, to march to the Dallas County Courthouse. The group was formed by Reverend Andrew Young and C. T. Vivian, both of SCLC, and Reverend Metz Rollins (phonetic) of Montgomery, Alabama.

At 4:36 p.m., a group marched to the Brown Chapel AME Church where they remained until 4:42 p.m. At this time, the demonstrators left the church and lined up two abreast. A large sign was carried by individuals in the front ranks which read, "Students of Interdenomination Theological Center," which is an organization from Atlanta, Georgia. Demonstrators were confronted at Sylvan and Selma Streets by Sheriff Clark and fifteen deputies. A spokesman for the group requested permission to march and request was denied by Sheriff Clark. There were approximately 245 demonstrators in line. The group broke rank at several points; however, leaders of the demonstration passed the word to return to the church and at 5:05 p.m. all demonstrators were back in the church.

At 5:55 p.m., March 16, 1965, a group of demonstrators left the Brown Chapel AME Church holding hands, four abreast. These demonstrators were confronted by Captain J. Wilson Baker immediately outside of the Brown Chapel Church. He instructed the demonstrators he would not permit a march as he had no provisions for security to protect the demonstrators. The demonstrators then took a sitting position in the street immediately in front of the Brown Chapel Church, which covered the entire block of Sylvan Street and the block in which the Brown Chapel Church is located.

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advised he was furnished a copy of a motion filed in U. S. District Court, Montgomery, Alabama, entitled, HOSEA WILLIAMS, ET AL., Plaintiffs, versus Honorable GEORGE C. WALLACE as Governor of the State of Alabama, ET AL., Defendants. This motion was "Plaintiffs' proposed plan for march from Selma, Alabama, to Montgomery, Alabama." The motion in substance sets forth that the march will commence Friday, March 19, 1965, at 10 a.m. or any day thereafter, provided plaintiffs furnished forty-eight hours advance notice of the march to the defendants. and to the court. No limitation of the number of marchers on four lane portion of Highway 80 was stated and on the two lane portion it would be three hundred. The distance to be covered on the first day was eleven miles, the second day eleven miles, the third day seventeen miles, the fourth day eight miles, and the fifth day the march would be from the western part of Montgomery to the Capitol. Large camp sites would be erected en route, with meetings and song festivals to be held. A mass meeting would be held and thereafter twenty persons would seek a meeting with the Governor and present a petition.

During the evening hours of March 16, 1965, approximately six hundred demonstrators, Negroes and whites, gathered in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church, and continued to sit and stand in the street immediately in front of Chapel singing and claping.

No activity was noted at the Church during the morning hours of March 17, 1965.

At 11:23 a.m., advised that civil rights workers were planning a march to the Dallas County Courthouse that afternoon.

The civil rights workers, according to advised that if they were not allowed to march on the Dallas County Courthouse in the street they will sit up another all-night vigil in the area of the Brown Chapel AME Church.

At 12 p.m., March 17, 1965, Sheriff Clark through a loud speaker system advised a group of approximately two hundred individuals on the steps of the Brown Chapel AME Church that a U.S. Federal Judge had permitted the march to the Courthouse. The march would start at 2 p.m.

Individuals on the steps of the church were observed to form a line, two abreast, in the street in front of the Brown Chapel Church. Hosea Williams, SCLC staff, was observed in charge of the march and was heard to say that this march "involved a political not racial matter." The march started at 2:09 p.m. Approximately fifty per cent of the individuals engaged in this march were white. The demonstrators followed the route to Sylvan Street and Alabama Street to the Courthouse, arriving at the Dallas County Courthouse at 2:28 p.m.

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At 2:39 p.m., the group was observed to start singing and clapping at the Lauderdale Street entrance of the Courthouse. At this time there were some 586 demonstrators in this march, all congregated at the Lauderdale entrance of the Courthouse. Hosea Williams introduced a Reverend Douglass, a white Methodist minister from New York State who offered prayer. A white Lutheran minister (first name unknown) Jenkins from Nebraska offered a prayer and a Negro Winister, P. A. Patterson, from Savannah, Georgia, offered prayer.


At 2:47 p.m. Hosea Williams again addressed the assembly, welcoming all out-of-town clergy. Williams was heard to state that he "was not interested in criticizing Sheriff James Clark; he was interested in converting Sheriff Clark." Williams stated that demonstrations would continue in a nonviolent manner on the streets of Alabama until "walls come tumbling down." During Williams' dissertation, it began to rain extremely hard ending with hailstones one-half inch in diameter. Williams continued to talk during the storm advocating the march from Selma to Montgomery.

At 3:01 p.m. James Grange, SNCC, instructed demonstrators to form in lines of two's to return to the church.

At 3:38 p.m. advised that at 3:27 p.m. thirty-six ministers and laymen were arrested for picketing Mayor Joseph Smitherman's home at 603 Sixth Avenue. These individuals were arrested for "picketing in a residential area." The individuals were transported to the City Hall in a school bus driven by Dallas County possemember. Five additional posse men traveled in the school bus with the thirty-six individuals.

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were released after signing \$200 signature bonds, with the exception of the two who were staging a sit-in in the City Courtroom, Selma, Alabama.

Demonstrators were carrying the following signs, while picketing Mayor Smitherman's home:

"When Will You Hire Negroes for Decent City Jobs?"

"We Demand Decent Housing - No More Shacks"

"Mayor Smitherman - We Demand Paved Streets"

"We Demand Integrated Education for All."

advised that trial for these individuals was set for 9 a.m., March 23, 1965.

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On March 17, 1965, advised that 30 individuals were arrested on march 17, 1965, in front of the home of Mayor JOSEPH SMITHERMAN, 603 6th Avenue, Selma. He stated that the arrest was originally made for "picketing in a residential district;" however, this charge has been changed to "parading without a permit." Trial for these individuals has been set for March 23, 1965, at 9:00 a.m.


stated upon arrest these individuals were carrying the following signs:

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A Negro mass meeting was held at 7:30 p.m., March 17, 1965, at the Brown Chapel AME Church, Selma, Alabama, with an estimated attendance of four hundred people, most of them adults. The principal speakers were Reverend L. L. Anderson and Reverend Elder Greer and both speeches were general in nature and reiterated the purposes of the civil rights movement.

There was no organized meeting or activity noted at the Brown Chapel AME Church, Selma, Alabama, throughout the day of March 18, 1965.

At 2:40 p.m. two busloads of individuals arrived at the Brown Chapel AME Church, numbering approximately sixty people; most of these were white.

At 3:09 p.m. there were approximately 350 people in front of the Brown Chapel AME Church singing, clapping and chanting; however, no speeches were given and no organized meeting was in process.

At 4:57 p.m. Negro leaders of the racial demonstrations called everyone inside the Brown Chapel AME Church.

advised there would be a mass meeting for these individuals at 7:30 p.m., this date, at the Brown Chapel AME Church.

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A mass meeting was held at the Brown Chapel AME Church, Selma, Alabama, starting at 7:30 pm, CST. The main speakers were Reverend L. L. Anderson, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, Selma; Reverend Frederick D. Reese, President, Dallas County Voters League; Rabbi Joseph Drummond, California; and A. D. King, brother of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

A collection taken at this meeting reached \$7,000, according to the state of the mass meeting terminated at 10:35 p.m. No incidents were observed.
