

On July 1, 1963. Selma, Alabama, advised that this date is a regular registration day for voter registration at Selma, Alabama. He stated that during the day no Negroes have appeared at the Board to apply for voting. He pointed out that no action has been taken by to exclude any Negro from the court house or any Negro from appearing to register. He stated that he cannot understand why no Negroes were present except they have apparently lost interest in registering.

He stated that he has which reads that a mass meeting for voter registration will be held for the Negroes at the First Baptist Church, corner of Jeff Davis Avenue and Sylvan Street, Selma, Alabama, on instant date, at 7:00 p.m. The principal speaker will be Mrs. LOIS L. REEVES, who is identified as Director of YMCA and YWCA at Tuskegee Institute. Tuskegee, Alabama.

On July 1, 1963, Selma, Alabama, advised that the mass meeting was scheduled for 8:00 p.m. Mrs. REEVES from Tuskegee, Alabama would be the principal speaker. They expected from 500 to 600 Negroes to appear at the meeting. She stated they planned no demonstrations in Selma other than to discuss going to the court house to register to vote on regular registration days.

On July 2, 1963, advised that it was claimed by Negro leaders in Selma that 900 Negroes appeared at the mass meeting on the night of July 1, 1963, however, this was a gross exaggeration. He stated that he had counted the Negroes present, and there were only 525 to 550 Negroes present. The meeting started at 8:00 p.m., and lasted until 11:00 p.m., with no incidents occurring; and it was very quiet. Mrs. LOIS REEVES was the principal speaker, and she called upon all Negroes to have prayer in their homes at 6:00 a.m. in the morning, every morning, to overcome their fear of making applications to vote. She expressed the idea that they lived in a wonderful age and ten years from the present, the meetings that were being held in the Selma area would be a legend. She pointed out that freedom was not cheap, and they had to fight for it, stating that social change was sweeping the country with hurricane force. She also pointed out that the President of the United States had made a strong statement for freedom. She further advised that the Negro people were not allowing themselves to be bought in the "new world", and they were taking steps to obtain their freedom.

She pointed out that anything that was worth living for was worth dying for, and some of them would be called upon to pay the supreme penalty. She also stated that Negroes should stop thinking about themselves in comparison to the white race, and they should think of themselves as the same and the equal to the white race.

A young Negro named GILBERT FORTUNE, age 13, made the statement at the meeting "I have not registered to vote because of my age. What's your excuse?"

Reverend L. L. ANDERSON of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, Broad Street, Selma, made a financial appeal and stated that the Negro should no longer be a beggar or a coward, and he had to fight and pay his own way.

AMELIA BOYNTON spoke at the meeting and said that anybody who is intelligent enough to be a reporter for a newspaper should be intelligent enough to respect the Negroes and call them by their title of Mr. or Mrs. No mention was

made at the meeting of the absence of Negro registrants not appearing at the Registration Board on July 1, 1963. The whole theme of the meeting was concerning voter registration and no other type demonstrations were called for.

Coverage was afforded the meeting by the Sheriff and his Chief Deputy, who occupied one car outside of the church, and three Deputies were stationed on the inside of the church.

One police car was utilized in patrolling the area to avoid any type of incidents in the area of the church.



SOLOMON SEAY, JR., Attorney, Montgomery, Alabama, was to be the principal speaker and a capacity crowd of 800 Negroes was expected. The purpose of the meeting was vote registration and to rally the Negroes to go to the Courthouse to register to vote. No other type of activity is planned at this time, such as sit-ins or marches in Selma, but these rallies were to arouse interest among the Negroes to register to vote.

further advised that a white Catholic Priest, Father MAURICE OULETTE, Fathers of St. Edmund, missionary priest among Negroes with headquarters at Selma, Alabama, had attended the rally which was held last week on July 1, 1963 and he, the had heard a rumor to the effect that if Father OULETTE attended another meeting made the statement "Father he would be arrested. OULETTE is considered a leader among the young Negroes in Selma and if he is arrested, I won't be able to control the Negroes".

stated these notes contained the following information:

DOUGIAS L. POPE. Negro male from Beloit. Alabama, was the leader of the meeting and he opened the meeting speaking on vote registration and appealing to Negroes to go to the Courthouse and register to vote. An eleven or twelve year old Negro girl, who was not identified, also made a talk, which appeared to have been memorized prior to the meeting, and this talk appealed to the Negroes to regard themselves as persons who were as good as the white man and not subsurvient to him.

A Negro male, HENRY SHANNON, spoke on the fact that he was a veteran of the war, that he fought for Alabama and Dallas County, Alabama, and he was not satisfied with the situation in Selma. He stated that Negroes deserve jobs at the Courthouse and deserve to be on the payroll where their salaries would be paid by the taxpayer.

Father OULETTE, previously identified, spoke briefly on the fact that Negroes were human beings with the same souls as any other human being.

MARIE FOSTER, Negro female, also spoke and made a statement to the effect that Negro mothers should smother their infants so that they would not grow up as "slaves"

and that the Negroes were not being represented in Washington, D.C. JAMESTAUSTIN, Negro male, who was identified as being originally from Selma but was presently living in Talladega, Alabama, made a statement to the effect that Negroes in Selma were not able to go downtown and be treated equally and that when they did appear downtown they were beaten. He stated that the Negroes had the power to boycott stores in Selma if they desired. AUSTIN specifically mentioned Carter's Drugstore in Selma which is the Walgreen Agency, stating that Mr. CARTER only served whites at the lunch counter, however, was glad to take the Negroes' money for purchasing any other article in the store.

SOLOMON SEAY, JR., the principal speaker, made a fifteen minute talk which was prepared and he read from notes. This talk centered around the fact the Negroes must register to vote and they must trust in God to obtain their freedom. The whole talk appeared to be completely ineffective.

Reverend L. L. ANDERSON. Pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, pointed out Father OULETTE in the audience and stated that the priest was a man of great courage in appearing at the meeting. ANDERSON made a statement on the Negroes' potential for boycotting stores in Selma, Alabama, and stated that they have the power to close up every store in Selma. He further pointed out that the Negro could "whip" the white man because the Negro could love better than the white man. Reverend LAFAYETTE then made a talk in which he made reference to the killing of MEDGAR EVERS, NAACP leader in Jackson, Mississippi, and he compared himself to EVERS, stating that on the same night that EVERS was killed, he was beaten in Selma, Alabama. He stated he also went to jail in Selma and that he was not afraid to go to jail. He made a statement that his group (Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee) would be all over Alabama before the summer was over. He said that Sheriff JAMES G. CLARK, JR. of Dallas County, Alabama, and Governor GEORGE WALLACE of Alabama did not want the Negro to be free, specifically CLARK. He made a statement to the persons in the audience that they didn't need those long knives and they could throw them in the river, that they had the truth to protect them. He made reference to

a Negro who was killed by a law enforcement officer in Selma and was brought in draped across the hood of a car like a deer that had been killed. (This statement was in reference to the killing of a Negro by ARTHUR SAMPIE, formerly a Selma Police Department Officer who is now deceased, which incident occurred 25 to 30 years ago.)

At the end of the meeting, the congregation stood up, sang and did a snake dance around the inside of the church. The meeting terminated at 10:00 p.m.

The crowd was estimated at approximately 300 Negroes, 75 to 80 percent teenagers who were not of voting age.





According to an article appearing on page 17,
Montgomery Advertiser, July 17, 1963, Reverend SOLOMON S.
SEAY, SR. and Reverend W.I. POWELL, Montgomery Negro
ministers, appeared before the Montgomery Commission July
16, 1963 and asked for a positive program designed to
resolve racial problems and differences on the local levels.
Both made it plain to the City Commissioners that they
favor negotiation, not demonstrations as a means of achieving
Negro goals in the local area. However, they warned in a
petition presented to the Commission which was signed by
42 persons, that Montgomery Negroes are "becoming increasingly
weary" of what they feel is "inactivity in the face of
active efforts of other communities for progress".

The petition urged the Commission to form a biracial committee and reopen public parks closed in Montgomery since January 1, 1959.

The two ministers claimed to have made a similar plea to the Commission 3 months previously and they charge that it was never acknowledged.

The article quoted as follows from the petition:

"As citizens of Montgomery, we have the same urges for social reforms that are expressed in other communities in a more desperate manner than the methods we are now trying to pursue.

"While the world is in turmoil over civil rights issues, we in Montgomery have been waiting hopefully for the authorities to come up with a plan for progress in this area and the area of race relations.

RACIAL SITUATION MONTGOMERY, ALABAMA

"Our silence is no indication that we are resigned to contentment with the inequalities that continue to exist. It is our belief that the present climate in Montgomery is conducive to an understanding and peaceful approach to the solution of community grievances.

"We, therefore, call upon you again to give a plan for progress by appointing a committee made up of both races with the responsibility of giving immediate direction toward solution of now existing problems. There can be no plans for the colored community in which there is no colored leadership representation.

"We urge that no further time be lost through lack of action on this matter. We hereby request an audience with the Board of Commissioners at the earliest possible date. May we be advised of the time, date, and place.

"Ultimately it shall be the responsibility of every local community to determine the solution to the racial problems that are now troubling the soul of America and affecting every locality.

"Like millions of other Americans of all races, we believe that the American dream is an idea that has come to the time of this fruition and that it is our duty as well as an opportunity to make every effort toward the fulfillment of this dream at this moment in our history."

Prior to departing, SEAY made reference to the petition and stated "that expresses all we want to say at this time".



Lewis, Negro male, age 25, who was identified as National Chairman of the SNCC, was supposed to deliver the main address; however, he spoke for only a period of five to ten minutes, advising the crowd he was on an emergency call to Cambridge, Maryland and could not speak very long. Martin Rich, Negro male, age 17, who was identified as being a Field Secretary of SNCC at Gadsden, Alabama, gave a "fiery" & APPROX. speech and talked about Negroes in Gadsden, Alabama, arming -themselves with weapons to protect themselves; that they had to do this in order to protect their homes and their rights. The inference that Rich appeared to be making, although he did not specifically armise the Negroes to do so, was that situations sometime called for a "call to arms." He was very critical of Al Lingo Director of the Alabama Department of Public Safety, for the way he handled the Gadsden demonstrations. This talk was greeted by cheers and loud applause from the crowd at the church.

Father Maurice Qulette, Pastor, St. Elizabeth's Mission, Broad Street, Selma, a Negro Catholic Church, delivered about a 20 minute speech in which he criticized the talk about guns, knives, and other weapons and stressed the need for non-violence in the movement. He praised Bernard Lafayette, Jr., for his crusade in Selma and stated he was "making the fight alone." He also spoke briefly of fair employment rights for Negroes and the potential the Negro has in boycott situations; however, the boycott was not urged at this meeting. The main theme of the meetings still center around registration to vote and no other type of demonstrations were urged at this time.

Also present at the meeting was Father Charles McNeece, Assistant Pastor of St. Elizabeth's, He did not speak, but was present in the audience. Both Catholic priests Selm Alson are white.



RACIAL SITUATION STATE OF ALABAMA SELMA, ALABAMA

On July 23, 1963,

Selma, Alabama, advised that the voter registration rally was held at the Baptist Tabernacle Church on the evening of July 22, 1963, from about 8 p.m. until 11 p.m. Central Standard Time. He stated the principal speaker was BRUCE BOYNTON, son of AMELIA P. BOYNTON and a practicing attorney from Chattanooga, Tennessee. He stated that BOYNTON spoke on the freedom of man, centered the theme of his speech around the statement in the Bible "Let my people go" and spoke on the general working conditions in the Selma, Alabama, area for Negroes. He also criticized law enforcement officers who were present at the meeting for having a walkie-talkie within the church itself.

stated he was aware of an arrest made on the evening of July 22, 1963, when the Sheriff arrested Negro male, age sixteen; however, he did not witness the arrest. He stated there has been no reaction today among the Negro population regarding the arrest; however, last evening after the Sheriff made the arrest, about fifty teenagers who were present at the meeting wanted to make a march on the Dallas County Jail; however, this movement was headed off by the older Negroes at the meeting. The crowd totaled from 350 to 400 Negroes and was comprised of about 75 percent teenagers.

Other than the arrest of which took place outside of the meeting, no other incidents occurred, and the Negroes dispersed and went to their homes after the meeting.

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





Selma, Alabama, telephonically advised received information that a Negro Voter Registration rally would be held at Ward's Chapel Church, corner of Tremont and Philpot Streets. Selma. at 7:30 on the night of July 29. 1963.

On July 29. 1963

confirmed the fact that a voter registration rally would be held at Ward's Chapel on the evening of July 29, 1963. He stated no principal speaker had been selected. He advised that from now on the local Negro leaders in Selma would take an active part in these meetings and they were going to assume leadership in the drive for voter registration. No other type demonstrations were being planned at this time as the only drive being made is to get Negroes registered. He pointed out that information concerning any other type of demonstrations which would be planned in the future would be difficult to find out as the Negro feels the only weapon he has in the movement that works to his advantage is to not let anyone know his plans. He

pointed out that the Negro feels the whites have everything on their side and he has nothing but the advantage of doing the unsuspected. Pointed out he is still willing to cooperate in any way possible with the FBI; however, he realizes it is the responsibility of the FBI to furnish information regarding Negro demonstrations to local authorities and, therefore, there is the possibility that the Negro leaders will withhold information relative to demonstrations as they do not desire local authorities be apprised or present when demonstrations take place.

BERNARD BAFAYETTE. IR., spoke on voter registration. He stated President KENNEDY wants the Negro to be free, but that he could not free the Negro in Selma, he must free himself. He informed all Negroes to stop being afraid. LAFAYETTE also led in the singing of the Negro freedom songs.

A young Negro male, not identified, stated that the Negro did not intend to "whip and wolf" his way, but to go about gaining freedom in a quiet manner. He stated they did not have weapons in the movement; that they do not have to "sling mud." He prevailed upon Negroes to strive for freedom in such a way that everyone will know that what the Negro wants is freedom and he wants it in a Christian manner. He stated the Negro has been a good servant to hicountry and now he wants to "reap what he has sowed."


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

Later, on the evening of August 5, mately 10:15 PM, CST advised that the meeting had been orderly and there were no incidents connected with the meeting. He pointed out, however, that one JAMES AUSTIN, a young Negro male, had made an inflammatory talk, in his opinion, concerning Negro voter registration. He said that AUSTIN made statements to the effect that he intended to register to vote even if he had to have Chief of Police E. W. MULLEN escort him to the registration office in order for him to be registered to vote. AUSTIN also made further statements concerning the fact that he intended to see that all places of business and all White schools in Selma were integrated this fall.

M-1, b-6, 1967 advised that he had been on the scene at the Trinity Eaptist Church on the evening of August 5, 1963.

were on the scene and observed no type of activities other than the fact that a rally appeared to be taking place in the church. He said he did observe a young Negro male, wearing a gray suit whom he later identified as JAMES AUSTIN, conversing with the Sheriff of Dallas County who was parked in front of the church and he understood from the Sheriff that AUSTIN used some strong language concerning efforts that would be made at integration of schools and public places plus a voter registration drive in Selms. He stated that it was his opinion that AUSTIN possibly was attempting to "bait" the Sheriff into arresting him and placing him in jail since he understood that AUSTIN made some type of statement concerning the fact that Negroes would file up the jails in Selma.

On 4ugus 6, 1963, advised that 67C JAMES AUSTIN, Negro male, age 21, who is a Field Secretary for the Student Nonviolent Co-ordinating Committee, had been 67D working in the area of Talladega, Alabama and Gadsden, Alabama. However, he was born and reared in Selma. He stated that AUSTIN made a rather "rabble rousing" type of talk; however, he thought that AUSTIN was impetuous because he was young and he had been actively engaged in activities in Gadsden and Talladega and appeared to be "all fired up". pointed out, however, that he felt the situation was well under control of Negro leaders in Selma, and that AUSTIN did not appeal to any of the adults at the rally; however, he possible had some appeal to some of the teenagers in the crowd which was about 60% of the 350 to 400 Negroes at the rally. stated that RUFUS LEWIS, Negro male, 50 years of age, a funeral director in Montgomery, Alabama, spoke at the meeting and passed out sample voter registration forms. He was a quiet, subdued speaker and gave a very constructive talk on how to fill out these forms.

He stated that the meeting terminated at about 10:30 or 10:15 PM, CST, and everyone dispersed and went peacefully to their homes.

Stated that they indicated to the Mayor that they were representatives of the Negroes in Selma, and advised that this was "the farthest from the truth that anything could be". SUBJECT RACIAL SITUATION STATE OF ALABAMA

This is to advise that a hill described as designed to insure freedom of association in public places was introduced in the House of Representatives, State of Alabama, Montgomery, Ala., on 8/9/63. The bill, sponsored by Representative MALCOLM RETHEA of Jefferson County, Ala., provides that a person may refuse to share his table, booth, compartment, bench, seat or "other like accommodations" if he so wishes.

The measure also requires the "proprietor, manager, superintendent or person in charge" to prevent "any disturbance or invasion of such ... rights".

ENTHEA said the bill is an answer to President KENNEDY's proposed public accommodations bill presently pending in Congress. Any proprietor or operator who "fails or refuses to secure" the rights provided under the BETHEA proposal would be liable for a suit by the offended party for punitable damages not exceeding \$5000.

The measure also provides that any person who willfully deprives another of his rights by the act is guilty of a misdemeanor" and can be fined as much as \$500 and sentenced to as long as six months in jail. This bill, according to BETHEA would at least relieve a person so that he can avoid direct contact with those persons he does not want to be bothered with.

The House also passed a resolution requesting that businesses that have desegregated their facilities place a sign at each entrance "to inform the traveling public".

Representative SAM NEWTLES of Wilcox County, Ala., said he introduced the resolution at the request of Governor GEORGE WALLACE. The resolution noted that an increasing number of businesses and other places of public accommodation have desegregated their facilities "though most often not from choice". "The traveling public", it said, "has no way of knowing what facilities are available to them"

Negro Committee-Airs Grievances, Urges Harmony

A committee composed of a white minister and five Negroes approached Selma Police Chief Ed Mullen with a petition of grievances Saturday morning and at the same time offered city and county officials their "sincere efforts" in avoiding racial demonstrations in Selma.

The group, a sub-committee of the Dallas County Improvement League, emphatically denied any affiliation with "three Negroes who recently attempted to petition Selma Mayor Chris Heinz."

They further stated that any requests made by their committee should not be considered demands nor the issuance of an ultimatum.

A spokesman for the committee, Rev. Maurice Ouellet, the white pastor of St. Elizabeth's Mission, said the group was directed to Chief Mullen's office by Mayor Heinz because he (the mayor) would not be in the city Saturday.

In a letter presented to the police chief by the sub-committee, a list of grievances pertaining to alleged racial discrimination was set forth in seven categories.

The letter also emphatically denied any affiliation with three Negroes who attempted to petition the mayor Tuesday, and stated that city and county officials would be contacted by the committee for the purpose of forming a bi-racial committee, to be appointed by the respective city and county government heads.

Represented Selves

"The three Negroes who petitioned the mayor some few days ago were in error in their statements of presentation. They only represented themselves—only the three persons who signed the petition," the letter described.

The Rev. Ouellet said the principal objective of the committee that talked with Chief Mullen Saturday is to avoid any racial tension or demonstrations and to foster harmonious relations between the races.

Chief Mullen, after short discussion with the committee, referred them to the mayor, stating, "at this time I can make no further comment."

The committee was composed of, other than Rev. Ouellet, Dr. W. B. Dinkins, the Rev. C. C. Hunter, the Rev. Claude Brown, M. C. Cleveland, Jr., and the Rev. Louis Anderson, all Negroes.

Committee

The letter presented to Chief Mullen in part:

"This group was organized for the purpose of trying to head off any actions of demonstrations that may lead to violence, and more racial hate, by attempting to establish positive but friendly lines of communication between the races and for the purpose of presenting to the proper persons those grievences Negro citizens believe should and must be corrected."

The second page of the letter was a formal petition embracing alleged discrimination against Negroes in the city.

Seven Categories

It was divided into seven categories as follows:

"1) That the officials of the City of Selma will use the prestige of their offices along with county officials to see that all qualified Negroes are registered as voters.

the Dallas County court house.

"3) That the Police Department will make a special effort to see that Negroes are treated like human beings and the "brutal and savage manner" in which they deal with Negroes be discontinued immediately.

"4) That the practice of intimidation by law enforcement officers be discontinued especially v/here Negroes attempt to use their constitutional rights of peaceful assembly.

"5) That the officials of the city will lend whatever assistance they can in creating a calm, receptive mood among the white citizens as pertaining to the efforts of this committee in the area of better job opportunities.

"6) That the City will hire Negroes in jobs other than as garbage collectors, janitors and common laborers... such as policemen, firemen, etc.

Selma will name businessmen of the white race who will work with this committee to correct cortain known unjust practices that a more harmonious relationship may exist between the races in this communication.

Tuskegee. Ala., on 8/15/63 advised SA that Sheriff PRESTON HORNSBY of Macon co., had employed JAMES GRANVILLE CHARITY, SR., a Negro, as deputy sheriff on 8/1/63. CHARITY was formerly a patrolman at Hampton, Va., from 4/11/53-4/14/58.

This information is being called to the attention of the Bureau as it is believed that CHARITY is the first Negro to be employed as a deputy sheriff in the State of Ala. Macon Co., Ala., has a Negro population of approximately 86% of the total population of the county. CHARITY is the first Negro holding a public office in this county indicated that the employment of CHARITY had not aroused any particular public criticism or opposition.

DESEGREGATION OF AUBURN UNIVERSITY AUBURN, ALABAMA

According to an article appearing on page one of the Montgomery Advertiser, a daily newspaper published at Montgomery, Alabama, on August 28, 1963, Harold A. Franklin, Negro male, a graduate of Alabama State College, Montgomery, Alabama, has filed suit in the United States District Court, Montgomery, Alabama, to require Auburn University officials to admit him as a student. He claims that his application to Auburn's Graduate School was rejected solely because of his race.

The suit calls for a temporary injunction forbidding school officials to reject him as a student, followed by a permanent injunction upon final hearing.

The motion charged that Auburn University officials refused to process the application of Franklin or to "act expeditiously" on applications of Negroes. It charged that Negroes were subjected to delays and tests not applied to white applicants, and also made subject to "terms and conditions" not required of white students.

According to the article, Auburn University officials claim Franklin was rejected because he was a graduate of a non-accredited school.

RACIAL SITUATION STATE OF ALABAMA

On August 27 and 28, 1963, copies of bills in the legislature of the state of Alabama, which relate to the racial situation in that state, were obtained from the Office of the Clerk of the House of Representatives of the State of Alabama.

The first being quoted is H.J.R. 116, introduced by Representative SAM NETTLES, Wilcox County, Alabama, which reads as follows:

"WHEREAS presidential edicts and federal court rulings have encroached so far on property rights and personal rights that proprietors of eating establishments and other places of 'public accommodation' are being forced to integrate their facilities and are denied the right to serve only those whom they choose to serve; and

"WHEREAS an increasing number of places of business are succumbing to the order, though most often not from choice, and the travelling public of both races has no way of knowing what facilities are available to them; now therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That all places of business which have integrated facilities be requested to post signs at each entrance of their establishments so informing the public of the fact in order that the travelling public may know facilities are available to them."

On motion of Mr. NETTLES the rules were suspended and $H_{\bullet}J_{\bullet}R_{\bullet}$ 116 was adopted.

House bill 861, introduced by Representatives McCORQUODALE, EDWARDS of Escambia County, SALTER, WOOD, NETTLES and DANIEL, a bill not yet entitled, reads as follows:

RACIAL SITUATION STATE OF ALABAMA

"Proposing an amendment to Article 8, Section 182 of the Constitution of Alabama 1901, so as to include among persons who shall be disqualified from registering and voting, any person who has been convicted of disorderly conduct or breach of the peace with the wilful intention to incite to riot or to overthrow the laws of this state by taking part in any sit-in or stand-in demonstration.

"BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

"Section 1. It is hereby proposed that Article 8, Section 182 of the Constitution of Alabama 1901 be amended to read as follows:

'Section 182. The following persons shall be disqualified both from registering, and from voting, namely:

'All idiot and insane persons; those who shall by reason of conviction of crime be disqualified from voting at the time of the ratification of this Constitution; those who shall be convicted of treason, murder, arson, . abezzlement, malfeasance in office, larceny, receiving - stolen property, obtaining property or money under false pretenses, perjury, subornation of perjury, robbery, assault with intent to rob, burglary, forgery, bribery, assault and battery on the wife, bigamy, living in adultery, sodomy, incest, rape, miscegenation, crime against nature, or any crime punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary, or of any infamous crime or crime involving moral turpitude; also, any person who shall be convicted as a vagrant or tramp, or of selling or offering to sell his vote or the vote of another, or of buying or offering to buy the vote of another, or of making or offering to make a false return in any election by the people or in any primary election to procure the nomination or election of any person to any office, or of suborning any witness or registrar to secure the registration of any person as an elector, or any person who has been convicted of disorderly conduct or breach of the peace with the wilful intention to incite to riot or to overthrow the laws of this state by taking part in any sit-in or stand-in demonstration.

"Section 2. An election upon the proposed amendment is ordered to be held on the date of the general election next succeeding the final adjournment of the current session of the Legislature. The election shall be held in accordance with the provisions of Sections 284 and 285 of the Constitution of Alabama, as amended, and Chapter 1, Article 18, Title 17 of the Code of Alabama 1940.

"Section 3. Notice of the election and of the proposed amendment shall be given by proclamation of the Governor, which proclamation shall be published once a week for four successive weeks next preceding the day appointed for the election in a newspaper in each county of the State. In every county in which no newspaper is published, a copy of the notice shall be posted at each courthouse and post office."

House bill fol was passed by the Alabama House of Representatives with the following amendment: In the first paragraph, sixth line, delete the words "sit-in or stand-in" and sestitute in lieu thereof the word "unlawful". In "Sect in 182", 23rd line, delete the words "sit-in or stand-in" and substitute in lieu thereof the word "unlawful". House bill 861, enacted by the House of Representatives, is presently being considered by the Senate of the State of Alabama, according to Mr. CHARLES COOPER, State Legislative Reference Service, Montgomery, Alabama, on August 27, 1963.

House bill 1176, introduced by Representative MALCOLM BETHEA of Jefferson County, Alabama, not yet entitled, reads as follows:

"To provide freedom of association for patrons of certain places of public accommodation and for passengers on public conveyances; prescribing rights, duties, and penalties.

"BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

"Section 1. Whenever a patron of a place of public accommodation or a passenger on a public conveyance desires freedom from personal contact or association with any other patron or passenger, he may refuse to

share his table, booth, compartment, bench, seat or adjoining seat, or other like accommodations in the establishment or conveyance, and the proprietor, keeper, manager, superintendent, or person in charge of the establishment or conveyance, and his or its employees, shall prevent any disturbance or invasion of such patron's or passenger's rights as declared herein. If the proprietor, keeper, manager, superintendent, or person in charge of the establishment or conveyance fails or refuses to secure such rights for a patron or cassenger, as the case may be, the offended party shall be entitled to recover such punitive damages, not exceeding \$5,000, as the jury may assess. Whoever wilfully deprives another of his rights as guaranteed by this Act is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned for not more than six months.

"Section at All laws or parts of laws which conflict with this are repealed.

"Section 3. The provisions of this Act are severable. I any part of the Act is declared invalid or uncontitutional, such declaration shall not affect the part which remains.

"Section 4. This Act shall become effective immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or upon its otherwise becoming a law."

House bill 1176 is presently in the House Judiciary Committee, according to Mr. JOHN W. PIMBERTON, Clerk, Alabama House of Representatives, on August 27, 1963.



Governor George C. Vallace of Alabama on September 1963, issued an Executive Order No. 9 directing the Macon County, Alabama, Board of Education to delay the opening of Tuskeges High School, Tuskegee, Alabama, for a period of one week to allow the governor to preserve the peace, maintain domestic tranquility and to protect the lives and property of all citizens of Alabama. A copy of the Executive Order is attached.

In the early morning of September 2, 1963, a large number of Alabama Highway Patrol officers headed by Al Bingo, a liscefor of the Alabama Department of Public Safety, sot up-ablock is around Tustegee High Cohool and Tustegee Grady School without prior notice to Tustugee officials, the Tusteged Police Legarment or the Eacon County Librit's Office. on the evening of September 2, 1963, Governor Wallace spoke at Easley Park, Birmingham, Alabama, and stated he has found the people of Alabama are behind his program and indicated his firm stand has brought support in other parts of the country particularly Ohio and Maryland. Wallace mentioned the recent March on Washington and stated it was led by communists and atheists and that the leader, Dayard Rustin, was a communist, convicted draft dodger and a sex offender. Wallace commented that President Kennedy spoke in defense of Rustin by saying it was in the American tradition that Rustin's past not be considered.

Governor Vallace indicated he had a plan for other subsols in Alabama during his speech but did not elaborate. Vallace astred people to follow his leadership and to beat the present administration at the polls in November.

The National States Rights Party (NSAP), an anti-Negro and anti-Semitic organization with headquarters in Birmingham, was active over the week end. A motorcade of 50 cars proceeded from Birmingham to Montgomery, Alabama, on August 31, 1963, to celiver a petition calling for the closing of schools. The potition was delivered to a representative of the Governor. It. Edward R. Fields, Information Director of the MEAP, gave a speech on the Capital steps in Mentgomery in which he referred to you as a "traitor." Fields vohemently declared that Alabamians will not permit Regroes in white schools. Fields also stated that he would be on the schoolhouse steps to prevent integration with this banner, referring to a confederate flag. Fields also announced a rally on September 3, 1963, at Bessemer, Alabama.

On August 26, 1963
Selma, Alabama, advised that a Negro voter registration rally would be held on the night of August 26, 1963 at the Baptist Tabernacle Church, corner of Broad Street and Minter Avenue, 7:30 p.m., CST. She stated the principal speaker would be "F. Furner," President of the Perry County, Alabama Voters League. She stated a capacity crowd of 400 to 500 Negroes was expected to attend the rally.

On August 26 and 27, 1963

Selma, Alabama,
advised that the rally at the Baptist Tabernacle Church
terminated at about 10:30 p.m., CST. No incidents occurred.
An estimated crowd of 250 to 300 Negroes attended and sixty
per cent of the crowd were teenagers. The crowd dispersed
peacefully after the meeting and went to their homes.

furnished on August 27, 1963, the following

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The meeting opened 7:40 p.m., CST, with a song fest led by James Pritchett, Negro male, and the singing continued until about 8:10 p.m. At 8:10 p.m. Father Charles McNeece, white male, Assistant Pastor, St. Elizabeth's Catholic Church, Selma, spoke on voter registration. He told Negroes not to be discouraged when they received notice they were not qualified as a voter and they must return again and again to the board to become registered voters. He stated Negroes could go more than one time and not to let anyone tell them they could register only once.

B. APPROX.

James Porter, Negro male, about 35 years of age, introduced an educational period led by Marie Foster, Negro female. Foster stated this was the

time for the Negro to wake up, for the Negro to have a voice in Government, and that the Negroes were coming out of the slums and they needed their freedom. The Negroes could obtain their freedom by going to the courthouse and registering to vote.

Principal speaker, Albert Turner, Negro male, about 35 years of age, identified as President of the Perry County, Alabama Voters League, stated as follows:

He was a taxpayer, but could not register to vote. He pointed out Negroes could not buy or eat where they wanted to, but Negroes could die for their country. He stated the "first person to die for the country was a Negro. He stated the Negro wanted nothing but what belonged to him and asked, "If we are not citizens and have no rights, why do we pay taxes?" He stated Negroes were not even citizens and pointed out, "they put dogs on you and the next day you go downtown and spend \$1.00 to help the man who put the dogs on you." He advised that the Negro was dissatisfied and when he got that way he intended to rise up and do something about it; that no matter how much taxes the Negro pays, he is still a Negro. He stated 5,000 Negroes in Perry County, Alabama are over 21 years of age and could be registered He pointed out that until Negroes get educated to vote and get on "solid ground" they were not going anywhere; that until Negroes have a say in who would be mayor, chief of police, or governor, they would have nothing. Turner stated Negroes are not the worst people in the world and "if you are treated right one time there is no turning around. If you ever find out how good things are out there, look out, things are going to be rough. We won't give them their freedom, but we will raise taxes on them. It won't be long now, things are beginning to roll. I have never seen a revolution."

Turner said, "If I get anything, it will have to come from you (addressing the audience)." He stated Negroes had to stay together and be proud to be black, to be full citizens and to be able to vote. He asked a question, "What will you give for freedom?" Several in the audience responded, "blood." Turner concluded by stating, "They may take my life, my family, but they can't take what I know."

Amelia P. Boynton, Negro leader of Selma, spoke about the speech of Turner and stated, "It made our hearts burn."

Boynton referred to the march on Washington this week and said it was for the people who are tired of being mistreated. She stated the march was to help dissolve crises, to obtain freedom, the right to vote, civil rights and the right to desegregate schools. She concluded her talk by stating the collection amounted to \$102.45.

Reverend L. L. Anderson, Pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, told the Negroes to never be afraid to come to the meetings at this church and that it was always open to them. He stated when he got to Washington, D. C., this week he was going to stick out his chest and represent the Negroes in Dallas County, and he asked, "Do you love God? Do you love America? Are you willing to die?" The audience responded, "Yea, yea." Reverend Anderson pointed out that the Negro and the white man are brothers and that the "white man can't do everything. We're going to help him." He concluded by stating the next meeting would be the second Monday in September at the AME Church on Tremont Street. J. D. Pierce would be the main speaker.

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



The meeting commenced at approximately 7:30 PM, Central Standard Time, Brown's Chapel, 10 Sylvan Street, Selma, Alabama. Approximately 300 Negroes were in attendance, composed of nearly eighty percent teen-agers and sub-teen-agers.

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The first speaker was Mrs. AMELL BOYNTON, owner and manager, Boynton Insurance Agency, and Jet Employment Agency, Selma, Alabama, She stated "your attendance here reminds me of what you want. The occasion speaks for itself. There are thousands who are speaking for itself. The Justice Department and the Federal Government knows and

speaks of freedom. Until we have freedom through the world the world will stop. There have been white people who have been slaves.

"The people to be free are what we are fighting for. There has not a person gone to the top unless a Negro is responsible for it. So that is why we will not stop fighting for freedom. If it takes fighting that's what we will have to do."

The next speaker was identified as MARIE FOSTER, Tuskegee, Alabama. She stated in part, "How many people went to the courthouse today to register?

eight hands were raised.) How many will go next time?

eight hands were raised.) I have questionnaires for the ones who will go next time. It tells the rights of people. It tells how they are elected to office. Answers 13, 14 and 15 will tell you a few things. The man on the street should live morally high. A voteless person is a hopeless person. You should want to help make the laws you have to live by. We appeal to you for registration to vote. I'll help and act as your servant. Generations of Negroes have fought for their freedom, but so far that has not been done. In Negro history a Negro was pastor of an all white church. A proper learning to achieve what we want is what we are working for. What stone has been left unturned to degrade us. The country was theirs and they were willing to fight for us and die for us."

The next speaker was the Reverend C. C. BROWN, pastor, Reform Presbyterian Church, Selma, who was a substitute principal speaker for the Reverend CALVIN WOODS, Birmingham, Alabama, who was the scheduled principal speaker and who unexplainably did not appear. Reverend BROWN stated in part, "We are gathered here to face a problem. It has not stated. It has been going on for some time. Color has started when cotton gins came. I can't say I can get up and speak for the Negro people because I can't.

"None will survive but full fledged citizens. All we want is our rights and our freedom and I believe we can get it. We want to be part of American society. Not to hurt anyone. But to be part of this community. We don't ask any special

privileges but just to be able to vote. We don't want to fight. We don't want any chips on our shoulders. We want to have the right to help elect our officers. We want to be able to walk in the city building without being called a damn Negro. I don't believe in cussing. I want to be respected as a man not as a Negro. We want full citizenship in the community. But when we can't have that then we have nothing. Violence, that is not the way. Fighting and everything like that is out. We want to take on our own obligation".

The next speaker was Mrs. AMELIA BOYNT who has been previously identified. She stated again in part "they are putting on church programs in all churches on Sunday about next meetings. We want to patronize our own store so we won't have to go downtown. I understand several of you have been stopped at intersections, and told to turn around the church was full. If you have not broken the law then you come on. We want 100,000 people in Washington on march in D.C. but instead there will be 250,000 of all colors, white, red and black. We will have some there. The march will start Washington Monurent and go to the Lincoln Memorial. The march will last three hours. Give to help us go to Washington. The price of tickets is \$15.50. Contact me at my insurance office".

The next speaker was the Reverend L. L. ANDERSON, pastor, Tabernacle Baptist Church, Selma He stated in part, "I always have the right to speak. They said we couldn't have a mass meeting but we been having them ever since. Go down to register. If you just clap your hands you're not doing anything. I was stopped by the police and given a ticket for lights not being adjusted. He called me LEWIS. I didn't like that. I'm Reverend ANDERSON to him just as I am to you. I want to enjoy everything in Selma. Not just part of it. I want all of it now. If you got what it takes you can have it. If they can't hear they can see. I want freedom for everyone. If you go out tonight check your lights. If they are looking at each other leave it here, and all of you get in my car. As long as I'm in town we are going to fight for what is ours. Slavery is wrong. I'll die in my tracks if I have the preference of being a slave or free. Stop going downtown to spend

your money with them. Spend it with your people. To be free we have to control our own economy. Don't let me see you downtown spending money."

The meeting concluded at 10:10 PM Central Standard Time and the participants of the meeting left for their homes promptly and quietly. No incidents were reported.

These letters requested elimination of racially integrated facilities in the downtown area a ? the upgrading and hiring of more Negroes in the businesses in Selma. stated that the letters requested answers from the various business establishments by September 15, 1963, or "other measures would be taken". stated he would assume these other measures would possibly be public demonstrations, and these would take place if the merchants did not comply with the Negroes! requests. said several merchants had met on the morning of September 3, 1963 at the Chamber of Commerce in Selma with Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr., Circuit Judge James Hare, and Probate Judge Bernard Reynolds, and it is his understanding there will be no response by the merchants to these letters sent to them by the Dallas County Improvement Association. He also stated that leaflets were being distributed in the Selma area calling for demonstrations against segregation now, and these leaflets were signed Reverend Benny L. Tucker and Wilson Brown. Advised that he did not know if Tucker and Brown were connected with the organization identifying itself as the Dallas County Improvement Association.



"Dear Sirs:

"The Dallas County Improvement Association, an organization composed of the Negro ministers, business and professional men of Selma, Dallas County, in a special meeting on Wednesday, August 28th, ordered that the following information be communicated to the Selma Retail Merchants Association by letter as early as practical.

"After reading in the newspaper that a special meeting of your Association had been called for today and realizing that this information should be brought to your attention for consideration at the earliest possible date, I have seen fit to have it delivered by carrier rather than by mail.

"The Dallas County Improvement Association is making every effort to keep a harmonious atmosphere existing in the area of race relation in the City of Selma, but at the same time to let it be known that the Negro Citizens here, too, are no different than those all over the country who are seeking those rights and freedoms that they feel they justly deserve those privileges that will enable them to live with dignit; and to assume those responsibilities that should be shared by all citizens. They want no more but it is natural that they want no less.

"It is our objective to establish communication now and to be always in a position to discuss our problems that we may reach some amicable conclusions without disrupting the orderly process of business in the city. We are making special efforts to try to solve these problems without outside intervention.

"In trying to do so, we first of all requested of the Mayor to select persons of his choice among the white businessmen of the city to meet with a sub-committee of this Association for the purpose of discussing our grievances, but the May rapparently does not agree with our thinking. Hardly any consideration has been given by the Mayor because of what he has described to this organization by our representative to him as being too busy at the time to discuss the matter.

"For this reason we have decided to use the meth of

individual contact by mail of every business in the city of Selma where Negro patronage is expected, and we are enclosing a copy of the letter they will receive. Surely it is hoped that your organization will see the necessity of giving sincere and Christian consideration to these requests at the earliest possible date, to the extent that you will encourage the business men of the City of Selma to grant these requests because they are fair and just. If they are not, then let us know what you consider to be fair and just.

"We see no reason to make demands or to make threats and we will not do so, but we feel sure that you must know that continued disregard of basic rights of the Negro Citizens cannot continue without growing discontent that may lead to discord and possibly unnecessary situations that have existed in many other cities. It is our sincere hope that our city will be spared these objectionable alternatives but we must have your assistance if they are to be averted.

"May we request some acknowledgement from your Association in regards to the requests being made of the businesses of the City and if you are interested in having a representative of your Association to discuss these matters with us.

"COPY OF LETTER TO ALL BUSINESSES

"The Dallas County Improvement Association acting for the Negro citizens of Selma, Dallas County, is making contact with management and proprietors of businesses in the city as regards employment of Negroes and general treatment of Negroes as customers.

"We have requested of the May_ of the City to call certain white merchants of the city of his choice to discuss these problems with us but evidently he has not seen the importance of such an idea. In view of his decision in this matter, we find it necessary to make contact with each business making the following requests:

- "1. To apprade Negro employees to sale clerks and stock clerks or hire additional Negroes to these positions, and to hire a representative number to fill these positions.
- "2. To pay all Negroes in your employ a livable wage.
- "3. To demand that your employees treat all customers with courtesy, and that your business make all customer facilities of the store available to all customers white and Negro alike.
- "4. To remove all signs reading 'White' and 'Colored' from your premises.

"These requests are made in the interest of continued good and peaceful relationship, with the hope that each proprietor or manager will see the fairness in them - That he will immediately take action to comply.

"We see no reason to make this a threat, however, every business man must know that the Negro wants to do business now where it is appreciated. He desires to spend his money with those who treat him as a sustomer and give him the opportunity to benefit from its profits by giving him employment other than as janitors, maids and portars.

"We should like to have your decision on or before September 15, 1963. Fefusal to give any answer will of necessity be concluded to mean you are not interested."

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





On September 3, 1963, the following sources reported that Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr. had called out available posse members of his Dallas County Sheriff's Office mounted posse, for duty at Tuskegee, Alabama during the early morning hours of September 3, 1963. Clark had taken approximately ten members of his mounted posse and their horses plus six of his deputies and traveled to Tuskegee, Alabama to assist the Alabama Highway Patrol in throwing up a cordon around Tuskegee High School, in order to assure that the school remained closed on September 3, 1963. These sources advised that they understood the aid of the Sheriff's Office posse of Dallas County had been requested by Governor Wallace through Public Safety Director

ACTION TAKEN:

SAC Ray Faisst, Birmingham Office, was telephonically contacted at 12:31 P.M., 9/8/63. He said that Governor Wallace is scheduled for a television appearance some time late today. This program will be carried by some Alabama television stations including Station WAPI in Birmingham. Faisst said he had not made any plans to obtain a tape of the audio portion of this speech but in view of Barrett's request the speech will be taped and typewritten transcripts suitable for dissemination will be forwarded the Bureau promptly.

SAC Faisst was told to also forward to the Bureau tonight a teletype summary of the gist of Governor Wallace's remarks in his television appearance. Faisst said this will be done.





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

Avenue. The subject of the address was to be the march
at Washington D. C. which occurred on 8/28/63.

voter rally at St. Paul's Church where 250 - 300 Negroes were present, about 50% being teenagers.

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At 7:40 P.M. CST the rally was opened by a songfest led by Reverend C.C. HUNTER. After the songfest JAMES CILDERSLEEVE a Negro male who is connected with the Negro Lutheran High School in Selma, spoke concerning voter registration. He pointed out that a number of Negroes have been turned down from registering to vote in Dallas County, Alabama, however, they must continue to attempt to register and continue to have mass meetings in Selma. He stated that the Negroes must not be satisfied until all Negroes are voters.


Mrs. MARIE FOSTER, a Negro female, gave instructions to the crowd as to how to fill out voter application blanks and she spoke concerning the fact that Negroes must educate themselves to become first-class citizens. She stated that by 1970 it will take high skills to obtain a good job.


Mrs. AMELIA P. BOYNTON, Negro leader in Selma, gave the principal talk and summarized information on her attendance at the march at Washington, D. C. on 8/28/63. She stated that she had to push her way into the crowd and advised people in Washington that she was Chairman of the Dallas County, Alabama Movement for Voter Registration which allowed her to get close to the speaker's stand. She stated the march was covered by news media from all over the world and she summarized various talks made by various speakers at Washington.

The meeting was terminated about 10:30 P.M. CST and all Negroes attending the meeting dispersed and went to their homes.





Mobile, Alabama

At Murphy High School, a crowd of white students were observed together in front of the school at about 7:30 a.m., September 12, 1963. At 8:00 a.m., a crowd of about 150 students, of which an estimated 100 were boys, did not enter the school building, but began to march around the area to the rear of the school. Four or five members of the Sheriff's Office mounted posse broke up the gathering there, and at about 8:15 a.m., this group started leaving the school area.

The two Negro students arrived at Murphy High School and entered the building through a rear entrance at about 8:00 a.m. without incident, Mobile Police Department and Sheriff's Office men were patrolling the area.

tion was received indicating any improper force was used by police authorities in connection with the arrests.

The Mobile Press, afternoon newspaper published at Mobile, Alabama, reported that the number of Murphy High School students docketed at the Police Department was 54, rather than 56, as earlier reported. The article reflected that the students had been blocking traffic on Government Street. The news article reflected that there were 47 boys and 7 girls arrested. Forty-one of the students were released on bond of \$100 each, signed by Harry D. Hardy, Chairman of the Legal Committee of the Mobile County Citizens Council. Hearings were set for September 25 through 27, 1963. The article continued that the other 13 students were under 16 years of age and were turned over to juvenile authorities, prior to being released to their parents. All were lectured by City Commissioners Joseph N. Langan and George E. McNally before being released.

The two Negro students at Murphy High School left the school at 2:44 p.m. by a private automobile for their homes, without incident.

On the morning of September 12, 1963.

advised that he had received a phone call that morning from Cecil Jackson, legal advisor to Alabama Governor George Wallace, at Montgomery, Alabama, protesting the arrest of the Murphy High School students. Jackson informed that Governor Wallace considered this action the worst thing that could have been done. Informed Jackson that the students were not arrested on school property, and it was not the responsibility of the School Board.

Tuskegee, Alabama

Thirteen Negro students arrived at Tuskegee High School between 7:40 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., September 12, 1963,

accompanied by their parents. There was no disorder. Only a few white students were observed at the senior and junior high school building.

advised that a meeting had been held on the night of September 11, 1963 of students and parents, and it had been decided that the senior white students would seek to transfer to Shorter High School, a white segregated high school in Macon County, in order that they might graduate together. It was reported that 20 of the 4h white senior students from the high school are in this group, the others having previously moved from the community or transferred to other schools.

reported that a Freedom of Choice committee was to hold a meeting on the night of September 12, 1963, to pursue efforts concerning forming a private white school.

formed that white sentiment in Tuskegee against integrated schools is unyielding, and they do not believe that there will be any white students in Tuskegee High School after this week. They predicted a substantial exodus of white families from the community during the next few months, this already having commenced. Stated that he is observing "the death of a town."

At 9:20 a.m.. September 12, 1963,

stated that the few
white students who came to the high school that morning
left after obtaining school material, and now the white
boycott of the senior-junior high school is complete. The
only students in the senior-junior high school are the 13
Negroes.

The 13 Negro students left Tuskegee High School at the close of school on the afternoon of September 12, 1963, in personal automobiles, without difficulty. There were no demonstrations.



Bufiles indicate that is active in the integration movement in Alabama. He has been interviewed by Bureau Agents and has extended cooperation. He has furnished information concerning Hunter O'Dell, the alleged communist associate of Reverend Martin Luther King. He is a member of the Southern Regional Council, Inc., (SRC).

SRC has not been investigated by the Bureau. It was founded in 1944 and operates in a tax exempt status. The official organ of this organization is entitled "New South." There appears to be a certain amount of affiliation with the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a communist front.

Alabamians Behind Local Education (ABLE) was founded in Mobile, Alabama, in June, 1963. It is alleged that more than 100 local prominent citizens are charter of this nonprofit organization. Their statement of purpose indicates that they take no stand on racial issues and that the prime concern of the organization is the finest education available for the children. They do not favor closing schools because of segregation and wish no break in the schooling of the children.

Stated that some response was expected by September 15, 1963.

On September 10, 1963

a mass Negro youth rally would be held at Ward's Chapel A.M.E. Church on the night of September 13, 1963 at 7:30 P.M. CST. This rally was to be led by BENNY L. TUCKER and WILSON BROWN who are supposed to be representatives of the SNCC in the Selma area. He stated that a preliminary meeting of the Negro youth mass rally would be held at the

attempted to get a full time Field Secretary of the SNCC to come into Selma to lead the Negro youth and remove the leadership from the hands of such individuals as TUCKER and BROWN who do not appear capable of handling the youth movement without causing violence.

as yet to obtain responsible leadership for the Negro youth. He pointed out that in his opinion the SNCC has "stirred up the youth" and now they have left the situation in the hands of inexperienced individuals such as TUCKER and BROWN.

On September 11, 1963 stated that nothing definite was decided at the Negro youth meeting at the Canteen on the night of September 10, 1963. stated emphasized to the group the need for thorough planning in organizing any demonstration, and as yet they have not definitely planned any procedures for carrying out a demonstration. advised felt the demonstrations would possibly occur the latter part of the week ending September 20, 1963 because the Negro youth at present are not fully prepared to demonstrate and they are only developing support at this time for a demonstration.

Selma, Alabama advised that a meeting was held at the Dallas County Chamber of Commerce on September 2, 1963 in which the "demand letters" delivered to the merchants in Selma were discussed by city and county officials together with various merchants. It was decided at the meeting, according to what little information he had obtained, that the Chamber of Commerce wanted to call a meeting of white organizations in Selma such as civic clubs, merchant associations, etc. and organize a course of action to be taken. It was generally believed that if these organizations would "stand pact" as one united front that the racial situation would be eliminated for at least this year.

On September 11, 1963 stated that a meeting was held by the Selma Retail Merchants Association on the might of September 10, 1963.

Approximately 275 local budinesses in Selma were represented and it was a unanimous decirion of all concerned that no concessions would be granted to the Negroes which concessions were asked for in the "demand letters" sent to the merchants by a Negro organization known as the Dallas County Improvement Association. A city ordina see barring parades, sitins, and other type demonstrations was read to the merchants and they were advised by the Police Department and Sheriff's





Selma, Alabama, advised

Improvement Association, on the night of September 13, 1963, which association is headed by Edwin L. D. Moss as chairman. He pointed out that a Negro youth rally would be held at either Ward's Chapel AME Church, or Brown's Chapel AME Church.

On September 14, 1963 reported that at the meeting of the Dallas County Improvement Association

Selma and the Dallas County Improvement Association had elected to attempt to persuade Negro youths in Selma from demonstrating on September 16, 1963. He stated Reverend Benny D. Tucker. Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) representative, was present at the meeting of the Dallas County Improvement Association and appeared to be in agreement with the opinion of the association not to demonstrate until the City Council had time to rule on a letter Wilson Brown, another SNCC representative, had had forwarded to the council requesting a permit to parade, which would be after September 23, 1963. At the youth rally on September 13, 1963, which was held at Brown's Chapel/AME Church, Sylvan Street, Selma, Negro attorney J. L. Chestnut pointed out that no demonstrations should take place by the youths until after September 23, 1963, at which time the City Council would have an opportunity to rule on a letter requesting a permit to parade.

On September 13, 1963

Negro youth rally at Brown's Chapel terminated at 10:00 p.m., CST. Attendance was estimated at 250 Negroes, 80 to 90 per cent teenagers. Reverend L. L. Anderson, Pastor of the Negro Baptist Tabernacle Church, Broad Street, Selma, gave a speech

CA

which was considered by him to be non-committal regarding Negroes marching in Selma on September 16, 1963. Anderson did not specifically urge a march, but he did not definitely point out to the Negro youths not to march. Stated, if anything, Anderson appeared to be in favor of a march in Selma on September 16, 1963 and inferred demonstrations should take place. Negro attorney J. L. Chestnut did urge the youths to delay demonstrations until after September 23, 1963.



On September 16, 1963 reported at approximately 8:45 a.m., CST, that the Negro youths began leaving school at about 8:30 a.m., and entering Brown's Chapel AME Church, where they appeared to be holding a rally of some type.

On September 16, 196 advised about 9:30 a.m., CST, that a youth rally was taking place at Brown's Chapel AME Church, which was being led by Reverend Benny L. Tucker. He stated sit-ins would take place at the drugstores in Selma at 10:00 a.m., that date. Two Negroes would sit in at the stores and one would be present to observe.

On September 16, 1963 at about 10:15 a.m., CST, reported sit-ins occurred at drug-stores in Selma


also reported about 15 to 20 minutes later that two incidents of violence had occurred at Carter's Drugstore, Broad Street, when a Negro female and a young Negro male went into the store to stage a sit-in. The


Negro female was struck by an unidentified citizen and the Negro male was prodded with a hot shot "cattle prod" and when they departed the drugstore someone struck the Negro male with a stick.

On September 16, 1963
at approximately 10:30 a.m., CST, telephonically advised that drugstore owners in Selma were beating Negroes who were sitting at lunch counters with clubs and wanted the FBI to "take immediate and direct action" in this matter. He stated no law enforcement officer was involved in any beatings, but citizens at the drugstores were doing the beatings.

who stated he did not desire to furnish any information regarding the beatings in a court of law, appeared at the Selma Resident Agency of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and advised he was standing on the outside of Carter's Drugstore looking through the window. He stated he saw a white male, whom he believed to be hit a Negro male, who was sitting at the lunch counter, with a stick one time. He stated the Negro male ran out of the store and his head was bleeding. He did not see any beating administered to a Negro female inside the store.

On September 16, 1963 advised he had learned of the beating administered a Negro male at Carter's Drugstore and he also heard a Selma Police Department Patrol car was outside the drugstore when the citizen hit the Negro male inside the store. He pointed out this was an example of the Selma Police Department ignoring their duty in allowing the beating to occur.

At 2:36 p.m., Sheriff James G. Tucker claimed the Negroes would march between that time and 6:00 p.m.





At approximately 4:35 p.m., CST, two Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation observed and photographed a march conducted by Negro youths from Brown's Chapel Church for a distance of approximately one-half block. This march was halted by a lieutenant with the Selma Police Department and the leader was asked if he possessed a permit to parade, which is required by City Ordinance, and when a negative reply was received, the Selma Police Department officer placed between 50 and 70 Negro youths under arrest, loaded them on a YMCA bus and a Dallas County Sheriff's Office bus and took them to the City Jail in Selma. This terminated any further demonstration by Negroes on September 16, 1963 at Selma. No violence or other incidents accompanied the arrest of the marchers.

In view of the various allegations which are being made concerning the inability of the Bureau to solve bombing cases in Birmingham, with certain figures being used indicating that we have failed to show results in from 30, to 40, to 50 instances, I have suggested to Mr. Belmont that we immediately prepare an analysis indicating just how many instances of bombings there have been in Birmingham in recent years and whether we have investigated these matters, or whether the Department ruled that we had no jurisdiction. It seems to me that we qught to know just where we stand, in order that we can at least try to refute the inaccurate allegations which are being made against the Bureau in this field.

I think a similar analysis should be made covering the entire state of Alabama so that we can see just where we stand in this picture.



One of the primary purposes of our investigations of Klan and hate groups is to determine whether they are actually responsible for acts of racial violence. While we logically consider Klan and hate group members as prime suspects in the bombing of the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church, to date no information has been developed indicating that members of these groups perpetrated that crime. There are, of course, many individual extremists who due to personal proclivity for violence and their overwhelming bitterness and antagonism towards desegregation are fully capable of committing crimes of racial violence. Investigation has disclosed that such individuals not Klan and hate group members were responsible for recent church burnings in Georgia and the racial murders of William L. Moore and Medgar Evers.

ACTION

We are continuing to afford the matter of coverage on racial matters preferred and continuous attention in an effort to even further extend and improve our existing coverage.

In this regard in connection with our investigation of the bombing of the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church, we have instructed pertinent offices to interview all Klan and hate group leaders, officials and members. The field has been instructed that each of these individuals

We have directed the SACs to personally supervise this program and have advised them that they will be personally responsible to insure that positive results are achieved, and we will follow it to insure the results are achieved.

RACIAL SITUATION STATE OF ALABAMA SELMA, ALABAMA

On September 17, 1963, advised that Negro youths began congregating at the Baptist Tabernacle Church on the corner of Broad Street and Minter Avenue, at 8:30 PM CST. During the morning of September 17, 1963, no activity took place except that Negroes at the church sang and held a rally. The estimated attendance was 400 to 500 Negroes, about 80% Negro youths. Shortly before noon, some 36 young Negroes were stopped on Washington Street, Selma, while parading toward the downtown section. They were asked if they had a permit to parade and if they did not have a permit, they were instructed to immediately disperse or they would be subject to arrest. They had no permit to parade and they immediately dispersed. However, it appeared that the Negro youths then "filtered" into the downtown section of Selma and organized picket lines in front of Carter's Drugstore, Pilcher McBride Drugs, and Jackson's Clothing Store. This occurred about 12:45 PM and

rurther activity occurred during the afternoon and evening of September 17, 1963. It was learned from that on September 18, 1963, the Negroes would again reassemble at Ward's Chapel AME Church, on the corner of Tremont and Philpot Streets.

On September 18, 1963 stated that Negro youths had begun to gather at Ward's Chapel AME Church at approximately 7:00 AM. The church was filled to capacity and several individuals were standing on the outside of the church.

On September 18, 1963, at about 10:45 AM CST,


On September 18, 1963, advised at approximately 2:30 PM CST that Negroes had changed their b7C meeting place from Ward's Chapel AME Church, to Brown's Chapel AME Church on Sylvan Street. stated that during the day of September 18, 1963, the downtown section of Selma had various stores picketed by pickets that were walking in twos and threes

On September 18, 1963, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation observed that at 4:20 PM CST, the Negroes at Brown's Chapel AME Church came out of the church and massed on the steps and started singing "freedom songs". A crowd of whites that were gathering one block away from the church on Sylvan Street were immediately dispersed by the Selma Police Department Officers. Dallas County Sheriff JAMES G. CLARK, JR., and his deputies plus two or three posse members and some few State of Alabama law enforcement officers were directly in front of the church on Sylvan Street. A white male, about 25 years of age, came walking down Sylvan Street with a large live green snake draped across his arms and he was holding the head with one hand. He walked into the crowd of Negroes massed on the steps and Sheriff CLARK walked to the curb directly in front of the crowd and watched the white male start waving the snake in the faces of several of the Negroes. A Negro male scuffled with this white male and CLARK immediately went into the crowd and arrested the Negro male, taking him out of the crowd and across RACIAL SITUATION SELMA, ALABAMA

the street to the Sheriff's Office car. The white male was allowed to continue on down the street carrying the snake. This brought a frenzy of excitement among the Negroes and anger flared among them. They appeared to be on the verge of violent activities; however, they only voiced angry disapproval of the Sheriff's actions at not arresting the white male and arresting the Negro male.

Shortly thereafter, the Negroes re-entered the church where the rally continued for about one hour and at 5:25 PM, they dispersed from the church.

In accordance with the request of Mr. John Murphy of your Division on September 24, 1963, the following details concerning the situation at Selma, Alabama, are submitted for your informatica.

Information was received from

on September 24, 1963, that John Lewis, as SNCC representative in Selma, and about 1400 Negroes were surrounded in the First Baptist Church in Selma by local and State Police and several hundred deputized citizens. Lewis claimed that the Negroes had been in the church since the night of September 23, 1963, and were being prevented from leaving the church.

Our Mobile Office, which has been observing the racial activity at Selma at the request of the Department, has advised that a Negro youth rally was held at the First Baptist Church on the evening of September 23, 1963, which ended at 11:00 p.m., Central Standard Time. All of those in attendance departed from the church upon the conclusion of the meeting. No violence occurred. Police who were at the scene did not interfere with the departure of the Negroes although at the request of Sheriff James Clark, approximately 50 Alabama State troopers drove around: the church in caravan style in a show of force.

Another Negro youth rally was held at the church beginning at 8:00 a.m. on September 24, 1963, with approximately 400 Negroes in attendance. The majority of the Negro youths involved are students at the R. B. Hudson High School in Selma. About 20 law enforcement officers including city police, Sheriff's deputies and Dallas County posse members were at the scene but there were no Alabama State Policemen on duty at the church. Bureau Agents observed that the Negroes were allowed to happenows tand go as they desired from the church in small groups throughout the day

Later in the afternoon, 600 to 700 Negro youths left the Hudson High School and proceeded in the direction of the First Baptist Church in groups. The members of one group of approximately 30 to 40 youths who were singing freedom songs were arrested by local police and charged with unlawful assembly. Shortly after, a group of 100 youths, who left the First Baptist Church and marched down the street, was stopped by local police. The youths knelt on the street and sang at which time they were police. The youths knelt on the street and sang at which time they were placed under arrest and charged with parading without a permit. All of those arrested, a total of 139, were transported to jail in buses. Bureau Agents observed no incidents of brutality occurring in their presence in connection with the arrests.

The arrests of the Negro youths took place immediately adjacent to a Negro housing project and approximately 50 Alabama State troopers arrived on the scene and notified all residents who were in their yards or on the sidewalks viewing the arrests to go into their homes. They forced Negroes off the streets into their residences.



subsequent activity at the church ceased at about 5:45 p. m. The only subsequent activity at the church on the evening of September 24, 1963, was a meeting of approximately 75 Negro adults. This meeting ended at 10:00 p. m. and no incidents or violence occurred.

The above information was telephonically furnished to the Civil Rights Division on September 24 and 25, 1963.


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At 3:15 p.m., September 24, 1963 Special Agents of the FBI observed approximately 600 to 700 Negro youths departing from R. B. Hudson High School, the Negro high school in Selma, corner of First Avenue and Lapsley Street, in large groups. They proceeded to Broad Street in an easterly direction, turned south on Broad Street walking in the direction of Jeff Davis Avenue. One large group of 30 to 40 Negroes were singing freedom songs and walking in a group. At the corner of Small Avenue and Broad Street, this group was stopped by Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr., his Deputies and Possee members and city Police Department officers. They were informed that they were under arrest for "unlawful assembly and inciting to riot", violation of Title 14, Section 407, Alabama Code, they were placed on a bus and taken to jail. This arrest was accomplished without incident by law enforcement officers at about 3:45 p.m., CST. The remaining groups of Negroes split into smaller groups and proceeded on toward Jeff Davis Avenue.

At about 4:00 p.m. Special Agents of the FBI observed a group of approximately 100 Negro youths march out of the First Baptist Church, corner of Jeff Davis and Sylvan Streets, and proceed south on Sylvan Street and were stopped by the Sheriff, his Deputies and Possee members and local Police Department officers. They were informed that they were parading without a permit and subject to arrest. The Negroes immediately knelt in the street

and started singing and praying. The arrest took place immediately adjacent to a Negro housing project. George Washington Carver Homes, and large crouds of Magro on-lookers were on the sidewalks and lawns of the project. Two buses were brought to the scene and the Nogroes that were parading were loaded onto the buses and taken to jail. After this arrest took place approximately 50 to 75 Alabama State Troopers were called onto the scene by Sheriff Clark and 25 Alabama State Troopers; cars arrived at the scene and the Negro onlookers were informed by Major Joe Smelley (NA), Chief, Department of Public Safety, through a public address system on his car, to disperse and go into their homes immediately. When the erowd appeared rejuctant to disperse, the Troopers immediately came out of the cars and cleared the area. No incident of violence was observed in this operation or during the arrest of the Negroes who were arading.



Agents observed a meeting at the First Baptist Church which appeared to be a spontaneous meeting of adult Negroes and was not a large gathering. The meeting lasted from about B:30 p.m., CST, to 10:00 p.m., CST. No coverage was afforded the meeting inside of the church by local authorities and the Negroes were addressed by an unidentified group spokesman. There was some singing and hand clapping at the meeting but no efforts to organize a demonstration out of the church. Outside coverage was maintained by one Sheriff's Office car with one Deputy Sheriff and three Posse members and one Selma Police Department car was on

the scene with two officers. The meeting terminated at about 10:00 p.m., CST, and the Negroes peacefully dispersed.

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Two meetings were scheduled for the evening of September 23, 1963, one at the First Baptist Church, on the corner of Jeff Davis and Sylvan Streets, which would be the main Negro voter registration rally, and a side meeting would be held at Brown's Chapel AME Church for Negro youths.

Brown's Chapel is approximately one-half block down the street from the First Baptist Church.

John Lewis Chairman of SNCC, would speak at the rally and would probably speak to the youths also, as he is an agressive leader among the Negroes, and especially among Negro youths.


Some consideration would be given by Negro youth leaders to also picket on the night of September 23, 1963, either the Dallas County Courthouse or the National Guard Armory in Selma; said he felt any outside demonstrations apart from the rallies might set off wholesale demonstrations which would "get out of hand," and he was of the opinion any pickets should be discouraged that night. He pointed out on September 24, 1963 it is being contemplated that demonstrations would occur in Selma, such as sit-ins, picketing and possible marches.

On September 23, 1963 the City Council of Selma turned down the petition of SNCC for a permit to parade and, plans were being formulated to organize wholesale demonstrations in Selma. Last week, the week of September 16-20, 1963, was only a prelude to the demonstrations which would take place, He further stated he had spoken to Reverend Martin Luther King at Atlanta, Georgia, on September 22, 1963, and King had promised to come to Selma within the next few weeks if the SNCC leaders could obtain a large enough hall for him to speak, for the expected turnout could be as many as 5,000 people. Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth was appearing in Selma and would speak on October 22, 1963.

that an organized campaign was underway at the present time to have Negroes withdraw

their patronage from downtown Selma merchants, which is known as "selective buying." This is being organized at the present time and is expected to be effected within the next two or three weeks.



On September 23, 1963 Bureau Agents observed the Negro rallies at the First Baptist Church and Brown's Chapel AME Church, which meetings began at 7:30 p.m., CST. At approximately 8:30 p.m., Negro youths from Brown's Chapel AME Church moved over to the voter registration rally at the First Baptist Church and joined Negro adults at this meeting. The total attendance for both rallies was estimated at some 600 Negroes. Parked in the immediate area of the churches and patroling the area were some 50 officers of the Selma Police Department. Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr., was stationed in his vehicle in front of the church. Approximately four to six law enforcement officers were in the church taking notes and affording coverage of the meeting. About seven blocks from the church, near the Southern Bell Telephone Company building in Selma, were parked some 19 Alabama State Troopers' vehicles with a standby force estimated at about 60 troopers. About four blocks from the church were two busloads of Dallas County Sheriff's Posse members, estimated at about 60 to 70 men. The posse members were dressed in khaki clothes with shoulder patches and hard helmets, identifying them as posse members. They were armed with side arms and billy clubs. It was also observed that the Alabama State Troopers were armed with carbines, shotguns, side arms, clubs and wearing hard hats.

As the voter registration rally terminated at approximately 11:00 p.m., and the Negroes were filing out of the church, a broadcast was made by Sheriff James G. Clark, Jr., over the Alabama Highway Patrol network to Chief Joe Smelley stating, "They have been talking about you in the meeting, so let's let them have a look at you; come on by the church." About ten minutes later as the Negroes were dispersing from the church, a caravan of 19 Alabama State Troopers' cars drove in caravan style by the church and it was observed that carbines were in the hands of these Alabama State Troopers pointed skyward through the window.

The meeting opened with a songfest led by Prichett, which lasted until approximately 8:05 p.m. Rev. J. D. Hunter then addressed the meeting, pointing out to the Negroes that this was a "big night" for freedom. He stated that less than 300 Negroes were eligible to vote in Dallas County, Alabama. He stated local officers had no right to interfere with court rulings and that the Negroes will "teach local authorities a few things before it is over." He urged all Negroes to register to vote.

At about 8:30 p.m., the Negro youths from Brown's Chapel filed into the church singing a freedom song.

At 8:40 p.m., Mrs. A. P. Boynton led a memorial service for a few minutes for the "two young boys killed in Birmingham." Thereafter Marie Foster led an educational meeting and pointed out to the Negroes it was time to remember the color of their skin and time to love one another.

John Lewis spoke to the meeting at 9:50 p.m., and stated he was born in Troy, Alabama, and was head of the movement in Nashville, Tennessee. He

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stated he was on the Freedom Ride to Birmingham and Montgomery, Alabama, in 1961. He advised his heart was full of sorrow for Birmingham and that Selma at the present time is involved in a holy crusade. He stated he was here for freedom and that the Negroes would get their freedom. He blamed Governor Wallace of Alabama for the bloodshed in Birmingham and he also blamed the President of the United States and Al Lingo and his "goons." He advised Negroes are in this movement together and they have to be free now and would not wait. He stated they must want to be free. He pointed out no Negro officials have been elected in Dallas County or the state of Alabama. He understands that the Negroes are not buying in town and this was a good movement. He said the Negroes had to break the back of the downtown section of Selma in order to succeed in their movement. He said Negroes must march, demonstrate and sit in. He urged the Negroes to forget violence and that Lingo was in Birmingham and now he was in Selma. He pointed out that when you arrest 19 people for nothing, you better get ready to arrest 100 or thousands. He told the Negroes if you must give blood we must give ours. Negroes want to be free in 1963; that justice would roll in Selma; that Governor Wallace is a madman and is sick. The Negroes must march, declare a non-violent war in Selma as well as in the nation. The forces of Lingo, Clark and Mullen will not stop the Negroes; that the Negroes must give themselves and their lives if they have to. They must say something about Wallace, Clark and his posse, and they cannot stop the Negroes. He stated "hot laws" are made overnight and the Negro cannot obey these laws. He said he is going to the courthouse someday and see brown faces holding offices in the courthouse; that the Negroes will turn the town "upside down". He said he invited all Negroes to come over to Parrish High School (white high school in Selma) and the Negroes would be sitting over there.

Mrs. A. P. Boynton advised the collection was \$393.78.

Reverend L. L. Anderson, Pastor, Baptist
Tabernacle Church in Selma, criticized Carter
of Carter's Drugstore in Selma. He pointed out
Carter owned 51 per cent of the City National
Bank stock and Carter had time to "hit one of
our Negro boys." Anderson told the Negroes to
do the City National Bank like Carter did the
Negro boy. He said neither Carter nor any other
Klan member will run him out of Selma.

The Negroes then broke into a chant:
"Two four six eight, we want to integrate."

Reverend M. C. Cleveland terminated the meeting at 11:00 p.m., and advised that the next meeting would be at the First Baptist Church and the speaker would be Emory O. Jackson, Editor of the Birmingham Negro World.



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



He stated in reference to allegations of mistreatment of Negroes, that several have complained that they have not received the proper food, were not allowed visitors at the county jail, and their cases have not been handled as expeditiously as he would have desired. He stated, "You know, we have to keep sending in propaganda to appropriate authorities in order to keep the Federal Government interested in our cause."

In view of the information above, Mobile is not conducting any further investigation at this time based on Bureau airtel dated 9/19/63; however, through contact with who was in Selma on 9/17/63, attempts will be made to establish what mistreatment is complained of in reference to the arrest of the pickets. If the identity of the picket who was mistreated is established, he will be interviewed concerning the allegation of mistreatment.

If the Bureau desires further investigation in reference to the incidents, advise Mobile.

On September 20, 1963 advised through continuing contacts throughout the day that a Negro youth rally was being held at Brown's Chapel A.M.E. Church which started at approximately 7:00 a.m., Central Standard Time, was attended by some 200 Negro youths, and the meeting was terminated at 4:30 p.m.

No demonstrations of any consequence occurred in Selma as Circuit Judge James A. Hare has stated he would issue an injunction against Negro demonstrations if same continued and if he received a petition from Circuit Solicitor Blanchard McLeod of the Fourth Judicial Circuit to issue this injunction.

This regarded a reported beating of a Negro male and the other incident was a reported beating of a Negro male, at the County Jail on the night of September 16, 1963




On September 20, 1963 demonstrations advised that which took place on the afternoon of September 16, 1963 when sixty or more Negroes were arrested for parading without a permit. demonstrations on September 17, 18, 19 and 20, 1963 when pickets were arrested by the Sheriff's Office and the Police Department Officers in the downtown area of Selma. He at Selma, Alabama, advised that on the morning or September 16, 1963 when sit-in demonstrations occurred at the drugstores; however, he understood violence had occurredat Carter's Drugstore wherein was struck on the head with a stick and a Negro female, whose name he does not know, was also "roughed up" and struck. He stated that he heard there were several things happening to Negroes who were arrested such as being given poor food, not being allowed visitors, and their cases were not being handled as expeditiously as he thought that they should be. The two incidents that he has reported to the FBI in Selma involving are the only two incidents that he knows of wherein He stated that he had reported to violence has occurred. that violence was erupting in Selma, Alabama, and that he had heard that Negroes were being "mistreated" and he knows that this information is furnished directly to Washington, D.C. He pointed out that "you know we have to keep propaganda going into Washington in order to keep the Federal government interested in our cause" in Selma on September 21, 1963 with the exception of placing one or two pickets at Carter's Drugstore on Broad Street, Selma, and having two churches open for Negroes to congregate

and hold rallies. He stated that too many rural whites and Negroes would be Selma on Saturday, September 21, 1963, and if demonstrations of any great extent took place he felt that violent activities could occur has contacted military authorities at Craig Air Force Base on two occasions. One time to attempt to persuade the Commanding Officer to put Selma off limits and one other time to seek legal advise for a Negro female who was in jail and who is a military dependent. He advised that no violence occurred to this Negro female, that she has been treated well in jail, and there was nothing that the Federal government had any jurisdiction over contacted military authorities at Craig Air Force Base for the purpose of only obtaining legal advise. He stated he felt that the movement in Selma was gaining momentum and more demonstrations would occur next week at Selma; however intends to "apply pressure" where it is needed in order to bring about the proper response from white citizens
