Confirming telephone conversation had this morning with your Major Smith, I desire to quote from a letter addressed to me by one of my constituents in Louisiana with respect to his son who enlisted last November in the Army Air Corps, - I duote the pertinent paragraph:

"***He was sent to Randolph Field, Texas and stayed there three months in basic training then sent to Sheppard Field, Texas to Mechanic School, and a few days ago was put under a bunch of bull-headed Negro instructors. This same thing happened to my son-in-law at Keesler Field, Biloxi, Miss., some month and a half ago. How does the War Department of anyone else think the Southern people can whole-heartedly support the war effort with something like that crammed down their throats."

I should appreciate receiving a full report from you in the above matter at your earliest convenience.







1. The following is a quotation from a memorandum addressed to the Secretary of War by Judge William H. Hastie, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War:

- "c. A small deviation from the separate school program was made when one group of Negro soldiers received training as enlisted technicians and mechanics at Chanute Field. The results were excellent. The men did well. I urged the importance of repeating such training for subsequent groups on a continuous basis. However, the program stopped with the first group. Efforts were made by the Air Forces to set up segregated technical training at Tuskegee or elsewhere. Difficulties were encountered. In the meantime successive classes of Negro pilots were being trained, but no supporting technical schooling of ground crew members was in progress. Thus even the segregated program has gotten badly out of balance in the effort to accomplish its extension. The prospect is that in 1943 Negro pilots will be ready before and faster than adequate numbers of trained ground crews are available."
- 2. Your attention is invited to directive to your office from the Assistant Chief of Air Staff, A-1, dated June 24, 1942:

"In accordance with verbal directive of the Chief of the Air Staff, you will take the necessary action to form a complete Pursuit Group, Negro, together with all the pertinent Base and Service units, Negro, with a view to their earliest practicable commitment to combat."

- 3. If the statements made in the quotation in paragraph one to the effect that technical school training of ground crew members is not in consonance with the training of Negro pilots, you will take immediate corrective action to insure early compliance with the directive to fully man one Negro Pursuit (Fighter) unit together with auxiliary service units.
- 4. You will continue the technical training of Negro personnel at a rate sufficient to initially man and subsequently support this group in active combat. For your information and guidance, units to which/officers are assigned are authorized a 25% overstrength in officer personnel. Negro
- 5. Your plan and the action taken for compliance with this directive will be reported to the Assistant Chief of Air Staff, A-1, together with such data as may be available to you showing total numbers of negroes, both officer and enlisted, who have been trained in Air Force specialties.

Reference paragraph 5 of attached R and R from Chief of Air Staff to Director of Military Requirements, the following plan is submitted for carrying out the directive from A-l to form a complete Negro Fighter Group together with all pertinent Base and Service Units with a view to their earliest practicable commitment to combat:

a. Send the 99th Fighter Squadron to an active theater with Lt. Col. Benjamin O. Davis in command; Col. Davis to be returned to the United States to assume command of the 332nd Fighter Group by the time the group is brought to full strength in personnel but

b. Transfer the 83rd Fighter Control Squadron and the 332nd Fighter Control Squadron, less personnel and equipment, to Orlando, Florida, to be assigned to the Air Defense Department, AAF School of Applied Tactics, for reorganization by the Assistant Commandant, Air Defense Department, AAF School of Applied Tactics. Transfer personnel and equipment, except Signal Corps equipment, presently assigned to above units, to the fighter squadrons of the 332nd Fighter Group. Transfer the Signal Corps Equipment assigned to the 83rd Fighter Control Squadron to the Air Service Command, Fairfield Depot, Fairfield, Ohio, marked for redistribution by the Director of Communications, Hq Army Air Forces.

c. Transfer sufficient personnel from the 717th Signal A.W. Company to the 689th Signal A.W. Company to form two additional reporting platoons, and send the 689th at the earliest practicable date to one of the following places:

(1) Trinidad.

(2) South Pacific or Southwest Pacific Island.

Query has been sent to General Brett re assignment of 689th Signal A.W. Co. to Trinidad in lieu of 684th Signal A.W. Co., now earmarked.

d. Disband the 717th Signal A. W. Company, transferring personnel to 332nd Fighter Group and returning equipment to proper Chief of Arms or Services.

e. Direct the Third Air Force to activate at Drew Field, Florida, a fighter squadron (white) at a strength of 19 officers and 224 enlisted men, to be moved to Selfidge Field, Michigan, by March 1, 1943, to provide instructor and supervisory personnel for the 332nd Fighter Group until mechanics and other technical personnel of that group are fully trained, at which time the white squadron should be assigned to a fighter group in the 0.T.U. system.

f. Move the 332nd Fighter Group, consisting of Group Headquarters and three fighter squadrons, at current strength on March 1, 1943, to Selfridge Field, Michigan. Pending the return of Lt. Col. Davis, the Commanding General, Third Air Force, will appoint a qualified Army Air Force officer to command the 332nd Fighter Group.

g. Move the 96th Service Group, consisting of units listed below, at currer strength on March 1, 1943, to Selfridge Field, Michigan:

Charge the Commanding General, Third Air Force, with the responsibility of training pilot loss replacements and enlisted replacements to the 99th Fighter Squadron until the departure of the 332nd Fighter Group.

i. - 1. It is believed essential that the future of the 332nd Fighter Group* be definitely clarified.
- 2. This group consists of 3 officers and 416 enlisted men at Tuskegee, Alabama. Pilots are being trained by the Flying Training Command at the same station. Enlisted personnel for the group and allied Service units have not completed specialized training. At the present rate of production it appears that several months will elapse before a competent ground echelon and the necessary supporting Service troops can be obtained,
- 3. This Air Force has selected Selfridge Field, Michigan as the ultimate station of the 332nd Fighter Group* to which it is proposed to move as soon as Selfridge Field becomes completely operational on or about February 1, 1943. There are some thirty (30) pilots for this group in the Flying Training Command establishment at Tuskegee. These flying officers can be transferred to Selfridge Field; however, the ground echelon is inadequate to maintain the airplanes which will be required for this It is, therefore, necessary to provide this service from white personnel available in the III Fighter Command until the 332nd Fighter Group* Service personnel are able to take over.
- 4. In order to provide the requisite incentive in grades and ratings for a white unit to act as instructor personnel, and to maintain the aircraft of this group, it is believed essential that a special Fighter Squadron, less flight echelon, be authorized. If authorized, this Fighter Squadron would be transferred to Selfridge Field to fill the interim in maintenance and to instruct on the job such ground personnel of the 332nd Fighter Group* as is not possible to send to the Technical Training Command for special school work.
- 5. In order to provide a command cadre for the 332nd Fighter Group* it is desirable that the most experienced negro officer available be assigned as the Commander, together with a suitable Executive Officer. Lieut. Colonel Benjamin O. Davis, Air Corps, now commanding the 99th Fighter Squadron* is considered the most suitable officer for this assignment. A suitable replacement as commanding officer of the 99th Fighter

Squadron exists in 1st Lieutenant Clarence C. Jamison. In the group of pilots trained at Tuskegee, but not yet assigned to the 332nd Fighter Group* or the 99th Fighter Squadron*, there are two suitable pilots who can be transferred to the 99th Fighter Squadron* as replacements for Lieut. Colonel Benjamin O. Davis and the Executive Officer to be transferred to the 332nd Fighter Group, thus maintaining the 99th Fighter Squadron* at full strength.

- 6. The rate of production of pilots in the Flying Training Command school at Tuskegee is such that once the initial requirements of the 332nd Fighter Group are met, any foreseeable need will be more than fulfilled. The only known requirement for additional pilots, once eighty for the 332nd Fighter Group*are produced, is the limited number of replacements to be required by the 332nd Fighter Group.
- 7. As presently organized the 332nd Fighter Group*consists of three squadrons. The 99th Fighter Squadron*is a separate squadron and not part of the 332nd Fighter Group. Since the normal Fighter Group organization consists of four squadrons, it is considered desirable that the 332nd Fighter Group should be no exception in this respect.
 - 8. Recommendations: It is recommended that:
- a. Lieut. Colonel Benjamin C. Davis, Air Corps, be transferred from the 99th Fighter Squadron+ and designated as Group Commander of the 332nd Fighter Group, and that one additional officer be transferred from the 99th Fighter Squadron to the 332nd Fighter Group as Executive Officer. There are three other officers now at Tuskegee who can be qualified as Squadron Commanders of the 332nd Fighter Group*.
- b. Two officers now under the Flying Training Command at Tuskegee be transferred to the 99th Fighter Squadron* as replacements for Lieut. Colonel Davis and the Executive Officer of the 332nd Fighter Group*.
- c. 1st Lieut. Clarence C. Jamison be designated as Squadron Commander of the 99th Fighter Squadron*.
- d. A special Fighter Squadron (white) with the necessary grades and ratings, be activated in the Third Air Force to serve at Selfridge Field, Michigan, to provide instructor and maintenance personnel for the flight echelon of the 332nd Fighter Group* until the mechanics and other technical personnel of that group are fully trained.
- e. The output of the Flying Training Command in negro officer pilots be reduced to that necessary to provide replacements for the 332nd Fighter Group* only.

1. It has been brought to the attention of this Division that two Negro applicants for Service Pilot rating who had passed the necessary flying and other tests were instructed by Headquarters, Southeast Air Forces Flying. Training Command, to report for training with the Central Instructors School, Maxwell Field, Alabama, with a view towards using them as instructors in the Civil Contract School at Tuskegee.

2. These Negroes, one living in Cleveland, Ohio, and the other in Washington, D. C., reported at Maxwell Field, traveling at their own personal expense, and were told that they could not be accepted as Service Pilots or as instructors in the Civil Contract School.

3. The applications in these two cases when forwarded to the Headquarters, Flying Training Command, were distinctly marked "Negro".

4. In view of the way that these two cases were handled, serious embarrassment to this Headquarters has been caused, and the attached letter ub Rel. is recommended for your signature.

- 1. An experiessing situation has developed wherein two negro applicants qualified for Service Filot ratings were requested by Headquarters, Southeast Air Forces Training Center, to report at Maxwell Field for the instructors' course. Their application papers for a commission were cent to your headquarters with notations to the effect that the applicants were negro and for the purpose of your consideration with respect to possible use at Tuskegee either in the Civil Contract School or in a Service Pilot status.
- 2. These applicants reported to Maxwell Field at their own expense, one traveling from Cleveland, Ohio, and the other from Wachington, D. C. Upon arrival they were told they could not be accepted because they were negroes.
- 3. This incident caused serious embarassment to this Head-quarters and the War Department and occurrences of this character must be prevented in the future at all costs. The officer who instructed these negroes to report without careful examination of the papers beforehand and without any definite plan concerning their effective use should be held responsible, and appropriate action taken. Steps should also be taken to see that no such mistake is repeated.

1. The following is a quotation from a memorandum addressed to the Secretary of War by Judge William H. Hastie, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War:

"h. The dangers inherent in sending inadequately trained flight surgeons into the field are too apparent to require elaboration. Yet, Negro medical officers in the Air Forces may get only part of the special training in aviation medicine which is available. They are not admitted to the school of aviation medicine at Randolph Field. The reason given is that branch schools are now providing training formerly concentrated at Randolph. Yet there remain such matters as didactic work for which selected white officers are sent to the school at Randolph Field for full time study while Negro medical officers pursue this training as a spare time correspondence course while continuing their regular duties at their home station. Even the branch school program in which it is represented that Negro officers share without discrimination is in fact discriminatory. Many white officers enrolled at a branch school of aviation medicine have the opportunity of full time resident study. The Negro officer is permitted to commute periodically from his home station at Tuskegee for work at the Maxwell Field branch school. Such grudging partial tender of makeshift schemes may be expected to continue unless a genuine change of racial attitude and policy occurs in the Air Commands."

- 2. Immediate action will be initiated by you to provide a proportionate share or vacancies for Negro resident students at the School of Aviation Medicine. Qualifying standards for white student Flight Surgeons will apply equally to Negroes.
- 3. The proportionate share of vacancies will be calculated on the basis of the ratio of the total white Flight Surgeons to total Negro Flight Surgeons to be trained. In any event, regardless of fractional proportions, at least one Negro surgeon will be thoroughly trained in a resident student status.
- 4. Compliance with this directive will be reported to the Assistant Chief of Air Staff, A-1, together with estimated total number of Negro Flight Surgeons who will be trained in a resident student status.

White personnel falling within Grade V is approximately 9 per cent; Grade IV, 22 per cent (Tab A). This should materially raise the caliber of the unit in question and permit its development into a reasonably efficient combat unit.

- activate the necessary number of service units whose chief function is that of labor troops, Quartermaster port battalions and service battalions being typical of this type. By supplying these units with carefully selected white officers and noncommissioned officers these latter units, likewise, should reach a reasonable stage of efficiency in so far as their contemplated tasks are concerned. While definite figures are not available, it is believed that the majority of Negroes falling into Grade V are from the South where they have been accustomed to performing common labor under immediate white supervision. If this is the case, little resentment should result on their part for the maintenance of their status quo after domning uniform.
- 4. specifically the plan now under consideration provides for the screening of Grade V Nugro personnel, in excess of 9 per cent,

from the 92d Division, its replacement with Grade I, II, III and IV personnel, and the activation of 2 port battalions and 7 Quartermaster service battalions to absorb the excess Grade V personnel, the latter units to be staffed with white officers and noncommissioned officers.

5. Approval of the plan outlined above is recommended.

Approximately 7000 Grade I, II, III and IV men will be required to replace Grade Vs in the 92d Division. To obtain this number it will be necessary to induct approximately 15,000 Megroes. Grade Vs obtained from this number will be sufficient to furnish privates and privates first class for the service and port battalions indicated. After a sufficient period of trial, the Commanding Generals, Army Ground Forces and Services of Supply should be called on for a report as to the advantages and disadvantages of the plan in order that the War Department may have data on which to base further action in this regard.



- 1. Procedures outlined in Section 2, Mar Department Circular No. 327, 1942, have been instituted at this station and to date sixty-three (63) enlisted men of Engineer Aviation Units at this station have been reclassified as limited service and have been transferred to the 24th Aviation Squadron. In addition to these sixty-three (63) enlisted men, twenty-four (24) engineer enlisted men have been reclassified as limited service, and at the present time, remain assigned to engineer units because of the fact that there are no colored units at this station which can possibly absorb these enlisted men.
- 2. Full use is being made of War Department Circulars 395 and 397, 1942, in an attempt to eliminate as many of these physically disqualified enlisted men as possible. In most cases, these enlisted men have no particular skills of benefit to the service and a great percentage are unable to perform manual labor day after day.
- 3. These overages of limited service enlisted men have been reported to the Commanding General, Fourth Service Command for reassignment, but this headquarters has been notified that the Fourth Service Command has no facilities and/or organizations which can possibly take these enlisted men because all of their organizations are, at present, at full strength.
- 4. It is estimated that an additional 150 enlisted men of engineer units at this station will be reclassified as limited service personnel within the next twenty (20) to thirty (30) days.
- 5. All regulations on limited service personnel indicate that combat units or tactical units proceeding to overseas theaters can expect a certain number of limited service personnel within such organizations, but it has been the experience of this headquarters that when limited service personnel are sent with such organizations to ports of embarkation that port commanders or staging area commanders eliminate such personnel and replace them with general service enlisted men. In view of this fact, this headquarters is working towards eliminating all limited service personnel from such units destined for overseas from this command, however, as enlisted men are reclassified as limited service, they can not be cleared from these field forces due to the fact that no organizations are available within this command to which they may be assigned. It is requested that this headquarters be furnished with units and stations which have facilities and shortages of personnel that can absorb personnel so reclassified.

- 1. In connection with complaint contained in basic communication and 1st Ind. thereto, and in compliance with directive contained in paragraph 4, 3rd Ind., above, the following information is submitted.
- a. Radio orders for movement of nineteen (19) enlisted men from the 923rd Engr. Avn Regt, Eglin Field, Florida, to the 890th Engr. Avn Co., Ft. Ord, California, were received at this headquarters at 2400 Z, September 28, 1942 and included a directive for these men to report at Fort Ord, California, not later than October 3, 1942.
- b. An immediate check of train schedules was made and it was determined that it would be impossible for enlisted men to arrive on the scheduled date under existing train schedules. At that time the 822nd Engineer Aviation Bn was moving to Camp Stoneman, Californis and a special train, which was moving the second echelon of that unit, was leaving this station at 1300 Z, September 29, 1942, and it was necessary to select men, issue orders and move them to Fort Ord, California alon with the second echelon the 822nd Engr Avn Bn.
- c. On the 25th of Sept. 1942, after all troops of the 822nd Engr Avn Bn had been fully equipped for foreign duty, one hundred (100) men af that unit were transferred to the 923rd Engineer Aviation Regt to eliminate overstrength of the 822nd Engr Avn Bn. These Troops had been fully equipped and examined for foreign duty prior to transfer to the 923rd Engineer Avn Regt and in view of the fact that they were equipped for foreign duty, the commanding officer of the 923rd Engr Avn Regt was requested furnish the names of nineteen (19) of these one hundred (100) men for transfer to the 890th Engr Avn Co. Seventy (70) of the one hundred(100) men that were transfer from the 90th 822nd Engr Avn Bn to the 923rd Engr Avn Bn prior to transfer of the unit. The personnel records of the 822nd Engr Avn Begt are not maintained at Post headquarters and it was impossible for personnel who were issuing orders for movement of these nineteen (19) men to physically check the records of the men selected for transfer, however, none of the men who had been marked "physically disqualified for

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d cont'd

ign duty" by the surgeon of the 822nd Engr Avn Bn were allowed to be included in nineteen (19) men selected for transfer to the 890th Engr Avn Co. On that same order at the time, six (6) men were ordered into the 822nd Engr Avn Bn. Appended to this Indorsement are the names, qualifications, etc., corresponding to the basic communication breakdown to show the present status of the remaining seventy-five (75) of the original one hundred (100). The Regimental Personnel Adjutant stated from memory that there were only thirty (30) men qualified of the original one hundred (100) from which to draw the twenty-five (25) which were shipped.

- 3. The colored troops remaining at this station after transfer of the 822nd Engr Avn Bn included a very high percentage of inferior personnel, due to the fact that all men are fit for full military duty in the 97th Engr Regt were relieved from that regt assigned to the 829th Bn upon transfer of the 97th Regt in April. When the 829th was preparing for foreign service, it transferred a number of its enlisted men to 822nd Bn. In preparing the 822nd Engr Avn Bn for foreign assignment, all men not fit for full military duty were transferred to the 923rd Engr Avn Regt. The remainder of the 923rd Engr Avn Regt was made up of newly assigned and untrained troops for whom complete equipment and men and not yet been procured.
- 4. In all future cases of this nature this headquarters will determine by phsysical check that enlisted men ordered from this station and from this command to overseas duty are fully equipped and fully qualified physically for such duty. However, it is requested that in the future this headquarters be given sufficient advance notice of movements to allow for a thorough processing of enlisted men to insure that they are physically qualified and fully equipped. Attention is invited to the fact that it was necessary to select enlisted men for movement, issue orders and transport enlisted men concerned to rail head, which is 22 miles distant, within 12 hours of receipt of orders for movement and these 12 hours were between the hours of 7 P.M and A.M. when Post headquarters and the headquarters of the 923rd Engr Avn Regt are not fully staffed and by those officers are present that are necessary for proper security.
- 5. With reference to attached correspondence relative to colored soldiers transferred to Fort Ord, Californis, for foreign assignment who were reported unfit for full military duty, and with particular reference to paragraph 2, 4th Indorsement, since the 923rd Engr Regt is being used as a training regt and charged with fully qualified engr bns for foreign station, it is obvious that as men unfit for full military duty are relieved from all battalions transferred out, a very high percentage of unfit personnel is accumulating in this regiment. As this process progresses, the regiment will gradually accumulate a majority of unfit personnel and it will not thereafter be possible to recruit a sutiable battalion.

In view of these facts, authority is requested to discharge or transfer all personnel in this organization not qualified for overseas duty.

With reference to attached correspondence relative to colored soldiers transferred to Fort Ord, California, for foreign assignment, who were reported unfit for full military duty, and with particular reference to paragraphs 3 and 5, Fifth Indorsement, since the 923rd Engineer Aviation Regiment is being used as a training unit and is charged with furnishing fully qualified engineer battalions for foreign station, it is obvious that as men unfil for full military duty are relieved from all battalions transferred out, a very high percentage of unfil personnel is accumulated in the remaining part of this Regiment.
- 2. As this process progresses, the Regiment will gradually accumulate a majority of unfil personnel and it will not thereafter be possible to recruit a suitable battalion. Commanding General, Army Air Forces, Washington, D. C. (Attention: AFPMP-2)

1. This Command was allotted a quota of 1070 Colored Inlisted Men to attend Technical Schools of the Technical Training Command during January, 1973. Despite the fact that as of December 31, 1942, the total number of Colored Enlisted Men under this Command amounted to 19,136, and the above allotment represented only slightly more than 5% of the total strength, this Command was fifty-eight (58) men (29 clerks and 29 radio operators and mechanics) short of filling the quota. The percentage of Colored Enlisted Men in this Command who are qualified for technical training is extremely small, and until additional Colored troops have been received by this Command, it will be impossible to furnish qualified Colored personnel, except in nominal amounts, for future Technical School quotas.

2. In order to fill the January quota, Technical Training authorized this Command to make up the shortage of fifty-eight authority sending the best qualified men available. This meant sending m nical Schools who had AGCT scores of less than 85 - until such granted, 85 was the minimum AGCT score available.

3. The majority of Colored Enlisted Men received in this the last two months of 1942 were excellent basic soldiers but in qualified for technical training. However, informal reports received during the past week seem to indicate that recent shipments of Colored troops to this Command have included a higher percentage of men qualified for Technical Schools. These men are being tested, and reports are being submitted to the Headquar ters the last day of each month, showing the number of Colored Fnlisted Men ters the last day of each month, showing the number of Colored Inlisted qualified for technical training.

1. The following is a quotation from a memorandum addressed to the Secretary of War by Judge William H. Hastie, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War:

2020 "h. The dangers inherent in sending inadequately trained flight surgeons into the field are too apparemt to require elaboration. Yet, Negro medical officers in the Air Forces may get only part of the special training in aviation medicine which is available. They are not admitted to the school of aviation medicine at Randolph Field. The reason given is that branch schools are now providing training formerly concentrated at Randolph. Yet there remain such matters as didactic work for which selected white officers are sent to the school at Randolph Field for full time study while Negro medical officers pursue this training as a spare time correspondence course while continuing their regular duties at their home station. Even the branch school program in which it is represented that Negro officers share without discrimination is in fact discriminatory. Many white officers enrolled at a branch school of aviation medicine have the opportunity of full time resident study. The Negro officer is permitted to commute periodically from his home station at Tuskegee for work at the Maxwell Field branch school. Such grudging partial tender of makeshift schemes may be expected to continue unless a genuine change of racial attitude and policy occurs in the Air Commands."

- 2. Immediate action will be initiated by you to provide a proportionate share cancies for Negro resident students at the School of Aviation Medicine. Qualifying standards for white students. Flight Surgeons will apply equally to Negroes. CENTRAL FILES

la Restricted letter, AG 210.31 (4-13-42)OF, April 28, 1942, subject: Policy on assignment of Negro Officer Personnel, is rescinded.

b The provisions of confidential letter AG 210.31 (4-17-42) MC-SP-M, April 21, 1942, subject: Assignment of Negro Officers, as amended, will be continued, except as modified herein.

2a Negro officers will be assigned only to such type colored units and to installations and in such grades as are authorized by the War Department.

- b These assignments come within the following four main categories:
  - (1) Units to which Negro officers are now assigned.
- (2) Units which are now activated but to which no Negro officers have been assigned.
  - (3) Units not yet activated.
  - (4) Overhead positions

3. The Commanding General, Army Ground Forces, the Commanding General, Army Air Forces, the chiefs of supply arms and services and administrative services, and other commanders concerned will inform each other by direct correspondence of the units and activities (see paragraph 2 above) under their jurisdiction to which negro officers may be assigned under these policies.

Copies of such correspondence will be forwarded to the Assistant Chiefs of Staff, G-1, G-3, and Operations Division, War Department General Staff, and the Military Personnel Division, Services of Supply, for their information.

- 4. The following will govern assignments to the categories in paragraph 2 above:
- $\underline{a}$  An overstrength of not to exceed 25% in the grade of lieutenant may be assigned to units indicated in paragraphs 2  $\underline{b}$  (1), (2) and (3).
- $\underline{b}$  Assignments to units and agencies indicated in paragraphs 2  $\underline{b}$  (1) and ( $\overline{4}$ ) will be made on routine requisitions originating with the unit concerned. Where the provisions contained herein increase the number of Negro officers previously authorized for any unit, prompt action will be taken to insure that such unit submits requisition for the authorized increase.
- $\underline{c}$  (1) Assignments to units now activated which will require reassignment of white officers will normally not be made until sufficient numbers become available over and above the immediate requirements for units to be activated and for overseas loss replacement (see  $\underline{f}$  and  $\underline{g}$  below).
- (2) Initial action in making assignments will be taken by the assignment agencies charged with filling officer personnel requisitions. This action will consist of direct requests on the appropriate authority named in paragraph 3 above having jurisdiction over the unit concerned, for dates on which to make such assignments.
- $\underline{d}$  Assignments to new units which are scheduled for activation will depend upon the number of Negro officers available (see g below). Assignments to units in this category will be given high priority in order to prevent the necessity of the reassignment at a later date of white officers who would be assigned (see  $\underline{c}$  above).
- e Assignments to overhead positions will be by individuals to fill authorized positions.
- f Assignments of Negro officers to units indicated in paragraphs  $2 \ \underline{b} \ (\overline{2})$  and (3), will be made by groups rather than as individuals and will conform to the following:
- (1) In regiments or similar units, groups of not less than one battalion.
- (2) In separate battalions or similar units, to include the entire battalion group.
- (3) In separate companies, or similar units, to include the entire company group.

- (4) Attached medical officers and chaplains in regiments and separate battalions, to include the entire regimental or separate battalion . medical or chaplain group.
- $\underline{g}$  In order to provide sufficient numbers for group assignments or for individual assignments, officers may be obtained from the following sources:
- (1) From replacement pools of the Arms and Services. (A small reserve pool will be maintained to meet emergency requisitions for overseas loss replacements.)
- (2) Direct from graduates of the respective officer candidate schools and similar sources.
  - (3) From overstrength assigned to existing organizations.
- h Assignment of officers qualified for limited service only, will be made to appropriate positions. Where no appropriate vacancy exists for Negro limited service officers they will be reported to the Commanding General, Services of Supply, for assignment.
- $\underline{i}$  Except for medical officers and chaplains, (see  $\underline{f}$  (4) above) senior Negro officers will not be assigned to a unit having white officers of other arms and services in junior grades.
- <u>j</u> Negro medical officers and chaplains may be assigned to a unit without regard to the fact that Negro officers of the basic arm or service have not yet been assigned to that unit (see  $\underline{f}$  (4) above).
- 5 Commanders concerned will be given sufficient notice by assigning authorities of arrival of Negro officers to permit adequate preparation for their accommodation. Commanders concerned are charged with preparation of the necessary accommendation.
- 6a Nothing contained herein will be constructed as cancelling the authorization for assignment of Negro officers to positions and units which have been previously designated for such assignments. These instructions are to be construed as amendments to those previously issued.
- b Enclosed herewith is a list of types of units authorized for the assignment of Negro officers in the grades indicated, assignments to these units being subject to restrictions provided herein. The Commanding General (Army Ground Forces, Army Air Forces and Services of Supply) concerned will select from this list units to which Negro officers of higher grades than those indicated should be assigned, as officers demonstrate their fitness for promotion to such higher grades, and will inform the War Department of these units. The administrative details in connection with reassignment in accordance with established policies and the coordination of the promotion of Negro officers in these designated units will be a responsibility of the Commanding General, Army Ground Forces or Army Air

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF THE AIR STAFF:

Subject: Resignation of Judge William H. Hastie.

- 1. This office has been advised by the Assistant Secretary of War, Mr. McCloy, that Judge William H. Hastie, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War, has submitted his resignation. The decision as to whether or not that resignation will be accepted has not been made, and this matter therefore should be kept in the highest confidence.
- 2. Your attention is invited to the attached memorandum to the Secretary of War from Judge Hastie dated January 4, 1943. In the event the resignation of Judge Hastie is accepted and he carries out the threat implied in paragraph two of his memorandum, it is obvious that the brunt of his criticism will fall squarely on the Army Air Forces. Furthermore, it is also probable that whether or not Judge Hastie's resignation is accepted, the Army Air Forces will be called upon to explain to the satisfaction of the Secretary of War the criticism set forth in this memorandum.
- 3. The establishment of an all Negro station at Jefferson Barracks involving an Officer Candidate School, technical training, etc., was not favorably considered in this headquarters, and Judge Hastie was so advised on December 17, 1943. The action of the Director of Individual Training with reference to the establishment of a separate school for Negro Administrative Officers at Jefferson Barracks, to open January 15, 1943, was in distinct contravention of the policy of the War Department and the Commanding General, Army Air Forces. The proposal to create such a school was not coordinated with this Division a procedure which would have saved one of many embarrassments with reference to Negroes.
- 4. If the allocations set forth in paragraph 2c of page three of the attached memorandum with reference to our failure to train necessary ground crews to support the pursuit units for which pilots have been trained is correct, the responsibility for such



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failure should be fixed and corrective action expedited. In this connection, the Director of Military Requirements was advised in writing by this Division under date of June 24, 1942, as follows:

"In accordance with verbal directive of the Chief of the Air Staff, you will take the necessary action to form a complete Pursuit Group, Negro, together with all the pertinent Base and Service units, Negro, with a view to their earliest practicable commitment to combat."

- 5. With respect to the utilization of Negro observers, the policy of the War Department provides for the return of Ground Force Officers trained as observers to their units. None of them are now retained by the Air Forces (statement of Director of Personnel Colonel Wetzel); nor do we plan to train any Negro observers for Army Air Forces units. This is clearly within the War Department policy until such time as Negro Observation Units may be activated.
- 6. There can be no question that the position of the Army Air Forces with respect to Service pilots is vulnerable. There are a number of qualified candidates for Service pilot rating. Two candidates were directed to report to Maxwell Field to pursue a course of instruction under Army supervision, travel to be at their own expense (Cleveland to Maxwell and return). On arrival at Maxwell they were summarily rejected because of race. There appears to be no good reason why Negro Service Pilots should not be effectively employed by the Air Transport Command in the Ferrying Division.
- 7. The training of Negro Flight Surgeons has been under the jurisdiction of the Air Surgeon. He advised this Division some time ago of his methods and strenuously objected to sending any Negro doctors to Randolph Field. He stated that the course at Maxwell Field was a satisfactory substitute therefor in conjunction with correspondence courses. This Division labored under the delusion that Negro surgeons were resident students at Maxwell Field. Certainly commuting from Tuskegee to Maxwell Field to pursue this course of instruction if white surgeons were in resident attendance constituted undesirable discrimination.
- 8. Judge Hastie is not on substantial ground with respect to the training of Weather, Armament and Engineering Officers as specialists. Those required for Negro units were, have been, or are being trained. War Department policy with reference to assignment of Negro officers to white units would make training in excess of requirements for Negro units wasteful and inadvisable.

9. This Division is not qualified to discuss the situation at Tuskegee pending receipt of report of Inspector General (General Davis). Even at Tuskegee the policies of the War Department cannot be violated with impunity, and if these policies are being violated, corrective action should be taken at once.

10. The situation with respect to the Negro in our country is deteriorating. The crusading, radical Negro press is constantly siezing on every instance of racial discrimination and magnifying it far beyond its true importance. With Judge Hastie, a prophet with Honour and a large following among his own race, free to voice uninhibited criticism the position of the Army Air Forces and the War Department will be further jeopardized. There is no doubt that the Air Forces have been honestly and seriously doubtful of the Negro's ability to further the National Air effort. However, Negroes who meet the standards for Air Force duties as established for white men cannot justly be denied the privilege of performing those duties solely because of his race.

11. It appears to this Division that the Army Air Forces should mould its Negro policies in strict compliance with War Department policies; that we must also recognize the Negro as presenting a serious National problem and stand ready to bear our fair share of the burden placed on the War Department in its solution. Certainly, no act or policy either of this Headquarters or of our subordinate headquarters which tends to embarrass the Secretary of War in his handling of the delicate, inflammable problem should be countenanced.

MEMORANDUM

TO:

The Secretary of War Through The Under Secretary of War

As you know, I have believed for some time that my presence in the War Department is no longer essential to the maintenance of the several substantial gains made during the past two years in the handling of racial issues and particular problems of Negro military and civilian personnel. At the same time I have believed that there remain areas in which changes of racial policy should be made but will not be made in response to advocacy within the Department but only as a result of strong and manifest public opinion. I have believed that some of these changes involve questions of the sincerity and depth of our devotion to the basic issues of this war and thus have an important bearing, both on the fighting spirit of our own people and upon our ability as a nation to maintain leadership in the struggle for a free world. Segregation within Army theatres, the blood plasma issue and the unvarying pattern of separate Negro units are such matters.

Therefore, it has seemed to me that my present and future usefulness is greater as a private citizen who can express himself freely and publicly upon such issues than as a member of the War Department under obligation to refrain from such public expression. Both the Secretary of War and the Under Secretary have felt that my view of this matter is mistaken. In deference to the judgment of men whom I respect and to whom I feel an obligation of personal loyalty I have remained at my post.

Compelling new considerations have now arisen. In one very important branch of the Army, the Air Forces, where the handling of racial issues has been reactionary and unsatisfactory from the outset, further retrogression is now so apparent and recent occurrences are so objectionable and inexcusable that I have no alternative but to resign in protest and to give public expression to my views. This ultimate decision has been forced upon me by

Took (a) the announcement just made of the establish-

ment of a segrogated Officer Candidate School to train Negro ground officers for the Air Forces, to open at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, on January 15, 1943; and

(b) the humiliating and morale shattering mistreatment which, with at least the tacit approval of the Air Command, continues to be imposed upon Negro military personnel at the Tuskegee Air Base, the principal training center of the Air Forces for Negro troops.

For convenient reference I will discuss these issues and related matters in numbered paragraphs.

Dirical. In establishing a separate Officer Candidate School for Negroes at Jefferson Barracks the Air Forces are deliberately rejecting the general practice of unsegregated Officer Cendidate Schools which has proved eminently successful throughout the Army and which has been so hopeful an augury. I did not know that such a school was contemplated until the matter appeared a few days ago in an Army press release. Worse still, I was given misleading information by the Air Forces at a time when the plan must have been well advanced. Rumors in the St. Louis papers that Jefferson Barracks were being considered for some Negro project of the Air Forces caused me on November 26 to inquire of the Assistent Secretary for Air what plan, if any, was in the making. I was advised in reply on December 17 merely that "present Air Forces plans do not provide for the conversion of Jefferson Barracks into an all-Wegro post" and that "the training program in general contamplates assignment of Negro personnel for training to installations in areas from which procured." In such circumstances the failure of the Air Forces, after written request, to advise this office candidly and fully of a plan so soon to be publicly announced cannot be considered an excusable inadvertence.

2. This latest development in the Air Forces officer training program must be considered in the whole setting of Negro participation in the Army air program. It is to be remembered that the policy of using Negro personnel in the Air Forces at all was imposed upon a Command, reductant from the outset. Resistance, bred of that reductance, has been encountered repeatedly.

a. The Negro program began with the organisation of several so-called Aviation Squadrons (Separate). Of those units, now greatly increased in number, it is sufficient to say, that they were organized to serve no specific military meed; that they have never had a defined function; and tiut. except as some commanders on their own initiative have found some military function for particular small groups of soldiers, their characteristic assignment has been the performance of such odd jobs of common labor as may arise from time to time at air fields. Such Labor as may be the part time fatigue duty of other soldiers is the principal business of these units. There are no equivalent white organizations. I believe I am justified in expressing the opinion that Aviation Squadrons (Separate) would never have existed except for the necessity of making some provision for Negro enlisted men in the Air Forces.

b. The segregated school for Hegro pilots at Tuskegee, Alabama, was the beginning of the Air command's insistence that it would not go along with the rest of the Army in the free admittance of Negro candidates to its schools for officer training. My objections to that move, presented in detail at the time, were overruled.

Transco. A small deviation from the separate school program was made when one group of Negro soldiers received training as enlisted technicisms and sechanics at Chanute Field. The results were excellent. The men did well. I urged the importance of repeating such training for subsequent groups on a continuous basis. However, the progress stopped with the first group. Efforts were made by the Air Forces to set up segregated technical training at Tuskegee or elsewhere. Difficulties were encountered. In the meantime successive classes of Negro pilots were being trained, but no supporting technical achooling of ground crew members was in progress. Thus even the segregated progress has gotten badly out of balance in the effort to accomplish its extension. The prospect is that in 1943 Negro pilots will be ready before and faster than adequate numbers of trained ground crews are available.

5.0.5.d. I have also just learned that Negro enlisted men are to be trained at a segregated school for clerical

and other administrative duty with service units attached to the Air Forces.

e. Two Negro officers were sent by the Ground Forces to the Air Forces school for Aerial Observers. They successfully completed their course. But such information as I have been able to get reveals no plans
for their utilization and no intention of training ad- with principal ditional Negro officers in Aerial Observation.

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f. For a period of six months fully qualified Negro candidates for training as seather officers have had their completed applications returned with the information that the Air Forces need no sore Negroes in William this field. But the Air Forces do need numbers of weather officers. The same thing has been true in armament and engineering, both ground specialties for which the Air Forces have been accepting cadete.

g. To date no application of a Negro for appointment as an army service pilot has been accepted. Several Regroes with prerequisite flying experience have applied. To date it is the policy of the Air Forces not to use Hegroes in this capacity, although I am advised that the matter is receiving further study. Two qualified applicants have actually been rejected after orders to report for training, when it was discovered that they were Megroes.

h. The dangers inherent in sending inadequately trained flight surgeons into the field are too apparent to require elaboration. Yet, Negro medical officers in [aliana Ca the Air Forces may get only part of the special training in aviation medicine which is available. They are not admitted to the school of aviation medicine at Randolph Field. The reason given is that branch schools are now providing training formerly concentrated at Randolph. Yet there remain such matters as didactic work for which selected white officers are sent to the school at Bandolph Field for full time study while Negro medical officers pursue this training as a spare time correspondence course while continuing their regular duties at their home station. Even the branch school program in which it is

represented that Negro officers share without discrimination is in fact discriminatory. Many white officers enrolled at a branch school of aviation medicine have the opportunity of full time resident study. The Negro officer is permitted to commute periodically from his home station at Tuskegee for work at the Maxwell Field branch school. Such grudging partial tender of makeshift schemes may be expected to continue unless a genuine change of racial attitude and policy occurs in the Air Commands.

- 3. The racial impositions upon Negro personnel at Tuskegee have become so severe and demoralizing that, in my judgment, they jeopardize the entire future of the Negro in combat aviation. Men cannot be humiliated over a long period of time without a shattering of morale and a destroying of combat efficiency.
  - a. Specifically, Negro and white officers serving at Tuskegee in the common enterprise of training Negroes for air combat have separate messes. They are not permitted to have quarters in the same building. Negro officers are separated from white officers when officially assembled at officers call. Separate toilet facilities have the been provided. If the group of white officers at Tuskegee insist upon this and I have no evidence that they do they are psychologically unsuited to train Negroes for combat. If they do not so insist, the racial attitude of the local commander or of higher authority is all the more apparent.
  - b. Despite original design to place Negro officers in posts of administrative responsibility at Tuskegee as rapidly as they should qualify, that design is not being carried out in the post administration.
  - c. Negro military policemen assigned from the post to patrol duty in the town of Tuskegee have been deprived of sidearms in response to the insistence of local civilian authorities. The subsequent appointment of a man, recently of the Alabama state constabulary, to be post Intelligence Officer is in accord with the same basic policy of catering to the prejudices of the community.
  - d. It is tragic irony that while the whole course of handling racial relations at Tuskegee is such

as to destroy combat efficiency, the Air Forces are now undertaking an historical study to determine whether and where Negroes will fit into air combat functions. The answer to this question will not be found in such a study, but rather in such present and future handling of Negro soldiers that their pride and dignity and self respect as men and as American soldiers will be preserved and heightened rather than destroyed.

4. For the reasons set out herein I am submitting my formal resignation in a separate letter. I must insist that it be accepted. By remaining at my post until February 1, 1943, I hope to allow adequate time for such arrangements as may be made for the continuation of my present work.

- l. There is attached a memorandum dated June 15th to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, Subject: Commissioning of Negro Civilians, signed by Colonel F. Trubee Davison, Assistant Chief of Air Staff, A-1. The reply from G-1, also attached, indicates applications should be forwarded to the Officer Procurement Section, Reserve Division, Office of the Adjutant General, which office is now under the Officer Procurement Service.
- 2. The instructions of G-l contemplate permanent filing of the applications. The Procurement Unit of Military Personnel is requested, from time to time, to review applications so filed and also to interview and initiate new applications from negro civilians with qualifications for Service Pilots.
- 3. At no time have any available vacancies been found by the Procurement Unit for negro officers commissioned from civilian life with the rating of Service Pilot. The logical assignment for these men would be at Tuskeegee Army Flying School, which is under the Southeast Training Center of the Flying Training Command Uses Service Pilots in Basic, Advanced, Gunnery, Bombardier, and Navigator Schools. However, under date of November 30th, Southeast Training Center, by 2nd Indorsement, on the application of John Sinclair Perry, states that inasmuch as Tuskeegee Army Flying School, the only negro school in that training center, is a small, specialized school, it is felt that only rated pilots with a military flying background may be used as instructors there, and that Service Pilots would not be acceptable.
- Assignment of Negro Officers, which states that through December 31, 1943, there will be assigned to the Army Air Forces 1318 negro officers. Of this number 152 will be flying officers. The current schedule of the Tuskeegee Army Flying School contemplates 10 classes of 52 men each. It is estimated that a maximum of 210. 

The following information concerning the 99th Fighter Squadron is furnished at the request of Colonel Grussendorf.

- 2. The 99th Fighter Squadron is now at Tuskegee, Alabama and the Third Air Force is charged with its training. There are thirty-two (32) officers, twenty-eight (28) of whom are pilots, and two hundred thirty-two (232) enlisted men. The Squadron Commander is Lieutenant Colonel Benjamin O. Davis, who is without question the best qualified colored officer/for the position. His efficiency rating is given as "excellent."
- 3. This Squadron has been in training for some time; they have not done any bombing, but have had some ground and air gunnery. Shortage of training aircraft and inadequate facilities have retarded the training of this Squadron but action has been taken to furnish ten (10) additional P-40's in a few days. In spite of these handicaps, the Squadron is sufficiently trained for commitment to the theater.
- 4. Due to the large number of P-40's being diverted to our Allies, there are no new airplanes readily available for the unit in question. In order to equip the 99th, the Tenth Air Force (India and China) would have to be deprived of one month's attrition replacements. At the present time the Tenth Air Force is over strength in fighter aircraft and the loss of one month's attrition would not seriously hamper their activities. As of this date there are thirty-two (32) P-40M's at Charleston P.O.E. awaiting shipment to the Tenth Air Force and it is expected that the thirty (30) more will be available in February.
- 5. The morale of the 99th Squadron is now excellent and it is the opinion of this Directorate that they should be sen to the theater as soon as practicable. The present situation of being on five-day alert is very unsatisfactory; and if thi condition is allowed to continue, it will have a detrimental effect on their morale and impede training activities.
- 6. The associated units, the 83rd Fighter Control Squad ron, and the 689th Signal Reporting Company are also adequated trained for their mission. The theater for which these units are destined is not active and training may continue in the new location.

To : Commanding General, Army Air Forces, Washington, D. C.

- l. As an incidental result of an investigation recently conducted by these headquarters, and also of conditions observed during inspections made by my staff officers and my own personal observations, it appears desirable to point out that a definitely unsatisfactory situation develops when colored units of the Army Air Forces are garrisonned at stations adjacent to localities lacking a sizeable colored population.
- 2. The situation at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, is cited as one case in question. At that air base there is stationed the 38th Aviation Squadron (Sep), a colored unit. The nearest city is Bangor, Maine, with a total population of approximately 30,000. The last census, according to city authorities thereat, shows a colored population of about 220 persons; the office of the City manager states 200; while a prominent colored attorney and preacher gives a figure of 118 adults, 24 young women, 14 young men, plus a number of younger children, number unknown.
- 3. Due to the small colored population in the city off Bangor, no facilities are available specifically to any appreciable axtent, commercially or otherwise, for the entertainment, recreation and social contacts for colored troops. Consequently, an unsatisfactory situation is encountered when the negro soldier off duty visits this city. A like condition prevails in other nearby towns and communities. Further, the colored soldier in such cities, when patronizing restaurants, taversn, and places of a similar nature, is not really desired. As a matter of fact, his presence is actually resented by many of the white troops and also by elements of the civilian population. There is almost an entire lack of the normal and desirable social contacts that would be furnished through the means of dances and social activities which it would be possible to provide if there were a sizeable colored pupulation available where the colored soldier might meet and mingle with members of his own race. In these communities lacking in colored population, a certain amount of association between negro soldiers and white women results. This develops friction, antagonism, and an intensification of race consciousness both on the part of military personnel and the civilian population.

4. These conditions can easily lead to physical encounters and, sooner or later, may result in more or less serious racial clashes which might easily develop widespread publicity and adversely affect both army and civilian

5. In this connection, it is desired to invite attention to Inclosure number 1, containing an editorial appearing in the Penobscot TIMES of May 25, 1942; to Inclosure number 2, containing items concerning negro troops, appearing in the same newspaper under date of June 5, 1942; to Inclosure number 3, a further editorial appearing in the penobscot TIMES under date of June 12, 1942; and to Inclosure Number 4, photographs showing the association of col-

ored troops with white girls. It is believed that a reading and considera-

tion of these articles, and attention to the photographs referred to, present a reasonable and fair picture of what may be expected to happen when colored troops are stationed at air bases adjacent to localities lacking a colored population. It is obvious that under these conditions, situations and circumstances arise as a result of which the problems of the air base commander are: greatly intensified.

- 6. While it is desired to point out that the inclosures submitted with this communication do not pertain directly to any colored troops of the Army Air Forces, they do pertain to other negro units, under the command of negro officers, which units in the past were stationed at Dow Field and in communities near Bangor, Maine, for guard purposes. It is believed that the picture presented applies to a greater or lesser degree in the case of any colored troops stationed in a locality where there is no sizeable colored population. Under such circumstances the negro soldier is placed in a situation extremely difficult for him as well as forall concerned.
- 7. In the Air Forces, Eastern Defense Command and First Air Force, a similar situation to that existing at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, also exists at Grenier Field, Manchester, New Hampshire. Neither of the cities in question have an appreciable colored population. The two stations named are the only two in this air force where this problem is being currently encountered.
- 8. This communication and the information set forth herein is furnished in order that your headquarters may be advised concerning these matters and of the local difficulties and problems which arise. It is recommended that such consideration as possible be given to the feasibility of garrisonning colored troops of the Army Air Forces only at stations where there is a sizeable colored population in the vicinity.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF: (Attn: A. C. of S. G-3)

Subject: Training of Colored Personnel at Jefferson Barracks.

#### I. DISCUSSION.

- l. The Army Air Forces has been directed to give basic training to all Air Force and Arms & Services personnel with the Army Air Forces. Technical training facilities for Air Force personnel is provided by the Air Forces whereas the technical training for Arms and Services personnel is provided by the Services of Supply. Basic training for colored personnel was given to Air Forces troops in units "on-the-job" training. Since the Army Air Forces is taking over the basic training of all Arms & Services personnel, this adds approximately 40,000 additional personnel to the Army Air Forces for basic training. The Air Forces quota of colored personnel amounts to approximately 6,000 colored troops per month for which basic training must be provided.
- 2. Facilities were established at Tuskegee, Alabama for both flying training (pilot) and technical training (enlisted technicians, enlisted cadets, officer administrative and enlisted clerical) for colored Air Force units but did not include facilities for training of the Arms and Service units necessary to accompany Air Force units. The maximum facilities that can be provided at Tuskegee are now being used for the expanded flying training program. It is therefore necessary to find other facilities to provide basic and technical training for the additional colored personnel that the Air Forces are now charged with training.
- 3. Jefferson Barracks, Missouri is centrally located in the United States near a large city which is capable of providing



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both social and recreational facilities for a large number of colored troops. A poorly selected location, geographically, will irritate and amplify racial prejudice which seriously hampers individual training. Any excess housing not needed for the training of colored troops will be utilized to accommodate other troops for such basic or specialized training as can be made available. The Army Air Forces Replacement Centers at Miami Beach, Wichita Falls, Salt Lake City, and Atlantic City are not near cities with large colored populations and therefore are not suitable for large concentrations of colored personnel. The Replacement Training Center at Biloxi, Mississippi is now crowded and can not be expanded and therefore is unsuited for large numbers of colored troops. Jefferson Barracks is so situated that it is the most desirable of Army Air Forces Replacement Centers for this training.

4. It is believed necessary that colored troops be stationed near large cities with large colored populations insofar as practicable and that the training should be consolidated insofar as practicable at one location.

#### II. Action recommended.

The Secretary of War directs:

- 1. That the Army Air Forces be authorized to utilize Jefferson Barracks for the basic and technical training of such colored personnel as the Army Air Forces are required to train.
- 2. That any additional facilities not required for colored troops be utilized by such other units as the Army Air Forces may direct.
