ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUN-
TEER SOLDIERS FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States :

GENTLEMEN: The Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers makes the following report of the corporation of the National Home, in obedience to law, for the year ending June 30, 1895:

There has been no change in the membership of the Board during the year. The terms of service of W. B. Franklin, John C. Black, Francis Fessenden, and George W. Steele expire under the law on April 22, 1896, or when their successors are appointed.

The Board has performed its usual duties, holding quarterly sessions as required by law, visiting and inspecting the Branches of the Home, admitting and readmitting the disabled men, and superintending the purchase and distribution of supplies, and other expenditures.

The twenty-four State Homes, the States supporting which have been subsidized by the United States at the rate of \$100 per man per year, less half the amounts retained from pensions of their members, have also been inspected by the inspector-general and assistant inspector-general of the Home. Their reports show that they have been in very good condition, with two exceptions, and that they are economically and humanely conducted.

The supplies of the Home of all kinds have been, in general, obtained by contract in a legal manner, and the quality is believed to be of the best. The materials for clothing and bedding are as far as possible made up by the members of the Home, their wives, widows, and children.

This remark does not apply to hats, caps, shoes, woolen shirts, and the greater part of articles of bedding, which are bought ready-made.

Tables K, L, and M, appended to this report, give the details of expenditures for clothing, bedding, tableware, and crockery for the fiscal year 1895.

STATISTICS.

During the last Congress the Board was asked for certain statistics relating to cost and quantities of land belonging to each Branch of the Home, and cost of buildings of each Branch, by the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives. This information

was furnished to include the fiscal year ending June 30, 1894, and the figures have been extended to include the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895. The paper is appended to this report marked Table A.

Table B, appended to this report, gives the financial transactions of the Home in detail from its organization to include the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895.

This table shows that the cost per member was, in the year ending June 30, 1894, \$127.45, and in that ending June 30, 1895, \$115.80. That the average number present for the whole year was, in 1894, 15,601, and in 1895, 16,480—an increase in 1894 of 940, and in 1895 of 879. In 1892 this increase was only 265.

The average increase for the previous seven years, from 1889 to 1895, inclusive, was 828, so that the increase for the past year has been 51 above the average increase for the seven years previous. No one can tell what will be the increase for the next few years. At this time (November, 1895) the number in the Home is 829 greater than it was at the same date in 1894, and it is kept down to that number only by extreme stringency in restraining admissions. The influence of the pension law of 1890, which in 1892 and 1893 kept down the pressure for admissions, has now been entirely eliminated, and the applications for admission have been more numerous than they have been before.

The number of deaths in the year 1895 is 1,060. The average age of the number cared for was 60.54 years. The average age of those who died was 65.62 years. The average time of residence at the Home of those who died was 7.30 years.

The number of pensioners at the Home increased 1,600, and the amount paid in pensions increased \$248,102.22, being \$139.76 per man, against \$132.33 in 1894.

The average number of members of the State Homes kept one year was 7,121—an increase of 703 above 1894.

The aggregate average number kept one year in the National and State Homes was in the last fiscal year 23,601, and the whole number cared for during the year was, in the National and State Homes, 37,532.

POPULATION OF THE HOME.

The Branches of the Home are in good condition, but the increase of membership has caused a congestion in all of the Branches which, to some extent, will be relieved by the completion of barracks authorized by Congress at its last session. The relief will only be temporary, however, for the increase of membership will continually keep the Branches filled to their utmost capacity for an indefinite time. Until the last fiscal year, the expenditures due to the increased membership of the Branches have been met by increased appropriations for the maintenance of the Home made on estimates founded on such increase, and on explanation of their necessity made by the Board. Thus, enlargements of the cooking and heating apparatus, additional furniture, bedding, and fuel, enlargement of hospital accommodations, whether by the use of barracks or erecting temporary buildings, etc., and all repairs, have been made from the general appropriations, and were absolutely necessary to make new barracks available. But the seven Branches of the Home are full to overflowing, and appropriations for barracks alone are no longer sufficient.

The dining rooms, kitchens, hospitals, heating apparatus, and water supply in all of the Branches are taxed to their utmost capacity, and when new barracks are authorized all these things must be supplemented by additional apparatus and new constructions.

The whole matter is respectfully presented to Congress for its consideration.

It will be noticed that the average age of men cared for by the Home is 60.54 years. Considering the fact that the enlisted men of the Army during the war were, in a very large degree, taken from farmers and laborers and other men who made their living by outside work, and the conditions of such men at the age of 60 who have never served in the Army, it must be granted that men of about that age are necessarily out of competition for outdoor work, and, in general, must depend for support on their friends when they have them, or on charity. So it seems proper that when old soldiers who are no longer able-bodied can demonstrate that they can not make their living, on account of the competition of younger men, they should be admitted to the Home, and that, therefore, the Home in the future may be considerably enlarged, should this premise be admitted.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, last, the losses of membership by discharges and deaths are 3,745. The gains in the same time are, by admissions, readmissions, and appointments, 4,984. There is no reason for supposing that these figures will vary much in the near future.

STATE HOMES.

The assistant inspector-general of State Homes makes an able and exhaustive report, which is transmitted herewith.

In his opinion, the \$100 per man per annum is, in some instances, abused by the admission of men to the Homes who can support themselves. The abuse is not flagrant, and there seems no remedy for it under existing law, except the honesty of State officials who are responsible for the honest execution of the law.

A chief medical officer of the Home, whose business it would be to inspect the Branch hospitals, with authority to correct abuses or lapses, superintend the purchase of all medical supplies and apparatus for the hospitals, and to report to Congress—through the Board of Managers—the medical condition of the Home, is respectfully recommended.

As the members grow older, the importance of doing everything requisite for the greatest efficiency of the medical department becomes more apparent.

The following resolution and report are given in obedience to the directions of the Board of Managers of June 20, 1895:

On motion of General Black, it was—

Resolved, That the Board of Managers desires to acknowledge the receipt from the public records of a copy of the report of the Inspector-General of the United States Army (Gen. J. C. Breckinridge), and to express its appreciation of the all but uniform favorable mention made by that officer, after a long and presumably thorough inspection of the Branches of the National Home under its charge, of the excellent condition of said Branches, and the high state of efficiency, comfort, and discipline obtained under its personal and official direction, applied through many years; and it desires to further express its pleasure that the conduct and operations of the officers whom it has appointed with care and painstaking fidelity to its public duty have so generally merited the approval of the Inspector-General. That he should have reviewed its entire work, approved its results, and recommended its agents so selected, without reference to its own labors and care, does not, in its estimation, detract from the value of his testimony to the condition of the great institution with whose administration it has been charged for thirty years; and it directs the president of the Board to incorporate the main report and this resolution in his next annual report to the Congress of the United States, to the end that the Government may be informed, in a lasting manner, of the said statements of the said Inspector-General.

EXHIBIT A.

WAR DEPARTMENT, INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE,
Washington, D. C., January 26, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of an inspection of the several Branches of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers made from October 3 to December 23, 1894, under the provisions of the acts of Congress relating to this subject, the last being approved August 18, 1894. This exacting duty related to over 15,000 men and disbursements amounting to \$4,758,173.48, and was greatly facilitated by the courtesy and assistance of the officials generally at the several Branches. It is believed the methods of accounting for public funds and property, and for the transaction of public business will be acceptable to all here, and that the changes recently adopted in the forms and accounts, by direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, are beginning to work perfectly smoothly, and the inspection of these old soldiers and their Home seems just as practicable as any others wherever desired; though, should there be a feeling of opposition to it, unnecessary difficulties may be created.

The inspection was begun by a visit of courtesy to the president and the secretary of the Board of Managers of the Home, the former, who had also been acting treasurer, being asked for any information and assistance he could give for the inspection of the Branches. At my second visit he informed me verbally, and subsequently in writing, that there were funds which would not be presented for this inspection under existing circumstances, though I have since been informed by him that a different conclusion has been reached. The new treasurer had not as yet made any dis-

bursements. The inspection of the Branches was continued until Christmas, when I appeared before the Appropriations Committee on this subject, in compliance with its summons, and the inspection terminated. It would make this report too diffuse to go here into all the details and minutiae of a thorough inspection from attic to basement of several of the Branches of this most creditable institution, so reference is made to the appendixes.

At the first Branch visited it was found, as indicated in the communication of October 3, 1894, from the president and acting treasurer, that considerably larger sums had been expended than were forwarded from Washington for the purpose. It subsequently appeared that the State-aid funds had been advanced to these National Branches, and, when occasion required, the pension fund was also called upon for expenditure at a Branch Home, and ultimately the moneys appropriated by Congress were received, but after the posthumous fund had been called in as part of the general fund and partially used for making advances, though no receipts for this money or bonds from the general treasurer were found in the hands of the local treasurers. This seems a temporary and exceptional condition of the finances, even if Congress cares to have cognizance taken at all of the separation or intermingling of the several funds of the Home, in the interests of good administration and accurate supervision.

It is submitted that by sending transfer drafts directly to the depository, as is customary in the transfer of moneys under the War Department (instead of sending it to the disbursing officer), the greatest accuracy as to the dates and transfers can be obtained and proper assurance be given from the face of the records that the checks and deposits are for receipts and expenditures of even dates, and for authorized purposes, as shown by correct vouchers to proper debtors. But doubtless the evident and complete accord between the bank records, the check, the vouchers, the stub, and the cash book, that experience elsewhere has proved to be generally beneficial, can soon be established, and any temporary deflection of funds from one appropriation or heading to another can be minimized, and may have already been so.

No returns or accounts of imperishable property are received by the authorities in Washington, such as are prescribed for public property in the military service, showing its disposition either by issue, expenditure, or condemnation; though in the aggregate its value is quite considerable. It appears that if these accounts were thus rendered to a Department of the Government it would add little or nothing to the clerical work at some of the Branch Homes, which seem to have found it necessary for their own security to prepare the necessary quarterly returns even of perishable stores.

With warm praise for the management and administration, and for the zeal and intelligence of those conducting the affairs, it is respectfully submitted that the system of accountability should receive the closest consideration, whether to the United States or locally; but it is not deemed best to overload this report now with details of bookkeeping or affairs which can be accommodated to the rules governing public accountability in good time and without shock, if all can work together in good accord.

The buildings purchased with some of the Branches, and constructed originally for other purposes than barracks, do not seem as satisfactory as the new ones, which are generally admirable, the hospitals deserving special commendation in construction and service and care. But as to future buildings, the remarks of Colonel Lawton, in his inspection report of last year, touched upon a special view in answer to a definite inquiry that may arise again. There is probably nothing which more deserves consideration than the decorous and comfortable housing of these beneficiaries of the Government. Food, raiment, and shelter are bestowed by the Government at these Homes upon needy and deserving men who have well earned them; and the quality is more than commendable—it is praiseworthy.

The men are now growing old and decrepit and are possibly fading away faster than State and national governments can build permanent structures for them. The quickest and most economical method of suitable construction should not be difficult to determine at some of the Branches, if the rate of increase of numbers can be indicated by fairly reliable statistics. Even then the system of commutation may be needed to relieve the pressure in the winter months. However commendable the majority of the buildings may be, there is a limit to their capacity which has been decidedly overstepped.

Men who have, by their conduct in war and by their present disability, earned a perfect title to all the consideration now being shown them, deserve something better than sleeping on floors or overcrowding in basements and attics, stair closets, and worse. They must be located, when received in such National Homes, in a way that is always creditable to the Government. The number of applicants who are entitled, under the law, to the benefits of the Home but can not gain admission, and the number of those who are sleeping in places not intended nor fully suitable for dormitories, can be learned approximately from the yearly reports. How to secure the speediest relief for these old and feeble and worthy men in time for them to

profit by it, deserves the most serious attention. The impression given at some of these Branches can not be too clearly presented. If there must be such a limitation to the expenses that some things believed to be needed can not possibly get into the appropriation bill, doubtless all in authority will join in indorsing those items which will do the greatest good to the greatest number. When short of funds and a choice must be made, the items of first importance at these Branch Homes are food, raiment, and lodging, especially in this winter weather. Everywhere there was talk of the unprecedented pressure for admission to the Home. It may be worthy of consideration, if, under these exceptional circumstances, the expedient of the Hampton, Marion, and Washington Homes, of giving outside commutation, may not merit temporary adoption.

The march past of hundreds of these old veterans, arrayed still in their country's uniform and showing the martial spirit and training of their youth, was a most creditable display both to the men themselves and the Republic of which they are citizens; and the pathos of the ceremony was noticeable.

In conclusion, I desire to express my gratification at witnessing how much has been done, and wisely, for our disabled old soldiers, and to invite particular attention to the enthusiasm, zeal, and general efficiency of the officers conducting the affairs of the Branch Homes, and to the marked economy and efficiency which have been attained in the matters most nearly affecting the welfare or comfort of the members. The efforts in this direction deserve to be heartily sustained, and it is indubitable that the policy of Congress will be faithfully accepted and loyally carried out. 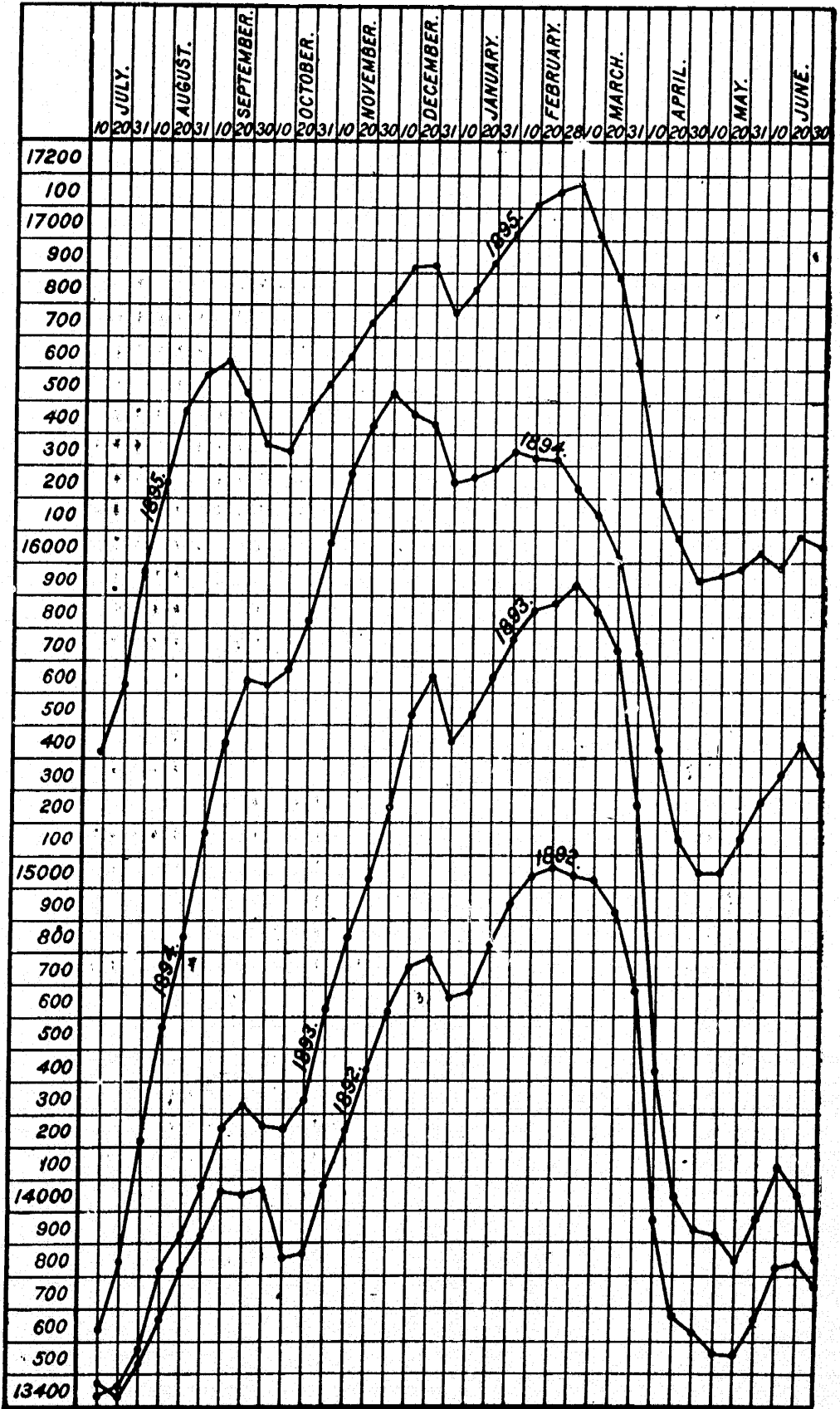

The following statement gives the dates of references to the laws establishing the seven Branches of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, the total acreage and cost, and the cost of all buildings and improvements at each Branch to include the fiscal year ending June 30, 1894.

(1) The date of and reference to the law establishing each of the seven Branches of the Home, and the date when each was ready for use:

The four Branches of the Home first established were:

First. The Eastern, at Togus, Me., purchased and opened for use by disabled soldiers in 1866. Authority for the establishment, section 4, act approved March 21, 1866. (Rev. Stats., sec. 4830.)

Second. The Central, first located at Columbus, Ohio, in 1867, when it was ready for use, and in the same year removed to the vicinity of Dayton, Ohio, where it now is. (Same authority as above given.)

Third. The Northwestern, near Milwaukee, Wis., purchased in 1867, and ready for use during 1867. (Same authority as above given.)

Fourth. The Southern, near Hampton, Va., purchased in 1870, and opened during the same year. (Authority same as above given.)

Fifth. The Western, at Leavenworth, Kan. This Branch was authorized by act approved July 5, 1884, entitled "An act to authorize the location of a Branch Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers and Sailors, in either of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, or Nebraska, or for other purposes." It was ready for use September 1, 1885.

Sixth. The Pacific, at Santa Monica, Cal. This Branch was authorized by act approved March 2, 1887, entitled "An act to provide for the location and erection of a Branch Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers west of the Rocky Mountains." It was ready for use January 1, 1888.

Seventh. The Marion, at Marion, Ind. This Branch was authorized by act approved July 23, 1888, entitled "An act to authorize the location of a Branch Home for Volunteer Disabled Soldiers in Grant County, Ind., and for other purposes." It was ready for use March 18, 1890.

"The president of the Board of Managers is directed to include in the estimates to be submitted to Congress for the fiscal year 1897, the sum of \$1,309.10 for the purpose of reimbursing the governor of the Southern Branch for money paid from his personal funds for repairs to the governor's quarters at the Southern Branch."

During the spring of 1893 certain repairs were absolutely essential to the governor's residence at the Southern Branch, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, and, believing there were sufficient funds remaining to the credit of the appropriation "Construction and repairs," the governor had the work performed, but after completion it was found that the funds under said appropriation had been exhausted, and he paid the amount from his personal fund; hence the Home received the benefit of the repairs without cost. Had the governor waited until the appropriation for the fiscal year 1894 had become available, the expenditure would have been authorized and paid from that appropriation.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF CENTRAL BRANCH, NATIONAL HOME FOR
DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, FOR THE YEAR ENDING
JUNE 30, 1895.**

CENTRAL BRANCH, *July 31, 1895.*

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Branch for the year ending June 30, 1895:

GENERAL FUND.

The treasurer's report shows the average cost of ration per day per 100 men as \$15.10, against \$17 last year; of clothing per man per year, \$14.57, against \$14.23 last year; per capita per year \$113.68, against \$123.79 last year; general expenditures, \$617,393.99, against \$657,407 last year. The minimum number of members present during the year was 4,476, on April 19 and 20; the maximum number present was 4,923, on September 4; minimum number present and absent 5,371, on April 19 and 23; maximum number present and absent 5,674, on June 29.

LIBRARY.

During the year 811 volumes have been added to the libraries, the Putnam Library having received from its generous donor 480, and the George H. Thomas, by gift and purchase, 331, making a total in the two libraries of 19,712 volumes. The number of books issued during the year was 41,301, or more than 3,000 greater than the previous year, which shows a growing appreciation among the members of the Home of the advantages of the libraries. A new catalogue of the George H. Thomas Library has just been completed.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year new quarters have been built for the quartermaster. A new purifying house and a new gas meter capable of doing the required work for our new gas plant have also been erected. A new boiler has been placed in the garden boiler house, to replace an old one which had become dangerous. Barrack No. 10 is being enlarged and altered; also the slop shed at the central kitchen, both of which improvements are greatly needed. A new gas house is in course of erection, and will doubtless be ready for use before the cold weather. The work of putting in additional wells at the Home pumping station is being vigorously pushed, and it is expected that before many weeks a duplicate of our present plant will be completed. As the water supply for the last two years has been entirely inadequate for the wants of the Home, the prospect of an abundant supply in the near future is a pleasing one.

HEALTH.

The following extract from Surgeon Huffman's report speaks for itself:

The Home can again be congratulated upon its good sanitary condition and small rate of mortality, the number of deaths being 30 less than last year and the average age at death being increased to 66.59 years. This showing is gratifying when we consider the increased number of members cared for and the advanced age of the members.

DISCIPLINE.

The tabulated statements which form a part of this report show a most gratifying decrease in the number of offenses as compared with last year, although the whole number cared for is much greater. This result is without doubt largely due to the fact that within the last six months the saloons and low dives in the vicinity of the Home have been closed. This work has been accomplished by the most persistent and energetic efforts on the part of the Home authorities, after the Ohio supreme court decided the mile and one-half limit law to be constitutional. The Gold Club continues to exert an excellent influence in the Home, although the additions to it have not been as many as in some former years. It is a fact worthy of note that many of the members who have lapsed after taking the gold cure treatment drink much less than they did before taking it.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

Since my last report a social-hall building has been erected at a cost of \$5,000. This building is used for the meetings of the Grand Army of the Republic, Naval Veteran Association, and Keeley League. The basement, being occupied as a billiard hall, and is a popular place of resort, and of great benefit to the Home in furnishing a means of amusement and comfort to many of its members.

The new central boiler plant has been nearly completed, at a cost of \$34,064.23, and will prove of great benefit to the Home as a means of economy, safety, and comfort.

DISCIPLINE.

That the discipline of the Home is good, is shown by the tabular statement submitted herewith.

The introduction of the Keeley cure for drunkenness at this Branch has proven a great success, has been of incalculable benefit to its discipline and comfort, and has been the means of restoring to many of its members their manhood.

I have had the hearty cooperation of the officers of this Branch during the past year, to which is owing the success of the efforts which have been made for its benefit.

RELIGION.

[Protestant chaplain's report.]

The undersigned begs leave respectfully to make his annual report for the year ending July 1, 1895.

Public services have been regularly sustained every Sunday at 10 a. m. in the chapel, and in the winter months upon Friday evenings, also on Thanksgiving Day. Deaths and removals affect the congregation, but on the whole the attendance has averaged well. The excellent music by the choir has aided very materially in inducing members of the Home to come to church, and it is a great pleasure to make this well-merited acknowledgment.

Funerals to the number of 64 have been conducted with religious services in the chapel. Four men were received into the church of Christ by baptism and 5 by confirmation. The latter rite was performed by the Right Rev. J. L. Nicholson, S. T. D., bishop of Milwaukee, on the occasion of his delivering the annual memorial sermon on the Sunday preceding Memorial Day, by invitation of the Veteran Post No. 8, Grand Army of the Republic.

In addition to the public services and funerals, regular visitations in the hospital have been made twice a week, and whenever at other times they were desired by the sick and dying.

Once again, if it is allowable, I desire to place on record my high appreciation of the unwearied labors of the governor of the Home in advancing the moral tone of this vast institution. To Governor Wheeler and his faithful staff of officers, the members of this Home owe a debt of obligation which never can be measured by words of praise. The religious welfare of the men has been wonderfully aided by the advance in morality and good conduct. While in this respect very much remains to be done for the eternal welfare of immortal souls, still we have reason to be thankful to Almighty God for permitting us to see some fruits for our labor.

[Catholic chaplain's report.]

I have the honor to submit the following report of duties performed during the year:

A remarkable increase in the number of those who attend Catholic services in the Home chapel was observed ever since we organized our Catholic choir this year, so much that on several occasions there was hardly enough seating capacity. Our services were held regularly every Saturday night, and twice on each Sunday and holy days of obligation.

In order to bring back to their church and to the attendance of divine services, the exercises of a Catholic mission were given during the last month, and the results were truly gratifying, for several who were never seen at mass have begun to practice their religious duties with new fervor.

Able and well-known priests of our society have lent their services in addressing the disabled volunteers, to create a new interest both in religious and temperance movements. Frequently during the year it was a pleasure to me to attend the meetings of the Keeley Club, and to address a few words of encouragement to those who belong to the club and have restored to themselves their former will power to resist the inclination for intoxicating drinks. The boys feel happy in their new and comfortable clubhouse.

I visit the hospital never less than twice each week, and sometimes oftener, and go frequently in the restraint ward to cheer up the sick. During the year I was called upon to perform the funeral services over 49 Catholic soldiers of the Home, who received the spiritual consolations of the last sacrament.

I venture to say that my experience during the last year in my frequent visits at the Home obliges me to express my gratitude for kindness and courtesy which I noticed in all the officers of the National Home.

DISCIPLINE.

The conduct of the members during the past year has been generally good, and shows an improvement over the previous year in the fact that the number of arrests have been less, although the membership has largely increased. The Keeley treatment for drunkenness is still a strong factor in the promotion of good discipline. Eighty-one members have taken advantage of the "treatment" during the past year and 409 since its first introduction.

HEALTH.

The report of the surgeon shows a gratifying result in the low death rate of 36.83 during the present year, notwithstanding the fact that the weather, by reasons of sudden and marked changes, has not been considered particularly favorable. I can not speak too highly in praise of the skillful and conscientious services of the medical staff at this Branch. The work of the matron and female nurses continues to be very satisfactory and undoubtedly contributes to the excellent record made during the year.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

During the past year the extensive improvements that were commenced during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1894, have been completed. A new boiler house and machine shop has been erected and the entire steam plant, with machinery, removed to the new building. The floor of the kitchen has been lowered 3 feet 6 inches to bring it on a level with the dining room. The bakery has been removed to the basement beneath the dining room, and the entire commissary department placed under one roof. One new bake oven has been erected and the "patent oven" removed and reconstructed. The kitchen has also been refitted and made more commodious, and it will answer the requirements of the Home for many years to come.

These improvements have been made without any practical interference with the heating and cooking services during the progress of the work, which rather increased the expense, but I find that the cost of the improvements is less than my estimate given to the Board of Managers at the time the changes were authorized. The work of changing the old bakery into a barrack is nearly completed.

BARRACK ACCOMMODATIONS.

The constantly increasing applications for admission to the Home indicate that additional facilities should be provided for the shelter of the veterans who desire its benefits. In the opinion of the surgeon in charge, the time has arrived when provision should be made for the larger number of men who should come more directly under the care and supervision of the medical staff. I am of the same opinion, and have recommended in my estimate for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1896, an appropriation for a new building for very old and feeble men, which should be directly connected with the hospital. This would provide for this class of men and make vacancies for newcomers in the regular dormitories.

FARM.

The decrease in the appropriation for the fiscal year in comparison with the amount formerly allowed for farm purposes has in a measure curtailed our farming operations and resulted in loss of vegetables and green food, which is much relished by the men, and furnished a welcome change in the routine diet, which, in feeding so large a number, is necessarily limited.

The main production of the farm is the essential article of milk, which must be produced at the Home, and, in order to serve our constantly increasing membership, we must extend rather than diminish our area of pasturage and tillage land. It would be impossible, especially in the winter season when our number "present" is the largest, to procure this necessary article of food outside of the Home. At times the Home is entirely cut off from the territory where milk could be sometimes purchased. Our already large herd of cows must be increased, and, in order to supply the necessary fodder, we must extend our grass fields and cultivate more acres of corn for ensilage. As the products of the farm are used for subsistence, and credit only given on internal account, larger appropriations should be allowed for our farm operations, which are necessary and can be done at a profit.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF SOUTHERN BRANCH, NATIONAL HOME FOR
DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE
30, 1895.**

SOUTHERN BRANCH, August 10, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Branch for the year ending June 30, 1895:

I hereby invite attention to the above tabulated statement of membership, which shows that the average number present June 30 was 3,000.

At the date of making this report (August 10) the number present is 2,990, which is only 90 less than our maximum present last winter. If our gain during the next twenty days is as large as that of the past ten days (viz, 43) we will reach our last year's maximum. This, however, will not necessitate any embarrassment about curtailing new admissions, transfers, etc., because this period will bring us so near the time for our September pension payment that we will find relief to the extent of 200 or more who will take furloughs. This will further relieve us until the completion of our new barracks, which will have a capacity for 400. This will enable us to transfer the members in tents (about 200) to the new barracks, together with the number of members now quartered in halls, bathrooms, basements, and elsewhere, numbering about 100, so that our new barracks will in reality afford us only an increase of 100 beyond our maximum number last winter, viz, about 3,100 present.

In this connection I desire to call attention to the fact that in my annual estimate for year ending June 30, 1897, I inserted, under instructions from our local manager, an item for new barracks of \$31,000. I trust this amount will not be reduced by the Board of Managers, as it will enable us to duplicate one of the style of barracks now in course of erection, with a capacity of 200, and further enable us to construct two buildings as annexes to hospital, and located on the east of the hospital, duplicating those on the west. This, in my view, will complete the Home capacity, and beyond which we should not further extend.

WATER SUPPLY.

Under this head I have to report that during the year the contract made with the Newport News Water Company for furnishing the Home with 200,000 gallons water per day has been consummated, and I

find that the water, both as to quantity and quality is what the company agreed to furnish, and in the future we need have no further anxiety as to an abundant supply.

CONSTRUCTION.

Under this head nothing has been done, but from post fund we have expended \$3,261 for granolithic pavements, which have afforded to our men not only a dry walk in wet weather, but has also served the purpose of adorning the grounds. So popular have these walks become that some of the members are already petitioning to have them further extended.

TRAINED FEMALE NURSES.

In my previous report I stated that this system had but just been inaugurated and that it portended success. It is very gratifying for this office now, after a full year's trial, to report its complete success.

Having been fortunate in securing a good and efficient corps of nurses, they have shown by their peculiar fitness and training that they are well adapted to administer to our hospital patients and the old veterans are loud in their praises for the good work they have accomplished.

HOSPITAL.

During the year the ill health of Dr. Towle, who had occupied the office of surgeon of this Home the past twelve years, and who had filled the position so ably and efficiently, compelled him to resign, whereupon the Board of Managers, through Gen. W. J. Sewell, our local manager, appointed as his successor Dr. W. W. L. Phillips, of Trenton, N. J., and late surgeon of the Third New Jersey Cavalry.

With this change the appointment of two interns and a civilian druggist has resulted, and there is in contemplation a more extensive hospital service, and radical improvements have already been started, and when completed it is expected that the hospital of this Branch will be thoroughly modernized and equal in its appointments to any in the land.

SANITARY AND HYGIENE.

Under this important head I have to invite attention to the report, herewith attached, of Surgeon Phillips.

KEELEY GOLD CURE.

Our Keeley Club flourished and grew to the number of upward of 200, then the interest therein seemed to lag and the additions were sporadic, amounting to only 8 or 10 per month, when the Board of Managers determined that the salary of the Keeley doctor must be paid from the profits arising from the price paid for the treatment (it had previously been paid from post fund), and the increase in membership not being sufficient to warrant this heavy expenditure, the doctor, in June, after being informed of the situation, resigned and left the Home, since which time the treatment has not been administered and, consequently, the gold cure at this Branch is now in statu quo.

Of late I have had a few applications, on the part of our men, for the treatment, but having no one to administer it I was compelled to inform them accordingly, much to my regret. I have no doubt, if permitted to pay the doctor from post fund, we would be able to increase the mem-

bership somewhat, and I do not hesitate to recommend that another doctor be secured from the Keeley Institute, and that his services be paid from the receipts of the "cure," and when such receipts fall short of the amount necessary that the balance be paid from post fund.

DISCIPLINE.

I am extremely happy to report that as the years go by and our men become older they become more easy to govern, and in this connection I will add that the percentage of violations of Home rules has become so small at this Branch that it is hardly deemed worthy of notice, and the conduct and discipline of the men is all that I could ask for or the Managers expect.

As in the past, my thanks are due and are extended to the officers, noncommissioned officers, and employees who have so faithfully and honestly aided this office in the administration of Home affairs during the past year.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The Home is in a good sanitary condition. There has been no epidemic or contagious disease during the year. The buildings, kitchens, dining rooms, and closets are daily carefully and systematically policed, and a rigid inspection of each building and its appurtenances is made daily. The sewerage system is about perfect; the near proximity of tide water and an abundant water supply for flushing purposes enable us to keep the closets and sewers free and clean. Facilities are afforded for salt-water bathing, of which the members eagerly avail themselves. Ample facilities for bathing are also furnished in hospital and quarters. The hospital is in good condition, and the sick are ably cared for. The yards and surroundings are kept

pure and clean. In the matter of policing the quarters, and keeping beds and bedding clean and free from vermin, I am very much aided by the great majority of the members who, carefully and sedulously regarding their own cleanliness, will not tolerate any negligence or carelessness on the part of their neighbors, and thus with their surroundings clean and comfortable and knowing that every precaution is taken to preserve their health and promote their comfort the average contentment of the members is as good as that in any community.

RELIGION.

[Report of Rev. William Price, Protestant chaplain.]

I hereby transmit a brief statement of my services as chaplain at this Home during the past year.

I have held regular services each Lord's day—Sabbath school at 2.30 and preaching at 3.50 p. m.—and prayer meetings each Sunday evening and once during the week. I have held special religious services three times during the year, and have been assisted by the pastors of churches in the vicinity; and several of the old soldiers here have made a public profession of religion, and these services have exerted visible influences on the morals of the Home.

The large supply of Bibles furnished me have eagerly been called for by the Home members, and I have received 300 copies of the New Testament from a generous lady of Washington, D. C., which have been distributed.

I spend much of my time in the hospital among the sick, and I am called upon often to administer the last sacred services to those comrades that are so rapidly passing away. I attended 133 funerals during the year.

[Report of Rev. T. J. Mercer, Catholic chaplain.]

The duties of Catholic chaplain of the Southern Branch present nothing out of the ordinary routine of preceding years except a demand of Catholic members for more frequent services during the week, making in all five services a week, besides funerals, visits to hospitals, etc.

The number attending services has increased to such an extent that at times the chapel does not afford seating room for the congregation.

The regularity of attendance and the conduct of members during services is a sufficient indication of how much they appreciate the convenience afforded them in the exterior practice of their religion.

JUNE 30, 1895.**

WESTERN BRANCH, *June 30, 1895.*

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Branch for the year ending June 30, 1895:

GENERAL FUND.

The treasurer's report shows the average cost of ration per day per capita, 15.54 cents, against 16.47 cents last year; of clothing per capita per annum, \$17.35, against \$15.31 last year; cost per capita per year, \$120.49, against \$126.22 last year; general expenditures, \$295,122.78, against \$312,601.12 last year. The average present last year was 2,188, this year it is 2,261. Saving in cost per capita per year, \$5.73.

PENSION FUND.

There has been an increase of 221 pensioners during the year. The amount paid to pensioners during the year was \$199,306.21, \$29,324.35 more than during the preceding year. The amount paid to families during the last year was \$89,675.05, \$8,277.15 more than during the preceding year.

POST FUND.

The treasurer's report shows cash on hand, \$6,948.58; stock on hand, including fixtures, \$13,480.75. Total expenditures during the year, \$39,840.33; depreciation stock, fixtures, etc., \$10,556.11. Aggregate expenditures, \$50,396.44, as against \$69,036.09 last year. Receipts, \$43,017.91, against \$57,496.21 last year.

SUBSISTENCE.

During the year a decrease in cost of ration per capita was effected. Last year the average cost of ration was 16.47 cents, this year it is 15.54 cents. Good and substantial food has been served and in ample quantities. The subsistence department has been well managed, close attention to details being the invariable rule.

CONSTRUCTION, IMPROVEMENTS, AND REPAIRS.

A vitrified brick road has been constructed, 28 feet wide by 650 feet in length, from the main avenue to the railroad depot west of the grounds.

The western slope of the grounds immediately in front of the barracks has been graded, gulleys filled up; the parapet, from the band

stand south to the church, along the main avenue, amounting to 7,000 square yards, has been sodded, adding very largely to the general appearance of the grounds.

The grounds around the new chapel have been graded, raised, and seeded down to grass. A brick walk from the main avenue to the lower, or Catholic chapel, has been laid.

A new operating room has been constructed, attached to the hospital, 16 feet 6 inches by 23 feet, with vitrified tile floor.

The post fund has been authorized to pay for the construction of a brick dwelling for the bandmaster, which was begun April 3, and is now nearing completion. Its dimensions are 34 by 43 feet. It has a basement, and two garret rooms can be added if necessary.

The cooling room of the general dining room was repaired and enlarged, so as to afford more room for fresh meats, and a small separate room for the storage of milk and butter.

DISCIPLINE.

Arrests under minor charges have been decreasing. During the year there were 362, against 480 last year, a decrease of 118. Drunkenness is now almost a thing of the past. A few old members are chronic inebriates past redemption. Some trouble is experienced with them, but the great majority are sober and well behaved. A total membership of 3,867 was cared for during the year. Of that large number 3,658 committed no offense whatever. During the last eighteen months not a single offense was committed upon the Home grounds, necessitating trial before the United States courts. Indeed, not a member has been arraigned before the United States commissioner during the period stated. I believe such a record is unparalleled. During the year only 24 men were arrested by the civil authorities for drunkenness, whose cases were reported to the governor. The treatment for inebriety and the morphine habit, administered in the Keeley Institute at the Branch, is to be credited for much of this improvement in the morale of the membership. Before its introduction it seemed to be impossible to discipline the inebriates. Most of them are now cured. I respectfully invite attention to the report of the surgeon, elsewhere embodied in this, my annual report, which shows the progress that has been made in the reformation of the victims of whisky and morphine. The Protestant and Catholic chaplains have been close observers of the Keeley treatment, and they each heartily indorse it.

THE KEELEY INSTITUTE.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON, KEELEY INSTITUTE.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith annual report of the Keeley Institute of the Western Branch, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, with statistics of history from inception of the work:

During the last fiscal year sales of neurasthenia and tobacco remedies have not been entered as cases treated; these remedies are sold to applicants and administered by themselves.

With commendable pride we would call attention to the improved morale of the camp since the introduction of the Keeley cure. Good order, quietude, and sobriety universally obtain; the discipline is all that could be desired; but little profanity, vulgarity, or obscenity of language is heard among the men; in fact, a cleaner, nicer, better-behaved set of old men can scarcely be found than the old soldiers at this place. These gratifying results are largely due to the Keeley cure.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The water supply is obtained from the Leavenworth Waterworks Company, and is abundant and free from any deleterious substances. The food is ample and of good quality; an abundant supply of fresh vegetables is furnished from the Home farm, which gives variety and improves the appetite by a frequent change in the bill of fare, and acts as a prophylactic to scurvy and kindred diseases, which were the bane of the soldier during the war. Clothing and bedding good.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The deep-pipe system, which, owing to the topography of the ground and the removal of garbage by cart and tank in its fresh state, is the best that could be instituted, and much cheaper than the late double-pipe system now in use in some of the larger cities, having less incline for removal of surface débris and storm water.

BARRACKS.

The barracks are clean and well kept; closets clean and well looked after, and everything pertaining to barracks in perfect sanitary condition, except that basement in each barrack in which men are quartered are damp and lack sufficient sunlight to make them proper, pleasant, or healthful. All the barracks are lighted with gas and heated by steam. The grounds are lighted by electricity.

The grounds have been greatly improved by grading, laying of walks and driveways, and the planting of shrubbery and flowers in almost every available place, and, owing to the favorable season, have produced a luxuriant growth of foliage, which gives the appearance of a grand park. The beautiful lake situated in the center, decorated with a Moorish band stand, dotted with artistic boats filled with blue-coated oarsmen, gives truly a romantic appearance to the casual observer, and is equal to many of the scenes in Venice or Naples.

HOSPITAL.

The hospital proper has a capacity of 150 patients; hospital annex, 49; convalescent company, 95, and insane ward, 44, making in all 15 wards, with 338 patients. The hospital building is of modern construction, heated by steam, lighted by gas, supplied with hot and cold water, and well ventilated by high air shafts connecting the wards through the floor and walls. This indirect ventilation is of great benefit in cold weather, when direct drafts would be very injurious.

Each ward is supplied with modern porcelain bath tubs, water-closets, nurses, medicine, and dining rooms and linen rooms. The wards are furnished with iron bedsteads, springs, cellulose mattresses, blankets, sheets, and counterpanes, to make the patients clean and comfortable.

The walls are decorated with pictures and the smoking rooms furnished with material for games, to help the convalescent patients pass away the time.

The drug supply is of the best quality, and is neatly and correctly dispensed. The general dining room for convalescent patients and employees has a seating capacity of 140. The kitchen is furnished with a large coal range and steam kettles and tables.

The culinary department is presided over by the matron, and is clean, neat, and orderly; it is as perfect in all its appointments as can be under the circumstances.

Last, but not least, is the new operating room, which has been constructed since my last report; it is well lighted, heated by steam, supplied with hot and cold water, furnished with a modern glass operating table, glass trays, and cases for instruments and solutions, and a percolator for constant irrigation during operations. It is well supplied with modern instruments, sterilizers, etc., and as nearly perfect in all its appointments and appliances for doing antiseptic surgical operations as the writer is able to conceive.

In closing my report I wish to call attention to the report of the Keeley treatment for chronic alcoholism. The results have been all that could be desired in this line.

All the improvements in morals and discipline spoken of I can fully indorse; in fact, it is apparent to the most casual observer. Drunkenness is reduced to the minimum.

The need of the Home is a building for the better care of the insane, where better light and pleasanter surroundings can be had.

Four new barrack buildings for the quartering of men now in basements are badly needed.

Since my last annual report there has been no epidemic of disease. The prevailing diseases are rheumatism, malarial fevers, diseases of the respiratory organs, diarrhea, various forms of heart disease, with a smattering of almost all the diseases incident to this climate and location. Our mortality list has been reduced from 164 last year to 150, which, in my opinion, is largely due to the improved sanitary condition of the hospital and the reduction of inebriety in members of the Home. Ratio of deaths last year per 1,000 was 42.49; ratio this year, 38.79, showing a net gain over last year of 3.70, and over the previous year of 7.38.

RELIGION.

[Report of Protestant chaplain, Rev. W. J. Gillespie.]

The year which closed on June 30 has been the ninth of my connection with the Western Branch. These have all been pleasant years of service. The one just closed has been marked by a special pleasure in the opening for religious service of Emanuel church. This building, by reason of its beauty, convenience, and comfort, is a great help in developing the devotional spirit in the Home.

In addition to the services held every Sabbath during the year, we have had two week-day services of a more social character, in which anyone present is at liberty to take part. The men seem to enjoy these meetings, and take part freely.

We observed the week of prayer, and one day were visited by five of the pastors from Leavenworth, while on each day of the week some of the Christian people of the city showed their interest in our work to the extent of coming out and assisting in the meetings.

During the year suitable services have been held at 99 funerals.

Visits to the hospital for the purposes of reading the Scriptures to the sick and praying with such as desire prayer, and for conversation with those willing to converse, have been matters of almost daily occurrence, and I trust have been the means of bringing comfort and gladness to many a lonely comrade.

These nine years have seen great changes and greater improvement among the membership of this Branch, especially in the good conduct and gentlemanly bearing of the men.

It would probably be very difficult to find a community of the same sized population wherein there are so few disorderly, and so much self-respect, gentlemanly bearing, and courteous conduct as are found on these grounds.

Various influences have no doubt contributed to produce these desirable results, but it is perhaps within the bounds of truth and reason to attribute this manifest improvement to the rescue of so many men from the cruel and degrading grasp of an overpowering appetite for intoxicants.

The past years' observations have confirmed the hope, formerly expressed, that a remedy has at last been found for the dreaded "dypsomania," the disease that has destroyed more brave men—soldiers and sailors—than fell in defense of their country. It has been found in the Keeley treatment.

With the facts of the past three years before me, I feel perfectly safe in saying to any comrade who has become a helpless and almost hopeless victim of his own appetite that there is help and hope for any man who wishes to be rescued, that he may live a clean, sober, happy life. During the past thirty years, in which I have known something of various plans adopted for the rescue of the drunkard—plans social, moral, religious, and legal—it must be confessed with regret that the hopes of earnest warm-hearted, large-hearted men and women outside and inside of the church have not been realized.

But in the past three years hundreds of men suffering from alcoholism have been treated at this Branch, and the greater number of them, so far at least as my observation extends, have been completely cured. Some of them have unfortunately for themselves and their friends returned to their old haunts and vicious companionship and contracted the disease again, but it is pleasant to know that hundreds of cured men fill influential positions in the business and political world, and stand living witnesses to the value of the medical treatment received from the surgeons at this Home.

May I, in closing this, my ninth annual report, express the hope, born of a great desire, that the work of rescue so grandly carried on by the medical department of this Home may not only continue but increase in breadth and effectiveness, until there shall not be one victim of inebriety left here, a hopeless, helpless, useless drunkard.

[Report of Catholic chaplain, Rev. Thomas H. Kinsella.]

The past year has been an active and an eventful one in this chaplaincy.

The veterans continue to display an edifying interest in the practice of their religious duties, which seem to afford them the greatest consolation in their declining years. The Sunday services, both morning and evening, are well attended, and the chapel is seldom or never without its sprinkling of devout worshipers from early morning till late at night during the week. After supper each evening a large number of members congregate in the chapel for night prayer. This practice has gradually become an established custom, and the veterans seem to take an especial pleasure in it, even in the absence of the chaplain.

The number who approach holy communion averages 100 or more each month. The hospital is visited from three to four times each week, and, as usual, the sick are attended upon call at any time of the day or night.

The number of funerals attended during the past year by the Catholic chaplain was 27.

The present incumbent of this office deems it a duty to bear testimony to the excellent spirit displayed by the officers of this Branch toward its Catholic members.

The Catholic chapel lately dedicated is without doubt a gem of art and architecture, and its interior furnishings are in keeping with its style and purpose.

Of the many events of the past year it is safe to say that none have so deeply moved this entire community as the death of my respected predecessor, Rev. Father Finn, who died at St. Vincent's Orphan Asylum, Leavenworth County, Kans., February 17, 1895. His loss is mourned by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

Among the several movements adopted by the management of the Branch for the moral betterment of the members, none, perhaps, deserve so much commendation as the Keeley Institute for the treatment of inebriety and morphinism. The benefits of its workings are apparant even to the casual observer, and I shall continue to use my every effort to further its most laudable ends.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Branch for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Efforts have been made to care for all eligible applicants as far as was practicable. During the entire year the Home has been full, and at times so overcrowded that it was necessary to discontinue admissions.

GENERAL FUND.

The treasurer's report shows the average cost of ration per day per 100 men as \$16.54, while the year ending June 30, 1894, it was \$19.01.

The cost of clothing per man this year, \$20.82; last year, \$11.63. The per capita cost for the year is \$140.21; last year, \$136.24.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year there have been constructed a fire protection plant, including a pumping station and deep-well pump, throwing 150,000 gallons per day, and water mains and hydrants near the buildings. A governor's residence has been built and a telephone system installed.

WATER SUPPLY.

It is believed that a sufficient supply of water is now assured. With average winter rains the storage system provides enough to meet the essential wants of the Branch from one season to another, while the new pump adds very largely to our resources.

HEALTH.

The surgeon's report shows that no infectious disease developed during the year and the health of the members has been comparatively good. The percentage of deaths of those cared for was 3.17.

DISCIPLINE.

The percentage of offenses reported is larger than in previous years, arising probably from some difference in the method of reporting. The showing of 1,677 men committing no offense out of a total of 1,922 cared for seems a creditable one.

ASSEMBLY HALL.

The need of a meeting hall, referred to in previous annual reports, is more pressing as the membership increases. Aside from the advantages of a room sufficient to accommodate those who desire to attend religious meetings, a hall large enough for gatherings of the men for instruction and entertainment is quite important.

The temporary building now used will not seat one-fourth of those who would like to attend meetings.

THE KEELEY CURE.

This treatment, commenced at the Pacific Branch July 21, 1893, was discontinued for a brief period owing to the absence of patients, and restored July 17, 1894, the year's work to June 30, 1895, resulting in the handling of 84 cases. During the entire period since the cure was first given there have been 188 cases. The oldest graduate is 77, the youngest 46; the average age 61½ years. The percentage of lapses is 16.6. The beneficial effect of the cure is observable here as elsewhere, one of the commendable features being the continued interest in the good work by the graduates. Weekly public meetings are held by the league, when entertainments are given and efforts made to strengthen the bonds of fellowship and secure recruits.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

All regulations looking to the proper hygienic conditions of the population of the Home have been carried out with the one important exception, viz, that the barracks have been overcrowded in order to admit those applying for shelter and such benefits of the Home as service, age, and resulting disabilities entitled them to. Although the overcrowding has naturally been the cause of inconvenience to some, it is fortunate that no more serious results have been observed.

This Branch has fortunately been exempt from the visitation of any serious epidemic during the past year.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

Protestant and Catholic services have been regularly held. There is also a weekly prayer meeting and a Sunday school which are well attended.

The small temporary structure, called an assembly hall, is the only meeting place and the number who can attend religious exercises is limited.

The following societies, made up of Home members, are in a flourishing condition and their influence is important and wholesome: John A. Martin Post Grand Army of the Republic, No. 153, 200 members; Union Veteran Legion, No. 138, 40 members; Association of Naval Veterans, No. 36, 30 members.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF MARION BRANCH, NATIONAL HOME FOR
DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE
30, 1895.**

MARION BRANCH, *June 30, 1895.*

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Branch for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Nothing of an unusual character has occurred at this Branch during the past year. The members have been provided with the necessities of life without stint, and peace, comfort, and happiness have prevailed. The health of the Branch has been good, considering the physical condition of the members. Seventy-one of our number died during the year, an average of 32.87 per 1,000 for whole number cared for.

The Board of Managers are fully aware of the crowded condition of the Branch from reports made, and by personal observation during their annual inspection of the Branch, made on the 18th instant. The pressure for admission continues. At this writing (July 24, 1895) our Home is full; all beds occupied and 73 disabled soldiers sleeping on the floor. The new barrack (No. 9) will be completed in about five weeks. This will add to our capacity 200 beds.

The old soldiers are willing to make the best of such accommodations as we are able to furnish, and accept the conditions without complaint, looking forward to better quarters when the new barrack is completed. The two additional barracks and dining hall, provided for by the last appropriation, will be hurried forward as fast as possible. The contract for same will be let on the 12th proximo, but in all probability the number applying for admission will be greater than we can care for, and admissions and readmissions will have to be suspended during the coming winter.

NATURAL GAS WELLS.

Our gas wells have supplied us with sufficient natural gas for all purposes up to this time, but they show a gradual decrease in pressure as time goes on. It is recommended that another gas well be drilled, either on the Home grounds, or on the leased land, as in the wisdom of the Board may be deemed best. If the well is drilled on the Home grounds, the cost, with connections, is estimated at \$1,450. If on the leased land, the cost, with connections, will be \$1,500 more, by reason of additional pipe, etc.

The appropriation for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1896, having been reduced, under the head "Construction and repairs," from \$21,500, as per estimate, to \$10,000, and title changed to "Repairs," there will be no money available from this head to put down the gas well. It is suggested that this would be a proper charge to "Household," as it is used for fuel and lights.

STINSON MEMORIAL.

The "Stinson Memorial," built from funds bequeathed to the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, by Daniel Stinson, of New York City, now approaching completion, will fill a long-felt want, and much enjoyment within its walls is anticipated. The thanks of the officers and members are tendered to the Board of Managers for locating the building at this Branch.

GOLD CLUB.

The Chloride of Gold Club continues to prosper, and is productive of good. Twenty-five per cent of members taking the cure have relapsed. Your attention is respectfully invited to accompanying tables, which give full information of the workings of the Branch.

In the administration of affairs I have had the loyal support of the officers, members, and employees, and to them my thanks are hereby extended.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

Daily inspection of the buildings and grounds is made by the officer of the day, and a written report handed in to the governor each morning. The camp is cleaned daily, and all rubbish is hauled to the dumping ground and burned.

A bath record is kept by the company captain, and all members are required to bathe once a week.

A thorough inspection of the members, their clothing, beds, bureaus, barracks, hospital, mess hall, and kitchen, is held every Sunday morning, to which all the officers of the Branch turn out.

The sewerage system continues to give satisfaction.

The surgeon reports that tubercular cases are isolated as far as possible. An efficient powdered disinfectant is used in cuspidors and water-closets. All cuspidors in general use are kept partially filled with water, to prevent drying of sputa, and consequent dissemination of tubercle bacilli.

Tubercular patients are furnished with individual cuspidors lined with paper. The lining is removed and buried as soon as soiled. In the hospital wards the average cubic feet of air to the patient is 1,000. The hospital and barracks are ventilated by vent stacks extending from basement to the roof, as well as the open fireplaces. The hot-air furnaces in the basement draw their supply of air from the outside.

In order to more efficiently carry on our religious work I have organized a Christian Union. In this nearly all the different Christian denominations are represented. The membership of this organization now numbers 134.

The hospital work has claimed a large share of my attention. The time spent in that department of the work will aggregate one hundred and twenty days.

The number of burial services at which I have officiated is 47.

The moral condition of the men at the Home is improving, and I feel much encouraged in the work by the results.

[Report of Rev. F. C. Welchman, Catholic chaplain.]

The attendance of the Catholic soldiers of the Home is, in the best sense, gratifying. A noted improvement is discerned in the manners and conduct of the men. During the year many who had abstained from any religious services for probably many years received the sacraments and have shown a laudable spirit of perseverance. The general attendance on divine service on Sunday is equaled by the capacity of the chapel, as a rule, seating about 200 persons. In addition to the Sunday services a sermon was had on Thursday evenings, which was well attended. The usual average per Sunday of those who received communion was six. A very decided improvement in sobriety has been shown during the past year, many of the men voluntarily taking the total abstinence pledge. As a rule your chaplain made two stated visits per week to the hospital, and takes this opportunity of saying that nothing was left undone by any of the attendants to assist in the necessary ministrations. During the year a mass was offered in the chapel for the repose of the souls of those who died in the Home. This service was weekly, and was attended by at least forty to fifty members of the Home. It is with much pleasure also that I call your attention to the spirit of devotion shown by the old veterans, in that a visit may be made at almost any hour to the chapel and some will be found engaged in prayer. Your chaplain has not kept a record of the number of funerals attended, believing these to have received their place in the reports of the respected adjutant.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE NATIONAL HOME FOR
DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, JULY 10, 1894.

WASHINGTON, D. C., *July 10, 1894.*

The Board met in regular quarterly session, at the Arlington Hotel, at 11 a. m.

Present: Gen. William B. Franklin, president of the Board; Gen. William J. Sewell, first vice-president; Gen. John C. Black, second vice-president; Gen. Martin T. McMahon, secretary; Col. John L. Mitchell; Gen. Alfred L. Pearson; Col. George W. Steele; Gen. Charles M. Anderson; Col. Sidney G. Cooke.

The minutes of the last meeting were submitted and amended so that resolution as to alteration and extension of treasurer's office at the Southern Branch should read, "cost not to exceed \$3,500," instead of "cost not to exceed \$3,000," as printed, and approved as amended.

The president of the Board presented the following:

[Public Resolution—No. 31.]

Joint resolution to appoint three members of the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That Charles M. Anderson, of Greenville, Darke County, Ohio; Sidney G. Cooke, of Herington, Dickerson County, Kansas, and A. L. Pearson, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, be, and the same hereby are, appointed as members of the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers of the United States; Charles M. Anderson to succeed General James Barnett, whose term of service has expired; Sidney G. Cooke to succeed Major E. N. Morrill, whose term of service has expired, and A. L. Pearson to succeed himself, his term of service having expired. All to take effect from and after the passage of this resolution.

Approved July 3, 1894.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$579,087.40, as necessary to meet the expenses for the quarter ending September 30, 1894, of the seven Branches of the National Home, and for construction, clothing for all the Branches, salaries of officers and employees, outdoor relief, and incidental expenses of the National Home, and \$143,750 for aid to State Homes; and that the acting treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$691,572.39 from the Treasury of the United States, and the sum of \$31,265.01 from the accrued posthumous fund of the several Branches of the National Home, and to receipt therefor, and transfer and disburse said amounts in the name and behalf of the National Home.

The president of the Board presented the following estimate to meet a deficiency in the appropriation for aid to State Homes for fiscal year ending June 30, 1894, which, after careful consideration, was agreed upon, as follows:

Aid to State Homes: Deficiency fiscal year ending June 30, 1894..... \$50,000

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$50,000 as necessary to meet a deficiency in the appropriations for aid to State Homes for fiscal year ending June 30, 1894; and that the acting treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$50,000 from the Treasury of the United States and to receipt therefor and disburse said amount in the name and behalf of the National Home.

On motion of General Sewell, it was resolved that Generals Franklin, Black, and McMahon be appointed a committee to consult with the Secretary of War, the Second Comptroller, and the Auditor of the Treasury in regard to the accounts of the Home and the methods of keeping and rendering the same.

On motion of General Black, the Board proceeded to the election of a governor of the Pacific Branch.

The president read a list of the various candidates named for that office, and their recommendations. After consideration, on motion, several ballots were taken without result. A final ballot gave a majority of votes to Maj. J. G. Rowland, of Illinois, who was thereupon declared duly elected.

On motion of General Black, the sum of \$6,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated from the Stinson fund for the construction of a memorial hall and chapel at the Marion Branch, to be called the Stinson Memorial.

On motion, it was resolved that the president be authorized to sell a West Shore Railroad Company, No. X 3844, guaranteed 4 per cent first-mortgage registered bond, \$10,000, registered in the name of The National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, W. B. Franklin, president, for the purpose of carrying out the foregoing resolution.

A committee of the Board of Trade of Hampton, Va., were received by the Board, and presented a request that the Board would rescind the regulation said to be in force at the Southern Branch, whereby pensioners were not permitted to leave the Home grounds within a certain time after the payment of their pensions. The gentlemen of the committee represented that this was unfair to the tradesmen of Hampton, and deprived them of such profits as might enure to them in case the pensioners were permitted to go out of the Home grounds at once after payment.

After full discussion of the subject, and hearing all the gentlemen of the committee, the subject was referred to Gen. W. J. Sewell, local manager, for investigation and report.

On motion of Colonel Steele, it was resolved that the president of the Board be authorized to purchase the Worrell tract of 19.65 acres, adjoining the Marion Branch, at a price not to exceed \$2,100, whenever there are funds in his hands available for the purpose.

The president presented the matter of the judgment claim against the B. F. Butler estate and the payment made thereunder, and on motion of General Sewell, it was resolved that General Black and General McMahon be appointed a committee to consult with the Secretary of the Treasury as to the disposition of the funds so paid.

On motion of General Sewell, the sum of \$1,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated from the post fund to build eight small houses for the band at the Southern Branch.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE NATIONAL HOME FOR
DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, AUGUST 22, 1894.

BOSTON, MASS., August 22, 1894.

The Board convened in special meeting, pursuant to a call of the chair, at 11 a. m., at the Brunswick Hotel.

Present: Gen. William B. Franklin, president of the Board; Gen. William J. Sewell, first vice-president; Gen. John C. Black, second vice-president; Gen. Martin T. McMahon, secretary; Gen. Francis Fessenden; Col. George W. Steele; Col. Sidney G. Cooke.

Absent: The President of the United States, the Chief Justice, the Secretary of War, Col. John L. Mitchell, Gen. Alfred L. Pearson, Maj. A. W. Barrett, and Gen. Charles M. Anderson.

The following dispatch was received from the Chief Justice of the United States, explaining his absence:

SORRENTO, ME., August 22, 1894.

Gen. W. B. FRANKLIN,
President Soldiers' Home Board:

Being absent, telegram just received. Regret can not attend, though would come if needed to make quorum.

MELVILLE W. FULLER.

Letters had also been received from Colonel Mitchell, General Pearson, and General Anderson, explaining their inability to attend the meeting.

The secretary explained that notice of the postponement of the meeting from the 15th of August had not been received by Major Barrett in time for him to attend.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

On motion of General Black, the following committee was elected by the Board to audit the accounts of the acting treasurer: General Fessenden, Colonel Steele, and Colonel Cooke.

The committee subsequently presented the following report, which was received and ordered on the minutes:

BOSTON, MASS., August 23, 1894.

The undersigned have this day examined and audited the accounts of Gen. W. B. Franklin, acting treasurer of the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, for the quarter ending June 30, 1894, and find the same correct and supported by proper vouchers.

The balance in his hands on June 30, 1894, was \$28,351.37 belonging to the appropriation 1894, and \$96,820.88 belonging to aid to State Homes; total, \$125,172.25.

Debit voucher 21, quarter ending March 31, 1894, amounting to \$93.18, reported absent for signature at date of last audit, April 18, 1894, was also submitted, examined and audited, and found correct.

The president of the Board presented and read letters from the governors of several of the Branches in relation to the crowded condition of the Home at the present time; and, on motion of Colonel Steele, it was resolved that the president be authorized to suspend admissions to the Home whenever there is lack of room for the accommodation of additional members.

On motion of General Black, it was resolved that immediately after the recess the Board proceed to the election of a general treasurer, in compliance with the terms of the act of Congress approved August 18, 1894.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that the president of the Board be directed to prepare a list of the officers and employees of the Home for classification under the provisions of the act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895, and for other purposes, approved August 18, 1894.

The Board thereupon took a recess until 3 p. m.

The Board reconvened at 3 p. m. and proceeded to the election of a general treasurer.

Colonel Steele nominated for this office Maj. J. M. Bermingham, at present assistant inspector-general. There were no other nominations, and Major Bermingham was thereupon unanimously elected.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that the by-laws and regulations now in force touching the office of the acting treasurer be continued and made applicable to the office of the general treasurer and the duties thereof until otherwise ordered by the Board.

Also, that the president be required, in addition to the duties now imposed on him, to supervise and regulate, subject to the control of the Board, all disbursements made and duties performed by the general treasurer.

The president of the Board submitted deeds for the purchase of land for Wagner wells at the Central Branch, which, after examination, were accepted and ordered to be duly recorded in the proper office and filed at the Central Branch.

The president of the Board presented the act approved August 18, 1894, making appropriations, which had been received since the recess; and the following extracts therefrom were read and ordered to be spread upon the minutes:

[Extract from act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895, and for other purposes.]

* * * * *

For current expenses of the Government Hospital for the Insane: For support, clothing, and treatment in the Government Hospital for the Insane of the insane from the * * * inmates of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, * * * two hundred and sixty-six thousand five hundred and twenty dollars.

National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers: For the support of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, as follows:

At the Central Branch, at Dayton, Ohio: For current expenses, namely: Pay of officers and noncommissioned officers of the Home, with such exceptions as are herein-after noted, and their clerks and orderlies; also payments for chaplains and religious instruction, printers, bookbinders, telegraph and telephone operators, guards, policemen, watchmen, and fire company; for all property and materials purchased for their use, including repairs not done by the Home; for necessary expenditures for articles of amusement, boats, library books, magazines, papers, pictures, and musical instruments, and for repairs not done by the Home; for librarians and musicians; also for stationery, advertising, legal advice, and for such other expenditures as can not properly be included under other heads of expenditure, one thousand dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount not exceeding sixty-four thousand dollars of the balance of the "posthumous fund," in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, namely: Pay of commissary sergeants, commissary clerks, porters, laborers, and orderlies employed in the subsistence department; bakers, cooks, dish-washers, waiters, bread cutters, and butchers; the cost of all animals, fowls, and fish purchased for provisions; of all articles of food, their freight, preparation, and serving; of tobacco; of all dining room and kitchen furniture and utensils, bakers' and butchers' tools and appliances, and their repair not done by the Home, three hundred and seventeen thousand dollars.

For household, namely: Expenditures for furniture for officers' quarters; for bedsteads, bedding, and all other articles required in the quarters of the members,

and for their repair if they are not repaired by the Home; for fuel, including fuel for cooking, heat, and light; for engineers and firemen; bath-house keepers, hall cleaners, laundrymen, gas makers, and privy watchmen, and for all machines, tools, materials, and appliances purchased for use under this head, and for their repair unless the repairs are made by the Home; also for all labor and material for upholstery shops, broom and soap shops, ninety thousand six hundred dollars.

For hospital, namely: Pay of assistant surgeons, matrons, druggists, hospital stewards, ward masters, nurses, cooks, waiters, readers, hospital carriage drivers, hearse drivers, grave diggers, funeral escort, and for such labor as may be necessary; for surgical instruments and appliances, medical books, medicine, liquors, fruits, and other necessaries for the sick not on the regular ration; for bedsteads, bedding, and materials, and all other articles necessary for the wards; kitchen and dining room furniture and appliances, carriage, hearse, stretchers, coffins, and materials; for tools of grave diggers, and for all repairs not done by the Home, fifty-three thousand nine hundred dollars.

For transportation, namely: For transportation of members of the Home, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For construction and repairs, namely: Pay of chief engineer, builders, blacksmiths, carpenters, cabinetmakers, coopers, painters, gas fitters, plumbers, tinsmiths, wire-workers, steam fitters, stone masons, quarrymen, whitewashers, and laborers, and for all machines, tools, appliances, and materials used under this head, seventy thousand dollars.

For farm, namely: Pay of farmer, chief gardener, harness makers, farm hand, gardeners, stablemen, teamsters, dairymen, hog feeders, and laborers, and for all machines, implements, tools, appliances, and materials required for such work; for grain, hay, and straw, dressing and seed, carriages, wagons, carts, and other conveyances; for all animals and fowls purchased for stock or for work (including animals in the park); for all materials, tools, and labor for flower garden, lawn, and park, and for repairs not done by the Home, seventeen thousand five hundred dollars.

In all, five hundred and fifty-two thousand five hundred dollars.

At the Northwestern Branch, at Milwaukee, Wisconsin: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, ten thousand dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount not exceeding seventeen thousand dollars of the balance of the "posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, one hundred and twenty-seven thousand five hundred dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, sixty-one thousand nine hundred and fifty-two dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-seven thousand three hundred and fifty dollars;

For transportation of members of the Home, one thousand eight hundred dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-four thousand dollars;

For building for central boiler plant, including coal sheds and smokestacks, seven boilers in place, and water heater, twenty-seven thousand three hundred dollars;

For tunnel for connection with main building, hospital, and barracks, including excavation, seven thousand two hundred dollars;

For perfecting a system of sewerage, six thousand dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, eight thousand eight hundred dollars;

In all, three hundred and one thousand nine hundred and two dollars.

At the Eastern Branch, at Togus, Maine: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, ten thousand five hundred dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount, not exceeding fourteen thousand dollars of the balance of the "posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, one hundred and eight thousand five hundred dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, fifty-five thousand one hundred dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-three thousand seven hundred dollars;

For transportation of members of the Home, two thousand dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-four thousand dollars;

For alteration of boiler plant, five thousand dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, ten thousand four hundred dollars;

In all, two hundred and thirty-nine thousand two hundred dollars.

At the Southern Branch, at Hampton, Virginia: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, ten thousand five hundred dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount not exceeding seventeen thousand dollars of the balance of the "posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, one hundred and eighty-eight thousand dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, fifty-six thousand dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-seven thousand four hundred and fifty dollars;

For transportation of members of the Home, two thousand dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-five thousand dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, fifteen thousand dollars;

In all, three hundred and twenty-three thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars.

At the Western Branch, at Leavenworth, Kansas: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, eighteen thousand dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount not exceeding seven thousand dollars of the balance of the "posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, one hundred and thirty-six thousand four hundred dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, fifty-eight thousand dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, thirty thousand four hundred and fifty dollars;

For transportation of members of Home, three thousand dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-four thousand dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, nine thousand seven hundred dollars;

In all, two hundred and seventy-nine thousand five hundred and fifty dollars.

At the Pacific Branch, at Santa Monica, California: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty thousand dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount not exceeding three thousand dollars of the balance of the "Posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head.

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, eighty-two thousand one hundred and twenty-five dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, thirty thousand dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, fifteen thousand dollars;

For transportation of members of the Home, four thousand dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, thirty thousand dollars;

For construction of quarters for governor of Home, nine thousand dollars;

For fire protection, including pumps, pipes, hydrants, and placing and locating same, eight thousand one hundred dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, ten thousand dollars;

In all, two hundred and eight thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars.

At the Marion Branch, at Marion, Indiana: For current expenses, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty-one thousand dollars: *Provided*, That in addition to this amount the balance of the "Posthumous fund" in the hands of the treasurer of this Branch on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, may be used for payments authorized under this head;

For subsistence, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, eighty thousand dollars;

For household, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twelve thousand dollars;

For hospital, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, sixteen thousand five hundred dollars;

For transportation, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, two thousand dollars;

For construction and repairs, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, twenty thousand dollars: *Provided*, That no part of the appropriations for construction and repairs for any of the Branch Homes shall be used for the construction of any new building;

For one new barrack, twenty-five thousand dollars;

For farm, including the same objects specified under this head for the Central Branch, four thousand eight hundred dollars;

In all, one hundred and eighty-one thousand three hundred dollars.

For clothing for all of the Branches, namely: Expenditures for clothing, under-clothing, hats, caps, boots, shoes, socks, and overalls; also all sums expended for labor, materials, machines, tools, and appliances employed in the tailor shops, knitting shops, and shoe shops, or other Home shops in which any kind of clothing is made or repaired, two hundred thousand dollars.

For salaries for officers and employes of the Board of Managers and for outdoor relief and incidental expenses, namely:

For president of the Board of Managers, four thousand dollars; secretary of the Board of Managers, two thousand dollars; one general treasurer, who shall not be a member of the Board of Managers, three thousand dollars; one inspector-general, two thousand five hundred dollars; one assistant inspector-general, two thousand dollars; clerical service for the offices of the president and general treasurer, four thousand five hundred dollars; messenger service for president's office, one hundred and forty-four dollars; messenger service for secretary's office, fifty-two dollars; clerical services for managers, one thousand five hundred dollars; agents, two thousand four hundred dollars; for travel expenses of the Board of Managers, their officers and employes, eleven thousand five hundred dollars; for outdoor relief, one thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars; for rent, medical examinations, stationery, telegrams, and other incidental expenses, two thousand five hundred dollars; in all, thirty-seven thousand eight hundred and forty-six dollars.

In all, two million three hundred and twenty-four thousand four hundred and seventy-three dollars: *Provided*, That all amounts disbursed from the appropriation of a Branch Home shall be disbursed and accounted for monthly to the general treasurer by the treasurer of that Branch, except such expenditures for services, stationery, tableware, clothing, and bedding as may be required by the Board of Managers to be legally made by the general treasurer, and all such stationery, tableware, clothing, and bedding as may be required for each Branch Home shall be shipped directly from the place of purchase or manufacture to such Branch Home; and all disbursements shall be made in conformity with sections thirty-six hundred and seventy-eight and thirty-six hundred and seventy nine, Revised Statutes: *Provided further*, That the balance of the posthumous fund, including the amount invested in bonds pertaining to that fund, that may be in the hands of the treasurer of any Branch of the Home on July first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, shall be transferred to the appropriation for "current expenses eighteen hundred and ninety-five" of that Branch Home, and thereafter all receipts on account of the effects of deceased members shall be credited to the appropriation for "current expenses" of the fiscal year during which such amounts were received, and all repayments of such amounts shall be made from and charged to the like appropriation for the fiscal year in which such repayments shall be made.

The general treasurer shall give good and sufficient bond to the United States in a sum not less than one hundred thousand dollars, as the Secretary of War may direct, and to be approved by him, faithfully to account for all public moneys and property which he may receive, and the treasurers of the several Branch Homes shall give good and sufficient bonds to the general treasurer in such sums as he may require and to be approved by him, faithfully to account for all public moneys and property which they may receive.

That the provisions of the fifth and sixth sections of the act entitled "An act establishing post routes, and for other purposes, approved March third, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven," for the transmission of official mail matter be, and they are hereby, extended and made applicable to all official mail matter of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers.

That all sums received from sales of subsistence stores or other property of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers shall be taken up by the disbursing officer under the proper current appropriation, and be available for disbursement on account of that appropriation.

That the Board of Managers shall classify all the officers and employes of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers and establish a rate of pay and allowance for each class, and the rate so established shall not be increased by fees,

perquisites, allowances, or advantages under any pretense whatever; and no employé shall be borne on more than one pay roll or voucher.

That when an officer of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, not a member of the Board of Managers thereof, travels under orders on business for the Home he shall be allowed seven cents in lieu of all other expenses for each mile actually traveled, distance to be computed by the most direct through route.

That hereafter no member of the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers shall receive any compensation or pay for any services or duties connected with the Home; but the traveling and other actual expenses of a member, incurred while upon the business of the Home, may be reimbursable to such member: *Provided*, That the president and secretary of the Board of Managers may receive a reasonable compensation for their services as such officers, not exceeding four thousand dollars and two thousand dollars respectively per annum.

That hereafter, once in each fiscal year, the Secretary of War shall cause a thorough inspection to be made of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, its records, disbursements, management, discipline, and condition, such inspection to be made by an officer of the Inspector-General's Department, who shall report thereon in writing, and said report shall be transmitted to Congress at the first session thereafter.

STATE OR TERRITORIAL HOMES: For continuing aid to State or Territorial Homes for the support of disabled volunteer soldiers, in conformity with the act approved August twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, five hundred and seventy-thousand dollars: *Provided*, That one-half of any sum or sums retained by State Homes on account of pensions received from inmates shall be deducted from the aid herein provided for.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that the general treasurer be authorized and required to legally purchase and manufacture stationery, tableware, clothing, and bedding, and to pay for services required.

General Black offered the following resolution; which, on motion, was adopted:

Resolved, That where claim is made for the effects of a deceased member of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, and where such claim is referred to a manager of the Board or to an officer of the Home for investigation and report, such manager or officer shall investigate fully the bona fides of said claim; the legality of the papers presented from a court, if any such are presented; the ability of the securities in each case; the publication or service made, and all such facts as will enlighten the judgment of the Board, and shall report in writing to the Board the facts so discovered and his judgment thereon.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that the president of the Board have prepared for the use of the Board the penalty envelopes authorized by the act of August 18, 1894.

A letter from General Anderson, local manager of the Central Branch, in relation to the post-office at that Branch, was presented by the secretary and read by the Board. After consideration, on motion, it was ordered that the newly-appointed postmaster at the Central Branch be allowed the use of the post-office there and its appointments.

On motion of General Sewell, it was ordered that the president of the Board be requested to cause an inspection to be made of the repairs recently put on the house of the governor of the Southern Branch, and a detailed report made to the Board as to the necessity, character, and cost thereof.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that the president of the Board be requested to call on the treasurer of the Southern Branch for a detailed statement in writing as to the difference between certain original vouchers, Nos. 17, 18, 19, and 20, for the quarter ending December 31, 1893, and those subsequently substituted therefor; and furnish all necessary papers for a full understanding of the case.

On motion, it was resolved that the next meeting of the Board be held at the Central Branch, near Dayton, Ohio, September 8, 1894, at 11 a. m.

The Board thereupon took a recess, and proceeded, on the 23d of August, to the Eastern Branch, near Togus, Me., where they made Aspection of the grounds and buildings and heard the applications of such members of the Home as desired to appear before the Board in person.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that Colonel Cooke and Assistant Inspectors Bermingham and Averell be directed to examine the accounts of the treasurer of the Eastern Branch and the balances in his hands, and report to the Board.

The committee subsequently reported. The report was discussed by the Board, but the matter was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

At various times during its session the Board examined applications for admission and readmission to the Home, and for the effects of deceased members, and made the following orders:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$614,108.90, as necessary to meet the expenses for the quarter ending December 31, 1894, of the seven Branches of the National Home, and for construction, clothing for all the Branches, salaries of officers and employees, outdoor relief and incidental expenses of the National Home, and \$141,250 for aid to State Homes; and that the general treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$30,088.17 from the accrued posthumous fund of the several Branches of the National Home, and the sum of \$725,270.73 from the Treasury of the United States, and to receipt therefor, and transfer and disburse said amounts in the name and behalf of the National Home.

After inspection of the barracks, hospital, buildings and grounds, and hearing such members as desired to make personal statements or applications, the Board proceeded to the Marion Branch and reconvened on the 17th of September.

SEPTEMBER 17.

The governor of the Branch presented papers, deeds, etc., concerning the purchase of the Worrell lands at the Marion Branch, heretofore ordered by the Board.

After due examination the deeds were accepted and ordered on file.

The application of the governor of the Marion Branch for authority to complete a hay barrack, already begun, at an expense not to exceed \$463, to be paid for from the appropriation for 1894, was considered and approved.

On motion, Gen. W. W. Averell, assistant inspector-general, was directed by the Board to proceed to the Western Branch for the purpose of making certain investigations, and to report thereon to the Board, with authority to employ a stenographer if necessary.

The president of the Board brought up the subject of the suspended vouchers in the accounts of the Southern Branch, and the condition of the accounts of the treasurer of the Eastern Branch, both of which subjects were considered at the last meeting of the Board.

Further discussion was had, but no final action taken.

The following applications were presented to the Board:

The application of John Lillis, late United States Navy, to be sent back to the Northwestern Branch on account of his physical condition. Granted.

The application of James E. Booth, late Company B, Sixteenth Kentucky Cavalry, to be paid a balance due him at the Western Branch for services as hospital nurse was considered, and it was ordered that the treasurer of the Western Branch be directed to pay the amount claimed out of the post fund, taking therefor proper vouchers.

On motion of General Anderson, it was resolved that a manager shall not pay for medical examinations of applicants for admission where the disability is evident without such examination.

SEPTEMBER 18.

The Board adjourned to meet in Chicago, and reconvened at the Grand Pacific Hotel.

The Board discussed the subject of the transfer of balances from the acting treasurer to the general treasurer, and the settlement of such accounts, and other subjects connected with recent legislation.

The president reported that under the clause of the sundry civil law, approved August 18, 1894, providing "that the balance of the posthumous fund, including the amount invested in bonds pertaining to that fund, that may be in the hands of the treasurer of any Branch of the Home on July 1, 1894, shall be transferred to the appropriation for 'current expenses 1895' of that Branch Home," etc., he had ordered the sale of the above-mentioned bonds, according to the terms of the resolution of the Board of Managers, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, dated September 7, 1881, in order to comply with the terms of the law.

On motion, the action of the president as to the sale of the bonds of the posthumous fund was approved.

The president of the Board also presented the following laws of Congress relating to the Home, which were ordered spread upon the minutes:

188 NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS.

[Public Resolution—No. 29.]

Joint resolution to provide temporarily for the expenditures of the Government.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all appropriations for the necessary operations of the Government and of the District of Columbia, and for the payment of pensions, under existing laws, which shall remain unprovided for on the thirtieth day of June, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, be, and they are hereby, continued and made available for a period of thirty days from and after that date, unless the regular appropriations provided therefor in bills now pending in Congress shall have been previously made for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-five; and a sufficient amount is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to carry on the same: *Provided,* That no greater amount shall be expended for such operations than will be in the same proportion to the appropriations for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-four as thirty days' time bears to the whole of said fiscal year: *Provided further,* That the total expenditures for the whole of the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-five, under the several appropriations hereby continued, and under the several appropriation bills now pending, shall not exceed in the aggregate the amounts finally appropriated therefor in the several bills now pending, except in cases where a change is made in the annual, monthly, or per diem compensation, or in the number of officers, clerks, or other persons authorized to be employed by the several appropriations hereby continued, in which cases the amounts authorized to be expended shall equal thirty three hundred and sixty-fifths of the appropriations for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and three hundred and thirty-five three hundred and sixty-fifths of the appropriations contained in the several bills now pending when the same shall have been finally passed, unless the salary or compensation of any office shall be increased or diminished without changing the grade or the duties thereof, in which case such salary or compensation shall relate to the entire fiscal year and run from the beginning thereof.

Approved, June 29, 1894.

[Public Resolution—No. 34.]

Joint resolution to continue the provisions of a joint resolution approved June twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, entitled a "Joint resolution to provide temporarily for the expenditures of the Government."

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of a joint resolution entitled a "Joint resolution to provide temporarily for the expenditures of the Government," approved June twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, be, and the same are hereby, extended and continued in full force and effect to and including the fourteenth day of August, eighteen hundred and ninety-four.

Approved, July 31, 1894.

[Public Resolution—No. 39.]

Joint resolution to continue the provisions of existing laws providing temporarily for the expenditures of the Government.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of joint resolutions approved June twenty-ninth and July thirty-first, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, providing temporarily for the expenditures of the Government, be, and the same are hereby, extended and continued in full force and effect to and including the twentieth day of August, eighteen hundred and ninety-four.

Approved, August 15, 1894.

[Public—No. 131.]

An act to amend section forty-eight hundred and thirty-seven of the Revised Statutes of the United States as to Soldiers' Homes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section forty-eight hundred and thirty-seven of the Revised Statutes of the United States, as amended by the act of Congress approved February eighth, eighteen hundred and eighty-one, be, and hereby is, repealed and reenacted to read as follows, to wit:

"SEC. 4837. That the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives shall cause to be sent to the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers at Dayton, Ohio, and to the branches at Togus in Maine, Milwaukee in Wisconsin, Hampton in Virginia, Marion in Indiana, Leavenworth in Kansas, Santa

Monica in California, and to the homes for the widows and orphans of soldiers and sailors established and maintained by any State or Territory, and all soldiers' and sailors' homes established by the authority of any State or Territory receiving aid from the United States under legislation of Congress, each, one copy each of the following documents: The session laws of Congress; the annual message of the President, with accompanying documents in the abridgment thereof; the daily Congressional Record; and the Public Printer is hereby authorized and directed to furnish to the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives the documents referred to in this section."

Approved, July 26, 1894.

[Public—No. 135.]

An act making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, in full compensation for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, for the objects hereinafter expressed, namely:

* * * * *

SEC. 3. The Auditors of the Treasury shall hereafter be designated as follows: The First Auditor as Auditor for the Treasury Department; the Second Auditor as Auditor for the War Department; the Third Auditor as Auditor for the Interior Department; the Fourth Auditor as Auditor for the Navy Department; the Fifth Auditor as Auditor for the State and other Departments; the Sixth Auditor as Auditor for the Post-Office Department. The designations of the deputy auditors and other subordinates shall correspond with those of the Auditors. And each deputy auditor, in addition to the duties now required to be performed by him, shall sign, in the name of the Auditor, such letters and papers as the Auditor may direct.

SEC. 4. The offices of Commissioner of Customs, Deputy Commissioner of Customs, Second Comptroller, Deputy Second Comptroller, and Deputy First Comptroller of the Treasury are abolished, and the First Comptroller of the Treasury shall hereafter be known as Comptroller of the Treasury. He shall perform the same duties and have the same powers and responsibilities (except as modified by this act) as those now performed by or appertaining to the First and Second Comptrollers of the Treasury and the Commissioner of Customs; and all provisions of law not inconsistent with this act, in any way relating to them or either of them, shall hereafter be construed and held as relating to the Comptroller of the Treasury. His salary shall be five thousand five hundred dollars per annum. There shall also be an Assistant Comptroller of the Treasury, to be appointed by the President, with the advice and consent of the Senate, who shall receive a salary of five thousand dollars per annum, and a chief clerk in the office of the Comptroller of the Treasury, who shall receive a salary of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The Assistant Comptroller of the Treasury shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Comptroller of the Treasury, and shall have the power, under the direction of the Comptroller of the Treasury, to countersign all warrants and sign all other papers.

The chief clerk shall perform such duties as may be assigned to him by the Comptroller of the Treasury, and shall have the power, in the name of the Comptroller of the Treasury, to countersign all warrants except accountable warrants.

The Auditors, under the direction of the Comptroller of the Treasury, shall superintend the recovery of all debts finally certified by them, respectively, to be due to the United States.

Section thirty-six hundred and twenty-five of the Revised Statutes is amended by substituting the words "proper Auditor" for the words "First Comptroller of the Treasury (or the Commissioner of Customs, as the case may be)."

Section thirty-six hundred and thirty-three of the Revised Statutes is amended by substituting the words "proper Auditor" for the words "First or Second Comptroller of the Treasury."

SEC. 5. The Comptroller of the Treasury shall, under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, prescribe the forms of keeping and rendering all public accounts, except those relating to the postal revenues and expenditures therefrom.

The returns of fees mentioned in section seventeen hundred and twenty-five of the Revised Statutes shall be made as prescribed by the Comptroller of the Treasury.

SEC. 6: Section two hundred and seventy-one of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 271. The Comptroller of the Treasury, in any case where, in his opinion, the interests of the Government require it, shall direct any of the Auditors forthwith to audit and settle any particular account which such Auditor is authorized to audit and settle."

SEC. 7. Accounts shall be examined by the Auditors as follows:

First. The Auditor for the Treasury Department shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the office of the Secretary of the Treasury and all bureaus and offices under his direction, all accounts relating to the customs service, public debt, internal revenue, Treasurer and assistant treasurers, mints and assay offices, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Coast and Geodetic Survey, Revenue-Cutter Service, Life-Saving Service, Light-House Board, Marine-Hospital Service, public buildings, Steamboat-Inspection Service, immigration, navigation, Secret Service, Alaskan fur-seal fisheries, and to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Department of the Treasury, and certify the balances arising thereon to the division of bookkeeping and warrants.

Second. The Auditor for the War Department shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the office of the Secretary of War and all bureaus and offices under his direction, all accounts relating to the military establishment, armories and arsenals, national cemeteries, fortifications, public buildings and grounds under the Chief of Engineers, rivers and harbors, the Military Academy, and to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Department of War, and certify the balances arising thereon to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, and send forthwith a copy of each certificate to the Secretary of War.

Third. The Auditor for the Interior Department shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the office of the Secretary of the Interior, and of all bureaus and offices under his direction, and all accounts relating to Army and Navy pensions, Geological Survey, public lands, Indians, Architect of the Capitol, patents, census, and to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Department of the Interior, and certify the balances arising thereon to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, and send forthwith a copy of each certificate to the Secretary of the Interior.

Sections two hundred and seventy-three and two hundred and seventy-five of the Revised Statutes are repealed.

Section four hundred and fifty-six of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 456. All returns relative to the public lands shall be made to the Commissioner of the General Land Office."

Fourth. The Auditor for the Navy Department shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the office of the Secretary of the Navy, and of all bureaus and offices under his direction, all accounts relating to the Naval Establishment, Marine Corps, Naval Academy, and to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Department of the Navy, and certify the balances arising thereon to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, and send forthwith a copy of each certificate to the Secretary of the Navy.

Fifth. The Auditor for the State and other Departments shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the offices of the Secretary of State, the Attorney-General, and the Secretary of Agriculture, and of all bureaus and offices under their direction; all accounts relating to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Departments of State, Justice, and Agriculture; all accounts relating to the diplomatic and consular service, the judiciary, United States courts, judgments of United States courts, Executive Office, Civil Service Commission, Interstate Commerce Commission, Department of Labor, District of Columbia, Fish Commission, Court of Claims and its judgments, Smithsonian Institution, Territorial governments, the Senate, the House of Representatives, the Public Printer, Library of Congress, Botanic Garden, and accounts of all boards, commissions, and establishments of the Government not within the jurisdiction of any of the Executive Departments. He shall certify the balances arising thereon to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, and send forthwith a copy of each certificate, according to the character of the account, to the Secretary of the Senate, Clerk of the House of Representatives, Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives, or the chief officer of the Executive Department, commission, board, or establishment concerned.

Sixth. The Auditor for the Post-Office Department shall receive and examine all accounts of salaries and incidental expenses of the office of the Postmaster-General and of all bureaus and offices under his direction, all postal and money-order accounts of postmasters, all accounts relating to the transportation of the mails, and to all other business within the jurisdiction of the Post-Office Department, and certify the balances arising thereon to the Postmaster-General for accounts of the postal revenue and expenditures therefrom, and to the division of bookkeeping and warrants for other accounts, and send forthwith copies of the certificates in the latter cases to the Postmaster-General.

The further duties of this Auditor shall continue as now defined by law, except as the same are modified by the provisions of this act.

SEC. 8. The balances which may from time to time be certified by the auditors to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, or to the Postmaster-General, upon the

settlements of public accounts, shall be final and conclusive upon the executive branch of the Government, except that any person whose accounts may have been settled, the head of the Executive Department, or of the board, commission, or establishment not under the jurisdiction of an Executive Department, to which the account pertains, or the Comptroller of the Treasury, may, within a year, obtain a revision of the said account by the Comptroller of the Treasury, whose decision upon such revision shall be final and conclusive upon the executive branch of the Government: *Provided*, That the Secretary of the Treasury may, when in his judgment the interests of the Government require it, suspend payment and direct the reexamination of any account.

Upon a certificate by the Comptroller of the Treasury of any differences ascertained by him upon revision, the Auditor who shall have audited the account shall state an account of such differences, and certify it to the division of bookkeeping and warrants, except that balances found and accounts stated as aforesaid by the Auditor for the Post-Office Department for postal revenues and expenditures therefrom shall be certified to the Postmaster-General.

Any person accepting payment under a settlement by an Auditor shall be thereby precluded from obtaining a revision of such settlement as to any items upon which payment is accepted; but nothing in this act shall prevent an Auditor from suspending items in an account in order to obtain further evidence or explanations necessary to their settlement. When suspended items are finally settled a revision may be had as in the case of the original settlement. Action upon any account or business shall not be delayed awaiting applications for revision: *Provided*, That the Secretary of the Treasury shall make regulations fixing the time which shall expire before a warrant is issued in payment of an account certified as provided in sections seven and eight of this act.

The Auditors shall, under the direction of the Comptroller of the Treasury, preserve, with their vouchers and certificates, all accounts which have been finally adjusted.

All decisions by Auditors making an original construction or modifying an existing construction of statutes shall be forthwith reported to the Comptroller of the Treasury, and items in any account affected by such decisions shall be suspended and payment thereof withheld until the Comptroller of the Treasury shall approve, disapprove, or modify such decisions and certify his actions to the Auditor. All decisions made by the Comptroller of the Treasury under this act shall be forthwith transmitted to the Auditor or Auditors whose duties are affected thereby.

Disbursing officers, or the head of any Executive Department, or other establishment not under any of the Executive Departments, may apply for and the Comptroller of the Treasury shall render his decision upon any question involving a payment to be made by them or under them, which decision, when rendered, shall govern the Auditor and the Comptroller of the Treasury in passing upon the account containing said disbursement.

Sections one hundred and ninety-one and two hundred and seventy of the Revised Statutes are repealed.

SEC. 9. This act, so far as it relates to the First Comptroller of the Treasury and the several Auditors and Deputy Auditors of the Treasury, shall be held and construed to operate merely as changing their designations and as adding to and modifying their duties and powers, and not as creating new officers.

All laws not inconsistent with this act, relating to the Auditors of the Treasury in connection with any matter, shall be understood in each case to relate to the Auditor to whom this act assigns the business of the Executive Department or other establishments concerned in that matter.

SEC. 10. The division of warrants, estimates and appropriations in the office of the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby recognized and established as the division of bookkeeping and warrants. It shall be under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury as heretofore. Upon the books of this division shall be kept all accounts of receipts and expenditures of public money except those relating to the postal revenues and expenditures therefrom; and section three hundred and thirteen and so much of sections two hundred and eighty-three and thirty-six hundred and seventy-five of the Revised Statutes as require those accounts to be kept by certain Auditors and the Register of the Treasury are repealed. The duties of the Register of the Treasury shall be such as are now required of him in connection with the public debt and such further duties as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury.

SEC. 11. Every requisition for an advance of money, before being acted on by the Secretary of the Treasury, shall be sent to the proper auditor for action thereon as required by section twelve of this act.

All warrants, when authorized by law and signed by the Secretary of the Treasury, shall be countersigned by the Comptroller of the Treasury, and all warrants for the payment of money shall be accompanied either by the Auditor's certificate, mentioned in section seven of this act, or by the requisition for advance of money, which

certificate or requisition shall specify the particular appropriation to which the same should be charged, instead of being specified on the warrant, as now provided by section thirty-six hundred and seventy-five of the Revised Statutes; and shall also go with the warrant to the Treasurer, who shall return the certificate or requisition to the proper Auditor, with the date and amount of the draft issued endorsed thereon. Requisitions for the payment of money on all audited accounts, or for covering money into the Treasury, shall not hereafter be required. And requisitions for advances of money shall not be countersigned by the Comptroller of the Treasury.

Section two hundred and sixty-nine and so much of section three hundred and five of the Revised Statutes as requires the Register of the Treasury to record warrants is repealed.

SEC. 12. All monthly accounts shall be mailed or otherwise sent to the proper officer at Washington within ten days after the end of the month to which they relate, and quarterly and other accounts within twenty days after the period to which they relate, and shall be transmitted to and received by the Auditors within twenty days of their actual receipt at the proper office in Washington in the case of monthly, and sixty days in the case of quarterly and other accounts. Should there be any delinquency in this regard at the time of the receipt by the Auditor of a requisition for an advance of money, he shall disapprove the requisition, which he may also do for other reasons arising out of the condition of the officer's accounts for whom the advance is requested; but the Secretary of the Treasury may overrule the Auditor's decision as to the sufficiency of these latter reasons: *Provided*, That the Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe suitable rules and regulations, and may make orders in particular cases, relaxing the requirement of mailing or otherwise sending accounts, as aforesaid, within ten or twenty days, or waiving delinquency, in such cases only in which there is, or is likely to be, a manifest physical difficulty in complying with the same, it being the purpose of this provision to require the prompt rendition of accounts without regard to the mere convenience of the officers, and to forbid the advance of money to those delinquent in rendering them: *Provided further*, That should there be a delay by the administrative Departments beyond the aforesaid twenty or sixty days in transmitting accounts, an order of the President in the particular case shall be necessary to authorize the advance of money requested: *And provided further*, That this section shall not apply to accounts of the postal revenue and expenditures therefrom, which shall be rendered as now required by law.

The Secretary of the Treasury shall, on the first Monday of January in each year, make report to Congress of such officers as are then delinquent in the rendering of their accounts or in the payment of balances found due from them for the last preceding fiscal year. Sections two hundred and fifty and two hundred and seventy-two of the Revised Statutes are repealed.

Section thirty-six hundred and twenty-two of the Revised Statutes is amended by striking therefrom the following words: "The Secretary of the Treasury may, if in his opinion the circumstances of the case justify and require it, extend the time hereinbefore prescribed for the rendition of accounts."

SEC. 13. Before transmission to the Department of the Treasury, the accounts of district attorneys, assistant attorneys, marshals, commissioners, clerks, and other officers of the courts of the United States, except consular courts, made out and approved as required by law, and accounts relating to prisoners convicted or held for trial in any court of the United States, and all other accounts relating to the business of the Department of Justice or of the courts of the United States other than consular courts, shall be sent with their vouchers to the Attorney-General and examined under his supervision.

Judges receiving salaries from the Treasury of the United States shall be paid monthly by the disbursing officer of the Department of Justice, and to him all certificates of nonabsence or of the cause of absence of judges in the Territories shall be sent. Interstate Commerce Commissioners and other officers, now paid as judges are, shall be paid monthly by the proper disbursing officer or officers.

SEC. 14. In the case of claims presented to an Auditor which have not had an administrative examination, the Auditor shall cause them to be examined by two of his subordinates independently of each other.

SEC. 15. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury annually to lay before Congress, on the first day of the regular session thereof, an accurate, combined statement of the receipts and expenditures during the last preceding fiscal year of all public moneys, including those of the Post-Office Department, designating the amount of the receipts, whenever practicable, by ports, districts, and States, and the expenditures, by each separate head of appropriation.

SEC. 16. In section three hundred and seven of the Revised Statutes the words "Secretary of the Treasury" are substituted for the words "Register of the Treasury."

SEC. 17. The transcripts from the books and proceedings of the Department of the Treasury, provided for in section eight hundred and eighty-six of the Revised Statutes, shall hereafter be certified by the Secretary or an Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, and the copies of contracts and other papers therein provided for shall be certified by the Auditor having the custody of such papers.

SEC. 18. Section thirty-seven hundred and forty-three of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 3743. All contracts to be made, by virtue of any law, and requiring the advance of money, or in any manner connected with the settlement of public accounts, shall be deposited promptly in the offices of the Auditors of the Treasury, according to the nature of the contracts: *Provided*, That this section shall not apply to the existing laws in regard to the contingent funds of Congress."

SEC. 19. Section twenty-six hundred and thirty-nine of the Revised Statutes is amended by substituting the words "proper Auditor" for the words "Commissioner of Customs."

SEC. 20. It shall be the duty of the collectors of customs and other officers of customs to transmit, with their accounts, to the officers charged with the settlement of their accounts, all such papers, records, or copies thereof relating to their transactions as officers of customs as the Secretary of the Treasury may direct.

SEC. 21. All accounts stated by the Auditors before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and then pending for settlement in the offices of the First or Second Comptroller, or the Commissioner of Customs, shall be revised by the Comptroller of the Treasury in the manner provided by existing law, and the balances arising thereon shall be certified to the division of bookkeeping and warrants.

SEC. 22. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to make appropriate rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of this act, and for transferring or preserving books, papers, or other property appertaining to any office or branch of business affected by it.

It shall also be the duty of the heads of the several Executive Departments and of the proper officers of other Government establishments, not within the jurisdiction of any Executive Department, to make appropriate rules and regulations to secure a proper administrative examination of all accounts sent to them, as required by section twelve of this act, before their transmission to the Auditors, and for the execution of other requirements of this act in so far as the same relate to the several Departments or establishments.

SEC. 23. Nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize the reexamination and payment of any claim or account which has heretofore been disallowed or settled.

SEC. 24. The provisions of sections three to twenty-three, inclusive, of this act shall be in force on and after the first day of October, eighteen hundred and ninety-four.

SEC. 25. All laws or parts of laws inconsistent with this act are repealed.

Approved, July 31, 1894.

[Public—No. 202.]

An act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and for prior years, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-four, and for prior years, and for other objects hereinafter stated, namely:

* * * * *

STATE AND TERRITORIAL HOMES: For continuing aid to State and Territorial Homes for the support of disabled volunteer soldiers, in conformity with the act of August twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, fifty thousand dollars.

* * * * *

Approved, August 23, 1894.

[Public—No. 211.]

An act to amend section forty-eight hundred and thirty-three, Revised Statutes, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section forty-eight hundred and thirty-three of the Revised Statutes of the United States be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 4833. The Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers are authorized to aid persons who are entitled to its benefits by outdoor relief, in

such manner and to such extent as they may deem proper, but such relief shall not exceed the average cost of maintaining an inmate of the Home: *Provided*, That in the event that buildings at any Branch of the Home shall be destroyed by fire or rendered unfit for habitation because of pestilence or by the elements, then and in that event the Board of Managers shall have authority to remove the members of said Branch so afflicted or destroyed to any other Branch not so affected, and to do this they may use any funds appropriated for the Home, notwithstanding they may have been specifically appropriated for other purposes, to the extent that such funds shall be necessary to effect such a transfer and the maintenance and support thereafter of said members so transferred, and shall report their doings therein to the Congress and their expenditures as in other cases of expenditures: *Provided further*, That the appropriations for any fiscal year shall not be exceeded."

SEC. 2. That this act shall take effect from and after its passage.
Approved, August 23, 1894.

Thereafter the Board adjourned to meet at the Northwestern Branch, near Milwaukee, Wis., on September 19.

SEPTEMBER 19.

The Board reconvened at the Northwestern Branch, and proceeded to the usual inspection of quarters, hospital, and grounds, and heard such members as desired to make personal statements or applications.

On motion, the matter of the classification of employees of the Home, required by act approved August 18, 1894, was referred to the president of the Board, with power.

On motion, General Black was appointed a committee to visit the Pacific Branch of the Home.

On motion, it was resolved that when the Board adjourn it be to meet in Washington, D. C., on such day of 1894 as the president may designate.

DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS, DECEMBER 4, 1894.

WASHINGTON, D. C., December 4, 1894.

The Board met in regular quarterly session, at the Arlington Hotel, at 11 a. m.

Present: Gen. W. B. Franklin, president of the Board; Gen. W. J. Sewell, first vice-president; Gen. J. C. Black, second vice-president; Gen. M. T. McMahon, secretary; Gen. A. L. Pearson, Gen. Francis Fessenden, Col. George W. Steele, Maj. A. W. Barrett, Gen. Charles M. Anderson, Col. Sidney G. Cooke.

The minutes of the last meeting were submitted and approved.

The president of the Board submitted draft of the annual report, which was read by the secretary and discussed. After certain changes had been ordered General Black moved to strike out certain lines touching the cure of drunkenness in the various Branches. The motion was adopted, and the text having been changed in accordance with the resolution the report was thereupon approved and ordered to be transmitted to Congress.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$593,317.26, as necessary to meet the expenses for the quarter ending March 31, 1895, of the seven Branches of the National Home, and for construction, clothing for all the Branches, salaries of officers and employees, outdoor relief and incidental expenses of the National Home, and \$142,500 for aid to State Homes; and that the general treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$735,817.26 from the Treasury of the United States, and the sum of \$32,168.30 from the accrued posthumous fund of the several Branches of the National Home, and to receipt therefor, and transfer and disburse said amounts in the name and behalf of the National Home.

198 NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS.

Major Barrett presented a communication from the governor of the Pacific Branch, requesting authority to introduce the telephone service at that Branch, and submitting estimates of the cost. On motion, it was resolved that the necessary authority be given, the expense to be paid from the construction fund, not to exceed \$200.

On motion, nominations were made for the auditing committee of the accounts of the late acting general treasurer. Colonel Steele, General Anderson, and Colonel Cooke were unanimously elected.

The committee subsequently presented the following report; which was received and ordered on the minutes:

WASHINGTON, D. C., *December 4, 1894.*

The undersigned have this day examined and audited the accounts of Gen. W. B. Franklin, acting treasurer of the Board of Managers, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, for the quarter ending September 30, 1894, and period ending October 26, 1894, and find the same correct and supported by proper vouchers.

And we further find that the unexpended balance in his hands on the 16th and 26th of October, 1894—viz, appropriation 1893, \$929.07; appropriation 1894, \$34,147.52; appropriation 1895, \$34,801.32, and aid to State Homes, \$96,820.88; total, \$166,698.79—has, under act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses, approved August 18, 1894, been transferred to Maj. J. M. Birmingham, general treasurer, who has duly receipted for same, thereby making a complete settlement of the account.

The president of the Board asked the instructions of the Board in regard to the matter of submitting the accounts of special funds arising from bequests, etc., to the examination of the inspecting officer of the War Department, appointed under the act of Congress of August 18, 1894.

After discussion, it was decided that the president be instructed to submit the accounts as requested.

A recess was thereupon taken until December 5, at 10 a. m.

DECEMBER 5.

The president of the Board announced the resignation of Dr. S. K. Towle, surgeon of the Southern Branch, which, on motion, was accepted.

The president of the Board nominated for surgeon of the Southern Branch, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. Towle, Dr. W. L. Phillips, of Trenton, N. J. No other nominations were made, and Dr. Phillips was thereupon unanimously elected surgeon of the Southern Branch.

The president of the Board announced the resignation of Maj. J. D. Anderson, treasurer of the Eastern Branch, which, on motion, was accepted.

The president further announced that he had, under authority heretofore conferred, appointed Capt. A. L. Smith, commissary of subsistence and quartermaster of the Eastern Branch, treasurer of that Branch in place of Major Anderson. On motion, the action of the president was confirmed, and Captain Smith was duly elected treasurer of the Branch.

General Fessenden nominated for commissary of subsistence and quartermaster of the Eastern Branch, to fill the vacancy made by the election of Captain Smith as treasurer, Col. Samuel J. Gallagher, of Augusta, Me. No other nominations were made, and Colonel Gallagher was thereupon unanimously elected.

The president of the Board presented a communication from Maj. J. M. Birmingham, general treasurer, requesting that he be paid for services rendered during the period from August 18 to September 30, 1894, during which no salary was provided by law. On motion, the president of the Board was directed to make such payment from any available funds in his possession.

The president of the Board called up the case of the cost of repairs, etc., to governor's quarters at the Southern Branch, submitted to the Board at its meeting August 22, 1894.

On motion, action was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

The president of the Board presented the testimony taken by the assistant inspector-general in regard to certain charges against the governor of the Western Branch. The testimony was read in full. During the reading General Black presented an affidavit of one of the witnesses. Objection was made to its admission, inasmuch as it appeared from the record and by the statements of Col. Sidney G. Cooke and Gen. W. W. Averell that the witness had positively refused to testify as to the matters referred to in his affidavit. After discussion, General Black withdrew the affidavit and turned it over to Assistant Inspector-General Averell.

Upon the close of the reading of the testimony, on motion of General Sewell, further action thereon was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

General Sewell presented a claim for the effects, amounting to \$2,000, of James McFall, late Company B, Fifth Pennsylvania Reserves, deceased, at the Southern Branch. On motion, it was ordered that the treasurer of the Southern Branch be directed to pay over the amount, taking the necessary vouchers.

On motion of General Black, it was ordered that a hearse and hospital carriage and horses for the use of the Pacific Branch be purchased, subject to the approval of the president of the Board.

The president of the Board presented communications from the State authorities of Oregon and North Dakota, relating to the establishment of soldiers' homes in those States. On motion of Colonel Steele, the general treasurer was authorized and directed to pay over to said States such sums of money as may be due them, after they shall have complied with the requirements of the act approved August 27, 1888, in regard to payments to State Homes.

General McMahon and General Fessenden were appointed a committee to audit the special fund account in the hands of the late acting general treasurer.

On motion of General Sewell, it was ordered that the president be authorized to pay the cost of the investigation heretofore ordered by the Board, touching certain vouchers of the Southern Branch, incurred by Mr. Gunnell, from any funds available for the purpose. Also, that the expenses of General Averell, assistant inspector-general, incurred in the investigation heretofore ordered at the Western Branch, be paid in the same manner.

DECEMBER 6, 1894.

The president of the Board submitted the schedule of pay, etc., being the classification required by the act of Congress approved August 18, 1894. After careful examination, on motion, the schedule was adopted.

On motion, the president of the Board was directed to make an additional estimate, to accompany the annual estimates for 1896, of \$6,000 for quarters for the treasurer at the Pacific Branch, and \$8,000 for a system of cold storage at the same Branch.

On motion, it was resolved that the next meeting of the Board shall be held at the Southern Branch at such date in April, 1895, as the president of the Board may designate.

On motion, \$2,500 additional was appropriated from the Stinson fund for the memorial hall heretofore ordered at the Marion Branch.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$628,849.88, as necessary to meet the expenses for the quarter ending June 30, 1895, of the seven Branches of the National Home, and for construction, clothing for all the Branches, salaries of officers and employes, outdoor relief, and incidental expenses of the National Home, and \$242,500 for aid to State Homes; and that the general treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$841,812.52 from the Treasury of the United States and the sum of \$29,537.36 from the accrued posthumous fund of the several Branches of the National Home, and to receipt therefor and transfer and disburse said amounts in the name and behalf of the National Home.

The president of the Board presented the acts approved March 2, 1895, making appropriations for the support of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, and for continuing the aid to State and Territorial Homes for the year ending June 30, 1896, and for deficiency in appropriation for aid to State and Territorial Homes for the year ending June 30, 1895, and the following extracts therefrom were read and ordered to be spread upon the minutes:

[Public—No. 120.]

An act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth eighteen hundred and ninety-five, and for prior years, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to supply

deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-five, and for prior years, and for other objects hereinafter stated, namely:

State or Territorial Homes: For continuing aid to State or Territorial Homes for the support of disabled volunteer soldiers in conformity with the act approved August twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, one hundred thousand dollars: *Provided*, That one-half of any sum or sums retained by State Homes on account of pensions received from inmates shall be deducted from the aid herein provided for.

[Public—No. 122.]

An act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-six, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, for the objects hereinafter expressed, for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-six, namely:

National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers: For the support of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, as follows:

At the Central Branch, at Dayton, Ohio: For current expenses, namely: Pay of officers and noncommissioned officers of the Home, with such exceptions as are hereinafter noted, and their clerks and orderlies; also payments for chaplains and religious instruction, printers, bookbinders, telegraph and telephone operators, guards, policemen, watchmen, and fire company; for all property and materials purchased for their use, including repairs not done by the Home; for necessary expenditures for articles of amusement, boats, library books, magazines, papers, pictures, and musical instruments, and for repairs not done by the Home; for librarians and musicians; also for stationery, advertising, legal advice, and for such other expenditure as can not properly be included under other heads of expenditure, sixty-three thousand dollars;

For subsistence, namely: Pay of commissary sergeants, commissary clerks, porters, laborers, and orderlies employed in the subsistence department; bakers, cooks, dish-washers, waiters, bread cutters, and butchers; the cost of all animals, fowls, and fish purchased for provisions; of all articles of food, their freight, preparation, and serving; of tobacco; of all dining-room and kitchen furniture and utensils; bakers' and butchers' tools and appliances, and their repair not done by the Home, three hundred thousand dollars;

For household, namely: Expenditures for furniture for officers' quarters; for bedsteads, bedding, and all other articles required in the quarters of the members, and for their repair if they are not repaired by the Home; for fuel, including fuel for cooking, heat, and light; for engineers and firemen; bath-house keepers, hall cleaners, laundrymen, gas makers, and privy watchmen, and for all labor, machines, tools, materials, and appliances purchased for use under this head, and for their repair unless the repairs are made by the Home; also for all labor and material for upholstery shops, broom and soap shops, one hundred thousand dollars;

For hospital, namely: Pay of assistant surgeons, matrons, druggists, hospital stewards, ward masters, nurses, cooks, waiters, readers, hospital carriage drivers, hearse drivers, gravediggers, funeral escort, and for such labor as may be necessary; for surgical instruments and appliances, medical books, medicine, liquors, fruits, and other necessaries for the sick not on the regular ration; for bedsteads, bedding, and materials, and all other articles necessary for the wards; kitchen and dining-room furniture and appliances, carriage, hearse, stretchers, coffins, and materials; for tools of gravediggers, and for all repairs not done by the Home, fifty-three thousand nine hundred dollars;

For transportation, namely: For transportation of members of the Home, two thousand dollars;

For repairs, namely: Pay of chief engineer, builders, blacksmiths, carpenters, cabinetmakers, coopers, painters, gas fitters, plumbers, tinsmiths, wire-workers, steam fitters, stone masons, quarrymen, whitewashers, and laborers, and for all machines, tools, appliances, and materials used under this head, sixty thousand dollars;

For gas house, six thousand five hundred dollars, to be paid from the appropriation for construction and repairs for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-five;

For farm, namely: Pay of farmer, chief gardener, harness makers, farm hands, gardeners, stablemen, teamsters, dairymen, hog feeders, and laborers, and for all machines, implements, tools, appliances, and materials required for such work; for grain, hay, and straw, dressing and seed, carriages, wagons, carts, and other conveyances; for all animals and fowls purchased for stock or for work (including animals in the park); for all materials, tools, and labor for flower garden, lawn, and park, and for repairs not done by the Home, fifteen thousand dollars;

State or Territorial Homes: For continuing aid to State or Territorial Homes for the support of disabled volunteer soldiers, in conformity with the act approved August twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, six hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars: *Provided*, That one-half of any sum or sums retained by State Homes on account of pensions received from inmates shall be deducted from the aid herein provided for.

Government Hospital for the Insane: Current expenses of the Government Hospital for the Insane: For support, clothing, and treatment in the Government Hospital for the Insane of the insane from the " " " inmates of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, " " " two hundred and sixty thousand seven hundred and forty dollars.

Upon motion of Colonel Mitchell, the president of the Board was authorized to renew the contract with the Milwaukee Training School for Nurses for the employment of female nurses at the Northwestern Branch of the Home.

The president of the Board announced the resignation of Dr. W. H. Leighton, surgeon of the Northwestern Branch, which, on motion, was accepted.

The president further announced that he had, under authority heretofore conferred, appointed Dr. Almon Clarke surgeon, in place of Dr. Leighton. On motion, the action of the president was confirmed, and Dr. Clarke was duly elected surgeon of the Northwestern Branch.

On motion of General Black, the sum of \$1,700, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated from the general fund for necessary repairs to the slop shed connected with main kitchen at the Central Branch.

On motion of Colonel Steele, the governor of the Marion Branch was authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$750 for repairs of gateway and entrance to the grounds at that Branch.

On motion of Colonel Steele, the local manager and governor of the Marion Branch were authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$4,000 for the purpose of securing and protecting the gas supply at that Branch.

On motion of General Black, the general treasurer was authorized to expend any balances of appropriations remaining on hand and available under the law for such purposes, if, in the opinion of the president of the Board, it should be made necessary by reason of advances in the market prices of fuel, provisions, and supplies.

Upon motion of Colonel Mitchell, it was resolved that the question of the repairs to the detention barracks at the Western Branch be referred to the president and local manager, with power to expend such sum as may be necessary and available under the law.

On motion of Colonel Steele, the sum of \$545.64 was appropriated from the Stinson fund for the completion of the Stinson Memorial at the Marion Branch.

Upon motion, it was—

Resolved, That the general treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized to legally purchase and manufacture stationery, tableware, clothing, barrack and hospital bedding, and materials for the same, required by the Home for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1896.

Colonel Steele, General McMahon, and General Anderson were appointed a committee to audit the accounts of the general treasurer for the quarters ending December 31, 1894, and March 31, 1895.

The Board, upon motion, thereupon took a recess, and proceeded to the Southern Branch of the Home, at Hampton, Va.

SOUTHERN BRANCH, HAMPTON, VA., *April 18, 1895.*

The Board reassembled at the Southern Branch, where the usual inspection of the grounds and buildings was made, and the complaints of such members as desired to appear before the Board in person were heard.

The president of the Board announced the resignation of Capt. A. M. Thornton, treasurer of the Pacific Branch. Upon motion, the resignation was accepted, to take effect April 20, 1895.

The president further announced that under the authority heretofore conferred he had appointed Capt. F. K. Upham acting quartermaster and commissary of subsistence at the Pacific Branch; that he had suspended Capt. A. M. Thornton as treasurer and had detailed Capt. F. K. Upham as acting treasurer.

Upon motion of Colonel Steele, the action of the president was confirmed, and Capt. F. K. Upham, late Seventh California Volunteers and

United States Army, was duly elected treasurer and acting quartermaster and commissary of subsistence at the Pacific Branch, at a salary not to exceed \$900 per annum, to date from April 20, 1895, General Black and Colonel Cooke voting in the negative.

On motion of General Black, the president of the Board was directed to include in the estimates to be submitted to Congress for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1897, the sum of \$1,309.10 for the purpose of reimbursing the governor of the Southern Branch for money paid from his personal funds for repairs to the governor's quarters at the Southern Branch.

On motion of General Anderson, the matter of the purchase of a carriage and horses for the use of the sick in hospital at the Southern Branch was referred to the president of the Board, with power.

The applications for increase of pay of the governor's clerk at the Southern Branch and of the druggist at the Western Branch were referred to the president of the Board, with power.

The president of the Board presented communications from the State authorities of North Dakota and Oregon relative to amounts claimed by them to be due on account of State aid from the date of establishment to December 4, 1894, the date from which payment to them was authorized by the Board.

After discussion, it was, on motion, resolved that the general treasurer be authorized and directed to pay said States such amounts as may be found due for the period from July 1 to December 3, 1894, both dates inclusive.

The president of the Board also presented communications from the State authorities of Wyoming relative to the establishment of a soldiers' home in that State.

On motion of Colonel Steele, the general treasurer was authorized and directed to pay over to said State such sums as may be due, after the State authorities shall have complied with the requirements of the act approved August 27, 1888, in regard to State Homes.

On motion of Colonel Steele, the matter of necessary repairs to buildings at the Southern Branch was referred to the president and local manager, with power.

On motion, the president of the Board was authorized to employ Mr. W. C. Gunnell, civil engineer, to superintend the erection of and repairs to the buildings at the Southern Branch, and to employ an expert to examine and report upon the matter of the gas supply at the Western Branch.

On motion of General Black, the president of the Board was authorized to exchange or sell the water-front lots now owned by the Home at Santa Monica, Cal., if, in his opinion, such exchange or sale will be for the interest of the Home.

On motion of General Black, the matter of alterations in the headquarters building at the Southern Branch was referred to the president and local manager, with power, provided that the cost of such alterations shall not exceed the sum of \$1,500.

On motion of General Black, it was—

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Board that no regular officer on retired pay shall hereafter be appointed to any office in the gift of the Board.

The president of the Board presented a communication from H. J. Holden, of Milwaukee, Wis., requesting permission to tap the water main that supplies the Home.

On motion, the application was denied.

On motion, it was resolved that the next meeting of the Board be held at the Central Branch, Dayton, Ohio, upon such date in June, 1895, between the 15th and 25th of said month, as the president of the Board may designate.

DAYTON, OHIO, *June 17, 1895.*

The Board met in regular quarterly session at the Central Branch at 11 a. m.

Present: Gen. W. B. Franklin, president of the Board; Gen. John C. Black, second vice-president; Gen. M. T. McMahon, secretary; Col. John L. Mitchell; Gen. A. L. Pearson; Col. George W. Steele; Gen. C. M. Anderson; Col. Sidney G. Cooke.

Absent: The President of the United States; the Chief Justice of the United States; the Secretary of War; Gen. W. J. Sewell, first vice-president; Gen. Francis Fessenden, Maj. A. W. Barrett.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers estimate and appropriate, out of the moneys which may be provided by law, the sum of \$687,075, as necessary to meet the expenses for the quarter ending September 30, 1895, of the seven Branches of the National Home, and for construction, clothing for all the Branches, salaries of officers and employees, outdoor relief and incidental expenses of the National Home, and \$156,250 for aid to State and Territorial Homes; and that the general treasurer be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to obtain the sum of \$843,325 from the Treasury of the United States, and to receipt therefor and transfer and disburse said amounts, in the name and behalf of the National Home.

On motion of General Anderson, the governor of the Central Branch was authorized to remove and destroy Barrack No. 24, at that Branch, because of its dilapidated and unsafe condition. It is now unfit for occupation because of its age. It was one of the buildings in use on the farm before the establishment of the Home, and is beyond repair. The space is required, more than a new building, for the health of the Branch.

The application of H. Vicroy, for repayment for the value of a horse lost in the lake at the Central Branch by driving off the road, was denied, on the ground that the Board has no authority to make such a payment, nor funds out of which it could be paid.

On motion of General Black, it was resolved that sundry expenses for rent, medical examinations, clerical work, and other incidental expenses incurred by authority of the Board, be paid out of any funds in the possession of the Board available for the purpose.

The president of the Board submitted the report of Col. E. F. Brown, inspector-general, of his inspection of the Eastern Branch of the Home, and a statement from Capt. P. T. Woodfin, governor of the Southern Branch, relative to transactions between himself and one W. H. Prince. On motion, both papers were received and ordered on file.

On motion of Colonel Mitchell, it was—

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Board that the case of the will of Charles Hamlin, late Company D, Sixth Ohio Cavalry, a deceased member of the Western Branch, in favor of Dr. O. C. McNary, assistant surgeon of that Branch, comes within the rule prohibiting officers of the Home from accepting bequests from members of the Home, and that said Hamlin's effects be treated as are the effects of other deceased members of the Home.

The president of the Board presented resolutions of Bates County Post, No. 58, Grand Army of the Republic, of Butler, Mo., approving of the administration of Governor A. J. Smith, of the Western Branch. On motion, the resolutions were received and ordered on file.

On motion, the salaries of the treasurers of the Pacific and Marion Branches were fixed as follows, viz: Pacific Branch, \$1,025; Marion Branch, \$2,000.

The president of the Board presented a communication from the governor of Idaho, relative to the establishment of a soldiers' home in that State. On motion, the general treasurer was authorized and directed to pay over to said State such sums of money as may be due, after the State shall have complied with the requirements of the act approved August 27, 1888, in regard to payments to State Homes.

On motion, the secretary was directed to correct the minutes of the last meeting to include the resolution to enlarge and improve Barrack No. 10, at the Central Branch.

The application of Charles Crossland, late Company I, Twelfth Ohio Cavalry, for reimbursement for transportation coupons from Dayton, Ohio, to Topeka, Kans., and return, lost by him, was referred to the governor of the Central Branch for investigation and such action as he may deem proper.

The application of Thomas McGinley, late Company L, First Pennsylvania Cavalry, for reimbursement for transportation coupons from Pittsburg, Pa., to Marion, Ind., lost by him, was referred to the president of the Board, with power.

On motion, it was resolved that when the Board adjourn it be to meet at the Murray Hill Hotel, in New York City, on September 9, 1895, at 12 m.

After inspection of the barracks, hospital, buildings and grounds, and hearing such members as desired to make personal statements or applications, the Board proceeded to the Marion Branch, and reconvened on the 18th of June.

On motion, the governor of the Marion Branch was authorized to add one story to the corridors of the hospital at that Branch, at a cost not to exceed \$1,200, cost to be charged to the general fund.

The president of the Board presented an application of the Chloride of Gold Club of the Marion Branch for permission to erect, at its own expense, a club house within the grounds of the Home. On motion of General Black, the question was referred to the governor of the Marion Branch for report, statistics concerning the cure for inebriety, the proposed cost of the club house, and any other information pertinent to the application.

On motion of Colonel Steele, \$3,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated from the post fund of the Marion Branch to complete the Stinson Memorial Hall at that Branch.

On motion of General Black, it was resolved that a suitable tablet to the memory of Colonel Stinson be prepared under the direction of the president of the Board, and placed in the memorial hall now in course of erection at the Marion Branch.

After an inspection of the buildings, hospital, and grounds of the Branch, and hearing the complaints of such members as desired to appear personally before it, the Board proceeded to the Northwestern Branch, and reconvened on June 20.

JUNE 20, 1895.

On motion of Colonel Steele, it was—

Resolved, That in a case demanding the suspension of the regulation of the Board prohibiting admission to the National Home of men discharged from State Homes until six months after such discharge, the said regulation may be suspended at the discretion of the president of the Board.

On motion of General Black, it was resolved (General Franklin and Colonel Steele voting in the negative) that the Board of Managers desires to acknowledge the receipt from the public records of a copy of the report of the Inspector-General of the United States Army (Gen. J. C. Breckinridge), and to express its appreciation of the all but

uniform favorable mention made by that officer, after a long and presumably thorough inspection of the Branches of the National Home under its charge, of the excellent condition of said Branches, and the high state of efficiency, comfort, and discipline obtained under its personal and official direction applied through many years, and it desires to further express its pleasure that the conduct and operations of the officers whom it has appointed with care and painstaking fidelity to its public duty have so generally merited the approval of the Inspector-General. That he should have reviewed its entire work, approved its results, and recommended its agents so selected, without reference to its own labors and care, does not, in its estimation, detract from the value of his testimony to the condition of the great institution with whose administration it has been charged for thirty years, and it directs the president of the Board to incorporate the main report and this resolution in his next annual report to the Congress of the United States, to the end that the Government may be informed, in a lasting manner, of the said statements of the said Inspector-General.

EXHIBIT A.

WAR DEPARTMENT, INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE,
Washington, D. C., January 26, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of an inspection of the several Branches of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, made from October 3 to December 23, 1894, under the provisions of the acts of Congress relating to this subject, the last being approved August 18, 1894. This exacting duty related to over 15,000 men and disbursements amounting to \$4,758,173.48, and was greatly facilitated by the courtesy and assistance of the officials generally at the several Branches. It is believed the methods of accounting for public funds and property and for the transaction of public business will be acceptable to all here, and that the changes recently adopted in the forms and accounts by direction of the Secretary of the Treasury are beginning to work perfectly smooth, and the inspection of these old soldiers and their Home seems just as practicable as any others, wherever desired; though, should there be a feeling of opposition to it, unnecessary difficulties may be created.

The inspection was begun by a visit of courtesy to the president and the secretary of the Board of Managers of the Home, the former, who had also been acting treasurer, being asked for any information and assistance he could give for the inspection of the Branches. At my second visit he informed me verbally, and subsequently in writing, that there were funds which would not be presented for this inspection under existing circumstances, though I have since been informed by him that a different conclusion has been reached. The new treasurer had not as yet made any disbursements. The inspection of the Branches was continued until Christmas, when I appeared before the Appropriations Committee on this subject, in compliance with its summons, and the inspection terminated. It would make this report too diffuse to go here into all the details and minutiae of a thorough inspection, from attic to basement, of several of the Branches of this most creditable institution, so reference is made to the appendixes.

At the first Branch visited it was found, as indicated in the communication of October 3, 1894, from the president and acting treasurer, that considerably larger sums had been expended than were forwarded from Washington for the purpose. It subsequently appeared that the State-aid funds had been advanced to these National Branches, and, when occasion required, the pension fund was also called upon for expenditure at a Branch Home, and ultimately the moneys appropriated by Congress were received, but after the posthumous fund had been called in as part of the general fund and partially used for making advances, though no receipts for this money or bonds from the general treasurer were found in the hands of the local treasurers. This seems a temporary and exceptional condition of the finances, even if Congress cares to have cognizance taken at all of the separation or intermingling of the several funds of the Home, in the interests of good administration and accurate supervision.

It is submitted that by sending transfer drafts directly to the depository, as is customary in the transfer of moneys under the War Department (instead of sending it to the disbursing officer), the greatest accuracy as to the dates and transfers can be obtained and proper assurance given from the face of the records that the checks and deposits are for receipts and expenditures of even dates and for authorized purposes, as shown by correct vouchers, to proper debtors. But doubtless the evident

and complete accord between the bank records, the check, the vouchers, the stub, and the cash book, that experience elsewhere has proved to be generally beneficial, can soon be established, and any temporary deflection of funds from one appropriation or heading to another can be minimized, and may have already been so.

No returns or accounts of imperishable property are received by the authorities in Washington, such as are prescribed for public property in the military service, showing its disposition, either by issue, expenditure, or condemnation; though in the aggregate its value is quite considerable. It appears that if these accounts were thus rendered to a department of the Government it would add little or nothing to the clerical work at some of the Branch Homes, which seem to have found it necessary for their own security to prepare the necessary quarterly returns even of perishable stores.

With warm praise for the management and administration and for the zeal and intelligence of those conducting the affairs, it is respectfully submitted that the system of accountability should receive the closest consideration, whether to the United States or locally; but it is not deemed best to overload this report now with details of bookkeeping or affairs which can be accommodated to the rules governing public accountability in good time and without shock, if all can work together in good accord.

The buildings purchased with some of the Branches, and constructed originally for other purposes than barracks, do not seem as satisfactory as the new ones, which are generally admirable, the hospitals deserving special commendation in construction and service and care. But as to future buildings, the remarks of Colonel Lawton in his inspection report of last year touched upon a special view in answer to a definite inquiry that may arise again. There is probably nothing which more deserves consideration than the decorous and comfortable housing of these beneficiaries of the Government. Food, raiment, and shelter are bestowed by the Government at these Homes upon needy and deserving men who have well earned them; and the quality is more than commendable—it is praiseworthy.

The men are now growing old and decrepit and are possibly fading away faster than State and National Governments can build permanent structures for them. The quickest and most economical method of suitable construction should not be difficult to determine at some of the Branches, if the rate of increase of numbers can be indicated by fairly reliable statistics. Even then the system of commutation may be needed to relieve the pressure in the winter months. However commendable the majority of the buildings may be, there is a limit to their capacity, which has been decidedly overstepped.

Men who have, by their conduct in war and by their present disability, earned a perfect title to all the consideration now being shown them deserve something better than sleeping on floors or overcrowding in basements and attics, stair closets, and worse. They must be located, when received in such National Homes, in a way that is always creditable to the Government. The number of applicants who are entitled, under the law, to the benefits of the Home but can not gain admission, and the number of those who are sleeping in places not intended nor fully suitable for dormitories, can be learned approximately from the yearly reports. How to secure the speediest relief for these old and feeble and worthy men in time for them to profit by it deserves the most serious attention. The impression given at some of these Branches can not be too clearly presented. If there must be such a limitation to the expense that some things believed to be needed can not possibly get into the appropriation bill, doubtless all in authority will join in indorsing those items which will do the greatest good to the greatest number. When short of funds and a choice must be made, the items of first importance at these Branch Homes are food, raiment, and lodging, especially in this winter weather. Everywhere there was talk of the unprecedented pressure for admission to the Home. It may be worthy of consideration if, under these exceptional circumstances, the expedient of the Hampton, Marion, and Washington Homes of giving outside commutation may not merit temporary adoption.

The march past of hundreds of these old veterans, arrayed still in their country's uniform and showing the martial spirit and training of their youth, was a most creditable display both to the men themselves and the Republic which they are citizens of; and the pathos of the ceremony was noticeable.

In conclusion, I desire to express my gratification—at witnessing how much has been done, and wisely, for our disabled old soldiers, and to invite particular attention to the enthusiasm, zeal, and general efficiency of the officers conducting the affairs of the Branch Homes, and to the marked economy and efficiency which have been attained in the matters most nearly affecting the welfare or comfort of the members. The efforts in this direction deserve to be heartily sustained, and it is indubitable that the policy of Congress will be faithfully accepted and loyally carried out. Certainly this is the first desire of this Department.

The SECRETARY OF WAR.

After inspecting the hospital, grounds, and buildings of the Branch, and hearing the complaints and applications of such members as desired to appear before it, the Board proceeded to the Western Branch, and reconvened on June 22, 1895.

After inspecting the grounds, buildings, and hospital of the Branch, and hearing the personal complaints and applications of members who appeared personally before it, the Board proceeded to the Pacific Branch, and reconvened on June 29, 1895.

JUNE 29, 1895.

On motion, there was appropriated, from any fund available for the purpose, a sum not to exceed \$5,000 for the purpose of completing the pitchen and furnishing an ice plant at the Pacific Branch.

On motion, the governor of the Pacific Branch was authorized to renew the bath tubs in the barracks at that Branch, cost of renewal to be charged to repairs and the expenditure to be reported as an emergency.

The usual inspection of the grounds, hospital, and buildings of the Branch was made, and the complaints of such members as desired to appear before the Board in person were heard.

BATH, STEUBEN COUNTY, N. Y., November 30, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of the inspection of the seven Branches of the National Home and the Soldiers' Homes of twenty-two States. The Inspector-general, Col. E. F. Brown, inspected the Pueblo Branch of the National Home and the State Homes of California, Oregon, Washington, and North Dakota, and his interesting and instructive reports are included herewith. The State Homes of Kansas and Colorado were inspected by Capt. D. O. Goodrich, of the Western Branch, and his reports will indicate the thoroughness of his examinations. My own reports are of the inspection of six Branches of the National Home and sixteen State Homes.

In the performance of this duty I have been mindful that the ultimate purpose of the law requiring these reports is for the information of Congress through the Annual Report of the Board of Managers of the National Home.

I have found that the methods and accounts of the treasurers and other responsible officers of all the Branches that I have inspected were personally and thoroughly examined by the general treasurer of the National Home, and that his constant supervision was close and exacting to a degree, therefore it seems unnecessary that I should repeat or add to the special reports which I have made to the president touching these subjects. Believing that Congress may be well assured of the conscientious care, rigid economy, and strict conformity to prescribed purposes in the disbursements of public money by the Board of Managers, and that it would therefore be chiefly interested in information concerning the beneficence resulting from its appropriations, I have endeavored in this and previous reports to present a clear view of the conditions which surround and sustain the disabled volunteer soldiers in their Homes. The essentials of life—food, clothing, shelter, and hospital service—have received my first consideration, and nothing that tends to lighten the mental and physical burdens of disease or of the infirmities of old age has been overlooked.

The annual reports of the managers of State Homes furnish interesting details of their growth and development.

Attention is respectfully invited to the summary and résumé at the end of the reports on State Homes. Therein some deductions touching faults of the administration of soldiers' homes and concerning some of their general social effects may be found worthy of consideration and, with your approval, suggestive of remedial legislation.

The medical reports of the treatment of certain diseases, generally regarded as incurable, are quite worthy and excellent when the lack of means and skilled force and the want of a competent medical director are considered.

The descriptive lists of members admitted during the year close this report.

NATIONAL MILITARY HOME, OHIO, *June 17, 1895.*

There has been no unusual increase or decrease of population at any special time during the year. The pressure for admission seems to be still on the increase, the Home having been taxed to its full capacity almost during the entire year, and the gates having been closed against admissions except at short intervals.

The largest gain was for May, 1895, 196. As usual the largest number of furloughs have been granted immediately after the payment of pensions, in June, 1894, and March, 1895; losses by furlough between June 25 and July 10, 1894, being 151, and between March 25 and April 18, 1895, 261.

The year has been an extremely dry one. According to the meteorological reports (gleaned from newspaper reports) the rainfall in this

section of the State has been 19 inches below the annual average during the past year. The water in the lakes has fallen to a low level, and the springs have gone nearly dry.

The number present added to the number of vacant beds (51) shows the dormitory capacity of the Home to be 4,816. In the winter season the Home is overcrowded, and some members have to sleep on floors. The necessity for shades to the 2,068 windows of the barracks, which has been spoken of in former reports, yet remains strikingly apparent. This necessity appears in a consideration of the propriety of securing a proper seclusion to members when dressing or undressing, by preventing a view of the interiors on the east and south sides, besides the comfortable and home-like appearance the window shades would lend to the interior. Shades of a serviceable kind would cost, I am informed, about \$700. The expenditure would be under the fourth head, "Household," but the funds under this head have been short for two or three years. This, I understand, is owing to the estimate for fuel, \$70,000, having been cut down to \$50,000. This latter sum was sufficient so long as the fuel was natural gas, but when the gas gave out the appropriation was not increased to \$70,000, which is the cost of coal fuel actually consumed. Fifteen per cent of the cost of fuel this year, it was stated, would have to be paid from the post fund, which belongs to the members, and portions of it would be necessarily charged off to subsistence and hospital. The cost of the fuel in preparation of the cooked ration, it would seem, should enter into the account of cost of subsistence, but it is not provided that the cost of any fuel shall be charged to either subsistence or hospital. The straits which have ensued, it is asserted, have prevented the purchase of many necessary things from the appropriation for household, such as window shades, which have been recommended. As an illustration of the straits referred to, it may be mentioned that a store box, with shelves, is reported as doing duty as a bureau in an officer's quarters for want of funds to purchase proper furniture.

The inspector of this Branch makes an inspection of one or more barracks daily, and an individual personal inspection of four to six companies of the members every Sunday morning. Among his special duties is the supervision of the discipline of the camp, and the clothing of the members, and of all repairs, and the disposal of condemned property.

DISCIPLINE.

Under a State law which was enacted about a year ago, all the saloons within a mile and a half of the Home have been closed, and the traffic in liquors driven beyond that distance, which has diminished the tendencies to disorders and promoted good discipline. The bichloride of gold cure is holding its own, or a large percentage of its own, but a small percentage of stagglers having fallen out of the line of temperance promoters. The reclamation of some of the most dissolute members of the Home has justified all the work and expense that has been incurred. Fifteen dollars are paid by the men for the cure, one-half of which goes to the remuneration of the doctor who administers the treatment and the other half to a fund for the support of a club formed of the "graduates" of the cure. Three hundred and eighty-five members have been treated, and there are 231 members of the club in good standing.

The additions and repairs throughout the Home during the year have been necessary and extensive to floors, windows, porches, doors, and wire fencing, and the repainting of officers' quarters, and nine barracks, and an out-ward of the hospital.

The disabilities of the patients are, of course, mostly chronic, and as to the number afflicted, appear in the following order: Diseases of the kidney, cardiac afflictions, pulmonary complaints, and rheumatism. The convalescent quarters have occupants whose chief diseases are paralysis in all its forms and the exhaustion of senile degeneration. Last year at this date the number of sick in hospital was 551. The winter was severe, with storms and extreme cold. It was difficult during the colder days and nights to keep a comfortable temperature. There have been no epidemic diseases, excepting a recurring attack of la grippe, which came a little later than usual—in February and March. There were no deaths from it except when complicated with other diseases which would have been fatal without it. There were about 300 cases of it. The hospital staff now consists of three assistant and two acting assistant surgeons, namely: Drs. S. E. Ellis, R. S. Gaugler, W. W. King, R. A. Elliott, and C. E. Reed. An oculist is employed who visits the hospital twice a week and has the assistance of one of the medical staff. The same number of nurses, one superintendent and twelve trained women nurses, are employed as last year, but their inadequate and unsecluded quarters, the condition of which I reported last year, have not yet been improved. Twenty-eight insane members were sent to the Government Hospital for the Insane on April 18, 1895, and there are now about half a dozen more whose minds seem irreparably affected. Very few members sent to the Government Hospital for the Insane ever return here; only two have returned in the last two years and one of them it was necessary to return to the Hospital for the Insane. The other took his discharge from this Home. Reports are received quarterly from the Government Hospital of deaths and recoveries.

The entire present capacity of this hospital is required. There are 34 vacant beds, but this number is the result of a daily struggle with those members who are too ready to surrender to their infirmities and to give up life outside the hospital. Some beds must be kept vacant in order to be ready to meet exigent and unavoidable requirements. There are enough feeble members in convalescent quarters to fill the vacant beds who should ordinarily be there, but their exigencies are not so imperative as those which may be and frequently are presented. The surgeon reported that the average age at death has increased during the past year, and will probably be above 66 years. The regular annual report of June 30 will show if this estimate be correct. There have been 306 deaths this year up to June 10, while last year the deaths in the same time were 352.

HAMPTON, VA., August 28, 1895.

The first and most lasting impression made upon a visitor to this Home is that it is overcrowded. One need not inspect the interiors of dormitories or of barracks to establish this conviction. It is manifest out of doors. A glimpse of the restricted area so fully occupied with buildings and the appearance of members in contiguous groups, sitting or standing, and with little activity, exhibit a want of room for comfortable dispersion and healthful exercise. If the 30 acres of flats that are exposed at low tide in front of the Home were reclaimed from the sea the walks of the infirm old members would be extended and their daily life expanded into an ideal environment. The cost of such a reclamation would not exceed \$40,000, and its ultimate intrinsic value would be not less than five times that amount.

RECORDS.

An examination of the books in the governor's office showed comprehensive and accurate records of the members with one exception. In the historical record book "Admission papers" were not specified nor described, the effects of deceased members were not noted nor the disposal of them recorded. The place of burial was also not recorded. The records of these matters could be found in other books, to be sure,

but this historical record book has been carefully designed to be an epitome of all other records, and, if securely preserved by the Government, the military, domestic, and home history of every member of a Soldiers' Home may be found therein from his birth, and, if he has died in the Home or his death has been reported to the Home, his history should extend to his grave. A century hence, when descendants of the disabled soldiers, who have been members of the Soldiers' Homes of to-day, shall be inclined to trace their genealogy they may find a complete and reliable history of their progenitors in these volumes. The historical importance of this record has hitherto escaped the observation of this and a few other Homes, but when their attention has been called to it they have all promised that it shall be made and kept complete.

INSANE.

There is a class of beneficiaries here requiring from charity the kindest consideration, who are a serious embarrassment to the Home and a pathetic reproach to the Government that brings them to a place where they can not and do not receive the attention and treatment which their forlorn condition demands. There are 21 totally insane and 43 with impaired cerebration—a total of 69 members who should be in some institution specially designed for their care. Whenever any of the insane who have been sent to the Government Hospital at Washington from the Branches of the National Home are said to be cured by the hospital authorities they are sent down to this Home. Sixteen such members were sent here previous to June 30, 1894, and 24 since. Of this number 4 have been returned to the Government Hospital, and after the lapse of months sent back to the Home to be again returned to the Government Hospital. The recreation and reading rooms of the hospital of this Home are now crowded with this class of unfortunates to the discomfort and deprivation of the sane patients. These rooms are on the second floor, and, while admirably fitted for the use of the invalid members who are able to move about, are wholly unfit and dangerous as dormitories for insane and imbecile men. One crazy man ended his life within the current year by jumping out of a window. One was very violent, threatening to kill the surgeon. Some require constant restraint or confinement. This feature of the population is conspicuously opposed to a correct idea or proper purpose of the Soldiers' Home. The insane and demented at any Home impair and obstruct the beneficence it was designed to bestow. It would seem proper that Congress should be asked to provide a separate and an adequate institution for the care of these unfortunate men who may be found in almost every Soldiers' Home, both National and State.

QUARTERS.

The main building was found very much out of repair. The plastering had fallen off the ceilings and walls in many places, and even the lathing was frequently broken. The closets, bathrooms, and lavatories, owing to the faulty character of the plumbing and want of cleanliness, were in a reprehensible condition. On the ground floor there is an interior room containing six beds which is called "the dark room," and where the ventilation is bad. I advised the occupants to leave it open and to remain out of it during the day as much as possible. The lower floors were tolerably dirty and the upper ones fairly clean. The beds, bedding, and lockers were in good order. The lava-

tories were amply supplied with clean towels. The seven hundred occupants were well dressed, and in their person and clothing they appeared neat and clean. Without exception their disabilities, upon close inspection, could not be questioned. The governor said he had a sufficient appropriation to make the necessary repairs in the main building, and was going to do it immediately. He also proposed to expend from the post fund the necessary amount, not to exceed \$1,000, to renew the plumbing throughout the building. It is the most exigent necessity in the Home outside of the hospital. The new barracks were in excellent order, well lighted and ventilated. An old isolated building, in which Company H is domiciled, has no lavatory or water-closets. They could be supplied at an inconsiderable cost. The convalescent quarters were in such a generally bad condition as to plumbing and cleanliness that I made a special report to the president upon the subject. The tents, with their walls looped up, and a neat, old-time soldierly arrangement of furniture, seemed most comfortable in this seaside climate. The "sick-call" quarters are in a part of the old building occupied as convalescent quarters. The principal room is on the ground floor, with table for assistant surgeon near windows opening southward. In the afternoon it seemed to me too dark, but I was assured that it was light enough in the morning. There are comfortable settees on which twenty-five or thirty members may sit while waiting. Adjoining was a dressing room, which, though not equipped with modern furniture, answers its purpose very well. It was attended by a man who has been employed as a dresser of wounds for seven years at this Home. He seems zealous and faithful, and exhibits his stores of dressings and appliances and the bathing and spraying in a manner that shows his knowledge of and aptitude for his work. When sick call is over he goes to the hospital to dress wounds and sores that can not be properly intrusted to women nurses. The metal footbath in the dressing room should be enlarged.

Behind the dressing room is a small, dilapidated, dark apartment, which is used as a laboratory, where tests and compounds are made. A rude and untidy dispensary for medicines in every-day use occupies the rear of the sick-call room. The attention required by the wounded and disabled members of so large a Home should receive more careful consideration than some of the means inspected would seem to indicate.

BARBER SHOP.

In another part of the same old building the barber's shop was visited. There are seven barbers employed. The chief barber receives \$17.50 per month and fees from pensioners. His charges are \$1 for 13 shaves. Nonpensioners are shaved without charge.

HOSPITAL.

From a close inspection of the hospital the inference is easy that the present surgeon, who assumed his office at the beginning of the year, has given zealous attention to his duties. Considering the obstacles he had to overcome, the lack of proper records, instruments, nurses, pharmacist, methods, and discipline, the progress already made is notable and commendable. It was impracticable for him to inaugurate any considerable improvements until after the special inspection ordered by the president was made last April. Since that time—about four months—two internes have been employed, an equipment of instruments has been supplied, although a proper case for their care and keeping

has not yet been obtained; records have been established, a rearrangement of the sick has been made, new baths and toilet-room furniture have been installed, a competent and experienced pharmacist has been engaged, trained women nurses have been brought in touch with the helpless, cleanliness has become a habit, windows are partly curtained, and, in short, the foundations of a correct administration have been properly laid. One great incubus yet oppresses the hospital like a nightmare. In its very heart, where weary invalids who were able to walk about might receive fresh impulses of life from reading, music, and quiet recreation—the rooms intended for such beneficent purposes—are filled with the unavoidable throng of crazy and imbecile men heretofore mentioned in this report. A serious and persistent consequence is that little recreation is found by invalids in the halls and corridors, and constant care is required to prevent their encroachments upon the offices and sick wards.

The number of sick in hospital was 468. The caretaking of the nurses, and especially the distribution of diet by them, was observed with pleasure. The ward in the eastern basement requires a bath and water-closet, which should be supplied without delay. The medical stores have been assembled in the room below the pharmacy and a schedule of all of them has been made; but the quantities on hand have not yet been ascertained or noted. It was promised that an invoice of stores on hand should be made and that a careful record of issues should be kept. The additional construction and modifications which were ordered last April have been delayed, it was said, by waiting over a month for the necessary brick and iron.

NEW BARRACKS.

Work had been commenced on the new barracks and the foundations of one of them were about 4 feet above the ground. The contract for the construction requires them to be completed by December 1. They will each have a dormitory capacity of 200.

COMMISSARY.

This department was found in excellent condition. The dining hall and kitchen were in their usual good order. A register of all meals is kept constantly up to date so that the ration served on any day in the past may be ascertained. A test of its accuracy was made by comparing it with the record of issues in the commissary's office of a few days in June.

QUARTERMASTER.

A large amount of unserviceable clothing and other property in this department was examined and condemned. The care with which the property was assorted and stored was commendable. A new and adequate storehouse is very much needed.

BEER HALL.

No checks are used and no "cash register" of sales. A registering turnstile, of which the treasurer holds the key, keeps the count of the number of men who pass through, each one of whom pays the price of a glass of beer before passing. The Anheuser beer of best quality is used. It costs \$3.25 per half barrel, in which there are 200 glasses. The receipts amount from \$75 to \$350 per day, according to the season of

the year, and also according to its relation to pension pay day. Every day between 1 and 2 o'clock p. m. the cash receipts are turned into the treasurer and a voucher taken. The beer is of the best, tends to keep the members from wandering outside of the Home, and the profits go to the post fund for their benefit in many ways.

TREASURER.

The books of the treasurer were examined and the balances on hand under each fund and under every head with bank certificates of deposit were found and forwarded to the president. My attention was called to a sample mosquito bar and the specifications for the same from the Quartermaster-General's Office, United States Army. The preferred price mentioned by the deputy quartermaster-general was \$1.04 1/2. Eight bids were shown me by the treasurer for the bar in accordance with sample, the lowest of which was 80 cents. The treasurer will purchase 500 for the hospital and 700 to be sold to members in barracks at cost.

In a visit to the new national cemetery provided for the Home it was seen that nearly one-fourth of the 5 acres have been already occupied by about 600 graves.

NATIONAL MILITARY HOME, *Leavenworth County, Kans., June 22, 1895.*

But little more in the way of construction remains to be done to complete this Home in all respects. Its general appearance from the railway station at the foot of the slope on its western front is in every way worthy of a national institution and of the beneficent purpose it represents. For half a mile along the elevated plateau stands an imposing array of dormitory buildings of pleasing architecture, enlivened with rifts of climbing ivy and surrounded with lawns and shrubbery. The most notable object in view to the right, on the southern flank, is the gray stone chapel, with bold and picturesque sky lines, perched on the brink of the slope, which affords opportunity for its two auditoriums, Protestant and Roman Catholic, one above the other. To balance this attractive feature there is reared to the left, on the northern flank, a grand and lofty music stand of oriental splendor, while half way down the slope and midway between the flanks a broad lodgment sustains a circular artificial lake with an electric fountain in its center. Accessory and appropriate embellishments of great vases of flowers and vines are symmetrically disposed upon and above the acclivity on either hand. Six or eight large and bright pieces of artillery, in battery, crown the crest in front of the center and lend a fitting

military character to the institution.— Beyond the hospitals and "Old Men's Building," at the southern end, a deep artificial lake, with a fountain in the center and surrounded with grassy banks, refreshes the eyes of invalids who frequent the hospital porches. At least twice a week its banks are covered with reclining old soldiers, who have hobbled forth to listen to the music of the Home band playing in a graceful pagoda standing on piles out in the water, and to watch the boats and gondolas, which, with the throngs of carriages from Leavenworth, lend life and motion to the entertaining scene. Little or nothing of the cost of the chapel, band stands, lakes, and fountain has been furnished by the United States Government. The Government established the Home, and about 75 per cent of its members are pensioners. The indomitable energy of the governor, exerted in the suppression of intemperance among the members and in wisely supplying such reasonable wants at the Home as would leave no tendencies to spend and waste their money in the shops and saloons of neighboring towns, has led to a saving which has enabled him, under the supervision of the Board of Managers, to make this Home a memorial of the beneficence of the nation worthy to challenge the admiration of the generations who will follow.

When the chapel was completed and ready for occupation its consecration was attended with impressive ceremonies in which prominent church men and women from a large section of the surrounding country assisted with vocal music, flowers, and appropriate gifts. According to the testimony of the chaplain it is distinctly noticeable that advancing years with accompanying infirmities seem to conspire with the great temperance-reform movement inaugurated by the governor of the Home to awaken and strengthen the religious inclinations of the members, so that the convenient and admirable chapel receives the highest appreciation, as shown by its auditoriums being crowded for standing room at the Sunday services. Father Kinsella, who has succeeded the lamented Father Finn, assured me that his auditorium is never without some members at prayers at all hours of the day and evening.

SUBSISTENCE.

An inspection at dinner time showed the usual good order and discipline by which 1,080 men were able to enter the dining hall and take their seats in a trifle over one minute after the signal was given. The food was bountiful and appetizing, and the cleanliness of the kitchen and furniture, even to the slop tank, was noticeable and evidently habitual. The cold-storage rooms had been enlarged and improved, and by adding a story above them, room for a clerks' mess was provided, which was formerly in a corner of the kitchen.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The great necessity for a proper storeroom for clothing, such as most of the Branches are supplied with, has been reported during the last three years, but remains unsatisfied. It is about the only important thing yet to be done in construction to complete this Home. The severe weather of last winter demonstrated the want of an increased heating power. It is contemplated to increase the boiler capacity by replacing the seven small boilers of 350 horsepower, by four 200-horsepower water-tube boilers, which would be an increase of 450 horsepower. When this is done there will be a total capacity of 1,400 horsepower.

TREASURY.

The general treasurer was making a thorough and rigorous examination of the treasurer's accounts and methods.

HOSPITAL.

There were 227 sick shown on the surgeon's records, which number was made up as follows: 100 in hospital; 38 in "old men's building," of whom 13 were temporarily at post and not counted as sick in adjutant's office; 7 insane, and 73 in convalescent wards. The hospital in its wards, dining room, storerooms, pantries, and closets was clean and bright. The comfort of abundant light and air, and the absence of any hospital odor was generally apparent. The new operating room is well lighted by day but not so well by night. There is a good supply of surgical and meteorological instruments, with the exception of a wind gauge, which is needed. Three meteorological observations are made daily—8 a. m., 2 and 9 p. m. It has been noted that in a majority of cases of rheumatism and in one case of asthma an east wind invariably aggravated the disease, and markedly so when the air was approaching the maximum of saturation at the temperature prevailing. The dressing room for wounds is entirely too dark for that kind of work. It is not properly furnished and is in every way unworthy of the hospital. It is now also used by the surgeon at sick call. It is unfit for any use where plenty of light and fresh air are required. The plan and structure of the hospital afford opportunities for good dressing rooms which are now used for other purposes. It is marvelous that many thousands of dollars should be expended in the construction and equipment of a hospital and that the very rooms where all this beneficence is first brought in touch with the beneficiaries should be in a dimly lighted and poorly ventilated basement. This will be remedied here if my suggestion be carried out. The cold storage for meats is wholly inadequate and inefficient for the purpose. It was promised that this would be enlarged and improved. To bring an appearance of home comfort, half curtains should be provided for the windows of all wards. They are now to be seen in only one ward. The need of trained women nurses in this hospital is painfully apparent. The assistant surgeons have for a long time been obliged to perform the ordinary duties of dressing wounds and sores, for which essential work trained nurses should be provided. The assistant surgeons have not now sufficient time for the careful study of chronic diseases, nor even for the reading of the latest current professional literature. The surgeon in charge, although enjoying a high personal and professional reputation has had but a brief experience in the administration of a hospital, and the want of a fully equipped hospital staff prevents him, in a great measure, from bestowing that tentative, persistent attention upon the details of practice and study which might result in progress. The good order and absolute cleanliness of the dining room and kitchen are very creditable to the energetic and industrious matron. Means for the immediate isolation and seclusion of patients afflicted with contagious diseases should be provided—some small, cheap structures which might be destroyed after use.

NATIONAL HOME, Milwaukee, Wis., June 20, 1895.

There have been a number of most important constructions and improvements made at this Home during the past year. The most notable, necessary, and economical is the new boiler and heating plant established down the slope south of the Home. It consists of a boiler house, 105 by 50 feet, a spacious coal room, and a chimney stack 130 feet high, with a 7-foot flue. The foundations have been carefully secured, especially of the stack, which does not show the slightest crack or deflection, although its weight is 750 tons. Two Babcock and Wilcox water-tube boilers are already installed, to which will be added the serviceable boilers which have been in use. Each of the new boilers have 108 4-inch tubes 18 feet long, and will carry 175 pounds pressure each, equivalent to 208 horsepower, nominal. The entire plant as planned and constructed may be easily amplified and augmented to 2,000 horsepower. The plant is fireproof and will, when in operation, do the work of the 9 dispersed boilers which have been uneconomically operated for several years in inconvenient places not devoid of danger. It will be connected with the buildings of the Home

through a tunnel 535 feet long with branches. The cost of the building and stack was \$11,000. It will permit the barracks and hospital to be properly ventilated. The important requirement of furnishing electric light to the Home may be satisfied by it also. The annual cost of illuminating gas to the Home is now about \$7,000.

SOCIAL HALL.

A conspicuous contribution to the social comfort of the members has been made during the year in the erection of a new building just south of the main barrack. It is 80 by 40 feet and has three stories, including the basement. The main hall on the middle story is appropriately furnished for the use of the Keeley League, and the upper story equally well furnished and decorated for meetings of Grand Army posts, while the high and well lighted basement holds four billiard tables, a pool table, and a table for other games.

COMMUNARY DEPARTMENT.

The storage of substances was in excellent order and clean. The brightness of the dining room, kitchen, and storerooms was admirable.

HOSPITAL.

The surgeon in charge was appointed April 1, 1895, and he has two assistants, an experienced matron, a capable pharmacist, and a corps of eleven trained women nurses. The pharmacist is a young man of 25 years, who has a certificate and seven years' experience. The exact order and brightness of the dispensary and the manifested ability to trace any prescription to the patient, the care of poisonous drugs and the precautions taken in their administration, revealed the good qualifications of the pharmacist, as well as the excellent record and supervision of his work. The general cleanliness of the hospital and its dining room were immediately noticeable. Many improvements made during the last year were very marked. The operating room had been enlarged, lighted, and properly plumbed. The obnoxious old bathrooms on the second story had been cleared and cleaned, and the wretched men who once occupied them as dormitories had been removed to proper quarters, and the rooms are now used for their legitimate purposes. The water-closets had been repaired, replumbed, and renovated so as to make them acceptable.

There were 134 sick in hospital and 87 in convalescent ward. The records of sick call and of prescriptions were well kept. The "Old Men's Building" had only two vacant beds. The old men domiciled here live quite independently of camp, having their own dining room, kitchen, and all conveniences. Their apparent comfort and content is one of the most pleasing features of this Home. Their food is adapted to their wants and to their impaired powers of mastication, and, although prepared with particular care, costs less per capita than the general daily ration of the camp.

The winter here was not regarded as severe. The influence of Lake Michigan ameliorates the extremes of temperature. There was the usual recurrence of la grippe, the onset of which occurred early in the winter, and it lasted through the spring. The general treasurer of the National Home, as usual, was making a thorough examination of all accounts.

Within a swampy, rocky, and uninviting environment, 5 miles removed from any view of the valley of the Kennebec River, any improvement in the buildings or grounds of this Home is certain to be appreciated. The construction and perfecting of roadways and walks, the growth of shade trees, shrubbery, and flowers, along with the building of a larger hospital, memorial hall, chapel, railway station, and a fine new power house and steam plant, with other constructions and additions, have so satisfactorily met the most pressing necessities of the Home that its seclusion is forgotten in the surprise of its attractive comforts. There are several important wants yet to be supplied, such as a proper storehouse for quartermaster property now stored, at the increased expense of attendance and the risk of waste, in four different places; and the removal of a tottering old barn, which is so situated that in case of fire it would put a large amount of property in peril.

RECORDS.

The record books of the governor's office were examined, and with the exception of some minor faults, the correction of which was promised, they were in good order and safely secured from loss by fire or otherwise.

TREASURER.

A thorough inspection of the treasurer's, quartermaster's, and commissary's offices and accounts had been recently made by the general treasurer of the National Home, the admirable effects of which were

apparent in the enlightenment of the officers regarding the proper methods and forms of conducting their business. The condition of their funds and a statement of their balances at the time of my inspection, together with some other matters connected with their duties, were made the subject of a special report to the president shortly after my visit.

QUARTERS.

Some important changes in the furniture of the dormitories in the main building have been made, the chief of which was the substitution of lockers in place of the chests or boxes heretofore used. The lockers are 30 inches high, 27½ inches wide, and 15 inches deep. The outside width of the bed being 30 inches, the interposition of the locker between the heads of beds, together with the allowance of space required in making them up, compels a separation of beds about equal to their width, which separation before the change had been reduced indefinitely, as the boxes, being under the beds, did not prevent it. An additional barrack of two stories, which will accommodate 40 beds, has been acquired by the conversion of the old bakery. It has been made quite comfortable by the installation of baths and water-closets on both floors. The new barrack now under contract for construction was inclosed and the lathers were at work on the inside walls and ceilings. It is cruciform in its plan, with gabled ends, and two stories high. Its capacity will be for 200 beds. No provision for ventilation has been made excepting that which will be afforded by two fireplaces on each story.

QUARTERMASTER.

There was a large quantity of unserviceable stores which it was desired should be inspected and condemned, and although the quartermaster had two days' notice to have the stores assorted in such order that they could be readily counted and their condition observed, yet when they were reported ready for inspection the stores were found in great disorder and in no condition for a proper inspection, and the schedules or invoices had not received the approval of the governor. The quartermaster exhibited a remarkable unreadiness in giving intelligent answers to questions regarding his department, and I regret to say that a proper sense of responsibility for property in his charge seemed lacking, as was shown in his evident expectation that an inspecting officer would sign a statement of the quantity and condition of alleged unserviceable stores without an opportunity to assure himself of the correctness of such statement by a personal examination.

Quartermaster's property is stored in four different places, one adjoining the Home store and under the same roof; another 400 yards distant from the first in an outbuilding quite unfit and unsafe for the purpose; a third place in Company D barrack cellar, and the fourth in the basement under the dining room, all inadequate and with a dangerous fire risk. The imperishable property on hand was shown on records, the last entry being for the week ending May 18, before the arrival of an invoice to-day. The perishable property book was posted up to include the week ending August 10, 1895. The invoice book, with inspection reports attached, was signed before approval and entry. A surplus of 25 blouses had been found in one invoice at time of inspection, May 20, and the incident reported to the inspector-general and general treasurer. It was claimed that no surplus had been discovered before.

COMMISSARY.

The capacity and convenience of the dining room and kitchen have been greatly increased by the improvements noticed as going on in my last report. The seating capacity at dinner in the main dining room is now 857; the noncommissioned officers and band have separate tables with 64 seats, making a total of 921. There is a good opportunity for the use of a light two-storied car on rubber-tired wheels to carry food to the dining room and bring the dishes therefrom. Time would be saved in serving meals and some breakage of dishes prevented by this method. A good bakery has replaced the old boiler plant in the basement below. The warming ovens in the kitchen were not as clean as they should be.

POST FUND.

The Home store was in fine order and clean. There is no cash register or record of sales. An invoice is made monthly of stock on hand, the value of which it was stated averages about \$2,800 per quarter. Receipts from the store and beer hall are turned into the treasurer daily, leaving \$25 in store and \$50 in beer hall for change. Tickets are sold for the purchase of beer, which, together with the known returns from the sale of a keg of beer, serve, it is claimed, as a reliable check on the cash received. The treasurer deposits the fund in bank as often as twice a week, sometimes oftener. The band and extra-duty men are paid once a month. The vouchers for expenditures agree with the cash in bank plus cash on hand. The restaurant at the railway station turns into the treasurer from \$175 to \$250 per month. There might be an improvement in the disposal of the swill beneath the kitchen.

POWER HOUSE.

The great boiler plant, consisting of a battery of six boilers of about 400-horsepower, in a fireproof building, is a credit to the Home and to the governor, who supervised and directed its construction and installation. The shops which adjoin it, very conveniently for the use of power, reveal only one fault; that is, the partition walls should have been carried up through and above the roof. Coal costs, delivered at Randolph, on the Kennebec, \$4.50 per ton, and its transportation to the Home, a distance of 5 miles, \$1.50 more, which latter item of cost seems very high. The conveniences for handling and storing the coal on arrival at the Home are simple and quite perfect.

The members are well clothed and the dormitories in good order, but a more careful attention to the cleaning of the floors, halls, and porches would not be out of place.

HOSPITAL.

ick in hospital, 194, and in convalescent company, 85; total, 279. A complete inspection revealed the usual thorough cleanliness, an affluence of sunlight and pure air, a prevailing aspect of confidence and content of the patients, and a cheerful, easy attention of the nurses and attendants. Where all these conditions are habitually maintained one may expect progress. And upon close observation and inquiry of every class of patients, it became evident that no condition had escaped the careful study of the medical staff, and that every coign of vantage had been seized and held in the battle for health, or at least for an

amelioration of suffering. And the inspection of the physical administration also disclosed no neglected point. Men afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis assured me of the improvement in their condition and detailed intelligently the effects of their treatment in the greater ease of respiration and riddance of sputa. An interesting ward was that containing 17 blind men, whose clothing and bedding were as clean and tidy as those of men who could see. Various devices for their instruction and entertainment were within reach and touch, some for reading and writing, yet inquiry convinced me that there was a good opportunity here for some other and better appliances for the use of the blind than are now furnished.

The wards occupied by the insane and imbecile were perfectly clean and comfortable in all parts. It is impossible, however, for them to have here the treatment they should receive. They can not be classified and separated as they should be, and the result must eventually be a steady descent of all to the same plane, and that the lowest of humanity. It appears inevitable that any individual tendency toward restoration among them must be overcome and lost in the deadly despondency or amid the insane and sometimes furious ravings from which there is no escape. I doubt if the soundest mind could endure a confinement of six months in these wards without impairment. Some of these talked to me for several minutes without disclosing any illusions, although the surgeon informed me what they were in each individual.

In the kitchen several utensils of aluminium were noticed which had been in use three months. Each was made of one piece of metal, without seams or joints, and was lighter and more durable than tinware. There were teaspoons of white metal nickel plated.

RECORDS.

The records of the hospital were found complete, accurate, and interesting. The means of making and keeping special or original data, for the recording of which there are no books or forms, must depend in every hospital on the ability and attention of the surgeon in charge, and there is no better evidence than such original data afford of the persistent and tentative work of the surgeon. In its absence no expectation or hope of progress may be entertained. During the last two or three years I have noticed a practice here that is in some manner adopted in other hospitals of the Home; that is, in the hospital record the space for a statement of the diagnosis of cases is not filled up whenever complications exist or symptoms conflict so as to interfere with a clear view in accordance with previous experience, but is left with only a general heading until the case is completed by recovery, incurability, or death. All symptoms and disabilities are recorded on a ward record sheet, with history, progress, and treatment, and when the case is completed the correct diagnosis is deduced and confirmed, by autopsy if necessary, and then entered on record book. By this practice, it would seem, the fullest benefits of experience are realized and fixed. In the hospital record are copied the statements of disabilities in unofficial certificates in black ink, and the disabilities found by the Home surgeon are recorded in red ink. The trimonthly report, which is required of the number treated at sick call, can not be made from the record book of camp sick call, as this record is ruled for quarters of a year and not for ten days. Neither can record or memorandum of treatment of any member at sick call be kept in this book, where no space is provided for it. Different methods have been used for noting

the date of treatment of any member at sick call. The Central Branch makes a date check on back of card; the Northwestern has a number on face of sick-call card for reference to memorandum book. The method in use here commends itself by its simplicity and accuracy. The back of the sick-call card is ruled horizontally into four spaces for the four quarters of the year and vertically into nine spaces for the ten-day periods in each quarter:

A member who presented his card for the first time on September 15 might have marked on its back in the proper place the figures 18, which would show that he was treated in the eighth period of ten days in the first quarter, the first figure denoting the quarter, the second the ten-day period in the quarter. A member presenting his card after the 20th of June would have it marked 49 in the proper place. With such an understanding of the meaning of the figures, I would suggest an improvement—that the card need not be ruled at all, and the quarter and ten-day period in each quarter could be indicated by the two figures used together, and a single card could be used for several years. The Death Record contains a brief of medical history, date, and cause of death. The record of urinalysis contains the findings of chemical analysis and microscopical observations, and is made immediately after the admission of any member to the hospital whose preliminary examination suggests its necessity. There have been some improvements made in the operating room of this hospital, which have increased its light and convenience. Considerable benefits have been derived from the use of Goelette's Faradic battery. The outside temperature and the temperature of each of the 18 wards is observed and recorded at 10 p. m. and at 1 and 4 a. m. daily, and a full meteorological record is kept, excepting of electrical conditions, concurrently with cases which are affected by its changes.

The secluded cemetery established upon a rocky elevation near the Home promises to be as enduring as the pyramids of Egypt. The entire cemetery, with its impressive monument, rests upon the eternal granite in which some of the graves were excavated. No agriculture, manufactures, or search for minerals will ever disturb this hard old solitude.

MARION, IND., June 18, 1895.

The new barrack is approaching completion, and it is expected to be finished by August 1. It will have a capacity, without crowding, for 164, and if crowded 40 more beds might be added. The total dormitory capacity of the Home when the new dormitory is completed will be 1,084, without crowding. At this time beds are placed along the middle of the wards, which restricts the space to an uncomfortable degree. It is fortunate that the present crowded condition, with the prospect of its aggravation by the pressure for admission, is to be met by the construction of two additional barracks, which, it is expected, will be completed before next winter. These will increase the capacity of the Home to nearly 1,300. The much-needed mess hall will also be completed before winter, and is expected to seat 960. It will have rooms above it, which will be devoted to society meetings and billiards.

The Stinson memorial building, intended for public meetings and entertainments, with a seating capacity for 600, is now nearly completed. Its cost will be \$9,183.39.

WATER.

About six months ago the seven driven gravel wells began to show a diminution of their yield, and it became manifest that a larger supply of water would be required. Steps were taken to sink wells down through the limestone, which is found here 140 feet below the surface, which may be penetrated 300 feet to a level where water is found that will

rise to within 40 feet of the surface. It is proposed to use a standpipe 18 feet in diameter and 125 feet high, which will give at all times an adequate supply with a sufficient pressure for all purposes. Bids have been made and accepted for the work and the construction required, which show that the cost will be about \$10,000.

FUEL.

The natural-gas fuel yet holds out, but with a diminution of the rock pressure of about 40 pounds. To be assured of a continued supply 232 acres of gas-bearing territory have been secured at a rental of \$100 per annum for the use of the Home as long as it may be required.

LIGHT.

With Welsbach burners the natural gas furnishes ample light throughout the Home.

QUARTEMASTER AND COMMISSARY DEPARTMENTS.

The conditions and capacities of these have not been changed since my last report. The quartermaster's storeroom is too small for the storage of clothing which has been worn. The laundry is well arranged for the economy and efficiency of labor, and was found in good order. The excellent condition and cleanliness of the power house reflects credit on the engineer employed. Natural gas is used as a fuel under the boilers, the pressure of the gas at the point of combustion being reduced to 2 ounces.

TREASURY.

The general treasurer was making a critical and thorough examination of the treasurer's accounts and methods at this Branch, as well as at all other Branches of the National Home.

HOSPITAL.

There were 184 sick in the hospital. No unusual experiences have occurred during the year excepting the annual recurrence of la grippe during the winter, which was manifested in about 100 cases, which lingered along until spring. As the hospital is destitute of meteorological instruments, no record of meteorological conditions was kept in concurrence with the records of diseases, as there should be. The new morgue has afforded opportunities for autopsical studies, some of which will be reported upon by the surgeon. Eight women nurses, mostly trained, are employed. Young women of the surrounding country who desire to make nursing their vocation are found useful at \$12 per month for the first year, when, if they have become efficient, their wages are raised to \$15 per month.

The rapid growth and symmetrical development of this Home have been extraordinary, and the prompt and pressing applications for admission to it since the first day of its occupation have demonstrated the correctness of the provision which suggested its establishment.

A careful, personal inspection of its members reveals general physical infirmities which seem to justify their titles to membership and sustain a belief that such care has been taken in their examinations for admission as to generally preclude any easy abuse of its beneficence.

SIR: In obedience to your verbal instructions, I have carefully examined the Pacific Branch, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, situated at Santa Monica, Cal., and herewith submit my report:

On arrival at the Branch on June 26, 1895, the president and the Board were received by the governor, officers, and members, and after a review and inspection of the men and the general workings of the institution, I was instructed to make a detailed inspection of the books, papers, etc., and report in writing to the president on completion of the duty. This inspection was commenced on the 2d day of July and completed on the 8th. Commencing with the

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE AND BOOKS PERTAINING THERETO,

It was gratifying to find that the regular books supplied from headquarters were being used, and no others. The Historical Register was found to be carefully and correctly kept, and was up to date in every particular. So also with the blotter for applications for admission, and there could be no mistake in the dates of application and no confusion as to the ones first entitled to be considered by the manager. The State Register was also in good form and up to date, and it is easy to find the number and name of all soldiers and the company, regiments, and States they served in. Letters, returns, etc., were entered in good shape, and the test of finding them by files was satisfactory. General, special, etc., orders were all entered to date.

The Pacific Branch is no exception to the rule that all the Branches have different ways of determining which orders are special and which are general, but all orders are entered in one book or the other and could be easily traced. Record of Members Discharged was nicely kept and up to date. Offenders' Docket seems to be kept carefully, and the rule as to arrests and trials properly followed. No member is placed in the guardhouse for punishment, only for safe-keeping while under the influence of liquor or awaiting trial. The Furlough Register is well kept up, and all members on furlough can be traced to the point from which they last asked for a renewal. The Death Record at governor's office appeared to have been overlooked, and was said to be kept in hospital. It was finally found, but was not kept with any regularity; the governor said it should be no longer neglected. All letters in letter books were well copied and indexed, and but a few minutes were needed to have any letter traced. The post returns were in excellent condition and the manner of conducting the process of obtaining information

was carefully considered, as, for instance, under the headings of Discipline, Employment, Health, Amusement, Civilian employees, and Miscellaneous, all received due care and attention and the results can be relied on as correct. The governor, adjutant, and serjeant-major have their offices in close proximity, and all the work is under the eye of the governor, who gives all close attention, and they all work harmoniously.

THE TREASURER'S OFFICE

was then taken in hand. The books and the manner of keeping them were first considered.

Check books.—On the back of each stub the form of page balance is printed and filled in with ink, which seems a good plan, and worthy of consideration by all the Branch treasurers. The weekly balance is entered in pencil on the margin, instead of the stamp. Complaint is made that the stamp form does not work satisfactorily, but it should be made to work, and the figures should be made in ink. I so said to the treasurer, who agreed with me, and said that it should be so done in the future.

Record of pension certificates.—This book is fairly well kept, and yet there are three other books in use, which the clerk in charge appears to think absolutely necessary, and in this he is sustained by the treasurer. The following reasons were given, in writing, by the clerk, and had the approval of the treasurer, to wit:

STATEMENT.

(1) One record book (ruled by hand) kept for convenience, showing pension certificates received, classified under the different laws, rates of pension, etc; also, in same book, table showing lapses by discharge, death, and transfer, giving rate, class, etc; also, in same book, table showing increase and decrease in rate, and changes from one class or law to another. (None of this information can be shown on regular Record Book.)

(2) Pension register, two volumes. No. 1, alphabetically arranged, containing record of pensions granted under act of June 27, 1890. No. 2, containing pensions granted under general law, Mexican and Indian wars. These are for convenience in making out quarterly vouchers and keeping them properly classified. (This classification can not be kept in regular Record Book.) The time occupied in keeping these additional records is more than saved in accuracy secured, convenience afforded, and avoids keeping loose memoranda.

This statement, prepared by the pension clerk at this Branch, I believe to be entirely correct, having personally looked into the matter since my attention has been called to it by Colonel Brown.

This has been carefully considered because of the objection of the general treasurer, Major Bermingham, to other than the regular books, and also because of the ruling as laid down in the appendix, Laws and Regulations, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, pages 29 and 30, which reads as follows:

No alteration in these new books will be made, and no additional books are to be purchased, except after said alteration, or additional books have been submitted for my action and approval.

I have been thus particular in this matter, as I have found a tendency in the Branches to the accumulation of books without adhering to this rule of the president, acting on their own motion and without authority. If these books are needed, proper authority should first be obtained.

Exhibit of contracts.—No record of the amount of the several contracts is entered in this book, and the excuse is made that the 10 per cent which may be added before completion of contract will change the amount. I advised that the amount of the contract be entered in all

cases, and that the percentage be added when required. I could see no good reason for entering a contract without giving the amount of same.

Record of transportation issued by Branches, managers, agents, etc.—This book is properly kept, although no transportation is sold to members or others at the Branch. Therefore, only that which comes from managers, agents, and original admissions is entered. The railroads sell tickets to members on presentation of certificates of officers, or on presentation of furlough, and other good evidences of membership in the Home, usually at half rates or less, for which the members pay at the station. I can see no good reason why this rule could not be adopted at all the Branches, and thus save the trouble of keeping transportation accounts with railroads and members of the Home. As the members traveling are usually pensioners and have the money to pay, why may they not transact their own business and thus save the Home the expense of a clerk or two, and be equally satisfactory to members and railroads.

Rates of fare.—This book is not kept; members make their own arrangements. Rates vary according to the rules and regulations of different roads. All compete for the soldier transportation and therefore are liberal to those who travel. Half rates are usually obtained, and often less.

Time book.—While this book is well and carefully kept, the manner of obtaining the time of employees is objectionable, and I so stated to the governor and treasurer. The plan adopted recently, and which Major Bermingham desires to make uniform in all the Branches, is to have the time kept by foremen and heads of departments, and for ten days, in a time book supplied to them for the purpose. At the end of ten days this time book is to be handed in to the time clerk (who is supposed to and should make up the pay roll). The time clerk enters the time so furnished by these foremen, etc., and returns the books, and so on every ten days to the end of the month. Then the monthly time is made up and carefully compared and examined by the time clerk, and the treasurer also must be satisfied of the correctness of the pay rolls, and be enabled to certify thereto.

It has been a rule of the Branch to have a monthly report, by the heads of departments, of the time kept by the foremen, etc., in detail. On reflection, I do not see the necessity or propriety of the extra blank and the labor to prepare it, for the reason that the time book is quite sufficient, and this unauthorized blank is therefore superfluous and useless, and I recommend its discontinuance, and let them depend upon the time books for checking errors, if any be detected.

A copy of this monthly report, to which I object, and in which objection the general treasurer concurs, is hereto attached, which shows the blank and the labor attending its preparation, which, to my mind, is a waste of time and labor.

Letter book.—The copying process is very imperfect and requires more care and skill in the work. I so advised the treasurer and he admitted the criticism, and promised immediate action and reformation in making copies of letters.

Papers, condition, how filed, etc.—All vouchers are properly folded and filed in good order, and are as well cared for as present conveniences allow. If suitable file boxes were provided, they could be kept much cleaner and free from dust. Other papers are properly filed and packed in open pigeonholes. They, too, would be better for the protection afforded by file boxes. Instructions to obtain such would be my advice.

Books in quartermaster's department and treasurer's office.—Imperishable property; perishable property. These books are the best kept of any I have examined at any Branch. The clerk, Mr. Kramer, who has charge of these books, is a neat penman, familiar with the work, and is a very competent man for the place.

Referring to the manner of issuing imperishable property, it has been the rule of the Branch to make requisition for all property, including that to be exchanged. This seems to be superfluous labor for officers and clerks, without the advantage of additional check or safeguard, and I advised that it be discontinued in future exchanges. Let the old property be exchanged for the new, and the quartermaster hold the old for the action of an inspecting officer.

Medical supplies.—These supplies, like others at this Branch, become property for which the treasurer (having no quartermaster) is responsible. Heretofore all these supplies have been received, inspected, and turned over to the surgeon in bulk. This, I advised both surgeon and treasurer, was improper, and as soon as suitable room can be prepared in basement of hospital it will be changed and issues to hospital made weekly, or oftener if desired, on requisition of surgeon, approved by the governor. This plan is in accordance with advice of General Treasurer Birmingham, and is working well at the Branches where it has been inaugurated.

Average prices list.—This book has not been opened at the Pacific Branch. I advised that it be done at once, and gave such instructions as I hoped would enable them to begin at once. I also advised that if further instructions were found necessary they might apply to the general treasurer for further information and advice.

Clothing books.—These are carefully and accurately kept, and the quartermaster-sergeant, Lieutenant Armstrong, is a very competent and efficient noncommissioned officer. All property intrusted to his care is well cared for. The issues are made on proper requisitions, and no garment is issued unless a corresponding worn-out one is delivered to supply its place. The storerooms are basements half above ground, dry, with plenty of air and light, and every way suitable for the purpose.

I wish to call attention to one feature of this Branch, to which I seriously objected, viz, no clothing or bedding are presented for the action of an inspector. They have heretofore claimed that when these articles were issued that was their final disposition, and they were treated the same as perishable articles. I tried to impress upon the treasurer the falsity of this position, and advised that hereafter all such articles be preserved carefully and presented for the action of an inspector, which he promised to do. A caution from the president of the Board might induce greater care on the part of both governor and treasurer.

Commissary supplies.—These are also in the hands of the treasurer, and he is held responsible for their care, as well as for the food and its proper preparation, both at general and hospital mess halls.

The immediate care of commissary stores is in the hands of the commissary-sergeant, Lieutenant Glasener, who is a very competent non-commissioned officer. The supplies are stored in the basement of the mess hall and are convenient to the kitchen. All are issued only on proper requisition, approved by the governor and the treasurer. The latter has the responsibility of attending to the details of supplying a sufficient quantity of good, wholesome food to the general mess hall and hospital mess hall. This duty requires frequent visits to the storerooms and to the kitchens and mess halls. After careful observation I am satisfied that Treasurer Upham fully appreciates the responsibility

and desires to act promptly and efficiently. No complaint came to me from any source, and I believe the members are well pleased with the quality, quantity, preparation, and serving of the food.

The Home having been so recently visited by the president and the Board of Managers, it would seem, perhaps, quite unnecessary for me to call attention to the general features of the Branch. I can not dismiss the subject, however, without some allusions to the improvements of the past year. The most prominent is the erection and completion of the governor's residence on the site of the one burned. This is a very complete and commodious building, and satisfactory to all concerned. The one barrack built last year adds to the capacity of the Home about 200 new members. The hospital, which was nearly completed, was fully so, and occupied during the past year, and is a very commodious and convenient building. The water supply was also perfected and is in fine working order. No complaint of lack of water was heard from any source, and this of itself is a cause for congratulation. The Home becomes more and more attractive year by year. The growth of trees, shrubbery, and grass is noticeable, and ere long there will be complaint of too much shade, rather than too little.

It is a real pleasure to note these rapid improvements of the country, and especially so on the grounds of the Home. Some years ago there was scarcely a tree or shrub in sight, while to-day the eye is attracted by views of orchards of every variety of fruit, including oranges, lemons, apricots, figs, English walnuts, apples, plums, peaches, cherries, etc., all in bearing. Also beautiful shade trees, shrubbery, and grass lawns. The elevated location of the Home gives the most enchanting view of sea, mountains, valleys, cities, and villas in the distance. The farm, outside the lawns and parks, is a source of considerable revenue, supplying abundance of vegetables and fruits for use of hospital and largely for the general mess hall; also all the hay and grain for use of the animals, and some to sell in addition.

The additional buildings to be erected this year, contracts for which were recently made, are one large kitchen, with ice manufacturing plant and cold storage; one barrack, to accommodate 100 men; also an electric-light plant to light the buildings and grounds and relieve the Home from the danger attending coal-oil lamps. This being a new and unfinished Branch, other additional buildings will be required, estimates for which will be submitted for your consideration and recommendation to Congress. At least three or four more barracks will be needed to accommodate the rapidly increasing numbers, and I hope these will be supplied at an early date.

The great interest attaching to this Branch is its climate, and no enthusiastic Californian can overestimate this feature, and the wisdom of the Board in selecting this particular locality has been conceded even by those interested in urging other points before this selection was determined upon and definitely settled.

In conclusion, I desire to state that all the officers of the Pacific Branch are active, earnest, and, apparently, thoroughly united in their efforts to do their whole duty and obey strictly every order and every expressed wish of the president and members of the Board of Managers.

SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE.

No Soldiers' Home has a more complete set of record books. They are properly kept up to date. They are models of neatness, and their safety, in a large fireproof, well-lighted vault, is absolute. In addi-

tion to these regular records the superintendent keeps a number of convenient abstracts which keep him informed of the condition of every account and of the current operations of all the departments.

INSPECTION OF MEMBERS.

When the members were turned out for inspection 179 were not able to take their places in the ranks owing to their disabilities. The men generally exhibited cleanliness of person and seemed well nourished, but their clothing lacked uniformity, particularly of trousers, and the entire suits of many were much worn and soiled. Only about 200 had on entirely new suits. Altogether about half of the men in the ranks were not dressed up to the average appearance of members in the National Home. At least three different shades were observed in the trousers. The flannel blouses, double-breasted vests, kersey trousers, and the shoes are furnished from the State prisons, at prices which were, respectively, \$3.87, \$2.25, \$3.25, and \$1.60, until the 1st of June this year, when, upon a strong representation which had been made to the State comptroller that those prices were from 30 to 35 per cent higher than such clothing could be purchased for outside of the prisons, the prices were reduced about 16 per cent. Until last February the pensioners in the Home were charged a part of the cost of their clothing, and there was collected from pensioners during the year \$1,865.15 in payment for clothing. On the 1st of February, 1895, this collection was stopped by an order of the board of trustees. The chief motive of this action was the selling of their clothing outside the Home by the men who had paid their pension money for it. Any consideration of this manner of doing business leads to the unavoidable deduction that the State prisons have been and are getting a profit from supplying the necessities of disabled volunteer soldiers in the Home. While it may be altogether proper that the penal institutions of the State should be self-supporting, or even that they should furnish supplies to the eleemosynary institutions at a profit, it would seem a little out of kilter with propriety that the State should derive a profit from an institution that is neither penal nor charitable, but founded on the rights of disabled soldiers to public support, and that over two-thirds of this profit, whatever it may be, must come from the aid bestowed by the National Government upon the Soldiers' Home lends to this business the character of a questionable conversion. If the clothing furnished from the prisons were of the quality and uniformity that is required, and furnished at the price it could be purchased for in the open market, there would be less reason for complaint. But it is a fact that there exist several obnoxious conditions; the members are not properly clothed, and there is not a sufficient supply of clothing on hand at any time to meet ordinary wants and exigencies. There are to-day only 15 blouses, 27 trousers, 13 vests, and 203 pairs of shoes on hand. There are no numbers 7 and 8 among the shoes—mostly large sizes in store. There is practically little or nothing of available clothing on hand. There are 347 suits of furlough mens' clothing in store, but it is not known what proportion was paid for by the men. The quartermaster thinks but little of it was paid for, as clothing has been issued free of cost to the members since the 1st of February. No money has been expended for overcoats for five years, and the winter season here is often severe. Last winter the temperature was frequently below zero. The quartermaster thinks, however, that two-thirds of the members have the heavily lined overjackets. At least 500 suits of uniform clothing are required here

now to properly clothe the members present. There was \$9,300.15 expended for clothing during the year ending June 30, 1895, as follows: First quarter, \$2,432.15; second quarter, \$2,357.50; third quarter, \$2,468; fourth quarter, \$2,042.50. The average number of members present during the year was 1,052. The total cost of a suit of clothing for this number, according to the prices which prevailed until June 1, 1895, would be \$11,540.44, so that over 200 men were unprovided for. An estimate for 200 suits of clothing has been made which, I am informed, will overrun the allowance for maintenance for the month of October about \$1,400. The comptroller limits the allowance for each month to one-twelfth of the appropriation for the year. There is a good supply of underclothing on hand for about 200 men.

QUARTERMASTER.

The multiplicity of accounts now required by the comptroller necessitates the use of two estimate books, each of 113 pages, every month, classified under 12 different heads. The treasurer's monthly report of receipts and expenditures is a book of 69 pages, containing an itemized account of all purchases and receipts in units of measurement and price per unit carried out in decimals. The quartermaster is also required to furnish monthly abstracts of all purchases and issues and a return of clothing. A similar set of abstracts and returns are required for subsistence and household stores, involving 171 pages. In addition to all this paper work, daily requisitions in triplicate must be made on the storekeeper, a new officer of the Home, for all articles required of every description, of clothing, subsistence, and household, signed by the person who receives them and approved by the superintendent.

COMMISSARY DEPARTMENT.

Considering the restricted capacity of the dining room and kitchen the food seemed well prepared and served. There were no criticisms regarding the food or its service so far as my inquiries extended, but there were some complaints of the rough manners and profane language of the sergeant in charge of the dining room. It was observed at the inspection at dinner time that after the members had taken their seats at table they were kept waiting fully five minutes while the sergeant in charge was looking up vacant seats and filling them. This was not good management. The vegetables consumed are mostly raised on the Home farm, and are of fine quality. A large quantity of sauerkraut was being skillfully manufactured from fine cabbage. The beef is obtained from the surrounding country, and costs from 6 to 6½ cents per pound.

The new dining hall, for which the need is so great, is progressing under a contract for construction. Its foundations are about 5 feet above ground. It will have a frontage of 123 feet and 4 inches, and a depth of 83 feet and 4 inches. The kitchen and bakery will adjoin it on its rear which will, unfortunately, bring them on the only conspicuous flank of the Home as seen from passing railways, and will also mask the view of the grand array of buildings, the noble avenues of trees, the shrubbery, flowers, and fountains from the nearest and most convenient point of observation by passing travelers. Perhaps the most serious regret will eventuate from the choice of this site for a dining room, kitchen, and bakery, when it shall be realized that the most beautiful and attractive feature to the members of the Home, the rippling river that flows through its grounds, in the like of which no other Home can

rejoice, will be forever partly hidden from the view of the Home itself. Aside from this violation of natural and unique aesthetic conditions, the consideration of the greatest consequence—that of having the dining room as near to the center of population as possible—seems to have been overlooked. The convalescent company next the hospital, which is generally composed of the most disabled members, will have the greatest distance to traverse to and from their meals without the possibility of sheltering corridors between their quarters and the dining hall. In its plan and construction there is already disclosed in the building of the foundation a very grave fault. At the threshold of each entrance there is a narrow flight of six stone steps with 8 inches rise and 9 inches tread, which the old soldiers, with increasing disabilities and infirmities, will have to climb and descend quickly to and from every meal as long as the Home and its dining hall shall be used. If the porches were flush with the thresholds the members could assemble around the entrances at their leisure and be ready to enter and take their seats without climbing any such flights and with the least delay. The porches could have been reached with greater ease by steps with 4 inches rise and 12 inches tread, like those in the Pension Office at Washington.

QUARTERS.

The dormitories were found somewhat crowded with beds. On a floor 110 feet by 32 feet there are 48 beds. The wire mattress is 30 inches wide, upon which is a hair mattress 2½ inches thick, 2 sheets, 2 pairs gray blankets, pretty well worn, but clean, covered with a brown figured bedspread of cotton. The hair mattresses were all fairly clean and elastic, a few soiled, but all are steadily renovated and recovered when needed. The hair pillows are of good size and thickness, the covers of which are renewed as fast as needed.

If the rule that beds should be as far apart as their width (2½ feet) were observed, there would be but 36 beds on a floor of these dimensions. There being 48 beds, the space between them is necessarily reduced to 15 inches. The heads of beds are arranged along the middle longitudinal line of the dormitory, leaving a passageway between them. The lockers are placed at the foot of the beds, leaving passageways about 6 feet wide along the walls. The dormitories of the central building contain some 60 beds each. When the old dining hall and kitchen have been converted into dormitories this congestion may be somewhat relieved.

HOSPITAL.

The hospital was quiet, clean, bright, and sunny, without an odor. At a glance it could be seen that discipline, good order, and strict cleanliness had been learned and were now in practice. It was observed that the trained women nurses appeared to understand their duties and responsibilities better, and were able to state the afflictions of their patients and their treatment. The ward prescription cases were neat and in good order. The schedules of prescriptions and diets were posted, and the proper ward records kept by the nurses. New blank charts had been procured for the strict record of such cases as invite study. Under the supervision of the matron the dining room and kitchen of the hospital have become models of speckless comfort. Crisp white tablecloths and glistening table furniture must pleasantly reinforce the appetite for food even when it is prepared in the largest, best equipped, and brightest hospital kitchen to be seen anywhere.

The baths and laundry, adjoining the hospital in rear, are also incomparably excellent in their structure and equipments. The toilet rooms of each of the wards, with their improved isolation, tiled floors, porcelain furniture, and odorless ventilation, are unsurpassed in efficient fitness. Every window in the hospital is fitted on the exterior with a fine wire screen the full size of the window, which not only prevents the intrusion of insects, permits the windows to be lowered or raised with freedom, but prevents anything being passed out of or into the interior. The record books are nearly complete, and will shortly be fully so. In order to make necessary observations and studies, in many cases a good microscope is required by the surgeon. In case of pulmonary tuberculosis for illustration, the surgeon is pursuing certain lines of treatment, on every point of which it is of vital importance that he should know the results as indicated in the sputa. It is impossible to see these results without a microscopic examination.

The operating rooms, as I have heretofore reported, is one of the best lighted and furnished in any Home, and the pharmacy is probably the largest. The latter was in mathematical order and perfectly clean. The dressing rooms were unusually well equipped, and a well-ordered storeroom completes one of the finest hospital establishments.

LABOR.

There are 50 citizens and 250 members employed. The wages of the citizens amount to \$1,958.34 per month. Among them are included the officers of the Home, a bookkeeper, clerk at headquarters, engineer, assistant engineer, and florist, all of whom are exempted from examination by the State board of civil service. A law passed by the legislature exempts veterans from civil service examinations up to \$4 per day, but I was informed the comptroller disregards this law. Among the citizen employees are 6 trained women nurses and 6 firemen. On examination of the list of citizen employees it seemed that some 15 or twenty of them might be replaced by members at lower wages. The wages paid to members during the year ending June 30, 1895, amounted to \$17,394.77.

POST FUND.

The receipts from the post exchange, including the store, aggregated for the year ending June 30, 1895, \$13,564.47, and is used in maintaining an excellent band of 18 musicians, whose salaries amount to \$415 per month, religious ministrations in the chapel and at funerals, books for library, magazines, newspapers, flags, and greenhouse.

KEELEY LEAGUE.

There are 150 members in good standing, present and absent, of whom about one-half are present. Three hundred and seventy-eight have been "graduated," of whom 20 were "graduated" the second time, leaving number of individuals graduated at 358. Of this number 190 have taken discharge or furloughs, and are presumably making their own living. Ten have died, 2 while absent and 8 at the Home. A resolution of the board of trustees was passed previous to the death of General Slocum, the president, which directed that none but temperate men should be employed on extra duty, and about 50 members of the league are so employed. It is reported by the officers of the league that a larger proportion of the graduates have been joining it of late. No charge is made for the first treatment, but \$20 is charged for the second.

CHAPEL.

Religious services are held in the chapel every Sunday by five ministers from the churches in the town of Bath, serving in succession, and attending funerals by selection. They are each paid \$300 per annum for their work, and they are furnished with a carriage for every service.

CEMETERY.

Nature has conspired with a well-disposed art in the establishment of the highly picturesque cemetery of this Home. Upon the rounded plateau, which is uplifted like a bosom of mother earth west of the Home, and through the evergreens that cluster around it, may be had glimpses of nearly a thousand white marbles standing in ranks around the commanding granite monument which marks the last resting place of the dead soldiers.

Throughout the inspection of the Home it was impressively apparent to me that additional strength was required in its administration. Every officer, from the superintendent down, is so completely engrossed with his own duties, which have been augmented by the burdensome paper work required by the comptroller, that the steady, close, and persistent supervision of every department of this large Home is impossible. General Rogers is a gentleman of the old school, and possesses the highest qualifications and largest experience for the office of superintendent, but his regular office work, with the inevitable infirmities that will come with increasing years, prevents him performing the daily duties of an inspector. But even with ample time and physical ability the superintendent of so large a home is entitled to the services of an inspector. In all the large Homes where such an officer has been added to the staff immediate and conspicuous benefits have followed. In selecting an inspector great care should be exercised to secure an officer having the physical ability to perform duties requiring considerable activity, and that he be endowed with the qualities of firmness, kindness, and justice, and, if practicable, with an experience as an officer or noncommissioned officer in camp or garrison life.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW YORK STATE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

BATH, N. Y., July 20, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The appropriation made by the legislature for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1895, was \$150,000 for maintenance, transportation of members, and ordinary repairs. The amount is \$10,000 less than the estimate furnished by the board of trustees.

As the State comptroller is now the financial manager of the Home, the expenditures will be kept within the sum appropriated and such other resources as may accrue, reaching probably \$160,000.

It may be asserted with confidence that the system adopted by the State is neither wise nor economical as far as this institution is concerned. The petty exactions resorted to in revising the monthly estimates to bring them within the average amount required for each month's expenditure in order to prevent an apprehended deficiency at the close of the year is what the comptroller's department is seeking to demonstrate that the system is one by which the State is largely to be benefited. Hence the State Soldiers and Sailors' Home, where economy of administration has been the recognized rule, is made to suffer for the extravagance which may have been found to exist in other State institutions.

As an important matter in the history of this Home it should be recalled that its superintendent, who had most to do with its establishment, and who had brought its administration to a high degree of excellence, was removed from his office in April, 1893, by a State executive who had been elected by a political party differing from that of his predecessor. The Board of Managers of the National Home, into whose provision for the welfare of disabled volunteer soldiers no political consideration in the selection of officers has ever been permitted to intrude, having fully recognized the admirable character and remarkable administrative abilities of the ex-superintendent, appointed him governor to the Pacific Branch of the National Home, where death had created a vacancy. It required only a year and a half of the new administration of the Illinois Home to produce a contrast of conditions with those of its previous administration which was so glaring as to

threaten a public scandal, and led to the retirement of the superintendent and the appointment of the present incumbent to that office. Captain Kirkwood assumed command on January 18, 1895. The population of the Home, present on that date was 1,123. It was easy to learn within the Home and from public knowledge that various disorders had grown up in and about the Home, which were chiefly attributable to the drunken and unruly conduct of a considerable number of members. The immediate and dishonorable discharge of about forty of the most unworthy and insubordinate men was one of the vigorous measures adopted by the superintendent to suppress the prevailing irregularities, and in a short time good order and an observance of the regulations of the Home were restored and maintained. At the first quarterly meeting of the board of trustees, March 4, 1895, a rule was adopted directing that all members who had been or should be absent from the Home more than one year should be discharged. Under the operation of this rule 87 absent members were discharged.

The present dormitory capacity of the Home is 1,125, but this could be increased if greatly needed to 1,200. Within the last three months it has been noticed that the applicants for admission are of a better class and show a larger proportion of native citizens. It is also observed that their infirmities are of a more serious character. The proportion of original admissions is increasing; that is, of men who were never in a soldiers' home.

DISCIPLINE.

The results of an exchange of discharge cards between Soldiers' Homes, which it has taken some two years to establish, is now realized as having the most potent and favorable influence upon the maintenance of discipline. The day before my inspection it was reported that seven dishonorably discharged members from other Homes applied for admission here and were refused, and one such appeared during my inspection. "Good-conduct passes" are given to all members in good standing, with permission to be absent each day from 6 a. m. until 8.30 p. m. The "Offenders' Docket" shows the examination of only four or five members at the superintendent's court each morning and sometimes none. This, in a camp of a thousand men, is a good showing. During the first month of the present administration the docket shows that sometimes from 35 to 40 delinquents were brought before the superintendent each day.

SUBSISTENCE.

The superintendent has inaugurated a system in the care and issuance of supplies which enables him to know daily the exact quantities and cost of all articles of subsistence expended the day before. The waste has been minimized and the classified and regularly made invoices show quantities and values on hand each day. This system effected a saving of \$6,000 in the first quarter of the current year, showing that amount less than the appropriation, and notwithstanding the large amount of purchases that have been made to replace worn-out machinery and materials there is a promise of a saving of about \$4,000 during the present quarter.

A visit to the cottages, each of which has its own dining room seating 32 members, was very interesting. Five minutes before dinner the cart for each cottage arrived at the receiving room and the contents—most appetizing roast beef and four different vegetables, with coffee, all hot—were quickly placed on the tables, upon which the cleanest and

brightest furniture was to be seen. The head waiter was observed taking pains to place in readiness special diet in three or four places. The members, as they quietly walked in from their rooms at the signal, seemed all old and infirm, some crippled, but clean and cheerful. This mode of living has a great advantage to old men. There is no limit to the time occupied at table; they may eat leisurely, which is a great promoter of good digestion. It is more homelike and dignified and must add the comforting consciousness of self-respect. The division of the cottages into rooms holding seven beds each admits of an easy social segregation and classification of members according to their age, infirmities, characters, and tastes.

HOME STORE.

Here is a fine store, supplied with the usual goods, in perfect order, which turns into the post fund about \$125 per month. My experience of seven or eight years in the observation and study of the results of the sale of beer within several Soldiers' Homes prompts the regret that the practice has not been established here. Its general results, temperance, keeping members within the Home grounds, a band of music, various recreations, and preventing intoxication and disorders outside are sufficient to recommend it. The chief opposition to it comes from the saloons of the neighboring towns.

HOSPITAL.

There were 97 sick in hospital and 63 in cottages. In the hospital there is a classification according to diseases. A decided improvement in the keeping of records and the use of cards is noticed. There is no pharmacist employed, his work being done by the second assistant surgeon. The Home, and especially the hospital, has sustained a great loss in the decease of the very worthy matron, Mrs. Lippincott, who furnished the highest ideal of matronly attributes. Her obsequies were attended by all the members of the Home who could walk and by a large concourse of the citizens of Quincy. The need of trained women nurses is now all the more exigent. There should be at least four with an experienced superintendent. The surgeon is fulfilling the promise which was indicated of him in my report of 1894, but neither the surgeon nor his assistants can perform the ordinary duties of nurses in dressing wounds, etc., except in extraordinary cases, without neglecting other professional duties and losing opportunities for studies, the benefits of which would be of inestimable value to the sick. And without trained women nurses the sick must necessarily lose those numberless attentions and comforts which only such nurses can bestow.

If obnoxious political considerations shall not again intervene to obstruct and embarrass the progress of this Home the highest expectations of its future worthiness may be confidently entertained.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ILLINOIS SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

HEADQUARTERS ILLINOIS SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' HOME,
Quincy, August 1st, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

For the year just closed the average cost per capita has been the lowest in the history of the Home, \$122.47, with an average attendance of 1,054.

48 NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS.

Many new members are coming into the Home. Heretofore the percentage has been largely foreign born, but it is not the case now. The admissions for the past year were largely native born, nearly two to one.

There are 1,016 present; of this number at least 400 are helpless, leaving about 600 in a fair condition of health. One-half the latter number are on the Home pay roll at prices ranging from 25 to 60 cents per day, or about \$2,000 per month, for labor in the various departments of the Home, exclusive of officers' salaries.

The "dump" penalties are generally five and ten day sentences and never exceed thirty days, in extreme cases. Old men are always sentenced to the library to read the Bible—a punishment that most of them dread. Men below 60 are sentenced to help work in the different Home departments.

A lake covering 2 acres of ground in front of headquarters has just been completed and stocked with 20,000 crapple and bass.

Plans and specifications have been accepted for the building of a new hospital annex to cost \$18,000.

The legislature allowed liberal appropriations for roads, walks, bridges, new plumbing in the cottages, a new vegetable house, library, painting, and ordinary expenses.

The source of nearly all trouble in this Home comes from intoxication. A greater part of this could be controlled if it were not for the generosity of the Government in giving such bountiful pensions—not less than 40 per cent of the recipients of this bounty spend the money in drink and riotous living.

Our great loss during the year was in the death of our worthy matron, "Mother Lippincott," which occurred May 21, 1895.

HEADQUARTERS ILLINOIS SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' HOME,
Quincy, August 1, 1895.

DEAR SIR: I submit herewith a tabulated list of diseases treated in this Home during the year ending June 30, 1895. No special reports are made, for the reason that the lessons taught by our cases are not materially different from those embodied in the more recent medical text-books.

During the past year the number of totally disabled men admitted to this Home has largely increased and our hospital capacity has not been sufficient to enable us to care for all these needing medical care and nursing as they should have been.

The hospital, soon to be constructed, will be of very great aid in enabling us to look more closely after the many very feeble old men and relieve overcrowding in attics.

An analysis of our mortuary record shows a constantly increasing death rate, arterial degenerations, those producing cerebral hemorrhage heading the list. Then come valvular diseases of the heart, there being here a very large number of men whose heart valves are badly damaged or insufficient, as a result of rheumatism. Then the group of paralytics and those who suffer from one or the other of the various degenerations of the brain and spinal cord furnish enough patients to fill three wards.

Diseases of the genito-urinary organs and syphilis are numerous, those having enlargement of the prostate gland and chronic cystitis being the worst sufferers. Of infectious diseases, erysipelas prevailed quite largely during the winter, overcrowding being one of its chief causes.

During the past year the use of cards for surgeon's call and hospital bed cards, as well as a full set of record books, has been of great aid to us. The following books supplied our library for the use of assistant surgeons have been of great value: Morrow's System of Genito-Urinary Diseases, Dermatology and Syphilology, Dennis's System of Surgery, Hare's System of Practical Therapeutics, Stenberg's Bacteriology, Pepper's System of Medicine. There have also been supplied appliances for bacteriological and pathological work and instruments and apparatus for surgical work as render it more efficient and satisfactory.

Mrs. Marion Eoff has proven herself a worthy successor to our late lamented matron, Mrs. E. W. Lippincott, and Dr. F. G. Hillebrandt, as first assistant surgeon, and Dr. Chauncey E. Ehle, as second assistant surgeon and pharmacist, are all that could be desired.

It has been observed that a larger proportion of native-born applicants have presented themselves during the past year, and the surgeon says that a larger proportion of new admissions go direct to the hospital. None are admitted now until after the Home surgeon has examined them and made a report. The dormitory capacity of the Home has been increased by 30 beds by utilizing the attic porches and hallways. The capacity of the Home has been strained so that during four months of the fall and winter no admissions could be made. The new hospital construction will soon increase the capacity by 60 beds.

RECORDS.

The record books of the Home are complete and well kept.

HOSPITAL.

There were 117 sick in hospital. The patients are classified as far as possible. There are 2 wards with 16 beds each, and 13 wards holding 7 beds each, and 4 rooms of seclusion. During the winter all the members present at the Home were reexamined, individually, by the surgeon, and a sick-call card containing his diagnosis given to each. The principal disease here is organic heart disease, of which mitral regurgitation, with constant dilatation and hypertrophy, are by far most prevalent. The surgeon reports that at least 75 per cent of the members are thus afflicted. Chronic rheumatism and chronic lung troubles are also prominent and quite common diseases. An additional hospital construction of great extent and importance is now going on. Its exterior lines will include an area of about 4 acres. It is eclectic in its plan and construction. Careful studies of the best hospitals were made and the most approved features adopted. The ventilating methods of the Johns Hopkins Hospital will be used. The new buildings will have but one story over a high basement. The interior court will surround groups of trees of natural growth. When completed and occupied, which will be late in the fall, one of the older hospital buildings will be occupied by trained nurses, who will then be employed. The methods of conducting sick call were observed in operation and were found admirably regular, indicating an habitual practice and complete record. The capable and industrious matron not only supervises the housekeeping of the hospital, but also superintends the cleanliness of all occupied buildings and of their furniture. The bedding is exposed in the open air at regular intervals.

GENERAL APPEARANCE.

The site of this Home when first occupied was an arid and rocky waste. It is now a park with fine roads and walks amidst continuous verdure of broad lawns and thriving shrubbery of great variety and beauty. Spreading patches of Japanese ivy are climbing the walls of the stone buildings, lending a pleasing relief to their dominant grey tint.

MUSIC.

This great Home lacks a band of music, which would complete and reinforce all the purposes and tendencies of the increasing hospital service by inviting the invalided members into the open air and bringing throngs of visitors from the towns and country in the neighborhood to break the monotony of secluded lives now decaying from inaction.

The legislature made an appropriation of \$25,000 to begin the erection of a new hospital. The trustees have adopted a plan, and with this appropriation are building the rear face, comprising two wards and the dispensary. The dispensary contains steam power, kitchen, mess rooms, laundry, quarters for assistant surgeon, hospital sergeant and druggist, room for sick call, drug room, and operating room. Each ward will constitute a separate building. The larger part of the building is occupied by the ward with 32 beds. Separated from this room by an intervening corridor is a suite of rooms—dining room for patients, sitting room for nurses, bath rooms, water closets, and closets for linen and clothing. The plan contemplates six such ward buildings, and also, in the center of the front, an administration building for the surgeon's office and dwelling.

The legislature at the last session gave the Home a liberal appropriation for repairs and improvements. A mile of roadway was constructed or repaired. An addition was built to the hospital, making a dining room for the surgeon. The surgeon's former dining room was arranged for the use of patients in the annex, and a covered bridge was built connecting it with the annex. The hospital and annex were thoroughly renovated, walls were scraped and painted, floors and stairways cleaned and oiled, all other woodwork, within and without, painted.

Through the camp the woodwork of most of the cottages was painted and the worst floors were renovated, roofs and chimneys repaired. The basement of the domestic building was largely reconstructed. By the removal of brick partitions the bakeries and meat rooms were enlarged. A new room for milk and butter was constructed, the meat-storage room enlarged and improved, a room for cutting meat constructed, and cement floors laid in the kitchen and storerooms and hall ways.

The excessive crowding last winter made it necessary to resort to every device to gain room. An attic over the workshop was plastered, floored, painted, and made a convenient room for nine beds. An upper porch of Dill cottage was inclosed and a wooden floor laid, making a smaller bedroom but large enough for three beds. Single rooms were made by partitioning off the end of hallways, taking out partitions and superfluous bath tubs, and throwing two bathrooms into one bedroom.

The steam pipes running under ground through hot, moist earth, or through a small, crowded tunnel filled with moist air, had become so rusted away that it was necessary to go over the entire pipe system, putting in new pipes and rearranging them.

The trustees now refuse to admit to the Home a man having a pension and a dependent family except on condition that he will give a due share of his pension to his family. I do not know of any man now living here in contravention of that rule.

The sanitary condition of the Home is the same now as at the time of the report last year. Some trouble is threatened, growing out of the discharge of our sewage. The arm of the bay into which the sewer discharged, or what was once an arm of the bay, is so filled up as to be now a marsh over which it is said the sewage settles.

In accordance with the suggestion made by you at your inspection in 1894, the trustees of the Home directed that no man be admitted to the Home till after examination by the surgeon of the Home.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

No change has been made in sanitary regulations since the date of last report.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

During the year the chaplain has preached 85 sermons, held 91 hospital services, 43 prayer meetings, conducted 40 funerals, made the rounds of the hospital 90 times, not including Sunday visits; had 453 personal talks with comrades, and distributed over 10,000 pages of religious reading. The average attendance at the regular afternoon service has been 110 and at the prayer meetings 26.

Special services of several days duration have been held in the interest of temperance and religion.

The Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Ohio, hold several camp-fires here yearly. The sixth anniversary of the opening of the Home was commemorated Sunday, November 18, 1894.

Memorial Sunday and Memorial Day were observed with appropriate services. These exercises are well attended, and every effort to procure music and speakers from abroad is always made.

The committee of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Ohio, the officers of the Home, ministers, and others outside of the Home show a constant interest in the moral character of the members.

The John T. Tolard Post, Grand Army of the Republic, No. 695, numbers 134; the Thomas L. Young Command of the Union Veterans' Union numbers 47; Camp No. 124, Union Veterans' Legion, enrolls 69; and the Independent Order of Good Templars, Abraham Lincoln Lodge, No. 160, has 70 members.

There is an encouraging improvement in the moral status of the Home.

It has been observed that the degrees of disability seem greater in recent applicants for admission than in previous years and that the proportion of native-born citizens is increasing. Applicants for admission to this Home are required to be examined by the Home surgeon.

RECORDS.

The record books of the Home contain all the data usually recorded, but they are not all uniform with those now in use in most Homes. The books required to secure the desired uniformity will be procured.

PENSIONS.

It is reported by the administration that some pensioners save their money until \$50 to \$100 have accumulated in the hands of the commandant, when they will ask for a discharge instead of a furlough, as

in the former case they can receive all their money, which they would not be permitted to have in the latter case. Then they will go forth, and as soon as their money is all gone—generally in a few days—will return asking for readmission. A rule similar to that in operation in the National Home would seem advisable, viz, that the sum taken away by the pensioner should be divided by 18 or 15—any sum sufficient for a month's support—and that readmission should be denied until after an absence of as many months as the quotient found by such division would express.

POST FUND.

Unfortunately, the Home does not control the store established on its grounds, it being on the lands of private individuals, and thus prevents the Home having any interest in the profits of sales which otherwise might and should contribute a considerable sum to a post fund.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

An admirable feature of the State appropriations for this Home is that while the purposes of the appropriation are classified and set forth, it is made to the general fund, leaving to the Board of Managers its distribution and use according to the necessities to be met. This has resulted in securing economies to the State and to the Home, as the Board is thus enabled to use the means at its disposal without delay. Three additional wells have been sunk, by which an adequate supply of drinking water has been secured. Soft water for steam, laundry, and lavatory purposes has been brought from a lake a mile distant by pumping through a 3-inch pipe. A new dam has been constructed across Lambertson Creek 300 feet north of the hospital, where a turbine wheel of 20 horsepower is to be installed, to furnish power for pumping and other work. Incidentally a lake will be formed, which, with a picturesque bridge across it, will become a refreshing feature of the park system about the Home. The deer park has been enlarged for a growing herd of nine fine deer, by the addition of some half dozen acres of woodland, the whole surrounded by a high woven-wire fence.

ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.

The necessity for a building that shall contain the headquarters of the Home, together with the offices of the quartermaster and commissary, a board room, residence for the commandant, and apartments for lodging members of the Board of Managers when visiting the Home on duty, has been felt and supplied at several Homes, some of them not so large as this of Michigan. It is greatly needed here for reasons that have been stated in previous reports. It would release some of the largest and best rooms in the main building to dormitory occupation for members for which there will soon be pressing need.

HOSPITAL.

Nearly all the faults found in the hospital and in its administration last year have been removed or ameliorated. The initial cause of most of the improvements noted was the employment of a thoroughly trained and experienced woman nurse, with four women nurses in training. Cleanliness, good order, quiet, and proper discipline have resulted. The preparation and serving of special diets were exceptionally admirable. The hospital records are properly kept, and the medical charts are so well

constructed and arranged that one may see the progress and hospital record of any case at a glance. The dispensary was not clean, either in its walls, floor, cases, shelves, or bottles. The chief nurse has no charge of this. The proper administration of the hospital is impaired by the presence of six invalid women, who should not be in a hospital for men. Rooms are occupied by them which should be used for the sick call and the dispensary. The dispensary is now on the second floor and should be brought down to the first, and the room upstairs thus vacated could be converted into an operating room, which the hospital greatly needs. The room used for sick call should adjoin the dispensary on the first floor, so as to permit the least disturbance of the quiet which is so desirable. It would seem that a portion of the women's building could be set apart for a women's hospital and thus relieve both men and women invalids from the embarrassment which exists, or ought to exist, under present conditions. The admirable improvements in the administration, in the appliances, and markedly in the discipline of this hospital illustrates the importance of enlisting the services of a competent and responsible chief nurse.

MUSIC.

As the rough and unsubdued tract which was selected as a site for the Soldiers' Home has been transformed into a suburban park, to which easy communications are in operation and but little more of construction work is to be done to complete and perfect the Home, it is high time to consider what else will most promote the welfare of its beneficiaries. They have good food, comfortable clothing, spacious shelter, medical attendance, and religious ministrations; that is, an existence without care. This is wonderfully satisfactory, but lifeless. A permanent or a regularly visiting band of music would break monotony, banish lethargy, accelerate the blood, bring the old people into the open air and sunshine to hear, to see, and to feel, and would lighten the burdens of the surgeon and the cares of the nurses

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

We commenced the year with a population of 335 present; present and absent, 343. This number increased until February 10, when we had 645 present, the highest number in the history of this Home. From that date the attendance decreased until June 18, with 360 present, the lowest number in the year. Since then there has been a steady increase, until we now have present 380; present and absent, 389. The average attendance during the year was 491.

It will be noticed that on June 30, 1895, we had 45 more present than on June 30 of the preceding year, clearly indicating that our attendance will be much larger the coming winter than ever before, and we have already commenced preparations to care for a larger number, and will be able to furnish a home for all who are entitled to its benefits.

Usually a large number of the members of the Home have taken discharges in the spring and gone out to try to earn their own living during the warmer months, returning with colder weather. This year they are returning much earlier than usual, and a great many who have never been in Homes are now seeking admission. Many of them are from the younger class, and the indications are that for the next three or four years this Home will be crowded to its full capacity.

The detail system of performing much of the labor about the Home, mentioned in my last report, is working satisfactorily. At first it was met with much fault-finding,

but it has now become accepted a fixed and rule, and is complied with without a murmur.

While the discipline of the Home for the last year has been excellent, yet we have had some trouble caused by intoxication of some members of the Home, who are of such weak mental condition that they do not resist their appetite for intoxicating liquors.

This Home—and, I presume, many other of the State Homes—has not the proper facilities for caring for such inmates. We have no police force, and no officers nearer than the sheriff's force, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant. There is no fence around the premises, and our only guard is a night watchman, whose principal duty is to watch the buildings during the night.

As the years go by and the veterans grow older, this evil will continue to increase. It has already become one of the most trying questions to deal with in State Homes. National Homes are provided with guards, policemen, guardhouses, and the proper inclosures so that such men can be restrained.

To correct this evil one of two things should be done. The rules of the National Home should be amended so that such men could be transferred from a State to a National Home. Under the present rule no such transfers are allowed, and a member of a State Home must have been discharged six months before he can enter a National Home. The other alternative would be to provide a Home for such beneficiaries with proper facilities for caring for and restraining them.

A very large percentage of this class, when sober, are good, peaceable men, and were good soldiers, but when under the influence of intoxicants they are noisy, quarrelsome, and capable of making it uncomfortable and irritating to sober, well-behaved comrades, who oftentimes have to keep awake only to listen to obscene, profane tirades of personal abuse until such time as an officer can be summoned and arrive.

I would also call your attention to what seems to me to be a necessity: The establishment of a system of transfers by which invalids admitted can have the benefit of climatic influences especially adapted to their peculiar ailments. This would apply more especially to consumptives, and two cases have been reported, one where the man went to Hampton, Va., and the other to Santa Monica, Cal., suffering with this disease in an incipient but progressive stage, and in both cases I hear the invalids have been cured.

Many improvements have been made during the last year. Since my last report pipe has been laid to a small lake 1 mile distant, and we are now supplied with an abundance of soft water for our boilers, laundry, and lavatory purposes. Three wells have been sunk, one on the Home grounds and two on adjoining premises, resulting in an abundance of pure spring water. About 10 acres more have been added to our deer park, and the whole inclosed with a handsome Page woven-wire fence.

A new dam has been completed, a turbine wheel and three pumps purchased, and we shall soon be able to obtain our water supply by water power.

The old, unsightly wooden bridge that spanned the chute in the upper dam has been removed and replaced by a handsome steel structure, costing \$600. Our storage capacity for coal has been enlarged, at an expense of \$1,200.

Our hospital has undergone many changes during the past year. The interior has been renovated, bedsteads painted white, and many other improvements made. Women nurses have been substituted for men, and a sun parlor is under construction on the south end of the hospital building, which, it is hoped, will add to the comfort of the convalescents. The gentle and efficient ministrations of the new trained nurses have added much to the comfort of the invalids.

WOMAN'S BUILDING.

In this department, up to date, 50 wives, widows, or mothers of ex-soldiers, sailors, and marines have been admitted since its opening. It answers the purposes for which it was founded, in relieving distress, and in taking care of those who did their share in the dark days of the war.

The dormitory capacity of the Home, as given in my report of last year (523) has been exceeded by 45. Some of the upper halls and the attic have been utilized to meet the necessities of this overflow. There are two ways in which the demands for increased capacity can be best satisfied. The construction of an "old men's building" of two stories divided into 4 wards, each holding 24 beds. This building would accommodate 96 old men who would have the comfort of their own dining room with a diet suitable to their needs and all other conveniences, day and night, quite independent of the conditions of the main Home. Another means of meeting the growing necessities would be found in the construction of an administration building which should include the residence of the commandant. This would permit the surrender of all the space in the main building which is now occupied by him and

his offices. This would enable the Board of Commissioners to meet at the Home and study its necessities and conditions with the greatest convenience and secure that full attention to their duties which would result in promoting the best interests of the Home and the welfare of its members. The prompt adoption of both plans would be the best thing to do. It has been noticed here, as in most other Soldiers' Homes, that the applicants for admission appear more disabled than formerly, and that they seem to be in many respects more worthy of the beneficence of the Home.

RECORDS.

The record books of the Home are well kept up to date and contain all desirable information regarding the members, but it would be well to introduce the Historic Register, which is in regular use at most Homes.

Discharge cards are received from and sent to all other Homes.

The methods in use in the commandant's office in the use of requisitions for quartermaster and subsistence stores and the requirement of vouchers properly arranged and numbered has led to very notable economies and insured accuracy in the rendition of accounts.

The Woman's Building was completed on the first of January. Besides the reception room and that of the matron there are 14 bed chambers which, with 2 beds in each, will accommodate 28 persons. The building is admirably constructed and furnished and the 9 widows who now occupy it are really very worthy of the beneficence the building affords. One of them, an army nurse, is 93 years old, and all of them seemed venerable women of some culture who had given their husbands or their own services to the country. One had a husband in the war of 1812 and was the mother of a soldier of the civil war. They have their own dining room, the food being brought in an inclosed little cart, like those of the Illinois Home. The little cottages for married soldiers which looked so bleak and barren at first are now surrounded with sodded lawns and growing shrubbery and flowers which have lent to them an appearance of comparative comfort. The grovelands in rear have been cleared of underbrush and present an inviting sylvan retreat.

HOSPITAL.

The hospital seems crowded, for the reason that it has been found that the dimensions of the small wards show no recognition of the dimensions of a bed which should always be considered as the unit of space measure in a hospital. The records are well kept by the surgeon and the pharmacy is in good order and bright. The surgeon does all the pharmaceutical and clerical work.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE IOWA SOLDIERS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

MARSHALLTOWN, IOWA, August 6, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The blanks used by your direction are those specially designed for the National Home, and the differing methods and records in use here makes it difficult, and in some cases impossible, to fully meet their requirements. Conformity on the part of this Home with the complete and well-considered methods of the National Home is

the obvious remedy, and is being urged forward as rapidly as practicable. A considerable advance has already been made in that direction—especially, perhaps, in the hospital, from which the surgeon now in charge is able, for the first time, to submit a substantially complete report.

From the statistics of population it will appear that the present membership exceeds the normal capacity of the Home, including the ten cottages and the Woman's Building, by more than 100. This has thus far been managed by crowding the wards and the use of the halls and an unfinished attic for lodging purposes. But, as the steadily-increasing demand for admission on the part of ageing and otherwise eligible comrades convinces beyond question that the strongest pressure on the Home is just fairly beginning, and that the maximum need not be expected within from six to ten years, an effort will be made to induce the general assembly to increase the facilities as soon as possible.

In considering the financial statistics, and especially in comparing the averages of per capita cost with those of former reports, a fair understanding requires the explanation that the cost of kitchen and dining room service and utensils is here for the first time included as a part of the cost of subsistence. Also that the increase of membership beyond what had been considered the capacity of the Home necessitated the purchase of extra beds and bedding, the cost of which, while properly chargeable to support, constituted a large and unusual item of expense. Also the unusually large per capita cost which for some time attended the support of the first arrivals after the opening of the Woman's Building last January. Also, that the average of expenditure as given is without credit for, or consideration of, the following sums collected by the commandant from sources indicated and turned over to the treasurer of the Board:

From estates of decedents for funeral expenses.....	\$519. 13
From cash sales of clothing.....	90. 79
From cash sales of subsistence supplies.....	256. 44
From freight rebates.....	176. 69
From miscellaneous items.....	22. 00

As will readily be seen this will decrease the average cost of maintenance per capita, \$2.10; that of clothing, \$0.18; that of subsistence, \$0.60; and that of the daily ration, \$0.0016. Thus corrected, the averages indicated, instead of as given in the sub-joined report, are as follows:

This shows a considerable reduction from the figures for last previous years, which is doubtless to be accounted for by systemization and the inauguration of more complete accountability in all departments.

With the pressure for admission the number of destitute ex-soldiers who have temporarily received food and lodging, pending action upon application and otherwise, has been considerably increased. From close calculation it is estimated that during the year 14,235 meals have been thus furnished, and a very considerable number provided with lodging for a few nights each.

Trusting for a continuance of the measurable healthy conditions which have obtained during the past year, and for relief from the necessity of turning away needy and deserving applicants for admission,

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

Cleanliness being one of the first essentials, in a sanitary point of view, the house and grounds are constantly policed and kept in as clean a condition as possible.

The Home being situated on an eminence, and with a good sewer system, trapped and flushed from the city waterworks, we have no cause to fear the deadly sewer gas. Closets are conveniently situated and flushed with plenty of clear water.

The lavatories are conveniently located and furnished with plenty of hot and cold water at all times.

Patients are bathed once per week and oftener if necessary. The bath tubs are kept clean, and, so far as I am able to detect, there is not that odor usually perceptible where sick are congregated.

The past year has been prolific of small improvements on the interior of the hospital. The walls and ceilings have been whitened throughout. The floors have been recoiled and woodwork revarnished and, where needed, repainted.

New screens of an improved pattern have been added to parts of the buildings not already screened.

A cold-storage room fitted up with the Herrick pattern has been put in, all of which adds to the sanitary condition of the hospital.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

Regular religious services in chapel each Sabbath afternoon conducted by clergymen of Marshalltown of the various denominations, including the Young Men's Christian Association, in rotation. The officiating clergyman usually brings a choir with him, thus insuring good music.

Services are held every Thursday afternoon by the Salvation Army.

The Old Men's Christian Association meets one evening each week.

Phil Sheridan Post No. 452, Department of Iowa, Grand Army of the Republic, with 120 members, meets each alternate Tuesday evening.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE,
Marion, Ind., July 27, 1895.

SIR: Pursuant to verbal instructions received from you at Santa Monica, Cal., July 1, last, I continued my inspection of the Pacific Branch until its completion, and on the 10th proceeded to the inspection of the State Homes as directed.

My first stop was at Yountville, where the California Home is located. I arrived there on the evening of July 11. On the 12th I inspected the men in line and carefully mustered the entire command, including men in hospital. The commandant, Gen. D. W. C. Thompson, the treasurer, Capt. J. C. Currier, and the secretary, Mr. J. J. Scoville, aided me at the inspection and muster, which was, in all respects, a very satisfactory one. Number present, including sick in hospital, 468; absent, 58; total present and absent, 526. There were 48 sick in hospital. Surgeon W. F. McAllister reported 35 deaths during the year ending June 30, 1895. The admissions for year ending June 30 were 263. Nationality, 146 native born and 117 foreign born.

The commandant reported the capacity in dormitory, 500; in the hospital proper, 50; and in the convalescent ward, in attic, 75. He also reported that the Home would require an increased capacity of at least 100 beds very soon.

In observing the food and its preparation, the cleanliness of quarters; and the general appearance of the men, I was pleased to note very few chances for criticism. The men appeared well fed, well clothed, and well satisfied with the care bestowed upon them.

This Home has made many improvements during the past year, and there are good evidences of proper care, both out of doors and in the quarters of the men.

It is safe to say that the California State Home is in good hands, well managed, carefully looked after by the proper authorities, and honestly conducted. It is fast recovering from its financial difficulties of a few years past, and strong hopes are entertained, by the people of the State, that no future trouble is likely to occur to detract from the efficiency and good name of the California State Home at Yountville.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CALIFORNIA VETERANS' HOME FOR THE
YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.**

VETERANS' HOME, CAL., July 5, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

A commodious building in rear of the large dining hall, 30 by 40 feet, two stories high, has been completed and occupied, the lower story as a storeroom, vegetable room, and root house, and the upper story as a dormitory for 16 members.

A meat shop, 20 by 20 feet, with a wing on each side 10 by 15 feet, one for cold storage and the other for milk, butter, etc., has been nearly completed, and is now partly in use for such purposes.

A mortuary chapel, 20 by 30 feet, of plain but suitable design, has been completed and is also now in use.

A shed, 25 by 60 feet, has been built and shelters five wagons and our farming tools. A suitable cottage of six rooms, for the use of civilian engineers, has been erected in the rear of the Home buildings.

A dynamo building has been finished and is now in use adjoining the laundry building, where the steam power for general use is furnished.

A first-class electric-light plant, comprising 1 50-horsepower steam engine, 2 dynamos, 10 arc lights, and 350 incandescent lights, has been placed on the grounds and throughout the buildings, and is now working well and gives great satisfaction.

The barns, sheds, shops, and smaller buildings, 21 in all, have been whitewashed inside and outside, and all the boundary and division fences, some 4 miles in length, have been put in good repair and newly whitened.

Handsome fences have been built around the commandant's and medical director's houses and the storage reservoir, and about 1 mile of strong farm fence has been built between the fields.

One large bridge and several small culverts have been built on the road.

Eighteen of the principal buildings on the Home grounds have been thoroughly repaired and are now being painted in a handsome and uniform color, which will add much to the fine appearance of the Home.

The winding road leading to the railway station and the south road leading toward Napa have been regraded, macadamized, and covered with traskite, making them the best roads in Napa County.

A new road has been graded around the hills from the hospital via the mortuary chapel to the cemetery, affording easy access to that beautiful spot.

Twenty-seven new roads and walks have been laid, and on curved lines conforming to the topography of the ground around the buildings, graded, graveled, and rolled, affording great convenience to the members and adding much to the beauty of the landscape. When the contemplated improvements in this line are completed, we hope our grounds will be the finest of any Soldiers' Home in the country.

After the first rainfall we commenced plowing and seeding. About 115 acres were sown to oats, producing 266 tons of first-class hay; about 30 acres were put in barley, producing 42 tons of hay, and about 80 tons of good volunteer hay was harvested, making a total of 388 tons of hay, which has been well cured and is all now in our barns or well stacked, affording enough for our own stock and a large amount to sell.

The following trees and plants have been set out since the commencement of this year: 210 apple, 210 apricot, 225 cherry, 290 pear, 300 peach, 100 prune, 500 Persian walnut, 30 chestnut, 10 plum, 50 olive, 10 nectarine, 15 orange, 30 locust, 50 maple, 50 acacias, 50 mountain ash, 50 eucalyptus, 15 magnolia, 50 pepper, 500 oak, 60 pine, 50 Monterey cyprus, 50 Lawson cyprus, 25 arbor vita, 25 lilac, 15 laurestine, 50 fan palm, 15 Japanese palm, 10 date palm, 300 rose, 25 lily, 10 japonica, 25 cactus, 50 chrysanthemum, and several hundred miscellaneous flowers.

About 30 acres have been planted in garden vegetables for table use, comprising corn, potatoes, peas, beans, tomatoes, beets, carrots, parsnips, onions, pumpkins, squash, cabbage, lettuce, asparagus, etc.

The waterworks have been greatly improved by judicious repairs, and much wastage has been stopped. Six new springs have been partially developed, which will increase our supply more than 10,000 gallons per day, and many others have been found in the hills and canyons back of the Home buildings, which will afford ample water for future use.

The Home has 10 fine work horses which are doing all the farm work and supply hauling; 22 cows, and about the same number of young stock coming on for use; about 100 hogs, which supply all the fresh pork, lard, etc., needed; about 250 chickens, supplying dining room and hospital.

The Home has now more members than ever before. The men are all well clothed, quartered, and fed, and are better behaved, more contented, and healthier than at any previous time. More permanent improvements have been made and larger crops produced this year, by far, for the money appropriated, than any previous year.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The sanitary regulations at this Home insure the personal cleanliness of the veterans by providing 16 bath tubs, each in its own room, and provided with hot and cold water taps. These baths are accessible every day except Sunday, and are supplied with an abundance of hot and cold water. Soap is issued weekly to sergeants of companies for the use of the men.

All of the buildings used as quarters are furnished with modern water-closets, urinals, wash-sinks, and hoppers. Each veteran has a chamber, and care is taken that these are kept clean.

The bedsteads are all iron with woven wire tablets, over which is a good mattress. A clean sheet and pillow slip is furnished weekly. Cotton quilts have been discarded entirely, and woolen blankets and cotton spreads used instead.

All the quarters, the bedding, and the veterans, are inspected every Sunday.

The drainage and sewerage are very good. All the sewage is led some distance to a creek flowing through the grounds.

Whitewash and chloride of lime are used freely, and the spring supplying the drinking water is kept clean and covered.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

Religious services are held every Sabbath day, alternately by Mrs. Greenfield, of Napa, and Rev. T. Dillon, both giving their services gratuitously.

A Grand Army Post, Unity, No. 171, was organized at the Home during the past year, and has 57 members.

Owing to the operation of a rule adopted by the managers in June last whereby all members who had been absent on furlough for one year or longer were dropped from the rolls after June 30, there appears on September 3 a loss of 21 when compared with the population of same date last year.

RECORDS.

The morning report, record of admissions, furlough record, offenders' docket, death record, record of pensions, and several minor records are kept up to date. Only one important record book is lacking—the historical record—and that will be supplied. The records furnish grounds for noting what has been remarked at several other Homes—that a larger proportion of native-born applicants have appeared during the last year than before. One page of the record taken at random shows 22 native born and 9 foreign born. The native born seem to have kept away from

the Home as long as possible, and their disabilities are more complete and decided than have usually been found. It is also noted that a larger proportion of all applicants now come from country regions than formerly, which accords with the fact that a large majority of disabled soldiers of foreign birth have been domiciled in cities where organized charities do not generally include their care, while in small country towns, where the disabled soldiers may be native, neighborly assistance may be relied on until their disabilities have become so great that proper care for them can not be supplied. Great care is exercised at this Home in the examination of all applicants for admission, and a complete and comprehensive record is made of the military and domestic history of the applicant. This original record of every applicant, properly authenticated, is carefully filed in the archives of the Home, and will hereafter be transcribed into the historical record book.

HOSPITAL.

The exigencies of hospital service have gradually increased here as elsewhere, and an assistant surgeon has been employed. The wards always impress me with their height, fresh and efficient ventilation, and satisfactory light. The "old men's pavillion," with its own dining room and kitchen, is a model of comfort. The pharmacy was in good order and bright and clean. The "hospital record of admissions" in the form now in general use is lacking, as well as the "sick-call record" and hospital cards.

Three or four trained women nurses would be highly appreciated here by the members in hospital and by all concerned in their welfare.

Every window in the Home is furnished with agreeable shades. The drainage is perfect and is not likely to ever become obstructed, and the water, from an artesian well 600 feet deep, is absolutely pure. In the dining hall and kitchen several special excellencies of methods of preparation of meals and their service were noted. A tinned iron teaspoon, of good shape and appearance, the net cost of which was \$1.32 per gross, was furnished to every member. It is so cheap that when it becomes worn it can be replaced by a new one.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW JERSEY HOME FOR DISABLED SOLDIERS FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

KEARNY, N. J., July 6, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

IMPROVEMENTS.

The road leading from Belgrove drive down to the administration building has been laid with Belgian block, thus forming a paved drive through the Home grounds from the Passaic River to Belgrove drive. Bluestone flagging has also been laid in front of all the dormitories and the approaches to the dispensary and chapel. The work was done by contract, at a cost of \$1,678.08

A contract has also been made for the painting of all the Home buildings. The work is now well under way and will be completed in a few days. The colors selected are much lighter than those formerly used, and convey a bright and cheerful appearance.

DISCIPLINE.

The remarks under this head in report of 1894 are applicable to this report. With an increased average present, there is a less number of violations of rules than last year, and we are hopeful of a steady improvement.

KEARNY, N. J., July 1, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor herewith to present my report, as surgeon, of the cases treated in hospital and at daily sick call for the year ending June 30, 1895.

The number of patients requiring hospital care has been larger than ever before, but the percentage of acute diseases has been small and generally of a mild character, while of the chronic cases under our care the greatly increased number of brain diseases is very noticeable, especially the number of hemorrhages resulting in paralysis and partial recovery.

The usual epidemic of the grippe appeared during the winter months, but in a modified form, and of those attacked but comparatively few needed hospital care.

It is of interest to notice that of the 33 men who died in the hospital but 2 deaths were the result of acute disease, both being cases of double pneumonia, and that 20 of the men had passed their sixty-fifth year.

The freedom from severe acute and epidemic or infectious diseases must be attributed to the excellence of the general sanitary condition of the grounds and buildings and to the supply of pure water.

The number treated at daily sick call has been about the same as in preceding years, but the increasing age of the inmates is making itself more manifest each year, and diseases of the brain, kidneys, and heart are making the inmates less able to endure slight ailments.

An increase in population such as will crowd the Home is anticipated from the increase of applications, and an extension of the hospital or a conversion of a portion of the main building to hospital purposes is likely to become necessary.

DISCIPLINE.

The bugle is used for all calls. The members, on inspection, presented a clean and bright appearance. It was noticed that their hair was neatly trimmed and well dressed. There were no exceptions to this uniform, agreeable appearance. A barber is employed for the

Home without expense to the members. It is a remarkable fact, which should be noted to the credit of its management, that intemperate habits have disappeared from this Home. This exceptional condition is not due to any Keeley or other cure, but to the personal supervision of the commander, which reaches every individual. His moral influence is so strong and efficient that the majority of the members are his quiet, determined coadjutors, who will not tolerate misconduct in their weaker comrades. Even the chronic grumblers, who may be found among the new members of all soldiers' homes, are silenced by this loyal determination which will not tolerate any disrespect to the rules of the commander. The records show that not more than 1 per cent of the members have violated any rules during the last quarter. Only about half a dozen members require any restraint, and these are not competent to take care of themselves. On the Fourth of July general permission was given to all members not on the sick list to be absent until 9.15 p. m., and the records show that not a single one failed to return in good order before that hour. A reliable and worthy sergeant, to whom all members departing and returning report, keeps a careful record of the time and a statement of conditions. The city of Erie, full of temptations, touches the Home grounds. Besides the controlling influence of the administration, there is a social condition that begets an efficient tendency toward good conduct. The dormitory rooms having only four to eight occupants, there is a development of individualism which is essential to personal character, the opportunity for which can not be found in a barrack room containing from forty to sixty men. Another condition not devoid of influence on behavior is the absolute cleanliness of the halls and rooms. The floors of both are smooth and glistening. When a visitor treads a wide, lofty, and well-lighted hall over 300 feet long which does not echo a footstep, because of the wide strip of carpet upon which is laid a strip of brown denim from end to end, and sees a piece of the same floor covering in front of each door opening on the hall, and finds clean, bright rugs in front of every bed, with curtained windows, and not a speck of dirt anywhere, he realizes that he is in a grand Home and that the dress and behavior of the occupants must, perforce, comport with their surroundings. Contrast this with a worn, shaled barrack hall floor, impossible to clean, and resounding with every footstep, and with crowded barrack rooms of like condition and without a window shade, and the force of habitual environment on personal character will be better understood.

FUEL.

A most fortunate experiment with a well on the Home grounds led to the discovery of an excellent gas, and four more wells were bored, which altogether produce an adequate amount for fuel for warming all the buildings and for cooking and baking. The wells are about 800 feet deep.

HOSPITAL.

There were 40 sick in hospital and 20 in quarters. There were 18 attending sick call. There is no operating room nor proper dressing room. The dispensary is now used for a dressing room, which is not right. The morgue is in the basement. Ten light screens are found in good use in each ward. Attractive framed engravings adorn the walls and there are double curtains on all the windows. The light, ventilation, and cleanliness of the wards were commendable. The

dining room is in the basement, but an elevator running from top to bottom makes all floors convenient. Hospital cards have not been given to members discharged from the hospital and the Home, as they should be. Members are still admitted before a final examination is made of them by the surgeon of the Home.

The construction at this Home having been about completed, attention has been devoted to its surroundings. It will be remembered that the main building, 370 feet long and three stories high, stands upon a bluff over 50 feet above Lake Erie. Between the Home, when first occupied, and the lake were about 50 acres of low lands, of which a large portion was a marshy or sandy waste. This tract has all been rescued and is fast being converted into a park with walks and drives down toward the shore. Hundreds of trees, clumps of willows, and a great variety of shrubbery have been set out and are flourishing, and the conservatories and grounds are ornate with flowers. A large two-story boathouse, with balconies and porches, has been erected on the shore, containing dressing and toilet rooms and a spacious room with seats for large parties. A steam yacht, with capacity for twenty persons, a sailboat, and eight rowboats belong to the Home. A member of the Home who has quarters in the boathouse has charge of the house and boats.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PENNSYLVANIA SOLDIERS AND SAILORS HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1896.

ERIE, PA., July 27, 1896.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1896:

The following permanent improvements have been made: A two-story frame boathouse, with balcony, dressing rooms for bathers, kitchen and bedroom for boathouse keeper; water-motor elevator in hospital, carriage house, two steel boilers, refrigerator, with apartment for milk and butter, and the painting of chapel and dining room.

On the outside we have completed the grading of the north bank on Garrison Hill, and have laid 16,810 feet of cement walks. The marshy ground on the flat is now complete and most of it is under cultivation, being planted in potatoes, corn, cabbage, onions, etc.

We have drilled five gas wells, at an average depth of 800 feet, with which we heat the hospital and cottages, and do the cooking and baking in main building and hospital.

The cemetery bank has been graded and sodded. We have purchased a new steam yacht, naming her *Comrade*, which is to be used for the pleasure of the comrades. We have added four new small boats, which make a total of nine. We have planted 300 shade trees.

There has been no change in the pension rules since last report. An action was commenced by one member to compel the Board to return to him the money paid in under the rules. This was heard before the court who refused the motion for judgment. It was then carried to the supreme court and the decision, herein attached, handed down.

Records of discharges have been received from all Branches of the National Home, and from all State Homes, with the exceptions of Vermont and Michigan.

APPEAL FROM THE JUDGMENT OF THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS OF ERIE COUNTY.

JAMES BRYSON, APPELLANT,

HOME FOR DISABLED AND INDIGENT SOLDIERS, ETC. }

William, J.:

The plaintiff sued to recover certain sums of money which he alleged he had been compelled to pay to the Home out of his quarterly installments of pension money received from the United States. These exactions he alleged were illegal and in plain violation of the spirit, if not the letter, of the pension laws.

An affidavit of defense was made by the commanding officer of the Home in which he set out the following facts: First, the adoption of a rule by the Board of Managers of the Home requiring the inmates to turn over 80 per cent of their pension money to the treasurer of the institution; second, that upon the admission of the plaintiff he signed an agreement in writing binding himself to comply with the rules of the Home, of which he knew this to be one; third, that the payments for which he now sues were made by him voluntarily in accordance with the contract so executed by him on his admission. The learned judge of the court below held this affidavit to be insufficient to prevent a judgment on motion, and this appeal is from that ruling.

The learned gentleman who represents the appellant has argued with great earnestness that the rule under which the money was paid to the treasurer is wholly unauthorized. We are not inclined to decide that question at this time. It is not necessary to the decision of this case. If the payments shall turn out to be voluntary, as is alleged, and in pursuance of an agreement under which the plaintiff's admission was obtained, and that admission depended upon the contract and not upon the positive provisions of the statute organizing this institution, then the plaintiff can not recover.

The record before us does not afford the means of determining these questions. They will be developed on the trial.

Meantime all that we can now decide is that the affidavit is to be taken as absolutely true, and, assuming its truth, we think, so far as this record enables us to see, that the court below was right in refusing the motion for judgment, and its action therein is now affirmed.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of the hospital department of this Home, for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The capacity of the hospital has been increased since last report by the addition of seven beds. This space was gained by the removal of the stairs leading from the first to the second floors in the rear of the building, and by fitting up a dining room in the basement for the convalescents and attendants.

A water-motor elevator has been put in, which has added very much to the comfort, as well as to the successful use of the whole building.

The capacity of the hospital is now 42 beds, with the addition of 22 beds in the fourth ward annex.

The Home has been free from any epidemic during the last year. The general health of the members has been good, but the general debility from age, with the diseases incident to old age, is noticeably on the increase.

The members admitted during the last year have been more uniformly disabled, and have required more medical aid than those admitted any year previous.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The sanitary regulations are in every way satisfactory. The buildings are well ventilated. The bathrooms, of which we have eight, are furnished with hot and cold water, and are found sufficient for the use of the Home. The men are required to bathe at least once a week. The beds are of horse hair, and are furnished with cotton sheets and counterpanes.

Frequent inspections are made of the quarters, kitchen, dining room, hospital, and a thorough inspection is made on Saturday of each week.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

The ministers of the different Protestant churches continue to conduct services on every Sabbath afternoon, and are accompanied by their choirs. Their interest in the Home continues.

The location of both the English and German Roman Catholic churches near the Home makes it convenient for the members of those denominations to attend.

In the number reported present, there were 23 disabled from any duty, but not in the hospital, and a year ago there were 33 such members. It will be seen that the capacity of the Home is overrun by 26, who are cared for in the attics and basements. During the past winter and spring, when the population reached the highest number, 375 on February 26, the entire dormitory capacity was pretty fully tested. To meet this growing demand a new barrack, called the "old men's building," is to be erected and will have a capacity for 80 beds.

It will stand next to the hospital, which is on the point of the promontory. This building, with the enlargement of the laundry for the introduction of dynamos, includes all the new construction. The grounds are being graded and sodded, and shrubbery and flowers are being set out.

The discipline of the members has been improved by the definition of an offense which afflicts all Homes more or less, viz, the publication of slanderous statements concerning the food, clothing, and administration of the Home. The following resolution of the board of trustees, adopted April 24, 1895, explains its action in the matter:

Resolved, That gross or outrageous behavior forbidden in the Rules and Regulations of the Soldiers' Home, shall include all forms of insubordination, the writing or speaking of false and slanderous charges against the management of the institution, and conspiring to violate the rules of the institution, or to bring unjust criticism upon the officers or trustees.

Resolved, That in executing certificates of dishonorably discharged members the commandant shall state the cause of discharge in the language of the Rules and Regulations, whether "drunkenness, willful violation of rules and regulations, gross or outrageous behavior," etc.

HOSPITAL.

There were 48 sick in hospital. The surgeon has no assistant, except one interne, who will stay only until September. The one woman nurse in training has proved so useful that it is probable that two or three more may be employed. The surgeon does the work of the dispensary. The operating room is well located for convenience and light. While the surgeon may not be overworked, yet the responsibility of half a hundred sick men should not rest upon the surgeon alone. It would be prudent to have a good assistant. As the sick may not need more than two or three visits a day from the surgeon, they do require the almost constant supervision of a nurse; hence, I think this admirable Home should employ at least three trained women nurses, so that the hours of the day and night be divided between them and the sick be assured always of a nurse at hand.

The trustees of this Home have secured its beneficence from abuse by requiring a declaratory statement from every member, viz:

When the operation of this statement was required, it disclosed the fact that 15 members had been cured of all disabilities and they were discharged, and 12 others were furloughed for ninety days. Notwithstanding the grumbling that has ensued the trustees will be, undoubtedly, sustained in their action.

THE PENSION QUESTION IN MINNESOTA.

SIR: In 1889 the board of trustees of the Minnesota Soldiers' Home adopted a rule requiring all members of the institution receiving pensions in excess of \$4 per month to pay such excess into the treasury of the Home, to be expended the same as other funds provided for its support. This rule has been inflexibly and impartially enforced from that day to this, to the great benefit of the morals and discipline of the Home, as well as a relief to the taxpayers of the State in the sum of nearly \$25,000—that being the amount collected under the rule from pensioned inmates up to this time. It was not to be expected that this rule would escape opposition and criticism. The first protest was made to the Grand Army of the Republic. But the department encampment, after a full discussion, indorsed the rule by an overwhelming majority at two or three successive sessions. When the legislature met in 1893 an effort was made to secure the passage of a law abrogating the rule of the board. But instead of doing that the legislature promptly passed a law embodying the rule, and authorizing its enforcement. The result is that when the quarterly pension collections come in each member of the Home is given the option to take the whole of his payment and leave, or take \$4 per month for spending money, turn the remainder into the Home support fund, and remain. Occasionally a man decides to leave. One such man, Charles Venables, who left for this reason in the winter of 1895, wrote very many abusive letters to the local papers, denouncing the management as corrupt and the trustees as "robbers." He finally applied to the district court of Hennepin County, at Minneapolis, for a writ of mandamus to compel the board of trustees to restore his membership. The case came up for a hearing before Judge Segrave Smith, on March 23, 1895. Capt. Henry A. Castle, of St. Paul, and John A. Gilman, of Minneapolis, members of the board of trustees, were present,

and were represented by George B. Edgerton, assistant attorney-general. Mr. Edgerton moved to dismiss the case on the ground that the act complained of, the discharge from the Home, was legal and proper. He showed that the rule enforced by the board was fully authorized by the law of 1893, passed by the Minnesota legislature. The attorney for Venables claimed that this law was repugnant to a United States statute which prohibits pensioners from assigning their claim, exempts it from garnishment, etc. But Mr. Edgerton showed that the supreme court of Michigan had held a similar rule in force there was not an assignment of the pension within the meaning of the act; and he further showed that Congress, in 1894, by express and explicit enactment, in the appropriation bill for the benefit of State Soldiers' Homes, had legalized the enforcement of the rule in question. Judge Smith cut the argument short by the prompt dismissal of the case. He said the rule adopted by the board of trustees was clearly sanctioned by law. He further said, very emphatically, that in the absence of express law, it would be sustained as just, reasonable, and equitable. It was the right of the board of trustees to make reasonable rules for admission to and discharge from the Home, and it was their duty to exclude from it all who had other means of support, including pensions, unless they paid in such means of support to ward their maintenance. The decision was so prompt, emphatic, and conclusive that no ground was left for cavil or argument.

Be it enacted by the legislature of the State of Minnesota:

"SECTION 1. Section 28 of chapter 148 of the General Laws of 1887 is hereby amended by adding at the end of said section the following proviso, to wit: *Provided further*, that in making regulations governing the admission, maintenance, and discharge of the inmates of said Home, it shall be lawful for said board of trustees to make it a condition for the admission to said Home, that all soldiers admitted thereto, receiving a pension from the United States exceeding \$4 per month, shall pay over said excess to the board of trustees, and said board of trustees may use said excess in all cases, where the soldier has no wife or child living depending on him for support, toward defraying the expenses of maintaining said institution; but in all cases where such soldier has a wife or child living, depending upon him for support, or in circumstances of dependence and want, said board of trustees may, and it shall be their duty, to pay over such excess to the wife or child of such soldier, and take duplicate receipts thereof, delivering one of the same to said soldier and filing one with the State treasurer, as ex-officio treasurer of the board; but the said board of trustees may, in their discretion, grant to the wife or child of such soldier, from the State soldiers' relief fund, an amount at least equal to the sum so paid by such soldier, in lieu of the payment to such wife or child herein required."

"SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage."

In accordance with this law the rule of the Home in regard to this subject was amended by the board of trustees so as to read as follows:

"All members of the Home who receive United States pensions exceeding \$4 per month, shall pay over such excess to the commandant quarterly on receipt thereof: *Provided*, That members absent with leave and not supported by the Home during the whole of one or more periods of thirty consecutive days may be permitted to retain their entire pension for the period so absent. In case any pensioned member of the Home has a wife or child living, dependent on him for support or in circumstances of dependence or want, the executive committee may direct that pension money received from such member be paid over to such wife or child as the law provides; or in lieu thereof shall grant to the wife or child of such member from the State soldiers' relief fund an amount at least equal to the sum so received from such soldier. Receipts from pensions of all members shall be transmitted quarterly by the commandant to the president of the board of trustees, who shall, after causing the secretary to make a detailed registry thereof in his records, pay over such amount as the executive committee may direct to destitute wives and children of members, and deposit the remainder in the State treasury to the credit of the Soldiers' Home support fund."

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

There are several important improvements now under way, among which is a new cottage for old men, to meet the ever-increasing demands of the Home. It is to be constructed of pressed brick, with brown stone trimmings, and will accommodate 80 inmates. An addition to the laundry has been made, and when completed will give ample room for the work of that department.

A new engine and new dynamo will also be added to the plant, which will give sufficient power to light the new cottage and supply the administration building and hospital with light.

There are also extensive improvements being made on the grounds, grading and sodding around the administration building and improving the driveways.

The past winter was rather milder than the average for this climate, and the summer very pleasant; no excessive heat or destructive storms.

The discipline has continued good and shows an appreciable improvement.

There has been no change in the pension rules.

The number cared for during the year in the hospital was 115, the highest number at any one time being 63. Number of deaths in hospital, 19; absent from the Home, 3; total, 22. The average age of those dying during the year, 64.86. The average number in the Home during the year, 334. The whole number cared for, 526.

There were 24 cases of influenza and 1 death, the first known in the Home, but that was a case of senile debility and required but little to take him off.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

All the buildings at the Home are furnished with bathrooms, water-closets, and urinals on each floor. The sewerage is perfect; the location of the Home being most favorable for drainage. The buildings are well supplied with both hot and cold water, and cleanliness is insisted upon. Each room has an attendant and the inmates are required to bathe and change their underclothing once a week.

The beds are furnished with clean sheets and pillowcases once a week. They are all spring beds with mattresses, feather pillows, and red woolen blankets. They are required to be turned down every morning after reveille for the purpose of airing them.

The rooms and hallways are swept daily, and every Saturday thoroughly mopped and cleaned by the members. Frequent inspection of the cottages, kitchen, dining room, and hospital is made by the officers of the Home.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

Services are held regularly every Sunday in the chapel at the Home by both Protestant and Roman Catholic clergymen, the former is the Home chaplain and the latter is stationed at Fort Snelling, a distance of 1½ miles from the Home, and whose services are gratuitous. Both clergymen are very regular in their attendance on the sick and invalid members.

The Christian Endeavor Society, of Minneapolis, hold song and prayer services once a week. Although there are no regularly organized religious societies at the Home, services are well attended and considerable interest manifested. The religious feeling is increasing.

A very encouraging and necessary improvement is now in progress at this Home—the erection of a dining hall and kitchen, for which \$28,000 was appropriated. Its construction is contracted for at \$20,000. It will be connected with the main building by a wide corridor. The upper story will be used for shops and dormitories for employees. The old dining room in the eastern basement of the main building was inspected and found in good order and clean. The kitchen, baking room, and storerooms were also in their usual commendable condition, well ventilated, and devoid of odors.

QUARTERS.

While the quarters are spacious and comfortable it is impossible that they should have an orderly appearance so long as the men have no place for the neat and uniform storage of their clothing and other effects. There are no lockers, and their clothing hung upon the walls and other effects stored in a variety of boxes, plainly visible under the beds, lend to the interiors a temporary, camp-meeting sort of an aspect not at all in accord with correct ideas of a Home which are so well

illustrated in all other features of the institution. Such conditions, while preventing cleanliness and good order, it would seem, should create some apprehension of vermin. If adequate and uniform lockers were furnished here the administration and the members would be surprised at the improved appearance of the dormitories. The lockers should be at least 3 feet high and not less than 30 inches wide by 15 inches deep. As in many other Homes, there has been here an evolution of an "Old Men's Building" to supply the wants of a class of beneficiaries who would be out of place among more active men, but whose infirmities do not, as yet, make hospital treatment necessary. Their reading room was crowded, and the necessity for extending this building seems imminent.

HOSPITAL.

The plan and construction of the hospital, with regard to convenience, light, ventilation and sanitary conditions, approach the ideal, and the administration of its gifted and experienced surgeon accords with its excellencies. If any change that would be an improvement could be suggested it would be to lower the windows in the wards a little way in order that the patients might see outside with greater convenience. The arrangements and appliances for preparing and serving special diet are admirable. The trained women nurses fulfill their vocation with zeal and tender beneficence. It was a touching incident to see them leading blind old soldiers to their seats at table. The rooms for seclusion are daintily furnished and inviting chambers. There is one condition that is out of kilter with the ideal of a hospital. The surgeon is quartered upon one of the upper floors. These quarters are not adequate and should not be regarded as permanent. To enable a surgeon to maintain his full professional force and skill he should have some time daily for mental and physical refreshment and recreation, which he can not find under the roof of any hospital. He could find it in that separation and seclusion that a convenient cottage residence upon the grounds would afford. In fact, there are at least two additional cottage residences required at this Home. The efficient adjutant and quartermaster, with his family, occupies small and cramped quarters in the main building which would be useful and are needed for office purposes, but which are wholly unfit as a residence.

The Home grounds have become a lovely park, ornate with shrubbery and flowers, and the woodlands adjoining the Home have been trimmed up and cleared by unpaid Home labor, which doubles the capacity of the space available for recreation and gentle exercise. The supply of water has been reinforced by sinking additional wells.

On the evening of my inspection the camp and the hospital heard through the open windows of the brightly lighted chapel, centrally situated in the Home park, the cantata of the Pilgrim Fathers, delightfully rendered by twenty young gentlemen and women from the neighborhood, which reflected in the most pleasing manner the sentiments of the community surrounding the Home.

The railway grade crossing near the Home, where several fatal accidents had occurred to members, has been lowered some 9 feet, a bridge built over it, and the approaches to the station so broadened and guarded that the possibility of accidents is precluded. In the rapid development and improvement of the Connecticut Home the State has been fortunate in its selection of officers. Its superintendent wasted no time in learning by long experience, but visited other older Homes and chose from perfected methods those which would be most useful here.

The Home records are complete and kept up to date. The military life which begot the Home is recalled by the drumbeat for all signals, and the sunset is marked by the evening gun.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONNECTICUT SOLDIERS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

NOROTON HEIGHTS, CONN., July 26, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The consolidated morning report for that date shows increase of 11 in membership over corresponding date of last year. This leaves us only 14 vacant beds, and the chairman of the executive committee reports an excess of applications over vacancies.

Heretofore only soldiers and sailors who were credited to the quota of the State of Connecticut, or those serving in organizations from other States who were actually residents of Connecticut at time of enlistment have been eligible to admission to this Home.

The legislature, which has just adjourned, extended eligibility to those who served in organizations from other States who have resided the past five consecutive years in this State. This law, which takes effect August 1, proximo, will undoubtedly add materially to applications for membership, and to meet this, as well as to relieve the present crowded condition of the Home, an appropriation was made of \$28,000 for additional buildings, which it is hoped can be made ready for occupancy the coming winter.

Some modification of the favorable report made last year in reference to results of treatment for the liquor habit seems necessary. Only a small percentage of those treated remain steadfast.

It is believed that the discipline of the Home is fully up to the average in similar institutions; quiet and good order prevail generally throughout all departments; disturbances and violations of rules are much less frequent than formerly. This result is largely owing to the long experience, judicious care, and kindly advice of the gentlemen of the executive committee, which has remained unchanged since the State first assumed control of the Home in 1887, with the exception of Colonel Morgan, the secretary, who was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Col. George M. White.

In accordance with your suggestion of last year, notices of discharges have been sent to all Branches of the National Home and to all State Homes every ten days. We have received similar notices from most of the State Homes and all Branches of the National Home. These latter are more than ten days delayed, however, as a rule.

No change has been made in administrative officers during the past year. Following are detailed statistics.

NOROTON HEIGHTS, CONN., July 26, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of the hospital of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Several of the cases reported in the death list were complicated. The two senile gangrene cases being already nearly exhausted with cardiac dropsy. One locomotor case developing pleurisy. An interesting case of elephantiasis carried off by acute meningitis, following an attack of erysipelas. One case of acute rheumatism winding up with gastritis and singultus. Also the case of spinal hemorrhage from a fall, closing a long epileptic career. Another case of dysentery, ending with pulmonary œdema, etc.

As we have a small convalescent ward I have changed reading under that head to "barracks," including all not in hospital. Under "impaired cerebration" and "partially blind" there is a margin for question and doubt, as also under head of "insomnia," "habitual constipation," "neuralgias," "muscular rheumatism," "senile debility," and perhaps some others.

No cases treated during the year have been of an unusual character, needing special mention. No diseases of an epidemic character have been attended here, and the sanitary condition of the Home and hospital is as nearly perfect, probably, as can be found.

It is noted that members have not come and gone after a short stay at the Home this year as they have done in previous years, but a greater

number remain permanently. The site of a soldiers' home with reference to large towns, influences the stability of its population, and this Home, being near Boston and several other manufacturing cities, has, until this year, had a fluctuating membership. Increasing age, probably, has also much to do with the steadiness of the population. The capacity of the Home has been strained during this year by reason of an average present of about forty more than the previous year, and at one time only half a dozen beds were available for emergencies.

A new barrack building is approaching completion and is expected to be occupied the last of September, and will increase the capacity 150, making the total capacity about 475. It has been found necessary to increase the hospital accommodations from year to year. The Massachusetts General Hospital and the City Hospital of Boston will not take or retain patients afflicted with incurable diseases, for the reason that their beds would soon become permanently filled and, therefore, when their patients are ex-soldiers they are transferred to the Soldiers' Home.

HOSPITAL.

There were 81 sick in hospital and 43 old men excused from all duty and domiciled in the main building. The surgeon's records are well kept. An incomparable cleanliness and brightness were found everywhere in the wards, dispensary, dining room, kitchen, storerooms and closets. There are many comfortable rooms having one, two, and three patients.

DORMITORIES.

The furniture of the rooms, containing generally two beds each, is not equaled in elegance and comfort in any public institution I have ever seen. In some of the rooms may be seen easy chairs which cost from \$15 to \$25 each, and the other furniture, beds, bureaus, wardrobes, rugs, pictures, and toilet articles accord with the chairs in cost and character. These rooms were furnished by the Woman's Relief Corps of the State. A surplus stock of bed and toilet linen, soap, brushes, etc., is on hand for some of these rooms sufficient to last three or four years. The members, although old and mostly infirm, present an uncommon appearance of clean, bright, and contented faces, animated eyes, well-kept hair, and tidy, comfortable clothing. They dine like people at a summer hotel, ten members being seated at each table, the spaces between affording room for every service.

A bugle is used for all calls. A simple but impressive ceremony was observed at sunset. A detachment of twelve members, in uniform with belts, formed in front of and facing the flagstaff east of the main building, and when the bugle had sounded the last note of retreat the flag was lowered and saluted by the detachment removing their caps.

CLAIM OF PRIORITY.

As a matter of important record, the superintendent claims that this Home was established and organized prior to any other Soldiers' Home in the country. Attention is respectfully invited to his report on this question. I believe that New Jersey has been heretofore credited with priority.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOLDIERS' HOME IN MASSACHUSETTS FOR
THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

CHELSEA, MASS., July 1, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The membership of the Home has been greater during the past year than ever before. During the winter months every available room was occupied, and we were obliged to refuse applicants for want of accommodations.

Notwithstanding the addition made to the hospital one year ago, the steadily increasing demand for admission to this department has rendered it necessary that additional room be provided for the sick, and to accomplish this, extensive alterations are now being made in the main building, and a new building is being constructed which, when completed, will have a capacity of about 220 beds.

The new building, now well under way, will be ready for occupancy early in the fall. It will be of brick, 120 feet long by 40 feet wide; three stories high on the front and four stories in the rear, with piazza and veranda attached to the first and second stories.

The basement will furnish a workroom for the engineer, a vegetable cellar, and a smoking room. The three stories above will be finished as dormitories, two on each floor, measuring 50 by 40 feet. Water-closets, bathrooms, and linen closets connected with each dormitory.

The building will be divided in the center by a heavy fire wall, and the main entrance and stairway will be finished with glazed brick, and provided with iron stairs and fireproof doors. The building will be further protected from fire by iron shutters, while standpipes on either end of the building, connected with each dormitory, will be an additional safeguard. A subway will connect this with the main buildings. The building will be known as "Sargent Hall," in honor of Gen. Horace Binney Sargent, the projector of the Home and the first president of the board of trustees.

Several important changes are being made in the main building. The hall, heretofore known as Sargent Hall, and used for entertainments, is being remodeled, and will be added to the hospital, furnishing a new dining room 46 feet long; also linen rooms, and apartments for the female nurses. On the two floors above, ten rooms on each floor are being added to the hospital, increasing that department from 78 to 118 beds.

"Peter Smith Hall," formerly used as a dormitory, is being changed to an entertainment hall, 60 feet long by 40 feet wide, while beyond this will be a library and reading room.

While it may not be considered as having any connection with the official report of our Home, yet I desire to record the fact, that it may be preserved for the future, that the first State Home, or the first Soldiers' Home established for the care of the sick and disabled veterans of the war of the rebellion, and where an appropriation was made by the State legislature for its maintenance, was located in Massachusetts.

In May, 1862, a soldiers' home organization was formed by a large number of philanthropic citizens of Boston and vicinity.

Rev. Phineas Stowe, a devoted friend of seamen, presented the fact of the destitute condition of some of the discharged soldiers, to the notice of a benevolent merchant, Daniel Tenney, esq., who promptly granted the free use of a large warehouse, to be occupied as a home, and contributed a liberal sum of money for its maintenance.

At the meeting in May, 1862, a constitution and set of by-laws were adopted, which provided that the association should be conducted under the name of "The Discharged Soldiers' Home," and "the design of the institution is to provide a comfortable home for such persons who are in need as have been honorably discharged from the Army of the United States, by reason of their sickness or wounds."

The constitution further provided for a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, executive committee, and board of managers, while the immediate charge and management of the Home was vested in a superintendent and matron.

On the 4th day of July, 1862, the Home was formerly inaugurated by religious services and appropriate addresses. The number of members was about forty.

In July, 1863, the city of Boston granted the managers the use of a commodious building on Springfield street where the Home continued in active operation for nearly eight years, or until the spring of 1870, when those soldiers not belonging to Massachusetts or who were not credited to the State during the war were transferred to the Eastern Branch of the National Home, at Togus, Me.

By an act of the legislature, three members of the board of managers were appointed by the governor, the surgeon-general of the State being ex-officio a member of the board.

From its inauguration in May, 1862, to April, 1870, 3,743 soldiers were admitted. The State of Massachusetts appropriated in the aggregate \$85,000 for its support, while \$30,754.12 was contributed by citizens.

The discontinuance of the Home was determined upon after the transfer to the Togus Home, in Maine, of such members as were not credited to Massachusetts during the war.

I think it can be clearly seen and readily acknowledged by consulting the complete file of Annual Reports of the Home on file in the Boston Public Library, that Massachusetts is entitled to the credit of establishing the first Home for Disabled Soldiers.

ADMISSIONS.

There is a correct administration of this Home with reference to admissions that is worthy of adoption by several other Homes to which admissions have been irregular and too easy: Final action is not taken on admission papers until after the Home surgeon has examined the applicant and the board of trustees at a meeting have voted upon the reports. It is noted that applicants during the past year have been largely American born and have exhibited greater disabilities than formerly.

RECORDS.

A complete set of record books are found at this Home, but two of the new ones (the Historical Register and the Record of Discharges) have not been used. The records in the old books will be transferred to the new ones.

"OLD MEN'S BUILDING."

This admirable building furnishes ample space for 30 beds, one-third of which are bedsteads 42 inches wide, and the others of iron 36 inches wide. The building is well lighted, well furnished, and clean.

NEW CONSTRUCTIONS.

That the State of Wisconsin entertains a generous but just view of her obligations to her disabled volunteer soldiers and of their wives and widows, is shown by her prompt and unhesitating recognition of the necessities of the Soldiers' Home, to enable it to keep pace with the growing demands, in the following legislation:

CHAPTER 381.—An act to appropriate a certain sum of money for improvements at the Wisconsin Veterans' Home.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. For the purpose of enlarging and making needed improvements at the Wisconsin Veterans' Home, there is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$25,000. The improvements necessary under this appropriation are as follows: Enlargement of main dining room and widows' hall, new kitchen in old people's building, addition to hospital kitchen and dining room, completion of closets, bathroom, and laboratory in hospital, furniture for hospital, repairs in Marden Hall, Assembly Hall, and Old Men's Building, new furniture for widow's hall, addition to laundry, new building for widows, and men with wives, two new boilers, 60-horsepower each, additional electric light, additional heating powers, enlarging pumping works, etc.

SEC. 2. The members of the board of trustees of said Wisconsin Veterans' Home shall execute to the State of Wisconsin a joint and several bond on their part in the penal sum of \$25,000, with two or more sufficient sureties, conditioned that they will faithfully expend and apply said moneys appropriated by this act strictly to the several objects and purposes for which the same are appropriated, and that they will in all respects discharge their duties as such trustees. Until such bond, as is hereinbefore provided, shall be properly made and approved by the governor and filed in the executive office, no money shall be paid out of the State treasury in pursuance of the appropriation made by this act. It shall be the duty of said trustees to keep a true and accurate account of the disbursements of moneys herein appropriated and report the same to the governor in writing.

SEC. 3. This act shall not in anywise repeal or amend any of the provisions of chapter 393, laws of 1891, but the said provisions of said chapter 393, laws of 1891, in so far as they are applicable to the expenditure of moneys hereby appropriated, and all reports relevant thereto, and all other duties imposed by said act, are hereby continued in force in respect to appropriations herein made, in so far as the case can be applied thereto.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Approved April 19, 1895.

CHAPTER 380.—An act to prevent the sale of intoxicants within a certain distance of the Wisconsin Veterans' Home.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any town board, village board, or common council of any town, village, or city to grant a license for the sale of spirituous, malt, ardent, or intoxicating liquors to any person or persons within a distance of 2½ miles of the grounds of the Wisconsin Veterans' Home, situated in the town of Farmington, county of Waupaca, and State of Wisconsin.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

Approved April 19, 1895.

The total cost of the buildings and extensions mentioned above and now under contract for construction is \$23,580. The "Old People's Building," now occupied by 60 married people, cost \$11,000. It is of two stories and the general plan is cruciform with annexes, the halls intersecting at right angles and each one being 100 feet long.

Another "Old People's Building," designed exclusively for married people, is contracted for at a cost of \$9,000. The plan is for a cruciform, one-story pavilion, the two arms being each 90 by 34 feet. The central or transecting building will be 118 by 36 feet and have a second story in front to furnish dormitories for employees, and will have the dining room and kitchen in rear. Its intended capacity is for 60 people. Large parlors or sitting rooms are provided at the exterior ends of the two wings and in front of the center building. The plan is admirably calculated to meet the wants of this class of beneficiaries. The question has frequently come from those States that are contemplating or adopting a provision for wives and widows of soldiers, "Which is the better form of construction for such beneficiaries, small cottages for couples, or large buildings with apartments?" Wisconsin, after giving both plans an extended and admirably successful trial, seems to be answering the question by discontinuing the erection of cottages and by extending the construction of large buildings with apartments and with independent dining room and kitchen in each.

An amusement hall, 36 by 78 feet, is also contracted for which will seat 400 people. Underneath the stage a spacious basement will afford quarters for the fire department of the Home. A building to contain the post-office, barber shop, and shoe and tailor shops, 38 by 32 feet, is to be erected under the same contract. The present dining room is to be extended 40 feet, which will at the same time increase the capacity of the widows' hall above it for about 12. These buildings and extensions, with dimensions and cost, are mentioned as a striking illustration of the economies of construction that have been attained here. A central power and heating plant is to be established, which will warm the "Old Men's Building," Marden Hall, Assembly Hall, and Twenty-first Regiment Building, and will also furnish power for electric lights, wood sawing, laundry, pumps, and sewage.

HOSPITAL.

The surgeon of the Home was established here on July 1, and has had little time to arrange his work. The record books have not been fully kept, some of them not at all, so that the surgeon will not be able to make a reliable annual report for the year ending June 30, 1895. There were but few sick enough to require nursing or special diet, perhaps half a dozen, but they were not separated from those who are called "convalescents" in the National Home. A proper separation will be made. The hospital kitchen and dining room will be enlarged. There was one woman nurse and one man detailed as attendant. The surgeon does his own pharmaceutical work and attends the wives and widows in the Home. While the hospital was generally clean, it did not exhibit that brightness which should characterize it. There was a deficiency of medical supplies, which the trustees promised to have remedied.

In every respect the growth and development of this Home have been a marvelous success, and it is a great satisfaction to note the general and special fitness of means to that end without noticeable waste or error. Considering the difficulties of ministering to the various wants and necessities of a complex population, full of all sorts of infirmities and caprices, the administration has been fortunate from the beginning in commanding the services of a matron possessing the highest qualifications for her office—controlling ability, quiet energy, a cheerful charity, and good health.

It is to be hoped that the efficient and thoughtful board of trustees may see their way to providing a visiting or permanent band of music for this sylvan Home.

I regret very much that our report has been so long delayed. It was nearly completed in July when our adjutant received imperative orders to do some other work and the report was laid on the table.

Our surgeon's report is not as complete as I had hoped it would be, for the reason that Dr. Manchester, who had been our surgeon ever since the organization of the Home, had to give up the work in the early spring on account of failing health, and recently died. Our present surgeon, Dr. George B. Noyes, has only been here since July 1, and found the records not in condition to make a very full report.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The sanitary conditions of this Home are good in most respects.

We have an abundant supply of unexcelled water and the air is untainted by malaria or the gases generated by mills in manufacturing districts, as we are several miles from any mills or factories.

The most serious question of sanitation confronting us is the disposition of sewages which at present is discharged into a reservoir in which the heavier portion settles and the more fluid part leaches out into the ground. The sediment is pumped over into a tank wagon, carted away, and spread upon the ground. I think that ultimately some better way will be devised for extending the sewer system, if not to running water, at least to some point more remote from the Home.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

Our chapel is the gift of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Wisconsin, erected in 1890 at a cost of \$3,256.50.

The chapel is for the use of any religious denominations desiring to hold services at the Home, but there is no formal organization of any religious sect or society.

F. A. Marden Post, No. 126, Grand Army of the Republic, has a membership of 86.

The Wisconsin Veterans' Home Lodge, No. 473, Independent Order of Good Templars, has 64 members.

The Wisconsin Veterans' Home Temple of Honor, No. 5, has 27 members.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union maintains a nicely furnished free reading and music room for the women and the girls connected with and employed by the Home.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

Old people's building, post-office building, including repair shops, addition to dining hall, extension of electric plant, central heating plant, addition to hospital of kitchen and dining room, and dead house, at an aggregate cost of \$30,000.

From such an array of boards one would expect to have his admiration aroused by an inspection of the Home, but on the contrary I regret to report that the welfare of the Soldiers' Home, in degree, is inversely proportioned to the amplification of its official control.

The chief attention bestowed on the Home during the past year by the State authorities seems to have been to change all of its officers, including the surgeon, without any assigned cause. That these changes were coincident with political changes in State control between different political parties permits the inference that the welfare of the disabled volunteer soldiers in this State Home receives but a secondary

consideration from the State authorities. There have been five changes of the officers of this Home since its establishment in 1888. That they have generally retarded and embarrassed its development is deplorably apparent. This unwise and unjustifiable political practice accounts in a good degree for the entire neglect of repairs of the main building and of the hospital which were so earnestly called for in my report of last year. During my inspection of the quarters of the main building on this date, while a light rain was falling, the roof was leaking so badly at several points that buckets were placed on the floors and on the beds to catch the water that fell through the ceilings. The walls are cracked and discolored and the plaster has fallen off in many places. The entire interior will require repairs after the roof shall have been repaired. Not a blow has been struck in the direction of repairs since my last inspection and report, and the main building, if not soon restored, will become uninhabitable. When one set of officers have gained experience necessary to a good administration, and have fully ascertained the necessities to be met, they have been removed and another new set have taken their places to repeat the experience of their predecessors.

Referring to the recommendations of my last year's report an appropriation for a dining hall was withheld and the dining room and kitchen are still in the half-lighted basement of the main building, difficult and perilous of access to disabled old men. All the obnoxious conditions of bad plumbing, steep stairways, and lack of elevators still remain. All the offices of the Home are now restricted to one room, all others, together with a part of the reception rooms, having been surrendered to dormitory use for the members. The last change of officers took place March 15, 1895, and the new commandant and adjutant have kept the records well up and in good order, and have made proper use and record of discharge cards of their own and other Homes. Two thousand dollars were appropriated for repairs by the legislature, which adjourned the latter part of March, 1895, so that about three months have elapsed since this fund became available, but nothing has been done, except that two members of the board of public lands and buildings inspected the Home on May 25, and afterwards sent some architects to examine the main building at the earnest solicitation of the commandant. Since then nothing has been done.

The officers of the Home fully realize the pressing exigencies that exist, but are helpless to meet them because the authority to direct construction or repairs is lodged exclusively in the board of public lands and buildings. The visiting and examining board, and especially its president, a lady of uncommon ability and rare energy, have endeavored to expedite action on the part of the controlling boards, but thus far without success. It may be noted that the appropriation for maintenance and clothing is precisely the same amount that was made two years ago, when the population present was nearly one-third less. As that amount is reported to have been quite small enough for a less number of members it is to be apprehended that there will be great embarrassment in the effort to maintain the population during the two years now passing.

An inspection of the members showed them to be comfortably clothed and clean. Considering the cramped condition of their kitchen the food was well prepared. The dining room is disagreeably dark. The dormitories admit of little quiet or repose in the daytime. Many of the embarrassments arising from all the unfortunate conditions that have been mentioned in this and previous reports are greatly ameliorated by the intelligent industry and cheerful ministrations of the faithful matron. The adjutant is a very active and resourceful man. He discharges all the duties of adjutant, quartermaster, and commissary, and does much other unclassified work, as the commandant is physically disabled from performing many duties. The adjutant receives but \$900 per annum. He earns double the amount, but certainly should receive not less than \$1,200, with furnished quarters, subsistence, fuel, and light.

Martial music is provided for calls and inspections. Report on pensions and the farm will be found in the annual report of the commandant.

HOSPITAL.

The new surgeon has assumed his duties with a surprising readiness for hospital details, and keeps his records with intelligence and accuracy. Like his predecessor, and fortunately for the sick, he is well equipped with instruments and books of his own. He mentioned, however, the want of a microscope.

The number of sick was 23, and they are receiving as good care as the means at hand will permit.

Members have been admitted to the Home on the certificate of outside and irresponsible physicians alone and without the examination of the Home surgeon, who alone is responsible for the final physical and medical examination of applicants, on which their applications should be considered.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEBRASKA SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

GRAND ISLAND, NEBR., July 26, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895.

In so doing I beg to say, that by authority of an appointment of the governor, duly confirmed by the senate, I took charge of the Home on the 15th day of March, 1895, and entered upon my duties as commandant immediately thereafter. I appointed the following officers: Mart Howe, adjutant; S. Sadler, surgeon; Hannah Zimmer, matron. These appointments were duly confirmed by the visiting and examining board, and all entered upon their duties April 1, 1895, except the matron, who assumed her duties March 15, 1895.

The former commandant, in his report to you July 30, 1894, said: "The Home has been much crippled on account of the meager appropriation made for its support, and as the Nebraska legislature meets biennially no relief can be had until 1895." The legislature of 1895 is now a thing of the past, and when we examine the laws passed at that session we find the same in amount has been appropriated for maintenance for the biennial period as was appropriated by the legislature of 1893, notwithstanding the constant increase of applications and admissions.

The appropriations for new buildings, repairs, etc., as shown in this report, will greatly increase the accommodations of the Home, yet with the limit of fund available for maintenance there can not be a proportionate increase in the population.

Particular attention is paid each day to the cleanliness of every department of the Home.

All fresh meats are slaughtered from stock grown and fattened on the Home farm.

A splendid herd of Holstein cattle and Poland-China hogs are kept and bred on the farm for home consumption, and the total farm products, as shown in this report, will add much to the maintenance of the Home.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

All members are required to bathe, at least once each week. Good bath rooms, with hot and cold water, are provided. Clothing is changed and washed each week. Rooms are swept and dusted each day, and scrubbed twice each week. Rooms and bedding are thoroughly aired each day and bed clothing changed every week. When an applicant for membership is admitted he is required to take a bath, and dress himself in a clean outfit complete. All buildings are connected with a sanitary sewer that flows or empties into a brook one quarter of a mile from the buildings. Five hundred dollars have been appropriated to improve the outlet.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

The Home has a chapel seating capacity of 150. It is used twice each week for devotional services—preaching each Sunday. Services are conducted by the ministers of the city voluntarily and nearly all ministers bring their choirs with them, which adds to the interest and brings out a large attendance. Thursday evening of each week there is prayer meeting, usually led by Miss Kimball, a lady residing not far from the Home. She is an earnest and noble woman and has done much good.

The members of the Home who belong to the Grand Army of the Republic, Masons, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, or kindred societies, have their membership with those societies in the city, as we have no organized society in the Home.

We secure an amusement and smoking room where the inmates can smoke and engage in cards, chess, and other games of amusement.

The number of those reckoned present, although living outside the Home, is 16, drawing rations from the Home. All are married. One is employed as teamster by the Home at \$12.50 per month. These men draw rations amounting in value to \$6 per month, and one suit of outside clothing and underclothing, at the discretion of the commandant. The total dormitory capacity of the Home being 225 beds, and there being on hand at the present time 110 single and 5 double beds, there is room for 110 more single beds.

The commandant of this Home, Capt. J. P. Megrew, was displaced at the last meeting of the board of commissioners by the reappointment of Capt. W. V. Lucas, to take effect July 1, 1895. No direction or rule was made regarding the rendering of the annual and quarterly reports of the Home for the year and quarter ending June 30, but it is obviously proper that such reports should be made by the retiring commandant.

The main building is suffering from the necessity of repairs. It needs a thorough overhauling. The roof leaks in a few places and the walls are cracked and discolored in every story. The plumbing also requires attention, especially in the urinals. The necessity for easy fire escapes upon the exterior walls is exigent and should be attended to without delay by the authorities who are responsible for the safety and welfare of the members occupying the building. The appropriation for repairs for the year ending June 30, 1895, being only \$600, was soon expended to meet various necessities—on the water pipes, boiler house, plastering and calcimining, and in some improvements which would properly be charged to construction account.

The appropriation for the coming year not being available until July 1, the general repairs to the main building have been postponed. If an elevator were placed in the main building it would relieve many of the most infirm old men from the fatiguing necessity of climbing and descending the stairs to and from their meals. The situation of the main building affords the members an interesting and inspiring view of an untiring landscape. The sky rivals, in its charms, brightness, and cerulean hues, any that invites artists to Italy. The environment of bald or sparsely pine-clad hills, naked cliffs, and rugged glens presents a kaleidoscopic spectacle of lights and shades from rising to setting sun.

CONSTRUCTION.

An important modification of the pumping apparatus by sinking a shaft in the boiler house, the building of a laundry and carpenter shop, and the enlargement of stable accommodations comprise the new constructions since my last report. The necessity for a separate residence for the commandant and adjutant, which shall also contain the offices of the Home, is becoming more and more apparent. If it were supplied, the main building might be entirely surrendered to the members and their comfort and welfare, as well as the facilities of the administration thereby increased. A better provision against fire, by fixing fire plugs with attached hose on each story of the main building, seems quite necessary.

HOSPITAL.

There are only seven sick, who are well cared for in the one-story hospital, which will be more commodious and convenient when the two-story addition, begun last year, is completed and furnished. The surgeon owns all the instruments and does all the pharmaceutical work. His pay is ridiculously small, being only \$600 per annum, with unfurnished house and feed for his horse. The sick and disabled soldiers are entitled to the best medical skill, and they seem to have it here, and \$1,200 per annum would seem little enough for the State to pay for it. Six hundred and eighty dollars were appropriated for the wages of nurses and cook. Fortunately for the fund, the sick list is now small. It has been as large as 12. Tents are provided for emergencies of contagious diseases.

RECORD BOOKS.

It is a pleasure to report that all the record books of this Home are complete and well kept. Record cards are generally received from the States and Branches of the National Home.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOUTH DAKOTA SOLDIERS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

HOT SPRINGS, S. DAK., July 6, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Mrs. Josie B. Megrew, wife of the commandant and matron of the Home, died in Omaha, Nebr., January 22, 1895, having been removed to that city for surgical treatment, which failed to give relief. Fitting services were conducted at the Home and the body laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery. The usual emblems of mourning were worn for thirty days, and the somber draperies of the entrances and corridors of the Home gave mute testimony to the loss that had been sustained. Mrs. Whitfield, wife of the surgeon, was appointed to fill the vacancy, and has performed the duty with rare fidelity.

Tabulated statements attached show a marked increase of admissions during the year. This is accounted for in a large degree by the failure of crops throughout the State and the general depression in commercial and financial circles.

The usual offenses against the peace and dignity of the Home have not increased out of proportion to increase in population. Restoration of the rule requiring members to obtain a pass before leaving the Home became an imperative necessity, and has had a salutary effect.

Regular chapel services are strictly observed, the pastors of the different organized churches in the city alternating. Recognition of distinct midweek prayer meetings and song services has been denied, for the reason that partizanship or sectarianism, of whatever nature, is, in my judgment, prejudicial to the general harmony of the Home.

Conforming to your recommendation, the management has authorized, set apart, platted, and fenced a tract for the purpose, in which are now buried ten of the members, and proper requisition made for headstones, and for all others buried in public cemeteries. Appropriate and impressive services, under the direction of the post commander, were conducted and participated in by the Woman's Relief Corps and citizens of the town.

Also, to provide for water mains, completion of hospital addition, and other construction, and on coal deficiency, \$2,280, which, being within the limit fixed by legislative enactment, except in the item of deficiency in fuel, amounting to \$500, this, as well as the following were provided for: Water main, poultry house, morgue, ice house, and cemetery fence.

Special appropriation having been made in the sum of \$2,280 to carry forward the improvement in hospital, toward which the Women's Relief Corps of the department had generously contributed and paid over the sum of \$440, to provide the much-needed relief from insufficiency of water.

A liberal amount of seed has been sown and some profit in the garden is looked for. The surgeon's report is herewith presented. Dr. Whitfield has demonstrated his fitness for the work of caring for the sick. I desire to convey my thanks to him, as well as to the acting matron, adjutant, and quartermaster, for intelligent and faithful discharge of duty.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of the hospital of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The average health of the Home during the past year has been excellent. There have been no epidemic or contagious diseases. Of the 247 cases treated only 47 were admitted to the hospital. There were but 9 deaths in the hospital during the year. It is the rule, marked improvements follow admission to this Home, due, no doubt, to the excellent location of the Home, and the mineral waters. The use of the water not only relieves many ailments unaided, but quickens and enhances the action of medicines when it is necessary to use them. The sanitary conditions of the Home are excellent.

During the past year the hospital annex has been completed; it contains a dispensary, operating room, and seven private rooms, and greatly relieves the cramped condition previously existing. The small room formerly used as a dispensary has been converted into a dining room for convalescing patients.

The erection of a morgue near the hospital enables us to properly care for the dead without inconveniencing the living.

Thanks are due to the board of commissioners and to Commandant Megrew for the heartiness with which they have responded to the many requisitions made upon them by the surgeon in the interests of the hospital.

I herewith submit to you a tabulated report of cases treated during the past year.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The utmost care is exercised to keep the main building and its surroundings in a condition of cleanliness, the sergeant being charged with the duty of seeing that all parts of the building are thoroughly mopped and renovated on Wednesday and Saturday of each week. One man is employed at a salary of \$100 per annum to keep in order the bath, wash rooms, and closets, using freely of disinfectants. Frequent inspection by the commandant is had. Sewerage is perfect, being discharged at a distance of half a mile from the Home.

HOT SPRINGS, S. DAK., *June 29, 1895.*

SIR: I have the honor to submit to you the following report relating to the number of soldiers discharged and furloughed from this Home during the year ending June 30, 1895:

Thirteen were discharged and left this Home either cured or so greatly benefited they could go forth and care for themselves, whereas when they came here they were ailing and reduced by disease so as to be a burden to themselves and to their friends. The principal diseases, mostly chronic in nature, were constipation, diarrhea, cystitis, both acute and chronic; rheumatism, in all its forms, mostly of long standing; catarrh in all its forms—nasal, throat, and alimentary; lung and heart troubles; bronchitis, asthma, epilepsy, progressive locomotor ataxia, partial paralysis, insomnia, and other diseases incident to the old soldier.

Fifty-six were furloughed, generally for ninety days, all of whom have asked for extension of furlough, their improvement being so permanent and health so restored by having been here and used the water so faithfully that they prefer to stay away, a spell longer at least. But while absent others learn of the great benefits they derived and so continue to come. I have taken men into the hospital here direct from the train, perfectly helpless, and in less than six weeks they went home and to work. The 56 above mentioned were here taking baths for the same diseases before mentioned. I might mention many other diseases man is heir to that these waters alleviate as well as cure. But little medicine has been used in this Home and hospital since my advent here eleven months ago. The perfect altitude, healthful air, the fragrant, piney forests, beautiful and variegated mountain scenery, all help the waters principally.

RECORD.

There were some books lacking and a few omissions in those that were kept which it was promised should be supplied. In the Historical Register "admission papers" were not described. "Army discharges," or "certificates of service," were not noted, and number of "pension certificate" was not recorded. No record book of discharges was kept.

HOSPITAL.

An air of quiet comfort and contentment prevailed here. All the wards were well and brightly furnished and the dining room and kitchen thoroughly equipped and clean. The windows are well shaded so that the light is agreeably mellowed, and the ventilation is complete. The situation of the hospital upon the highest elevation of the grounds

and the outlook from its windows and porches over a broad expanse of water and island uplands, with a view of distant towns and intervening commercial activities, presents a scene of never-ending interest to the languid and waning lives of the invalids. The chief hospital record was well kept, but hospital cards had not yet been used and there was a lack of some medical records of minor importance.

At the individual inspection and muster of the members it was observed that they were so uniformly disabled that one could not doubt that everyone was eligible to the beneficence of the Home. The pavilions are well lighted, spacious, well furnished, and clean, and presented an ideal of good order and home comfort. The dining room in each pavilion, with conveniently arranged baths and lavatories, the high and roomy lockers or wardrobes, and the service rooms and sheltering corridors between the pavilions and the central kitchen present a well-planned combination of least exposure and minimum resistance to the lives of disabled men.

When a fire alarm was given a few of the least disabled members ran a hundred feet with a hose from a fire box on the grounds and had a stream on the stables in about one minute after the signal was given. The Home grounds having been finished and ornamented with shrubbery and flowers, improvements have been extended to the adjacent fields, and sylvan resorts for the members who are able to walk half a mile have been found among the bowlders and tangled thickets of the shore down below.

The structural excellencies and admirable methods found at this Home have their origin and living impulses in the lively interest taken in its welfare by its Board of Managers, including the Governor and other officers of the State, all of whom accompanied me in this inspection.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE, *Dayton, Ohio, July 31, 1895.*

SIR: After the inspection of the Oregon State Home, I proceeded to Orting, Wash., where that State Home is located, arriving there on the evening of July 15. On the 16th I made a careful muster of the men and a thorough inspection of the Home.

At the muster I found 110 men present, and 1 reported absent. Of the sick, in hospital, there were 10. Deaths during the year ending June 30, 1895, 7.

The commandant reported admissions during the year, 81, of which 53 were native and 28 foreign born. The capacity of this Home, in dormitories, is reported as 153. Hospital accommodations, 50 beds. This is understood to be quite sufficient for the present.

There are none violently insane, and none so demented as to require special care and attention, although 3 are reported as weak-minded.

Amusements are not provided. There is a small library and smoking room, and there the men play games with cards, dominoes, etc. The general opinion prevails that the veterans are getting too old and feeble to take much interest in billiards, bowling alleys, etc.

Very many improvements have been made and are still progressing at the Home. It was gratifying to learn that the State legislature, at its last session, was liberal in making appropriations, and the board of trustees have given the matter careful attention. Two members of the board, Captain McMicken, secretary, and Lieutenant Boardman, treasurer, were at the Home superintending the building and improvements of grounds. They give these matters close attention, and are doing efficient work. It is rarely that business men can be found to take

such an undertaking in charge, to the neglect of their own personal affairs. The Home is surrounded by dense forests and the clearing up of the land is something of an undertaking of itself, and that, too, is being pushed forward by the united efforts of the committee and the commandant. All are united in one common desire to see this young State among the foremost in the care of its disabled veterans.

The hospital, under the eye of the matron, Mrs. Achilles, is one of the features of this Home worthy of special mention. The surgeon, who also acts as adjutant, is careful and painstaking. The patients were unstinted in their praise of both surgeon and matron.

Under charge of Captain Achilles, who saw hard service during the war, the people of Washington may hope to see their war-worn and disabled veterans well cared for and the appropriations, made by the State for the use of these dependent men, honestly and wisely expended.

The inspection showed clearly that the men were well clothed, well fed, and in every particular properly cared for.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The sanitation of the Home is carefully looked after by the officers. The sewer, with which all the quarters—hospital, kitchen, and offices—are connected, has recently been extended 2,350 feet to a running stream. The sewer is flushed thoroughly twice a week, and thus kept clean. The quarters and grounds are thoroughly policed, and the halls, porches, and rooms frequently scrubbed. The men are required to air their beds each day for an hour before making them up, and as often as once a

week, when the weather is clear, mattresses, pillows, and all bed clothing are taken out of doors and thoroughly sunned and aired. The men appreciate the necessity of cleanliness, and bathe as often as once a week, a given number of men being assigned to each day, thus giving no man an excuse for not bathing.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

During the greater part of the year an inmate, who was a regularly ordained minister, held services in the assembly room every Sunday afternoon. These services have been fairly well attended. Since the discharge from the Home of this minister, who was chaplain, services have been frequently held by ministers from the neighboring village of Orting. Many of the inmates attend religious services very regularly at Orting.

The only organized society of the Home is a post of the Grand Army of the Republic, to which only members of the Home belong.

Of the 49 admitted during the year 30 were native Americans, or over 60 per cent. The continued interest manifested by the citizens of Vermont, and especially by the women, in the Soldiers' Home is doubtless largely due to the fact that a great proportion of its members are natives of the State. In the Western States the proportion of natives in their Soldiers' Homes is inconsiderable and the interest of the citizens in some of those States is correspondingly diminished. It may be

noticed also that the furniture and ideas of household comforts in each State Home accord in some degree with the general outfit and habits of life of the citizens. The members were uncommonly well clothed and they seem to keep their clothing clean and neat. The inspection of quarters, dining room, kitchen, laundry, hospital, the outbuildings, farm, garden, zoological collection, and the admirably arranged cemetery was altogether pleasurable and suggestive. The freshness of all commissary supplies and the scrupulous care displayed in their storage had an appetizing effect. To a large variety of food the women of the State add stores of preserves and delicacies for the use of the sick in hospital during the winter. The last winter was severe, the thermometer ranging below zero for considerable periods, but no difficulty was experienced in keeping the buildings warm, and the superintendent reports that there was not a single complaint of the cold during the winter. At supper there were 54 present, and the food was good and plentiful and well served. I observed a method of shortening the time for clearing the tables and reducing dining-room labors to a minimum, which might be adopted with advantage in small Homes. As the men left the tables, each carried the tableware he had been using and placed it, properly assorted, on a large table near the exit. This left but little clearing to be done and lessened the chances of breakage. Plans have been made for a contemplated increase of dormitory capacity, which are awaiting an appropriation by the next legislature. It may become necessary to use the chapel for beds during the coming winter. An addition to the laundry is building for machinery.

HOSPITAL.

Plenty of room is now provided and the sick are well cared for and supplied with everything they require. It is not unlikely that the diet kitchen now in a front room will before long be removed to the rear, where it ought to be. The administration of this Home has so grown in grace and a knowledge of the true lines of provision and control that its exercise is unobserved. The members do not have the appearance of stopping here as visiting beneficiaries; they live here.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Your recent visit of inspection makes it unnecessary to make a very extended report at this time. The Home being already equipped with steam heating, electric lights, a complete system of sewerage, and hospital, there have been no additional changes in the past year.

The board of trustees held the eighth annual meeting on July 23, 1895. It was evident that the present capacity of the main building is not sufficient to accommodate the increasing demand that it will be necessary to care for.

After an experience of nearly nine years as superintendent of this Home I am convinced that there are still a large number of veterans that it will be necessary to care for; that the height of membership has not yet been reached. I hope that during the coming year the officials of the State Homes will have a meeting at some place, which would be of great value to them personally as well as to the Homes which they have in charge.

VERMONT SOLDIERS' HOME,
Bennington, October 1, 1894.

SIR: Since my last report, July 1, 1892, 16 of the inmates of the Vermont Soldiers' Home, at Bennington have died. Of this number 5 died from consumption, 2 from senile decay or old age, 2 from heart disease, 1 from tetany, 1 from Bright's disease, 1 from cancer, 1 from inflammation of the bladder, and 1 died in the asylum at Brattleboro.

In my report of two years ago, which covered a period of five years one month and twelve days, I had 26 deaths to report. Adding to that number the 16 which have occurred during the past two years, the period covered by this report, makes 42 deaths since the Home was first opened. Of the whole number of deaths that have occurred in the Home, 11 died from consumption, 7 from heart disease, 6 from old age, 3 from apoplexy, 3 from Bright's disease, 3 from cancer, 2 from softening of the brain, 2 died insane in the asylum at Brattleboro, 2 committed suicide, 2 from ulceration of the stomach, and 1 from tetany. The most common diseases with which they were afflicted at the time of their admission were consumption, heart disease, dyspepsia, spinal disease, and malarial poison.

I can say now, as I said two years ago, in every case the disease which caused death existed when they were admitted to the Home.

Of acute sickness there has been very little in the past two years. Ordinary colds in the winter and mild bowel complaints in the summer have at times been common,

but never severe or protracted. In my last report I called attention to the fact that no case of typhoid fever, diphtheria, dysentery, erysipelas, or pneumonia had occurred in the Home as evidence that it is favorably located, well drained, and admirably managed in all respects. I can say the same at the present time.

The average age of the admitted is now greater than at the time of my previous report, and a larger proportion are placed in the hospital at once on their admission. This has made a demand for more hospital room, which has recently been supplied by an annex to the hospital building, containing nine rooms for patients and one store-room.

No change in the rules relating to pensions has been made since last report. No trouble has been made on account of the rules since last report.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

During the past year no outlay has been necessary for this purpose. The 12-inch sewer, discharging in a running brook 1,100 feet from the Home, makes the sewerage system almost perfect.

All sweepings, rags, and bandages from the Home are burned every morning in a brick stove made for the purpose in rear of the buildings.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

During the past year, except during the winter months, services have been held in the chapel on Sundays at 3 p. m. The different clergymen in Bennington have volunteered their services (except the Roman Catholic). The Home provides first-class singing, a mixed quartette, and organist. The members of the Home that are able attend church wherever they wish; all the different churches being within one-third of a mile from the Home. A good number of citizens are always in attendance at the chapel services.

Camp-fires, concerts, and other exercises are held in the chapel, which is a gift from the Grand Army of the Republic and friends, costing \$2,865.

At the inspection of members they were assembled at short notice, and as about one-third of them had been employed at farm work and in the kitchen and elsewhere there was a want of uniformity in their clothing and hats. That they were well supplied, however, was discovered at an inspection of quarters immediately after the outdoor muster. The well-furnished and comfortable rooms were models of good order and cleanliness. Both inspections assured me of the general disability of all the members. Yet all the work of the Home, on the farm, in the garden, kitchen, dining room, hospital, on the lawns, and in the stables is performed by the members, with the exception of one citizen, a man-of-all-work on the farm. From the day of its establishment until now the work of the Home has been thus performed by the members who have not been excused or restrained from labor by the surgeon. A rocky, bowlder-strewn topography has been subdued, and the cleared and cultivated fields are now producing all the vegetables and

hay consumed at the Home. The sloping lawns in front of and around the Home are now blooming with flowers and variegated shrubbery that never cost the State \$5 all told. The members take as much interest in the development of the Home and its surroundings as if they owned it all, and the results that have been achieved in the last four years illustrate in the most satisfactory manner what may be accomplished by the feeble but persistent labor of a few disabled but willing old soldiers. The officers say that those members who are able to work at all, even an hour or two, are the most contented in the Home, and that those who can not work at all are prone to be uneasy and dispirited. Instances were mentioned where men had declined a furlough, or returned from one before it had expired, because certain work was unfinished. The true Home sentiment is cherished and enjoyed at the New Hampshire Soldiers' Home.

DINING ROOM AND KITCHEN.

Some enlargements and extensions have been found necessary in the appliances for the preparation of food. The furniture is adequate and the food is bountiful and well prepared; the vegetables are of rare freshness and great variety; the milk and butter are of the best dairy production, the latter being furnished by contract at 25 cents per pound the year round.

DISCIPLINE.

Very little trouble has been experienced on account of intemperate indulgence in drink. Only one member has been discharged for persistent intoxication. One member died from alcoholism, and two men who sold him some of the liquor were arrested, tried, convicted, and sentenced to a fine of \$50 each and costs. The alertness of Captain Smith, the commandant, in prosecuting these and other offenders, has produced the best restraining influence on the sale of intoxicating drinks to members of the Home.

HOSPITAL.

In accordance with the suggestions in my report of last year a new and commodious hospital has been built which will accommodate 22 beds, with a provision to double the number when needed. It will also contain the dispensary and surgeon's offices. The plan is cruciform, the north and south arms having a total length of 111 feet by 40 wide. The total length of the east and the west arms is 140 feet. It will have its own dining room and kitchen. Instead of wards it is subdivided into spacious rooms, most of which will hold 2 to 4 beds.

It will probably receive a broad and lofty portico running along the front and the east and west ends, thus affording to those invalids who are able to get out of doors an opportunity to enjoy the open air and sunshine. The eight now sick in the old hospital have beds in different rooms and are supplied with special diet as required.

FARM.

The farm and garden, which yield bountiful crops to a careful cultivation, repay an inspection in observing the satisfaction with which the old men regard the results of their labor.

Where so many interesting and excellent conditions may be seen, showing a thoughtful and faithful management of the Home, it is not agreeable to note the almost total lack of proper record books in the

office of the commandant and in the hospital. I feel sure that were they once obtained and put in use the managers would wonder how they had ever got along without them. It is the only Home where they are not in use.

Friday.—*Breakfast:* Baked potatoes, codfish. *Dinner:* Fresh fish or chowder. *Supper:* Cake, cheese.

Saturday.—*Breakfast:* Baked potatoes, cold meat. *Dinner:* Corned beef, potatoes, vegetables. *Supper:* Toast, sauce, or berries.

Bread, crackers, tea, coffee, butter, milk, and pickles served at all meals. Doughnuts, oatmeal, and boiled eggs at every breakfast. Pie or pudding each dinner. Berries in their season for supper. Apples are placed where members have access to them from August 15 to June.

Changes are made in the general dining hall bill of fare every week.

Hospital bill of fare is prescribed by the hospital steward.

Capt. D. C. Goodrich, of Western Branch, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, inspected this Home August 10, 1895, and reports as follows:

A marked improvement in the general appearance and condition of this Home over that of a year since was plainly observable. Under the management of the new commandant, Colonel Cunningham, a change has been wrought which has been for the better. The general condition of the grounds were much improved, needed changes in the ventilation of the men's quarters have been made, and better regulations established for enforcement of room and personal cleanliness. There is a very marked improvement in the regulation uniforms. The dress coat, trousers, and vest are made of a very good quality of middlesex, dark blue, 14.02 cloth, each garment cut and made to order, well lined, trimmed, and made up by a tailor, for each individual member, with a State "sunflower" button with the words "Kansas Soldiers' Home" stamped thereon. When in line for inspection they presented a splendid appearance. The officers all have supplied themselves with full-dress uniforms, soft hat and cord. All the noncommissioned officers wore the regulation chevron insignia of rank, uniform with those of the Regular Army. In fact, were it not for the advanced ages of the men in line the inspection of the 80 men in the ranks would have been that of a garrison of regulars. A splendid drum corps of ten pieces, made up from the ranks of the members and boys of the soldiers' families, has been organized and is in a good shape of drill and discipline.

The dining room and kitchen for the twenty-odd members without families are still in the hands of a member and his wife, as shown in last report. An inspection of this department and questioning many of the men revealed nothing to call forth any criticism, except a possible want of change of diet as often as should be. There is one urgent need in

this department, and it should be supplied without delay. A bake-house, at a cost of not over \$500, ought to be erected, where the bread, not only for the general dining hall, but for all the families at the Home, could be supplied by a professional bread maker, thus bringing about a measure of economy and health for the Home. The supplies are now purchased under contract.

There is now under construction, soon to be completed, cottages for 39 additional families. The appropriations as above shown are based on the care of 500 people. HOSPITAL.

No particular change in the hospital was found, except that the dispensary had received an outfit of shelf bottles. Six were sick in hospital. One death was recorded during last year. By far the greater number of prescriptions are made for the families. The duties of the surgeon are by no means confined to the care of the old veteran and ordinary ailments of the population of the Home, inasmuch as the old heroes still honor the teachings of the Good Book wherein it says: "Be fruitful and replenish the earth." The surgeon reported no perceptible lack of activity in this department.

The appropriation of \$400 per year for medical stores is small. Unless the surgeon can draw from the contingent fund for this pur-

pose he will have much difficulty in the proper administration of his department. No insane has been sent away from the Home.

LIBRARY.

The library is now stocked with 600 bound volumes, 4 daily and 6 weekly papers, besides many magazines. It is in charge of a paid female librarian.

PENSIONS.

The only regulation enforced by the Home relative to pensions received by the members is the retention of the pension of those who will make improper use of it. Many are using their money to beautify their home and adding comforts not otherwise provided.

QUARTERMASTER'S AND COMMISSARY'S DEPARTMENTS.

These departments were found in good condition; however, with room for further improvement in the manner of keeping the issue book. No invoice book is in use—nothing but vouchers to show the receipts of the Home. The State accountant had visited the Home and will inaugurate needed changes in their accounts.

WATER AND IRRIGATION.

In addition to the large water tank and wind power noted in last report, a centrifugal steam pump has been put in, with a capacity of 600 gallons per minute, which is being used for supplying a reservoir with a capacity of 2,500,000 gallons of water. This water is used for irrigating purposes and is a very valuable acquisition to the Home. The same pump will also be used for supplying the tank on the high ground north of the buildings when wind power is lacking. With this irrigation reservoir the Home will be self-supporting in way of vegetables, not otherwise possible except in rare seasons.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

In addition to the subject-matter given in the report, I wish to state that the demands on the Home by applicants were greater than its facilities to care for them. The legislature appropriated \$15,000 for additional buildings, many of which are well-nigh completed. It will enable us to care for at least 40 more, mostly comrades and their families. The irrigation plant spoken of in a former report is completed and in successful operation. It has proven a great help to us in gardening and the growing of a greater variety of vegetables for the use of the Home. From present experience I have reason to believe that in the future we will be able to grow vegetables enough to supply the Home.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

In the hospital a weekly bath is obligatory, also a change of underclothing once a week. In camp personal cleanliness is exacted. Proper ventilation is enforced. Swill barrels are kept at least 40 feet from houses and emptied daily. Every privy has a box of dry earth constantly in it, to be used after each defecation, in order to keep vaults disinfected.

Cleanliness of houses, clothing, beds, cupboards, etc., is enjoined and enforced by weekly rigid inspections of all the premises. Such inspections are made by the commandant and surgeon.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

The Methodist Episcopal and Free Methodist societies have classes. Religious services may be held and conducted by the ministers of any denomination. A Union Sabbath school and Epworth League are organized, and all are well attended by the inmates of the Home.

At the time of this inspection, July 29, 1895, permanent improvements were under way which, when completed, will be a material betterment to the Home. The east wing of the two-story cottage, completed last year, was being rapidly pushed toward the roof. This addition is 31 feet 6 inches by 55 feet, one story and basement, constructed of stone, and uniform with the other buildings of the Home. A tower is being erected at the southwest corner of the wing, and against the central or two-story cottage, to be three stories in height and 14 feet by 15 feet 6 inches in plan. In the top of this tower will be placed a tank to hold 9,000 gallons of water, to be supplied with artesian water by a small steam pump, and thence by gravitation to all the buildings of the Home, and also to afford a degree of fire protection through the small fire plugs connected with the main. An addition to the building, denominated the power house, is being erected, to be used as a general kitchen and bakery, the bake oven being completed while I was at the Home. Upon completion of the new wing above described the men now quartered in the power house will be removed thereto, and the room thus vacated will be transformed into the general dining room, thus relieving the west wing of the hospital, now used for that purpose. In addition to this change, made possible by the construction of this wing to main cottage, room will be supplied for bath tubs and four water-closets, accessible from the two-story main cottage as well as the wing thereto, thus correcting the mistake made as to these necessities noticed in last year's report.

The east porch in front and on south side of the hospital has been entirely inclosed with glass. A door of sufficient width is cut through the outside wall into the ward to admit of the passage of beds from the ward to the porch for the purpose of giving the patients the benefit of air and sunshine so necessary to the sick, and which they could not have heretofore in the dark and gloomy wards. Skylights will be introduced into the roof of the porch to increase the light.

The cost of the above-mentioned improvements will be:

With a minor exception the general inspection was altogether satisfactory. The quarters were in a cleanly condition, beds and bedding all that is required.

No material change has been made in the regulation clothing from that heretofore reported. As a matter of both economy and comfort, I would suggest, for summer wear, instead of the heavy cloth coat now furnished and worn summer and winter, a light flannel blouse, similar to that in use in the National Home, be supplied. The food furnished the members is in every way sufficient in quantity, variety, and quality, and, as nearly as could be discovered, well served. All supplies, with but few exceptions (not including hospital supplies), are now purchased under contract and paid for monthly.

The present commandant went on duty at this home January 22, 1895, since which time he seems to have made himself thoroughly conversant with his duties in every way. His sympathies are certainly in line with the proper welfare and comfort of the men. His family, consisting of wife and two grown daughters, is with him, adding much to the attractiveness of the Home and to the contentment of the men.

The commandant, in relieving the want of attractiveness about the Home, has bent his energies toward increasing the grass plats in front of the buildings noticed in last report. A park of about 3 acres has been laid out in semicircular form, with trees set out and grass seed sown. These grounds are flooded daily from the irrigating ditches and every attention possible given toward beautifying the grounds. It will require years to make this a park to be used as such. In the meantime the tenure of the old veterans is growing shorter.

Good discipline exists without the enforcement of harsh regulations.

HOSPITAL.

The heretofore careful and sympathetic care of the sick on the part of the Home surgeon, Dr. Packard, was observed. His administration of this department seems to be a matter of professional pride, with an added humane feeling toward the unfortunate sick not always observed in this class of medical practice.

The Home is growing rapidly. The management expects to care for fully 100 members during the coming winter. The need of a resident physician, I think, is urgent. The Home is 3 miles distant. The physician's visits are made regularly every other day and as much oftener as necessity requires. There are men at the Home at this time, and always will be so long as it is a Soldiers' Home, whose physical condition is likely to require and should have the immediate care of the physician. As it now is without telephone connection with the town, 6

miles must be ridden before relief is had. Telephone poles are erected, wire is on hand and paid for, and with a further expenditure of about \$100 the Home can be connected with the physician's office, thus affording a relief sadly needed.

The betterment of the condition of the hospital is being gradually brought about, as above noted, in the removal of the general kitchen and dining room to other quarters and inclosing the porch fronting the east ward with glass. The diet cooking and preparation of delicacies is being performed by Mrs. French, the commandant's wife, who evinces the same motherly care she would toward a member of her own household, which is certainly much appreciated by the sick.

One insane member has been sent from the Home to the State asylum, at Pueblo, having been adjudged insane by due process of State law. No personal, military, or medical history accompanied the patient.

FINANCES.

Since last report the appropriation of \$20,000, held back by the State auditor and sued for by the Home management, has been paid to the treasurer of the Home. This sum liquidated the accumulated indebtedness of the Home shown in last year's report, except about \$5,000, which balance has been provided for by a deficiency act, and is just now available.

The State has appropriated for the support of the Home for two years, 1895-96 and 1896-97, the sum of \$40,000; for permanent improvement, \$5,000.

The law now requires that supplies shall be purchased on contract, and is now in effect at the Home.

PENSIONS.

The number of pensioners has increased during the last year from 30 to 39, and amount paid them from \$3,336 to \$5,647. Of the 39 now at the Home 36 are pensioned under the law of June 27, 1890, 2 under the old law, and 1 Mexican-war pensioner. The present law of the State requires that the commandant shall become the custodian of the pensions received in excess of \$5 per month, to be held for the benefit of the pensioner or dependent relative. Refusal to comply with this provision is met with discharge from the Home, and an improper use of the \$5 per month allowed merits the withholding of the entire pension while a member of the Home.

There is a need for some provision for the holding of religious services at the Home. Services are held bimonthly in the dining hall, the tables having to be removed and chairs brought from the cottages.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COLORADO SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' HOME FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

MONTE VISTA, COLO., July 14, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit to you the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

The financial condition of this Home is much better than shown by the report for 1894. Through the persistent efforts of the board of commissioners the mandamus case against the auditor of State was brought to successful termination, and the \$20,000 appropriated for support of the Home for 1894 was secured, resulting in establishing our credit and a reduction of the old indebtedness to about \$4,500, which has been provided for by the passage of a deficiency bill by the last legislature, by

which the current expenses of the Home were greatly reduced. The legislature also provided liberally for the maintenance of the Home, appropriating \$40,000 for the years 1895 and 1896. An effort was made to obtain \$15,000 for needed improvements, but only \$5,000 was appropriated. Contracts have been awarded for an addition to the present stone dormitory, which will accommodate, when completed, 16 additional men, giving a capacity for 100 members.

The sanitary conditions of the Home are to be improved and alterations made, including the sinking of a new artesian well, with a large tank, located in the tower of the new wing, thereby securing sufficient pressure for fire protection and an ample supply of water for all purposes.

The improvements also include a bakery and oven, which will be added to the present power house, which is to be made into a general dining room. The change will greatly add to the convenience of the hospital; and the special diet, which has heretofore been prepared in the cottage, some 200 feet distant, will then be attended to in the hospital kitchen. But few improvements have been made the past year, and have been confined to beautifying the grounds, laying out and grading a park, planting trees, sowing grass seed, etc.

The last legislature passed a law providing for the care of pensions, but up to June 30 no rules have been adopted or put in operation regarding them.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The sanitary condition of this Home has not materially changed since the last report. Upon admission members are required to cleanse their persons thoroughly in a bath, and are supplied with clothing complete throughout. The entire buildings are thoroughly cleaned and aired daily throughout the year and are personally inspected by the commandant once a week. The beds and bedding are thoroughly aired once a week and entire cleanliness is required from all.

The sewage system is unchanged, but radical changes, productive of a better drainage, are already under way and will be completed during the summer.

222 NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS.

The high altitude and dry atmosphere, being added to personal care, combine to render the general sanitary condition of the Home good.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

The crowded condition of the Home and the lack of a suitable room in which to hold them have prevented any regular religious exercises, but upon frequent occasions, in fact whenever the opportunity occurred, services have been held in the dining room, but at such a disadvantage as to detract materially from their enjoyment.

For the interest and amusement of the members of the Home the Grand Army of the Republic and the Ladies' Relief Corps, of Monte Vista, have occasionally given entertainments at the Home, consisting of music, songs, recitations, and off-hand speeches, but in general the amusement afforded is confined to friendly games, fishing, and an occasional visit to Monte Vista to witness trotting or amateur dramatic performances.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE, *Marion, Ind., July 27, 1895.*

SIR: Immediately after the inspection of the California State Home, I proceeded to Roseburg, Oreg., where the State Home is located. Leaving Yountville on the evening of July 12, I arrived at Roseburg on the morning of the 14th, and proceeded immediately to the Home.

I proceeded to muster the men, and found 48 present and 54 present and absent. There are also present at the Home 7 Indian war veterans, who are not counted or taken up on the returns to the National Home. These veterans are cared for by the State the same as other soldiers, and it is creditable to the authorities that they are thus made comfortable in their old age. Their services were valuable at the time, and I can see no good reason from withholding from them the small sum appropriated for the care of other veterans. If not inconsistent with your views, I would recommend that Congress be asked to include these Indian war veterans, giving them the same care and consideration as veterans of the other wars, upon satisfactory proof of their service. They certainly did great service to the whole country as pioneers in those early troublesome days.

This Home has no hospital, and hospital patients are not received at the Home for this reason. They can not be suitably accommodated. Four deaths occurred during the year ending June 30, 1895.

The present commandant, Captain Byars, assumed command May 1 last, relieving Capt. Wallace Baldwin. The appropriations for improvements by the State of Oregon for this Home has not been liberal, apparently, and no improvements in buildings or otherwise have been made and none are in contemplation until another legislature meets, when it is hoped and expected that more liberal provision will be made for the much-needed additional accommodations.

The commandant reports admissions during the year at 51, of which number 35 are native and 16 foreign born. Capacity in dormitories, 68.

He estimates that if the capacity were doubled it would be filled during the coming winter.

This Home is apparently well managed, so far as the officers are concerned. The food is good and sufficient, clothing clean and well cared for, dormitories pleasant, and beds and bedding in fine order. The general appearance of the men indicates contentment.

They have no insane or demented men, and none could well be cared for. No amusements of any kind are provided. For some unaccountable reason the bills for the maintenance of this Home have remained unsettled for several months and some dissatisfaction on the part of the creditors was reported to me, but on inquiry I learned it was the fault of the State officers and not payments due from the National Home. It was expected that this difficulty would soon be overcome.

As the former members of the board of directors were not approved by the senate, the governor was required to appoint a new board, which was indorsed by the senate, and are as follows: B. F. Alley, William Galloway, S. B. Ormsby, J. P. Robertson, and Henry Rust.

The board is organized with S. B. Ormsby president, and Charles Graham secretary. Regular meetings are the fourth Tuesdays of March, June, September, and December.

SIR: On completing the inspection of the Washington State Home, I proceeded to Fargo, N. Dak., and thence to Lisbon, where the Home is located. I arrived there on July 22.

There has been no change of officers of this Home during the year.

Admissions during the year ending June 30, 1895, 16. Fourteen of these are native, and two are foreign born. There was no unusual gain or loss at the Home. At the muster there were 11 present, and 10 reported absent with leave.

One sick in hospital, which is a room set apart for the purpose in the main building. No deaths have occurred during the year.

The capacity in dormitories, reported as 30; the capacity of hospital, 5. The commandant reports that increased capacity will be soon required to accommodate 15 to 20 more.

In a hurried inspection, it was quite apparent that the few men in this Home were well cared for in every particular. It appears to be a happy little family, treated with great care and consideration by the commandant and his wife, acting as matron. No improvements of any kind have been made during the year, and none are in immediate contemplation. The Home is a perfect little gem, and it is surprising that so few are applying for shelter there. The rules for admission are stringent, but all disabled veterans, who can show a residence of one year in the State, will find access to the Home easy, and good care when once admitted. The commandant expressed great satisfaction at hav-

ing received remittances promptly from the general treasurer of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, after getting the proper instructions for preparing and forwarding his reports.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

Owing to general financial depression and consequent limited appropriation for support and maintenance of the Home, permanent improvements have been limited to actual necessities, and were mostly done during first year of our existence.

The sanitary condition of the Home is good, but two deaths having occurred since our organization. Our average sick from same date is the lowest on record.

There is no available fund for amusements, and all the members have had in that line have been given voluntarily. Pastors from the city come and preach to us and bring their choirs to sing. The young people's societies conduct services on one Sunday evening in each month. All these meetings are well attended and much enjoyed. Now and then a traveling troupe stopping within the city favor the members with a short entertainment of high order. Much time is spent in reading newspapers and magazines, of which we have a fair supply.

Discipline is good. We have no guardhouse, nor do we need one. Members are generally courteous toward each other and never engage in wrangling or quarrelling. Our Home is in a prohibition State. We congratulate ourselves that we are exceptionally free from that dreadful curse, intemperance. We have never had a drunken man in our Home.

Low prices for produce and depressed condition of business is likely to fill our Home to its utmost capacity in the near future.

NORTH DAKOTA SOLDIERS' HOME,
Lisbon, N. Dak., June 30, 1895.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of the hospital of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895:

I was appointed surgeon of the Home June 1, 1893. There were no record books furnished, and I am therefore unable to make a correct report, as I would very much like to, but the matter will be attended to at once.

My residence is at Lisbon, a mile from the Home, and I only make visits as necessary for the good of the inmates. My residence and the Home are connected by telephone, so that I am in close connection. We have no hospital; therefore my report comes under the head of convalescent companies, and is very meager at that, owing to the want of regular report books.

The general good health of the comrades can be attributed to the healthful location of the Home and the excellent sanitary conditions.

None have died during the past year and there is less suffering from rheumatism than usual, owing largely to the above reasons and the protection from exposure to all kinds of weather.

There is at present only one who is confined to his room, which is a case of articular rheumatism, and he has been bedridden thirteen years.

All of which I respectfully submit.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

The buildings are all drained by a 10-inch sewer, extending 1,500 feet from the Home and discharging into the Cheyenne River, below all buildings, where there is a constant flow of water.

RULE 4.—Scrupulous cleanliness in person, in dress, and in quarters is positively enjoined.

RULE 5.—All inmates will be required to bathe at least once a week, and those who require treatment by the baths as often as the surgeon in charge may direct.

RULE 10.—Water, sweepings, or refuse of any kind shall not be thrown from the windows or doors of the building, but must be put in places designated by the commandant and disposed of as he may direct.

RULE 18.—Each and every member will be required to make his bed, air his room, keep his furniture and entire surroundings in a neat and cleanly condition.

RULE 20.—No clothing or other effects will be allowed storage unless cleaned and put in proper condition, but will be destroyed.

RELIGION AND SOCIETIES.

There are no religious or other societies organized at the Home. Services are held in the reading and reception room every Sunday, at 3.30 p. m., conducted by the pastors of the various denominations in the city of Lisbon, and by the young people's Christian societies in rotation, all of whom give their time and services free. Most of the ministers bring with them their choir, which adds much to the interest of the service. The young people usually have a full house and plenty of excellent music.

Attendance of members is good. There is no compulsion as regards attending service, still 97 per cent of the members attend regularly.

Members of the Home have the privilege of attending church in the city whenever they wish.

RÉSUMÉ.

REPORTS.

A general complaint was heard at State Homes that they had received only five copies of the annual report of the inspection of State Homes for 1894 and that this number was not sufficient for the trustees or managers of the Homes and none was left for the officers. Complaints were also made that no annual report of the Board of Managers of the National Home had been received.

The officers not only manifest an interest in the reports upon their own Homes, but are quite on the alert for any suggestions of improvements they may find in the reports of the National and other Homes, and at least twenty copies of such reports should be sent to each State Home.

It may be observed that much better attention has been given to these reports than formerly. They were received from fourteen Homes during the month of July and from four during August, and but three were delayed until September. The report from North Dakota was necessarily delayed for want of blanks. The reports from seven Homes approach perfection in their accurate and intelligent conformity to their purpose, and one of these is faultless. Fifteen exhibit various degrees of error and omission, from slight to serious, to which the attention of superintendents and commandants is respectfully invited. From the averages of all living members, of members admitted during the year, and of those who have died during the year, if accurately ascertained and stated on June 30 each year, very interesting and important deductions might be drawn as to the various effects and probable duration of the beneficence of Soldiers' Homes. While the reports of several Homes furnish evidences of great care and attention in computing and stating these averages in years, months, and days, or in carrying the computations to the second decimal, others reveal carelessness and inaccuracy which, if permitted in general averages, would render them unreliable and useless. The uncertainties of

the records of the ages of many members are fully realized, but much better results and an approximate reliability could be attained were all the Homes, without exception, to accurately compute their averages from the records as they find them after bringing them up to the 30th of June each year.

POPULATION.

Twenty-two States now maintain Homes for disabled volunteer soldiers, and last year cared for 13,373 men. The general average of present and absent was 8,637. The National Government has furnished to the States maintaining the Homes \$100 per capita on the average present. Three State Homes will be added to the number during this fiscal year by Indiana, Wyoming, and Idaho, which will make the whole number twenty-five. A comment of interest may be made that there are six States, viz, Maine, Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky, and Missouri, which have as yet manifested no need for a Soldiers' Home of their own. These six States furnished, altogether, 339,968 men to the Union armies during the civil war, while the two Dakotas together furnished only 206 men to the war, but now have each a Soldiers' Home, in which 514 disabled volunteer soldiers have been cared for up to June 30, 1895. Within another year New York will have ready for occupancy an additional Home for married soldiers and widows. This national beneficence which bestows direct and assured relief from want of food, clothing, shelter, hospital ministrations, and all the comforting concomitants of a life necessarily undomestic, upon over 30,000 disabled soldiers during the year, and brings

satisfaction to almost every house in the land, at a cost quite nominal, is, I am sorry to say, not altogether without question. My own careful inspection during seven years, corroborated by the testimony of the managers of the Homes, warrant me in saying that the beneficence is abused. There are enough members of Soldiers' Homes who are evidently not sufficiently disabled to prevent their earning a living to attract attention and evoke just criticism. It should be remarked that there is a necessity at all Homes for the employment of serviceable members to take charge of the physically disabled or mentally impaired men, but beyond this requirement there is a considerable number who, it is plain to be seen, are not entitled to membership, while many eligible and needy applicants are necessarily turned away for want of room. The manifestation of these conditions, so obnoxious to the well-defined purpose of the Homes, is in proportion to the population of each. From all considerations of proper governmental functions and of the maintenance of manhood in men, there can be no greater injury inflicted than that which removes all resistance to life from the path of a man who is able to work. In the smaller Homes, with a population not exceeding 200 members, such abuse is rarely seen, while in the larger Homes, where the individual is lost from observation in the multitude, it is more secure from notice. When there was plenty of room in the Homes, and before their managers had learned by experience the devious ways of the malingerer, and while complaisant country surgeons could be found ready to oblige their neighbors, who wished be rid of a probable burden, by signing a certificate of disability, it was not difficult for an ex-soldier with a discharge or a certificate of service to gain admission. Some Homes have admitted applicants upon the certificate of an unofficial surgeon, and without any examination by the Home surgeon, who alone could be held responsible. The practice has been gradually discontinued in most Homes. It is notable that 68 per cent of the members admitted during last year were native born. It is also noted that a majority of them came from country districts and not from cities, which have furnished most of the foreign-born members. Disabled soldiers find little or no provision in the charitable institutions or among the people of cities, while in the country, where they are native, they have found sympathy and care until their disabilities required an attention which the country could not bestow. And it has been observed at Soldiers' Homes that the disabilities of the native-born applicants are apparently more serious than of the larger number of foreign-born applicants of former years. To exclude applicants whose diseases, wounds, or infirmities of old age are evidently not such as to disqualify them from earning a living by manual labor, a more careful official examination should be made; and to eliminate all such ineligible as are now members of Homes it is necessary that a rigorous individual inspection should be made at least once a year by two surgeons, detailed or appointed for that purpose, to act with the surgeon of each Home in the performance of that duty. The Home surgeon alone can not do it. The local influences are generally strong enough to embarrass or prevent the proper discharge of a disagreeable duty requiring firmness and unbiased judgment. On account of the number of discharges from several of the larger State Homes, the net gain in population has not been so great by 105 as it was the previous year, but the average present and absent has been 719 greater.

The whole number cared for in State Homes since the dates of their organization, according to the reports, is 80,468, of whom the records show 5,325 have died and that 8,637 were members on June 30, 1895

leaving the inference that 66,506 have been relieved of their disabilities in the Homes and restored to life outside or have become members of the National or other Homes. The fact is that a large proportion of the number have been transferred or have wandered from one Home to another several times, thus making the reports of the whole number cared for necessarily misleading. A laborious examination of the descriptive lists of all members who have been admitted to all the Homes each year would lead to an approximation of the true number.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Although the population has increased 8.77 per cent the number of sick in hospital has decreased 1.19 per cent during the year. The general average age of living members has increased 1.42 years while the general average age of members admitted during the year has advanced only 0.60 of a year. The average age at death of those who died during the year, 64.03, remains about the same. The death rate in 1,000 has increased 3.96.

PENSIONS.

About 67 per cent of the members of State Homes are pensioners, and their pensions aggregated \$391,951.51 last year. The pensioners in two of the larger Homes, Illinois and Ohio, receive their pensions direct from pension agents, and the Homes do not touch them. In one of these the superintendent retired during last year, and over 200 men were discharged for intoxication and general and continued disorderly conduct. In the other the board of trustees was impelled to authorize the commandant to summarily discharge from the Home any member convicted of drunkenness. The inferences from these incidents are obvious. Nothing but constant vigilance and an inexorable application of Home regulations can maintain good order when the members receive all their pension money and use it without restraint. Several other Homes minimize the evils engendered by pension money by taking charge of it and making regular payments of small sums to the pensioners. The treatment of the pension question in Minnesota, which is set forth herewith in my report of that Home, comes nearest a proper and just solution of the troublesome problem.

If it were known, or not ignored, that a considerable proportion of the pensioners in the Homes are more or less physical and mental wrecks; that some of them are totally unfit to be intrusted with any money at all; that many are men who, finding they could not indulge their shiftless habits and unnatural appetites outside the Home and at the same time supply themselves with the essentials of life with their pension money alone, have availed themselves of the Home to be relieved from the expense of natural wants; that pension money given to the unrestrained use of such men maintains and aggravates the evils which hasten them to the madhouse and the grave; that leaves some abandoned families without the help a pension to a disabled husband or father was intended to bestow, and that it fails not to bring disgrace and reproach upon the worthy and self-respecting members for whom the Home was created; if all this were realized, as any inspection of the larger Homes reveals it to-day, no mistaken sentiment regarding pensions would stand in the way of the enactment of laws and rules which would regulate the payment of pensions in all Soldiers' Homes in such a uniform manner as would conduce to the best welfare of the members and their dependent relatives, and cease to be a curse.

In the vicious consequences of the wasting of uncontrolled pensions in Soldiers' Homes, cause and effect are glaringly coincident. Plant

a large Soldiers' Home in which the population contains 67 per cent of pensioners and whole streets of saloons spring up around it where no habitation was seen before the Home was established. To lives that are monotonous at best and from which earthly hope and ambition have been nearly eliminated, and to a majority of which books lend little or no beguilement, the convenient temptations of the saloons are irresistible. In the persistent fight for the welfare of the members the managers of the Home could easily win, if the cause of it could be properly controlled. With the cause in vigorous operation, however, they hold the enemy in check by resorting to such means as are available. Post exchanges have been established within the large Homes where pure beer is sold to the members under such regulations as a maturing experience suggests as the best, with light, wholesome, and free confections. The homing influence of this installation is multiplied and amplified in its beneficent tendencies by converting pension money that otherwise would be worse than thrown away to the injury of the members, into a post fund from which is drawn the maintenance of bands of music, of a great variety of inspiring recreations and procurement of many things to enhance the comfort of the members for which no appropriation could be asked. It must be admitted that the conduct of this business requires the most constant and rigorous supervision to restrain the ready tendencies toward abuses. Yet in its worst possible aspects it is better and safer for the members than were the unchecked ravings of the robbers and assassins outside where members were lured to debauchery, drunkenness, cruel exposure, and not infrequent death. In some States laws have been enacted which prohibit the sale of intoxicating drinks within 1 to 3 miles of a Soldiers' Home. The cures for alcoholism and clubs that have been established in some of the large Homes have exercised an influence for good. The root of all the trouble is the uncontrolled use of pension money in the Homes.

INSANE.

There are 133 insane members in the State Homes and a larger number who exhibit various degrees of dementia. There is a considerable and distinct class of weak, incapable, and more or less imbecile members who, having little or no self-control, require a gentle restraint. The best provision that is made for these is at the Central Branch, where a barrack as spacious and comfortable as any in the Home is surrounded with a roomy, high, and insurmountable inclosure which affords ample space and freedom for exercise and recreation. This segregation somewhat relieves the population from annoyance and the embarrassment of ineffectual sympathy, and assures the comfort, safety, and control of the unfortunates who would suffer without it. There is no proper provision for the care and treatment of the insane in the Homes, and the want of it is a blemish on this otherwise incomparable national beneficence. There are no expert attendants for them. The Government Hospital for the Insane is remote and seems inadequate. The cost of a separate Home for the proper care and treatment of insane, demented, and imbecile members would be quite inconsiderable. It will be needed as long as Soldiers' Homes are maintained. It would be a great and blessed relief to both the National and State Homes.

HOSPITALS.

Notwithstanding the general want of many essentials to a satisfactory service, the steady improvement of the hospitals has been commendable and noteworthy.

The study and treatment of some diseases which have been considered incurable have been carefully recorded in a few hospitals and published in my reports, and clearly indicate excellent work, which in a few instances is not without hope of progress. In the greater number of hospitals work has been delayed, thwarted, or prevented by want of intelligent supervision or direction, or of proper equipment and facilities for original investigation, or, even, for following precedent paths of practice and observation. The greatest and most essential need is a proper organization with a directing head. In the early life of the Homes, when they were few in number and small in population, this need was not apparent, but with a larger number of Homes and a great and steady increase in population the need has become the greatest exigency.

The organization and pay of the Medical Department of the United States Army, which attends to the health of about 20,000 young, sound, and active men, when compared with the medical service of the Soldiers' Homes, which ministers to the afflictions of over 30,000 soldiers who were disabled in war, presents a deplorable contrast. The pay and emoluments of the former amount to nearly \$500,000 per annum, and of the latter to a sum not exceeding \$50,000. In the maintenance of Soldiers' Homes we are doing a work which will illuminate our history and shed a new light upon civilization. That light will glow forever to the honor of our patriotism, but our intelligence will suffer lack-luster in the next generation. If medical science were organized, adequately maintained, and encouraged to apply the marvelous discoveries of Pasteur and other pioneers of science to the terrible diseases, such as cancer, pulmonary tuberculosis, and all germ-engendered affections that are to be found in our hospitals, and if a record of the work were published annually, or oftener, the attention of the entire medical profession would be fixed upon it and interest in the results would extend beyond the limits of the nation. All the best surgeons desire such an organization.

The incentive of possible discovery, or at least an appreciation of intelligent, skillful, and earnest effort is perhaps stronger with surgeons than with men of any other profession. There is none such now for surgeons of Soldiers' Homes. Under the operation of a law of Congress the Board of Managers of the National Home can not appoint a surgeon who was not in the United States service during the civil war. Surgeons have been retained in the Homes for years who were unfit for active duty of any kind. Their own physical and mental infirmities of old age seemed, under the law, to be a qualification or a requirement for their appointment.

INSPECTORS.

Inspectors are required at four Branches of the National Home and at three of the larger State Homes. The prompt and conspicuous improvements in the cleanliness, good order, and discipline which followed the appointment of an inspector at the Northwestern Branch makes the necessity for such an officer all the more apparent at those Branches which have none, especially the Southern. Officers, or non-commissioned officers, who have served in a garrison for some length of time, and who are yet capable of considerable activity, and who possess firmness, good judgment, and good manners should not be difficult to find and would be most desirable. An experience of service in the field alone would hardly furnish the proper qualifications. Without an inspector a Home is not inspected regularly nor properly.

**SPECIAL REPORTS OF THE NATIONAL HOME AND OF SOLDIERS' HOMES IN STATES
ON LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA, UNIVERSAL PITYRIASIS, RUTERA, LA GRIPPE, AND
OTHER CASES.**

CENTRAL BRANCH.

DAYTON, OHIO, *June 30, 1895.*

SIR: In accordance with existing instructions I have the honor to make the following report on locomotor ataxia; and in compiling the same I desire to acknowledge the help of First Asst. Surg. Samuel B. Ellis, who has devoted much personal attention to these cases.

Following the idea of adhering as nearly as possible to the accurate interpretation of the order, we have selected these 27 well defined and undoubted cases of the disease, treated them as purely clinical study, and tabulated them so as to better bring out the points for comparison. Each case was taken separately, the study including a careful inquiry into the etiology, symptomatology, course, duration, and effects of treatment, as well as a systematic physical examination.

The patients are almost entirely confined to the Irish and Scotch nationalities, there being one German and one colored man. All were blessed with unusually bright intellects and particularly good memories, and strikingly of the nervous temperament.

EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

In the following tables the cross (×) expresses merely a presence of the condition at the head of a column, while the minus (—), plus (+), and double plus (++) denote a slight, moderate, and excessive degree, respectively, of the condition noted.

The average age of the patients is 55+; the average age at which the disease developed being 42+; making an average duration of 13 years.

There were 17 who admitted alcohol to some extent in early life, 8 of these having been hard drinkers; while, with the exception of 2, all were users of tobacco to a greater or less degree.

As to venery, particular pains were taken to bring out any point bearing on excess, especially in early life, a condition so often referred to as a prominent cause, with a result anything but convincing, the almost invariable reply being an admission of only moderate indulgence. Out of the whole number not one felt that such had been carried beyond indiscretion, while all considered themselves men of moderately strong sexual passion in early life.

Sixteen had been common laborers, 4 had earned their living with their minds, while 7 had worked with both mind and body.

A positive history of constitutional syphilis was obtained in 2 cases; in 6 there was doubt, the patient claiming to have had a local lesion, but giving no definite history of a general infection, while in 19 of the cases a positive denial was entered. In the 2 patients that admitted syphilis, together with 1 that denied it, there were evidences in the way of scars that bespoke an old affection, making at the most 3 with positive histories of syphilis, and something like 9 in which syphilis could not be excluded.

Four men had suffered injury to the spine sometime in their lives, without nervous symptoms, and in 4 others spinal paralysis (paraplegia) existed to some extent and in a longer or shorter period, making a total of 8. In none of these are there now any visible evidences of an old injury.

History of heredity is entirely wanting, not only as to the actual disease, locomotor ataxia, having existed in parents, but in extremely few could even a history of any predisposing influence be found. There was insanity in neither parent of any, and alcoholism in only 6 in 54, and 8 in 54 were only of nervous temperament.

Of peculiar interest was the individual idea as to the cause of the disease. Almost every man had some tangible, exciting agency, particularly some extraordinary physical dissipation or mental strain that he could recall as immediately preceding the first attack. Only 3 attributed the onset to injury to the spine, most of them favoring excessive indulgence in physical exertion as the cause. Alcohol and venery played a small part in their minds as causative agents.

Sixteen were married, 11 single.

There was nothing about the boyhood of any of the men bearing on either cause or symptom. Of course, all had experienced some of the hardships of army life.

By far, most of them were robust and athletic as youths.

Neuralgia occurred in early life in 4; 5 were nervous and excitable boys, and 4 were physically weak.

What is deemed of practical importance as pertains especially to early diagnosis (upon which probably all the good that can be done to these cases depends) is the bringing out of certain symptoms that seemed quite common to all cases, and heretofore apparently never given their full significance. Reference is made to "numbness" in feet and legs. In every case except 3 was this one of the very first symptoms, if not the very first symptom noticed by the patient. Not only is this true, but the description of the character of this sensation is quite alike in all cases. It is described as a combination of heaviness, distension, and tingling and sticking (needles and pins), and anaesthesia. In almost every case was this volunteered as the first symptom, the merest suggestion being necessary to elicit it in others. It was described as being deep, rather than in the skin.

Next to numbness in the feet and legs, the earliest symptoms were about equally divided between neuralgic pains and ataxia at night, the 2 of 10 occurring in the same instance. These early neuralgic pains were practically limited to the legs, only occurring 4 times in the form of so-called girdle sensation and never as visceral crises.

Ataxia in daylight was not noticed until later in the course of the disease.

Of the most prominent symptoms of the disease after its full development, the following is the arrangement of frequency:

Neuralgic pains existed in the limbs in every case but 5; while the same was a prominent symptom as girdle sensation in 9, and as visceral complications in the form of gastric and other crises in 5.

In only 4 cases, then, neuralgia was never severe enough to be considered especially troublesome. The pain in these cases of locomotor ataxia is unlike the pain in ordinary neuralgia, in the cramps of muscles of old people, or in rheumatic troubles, being rarely accompanied by swelling or local inflammation, contraction of muscles, or particular tenderness at the site of pain.

Ataxic locomotion was a prominent and bothersome feature in 21 cases, while in several others, though present to some degree, was not considered conspicuous.

Sexual power was lost in 21 of the 27 cases. Its disappearance seemed to bear no relation to the ataxia or neuralgic pains, but was quite in accord with the testicular atrophy. In the 6 cases where sexual power was not gone there was no atrophy of testicles in 4, while in almost all other cases there was decided atrophy as already stated. Loss of sexual power, while not considered one of the earliest symptoms, almost universally occurred during the first stage of the disease—during the first year or two—and became rapidly complete.

Impairment of vision was one of the most peculiar features. In fact, it seemed to set a class of tabes unlike all the rest. Among the 27 patients, 4 were of this nature. Blindness was complete in each, and in 3 of the 4 the impairment of vision was one of the very first symptoms, and in the others it occurred early. Primary atrophy of the optic nerves was the lesion common to all. The progress toward complete blindness was without interruption. These patients suffered probably less from neuralgias than others, but the ataxia in 2 of them made "wheel-chair" cases of them, while the other 2 had very little ataxia at all. One of the curious facts about these eye cases is the sudden onset and rapid completion of the fully developed, most marked symptom. Defective vision from optic atrophy existed in no case to a mild degree.

Bladder and rectal symptoms were rare—4 times in 27—and were transient for the most part, but with a tendency to recurrence. Retention, with overflow and cystitis, was the prevalent disorder, while neuralgia and incontinence mostly affected the rectum, and both organs (rectum and bladder) were usually involved in the same case.

During the course of the study of this disease there appeared a phenomenon too constant to be coincidental, and probably sufficiently definite to warrant it a place among the symptoms of locomotor ataxia. This phenomenon was most developed in those cases with marked ataxia and consisted in a peculiar falling movement in sitting down. The patient when asked to be seated would square himself in front of the chair, take aim, let go, and drop altogether as it were. The explanation for this could not be found. It seemed to be due neither to weakness of muscles nor pain in the limbs.

As to physical signs, the most constant was loss of patellar reflex; next to this was the Argyll-Robertson pupil. The former occurred in every case; the latter was fully developed in 20 cases (3 of these were in optic atrophy). In one, reaction to light was very sluggish, though present, while contraction of accommodation persisted.

Romberg's sign (inability to stand or walk well with eyes closed) was present in every case except 3; in one of these cases a test was impossible as patient was unable to stand at all. The other 2 cases were blind men whose gaits seemed perfectly steady.

Incoordination in the upper extremities existed in a strikingly large per cent of the cases, 15 in all; but in none was it marked save 2, who were unable to button their coats with eyes open. In 5 cases the pupils were irregular; in 2 of these the pupils were oval in shape, while in the 3 there was an inequality in size.

Contraction of pupils sufficient to be considered decidedly unnatural existed in 5 cases. In 2 of these the pupils were "pin-point" and first led to the discovery of the disease in the individual.

There was unilateral ptosis, with divergent strabismus, in 2 cases.

There was slight atrophy of muscles of the legs in 7 cases.

In none of the cases was articulation of speech involved.

Joint complications (arthropathies) existed in 3 cases and trophic ulcerations of feet in 3 cases.

Sensation was involved to some degree in all but 1 case. Though many curious perversions were found there was nothing sufficiently definite, constant, or characteristic to entitle it to special consideration.

As to treatment, the almost universal opinion among these men was that no one particular drug or measure had been of any lasting benefit. Remedies that relieved pain stand most in favor, and among these coal-tar products are given second place only to morphine. Rest and quiet of both body and mind, combined with abstinence from alcohol and venery, undoubtedly have done more than all drugs toward delaying the progress and even leading to improvement in this serious disease.

Strangely enough, though a warm, dry climate was liked most, few, if any, of these men felt that barometric conditions had aught to do with the trend of their trouble.

Bearing on the pathology of locomotor ataxia, there is a suggestion in the rapid onset, irregular course, and frequent improvement of so many cases at hand, not to be overlooked.

That the lesion in the spinal cord of this disease may be acute, or at least subacute, is evidenced by the history of more than one of these patients. In the case of C. McD., a pugilist of remarkable physique, ataxia developed in one night after a sparring match. He was laid up for a few weeks and recovered sufficiently to enter another fight at the end of six months, but which was followed by a renewal of the ataxic symptoms and rapidly developed optic atrophy. Again the ataxia receded

(sight never returned) for a time and he was able to walk quite well until some exposure brought him down once more. Repeated attacks like this made it necessary for him to seek a wheel chair. In this case and in several others, in place of a gradually progressive chronic cord lesion, there seemed a succession of acute invasions followed by marked abatement of symptoms. A very large percentage of the men said they had one time been much worse than at present, undoubtedly showing to a degree a recoverable lesion.

Whatever the original cause of locomotor ataxia, there is no question of the baneful influence of dissipation—alcoholic, venereal, and athletic—upon its course, and could it be proven that in all or even in a good per cent of these cases progress was by a succession of acute exacerbations, excited by definite causes, there might be wholesome promise at least in prophylaxis.

The tendency toward improvement at some time in the course of the disease in almost every instance is not exactly consistent with our understanding of a purely chronic sclero-atrophy. Trace an analogy in sciatica. Here a subacute inflammation of a nerve trunk develops and the patient is unable to walk in twenty-four hours; the course is run through in a few weeks and almost complete recovery occurs. Such a nerve is more liable to subsequent attacks, each carrying the patient a little lower, but doubtless such recurrences can be thwarted by care. Admitting the original cause of locomotor ataxia to be the toxic remains of the life products of some specific virus (syphilis, as Gowers believes, in most cases), while this view of its pathology may not be in accord with the usual theory of an essentially chronic disease, it is not inconsistent with the reaction of a chronic, nonprogressive lesion subject to acute exacerbation and acute extension excited by some known influence.

Edward F. Kingsland, late of Company H, Second Colorado Cavalry. Present condition: Weight, 190 pounds. If he keeps hot he feels good. In cold or cloudy weather he is stiff and sore. Left shoulder and left ankle have been slightly swelled for a short time since return from the Springs. Works in the general kitchen now and is entirely free from pain. Feels good, is cheerful and happy. Heart's action good.

Abram Steadman, late of Company A, Thirty-first Ohio Infantry. Present condition: In October, 1894, he became insane (acute melancholia), and on November 19, 1894, was transferred to the Government Hospital for the Insane, Washington, D. C. There had been slight exacerbations of rheumatism. His cystitis was improved.

Michael Shea, late of Company H, Twenty-seventh New Jersey Infantry. Died of valvular disease of the heart December 8, 1894.

Edward McGloin, late of Company E, Third New Jersey Cavalry. Present condition: Has been confined to his bed ever since his return from the Springs. Suffers continual pain in all joints. Arthritis deformans more marked, and swelling of joints seems to be constant. Is also troubled with insomnia.

Thomas W. Jones, late of Company I, First California Cavalry. Present condition: Weight, 178 pounds. Hands are slightly swollen. Right ankle swollen and painful. Left hip joint quite painful. Some days it is hard for him to get around on account of the pain. Knees are comparatively free from pain or swelling. Heart's action good.

Patrick A. Somers, late of Company F, Two hundred and thirteenth Pennsylvania Infantry. Present condition: Knees and ankles swollen and painful. Shoulders, elbows, and hands are painful. He says he has suffered more or less pain all the time since returning from the Springs, but no more than before going. There is no increase in arthritis deformans. The first sound of his heart is slightly muffled.

252 NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS.

Philander Hudson, late of Company D, One hundred and forty-seventh New York Infantry. Transferred to Central Branch from Convalescent Company K, August 1, 1894. Still some rheumatism.

Martin W. Cozine, late of Company D, Twelfth Missouri Cavalry. Present condition: On furlough from hospital since October 25, 1894. He was still suffering from rheumatism, although less than before going to the Springs.

Frederick Zeigler, late of Company B, First Missouri Light Artillery. Present condition: Weight, 150 pounds. Has been considerably improved. Has no swelling of joints, and pains but seldom. He has had two or three slight attacks of rheumatism since returning from the Springs, but of comparatively little moment.

James Hanson, alias John Kerwin, late of Company H, Eleventh United States Infantry. Present condition: There is no swelling and but slight pain in any joints except right shoulder. It has troubled him some lately. The past winter and spring, however, he suffered considerably. He has tried to work several times, but each time has been compelled to abandon it on account of rheumatism.

Albert Mueller, late of Company E, Second Illinois Light Artillery. Present condition: Was transferred to Northwestern Branch October 2, 1893.

Thomas Concannon, late of Company G, Sixty-ninth Illinois Infantry. Discharged from the Home and died soon after in Kansas City. Cause of death unknown.

Evi T. Nichols, late of Company E, First Ohio Heavy Artillery. Furloughed from company for one hundred and twenty days May 2, 1895. Condition unknown.

Adam P. Baum, late of Company E, One hundred and sixteenth Indiana Infantry. Present condition: Weight, 144 pounds. Still has some rheumatism in joints of left arm and leg. No swelling. Has been much better the past three months, and lately has been able to comb his hair with the left hand. Spine still tender its full length.

John Mahoney, late of Company C, Forty-third Ohio Infantry. On furlough from company for nearly a year. Condition unknown.

Nathan J. Axtel, late of Company H, Fourteenth Illinois Infantry. Present condition: Weight, 145 pounds. Has lumbago at this time. Muscular rheumatism better as to pain; no improvement in strength of muscles. Examination of urine shows cystitis still present. During past winter neurasthenia worse than ever before, but is much better at the present time than for several years. Is more forgetful. Sleeps fairly well.

William H. Hughes, late of Company A, Ninth Ohio Cavalry. Discharged from the Home September 2, 1893.

John Walsh, United States Marine Corps. Present condition: Weight, 120 pounds. Still has muscular rheumatism, but not so severe in character as before going to the Springs. Arms and legs painful at present time. Heart's action good.

Patrick W. Gilligan, late of Company D, Thirteenth Indiana Infantry. Present condition: Weight, 142 pounds. Complains greatly of lumbago. Spine very irritable in dorsal and lumbar regions. Has rheumatism in right shoulder at the present time. There is little, if any, evidence of improvement. Heart's action good.

Ira D. Chamberlain, late of Company D, Seventh Indiana Infantry. Present condition: On furlough from hospital annex. Walks with two canes most of the time, and complains still of the sciatica, but greatly improved.

Charles S. Gifford, late of Company H, Fourth Illinois Cavalry. Died at Dallas, Tex., January 11, 1895, while on furlough. Cause not stated.

Richard Youman, hospital steward, United States Army. Discharged from the Home November 28, 1893.

Clark Eldridge, late of Company A, Third Rhode Island Cavalry. On furlough from company since winter. Has spent a greater portion of his time in the hospital with his old complaint since his return from the Springs.

Rozell Randall, late of Company K, Forty-ninth Wisconsin Infantry. Discharged from the Home October 19, 1893. Present condition unknown.

Gilman D. Gove, United States Army. Present condition: Complains of lumbago and spinal irritation. Muscles of back stiff and sore. Is perhaps less nervous and peevish than before he went to the Springs. He thinks he was not improved in the least. Cystitis has improved under treatment since returning from the Springs.

Andrew J. Arnett, late of Company B, Kansas Infantry. Present condition: On furlough from the hospital since May 29, 1895. There was no improvement whatever.

REPORT OF CASES OF ANEURISM CONTINUED FROM REPORTS OF 1893-94

CASE I.

[Service of Asst. Surg. O. C. McNary.]

Charles Hamlin, late of Company D, Sixth Ohio Cavalry. Admitted to the hospital November 8, 1890.

Since last report, June 30, 1894, Hamlin has lived comfortably without pain or sickness of any kind. The treatment, viz, large doses of potassium iodide and tr. verat. viride, was kept up faithfully, and it seemed he was in a better condition since the ribs were eroded off than at any time since his admission.

He felt so well that with his pension money he purchased a horse and surrey, with the intention of getting fresh air and change of scenery by driving. He also intended taking his sick comrades out for an airing occasionally.

On April 11, 1895, he obtained a pass to visit Kansas City, Mo., to drive up his horse and vehicle (27 miles). This intention was unknown to the surgeon, or he would have been dissuaded from his purpose. However, on Monday, April 15, he left Kansas City at 9 a. m. It rained hard from 2 to 4 p. m., and wet him. At 4.30 p. m. he was observed driving down the road in front of the Home, when he suddenly fell forward off the seat, striking his left cheek on the front wheel. Some of our men went immediately to his assistance, but he was dead.

At 2 p. m. of this date (June 30, 1895), twenty-two hours after his death, I made a post-mortem examination in the presence of Drs. Jones, Reese, and Fryer, of the Home, and Dr. McGill, of the city of Leavenworth, the report of which is appended.

Post-mortem examination.—External inspection showed no marks except a slight abrasion of the skin on left cheek and neck, from which there had been a very little oozing of blood,

On the left side of chest there was a depression about 3 inches long by $3\frac{1}{4}$ deep, where, during life, there had been a tumor.

On opening chest the third rib, left side of sternum, was found eroded entirely off in two places, first, within 1 inch of sternum; second, 5 inches to left of sternum. A plate of the rib one-eighth of an inch in length, by three-fourths of an inch in width still remained between points of separation. The sternum was eroded half through and weakened so much that it broke on attempting to elevate it. The lower and inner side of second rib and the upper and inner side of fourth rib were also eroded. The left side of the bodies of the vertebrae from the third to the sixth were eroded to the depth of half an inch.

Left lung was found adherent to chest walls throughout its circumference, and was partially solidified.

A collapsed aneurism of the arch of the aorta was found, measuring 6 inches in length by 5 in a vertical direction by 4 inches antero posteriorly.

In front wall of the aneurism was found embedded a calcareous plate about $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter. The walls were but slightly less in thickness than those of the normal artery, except where it was agglutinated to the pericardial sack; here a rupture, or tear, into the pericardial sack immediately above the left auricle was found, measuring one-fourth of an inch in length. The pericardial sack was found entirely filled with clotted blood.

Heart muscles flabby, valves normal. Right lung normal except slight adhesion in front, easily broken up. Nothing further of abnormal character found.

The specimen was taken out entire with portion of ribs attached and preserved.

Cause of death.—Rupture of aneurism, arch of aorta.

CASE III.

[Service of Asst. Surg. O. C. McNary.]

Obbediah McCreary, late of Company D, Twenty-second Pennsylvania Infantry. Admitted to the hospital July 25, 1893.

Since last report this patient got along very comfortably and with no apparent increase in size of aneurism or aggravation of symptoms until February 25, 1895, when he felt so well that, notwithstanding my entreating him to change his plans, he took a furlough and went to Philadelphia, Pa., to visit his friends. I requested him to keep me informed of his condition, and in compliance with this request he wrote me May 6, saying he was rapidly growing worse and would like to get back if it was possible for him to travel so far. He was afraid to walk out for fear of dropping dead on the street; tumor growing larger; deglutition more difficult, and it was now affecting respiration.

Since this letter I have heard nothing from him.

Just as I finish this report we receive official notice of his transfer to the Northwestern Branch, Milwaukee, Wis.

REPORT ON CASES OF LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA CONTINUED FROM REPORTS OF FORMER YEARS.

CASE II.

[Service of Asst. Surg. J. L. Fryer.]

Levi O. Gray, late of Company A, Ninth Illinois Cavalry.

Pain in back and head. Anaesthesia, same as at last examination. Conduction not delayed. Knee jerk same as last examination. Gastro-intestinal crises, none. No bladder trouble. Constipation, still very obstinate. Electrical contractility, same as last report. Pupillar inequality, none. Light reflex, sluggish. Ophthalmic examination shows no change. Sexual desire, normal. No change in coordinating powers. Affections of joints, none. Well nourished.

Patient has passed a very pleasant year, with the exception of his increasing paralysis he has been slowly improving. No medical treatment has been pursued.

CASE VI.

[Service of Asst. Surg. O. C. McNary.]

Henry Harris, late of Company I, Thirty-second Indiana Infantry.

On August 26, 1894, Harris was discharged from the Home at his own request, to return to his business, pharmacy, in San Francisco, Cal. Examination on that date showed the condition of the patient greatly improved.

Pain since the last examination, none. For the past six weeks not even abdominal pains, spoken of in examination of June 30, 1894.

Anaesthesia not so marked. Conduction delayed in right foot, one second; right calf, three seconds; right thigh, five seconds; left foot, one second; left calf, two seconds; left thigh, five seconds; hands and arms, one second.

Patellar tendon reflex gone. No gastro-intestinal crises, or bladder or rectal troubles. Actions of the bowels have been perfectly regular for the past year. No transient paralysis. No change in electrical reaction. No myosis; pupils respond slowly to light. No pupillar inequality. No optic atrophy. Ophthalmoscopic examination gave no results. Sexual desires natural, and at times even urgent; scarcely a night now without erections, but no nocturnal emissions.

Coordinating powers in lower extremities greatly improved and improving; walks around the ward and around the porches without a cane; although when he takes long walks, of a mile or so, he takes two canes along. No improvement in coordination in the dark or with closed eyes. Coordinating powers of upper extremities slightly impaired.

No joint affections at this time. Since leaving the Home I have heard nothing from him, although he promised to keep me informed of his condition. This case, at first, was probably the least promising of any of the cases coming under my care, being confined to bed and having absolutely no control over his legs, and suffering with Charcot's disease. The results have been better than in any other case. The treatment throughout was argem. phos. and nux. vomica. When he left the Home he was instructed to keep up the treatment faithfully.

CASE VII.

[Service of Asst. Surg. O. C. McNary.]

Andrew J. Arnett, late of Company B, Sixth Kansas Infantry.

There has been very little change in the condition of this patient since last report. He has never regained what he lost by going to California. He has been fairly free from suffering, but he has had occasional pains in chest and legs. The only gastro-intestinal crises he suffered from came on March 8, and lasted until the 13th. It was light in character. No change in treatment has been made, except that from February 1 to May 28 potassium iodide was also given.

He was on furlough visiting his sister from September 21 to October 12, 1894. He again went on furlough May 29, and is still absent.

Examination May 29, 1895, before going on furlough, showed his condition to be as follows: Pains becoming lighter and less frequent. Anaesthesia, no apparent change. Conduction delayed in right foot, two seconds; right leg, five seconds; right thigh, one second; left foot, one second; left leg, two seconds; left thigh, one second. Upper extremities, conduction immediate. Knee jerk abolished. Gastro-intestinal crises, none since March 13. No trouble with bladder or rectum. No transient paralysis. No change in electrical reaction. No myosis or pupillar inequality. Pupil responds very slowly to light. No change in sexual functions. No change in coordinating power during the year; can walk but little with two canes. No joint affections.

CASE X.

[Service of Asst. Surg. O. C. McNary.]

Almond M. Trunkey, late of Company B, Eighth Iowa Infantry. Age, 53; nativity, Ohio; occupation, grain buyer; single.

Admitted to the Home (T. A. P.) August 1, 1894. Permanently admitted December 11, 1894.

Disability recorded: Ulcers, tenderness and numbness of legs, rheumatism.

Admitted to the hospital August 1, 1894.

Diagnosis: Ulcers of both legs.

Previous history.—Father still living, at the age of 84 years. Mother died of phthisis, in 1858. One sister died of phthisis and one brother of scarlet fever. Has three sisters living. He had the usual children's diseases, but was a healthy man, going through the entire war of the rebellion without sickness or injury.

In 1879 he contracted syphilis at Beloit, Kans., and since that time, he says, he has never been well.

In 1886 a succession of small sores appeared upon his shins, which healed reluctantly, and with a dark, scaly cicatrix, which cicatrix remained until 1891, when large ulcers broke out on the anterior aspect of both legs, and were never healed until he came under my care in this hospital. These ulcers were undoubtedly tertiary manifestations of syphilis, and it was on account of these ulcers that he was admitted to the hospital. He was placed in bed, and antisyphilitic treatment employed, which resulted in the healing of the ulcers in a short time.

History of present disease.—In the spring of 1894 he first noticed a difficulty in walking in the dark, and shortly after noticed the same difficulty in walking by daylight—a sort of unsteadiness without loss of strength—but this has increased until he walks with difficulty without a cane.

Pains were first felt in the legs about the summer of 1893; they were not the lightning pains, and were attributed to the sores on the legs.

About April, 1894, the lightning pains set in, and they have increased in severity and frequency since; but he said little about them, still attributing them to the ulcers.

Present diagnosis.—Locomotor ataxia.

Causation.—Syphilis.

Symptoms on admission to hospital.—Shooting pains, especially in his heels and knees, coming on lately nearly every day in the afternoon, and are worse after becoming warm in bed at night.

Pains in chest occasionally, but light; he has the girth-like feeling around the chest at times. Anæsthesia of feet marked; the prick of a pin causes no pain. Conduction delayed in right foot four seconds; right shin, three seconds; right calf, two seconds; and feels as though it was between the toes; right thigh, immediate; left foot, three seconds; left foot and thigh, immediate. Tendon reflex at knee and ankle abolished. Has no gastrointestinal crisis, nor bladder or rectal trouble (except hemorrhoids), and no laryngeal trouble. No transient paralysis.

Electrical reaction greatly impaired in lower extremities; normal in upper. Myosis, none. Pupillar inequality, none. No loss of light reflex. Has occasional attacks of diplopia, and complains of slight dimness of vision; can see better with either eye than with both.

Ophthalmoscopic examination showed nothing abnormal. Has had no desire for sexual intercourse for the past two years; has had incomplete erections less than once a month, and has had two seminal emissions in six months. Coordinating power in upper extremities is normal; in lower extremities diminished so far that he is compelled to keep his eyes on the ground continually when walking or standing, and can only walk with great difficulty without a cane; uses a cane constantly. Can not stand or walk with closed eyes. No joint affections.

Condition May 29, 1895, before going on furlough for sixty days.—Pains have been greatly relieved as to severity, and longer intervals of comfort enjoyed the past six months.

There seems little, if any, change in regard to anæsthesia.

Conduction delayed in right foot two seconds; right leg, one second; right thigh, immediate; left foot, three seconds; leg and thigh, immediate. Tendon reflex abolished.

No gastrointestinal crisis, bladder or rectal trouble, or laryngeal affection. No transient paralysis. Electrical reaction substantially the same as on admission. Myosis, none. Pupillar inequality, none. No loss of light reflex. No attacks of diplopia for six months. Vision improving. Sexual functions the same. Still incomplete erections and one emission in the last six months.

Coordinating power of upper extremities, good; of lower extremities, improving; walks better with a cane, and can walk fairly well without a cane. No joint affections.

Treatment.—Argent phos. and extract of nux vomica; in addition potassium iodide was given on account of the specific origin of the disease.

For four months, viz, from February 1 to May 29, the months in which we have the most changeable weather, I kept a comparative record of the cases of Arnett and Trunkey. I had them placed side by side in the same ward; prescribed exactly the same medicines; gave them the same diet, and in every respect made the conditions for observation as nearly alike as possible. The following is the record:

February 1.—Both feeling fairly comfortable.

February 9.—Both suffer pains.

February 16.—Trunkey suffers none; Arnett complains of legs being almost useless.

February 20.—Trunkey has pains in legs, feet, and head; Arnett feels good.

February 23.—Trunkey's pains light; Arnett feels good.

February 25.—Trunkey, very little pain; Arnett feels good.

February 26.—Trunkey has cramps, principally in legs; Arnett comfortable.

March 1.—Both fairly comfortable.

March 2.—Trunkey, slight pains; Arnett comfortable.

March 5.—Trunkey, cramps in legs; Arnett feels unusually good.

March 6.—Trunkey, free from pains; Arnett gastrointestinal crisis.

March 8.—Trunkey feels well; Arnett gastrointestinal crisis.

March 14.—Both feel well.

March 18.—Both feel unusually well.

March 20.—Trunkey, cramps in legs and lightning pains; Arnett continues feeling good.

March 22.—Both feel good.

March 26.—Trunkey, pains in legs; Arnett feels good.

April 1.—Both feel well.

April 3.—Trunkey feels good; Arnett, pains in legs.

April 18.—Trunkey feels well; Arnett, chest pains.

April 20.—Trunkey feels good; Arnett's chest pains disappearing.

April 22.—Both free from pain.

April 26.—Trunkey, cramps and lightning pains in legs; Arnett feels well.

April 29.—Trunkey's pains in legs almost gone.

May 1 to 8.—Both feel good.

May 9.—Trunkey feels first rate; Arnett, chest pains.

May 13.—Trunkey, pains in chest and legs; Arnett's pains in chest continue.

May 15.—Both free from pains.

May 29.—Both free from pain since May 15.

Environments, therefore, I conclude had no influence on these cases.

NORTHWESTERN BRANCH.

REPORT OF SIX CASES OF LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA UNDER TREATMENT AT THE NORTHWESTERN BRANCH OF THE NATIONAL HOME FOR DISABLED VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1895.

[Service of Asst. Surg. A. Ivins Comfort.]

Of this number two were under treatment at the close of last report, June 30, 1894, viz, George E. Averill, late of Company C, Twelfth Vermont Infantry, and Elias J. Shaw, late sergeant of Company G, Twenty-third Illinois Infantry. The former died March 24, 1895. Of the remaining five, four are still under treatment.

CASE I.

George E. Averill, late of Company C, Twelfth Vermont Infantry.

For military and personal history, vide Report of Board of Managers of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers for the year ending June 30, 1893, page 418.

Enlisted August 23, 1862. Admitted to Northwestern Branch, April 15, 1885. Age at admission, 48.

He never suffered with syphilis, either hereditary or acquired. Four years ago he was furnished with a wheel chair, as his lower extremities were inadequate for the purposes of support and progression, he having suffered two attacks of paralysis, left hemiplegia, the last about fourteen years ago, though he so far recovered from them as to be able to resume manual labor, being obliged, however, to walk with a cane. Four years ago he discovered that he could not button his clothing without seeing the buttons. He now reports that in 1872, he had, during the winter, two

attacks of convulsions with loss of consciousness and sensation. Six years ago inco-ordination of the lower extremities was observed.

Decubitus is usually upon the left side, though sometimes upon the right, but never upon the back, as the muscular twitching and shooting pains are exaggerated thereby.

The patient's lower limbs are at times flexed spasmodically while reclining, then forcibly extended, indeed, violently. His feet and legs are always cold and numb. He is often aroused from sleep by local muscular action. Upon awaking from sleep he is unable to locate the position of his feet and legs without uncovering and looking for them. He still, as heretofore reported, swings himself into his wheel chair and thus moves about at will. While lying upon his left side his right shoulder is involuntarily shrugging, and vice versa.

The patient can not sit erect in the chair without swaying his body, showing that the muscles of the trunk are ataxic in function.

As the progress in this case has been of the most grave character the treatment has been symptomatic, expectant, palliative; of treatment, general hygienic and dietetic has proved most beneficial, for its anodyne effect, and to arrest spasmodic muscular action as well as paralytic of the bowels. The sulphate of morphia has been administered in pill form as required throughout the period of treatment. For the gastric crises, which have appeared from time to time, and usually in anticipation of, or during a sudden barometric change, or the approach of a storm, or a "cold wave," anti ferments, such as subnitrate of bismuth or carbolic or salicylic acid, have been prescribed, or the bicarbonate of soda in mint water. For a vesical and rectal crises, even palliative treatment has proved to be of little benefit, and the personal cleanliness of the patient is preserved only by the constant use of the draw sheet.

Since the 24th of November the patient has suffered with a hydropic œdema of the feet and legs.

March 5.—Severe gastric crises has this day occurred, differing, however, only in degree from others which have occurred every few days or twice a week for the past several months.

March 13.—The patient takes little or almost no aliment, and as a result, with the colliquative diarrhœa with which he suffers, he is extremely emaciated and exhausted as well.

March 20.—A left facial paralysis has now occurred with a left hemiplegia, the result, no doubt, of a recent cerebral hemorrhage.

March 22.—Intellection, throughout the disease, has been remarkably clear. The patient experiences a burning pain in the epigastrium, which he states is relieved by his being turned from side to side.

March 23.—Death is imminent.

March 24.—At 6.30 a. m. George E. Averell died of gastroenteritis. An autopsy could not be obtained.

CASE II.

[Service of Asst. Surg. A. Ivin, Comfort.]

Elias J. Shaw, late sergeant of Company G, Twenty-third Illinois Infantry.

September 4, 1894; age 52; married; occupation, clerk. Enlisted March 24, 1862. Mustered out of the service September, 1865. Duration of service, three years and six months. One month spent in Libby Prison. He was exposed to a soaking rain during a night march made to reach the Union lines immediately after his discharge from Libby Prison, from which he contracted pneumonia. He contracted erysipelas, from which he nearly lost his left leg in 1864. He never had fits. Never had sunstroke. Never had a blow or other injury upon the head. He never had syphilis or other venereal diseases.

Motor symptoms.—Ten years ago he suffered repeated attacks of vertigo attended with pain in the shoulders and back. One year subsequently he perceived that his gait had become unsteady and that he could not button his shirt collar without a mirror, nor his clothing without seeing the buttons. Has felt for seven years a twitching sensation in the calves of the legs and anterior aspects of the thighs, accompanied with shooting pains. The patient experiences a twitching of the muscles of the forearm and arm, but not to so great an extent in the latter. Slight atrophy of the muscles of the upper and lower extremities. There are no bed sores or ulcerations, or herpetic or other cutaneous eruptions. A varicose ulcer appears, however, on the left leg from time to time.

The facial muscles are not involved in the disease. The muscles of the trunk are so involved that the patient can not sit erect without swaying his body. The patient can not stand with his eyes closed, or walk in the dark without a cane.

The dynamometric grasp of the hand equals 49 degrees on a scale of 160, representing 49 kilograms of prehensile force and showing a loss of 111 kilograms of normal physical energy.

Sensory symptoms.—The patient is not conscious of such abnormal sensations as that of flies or ants crawling on the skin, or of pins or needles pricking him, although he experiences the sensation of walking on rolls of cotton or some soft substance. He suffers with girdle pains or waist cinctures.

Delayed sensations.—In the soles of the feet conduction is delayed five seconds. In the dorsum of either foot conduction is delayed four seconds. In the hands, the thighs, and the forearms conduction is delayed three seconds. The patient distinguishes accurately, with some delay, the sensation of heat and cold. There is no local anesthesia, hyperesthesia, or hyperalgesia. With his eyes closed the patient readily locates any part of his body touched. Electro-sensibility is obtunded in the feet and legs to a marked degree and slightly so in the hands and arms.

Eyes.—There is no paralysis of the muscles of the eye. The pupils contract to both light and accommodation. The field of vision is apparently normal. The patient is free from nystagmus and color-blindness.

Crises.—The patient is free from cardiac, pulmonic, laryngeal, and gastric crises. There is, at times, difficulty in completely evacuating the bladder, and the patient can not urinate standing. At times he suffers from precipitate urination. The bowels are habitually constipated. The knee jerk is abolished, but the plantar reflex exists. The patient is free from oedema, herpes, and ulceration. Intellection is clear. There is no apparent abnormal condition of the joints. No fractures have occurred.

From September 6, 1894, to May 9, 1895, the patient was under constitutional treatment in hospital for locomotor ataxia, during which time the sirup of hyphosphite of lime and soda with iron and strychnia were prescribed for the nutritive and tonic effect of these drugs, while attendant symptoms were prescribed for as required; for the shooting pains, phenacetine was prescribed; for the constipation, the fluid extract of cascara was administered. A nutritive and nonstimulating regimen of diet was insisted upon with moderate exercise in the open air daily, on all suitable occasions. The use of alcohol has been interdicted.

From May 9 to June 30, 1895, the patient has been discharged from the hospital, at his own request, and declines all further treatment.

The progress of the disease seems to be, for the time being, retarded, and the patient's physical health is somewhat improved.

CASE III.

[Service of Asst. Surg. A. Ivins Comfort.]

Charles Hauschild, late of Company C, Twenty-fourth Wisconsin Infantry. Enlisted August 24, 1862. Mustered out of the service June 6, 1865. Age, 64; widower; occupation prior to enlistment, laborer in a sash and blind factory and also in an iron foundry.

His health became seriously impaired while engaged in these avocations, he suffering with a distressing cough attended with copious expectoration and great emaciation. He suffered several attacks of hæmoptysis until he was obliged to abandon indoor pursuits and seek employment in the open air. Since he was mustered out of the service he has been employed in a stone yard, that is, a stone dressing establishment.

The patient never had epilepsy. He suffered a sunstroke in 1868, subsequent to which he was confined to the bed and unable to work for several months. He has had gonorrhœa, but has never had syphilis.

Motor symptoms.—Incoordination unmistakably present. He can button his clothing without looking at the buttons, and he can button his shirt collar without a mirror. He walks with a staggering gait and is accused by his comrades of being intoxicated. He can not stand erect with his eyes open without swaying his body. He is the subject of diploptic vision. The patient has been subject to cramps and muscular twitchings in the sural muscles for eight years past. He has been unable to walk in the dark for the past five years.

There is no apparent wasting of the muscles except from disuse and advanced years. There are muscular tremors in both the upper and lower limbs. The patient is free from bed sores. The facial muscles are not involved by the lesion; the muscles of the trunk are not involved in the disease. He can not walk in the dark. His dynametric grasp equals 70 degrees on a scale of 160, representing 70 kilograms of normal physical energy.

Sensory symptoms.—The patient has suffered the sensation of insects crawling on his person and believed himself infected with pediculi, and has on several occasions destroyed his clothing and purchased new in order to divest himself of imaginary vermin. He has never felt as if he was walking on velvet, or wool, or cotton, or had pebbles in his shoes.

It has been free from girdle pains or sensations of a constriction about the waist. Plantar reflex responsive. Right leg numb; left sensitive. Unable to extend the right foot fully. Sensation delayed in the right foot; not so in the left. Partial anaesthesia of the right foot and leg is plainly marked. The patient readily distinguishes heat from cold by contact. There is no delay of sensation above the knees, nor none below the left knee. Conduction right foot delayed three seconds.

Eyes.—No paralysis of the muscles of the eyes. The pupils conform to the Argyll-Robertson test. They do not dilate on pinching the neck. No nystagmus; no color-blindness.

Crises and visceral disorders.—The patient is free from gastric crises. There are no visceral crises. There is no manifestation of a cardiac, pulmonic, or laryngeal crises. The patient is not troubled with precipitate urination, nor is there any difficulty in urinating.

The knee jerk is abolished. The right plantar reflex is diminished. The left plantar reflex is exaggerated. The patient is free from oedema and herpes.

Mental condition.—Intellection is clear and vigorous.

The joints are apparently free from deformity. The patient suffered a fracture of the left radius January 19, 1895, which readily united without deformity.

On March 2, 1895, the existence of locomotor ataxia was diagnosed and the syrup of hyphosphite of lime and soda prescribed, with iron and strychnia, until May 21, when a solution of the bromide of arsenic and gold was substituted for it in 10-drop doses. The progress of the disease appears to be arrested for the time being, his symptoms mitigated and his general health improved. These beneficent results may be attributed to a salutary system of hygiene and dietics and the gradual change of winter to summer.

CASE IV.

[Service of Asst. Surg. A. Ivins Comfort.]

Frederick Amann, late corporal of Company H, First Wisconsin Cavalry. Enlisted October 13, 1861; age, 60; discharged February 23, 1865.

The man was never sick prior to enlistment. He was never sick in hospital during the war. He is of a long-lived ancestry. He has five sisters and a brother living and in good health.

Occupation, farmer; married; nativity, a German canton of Switzerland.

He never had convulsions. He never had sunstroke. He never had a blow upon the head. He has had falls on several occasions; once from a tree, and once from a building, through a distance of 20 feet. He never had syphilis or any venereal disease whatever. He never had smallpox, measles, or scarletina. He received a kick from a horse in 1863 which resulted in a ventral hernia.

On July 4, 1893, his left eye and face were powder burned by a flash from the vent of a cannon, resulting in intraocular lesions and impaired vision.

On October 25, 1894, he observed that he walked with some difficulty and suffered pain in the right foot that his features were drawn to the right that he suffered with ptosis, and his tongue still deviates to the right. Since then his bowels have been habitually constipated. He has not since that time been able to button his collar without a mirror, or his vest or his suspenders without looking at them. When first attacked he could not raise his hands. He could not walk or stand; he could only lie in the recumbent position.

Since January 1, 1895, he has been unable to pick up a coin, or pin, or other small object from the floor, as he is unable to feel the object. The ends of the fingers just beneath the nails are extremely sensitive and tender. For one year prior to October 25, 1894, he suffered with cramps in the sural muscles and in the flexors of the thighs. His usual weight has been upward of 140 pounds. He now weighs 122 pounds. He is free from ulcers and other cutaneous eruptions. He is free from atrophy of any system or group of muscles. The facial expression does not indicate the involvement of the facial muscles. The patient can sit erect with his eyes closed without swaying his body, though he can not stand erect with his eyes closed without swaying his body. He can not walk with his eyes closed without staggering or danger of falling. He can not stand on one foot. His gait is moderately ataxic.

The dynamometric grasp of the right hand is about one-half its natural force. The dynamometric grasp of the left hand is about three-fourths of its natural force. The patient is left-handed.

Sensory symptoms.—The patient experiences the sensation of ants crawling upon his hands and forearms, and sometimes upon his arms, or as he expresses it, he feels as if he had his arms and hands in an ant heap, and so, also, he experiences the sensation of ants crawling on his feet, legs, and thighs. When he flexes his toes he experiences the sensation of walking in gravel or having pebbles in his shoes. He experiences a pricking sensation of the skin, also a constricting sensation, as if the upper and lower extremities were incased in tight felt gloves or stockings. He

suffers with well-marked and severe girdle pains. He suffers the sensation of stabbing pains in the abdominal walls. Two points of the æsthesiometer, 2½ inches apart, are regarded as one, rarely as two, when applied to any part of the body after a delay of three seconds. Friction applied to the skin is responded to in from one to one and one-half seconds.

There is no hyperæsthesia. A location of partial anæsthesia is found on the palmar surfaces of the distal phalanxes of the thumbs and fingers. There is no location of hyperalgesia. The patient can locate any part of his body touched when his eyes are closed. The patient readily distinguishes between the sensation of heat and cold.

Eyes.—There is no paralysis of the muscles of the eye. The pupils dilate unequally; the right is more dilatible than the left. The long diameter is perpendicular and greater than the horizontal and probably due to symchia, the result of the powder burn. The pupils contract to light and accommodation imperfectly. There is no nystagmus. The patient discriminates between colors imperfectly, or, in other words, he is slightly color-blind.

The patient is free from gastric, vesical, rectal, cardiac, laryngeal, and pulmonic crises. He is not troubled with precipitate urination, nor retention of urine, nor with other difficulty of urination. His bowels are persistently constipated. The knee jerk and the plantar reflex are abolished. There is no œdema of the extremities or other parts of the body. There is no herpes or ulceration on toes, feet, or other part of the body. There is no deformity of the joints. There is no fracture. There is no ankle clonus. Intellection is clear, though the patient is usually depressed in spirits.

The patient was admitted to hospital for treatment May 28, 1895, and the sirup of hyphosphite of lime and soda was prescribed, with iron and strychnia, for the nutritive and tonic effect of these drugs, while phenacetine was prescribed for the shooting pains, cinctures, etc., and saline cathartics were prescribed for his constipation.

On June 21, a solution of gold and arsenic, bearing the name arsenaro was prescribed in 5-drop doses, and the sirup of hyphosphite of lime and soda was discontinued.

The patient is apparently somewhat improved in general health, though the ataxic or tabebic symptoms remain apparently unchanged.

CASE V.

[Service of Aast. Surg. A. Ivins Comfort.]

John Purcell, late of Company D, Third New York Heavy Artillery. Nativity, Ireland; single; occupation, farm laborer. He enlisted in April, 1861.

Prior to enlistment the patient enjoyed excellent health. He contracted a chronic diarrhœa in 1862 with which he suffered till the close of the war. In 1862 he suffered a sprain in the back while lifting a cannon by which he was thrown forcibly on his face and hands. In 1861 he suffered a sunstroke. He never had epilepsy. In 1875 he suffered an attack of gonorrhœa, but he denies ever having had syphilis. He has been subject to chronic rheumatism since the close of the war, which he attributes to hardship and exposure incident to the service. Three years since he experienced a difficulty in stooping to pick up an object. This he attributes to the injury received in his back in 1862, as mentioned above.

The patient has experienced cramps and twitching of the sural muscles for the last three years. He has had no bed sores or other ulcerations. The facial muscles are not involved by the disease. The muscles of the trunk are so involved that the patient can not sit erect without swaying his body. The patient can not walk in the dark, or with his eyes closed. He always walks with a cane. He can not ascend or descend a flight of stairs without the support of the hand rail. The dynamometric grasp of the hand represents 55 kilograms of prehensile force, showing a loss of 105 kilograms of normal physical energy, or, in other words, the grasp of the hand represents 55 degrees on a scale of 160.

Sensory symptoms.—Sensations as of ants crawling on the feet and legs are sometimes experienced by the patient. He also at times experiences a prickling sensation in his feet. He also experiences a tightness or constriction of the hands, as if they were swollen. He feels as if he was walking on straw, or had straw in his shoes. He suffers with girdle pains. In the feet conduction is delayed from two to four seconds; in the legs not quite two seconds. In the thighs the delay of conduction is very slight. In the trunk and upper extremities conduction is not delayed. The left half of the upper lip and nose are partially anæsthetic. There is no hyperæsthesia. The patient locates any part of the body touched when eyes are closed. In the feet and legs he can distinguish heat and cold only with delay and uncertainty; elsewhere he distinguishes between them accurately and readily. There is a marked diminution of electrical excitability in the feet and legs; elsewhere it is apparently normal.

Eyes.—The existence of ptosis indicates the improvement of the levator palpebræ superiories; other ocular muscles do not appear to be affected. The pupils contract to light and accommodation, and are free from myosis. There is no nystagamus. There is correct discrimination of colors. Pinching the neck corrects the ptosis temporarily and dilates the pupils.

Crises and visceral disorders.—There is no gastric crisis. The patient suffers from most urgent and precipitate inclination to urinate, followed by difficult urination and incomplete evacuation of the bladder. Rectal crises occur with frequent and urgent defecation. The patient suffers from dilatation of the heart and mitral regurgitation, attended with hydrous œdema of the lower extremities. He is subject to mild attacks of dysprœa. He is free from laryngeal crises. The knee jerk is abolished. The plantar reflex is diminished but not abolished. He is free from herpetic and other cutaneous eruptions. Intellection clear, but perception slow. There are no affections of the joints nor fractures nor deformities.

May 29, 1895.—The patient was this day admitted to the hospital and a nutritious regimen of diet prescribed, and he was directed to take moderate exercise in the open air daily. For the shooting pains in the lower extremities phenacetine was prescribed as required, and the sirup of hypophosphite of lime and soda, with strychnia and iron, was administered thrice daily until June 21, when a solution of the bromide of gold and arsenic was substituted for it, the patient taking 10-drop doses three times a day.

In addition to the above a symptomatic treatment was instituted, as the case required. For the œdema of the lower extremities a mild hydrogogue cathartic with bitartrate of potassa was prescribed. For the precipitate urination the sulphate of atrophia with benzoic was prescribed. Though the patient has been under treatment only a month there is a marked improvement in his case, due to salutary hygienic and dietetic precautions as well as to medicine. Much more, however, may his improvement be attributed to the balmy, genial, summer climate, or at least a uniform temperature of not less than 75 degrees F., which is highly conducive to the arrest of the progress of the disease and the amelioration of the condition of the patient.

CASE VI.

Adam Baumgardner, late of the One hundred and twenty-sixth Pennsylvania Infantry, Company I, also of the Two hundred and second Pennsylvania Infantry, company B. Age, 52; nativity, Pennsylvania; married; occupation, laborer and carpenter.

Enlisted August 1, 1862. Served as an enlisted man one year and nine months. Was twice precipitated from a scaffold a distance of 15 feet, falling upon his head and shoulders. He never had convulsions. He had thermic fever twenty-five years since. He never had syphilis.

Admitted to the Home November, 1883.

Motor symptoms.—Nineteen years ago he discovered that he could not climb a ladder. This was a short time after his fall from a scaffold. Neither could he for twelve years past descend a stairway without the support of the hand rail or seating himself upon each step in the descent. The ascent of a flight of stairs is less difficult, but is made upon the hands and knees. He has been unable to write with a pen, except his autograph, for twelve years past. He uses a pencil to write with. In order to write at all he passes his penholder or pencil through a spool in order to increase the diameter and enable him to grasp it. Since 1880 he has been unable, also, to walk in the dark.

He has severe muscular pains in the lower extremities and in the back, and very recently and very rarely in the forearm.

There is no muscular atrophy. He has no bed sores or other ulceration anywhere. Facial muscles are not involved.

Patient can not sit erect on a stool without swaying his body if his eyes are closed.

On May 3, 1863, was struck on the cartridge belt by a spent shell, since which time he has been unable to mount a horse from the ground.

The patient can not stand erect with his eyes closed without swaying his body. The patient can not walk at the word of command, stopping or starting suddenly, without falling. The patient can not, with his eyes closed, stand on one foot for an instant. While sitting the patient crosses one leg over the other without raising it very high and then letting it drop.

Dynamometric grasp appreciably impaired. Loss of force, 25 per cent. The knee jerk is abolished.

Sensory symptoms.—The patient is devoid of paræsthesia, except when walking on the floor barefoot he experiences a prickling sensation in the soles of his feet. He is free from the sensation of walking on wool, or velvet, or felt. He is free from cincture or girdle pains.

This man has been a member of the Home for nearly twelve years. He usually spends his summers with friends while on furlough. He is fully aware of the character of the disease with which he suffers, though he declines all treatment. He avoids medicine and medical men, and trusts solely to the *vis medicatrix naturæ*. His case was accidentally discovered by the writer of these lines, and with some persuasion he submitted to an examination prior to his departure on his usual summer furlough, the above notes being a report of said examination. The progress of the disease is slow and the general health of the man, as he states, is better in summer than winter.

EXPLANATORY REMARKS RELATIVE TO CASES REMAINING UNDER TREATMENT
JUNE 30, 1894.

Case II, that of Watson Holway, is undoubtedly one of spastic paralysis, and hence not included in this report.

Case III, that of Elias J. Shaw, is carried on in this report as Case II.

Case IV, that of John Cooney, in consequence of his transfer to the Western Branch has not been included in this report.

Case V, that of Hiram Paris, who has positively declined all medical advice and treatment, is not reported.

Case VII, that of George E. Averill, is carried on in this report as Case I.

EASTERN BRANCH.

TOGUS, ME., August 1, 1895.

GENERAL: I have the honor to transmit herewith my annual report on *tabes dorsalis*, a special report of a case of epithelioma treated with the toxins of erysipelas and bacillus prodigiosus, and a summary of our meteorological record.

During the past six months we have adopted the treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis described and advocated by Dr. G. M. Carasso, chief physician and director of the military lazarette at Genoa. Dr. Carasso's report is substantiated by a detailed description of forty-four cases treated, and contains such convincing evidence of the efficacy of his method as to warrant a thorough trial of it here.

The treatment consists of the constant inhalation of the vapor of the essence of peppermint, associated with such other measures as experience has proved to be useful in these cases, and is based upon the fact that the oil of peppermint, as demonstrated by laboratory investigation, is fatal to the tubercle bacillus. Ten cases were treated by this method in the hospital of this branch between January 1 and June 30, 1895, in all of which the tubercle bacillus was found in the sputum by careful microscopical examination before treatment was commenced. The results have not been as favorable as the report of Dr. Carasso led us to hope for, but in every case the treatment has afforded relief to many of the unpleasant symptoms. Of these ten cases one recovered after six months' treatment. Bacilli, which had been abundant in the sputum when treatment was commenced, could no longer be found. The temperature, pulse, and respiration returned to normal, and all cough and chest symptoms, which had been pronounced, disappeared. Treatment was commenced in the early stages of this case. Two other cases in which treatment was also commenced early have so far improved as to warrant the hope of recovery. Two died, and in the other seven cases palliation of the symptoms and prolongation of life is all that can be claimed.

The treatment has not given sufficient results to warrant a detailed report of the cases as was hoped for when it was commenced, but is sufficiently promising to justify its further trial.

TABES DORSALIS.

Three new cases of *tabes dorsalis* and two of the cases previously reported have been under treatment during the past year. Of these five, one died, one has held the improvement previously noted, two have left the Home somewhat improved, and one has so far improved that he has been detailed for extra duty as a nurse.

The salts of gold, especially the bromide of gold and arsenic, combined with the free and continued use of phenacetine, have given the best results in most of the cases,

but a proper regulation of the habits of life and systematic exercise of the ataxic muscles are important factors in the treatment. For convenience of reference to previous reports, the cases are numbered as they there appear, the three new cases being numbered in the order in which they were admitted to the hospital.

CASE V.

John Chelec, late Company C, Fifty-sixth Massachusetts Volunteers.
History, causation, and course to June 30, 1894, appear in previous reports.

TREATMENT AND CHANGES FROM JULY 1, 1894, TO APRIL 5, 1895.

The bromide of gold and arsenic was continuously administered in increasing doses from July 1 to August 9, when a slight rise of temperature, with soreness of the roots of the teeth, indicated that the gold had been pushed to its limit, and the amount was therefore reduced, when the unpleasant symptoms subsided. By August 22 there seemed to be a slight improvement in locomotion, the patient being able to go about the ward with less difficulty, but the degree of the other symptoms, previously noted, remained without change, and his condition was practically stationary until December 2, when he suffered from a cardiac crisis, similar to those before noted; and although it was less severe, it was not as quickly relieved by digitalis, the heart remaining very weak and irregular for several weeks. This attack was the beginning of a slow but constant failure of strength and an increase in the tendency to pain and crises, associated with insomnia and marked despondency.

March 18, 1895, he had a severe gastrointestinal crisis, the first of this kind from which he had suffered. The attack was so severe that morphine was at once administered, three-fourths of a grain given by divided doses, but without relief. The attack, however, yielded quite promptly to 45 grains of phenacetine, which was subsequently administered. From this date insomnia was a most distressing symptom, and was relieved better by a combination of chloral and potassium bromide than by sulfonal. Failure seemed to result from nervous exhaustion, the heart becoming more and more feeble, but without valvular lesion.

He died April 5, 1895.

Report of necropsy.—The necropsy was performed twenty hours after death. There was slight ascitis and edema of the legs. The cord was carefully removed by sawing through the transverse processes and pedicles of the vertebrae. The only abnormality in its gross appearance was a small cyst at the level of the fifth dorsal vertebra, which was slightly dislocated to the left, a condition which had not been detected during life. The cord was prepared for microscopical examination by Dr. C. F. Nutter, acting assistant surgeon, and numerous sections were examined. The degenerative changes in the posterior columns and posterior roots, characteristic of tabes, were observed in all the sections. There was also noticed a small circular opening a little to the right and anterior to the median canal, which appeared to be of cystic origin. This was in the cervical region of the cord. In the dorsal region of the cord, appearing continuously in numerous sections, a large cystic space was seen in the posterior part of the left posterior lateral column. The continuous appearance of these spaces in several sections, and the care used in mounting them, was sufficient evidence that they were not the result of traumatism. Similar cystic spaces were found in the cord of Case No. 1.

CASE VI.

Frederick Denny, late Company K, Eighty-second New York Volunteers.

History, causation, and course to June 30, 1894, appear in previous reports.

Was readmitted to hospital September 16, 1894, on account of a severe gastrointestinal crisis, precisely similar to those before recorded in the report of this case. He had suffered a few days preceding this from a return of the pain in the right foot and leg, but otherwise he had been comfortable since leaving the hospital almost exactly one year before, and there had been no changes from the symptoms as recorded June 30, 1893. This crisis was associated with severe pain and cramps in the legs, but was quickly controlled by phenacetine. A little overindulgence in alcoholics was the only thing that could be assigned as the immediate cause of the attack. The treatment under which he had previously improved, namely, chloride of gold and sodium grain, one-fifth, t. i. d., and phenacetine, was at once recommenced. A tendency to attacks of pain in the right foot continued until October 31, when they disappeared. No changes could be detected in other symptoms, and as the patient was able to care for himself, he was allowed, at his own request, to return to company quarters.

He was again readmitted to the hospital February 27, 1895, on account of a return of pain in the feet, associated with obstinate constipation.

At this time there was a noticeable increase in the knee jerk of both legs as compared with his last examination; but otherwise no changes in the symptoms could be detected. The tendency to constipation was relieved by proper medication, and the pains were controlled with phenacetine; but as the intestinal digestion improved the pains disappeared and he was again returned to company quarters, April 17, entirely free from pain and uncomfortable symptoms, except the ataxia, which remained as it had been for two years past. The improvement in the knee jerk was permanent, but otherwise no changes were noted.

CASE IX.

Alvah V. Oatman, late Company C, Twenty-seventh Massachusetts Volunteers; aged 59 years; widower; military service, thirty-four months.

Notes cover the period from July 13 to September 12, 1894.

Medical history.—Was well when he entered the service, and continued so until 1864, when he twice suffered from severe "colds," associated with neuralgic pains and cramps in the legs. He claims that he has been subject to similar pain ever since, but has been able to work as a farmer until about four years ago. Ten years ago the pain in the legs became so severe that he resorted to the use of morphine, which he continued to indulge in, and at the date of admission to the Home, was using from 1 to 3 grains daily. He came here for the relief of this habit. On account of the prolonged use of morphine, and his feeble condition generally, it was difficult to obtain any reliable information from him as to his early symptoms and the cause of the disease. He denied syphilis, and there was no marked evidence of it. From his general appearance and partial admissions it seemed evident that he had been addicted to excessive venery, and probably to the use of alcoholics.

COMPARISON OF SYMPTOMS PRESENT JULY 13, 1894, AND SEPTEMBER 12, 1894.

July 13, 1894.

Constant pain in lower part of body and legs, with frequent lightning pains. Uses from 1 to 3 grains of morphine daily.

Partial anæsthesia of thighs and legs, and almost complete anæsthesia of soles of feet.

No hyperæsthesia. Conduction from legs and feet delayed three seconds.

Knee jerk totally abolished.

No visceral crises, but has suffered from partial paralysis of bladder for past six years, and resulting incontinence of urine.

No transient paralysis.

Electrical reaction good.

Pupils dilated, and respond slowly to light. Presbyopia, with a tendency to central cataract, which prevents examination of retina.

No venereal desire or power of erection for five years.

Incoordination marked.

Cannot walk without a cane.

Romberg's symptoms marked. Hands and arms beginning to be ataxic.

Joints not affected.

September 12, 1894.

Dull pain in legs, almost constant, but not severe. No lightning pains. Takes no morphine.

Anæsthesia same as on admission.

No hyperæsthesia. Conduction not delayed.

Knee jerk still absent.

No visceral crises, and only slight tendency to incontinence of urine now.

No transient paralysis.

Electrical reaction good.

Pupils dilated, and respond slowly to light, but vision less acute, due to developing presbyopia and cataracts.

No venereal desire or power.

Incoordination marked.

Romberg's symptoms still marked, but hands and arms less ataxic.

Joints not affected.

TREATMENT AND CHANGES FROM JULY 13 TO SEPTEMBER 12, 1894.

Treatment was commenced by reducing the amount of morphine taken, with a view to curing the habit. One-fourth of a grain was allowed three times daily at first, and this amount was quickly reduced during the first ten days, at the end of which time it was entirely stopped. The unpleasant symptoms attendant upon its withdrawal were controlled by sulfonal in sufficient doses to produce sleep and control restlessness, with occasional doses of codia, as necessary. The strength was maintained by strychnia grain one-thirtieth given hypodermically t. i. d., and a light liquid diet administered at frequent intervals. This treatment was continued with the gradual substitution of phenacetine for codia, until August 2, when the unpleasant symptoms had abated, and the patient slept naturally. As the nervous system was in an exhausted and irritable condition, a prescription, consisting of a solution of hypophosphites of lime and soda with the bromide of potassium, was

ordered, and August 8 treatment of the tabetic symptoms proper was commenced by the administration of 15 minims of liq. auri et arsenii bromide, t. i. d., with phenacetine in 15-grain doses several times daily, as necessary to relieve pain. A tendency to incontinence of urine was controlled with ergot. The patient improved somewhat, so that he was able to be up and about with the aid of a cane, until August 16, when he began to suffer from very obstinate diarrhoea and a return of incontinence of urine, associated with insomnia and severe pain, which symptoms continued with varying intensity for two weeks before they were controlled. By September 2 he was decidedly more comfortable. There was much less pain, and the patient was able to be up and about the greater part of the day. He stated that he had lost all desire for morphine, and it was to obtain relief from this habit that he came to the Home.

He was discharged from the Home at his own request September 12, 1894, at which time his condition was as above recorded.

CASE X.

Peter A. Lehlback, late Company C, Twelfth New York Volunteer Cavalry; aged 57 years; widower; military service, nineteen months.

Notes cover the period from August 1, 1894, to March 28, 1895.

Medical history.—Was well until 1864, when, at 27 years of age, he contracted syphilis, but, so far as he can remember, he did not suffer very severely at the time. After leaving the service he worked as a barber and led a rather dissolute life, indulging in alcoholics and tobacco freely, and contracted gonorrhoea three times. In 1878 he was taken suddenly with almost complete paralysis of the arms and legs, evidently syphilitic, from which he recovered slowly, so that he was a cripple for ten years. As the paresis diminished, he began to suffer from a pain in the back and legs, which was followed by other symptoms characteristic of tabes dorsalis.

Causation: Syphilis.

COMPARISON OF SYMPTOMS PRESENT AUGUST 1, 1894, AND MARCH 28, 1895.

August 1, 1894.

Pain almost constant in back and legs, and occasionally very severe.

Partial anæsthesia of thighs and legs, and almost complete anæsthesia of feet.

No hyperæsthesia.

Conduction not delayed.

Knee jerk delayed, but normal in amplitude.

Is subject to severe gastrointestinal crises.

Transient paralysis, as noted in history.

Electrical reaction good in thighs; diminished in legs and feet.

Equal myosis. Light reflex slow. Incipient cataracts prevent examination of retina.

No venereal desire or power of erection.

Incoordination and Romberg's symptom marked. Walks with a cane.

Joints not affected.

March 28, 1895.

Slight pain occasionally in left side, not sufficient to require analgesics.

No anæsthesia.

No hyperæsthesia.

Conduction not delayed.

Knee jerk normal.

No visceral crises for six weeks.

No return of paralysis.

Electrical reaction good.

Equal myosis. Light reflex absent.

Is inclined to indecent exposure of person.

Incoordination very slight. Can walk on a straight line slowly.

Romberg's symptom less marked.

Great improvement in walking generally.

Joints not affected.

TREATMENT AND CHANGES FROM AUGUST 1, 1894, TO MARCH 28, 1895.

Treatment was commenced with the regulation of his habits and diet, the systematic exercise of the ataxic muscles, and the administration of 15 minims of liq. auri et arsenii bromide, t. i. d., with from two to 15 grain doses of phenacetine daily, in accordance with the severity of the pain. He began to show some improvement by the end of the first week, chiefly in the relief from pain. August 16 there was a severe electric storm which seemed to have a marked effect upon this patient, causing headache, restlessness, pain, and insomnia, and leaving him so weak that August 18 strychn. sulph. grain one twentieth, t. i. d., was added to the treatment. This is the first instance in which a tabetic patient has seemed to show any reaction to changing meteorological conditions, although the varying conditions in all these cases have been compared with our meteorological record. August 23 knee jerk in right leg could be detected only with difficulty, but the gait was less ataxic, and the patient could stand and walk for a few steps with his eyes closed. There was almost no pain, so phenacetine was discontinued. September 15 the gold salt was

discontinued on account of a tendency to soreness of the teeth, and potassium iodide, in gradually increasing doses, was substituted. His condition remained almost stationary under this treatment; although the drug was pushed almost to the point of iodism, until November 23, when he suffered from a severe gastrointestinal crisis. He lost ground slowly from this date, severe pain in the left side occurring frequently, which was occasionally associated with crises, and by January 1, 1895, these attacks were so exhausting that he was sometimes confined to bed for several days at a time. January 17 the potassium oxide was discontinued, as the patient had lost ground under its influence decidedly, and the liq. auri et arsenii bromide was readministered in 15 minim doses, t. i. d. Improvement was noticed at the end of two weeks, the pain in the side being much less severe, and no crises having occurred.

By February 16 he was free from pain, and was able to be up and about all day, walking with much greater ease than when admitted; but he developed peculiar hallucinations of persecution, and was inclined to be hysterical, and was several times guilty of intentional indecent exposure of his person. All medicines were discontinued, and he was removed to a back ward, where his morbid and hysterical tendencies were discouraged by forcing him to care entirely for himself, and subjecting him to some slight restraint. Under this treatment he gradually regained almost entirely his mental balance. He was discharged from the Home March 28, 1895, at which time his condition was as above noted.

CASE XI.

Henry T Kelly, late Company I, Fifteenth Massachusetts Volunteers; aged 52 years; widower; military service, twenty-one months; iron molder.

Notes cover the period from October 29, 1894, to June 18, 1895.

Medical history.—Was well as a youth, and until 1862, when in the service he received a nail wound in the right foot, which subsequently necessitated the amputation of all the toes of that foot. Upon leaving the service he worked hard as an iron molder, occasionally indulging to excess in alcoholics. The first symptom of tabes which he can remember was the sensation of a tight band about his abdomen, which made its appearance in 1874. Seven years later he began to suffer from ataxia and Romberg's symptom, but was able to continue at his trade until 1892, when these symptoms had become so severe as to totally disable him for labor. The band sensation, which had become constant, was now often associated with spasm and distress in the abdominal viscera—mild gastrointestinal crises. These symptoms grew constantly worse up to the date of his admission to the Home. His family history is good. He denies syphilis; and there is no evidence of it. He worked hard at the rather unhealthy occupation of an iron molder and occasionally indulged in alcoholics, but neither of these seemed to have been sufficient to be taken as causative factors.

Causation: Obscure

COMPARISON OF SYMPTOMS OCTOBER 29, 1894, AND JUNE 18, 1895.

October 29, 1894.

Pain in abdomen, associated with band sensation, occasionally severe.

Pronounced anaesthesia on soles of feet and in spots on right leg.

No hyperaesthesia.

Conduction not delayed.

Knee jerk abolished.

Frequent gastrointestinal crises.

No transient paralysis.

Electrical reaction good, except right leg below knee.

Double myosis. No light reflex. No optic atrophy apparent.

Venereal desire and power appear to be but slightly diminished.

Ataxia typical, but not extreme. Romberg's symptom marked.

Walks with a cane.

Joints not affected, but has a trophic ulcer on the right foot in the vicinity of the cicatrix, resulting from the amputation of toes referred to in history.

June 18, 1895.

No pain or band sensation for three months past.

No anaesthesia.

No hyperaesthesia.

Conduction not delayed.

Knee jerk still absent.

No visceral crises for three months.

No transient paralysis.

Electrical reaction slightly diminished.

Double myosis. No light reflex. No optic atrophy.

Venereal desire and power of erection normal.

Ataxia and Romberg's symptom scarcely perceptible.

Walks several miles daily without a cane, and is able to work all day as a nurse without fatigue.

Joints not affected, and trophic ulcer much smaller and nearly healed.

TREATMENT AND CHANGES FROM OCTOBER 29, 1894, TO JUNE 18, 1895.

Treatment was commenced by regulating exercise and habits generally, and the administration of 10 minims liq. auri et arsenii bromide, t. i. d., with phenacetine in 10-grain doses two or three times daily for relief of band sensation. There was but little change in his condition during the first month of treatment, except a slight diminution in the pain and band sensation. The ulcer on the right foot caused considerable annoyance, and on December 20 a large mass of callus surrounding it was removed. December 29 the band sensation became very pronounced and the liq. auri et arsenii bromide was therefore increased to 15 minims, t. i. d. From this date he began slowly to show improvement. January 20, 1895, he was entirely free from pain and band sensation. He continued free from pain and by February 21 could walk with ease without a cane. Romberg's symptom was much less pronounced, and the floor and ground began to feel normal to his step. At this date the gold solution was stopped to notice the effect of its discontinuance. At the end of one week the band sensation had returned and he began to lose ground generally. Phosphate of silver in one-fourth grain doses, t. i. d., was then administered with a view to comparing its effect with the gold preparation, but was not given a fair trial, for, as there was no apparent effect at the end of one week of its use, the patient became anxious to return to the medicine under the influence of which he had improved, and was allowed to do so, 15 minims of the gold solution being administered three times a day. By March 20 the pain and band sensation had again disappeared. He continued to improve slowly, nearly all the symptoms of tabes becoming gradually less and less pronounced; but he lost flesh, and at times seemed weak physically, therefore strychn. grain one-twentieth, t. i. d., was added to the treatment. By June 1 he had improved greatly in his ability to control the action of his legs and in his power of endurance in walking, and was free from all band sensation and pain and tendency to crises. The anesthesia of the feet had disappeared, and he was able to assist in the work about his ward, at which he proved so efficient that he was transferred to extra duty as a nurse June 18, 1895. His condition at that date was as above noted.

NOTE.—Since the above report was written, Louis Ende, Case No. VIII, of last year's report, has returned to the Home, and it is gratifying to be able to report that the marked improvement in this case has, so far, been permanent. He has worked almost continuously as a clerk in a store during the past year and is now fully as well as when he left the Home.

EPITHELIOMA.

REPORT OF A CASE TREATED WITH THE TOXINS OF ERYSIPELAS AND BACILLUS PRODIGIOSUS.

James T. Jenner, late Company B, First Louisiana Volunteers; aged 72 years.

Medical history and treatment.—The patient's history is without significance until 1881, when a small epithelial tumor made its appearance on the lower lip. This increased slowly in size, and was removed by excision two years later. The growth reappeared one year after its removal, and was again removed by excision two years from its second appearance. In six months from this date it again returned, and was removed for the third time June 1, 1893. It made its fourth appearance January 1, 1895, and extended slowly over the right half of the lower lip and into the angle of the mouth.

The patient was admitted to the hospital of the Eastern Branch, National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, April 28, 1895, at which time he was suffering from epithelioma, involving the right half of the lower lip for three-fourths of an inch and extending well into the angle of the mouth.

The neoplasm occupied the whole thickness of the lip, and was steadily increasing in size, causing much annoyance by limiting the extent to which the mouth could be opened and by constant prickling, painful sensations. The patient positively refused to submit to operative procedure, giving as his reason that previous attempts at extirpation had failed. Treatment was therefore commenced by injecting the toxins of erysipelas and bacillus prodigiosus directly into the tumor. Two minims were given as the first dose, and caused profound systemic disturbances. In less than two hours after the injection was made the patient had a severe chill, followed by elevation of temperature to 102.6°, with yawning, stretching, nausea, and vomiting, which lasted about three hours and was followed by great exhaustion. These symptoms were so severe that the next two doses, given at intervals of two days, were reduced to 1 minim. The reaction produced was similar, but less severe. May 5, 2 minims were again injected, and this amount was continued every second or third day, according to the severity of the reaction and the condition of the patient, until June 3.

By the 10th of May there was a perceptible diminution in the size of the neoplasm, and the unpleasant prickling and painful sensations, which had been annoying symptoms of its growth, had disappeared.

June 3 the dose was increased to 3 minims, as a slight tolerance had been established. The growth continued to diminish in size, and the patient was now able to open his mouth to its full extent, which had previously been impossible.

By June 25 all that portion of the growth which had involved the lip had practically disappeared, a finely granular, unhealthy-looking surface alone indicating where it had been; but there was still a considerable mass remaining on the inner aspect of the angle of the mouth. This has continued, without increasing in size or causing inconvenience, and the granular surface of the margin of the lip is now (July 1, 1895) beginning to heal over.

A permanent cure can not as yet be claimed, but the fact that a steadily developing malignant growth which had thrice returned after removal has not only been checked in its progress, but has been materially reduced in size, seems of sufficient importance to warrant the report of this case.

GENERAL: I have the honor to submit the following report of cases of locomotor ataxia under our care during the past year.

CASE I.

James Watson, Company E, Forty-seventh Indiana Infantry.

Watson has gained 4 pounds in weight, now weighing 95 pounds. Sensory paralysis of toes and fingers has developed. Incoordination has extended to upper extremities. He can not button his coat unless he can direct the motion with his eyes. The girdle sensation is much lower. Deplopia when looking at objects more than 10 feet away. A pledget of cotton, used as an aesthesiometer, shows cutaneous sensibility in the lower extremities, save the toes, very slightly impaired. Pain not so intense of late. Burning sensation centers in feet.

CASE II.

Henry Rich, Company A, One hundred and twentieth Indiana Infantry.

Rich has declined in weight during the past year about 10 pounds. Incoordination has extended to upper extremities. He can not direct the fingers to the performance of the simplest task when eyes are closed. There is noticeable aphasia. Girdle

sensation is lessened. Pains in legs very severe. Grasp is strong. His sight is much better than one year ago. He is able to read, however, but a very few moments until the print becomes blurred.

An interesting feature in this case is a peculiar susceptibility to morphia. On one occasion, his pain becoming intense, he was ordered one-fourth grain hypodermically. In a very few moments the narcosis produced was such as to alarm us greatly, and necessitated restoratives.

CASE III.

John Cooney, Battery A, Fifth United States Light Infantry. "Case IV, Dr. W. H. Leighton's very excellent report of last year."

Cooney has been under our observation since June 6, 1895. He had been dissipating some before his arrival, which necessarily masked the symptoms to a great extent. For this reason, and because of the short time he has been under our care, we are not able to make a report of his case.

CASE IV.

James Ervin, Company A, Sixteenth Illinois Infantry. Admitted temporarily at post June 24, 1895. Occupation, butcher; age, 54; nativity, Pennsylvania. Diagnosis, locomotor ataxia.

History.—He first experienced shooting pains in 1865. These were from the thighs downward. Pain developed immediately after certain exposures incident to Sherman's march to the sea. These pains have continued on up to the present time. There was no impairment of locomotion until 1890. He was married in 1875, has had two children born to him, the last one in 1877. Sexual function even now remains unimpaired. In 1890 discovered inability to stand with his eyes closed. This was succeeded by numbness in feet. Incontinence of urine always followed a slight cold. At present he is fairly well nourished, walks with characteristic gait, and can not stand with eyes closed. There is absence of knee jerk and ankle clonus. Pupils respond slowly to light. Sight very slightly impaired. Sensory paralysis of feet. Shooting pains at intervals. Occasionally there is a manifestation of girdle sensation. Upper extremities are not affected. He had an epileptic seizure a few days after he was admitted to the Home. We then elicited a history of previous attacks.

Treatment.—In the case of Henry Rich we have continued the use of potassium iodide. In the other cases our treatment has been iron and strychnia.

We have had during the past year several cases of general dropsy, in the treatment of which we derived marked benefit from the use of strychnia as a stimulant and sulphate of magnesia as a hydragogue. The following is a report of such a case:

Asbury H. Gaston, Company L, First Indiana Heavy Artillery. Occupation, painter; age, 49; nativity, Indiana. Admitted temporarily at post May 7, 1895.

Diagnosis: General dropsy, the result of heart disease.

History.—He had perfect health up to December, 1893. At that time he had a severe attack of la grippe, from which he did not recover for two months. During this period, there was slight œdema of feet and ankles. In February, 1894, he resumed his work, and continued in good health until December of the same year. Again he was taken down with la grippe and œdema of extremities, which soon became general anasarca, developed. Dyspnoea accompanied this. On admission to the hospital, upper and lower extremities, chest, abdominal walls, and genitalia were enormously distended. Orthopnoea, with all its terrors, was constantly present. A short time after admission, a gangrenous sloughing ulcer, from the impaired circulation, was established on the left anterior tibial region, and extended from the middle upper third to the middle lower third of leg. Examination of urine revealed no albumen. Heart's action weak, but no murmur appreciable.

Treatment.—Lint, placed under a bichloride drip; strychnia, grain, one twenty-fifth, three times daily; sulphate of magnesia, ounce, one, 4 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p. m.; whisky and digitalis, as they were symptomatically indicated. Dyspnoea disappeared within a very short time. The dropsical accumulation has been entirely eliminated. The ulcer is granulating nicely. The patient now eats and sleeps well, and walks about on crutches.

SIR: I have the honor to submit my annual report upon special cases and treatment during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895.

During the year I have had opportunity to observe and treat eight cases of tabes dorsalis. The histories of three of these have been given in former reports. Histories

of the remaining five, together with a continuation of the histories of the three before mentioned, are given herein. A rigid examination has been made in each case. Various treatments have been tried, some without satisfactory results, others more successfully.

I hereby submit the histories of the several cases of tabes dorsalis, with a résumé as to etiology, semiology, and treatment.

Allow me, also, to refer to my statement as to the condition of patients having tabes dorsalis in my former reports for fiscal years ending June 30, 1892 and 1893.

Permit me to append the histories of two special cases, one of trephining, with favorable results; the other of a disease invariably fatal, namely, leucocythomia, the second recorded case in the history of the Home.

CASE I.

[Service of Asst. Surg. C. Fern Robbins.]

Oliver S. McLane, late Company A, Ninety-third Illinois Infantry. Ward I, hospital. Age, 51; occupation, real-estate dealer; native of Illinois; widower; weight, 120 pounds; height, 5 feet 10 inches; disease, tabes dorsalis; result, good.

Family history.—Father died of dropsy. Mother dead; cause unknown. Six brothers, 2 dead; 1 of phthisis, the other of pneumonia. Three sisters, 1 dead; cause, enteric fever.

History of case.—Lived in a malarious district; father of 4 children, 3 dead; cause, respectively, diphtheria, acute encephalitis, malnutrition.

Habits.—Alcoholic, for forty years; tobacco, moderately; indulged in sexual excesses.

Antecedent history.—Malaria, enteric fever, cerebro-spinal fever, rheumatism, and heat exhaustion.

Present condition came on eight years ago with sharp, shooting pains in head and down the spine. Now has double vision at times. Argyll-Robertson pupil; loss of patellar reflexes; paræsthesia; anaesthesia of lower extremities, with places of hyperæsthesia; incoordination of legs and hands; gastric pains; joints swell at times.

Urine: Sp. gr. 1020; reaction acid; urea 568 gr. fl. 40; epithelial cells.

Treatment: Aurii chloridi et sodii, gr. one-fourth, three times a day.

CASE II.

Jeremiah Ball Hackley, late Company A, One hundred and seventieth New York Infantry. Age, 51; occupation, farmer; nativity, New York State; single; weight, 145 pounds; height, 5 feet 7 inches; disease, tabes dorsalis; result, good.

Family history.—The cause of mother's death unknown. Do not know whether father is living or not. One brother living.

History of case.—Was never married. Never received any severe injuries. When 15 years of age had bilious fever; at 19, malarial fever lasting two months; rheumatism at the age of 40; first attack of gonorrhœa at 19 years of age, lasting 6 weeks; had hunterian chancre at the age of 26; syphilis at the age of 28. A moderate smoker; drunk all his life, and was a fast-living man. Complains of pain and numbness of legs, which are generally cold.

Present condition on examination.—Incoordination; loss of reflex; Argyll-Robertson pupil; gastric pains; swelling of joints; double vision at times; ataxic gait; can not go up and down stairs easily.

Urine: Sp. gr. 1018; slightly acid; epithelial cells; pus cells; urea 516 gr. fl. oz. xl.

Diagnosis: Locomotor ataxia.

Treatment: Chloride of gold and sodium, gr. one-fourth, three times a day.

CASE III.

[Service of Asst. Surg. C. Fern Robbins.]

James Elliot, late Company B, Fifty-fourth Ohio Infantry. Age, 48; occupation, miner; nativity, Ohio; weight, 140 pounds; height, 5 feet 8 inches. Admitted to the Home November 18, 1892; disease, tabes dorsalis; result, good.

Family history.—Does not know whether parents are living or not, having heard nothing from them for the past five years. Two brothers and one sister living.

History of case.—Habits: Tobacco, moderately; alcoholic drinks, also; gonorrhœa, chancres, and syphilis. Antecedent history, negative as to disease; as to injuries, one trauma at the last dorsal in 1886.

Present condition on examination.—Present trouble began with pain in lower extremities, followed by headache. Now, loss of reflexes; incoordination of legs; with slight incoordination of arms; Argyll-Robertson pupil; pain in the joints, with swelling; gastric and laryngeal pains occasionally; anæsthesia in lower extremities; with hyperæsthesia at last dorsal.

Urine: Sp. gr. 1025; acid; 424 gr. fl. oz. xlviil.

Diagnosis: Locomotor ataxia.

Treatment: Aurii caloricidi et sodii, gr. one-fourth, three times a day. Now, an elixir of quinine et iron et strychnia.

CASE IV.

[Service of Asst. Surg. C. Pern Robbins.]

Jacob Kirk, late Company F, Nineteenth Ohio Infantry. Ward I. Age, 50; occupation, miner; nativity, Switzerland; physique, 150 pounds; height, 5 feet 8 inches; never married. Admitted to the Home, August 18, 1894. Admitted to the hospital, May 9, 1895. Disease, tabes dorsalis.

Family history.—Father died with pneumonia; mother living; two brothers and one sister, all living.

History of case.—Habits: Tobacco, alcoholic, also had syphilis.

Antecedent history.—Rheumatism several years, bilious fever during service.

Present history.—Present trouble began six years ago with severe gastric pains, followed by swelling of joints. Now hyperæsthesia in places with irregular attacks of paræsthesia of lower extremities; anæsthesia of lower extremities; loss of reflexes; Argyll-Robertson pupil; marked incoordination.

Urine: Sp. gr. 1022; alkaline; 496 gr. fl. oz. 40; epithelial cells; mucus; pus cells; triple phosphates.

Diagnosis: Locomotor ataxia.

Treatment: Elixir of iron, quinine, and strychnine.

CASE V.

[Service of Asst. Surg. C. Pern Robbins.]

John Gomes, late Company B, One hundred and sixty-eighth New York Infantry. Ward 3. Age, 53; occupation, miner; weight, 165 pounds; height, 5 feet 7 inches; married; now a widower. Disease, tabes dorsalis.

Family history.—Father died of old age; mother living; sisters, three, living.

History of case.—Born in Portugal. Habits: Tobacco, alcohol; gonorrhœa, chancre, syphilis.

Antecedent history.—Malaria; fell 30 feet at the age of 12 with injury to the spine.

Present history.—Present trouble commenced in 1890; first noticed incoordination of muscles of legs, then of extremities, then gastric pains with laryngeal pains with vertigo, dimness of vision, now partial paraplegia, spinal pains, anæsthesia, coldness of lower extremities, loss of reflexes.

Diagnosis: Progressive locomotor ataxia.

Treatment: Elixir of iron, quinine, and strychnine.

REPORT FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1892.

CASE VI.

F. A. W., late of Company H, Fourth Iowa Infantry. Has returned to the Home suffering from acute bronchitis, but has no ataxic symptoms.

CASE VII.

P. C., late of Company H, Third Missouri Cavalry, Mexican war. Age, 70. Remains under observation. The paralysis of the lower extremities is more pronounced, and for locomotion he is wholly dependent upon his roller chair.

CASE VIII.

F. S., late of Company H, Second Missouri Cavalry. Has left the Home, and his present condition is unknown.

CASE IX.

D. E., late of Company D, Third Colorado Cavalry. Is now in hospital. The partial paralysis of the bladder and rectum require constant attention. The neuralgic pains of the arms and legs are more frequent.

CASE X.

C. H. S., late of Company E, Thirty-fourth Ohio Infantry. Has left the hospital. Nothing known concerning him.

CASE XI.

J. G., late of Company E, Regular California Infantry. Is now at the barracks relieved from pain and much improved incoordination.

RÉSUMÉ.

ETIOLOGY.

Analysis as to etiology, semiology, and treatment of the five reported cases of tabes dorsalis:

- (1) As to fatigue, all were to a great extent exposed during the service.
- (2) As to mental disturbances, none could recall anything severe in character.
- (3) As to exposure, three, being miners, suffered much from the same. Three complained of injuries.
- (4) As to venereal diseases, four had syphilis; the other inclined to indulge in sexual excess. In regard to other diseases, three had rheumatism, one cerebro-spinal fever, two bilious fever, one enteric fever, one sunstroke.
- (5) As to poisoning, all used alcohol and tobacco; four used alcohol to excess.

SEMIOLOGY.

- (1) As to sensory disturbance, all complained of the same, namely, pains gastric, laryngeal, spinal, and of the extremities. Four had anaesthesia, three hyperaesthesia; all delayed conduction.
- (2) As to knee jerks, all had abolition of the same.
- (3) As to visceral crises, three had gastric, one laryngeal.
- (4) As to paralysis, one had partial paraplegia.
- (5) As to eye symptoms, four had pupil inequality, and all had the Argyll-Robertson pupil.
- (6) As to perverted sexual functions, all complained of the same.
- (7) As to incoordination, four had the same, one had partial paraplegia.
- (8) As to joint affections, three complained of swelling of the larger joints.

TREATMENT.

As to treatment, nearly all laid-down treatments have been tried—suspension, galvanism, rest cure, iodides, mercury, etc., until it has narrowed down to one of two treatments, namely, an elixir of quinine, iron, and strychnine and the chloride of gold and sodium. Of the former, the elixir of quinine, iron, and strychnia seems to do the most good in the advanced stages of tabes dorsalis. Of those in the preataxia stages and beginning of ataxia stages, the chloride of gold and sodium was given in ascending doses. One-tenth of a grain in the beginning until one-quarter of a grain was reached, and then continued upon one-quarter of a grain three times a day for a long period of time. The three cases that were, and are yet, upon the chloride of gold and sodium have given better coordination of the muscles, and the attacks of pains are less severe and return at longer intervals. It would not be just to attribute our gratifying results in these three cases to chloride of gold and sodium alone, for I believe the climate here, which is so beneficial to the weaker natures, plays a very important rôle. Nevertheless, the chloride of gold and sodium should be given a fair trial in all cases. The result here in cases tried has been brilliant in comparison with other treatments.

SPECIAL CASES.

John Waller Fisher, late of Company, Light Artillery, Ninth Wisconsin; age, 60; occupation, carpenter; nativity, Canada; married; weight, 200 pounds. Admitted to the Home May 22, 1895. Admitted to the hospital May 28, 1895. Disease, leucocythæmia.

Family history.—Father died of old age; mother died of dropsy; sisters, five, two dead, cause unknown.

History of the case.—Father of six boys and six girls; habits, a user of tobacco and alcohol, moderately, for forty years.

Antecedent history.—Malaria in 1860, lasting irregularly for eight years; rheumatism in 1865; flux; pneumonia during the service; chronic nasal catarrh; broken ribs on left side in 1870; on right side in 1880; double inguinal hernia; mode of life much exposed to cold and damp.

Present history.—Present trouble began about one year ago with enlarged lymphatic glands, until all the cervical and axillary were involved. Complains of pains in left

side; headache; insomnia; anorexia; constipation; parapism; black spots before the eyes; weakness with extreme lassitude; frequent urination; vertigo; fever.

Present condition on examination.—Marked anæmia; œdema of both legs and feet; pulse weak, rapid, 96; temperature, 102; nausea and vomiting. Hypertrophy of heart, with to and fro murmurs very audible. Lungs, few moist rales with slight dullness at right side. Liver, dullness increased, splenic dullness extending above and merging into the cardiac, dullness below the left inguinal region and into it, and to the right three-fourths of an inch beyond the umbilicus. Cervical and axillary glands enlarged. Urine, 1016 sp. gr.; acid; 540 gr. fl. L.; epithelial cells; mucous.

Diagnosis: Leucocythæmia.

Treatment: Ascending doses of Fowler's solution, then a elixir of quinine, iron, and strychnine.

CASE II.

[Service of Asst. Surg. C. Fern Robbins.]

Henry Wehrung, late of Company D, Ninth Illinois Infantry. Ward I, hospital. Age, 56; occupation, farmer; nativity, France; weight, 160 pounds; height, 5 feet 8 inches; married. Admitted to the Home June 28, 1894; admitted to the hospital May 27, 1895; disease, cerebral compression.

Family history.—Father died with old age; mother died of old age; five sisters, two dead, cause unknown.

During September, 1864, he was struck by a stone upon the head. The wound healed readily, but pain in the head soon appeared. In 1875 he again received an injury by a 2-inch augur falling upon his head, striking upon the vertex to the left of the median line. Cephalalgia and vertigo increased after this. On May 27, 1895, was admitted to the hospital. Two and one-half inches above external angular process of the os frontis there is a depression and adherent cicatrix, the seat of the first injury received. This was circumscribed by a U-shaped incision, forming the flap, base downward, corresponding with the cicatrix of the flap, the skull presenting a depression. This was included in the trephine. The removed button showed uncommon thickening of the cranium, with nearly entire obliteration of the diplo. A puncture of the forcibly pulsating and bulging dura gave exit to clear serum. The button was replaced, the flap stitched, drained, and dressed antiseptically. It healed by first union, and the soldier left the hospital June 13 at his own request. He was relieved from headache, vertigo, and anæsthesia of right arm.

OHIO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME.

OHIO STATE SOLDIERS' HOME, *July 10, 1895.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith reports of cases of locomotor ataxia treated at this Home during the past year.

With the exception of one all the cases were presented last year, and with all of them, so far as I have been able to observe, there has been but little change either for the better or for the worse.

The treatment in these cases and its results are certainly the only points of interest and of these the former has been quite unsatisfactory, while the latter has been uncertain and probably misleading. As regards drugs, everything in the list of remedies has been given trial—phosphorus, strychnine, and the iodides, especially that of sodium, are among the remedies most employed; by some the iodide is looked upon as the "sheet anchor."

As was the case in my report of last year, I am unable to give any microscopical observations because none known to be afflicted with posterior sclerosis died during the past year.

LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA.

CASE I.

Cornelius Divine, Company E, Sixteenth New York Flying Artillery; age, 67; occupation, brick mason; white; single; physique, spare. Date of admission, February 11, 1893. Disease, tabes dorsalis.

H. Doc, 42, pt. 2—18

Urinalysis: Sp. gr., 1.024; color, dark; reaction, acid; albumen traces.

History and diary of the case.—Patient states that he has been a habitual drinker for a long period. Does not admit that he has ever had any venereal disorder. Has had rheumatism in back and shoulders for years since the war.

About four years ago, while working in the water up to his hips, he became disabled so that he had to stop work; at that time he had marked weakness of both legs and violent pains shooting down from the back to the knees. He soon had pains in the region of the spine with slight girdle sensation. Says that after pains had subsided spots of discoloration would appear where the pain had been. Shortly after this had numbness of both feet and legs and walked like a "hamstrung horse," as he described it. Would lift his feet too high. Could not put them down well and could not feel the ground under his feet. Has never had pains in stomach or other viscera. No vomiting.

Present condition.—No pain in extremities except at times, and then it is mostly below the knees. Anæsthesia of left leg marked, but very slight in right leg. Can feel hair pulling and pinching in left leg with difficulty, and can not distinguish contact points of an æsthesiometer at 4 inches on either leg. With heels together and eyes closed, would weave backward and forward, but would not fall. Muscles of both legs of moderate size and power. Knee jerk normal in both legs. Electrical reaction not tried. Pupils evenly contracted and react both to light and distance. No paralysis of extensor muscles or internal lesions that can be found by ophthalmoscopic examination. No affection of joints.

Treatment.—First placed on strychnine sulphate, grain one-hundredth, given three times a day and gradually increased to one-fiftieth. Potassium iodide was given in connection with strychnine, beginning with 10 grains and rapidly increasing up to 30 and 40 grains, or until toleration had been reached. The appeal from the stomach is the sign for the withdrawal of the iodide. Strychnine was then given exclusively in the form of Hall's solution. This treatment was as rapidly as possible pushed to one-twentieth of a grain three times a day, and this still further pushed to one-tenth of a grain three times a day. At this point there was some twitching and the quantity was reduced to one-eighteenth of a grain and so remained for a good period. General tonics were given as required. Bowels were kept lax with the elixir cascara sagrada. The deepened color of the urine was removed by the citrate of potassium with spiritus ætheris urtrosi. The antispasmodics were frequently used to subdue nervous irritability.

August 10, 1894.—Close observation has been kept over patient during the entire year. There has been no change in the treatment of the case except that phosphorous was given at one time for a period of more than four months, but without any good results. Although the use of spirits was denied the patient, yet several periodical spreeds have occurred, and all this may have in some way interfered with all effort made toward the improvement of the condition. So far as has been observed there has been no change in the condition of the patient either for the better or for the worse.

CONDITION AFTER TWENTY-EIGHT MONTHS' TREATMENT.

February 11, 1895.

July 1, 1895.

Had violent pains shooting down from back to knees.

Lifted the feet too high, and could not put them down well; could not feel the ground under his feet.

Had numbness of feet and legs.

Heels together and eyes closed, would fall.

Complains of slight girdle sensation.

No paralysis of extensic muscles.

Pupils evenly contracted.

No pains in legs except occasionally below knees.

Anæsthesia of left leg marked, but very slight in right leg.

Coordination improved slightly.

Heels together and eyes closed, would weave backward and forward, but would not fall.

Does not feel it at all.

No paralysis of extensic muscles.

Pupils evenly contracted and respond both to light and to distance.

CASE II.

Martin Myers, Company H, Forty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry; age, 68; occupation, farmer; nativity, Germany; race, white; single; physique, well nourished. Date of admission, April 24, 1890. Disease, tabes dorsalis. Urinalysis: Sp. gr. 1.220; color, straw; reaction, acid; traces of albumen.

Family history.—No inheritable diseases in any branch or member of the family.

History and diary of the case.—Past: Had every disease common to childhood. Denies ever having syphilis or gonorrhœa.

Present: Patient states that one week prior to attack he was ditching in the wet and cold. He considers that this was the cause of his disease. While building fence found that he was unable to take up a rail without toppling over. Following this came lightning pains in both legs, girdle sensation, and other manifestations of the disease. Patient states that all symptoms came on in a few days. Anæsthesia was preceded by a short period during which was partial and greatly delayed as regarding perception. Incoordination was so great that patient was afraid to walk about. Patient fairly well nourished; eats and sleeps well; bowels constipated. States as above in regard to symptoms.

Physical examination.—Skin normal color and temperature, and imparts a normal sensation to the hand. Muscles seemingly of normal proportion and act with power. When patient shuts his eyes while standing will fall backward. Anæsthesia nearly complete. Patellar reflex entirely absent, ankle clonus gone, Argylt-Robinson symptom pronounced. Difficulty in urination and defecation, with lancinating pains in the bladder. Girdle sensation still noted. Sight is not very good by reason of partial cataract of both eyes; this interferes with examination of fundus.

Treatment.—Patient was placed on the iodide of potassium and compound tincture of gentian, with cold sponge baths and friction along the spinal column.

Result.—At first the case progressed until the muscles showed signs of atrophy; patient could not stand without support; arms also showed signs of incoordination. Later patient began to improve. Muscles regained their power and could be used with more precision. Anæsthesia only partial. Girdle sensation no longer troublesome. Later on, patient can walk without crutches, using only a cane. Reflexes have returned and pain has gone. After one year, patient in comparatively good health.

June 15, 1893.—General health good; appetite good; sleeps well; general bodily condition excellent; body well nourished and robust. Has been out of hospital since 1891, and has not used a cane for some time. Upon closing his eyes he still has difficulty in maintaining his equilibrium. Upon walking shows slight heel-and-toe movement so characteristic in the case when first reported. Says that he falls at times by reason of defective eyesight. Knee jerk is abolished in right side and only slight (if it exists at all) in left.

Present examination of case.—Skin found to be anæsthetic below knees and partially so above. Muscles move powerfully under stimulus, although he is sometimes afraid to walk from sheer weakness. Pupils of eyes evenly contracted; anterior media normal; lens of left eye quite opaque; of right, translucent. A partial reflex from fundus obtained. Argylt-Robinson's sign not obtainable for reasons stated. Patient complains that he sometimes has a sensation similar to the girdle feeling and slight pains down his legs. States that he has pains in both wrists, which is evidently rheumatic in character. Patient insists that he is much better than he was one year ago.

Treatment.—The treatment for the past year has, indeed, been small. At times his pains become quite troublesome for periods of one to three days, and for this phenacetine was given with very happy result.

The latest history of this case goes to prove that the sclerotic changes were only arrested, and resolution but partially begun (if at all) for the recurrence of an occasional lightning pain, and the binding feeling around the abdomen at times, all go to show positively that the disease is determined not to retreat, but to hold its ground and stand in readiness to advance when the opportunity came. Of course, the occasional blundering is not wholly due to lack of coordination, for ocular deficiency, as mentioned in the history, plays an important part in this connection.

The French method of extension was frequently practiced by this patient. This consisted in lying flat on the back on the floor, with a pillow under the head, then elevating the feet, bringing them over until they rested on the floor at each side of the head of the patient. This was frequently done, and whether due to this or not, the patient was quite a walker, going without a cane most of the time. The patient also states that he feels better than he has since he first became afflicted, and he thoroughly believes he is on the road to recovery. For the occasional pains in the legs, phenacetine alone has been given with very happy effect. Morphine has never been given for any of the symptoms, which, I believe, according to best authority, is thought to be correct.

July 22, 1894.—This case has gone on during the year past much as it did during the year previous. There have been times when the symptoms were more prominent, but during the greater portion of the time very little was complained of. Pains in the legs were at times very annoying, but by the use of phenacetine this was destroyed. Patient has been carefully watched and general condition given special attention. Strychnine in large, frequent, and increasing doses was tried, but little for the better resulted. There certainly has been no advance of the sclerotic process and the condition of the patient has remained about one thing for two and one-half years.

TREATMENT FOR FIVE YEARS WITH RESULTS.

April 30, 1890.

June 30, 1895.

Has sharp, lancinating pains darting down hips to knees.

Has pronounced girdle sensation.

Falls if eyes are closed while standing.

Obstinate constipation.

Argylt-Robinson symptom pronounced.

Incoordination so great that patient can not walk with even the aid of crutches.

Complains only of slight pains in legs at times.

Sensation entirely disappeared.

Does not fall, but has great difficulty in maintaining equilibrium.

Constipation disappeared.

The symptom not obtainable.

Patient has become a good walker, and seldom uses a cane.

CASE III.

Thomas J. Hamilton; age, 48; occupation, stone mason; date of admission, June 22, 1894.

Hereditary tendencies: Parents, consumption on mother's side.

Clinical history.—Acquired diseases, fevers, typhoid fever in 1856; lungs, chronic bronchitis; kidneys, chronic cystitis, gleet; pelvic organs, chronic diarrhoea for years; venereal, syphilis pronounced in 1865. Habits as to diet, regular. Habits as to alcohol, always a drinker. Habits as to tobacco or drugs, tobacco, very moderate. Habits as to venery, moderate.

Sensory phenomena, anæsthesia of both legs and left arm. Attitude, with feet spread. Gait, hamstring, flopping gait. Sense of smell, normal. Ear, hearing defective. Eye, pupils, right eye enlarged and react to light at distance; lids, ptosis of right eye; ocular movements, defective in right eye; vision, defective in right eye. Brain, memory failing; sleep, fair; vertigo, slight. Spinal cord, deep reflexes, loss of patellar tendon; delayed sensation, slight; anæsthesia, legs and left arm; hyperæsthesia, both feet; pain, lightning in both legs; coordination, very defective. Pulse, normal. Temperature, normal. Respiration, embarrassed. Voice, husky. Fibrillary twitches, slight. Handwriting, defective. Condition of urethra, gleet. Condition of bladder, cystitis, chronic. Condition of heart, mitral regurgitation.

Diagnosis: Locomotor ataxia.

After war had pronounced chancre, followed in six months by sore mouth, etc. In 1878, while painting, suddenly had twitching of right eyelid, followed by ptosis. As latter improved eyesight failed and strabismus resulted. Now has ptosis, external strabismus, and amaurosis of right eye. In 1890 had lightning pains in left leg and numbness succeeded by soreness at points along legs, afterwards involved both lower extremities and arm.

Present condition.—Patient fairly well nourished. Disease of heart. Chronic cystitis and gleet from old gonorrhœa; also chronic nephritis. Urine dribbles at times. Anæsthesia of both lower extremities and left arm. Hyperæsthesia of both feet. Loss of patellar tendon reflex, but Argylt-Robinson's sign absent. Girdle sensation at times. Lightning pains in legs, followed by sore spots. Incoordination of movement, as shown by inability to walk to line, to stand with eyes shut, to button clothes, or wash face with ease. Electricity showed no abnormal formula.

Treatment.—Was given Hall's solution of strychnine, with tincture of gentian compound in increasing doses. This treatment has been pursued for the past thirteen months exclusively.

Result.—Has improved gradually. Anæsthesia less. Coordination better. Can almost walk to line, and has little difficulty with hands. Urine does not dribble as before. Relapse commences whenever he ceases taking strychnine.

TREATMENT FOR ONE YEAR WITH RESULTS.

Anæsthesia of both legs and left arm marked.

Coordination very defective.

Can not walk line without assistance.

Incontinence of urine.

Inability to button clothes.

Lightning pains in both legs marked.

Falls if eyes are closed while standing.

Anæsthesia less. Has little difficulty with hands.

Improved coordination.

Can almost walk to line.

Has but little trouble.

Has no difficulty in buttoning his clothes.

Much improved.

Does not fall, but has great difficulty in maintaining equilibrium.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report on the cases of locomotor ataxia treated in the hospital of this Home for the year ending June 30, 1895.

One case of locomotor ataxia died January 23, 1895, which was reported June 30, 1893. He lost all power of deglutition and action of stomach and bowels, and practically died from inanition, although the prime cause was tabes.

I have one new case, received during the year, which seems different from any I have ever seen, having more head symptoms. History as follows:

W. F. F., late assistant surgeon of the Fiftieth Louisiana Regiment. Age, 65; born in Louisiana. Admitted to this hospital December 4, 1894.

He states that he had a chance when he was 19 years of age, but never heard from it after he was cured of the sore. As he can not talk intelligently, I called his wife in, who gave me the following:

"After the war he came North and practiced medicine (homeopathy). He secured a large practice and necessarily worked night and day. About thirteen years ago he had an attack of hemiplegia, which lasted one week, and in a week or two resumed practice. He has not been right mentally and physically since that time. About six years ago he had an attack of asthma and sore throat, which confined him to the house several months. Three years ago he began to lose the use of his lower extremities and had shooting pains in them, also had similar pains in his arms."

Symptoms when admitted.—Sallow complexion; muscles atrophied; skin soft, apparently normal; sensation acute; vision and hearing unimpaired; speech very defective, can hardly understand him; deglutition difficult; can not walk or even stand with eyes shut. He has the usual ataxic gait in walking; uses a cane and takes the position of a tripod; is fretful and cries easily; has shooting pains in legs and arms; the knee jerk is normal; bowels are constipated, and appetite fairly good; memory and reason are very much impaired; is quite indifferent and unsocial to his friends. These are the principal symptoms in his case, sufficient to establish a case of locomotor ataxia, with marked head complication. Now the question is, whether the head symptoms are referable to the effects of hemiplegia thirteen years ago, or to tabes direct. Hirt mentions, in his treatise on mental diseases, page 586, that "the cerebral symptoms, which appear in the course of the disease, are referable either to the cranial nerves or to the brain substance. When the latter is affected it is sometimes the cortex, at other times the white substance, and again the basal ganglia which are most implicated." In this case it would seem that both cranial nerves and brain substance were implicated.

Treatment.—The treatment for the first four months was potassium iodide and strychnine; also mild laxatives as needed. Since then he has been given compound sirup of hypophosphites after meals and strychnia arsenate before meals. He seems to be doing well.

CASES OF EPITHELIOMA.

I have two cases of epithelioma of the lip to report which were excised about a year ago while the system was saturated with calcium of sulphide. The treatment was continued for several months. No signs of the return of the disease are noticeable.

Two other cases too far advanced to justify an operation have been stayed, and one of them has taken on a healthy appearance and is healing quite rapidly. They are taking 2 grains every three hours during waking hours.
